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

EDITORIAL

SCIENCE, RELIGION AND SPIRITUALISM

Surely the time has fully come when Science and Religion ought to be revised, in respect to some of their basic tenets and doctrines, in view of the Light of Spiritualism. Science a generation ago was exceedingly dogmatic in asserting that there was no such thing as spirit. Mind and so-called spirit were, it said, merely manifestations of brain-functioning. The necessary corollary of that well-worn tenet that when a man's brain ceased to think, and his physical sense ceased to correspond with their environment, all we knew of that a man became dissolved in a few, simple elementary chemical substances. Death ended all. Science professed to know only one world—the physical. It denied that there could be any other, or any reality

beyond what could be ascertained by the five physical senses. No such thing as soul or spirit was discoverable by any process known to science. And therefore neither soul nor spirit existed. It declared this quite positively as scientific truth, and it became known to the world under the high-sounding title of scientific materialism. All claims that the spirit of man could exist apart from a physical body, Science in its pride and confidence, regarded as mere vestiges of primitive supersition-as "old wives' fables". Apparitions did not exist; they were only delusions of disordered imaginations-when they were not the tricks of spring-heeled Jacks! In this way Science became an aggressive and formidable enemy of Religion. It claimed that its material hypothesis ruled the whole realm of intelligence. It covered all known facts. God and spirit were not known facts. If any one supposed they were, let him produce them and lay them upon the laboratory tables, where they might be examined. If no one could fulfill this demand, then let the world for ever hold its peace. Science pressed this view, and it had its day, for many and eminent were the men who held it. As Materialism became widespread, Religion decayed. Skepticism, Agnosticism, Positivism, Atheism, Infidelity, Rationalism became the habit of the times. And Religion with its appeals to ancient Scriptures and traditional beliefs had no suitable weapon with which to repel their assaults. To say "I believe" in God and spirit was not to know them or to demonstrate them. "Of course you believe", said Science, "and you are quite sincere, but your belief is intangible; you can not prove it; it is merely something you have inherited from your unscientific progenitors." It was little use in such a conflict for Religionists to assert that the facts of spirit could only be spiritually discerned. Science could not acknowledge either the facts or the discernment. Neither was it helpful to refer to such incidents recorded in Scripture as the prophet Samuel returning after his death to converse with Saul, or the postmortem appearances of Jesus to His disciples, because Science claimed that Nature acted invariably in a consistent and uniform manner, and if such things really happened in the long distant past, how was it that they did not happen now? And here Religion was touched upon the raw, because it claimed that these mysterious events belonged only to Biblical times and the age of miracles. It banned the very idea that any manifestations of spirit presences could possibly happen or be divinely sanctioned after the last chapter of Revelation was written. That book was closed; the Almighty had not one jot or tittle to add to it; His revelation was complete. Therefore if it were alleged that in these latter days strange and wonderful physical phenomena had occurred, which suggested

WHO IS FIGHTING AGAINST GOD?

The gentle physician Luke gives the true facts. Let us all open the Bible to Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 22. Paul was being tried before the Sanhedrim for his very physical life because of his alleged heresy. If convicted he must suffer that most horrible form of public execution — being stoned, that is being beaten to a pulp by handy stones thrown by those who should have known that great commandment, "Thou shalt not kill."

The Pharisees believed in spirits and in the resurrection. The Saducees believed in neither one. So a great commotion arose so now, let us quote verbatim from the Bible text. "So the Scribes of the Pharisees arose and cried out, 'WE FIND NO EVIL IN THIS MAN (PAUL) FOR IF A SPIRIT OR ANGEL HATH SPOKEN TO HIM, WE MUST NOT FIGHT AGAINST GOD." It was necessary to call out Roman soldiers to stop the riot. True Spiritualists believe in spirits from personal and continuing experiences. They believe, with proofs, that the resurrection takes place when the immortal spirit leaves the mortal body. That the spirit does not remain in the decaying flesh until some mythical future day. That the spirit is just as good or as evil as it was when the passing occurs. Since Jesus' day millions of humans have been slaughtered by alleged Christians despite Jesus' direct commandment, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself," and gave us that wonderful parable of the man that went down from Jerusalem to Jerico. How he was robbed and beaten almost to death, how a priest and a Levite passed him by, and how a proverbial enemy of Jews dressed his wounds, took him to an inn, and paid for his nursing there. May we follow the text for a short period? "The Jews formed a conspiracy and bound themselves that they would not eat or drink until they had killed Paul."

