the blessed Season when the First Advent is celebrated, it should remind us that this was the first psychic event recorded in the New Testament: "In the time of Herod, King, behold there

came three wise men from

As we again approach

the east to Jerusalem saying, "where is he that is born King of the Jews? for we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him." Although Matthew did not give their names, there arose a tradition in the 7th century that their names were Melchior, Gaspar and Balthazar and that they had been priests in ancient cults in Persia and Medea. The fact seems to have been so much believed in the time of Constantine the Great, the first Christian Emperor of the Roman world, in, just a matter of three centuries after the First Advent, that Constantine's mother Helen, investigated and claimed to have found the mumified bodies of the Magi and brought them to Constantinople, the bodies were later taken to Milan, Italy, and later taken to Cologne, Germany in A.D. 1162, by King Barbarossa and deposited in the great cathedral there. Their sarcophagi are called,

The exact year and day of Jesus' birth are not known but the best authorities agree that it was between B.C. three and eight. Certain errors in computing exact time caused this controversy. There have been certain rash and ignorant people that have declared that there never was a Jesus of Nazareth. Such people have little knowledge of the facts we are about to hear. Consider this, within one generation from his birth, Christians, those who had heard the facts from their own people, were herded into Roman amphitheatres and martyred by many thousands because they would not deny Him. Would you that read this take the following infernal tortures as these?

TACITUS' LETTER

Still in existence. Written about A.D. 64 while several of Jesus disciples were still living. Tacitus was probably Rome's greatest historian. This is from his Annals (XV: 44)

"Nero put in his own place as culprits, and punished with most ingenious cruelty, men whom the common people hated for their shameful crimes and called Christians. Christ, from whom the name was derived, had been put to death in the reign of Tiberius by the procurator Pontius Pilate. The deadly superstition, having been checked for a while, began to break out again, not only through Judea, where the mischief first arose, but also in Rome, where from all sides all things infamous and shameful meet and become fashionable. Therefore, at the beginning, some were seized and made confessions, then, on their information, a vast multitude were convicted, not so much of arson as of hatred for the human race.

"They were not only put to death, but subjected to inhuman tortures, in that they were either dressed in the skins of wild animals and so perished by the cruel mangling of wild dogs, or else put on crosses to be set on fire, and, as the day declines, to be burned, being used to light the night. Nero had thrown open his gardens for this spectacle, and gave a circus play, mingling with the people dressed in a charioteers costume or driving in a chariot. From this barbarity arose, however, sympathy toward men who were indeed criminals and deserving extreme tortures, on the ground that they were not being destroyed for the public good, but to satisfy the cruelty of an individual (Nero)."

Can we, dare we doubt that such a being as Jesus existed?

PLINY'S LETTER TO THE EMPEROR TRAJAN, FROM BITHYNIA CA 112 A.D.

"The method I have observed towards those who have been denounced to be as Christians: I asked them if they were Christians; if they confessed it, I repeated the question again, adding the threat of terrible death; and if they still persisted, I ordered them to be executed. Those who denied they were or ever had been Christians, and who repeated after me an invocation to the gods, and offered adoration with wine and sweet perfumes to your image, which I had ordered to be brought for that purpose, together with those who finally cursed Christ -none of which acts those who are really Christians can be forced into performing those I thought fit to discharge.

"People of all ranks and ages are and will be persecuted. This contagion and superstition is not confined to the cities only, but has spread through the villages and rural districts: it seems possible, however, to check and cure it. It is certain at least that the temples of the Roman gods, which have been almost deserted, are beginning to be frequented; and the sacred festivals, after a long interval, are being revived; while there is a general demand for sacrificial animals, which for some time have met with few buyers."