As with all Godless oaths, they broke it and lived, or died from starvation. Who then fights God? The answer is plain, it is those that persecute and kill those that believe in Spiritualist proofs and practices. The concept of an immortal, indestructable part of Man is older than the written word. Twenty-five thousand years before the First Advent, Cro-Magnon and Nieanderthal Man had definate ideas about the survival of the spirit of those that physically died. In the caves along the French-Spanish border, caves known to have been used not less than 200 centuries ago, there are magnificent

paintings, etchings on walls and ceilings, clay statues of men and animals-many of them long ago extinct, and stone artifacts showing that true Spiritualism is far older than any religion existing today. There are age-long etchings of priests in worshipping their idea of a God.

A century ago an anthropologist found a peculiarly shaped stone etched by some Cro-Magnon artist showing the corpse of a woman. A priest (sachem) bends over her, sprinkling some liquid over the remains, and, from the area of the heart emerges what can only be accepted as the immortal part of her. The stone also proves that our forefather of 25,000 B.C. were Phallic worshippers. Many years ago, a friend in Europe sent me a good photograph of this proof that the belief in survival was a gift from God intended to take away the fear of extinction. There can not be the least doubt about these testaments as the relics of timeless existence of Man can be seen to this day.

How strange that orthodoxy tries to deny FACTS, but still accepts the Adam and Eve fable, easily proved so by the mere logic of reason. Hear this: God created Adam from the earth, took a rib from Adam's side to make Eve. They disobeyed God's commandment and were driven from Garden of Eden. They had two children, Cain and Able, Cain hated his brother and killed him. God knew this and drove him away. He protested, "Every man that seeth me will kill me! BUT BIBLICALLY SPEAKING, THERE WERE NO OTHER MEN EXCEPT HIS FATHER ADAM. Cain went into the land of Nod and there knew his wife. BUT, BIBLIC-ALLY SPEAKING THE ONLY LIVING WOMAN WAS HIS MOTHER EVE. REMEM-BER, THE ONLY LIVING WOMAN, IF WE ACCEPT THE BIBLE FICTION, WAS EVE. The Apostle Paul warned us TO AVOID JEW-ISH FABLES. AND DISPUTATIONS OF SCI-ENCE FALSELY SO-CALLED. I Timothy 2-20. Thus did he condemn much of the modern theology, and doubly condemn so-called science. science that is destroying the human race. Socalled science that devises means of human and animal tortures.

SPIRITS PROVED IN OLD TESTAMENT

In Exodus we find the mention of the Urim and Thummin. They were part of the personal apparel of the High Priest and were supposed to bestow great wisdom and psychic power on the wearer. The two are mentioned a number of times in O.T. but the most interesting is found in I Samuel 28-6, to prove that the Gift of prophesy proclaimed by Paul many centuries later, was known and admitted by the Jews: "And when Saul inquired, the Lord answered

him not by dreams, nor by Urim, nor by prophets." Saul in despair sent messengers to the High Priest Samuel who admitted he was a prophet, formerly called seer. Samuel said, "Come tomorrow and I will answer your questions." Soon afterward Samuel died and Saul inquired of the Woman (not Witch) of Endor a highly gifted medium who caused the spirit of Samuel to materialize and inform Saul that in a day Saul and his family would be killed. I Samuel 28—.

The Urim and Thimmin were lost at the destruction of the Temple of Jerusalem. The materialization of Samuel was the first direct account of a medium being able to cause a materialization. As we would expect, many orthodox ministers have said that this Woman of Endor was a witch and that an imp of satan came and posed as the great High Priest. However wonderful Church-father St. Augustine said clearly that it was no imp. That it was truly Samuel permitted to appear by God's law.

Both Isiah and Jeremiah admitted the exinstence of evil spirits whom they called 'familiars'. We know them today as poltergeists. Get a paperback of Fr. Thurston's 'Ghosts and Poltergeists' The Catholic Hierarchy gave it the coveted Imprimitur and Nihil Obstat. May we now turn Job 4:14-15, "And a spirit passed before my face and the hair of my flesh stood up." Later Job asks, "If a man die shall he live again?" But he had already answered that. YES. Then let us turn to Ecclesiastes 12:7, "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was; AND THE SPIRIT SHALL RETURN TO GOD WHO GAVE IT."

The Old Testament is the history of a people emerging from semi-barbarism to the new dispensation through Jesus Christ. Old Testament is replete with vicious sex, murder and injustice. But O.T. was necessary to prepare the path for Spiritualistic concepts. Jesus told his disciples in the upper room, "Examine me and see that spirit hath not flesh and bones as you see I have." Jesus last words as he expired on the cross were, "Father, into Thy hands I commend my Spirit." "I COMMEND MY SPIRIT. How then dare anybody claiming to be followers of the lowly Nazarene Jesus condemn, or judge us that know by four out of five physical senses? And Luke VI definitely points out that those that judge or condemn others, will be judged and condemned. But the best portion of Luke VL is, "FORGIVE AND YOU WILL BE FOR-GIVEN."

"Forgive, for give your direst foe And never give him blow for blow. Forgive him seventy times and seven, For all the Saints that dwell in heaven Are all forgivers and forgiven."

It seems incumbent on me to interpolate some present awful news at this point for it is my most solemn belief that no true Spiritualist is in any way connected with the infamies now being uncovered in our present officials. I recount a few just as I would warn you against the rabid animal that your children are playing with. As Bobby Burns wrote, "And why has man the will or power to make his fellows mourn?" Solomon told the reason some thirty centuries ago:

"THE LOVE OF MONEY IS THE ROOT OF ALL EVIL."

John Ruskin observed, "If no man had too much, everyone would have enough." An inspired poet wrote:

> "Gold can never take you further Than the graveyard where you lie. Tho' you're rich while you are living, You're a pauper when you die."

The great Roman poet Virgil wrote in his Aeneid, "Accursed love of gold, to what doest thou not drive mortals."

Nationally, we are under divine condemnation for promoting wars that have cost millions of lives, and hundreds of billions of dollars all over God's footstool. Read the daily Press, watch T.V. Once upon a time Troy was a great and prosperous domain. A pagan priestess named Cassandra predicted that Troy would be pillaged and destroyed. Fools laughed, called her 'crack pot'. But her prediction came true. Many years ago, this writer observed workmen skimming the concealed fat from sewage to be added to lard and used in cooking. This infamy brought about the Pure Food Act of 1906. But there were wide cracks in the law and infamous lawyers used them to increasingly poison God's people. For instance, TIME magazine August 2, 1971 exposed the use of known cancerous meat sold for human food. And food literally reeking with poisonous additives. Just take a close look at the products on supermarket shelves, especially the labels on ready-to-serve cereals. In small print you will find coal tar additives as foreign to nutrition as chalk is to cheese. Small quantities? Yes. But many of them are cumulative and may trigger cancer, pernicious anemia and other physical body killers. As a noted gynecologist said a short time ago, "The Pill is a cumulative time bomb." As this author wrote for SUMMIT in 1972, he writes again the documented, now demonstrable truth that mere men in the pursuit of wealth and power have promoted, still do, worldwide carnage in order to sell implements of destruction. In the manufacture of which we have befouled our atmosphere with pollutants that are filtering out certain solar rays on which man survives. And there is no way to remove these pollutants. And every second we are adding to them.

Many years ago. I wrote of churches definitely dedicated to the worship of satan and was promptly called crack pot and liar. Before me at the moment lies a magazine carrying ads such as the following: "THE DEVIL WANTS YOU. Join the Satanic Church." Another, "GREAT GOD OF WITCHES. Strange, Wonderous, Marvelous." "Learn how to become a Witch." These are the money-grabbing claws of those who give the real Religion Spiritualism, a bad name, among those that fight against God. The above interpolation is designed to warn every human being of the insidious serpent in the grass. And to pin point the documented and eternal Truth that form the basis of Spiritualism. And that spiritual manifestations were recorded on the semi-eternal stones in the most ancient caves in the Pyrenees, thousands of years before the Adam and Eve incident.

The Bible (O.T.) tells us of the building of the Tower of Babel which was to reach the heavens. It states that God threw confusion into the proponents by causing them to forget each his own language-to babble, to speak without being understood. Jargon. From this arose the foundation of almost 300 religious groups each with its fatuous fancies. You are recommended to get a paperback edition of Gulliver's Travels, read it with more edification than 10,000 copies of the latest modern bestseller. Swift, the author, needles human ecclesiastical scramble by describing a great war with much carnage over the question of whether the eggs must be opened at the big end, or the little end. Furthermore, that book, written more than two centuries ago WILL PINPOINT THE INFAMY IN PERVERTS-BURG ON THE POTOMAC, FAR BETTER THAN YOUR DAILY PAPER. This present scribe cannot forego urging every single reader of SUMMIT to get a copy of Dickens' immortal Christmas Carol and read, re-read for in it is a marvelous thing to remember every day in every year. Here is a bit lifted from Christmas Carol: Marley's Ghost speaking:

"Oh! captive bound, and double-ironed, not to know that ages of incessant labour, by immortal creatures, must pass into eternity before the good of which it is susceptible is all developed. Not to know that any Christian spirit working kindly in its little sphere, whatever it may be, will find its mortal life too short for its vast means of usefulness. Not to know that no place of regret can make amends for one's life's opportunities misused. Yet such was I! Oh! such

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was I." Then the ghost of Marley continues:

"Business! Mankind was my business. The common welfare was my business; charity, mercy, forbearance, and benevolence, were, all, my business. The dealings of our trade were but a drop of water in the comprehensive ocean of my business." It must interest every Spiritualist to know that this Dickens, one of the greatest men that ever lived was a dedicated Spiritualist. (Some time soon, it my intention to give the world some of Dicken's observations concern-spirits.)