Remember that when this was written there were undoubtedly some living who had seen Jesus Christ. Furthermore, we must keep in mind that orthodox Jewery hated Jesus and His followers in a degree that was almost incurable insanity. The very mention of Jesus name would cause orthodox members of that religion to make an inprecation and spit on the ground just as they had spit in His face when He stood before Pontius Pilate. This is all in New Testament. May we not, now, consult the Jewish holy books. One of the most learned Jews, very strongly orthodox, and yet one who held his honor high - his name was Rawlinson — translated the Talmud into German and stated unequivocally that it is mere subterfuge to deny that such a being had existed, that He healed the ills of countless people, did walk on the waters of the Sea of Gallilee, and that He was crucified just before the Passover.

Can one doubt that the story, in the main, is absolutely true when we bear in mind that the nationalities that abhored Him most, and persecuted and martyred His followers, admitted in cold print that He existed and performed the miracles as stated in New Testament?

WHAT IS A MEDIUM?

There are several definitions recorded in Webster but the one we are interested in is this:

"One through whom the spirits of the dead are believed to get in communication with living people."

Employing that definition, we cannot doubt that Jesus of Nazareth was a spirit medium, a prophet, and a healer. We must understand that the Palestinian language from the time the Israelites were enslaved and carried away to Babylon, where they were forced to speak Aramanic — OR ELSE — the language was therefore Aramaic (Chaldeic). If one doubts that statement, let the doubter consult any

good dictionary to find this definition: "One of a group of languages used in Palestine. The language spoken by Jesus and his disciples." Now, the Bible we use — King James and a few newer translations were from a supposed Greek text. But Jesus did not speak Greek. Therefore, as the great authority, Dr. George Lamsa says, the Aramaic text was translated into Greek which was, in turn translated into modern languages. But, says Dr. Lamsa, very, very gross errors occur in translations from one language to another. In fact, we hardly know our own English tongue. Why not consider a few examples? The word apprehend may mean to arrest or to stop, or to understand. The word observe may mean to speak, to see. Two examples out of thousands to prove that the spoken word, or written word cannot always be depended on. How far more difficult it is, then, to translate from one language to another. The Old Testament is the history of a people from barbarism through floods of blood, to a new way of life enunciated by Jesus the Christ. (The word Christ means to anoint one, and does not necessarily imply diety). Yet, the Old Testament is replete with psychic proofs that man does not die — only the worn out body. That there are good and evil spirits and that there were mediums that plug in the line between the seen and the unseen. And there are many, many Jewish fables to be avoided as Paul stated in his Epistle to Timothy.

Take the case of Moses hammering a rock and water gushed out. (Numbers 20:11) We have modern idioms to demonstrate how incorrect the idea. A prospector makes a gold strike. A driller strikes oil. A striking example. The truth about Moses procuring water is proved by the very Book. Wells in the desert are invaluable, but would be soon buried in the sands. So a flat stone is placed over the well but is soon covered and concealed by drifting sands. When people want to find a well, buried in sand, THEY PROBE THE AREA UNTIL THE PROBE STRIKES THE STONE COVERING THE WELL. Its just as simple as that and true as well. NOW CONSIDER Numbers, 21:18, "The princes digged the well, the nobles of the people digged it, by the

A certain ruler came to Jesus for aid for a dying daughter. While he spoke to Jesus a messenger came to announce, "Thy daughter is dead; trouble not the Master. Jesus heard and said, 'Fear not, believe only, and she will be made whole.' . . . And they all wept and bemoaned her; but he said, 'Weep not; she is not dead, but sleepeth.' And they laughed Him to scorn, knowing she was dead. And He put them all out, and took her by the hand, and called saying, 'MAID ARISE.' "AND HER SPIRIT CAME BACK AGAIN."

Almost a full century ago, enemies of the truth which every true Spiritualist knows, that man surives and can communicate with those on this plane, led by Orthodox tyrants, mocked the movement to the point that the London Dialectical Society was formed by some of the most reputable citizens of Britain. They determined to make the most thorough investigation ever undertaken into the claims of Spiritualists. In the early seventies their investigations and the factual results were published and reported miracles paralleling Jesus mira-

cles with the exception of raising the dead to life. IN FACT, THEY REPORTED THINGS NOT RECORDED IN THE HOLY BIBLE, AND PROVED THEM BY EVERY MEANS KNOWN TO MAN. About His miracles Jesus had said:

I Corinthians 12

"For to one is given the word of wisdom: to another the gift of faith, to another the gift of healing by the same Spirit. To another the working miracles: to another prophesy; to another the discerning of spirits . . ." The word discern actually means to see and understand.