Returning to our Main Thesis

We refer again to the matter of Jairus' little daughter. We find this poignant record in Matthew, Mark and Luke. I prefer Luke 8:50. Jairus little girl was sick unto death and as a last resort they sent for Jesus. On his way to Jairus home, a woman with a chronic issue of blood touched his robe and was healed. Jesus went to the house and said, "Weep not for she is not death but is asleep. 'And they laughed him to scorn because they knew she was dead.' Jesus took her by the hand and said, 'Maiden arise,' and her spirit returned and she arose." What returned? HER SPIRIT. Paul who was responsible for bringing Jesus down to us in proper perspective, was a strong medium and healer. He wrote, I Corrinthians 12 of the diversity of gifts God gave to man, among the gifts was that of healing, and prophesy, AND THE DISCERNING OF SPIRITS. The word discern means to see with understanding. Thus many Spiritualists have discerned by touches, my seeing spirits, by hearing their voices, and often by the fragrance of heavenly flowers when none are visibly present. In my own residence, especially since my Blanche was called higher almost three years ago, I constantly, thank God, our loving creator that I have more evidence of her continued love and presence than she was before her transition. I give each and every reader my solemn pledge that as this last page is being written, my little room is filled with the divine fragrance of flowers not from earthplane, and raps from different parts of the room. It is by no mere whim that I have introduced some of the mundane because a diseased, morbid body cannot sustain a sweet spirit. And warmongers have made it almost impossible to keep a sound mind in a sound body. As we watch the passing scene on TV or Press, we know how very right that great Spiritualist Shakespeare was:

LILY DALE—THEN AND NOW

"Amidst the scenic beauties which the Creator has given unto man is Lily Dale, a place of beauty which surpasseth the fondest hopes and expectations of the idealist. It is a gem in its setting of natural beauty from the budding time of spring until nature takes on her autumn robes of red and gold. Its shores are washed by waters that gush from springs and form a chain of lakes which lie peacefully in the valley among the wooded hills."

The above paragraph, taken from an annual program, provides a brief introduction to Lily Dale, located about fifty miles southwest of Buffalo in Chautauqua County and known as the largest center for the religion of Spiritualism in the world. Founded in 1879, and having just ended its 94th season on September 2nd, it is interesting to follow the development of this beautiful spot from its inception up to the present.

The Lily Dale Assembly, so named because of the multitude of water lilies near the shores of Cassadaga Lake, had its beginning in a growing interest in Spiritualism among the residents of the tiny hamlet of Laona in the Town of Pomfret, about five miles from the site of the Assembly.

Through the teachings of one Jeremiah Carter, an early clairvoyant, numerous persons in the surrounding area embraced this religion. A hundred years ago, the Spiritualists of western New York, who had grown to a considerable number, began holding picnics in a grove on the farm property of Willard Alden, already popular as a picnic spot for many years and located on the east side of Middle Cassadaga Lake. Mr. Alden, himself an ardent Spiritualist, selected Sunday, June 15, as the day that his grove was to be used exclusively by this group. This was, in effect, the first "one-day meeting." Every year thereafter, until 1877, a one-day meeting was held annually, called the "June Picnic and Sunday Assembly," later being extended to three days. In 1877, it was decided to further extend the meeting, and so, the First Camp Meeting was held, running from September 11-16. This was the first actual season of the as yet-un-named camp. Each visitor paid ten cents admission fee to Mr. Alden who stood in the middle of the road to welcome them. With over one hundred visitors on weekdays, and four hundred on Sunday, the meeting was so successful that it was decided to meet for ten days in 1878.

In 1879, as Mr. Alden had passed to the Higher Life, it was necessary to secure a new location for a permanent Camp. A society was formed and incorporated under the laws of both New York State and Chautauqua County, with the final papers being filed on August 28, 1879.

Invitations were issued to all persons interested in purchasing shares in the corporation; named "The Cassadaga Lake Free Association." After careful inspection of various properties, farmlands were purchased by the Board of Trustees along the east side of Upper Cassadaga Lake, about one half mile from Alden's Grove. Purchase price of this land was \$1,845.00. Renting of cottage lots was decided upon instead of outright sale. The former farmland was fenced in on three sides, surveyed, and primary landscaping begun.

Throughout the eighties and nineties, the June picnics and camp meetings continued, with many well-known speakers and mediums in attendance. Whereas at Chautauqua Institute Susan B. Anthony was denied a platform for her womens' rights speech, at Lily Dale she was welcomed and given a warm and sympathetic reception. Bit by bit, the atmosphere changed from a camp ground to one of permanence with new houses and public buildings replacing the temporary structures. One of the first needs was a hotel to accommodate those who wished to remain for longer than just a day. Accordingly, a building which began as a stable was continually added onto and became known as the Grand Hotel, which later, after much remodeling, is now the present Maplewood Hotel. The Leolyn Hotel, just outside of the main gate, is the oldest Assembly building. constructed over one hundred twenty five years ago.

Originally, as the Willard Alden home, it was an overnight stage coach stop on the road between Dunkirk and Jamestown. Stage Coaches plodded through the rutted, often muddy road and stopped under the softly glowing oil lamps. This house was later sold to Mrs. Abby L. Pettingill, who named it after her daughter, Leolyn. A well was discovered, the water from which was found to possess medicinal properties. Many people journeyed to the Leolyn so as to benefit from these waters and thus discovered "The City of Light," as the camp was now known. The Leolyn was later presented to the Assembly by Mrs. Pettingill.

By 1900, there was a railroad station just outside the main gate. The New York Central had built a line from Dunkirk into Pennsylvania, and it was now possible to easily reach the Assembly from any point in the nation. Steamboats operated from a dock in the village of Cassadaga to a landing at the rear of the Leolyn. Telephone service began in the early part of the present century; a phone booth from that era is still in use in the Maplewood lobby. There was also a telegraph office at the railroad depot. A short distance away was a farm owned by a Mr. Frisbee who delivered dairy products daily. Today, this farm has become

the Cassadaga Country Club; the meadow where cows once grazed is now the golf course, located on Frisbee Road. Electricity was produced by a plant owned by the Assembly and situated near the bathing beach.

A Post Office was established in 1888 and has remained ever since. For many years, a Spiritualist newspaper, "The Sunflower," was published here. In 1916, the Fox Cottage, where Spirit communication was first recognized, was moved here from its original site at Hydesville, Wayne County, New York. Demonstrations of mediumship were held daily in the summertime at the old cottage where there were many relics of Spiritualism on display. The cottage was destroyed in a tragic fire 18 years ago. In 1927, the name of the Assembly was officially changed to Lily Dale. In the early days, a raft of logs was constructed and covered with planks. This would be floated on the lake and served as the first dance floor, being pushed by a small boat, "The Water Lily." Later, after the Auditorium was built, dancing took place there, to the accompaniment of well-known orchestras. Concerts were given for many years in the two bandstands on the property. Sports, such as baseball, bowling, billiards, tennis, quoits, and croquet were popular in days now long past. In 1956, the old crank telephones were replaced by the modern dial system.

The visitor to the Assembly of today finds a little village, knitted by tiny streets; a happy combination of religious colony and summer resort, reflecting the prosperity of a flourishing institution. There is something ever new, yet mixed with a Victorian flavor about the "Dale" as it is affectionately know.

Nestled in the green Chautauqua hills, encircled by beautiful lakes, one feels close to nature here, far away from the cares of the workaday world. "As close to the Summerland as we'll ever see on earth," as many have said. A widely varied group of all ages and many locations come here, long-time Spiritualists, those who are merely curious, and even a few

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outright cynics, who nonetheless enjoy the picturesque surroundings. All are welcome to this small community of dozens of modest homes lining the informal streets. Although a multitude of rooms are available at both hotels, there are times when there is not a single vacancy, especially on such occasions as Buffalo and Rochester days, when mediums visit from these cities. The hotels, spotlessly clean, reflect a bygone era, with wall-papered rooms and high-ceilinged parlors. On display are "spirit paintings." accomplished through the efforts of spirit. Art experts who have examined these works have verified unanimously that they contain no brush strokes or other evidence of human craft. An extremely peaceful spot is the Leolyn Woods, where leaf-carpeted paths lead through one of the last groves of virgin timber existing in the United States to the Inspiration Stump. Here, in the solitude and quiet, services are held each day, weather permitting. Close by is the Healing Temple where Spiritual healing is given daily. Looking across the hills rising over the lake, there may be seen the buildings once occupied as the New York State tuberculosis hospital, now the Pope John XXIII Center where retreats are held.