Paul was also a medium and the seance on the Road to Damascus proves it. He was a spiritual healer as one finds recorded in Acts and his Epistles. Look them up for they are well-worth reading and will confute the claims of the ignorant and the avaricious who prey on the ignorant. Both Peter and Paul had what Orthodoxy call visions. These were really communications between two worlds — the seen and the unseen. Consider the scene called the Transfiguation. Both Moses and Elias materialized and talked with Jesus. But Moses and Elias had been called higher many centuries before this historical event of the ages. They proved that only the human body dies and returns to earth, just as Solomon wrote a full millenium before the First Advent:

"Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was: and the spirit to God who gave it." That does not agree with our Orthodox friends who preach a soul sleeping in a mass of festering flesh until some future mythical resurrection. The above factual gem is to be found in Ecclesiastes. Job has a word for us in Job 4:14: "Then fear came upon me, trembling that made all my bones to shake. Then a spirit passed before my face, the hair of my flesh stood up. . . ."

Thus one could go on for hours detailing Biblical facts that our orthodox friends dodge as they would the black plague.

AS WE APPROACH THE CHRISTMAS SEASON

One of the great books of all time was written by a Spiritualist, Charles Dickens. The book is CHRISTMAS CAROL, a work that no person can read without being a better person. May I brief a bit of it? One of the grouchiest,

most miserly, most unChristian men in England was one Ebenezer Scrooge. For his inhumanity, his former partner, one Jacob Marley's ghost haunted him. Marley's spirit came arrayed in the chain of material objects he had forged in life. Now hear the great exposition of what Spiritualists known to be true:

"It is required of every man," the ghost returned, "that the spirit within him should walk abroad among his fellow-men; and if that spirit goes not forth in life, it is condemned to do so after death. It is doomed to wander through the world - oh, woe is me! and witness what it cannot share, but might have shared on earth, and turned to happiness!" Again the ghost raised a cry, and shook its chain and wrung its shadowy hands. "You are fettered," said Scrooge, "Why?" I wear the chain I forged in life. I made it link by link, and girded it on with my own free will and wore it. Would you know the weight and length of the strong coil you bear yourself? It was as heavy and long seven Christmas Eves

ago. It is a ponderous chain!"

The horrifying drama rushes ahead at supersonic speed and the ghost tells Scrooge that he must be haunted by three spirits, that is, if he thirsts to avoid Marley's fate. He gives Scrooge no possible way out of a ghostly visitation — three of them, and prepares to leave by way of a window. Scrooges rushed to the window. He becomes sensible of confused sounds, fearful lamentations of regret; of wailings inexpressively sorrowful and self-accusatory. Scrooge sees that the air is filled with phantoms, wandering in desperate haste. moaning as they went. . . . Scrooge had been quite familiar with one old ghost, in a white waistcoat, with a monstrous safe attached to his ankle, who cried piteously at being unable to help a wretched woman with an infant, whom it saw below, upon a doorstep." NOW HEAR THIS: "The misery of them all was, clearly, that they sought to interfere, for good. in human affairs, and had lost the power for ever."

Dickens made just one error in this, the greatest drama since Chaucer. WE SPIRIT-UALISTS KNOW, AND I HAVE HAD THE PROOFS, THAT THE GATES OF REDEMPTION ARE NEVER CLOSED. WE KNOW, IF WE WILL BUT THINK, THAT ACCUSING A MERCIFUL FATHER OF BARBARISMS TRILLIONS OF TIMES WORSE THAT NERO, HITLER AND OTHER BUTCHERS, IS A BASE BLASPHEMY AGAINST OUR CREATOR-FATHER.