On rainy days, fog completely enshrouds this lake: on clear evenings, there are few places where more beautiful sunsets occur. The Assembly has its own fire department, with volunteer members answering first aid and an occasional fire call. A fund drive is presently underway to raise money for the construction of a new fire station. Nearby is the pagoda, where post cards, ice cream, and souveniers may be purchased. A large cafeteria is well patronized from early morning breakfast time until late evening. Most activities center in the large Auditorium where noted mediums and speakers appear every day. The Skidmore Library occupies a substantial building and contains the most outstanding collection of rare Spiritualist and metaphysical books in existence. Librarian Marian Wisniewski is an expert on religions of the world and delights in answering visitors' questions on Spiritualism.

Directly across the street is the Assembly Headquarters; all mediums wishing to give readings to the public must present certificated evidence of their mediumistic qualifications here when they register. Now we are at the main entrance where a gate fee is collected from visitors. On the left is Melrose Park, a pleasant area to rest. Even on a day only slightly breezy, the action of the wind through the many leafy trees produces a delightfully relaxing "music." Across from the park is the building housing the Post Office and bookshop.

The Post Office has two incoming and outgoing mails daily, one of the few still providing such service. Residents, of whom quite a num-

ber live here all year, have their own Post Office boxes; there is no carrier service. Prospective residents must certify that they are Spiritualists before they may settle permanently here; no such restriction applies to visitors, however. The bookshop is presided over by the Reverend D. Mona Berry, founder and former pastor of the Church of Eternal Brotherhood of Buffalo. During the winter months, she makes her home in Cassadaga, Florida, a Spiritualist camp somewhat resembling Lily Dale, but on a smaller scale. Walking down another road, we pass an antique shop, then, a bit further, a combination grocery store and lunch room. Still further is the Lyceum, where children attend classes daily in summer and on Sunday for the remainder of the year. Perhaps the most striking aspect of Lily Dale are the residents themselves: people possessing an inner contentment, as though they have found exactly what they were searching for. Now, as we walk back toward the lake, we pass the Octagon Building, an interesting eight-sided structure, hence its name, used as a meeting place by the mediums association.

Soon we reach the Assembly Hall, a white clap-board ediface looking much like a rural public school. A large bell on the porch is rung fifteen minutes before meetings begin and may be heard throughout the grounds. Special summer school classes are held on Spiritualism, with visiting instructors from all parts of the country coming to lecture. "Thought Ex-changes," held on Wednesday and Saturday evenings, provide a debating forum where any subject controversial or otherwise, may be brought forward. At times, these discussions are so popular that the only seating space to be found is on the floor. A beach at the waters edge is extremely popular with young and old alike; a lifeguard is on duty four hours each day.

Lily Dale's present position did not occur overnight. Struggles, sacrifice, failure, success, all blend in a story of courage; all because of the religion termed Modern Spiritualism. Perhaps at this point, an explanation would be in order of this religion.

Basically, Spiritualism is a religion which acknowledges the fact that that man is a spirit and lives forever. A Spiritualist does not merely "believe" this, but continually proves it through communicating with those who have made their transition from the earth plane to the plane of spirit. The Spiritualist recognizes the presence of God in all things and feels a great affinity toward all of nature as the foremost expression of God. This concept is not new.

The Bible is filled with references, in both Testaments, regarding spirit communications, healing, prophesying, and other phenomena. Jesus, when performing His miracles said, "These and greater, ye shall also do." These various phenomena have been received by man throughout the ages, but, for thousands of years, man believed that only celestial beings such as angels could communicate; through the creeds and dogmas accumulated through centuries, man believed that God could only be approached through the efforts of others, could only be found in magnificent edifaces, not realizing that God could be found within himself, that man being a part of God, contains within himself a spark of that divinity.

Then, finally, in 1848, in a small cottage in New York State, two little girls, the Fox sisters, demonstrated through spirit communication the continuity of life. Mysterious noises, poundings began to disturb the family in March of that year. Although a thorough search of the house was made, the source of the sounds could not be located. This went on for two weeks. Finally, on March 31st, Katie Fox, age 12, decided to try an experiment; she began imitating the sounds. Katie snapped her fingers twice, immediately two raps were heard in answer. Through a simple code of one rap for "no" and two raps for "yes." Mrs, Fox, the girls' mother, learned that the cause of the raps was the spirit of a peddler who had been murdered some years earlier and whose body was buried beneath the cottage.

An alphabetic code was developed, each letter corresponding to a certain number of raps; every question Mrs. Fox put forth was correctly answered, thus convincing those present from the neighborhood that some form of intelligence was manifesting itself in the cottage. The body of the peddler was later dug up, along with a peddlers pack.

Thus, for the first time, there was proven the certainty of the continuity of life and that communication with ordinary spirits is possible. Out of this, a world-wide movement grew. Famous mediums such as Cora L.V. Richmond, an un-educated farm girl, astounded learned audiences by lecturing at great length on any subject through the influence of spirit. Various forms of mediumship were developed such as direct writing, where messages were received on a slate or sheet of paper in the exact penmanship of the individual. There are slates on display in the Skidmore Library with the writings of Thomas Edison and other personages.

Today, the universal religion of Spiritualism is found in over thirty-five countries, all without any missionary work whatsoever. The greatest number of Spiritualists are found in Brazil, over ten million in number. The second largest group is in England. In the United States and Canada, there are over two hundred churches.

True Spiritualists consult mediums (a medium is an intermediary between the spirit world and the earth plane) not merely to ob-

tain messages from loved ones who made their transition, comforting as these messages may be, but mainly to obtain teachings to mold their lives.

All phenomena is based on Natural Law, there is no connection with magic, witchcraft, crystal gazing, etc. Spiritualism is considered to be a science, a philosophy, and a religion all in one. It provides man with an understanding of Natural Law, which is God's Law, so that he may live in accordance with it and develop himself as far as possible. Spiritualists believe that all religions contain basic truths of value and that there is only one God who is merely worshipped in different ways by various peoples. A Spiritualist church service is one of joy, there are no long, solemn faces, there is no fear of the hereafter. There is the conviction that all persons, no matter what type of lives they led, will eventually rise to a state of complete harmony and knowledge.

Perhaps the greatest insight into Spiritualism may be gained at one of their funerals. There are no tears, no despair, only the knowledge that while the person who has made his transition will be missed, they will surely be once again re-united in the future; that men are spirits who have a physical body and that we are all living right now in eternity.



SPIRITUAL PROTECTION By Arthur B. Hartley

Informed Spiritualists, I imagine, instinctively feel that they are protected in one way or another. They are aware that spirit guides and helpers are always available to help them and guide them when the need arises and they ask for help. Informed Spiritualists know that their prayers are always answered, sooner or later, so they naturally feel that protection is forthcoming when they ask for it.

Yes, protection is available, that is sure. But asking for it is very important.

Many of us have had the privilege of contact with a group of Spirit teachers known as the Imperator Group, who use the Rev. Grace Gause as the channel through whom they can talk to us. These wise ones from the Heaven world include, of course, Stainton Moses, one of the most outstanding mediums of the last century, through whose mediumship Imperator made possible the wonderful book "Spirit Teachings"; Rector, Imperator's second in command, also comes and talks with us; Doctor, the Teacher, another one who was close to Imperator during the time he was collaborating with Stainton Moses and bringing forth the wonderful teachings constituting the contents of "Spirit Teachings", comes with his wisdom words occasionally. Some quite recent arrivals in the Spirit world, such as Dr. Hyslop, former professor of logic in Columbia University and head of the Hyslop Psychical Research Society, and Brown Landone, renowned healer and writer, and many others, are heard from periodically.

These words for Imperator, showing his exaulted status in the Heaven World, are the reason we feel his words are so important:

"I, Imperator Servus Dei, am the chief of a band of forty-nine spirits, the presiding and controlling spirit under whose guidance and direction the others work.

"I am come from the seventh sphere to work out the will of the Almighty; and when my work is complete, I shall return to those spheres of bliss from which none return again to earth. But this will not be till the medium's work on earth is finished, and his mission on earth exchanged for a wider one in the spheres."

These informed Spirits are constantly suggesting that we ask for protection at all times; that we make a habit of surrounding ourselves with God's protecting power, which is available to all of us and should be used.

One suggestion from a teacher was to use the expression, "I surround myself with the white light of the Christ, through which nothing negative can penetrate and within which all is activated by the Christ." When asked what they meant by "Christ," they said "Christ" meant the activity of God. So we could say we surround ourselves with the white light of God; or the white light of Infinite Intelligence, or the white light of Eternal Truth, or something of that nature. It is not so much the words we use as our awareness of its efficacy. Those of us who have been following these suggestions can vouch for its effectiveness.