PAGANISM IN MODERN CHRISTMASES

Once again at Christmas the Master of Galilee and the Babe of Bethlehem come to mind and proverbally knock at our doors, in the midst of murky clouds of forebodings of disaster that pursue Earth's ways. Some of us respond to the Presence at our doors, and recall that History repeats itself in much the same ways of destruction as formerly, with a world falling to pieces from the for-

saking of God and righteousness, crippled with greed, commercialism, and materialism. At the first Christmas was the world in which Hebrew religion had failed, also Greek philosophy, and Roman politics were corrupt beyond description

Our modern Christmases become more and more corrupt, reverting in many respects back to the pagan practices of the heathen dieties, and Nature spirits, born on December 25, and celebrating that date as their birthday. Of course that was not Jesus' birthday, as attending circumstances of His birth would make that date impossible, since it would be far too cold in Palestine for shepherds to be sitting out doors on the hillsides with their sheep, apparently holding a seance in which unusual events had occurred that caused them to fear, inasmuch as an angel appeared and said, "Fear not," then announced the Great Event of Christs' birth. And many more angels appeared, and with much singing and rejoicing. Very naturally December 25th, being the birthday of the gods, would be assigned to Jesus, as he was taken for another god with special announcement by heaven.

However, in those days people paid no special attention to the birthdates of the Great, but rather to the dates of their death. The early Christian Church did not celebrate Jesus' birthday. The Master was the Great Leader of the Piscean Age. Pisces, the Fishes, is the zodiacal sign of the month of March. This month seems to fit in with other facts concerning His birthday, so is the most logical time of His birth.

Besides giving the Master Jesus a pagan birthday, pagan customs, increasing in modern times, with the down-going of the Age, have attached themselves to the celebration of His birthday, making it very similar now to that of the gods and Nature spirits, especially of Rome and of the Norsemen, with their vulgar, degrading, and harmful customs, obnoxious in many ways to the better of mankind. There

were the demoralizing feasts of stuffed turkeys and birds, drinking and obscene customs, by the Romans; and by the Norsemen in their celebrations were the Yule log, holly, mistletoe, and wassail bowl of liquor with carousing these were relics of pre-Christian times, partly adopted in the present as being proper for the occasion, though having nothing to do with the celebration of the birthday of the Christ. The Yule log coming from the Druids, while the Christmas tree was used in Rome and Egypt sometimes a palm in the latter place. The lights on the trees came from the Jewish Feast of Lights — the holly was of pagan origin, used in the festival of Saturn, and also used by the Christians to camouflage their homes by decorating their windows when they observed sacred rites. The mistletoe came from a plant sacred to the ancient Druids, dedicated to the Goddes of Love — hence the reason that kisses are stolen beneath it, as it often dangles from the Christmas tree. Santa Claus became a part of Christmas from the practices of Nicholas, Bishop of Myna, in Asia Minor, who gave rich dowries to poor peasant girls who married. He was so lavish and irrational in his types of giving that the local authorities frequently arrested him. However, his fame spread to many lands. He was known as San Nicholaas in Holland, and when the Dutch settlers came to America, they brought his story with them. To the children the pronunciation of his name sounded like Santa Claus. With all these celebrations there was always much feasting, drinking, and carousing that has nothing to do the the birthday of the Christ; anymore than our superficial clutter of Christmas cards, even some of Santa Claus, as though it were his birthday, and some cards even worse in color, design, and subject matter.

The ancient festivals became so obnoxious that the ancient Egyptians and Chaldeans prayed for a deliverer to come to release them from such observances. But in those days they did not have to contend with the crowds in the stores laden with many useless, glittering commercialized gifts, that have nothing whatever to do the the real spirit and celebration of Christmas and for what it stands. Neither did they have to contend with the harmful toys now that often mothers and grandmothers select for children, such as war toys, pistols, guns, firecrackers, caps, soldiers' uniforms and such like that perpetuate war, hate, murder that cause children to think such things are legitimate, and that to fight, to main, and kill are all a part of routine, all this coupled with what they see on TV, causes them to think

nothing of killing, and to forget the words of the Master whose birthday they may be celebrating, who said, "He that taketh the sword shall perish by the sword" — and this is just what is happening now, with the sons brought up on war toys that feel it a duty in many instances, to kill brother man. Why not do away with pagan customs and give children something creative, something they can build with, that is educational, that will bring out originality, character building, — a kit of tools, boards, nails, tinker toys, things to put together and construct with — a backyard where caves can be dug, where castles can be built in sand piles, a play house where the girls can make dolls' clothes and carry on a miniature household with their neighbor friends. And if they serve meals to the dolls, they should be taught to say "grace," as part of their play, for in later life they will do much the same as they play when younger.

When weary of the present Christmases with all its paganism, leading to the need of a vacation and a doctor often, due to the extra strain of Christmas, with many of its useless gifts as of former years, why not debunk paganism and come back to a real, simple, peaceful, constructive, Christ-filled Christmas in which a few of the following suggestions supplemented by thoughtful people, may be carried out to the benefit of the giver and the receiver. Things that the giver does or makes is always at a premium rather than the things


purchased.

Suppose we were to surprise the angels and give for Christmas a part of ourselves, our time, our talents, things we have that we can share or obtain that would be in the spirit of Christ's birthday and that He would approve? We could write our friends that we are trying an experiment, a different kind of Christmas, and if they do not hear further from us this Christmas we send out love and blessings that all good may attend them. As we give part of ourselves in service, let us decide according to the temperament and needs of each individual just what we can best offer to meet his or her needs.

It may be possible we can write letters for a friend going blind, or to those that are blind, or maybe read an hour to a shut-in in our locality. Perhaps we can donate two hours to discuss things of special interest to adolescents, perhaps concerning one girl or boy friends that will help toward future happiness: or perhaps discuss possible occupations, and the like. Some could tutor a backward child, all as a Christmas gift among many other

And if there are physical needs, they too could be supplied, often in the country from one's own garden, for it was the Christ who said, I was sick and ye visited me not", and He

GREETINGS:

Once again as we meet in Convention in the beautiful City of Denver, it is my privilege and honor to present the report of the Lyceums

throughout the country.

These Reports show that our Lyceum Conductors are using both the American and British Lyceum Manuals as was suggested at the 1967 Lyceum Conference, and I am sure that the children under the Spiritual guidance of the Conductors and teachers in charge are learning about Spiriualism in a very efficient way, and our thanks go to everyone interested in the spiritual unfoldment of our children and young people.

It is uplifting to know that our young people, noticing the interest the world is taking in Psychic Phenomena and subjects relating to Spiriualism, want to know more about the Science, Philosophy and Religion of the truths they profess. This intrest is World Wide and it is confirmed by reports coming from abroad

and from our own country.

I recently received the first issue of a new magazine, named Psicon, compiled and edited by young people in England, who are striving to draw to their group anyone interested in Spiritualism and allied subjects, I have the first copy with me and anyone interested in subscribing to it may do so.

At our Conference in Lily Dale, all children over twelve years of age were asked to remain on the Conference floor, so that they could express in their own words what they wanted, not only for the 1969 Conference, but in their Churches Lyceum sessions.

Some of their suggestions are as follows:

That all of our Churces will conduct (Home Circles) so that they may have the opportunity

of unfolding their own Mediumship, this being conducted under the guidance of a competent

medium and teacher.

They have asked that if possible at our next Conference at Lily Dale they might be able to sit in a Seance of Physical Mediumship so that they may better understand the things that have brought Spiritualism into prominence in World religions. This of course would be under the guidance of the Lily Dale Officers.

They want open discussions group with young people of their own age and later to draw into these discussions older Spiritualists of learning, to be sure they have the correct

understanding.

At our next conference they would like a Panel discussion of their own group and age against those who have made a study of Spiritualism and are responsible for the teachings of our Lyceumists.

It was suggested that "TOPICS" and suggested material for lessons should be printed in the Spotlight, teachers giving their own interpretations to the various age groups.

It was most interesting to listen to the reading of papers sent in from Wheeling, St. Louis and Michigan. These writings will appear in

the Spotlight as space permits.

Some of these papers were from very young children, and showed that wherever our religion is being taught it is opening up in the minds of our children the importance and the power of knowledge of Spiritualism can give them.

They know that they can and do receive help from the other side of life if they have the faith to believe.

At this point we should all express our deep appreciation to Rev. Elsie Butler Bunts for her great love and effort she expends in publishing the Spotlight, in spite of not being too well, she carried on because of her love for Spiritualism but because most of all, she loves the children.

Our thanks must be given to all who so generously helped at our Conference, particularly to Mr. R. Robeson, who, with the help of Mr. Ralph Cutlip provided us with such a delicious barbecued chicken in place of the usual banquet.

All of these things bring us to the fact that Spiritualism is an advanced thought as far as religion is concerned, we are here to teach our children that mankind has always searched for a God Power, and that the teachings of the past are important as they are compared with the unfoldment of mans thinking, and the teachings of the Bible can be shown to be, not miracles, but that Spirit has always worked through mans mind and was as natural as the mediumship we witness today, as our young friends from Texas say, "Teach us the Bible from our Spiritualistic understanding

may be able to discuss intelligently our viewpoint in a matter which is bound to come up wherever young people meet together".

Our Spiriualism must teach our that there are two things which must be unfolded, not only mediumship but the unfoldment of the Spiritual lives of our children, the responsibility of themselves in learning at a young age their moral responsibility, for if this is unfolded at an early age, it will carry them through a greater knowledge of truth. COMPARATIVE RELIGION By Margaret L. King

A set of beliefs and code of conduct have always been essential to the welfare of man. This is because he is part of the Divine Principle, or, as we might say — the Holy Spirit. Since man is a unit of the Eeternal Consciousness, possessing his individual soul qualities, he cannot help but seek his link to the source of life. This may be done consciously or unconsciously. An individual develops his religion or contact with God through sheer necessity, regardless of whether he things he wants it or not.

Religion takes many forms according to the individual consciousness. Long before any records were kept, man made many crude attempts to find his place in the universe and to express his true identity. The form which his expression took depended upon his state of consciousness or self development. His religion had to fit the individuals make-up.

Environment and way of living also had a controlling influence. Thus the cave man first drew crude pictures and symbols on the walls of his cave. When men moved about in tribes their Gods took on the peculiar characteristics of their adherents. Then, local communities, cities, and nations developed their own Gods. The local chief or the emperor was usually the leader, dispenser of the law, and chief authority for the ceremonies of worship and expression of belief.

The Gods of men took on all the human attributes of the believers. A whole pantheon of Gods lived in a special place of their own and behaved in a very human way, although possessing more power and glory than their followers.

In the course of time religion changed its emphasis. The Jewish people in particular, influenced by their experience in Egypt, began to think of one mighty Jehovah—a God of right-eousness and of faith — demanding that his children follow a stern moral and ethical code.

It became important not only to propitiate God but to obey the laws laid down in his commandments. Man continued his endless

task of learning to live by law.

However, law differed according to race, geography, customs and circumstances of life. Recognition and understanding of laws are achieved through inner compulsion and growth. Since this comes from within, it must be sought by the individual from within. No one can force it upon him. Our experiences here on earth are for the purpose of finding our own inner spiritual development or link with God—in short, our personal religion or way of life. Because each of us has a soul, he must make his own search and build his own spiritual temple while in the physical body.

Today, religion continues to appear in many different forms, appealing to and having meaning for all types of people. As mens minds open, his old beliefs are discarded and new ideas take their place. So, modern Spiritualism arose as a further step along the path of en-

lightenment and self-realization.

The importance of the religion of Spiritualism in mans journey to find himself is that he learns he is an individual spirt; that he is eternal — never losing his personality — but continuing from one phase of life to another. After many changes and series of experiences he arrives at a degree of understanding and self knowledge. He can begin to taste the glory of bringing to light his true identity and finding his place with God.

THE SPIRIT WORLD By Edwin W. Ford

Throughout the years I have had an intense interest in the lift following death. Details concerning this life, to me, did not seem adequate in centuries-old Christian and Hebrew writings. At least four (4) different views concerning the after-life area in the Bible and theological writings. All of them cannot be true because of the conflicts.

The general resurrection day theory, for example, cannot be accepted from the standpoint of pure reason alone. Why would God in one day resurrect the billions of people who had lived on this earth only to have most of them starve to death within a few weeks? It is too preposterous to consider seriously.

General dissatisfaction with the meagre information regarding the afterlife available in orthodoxy was one of the reasons that caused me to seek further. It was only in Spiritualism

that I found sensible answers.

Since becoming a Spiritualist, about twentyfive years ago, I have persisted in my quest in learning about the after-life. Much information has been given to me by relatives and friends who have gone on before. Also, I have met a few people who have visited the spirit-world — some for as long as

several days and nights.

In Dr. Barnes writings she tells us of the European doctor who researched the subject of the spirit-body by physical means. He carefully and accurately weighed a patient who was about to pass on in the hospital. After the patients death he weighed the body to see if there was a difference in weight. If there was any loss in weight, he reasoned, this was the weight of the spiritual person, or soul. The difference, as averaged over a large number of patients, came to less than an ounce. He proved that at the moment of death something left the body, and that something must have been the life principle as the body became inanimate and began its disintegration after the change.

If a two-hundred pound person at the moment of transition become a one-ounce spirit, it explains to some degree the sense of lightness, freedom, and buoyancy which so many spirit people have remarked about. Their bodies are just as energized as previously but the mass of coarse earth matter has been left behind with all its pains and limitations.

The spirit-body is much more amendable to thought than was the physical body: spiritpeople tell us they can go anywhere they wish

with a speed comparable to thought.

The Spirit-World is infinite in size just as surely as our physical world is infinite. God does not place limitations on man or spirit; and we know that the two worlds interpenetrate

The people in the Spirit World tell us that their world is just as real and solid to them as our world is to us. Furthermore, they report it is a world of great beauty, beauty of such magnitude that they cannot adequately describe it in our earth-words. This beauty extends to all fields. In the vibration of color, spirit people often mention that the colors go beyond anything we know. In the vibration of music the music of earth is crude by comparison.



EAST ST. LOUIS, ILLINOIS



People in spirit no longer have to provide the necessities through labor and can pursue a professional education if they wish and gain

the knowledge they missed on earth.

Many people reach the heaven-world with the belief that certain work was unfinished. An inventor, for example, passes on before completing an invention that he considered very important to mankind. In Spirit he can continue the development of his invention, and when perfected he and others can send the information to some kindred soul or souls on earth who will carry it through to completion. I firmly believe one must be dedicated from the heart, filled with compassion, good will and generosity to meet the inquiring mind and condition of today. We must feel an Inner urge — dedicated to the assigned appointment.

Firstly — We must recognize we are living in a new era and this new generation is different than the generation of yester-year —

therefore, it is my fervent belief that Spiritualism can bridge that gap — because it is **not filled** with dogma — creed and thou shalt not. This generation is not satisfied with a **blind** faith or a God of Fear or wrath.

We are in a Scientific age — wherein our great scientific minds have tapped the secrets of the Universe exploring space, and under water and this new generation wants fact and logic.

The teaching of Spiritualism as Philosophy

-Science and Religion fills this need.

Philosophy deals with Wisdom — causes and effects — Reasons and teaches the application of Principle. Our Science investigates, analyses, classifies, discovers the general operation of Laws.

Spiritualism is Religion because it delves in and understands the Physical, Mental and Spiritual Laws IN Nature that leads man to Infinite Intelligence (God) as a Universal Law of Life applicable to all mankind — thus Leading one to Truth — Reality and Responsibility.