That this asking for protection should be done quite often seems to be desirable because this protection can be broken by our fits of anger, our emotional upsets, unkind words, negative destructive thinking, or when we don't "keep an even mind," which Andrew Jackson Davis suggests we do. Therefore it would be desirable for us to get the habit of protecting ourselves and our home and loved ones the first thing in the morning; protect ourself and our car when we are out on the highway, and when we leave it parked somewhere or in the garage at night. In other words, the constant asking for protection keeps us close to our spirit friends over the way and makes us more inclined to endeavor to "keep an even mind."

At this point, this remark by Imperator, from Stainton Moses' book, comes to mind. We quote; "The Deity operates by general laws. Prayer is good, as by it man moves forces which act on those through whom God operates. It is good for all of us to pray. The hard, prayerless soul cannot be reached by the angel ministers, who are always attracted to the praying soul."

Our friends over the way consider it very desirable and helpful if we surround ourselves with this wonderful White Light when we go to bed, as it protects us from any undesirable visitations during the night. And asking that we be cleansed and purified does just that to the atmosphere around and about you, so that those entering your home comment about the peaceful feeling that envelops them.

This constant contact with Spirit helpers seems to open doors for more and more help. We find ourselves impressed to say, as we greet the new day, "Thank you, God, for this new day and new opportunities." Then this comes to mind: "Thank you, God, for this wonderful guidance." The more we contact our Spirit friends the more opportunities they have of recognizing our needs and inspiring us to ask for guidance and help in our everyday activities. It is our Divine right to have perfect health, plentiful supply and a peaceful and happy life, and it is their job to help us to attain just that, and the more we welcome their guidance, the more they can inspire us in our journey toward that end.

The need for exposing Spiritualism through the method of a camp-style program has been evident by the attendance and interest exhibited by so many persons not already connected with Spiritualism. Several pastors of other religious denominations attended with surprising regularity. The number of new people requesting enrollment in our primary Philosophy Class demonstrates that man is ever seeking to increase his spiritual awareness and will use the vehicle of Spiritualism, if he is exposed to it properly. Attendance at services varied from a low of twenty-one to a high of eighty-nine during our summer program. The need for a larger meeting hall to accommodate next year's expanded program is now in the planning stage.

Visiting mediums came from as far away as Florida and California to serve the camp and our church at regular Sunday services. Rev. Merrill, our national president, was able to fit three days at camp into his heavy summer schedule. Through his wisdom and knowledge he boosted the image of Spiritualism in this locality, and brought heightened awareness to those fortunate enough to hear him.

The increased spiritual awareness we received through fellowship and the sharing of knowledge in the informal environment of camp has made Spiritualism come alive for all of us in our daily lives.

the possibility of a human personality persisting after the death of the body, and returning to manifest as a spirit on this mortal plane, then Religion was confident that such happenings were the work of the Devil!

That briefly was the condition of our knowledge-among wise and learned, simple and unlettered alike-when the light of Modern Spiritualism dawned upon the world. Then, beginning with knockings at Rochester, a great variety of wonderful psychical facts came into view which indicated that the veil between the living and the dead, supposed to be impenetrable, was being rent. By means of raps, tilting, signals, writings, voices, levitations, etherealizations, and materializations, persons supposed to be dead and done with, and whose bodies were under the green turf, gave many infallible proofs that they were alive, conscious and able to communicate intelligently with those whom they had left behind. These revelations from the unseen world were of such a nature that even physical scientists could, if they desired, examine them and test their value. But they were not welcomed by official Science, for the simple reason that they knocked out the bottom of its much vaunted materialistic view of life and the universe. Professor Huxley said, "Supposing the phenomena to be genuine, they do not interest me." Sir David Brewster said, "Spirit is the last thing I will give in to." Mr. Herbert Spencer said, "I have settled the question in my own mind on 'a priori' grounds" (that is, without considering the facts). And Dr. W. B. Carpenter declared that the Spiritualistic phenomena were "a most mischievous delusion". Religion also ignored and condemned the phenomena instead of realizing their power to re-establish it on a firm basis of incontrovertible present-day fact. The new revelation appeared to it to interfere with the old, which it held as alone sacred. But in course of time the facts have asserted themselves as true, and their significance is quickly coloring the thought of the world. Materialism is already dead, and dogmatic irrational Religion has no longer authority among men. Science and Religion must therefore adjust themselves to the truth that Spiritualism has revealed and established, if they wish to stand firm upon ascertained facts. There is a spiritual world as well as a physical world. Science can no longer ignore the former if it is to escape the reproach of being blind, lop-sided, and incomplete. And Religion cannot afford to despise Spiritualism, if it has any proper ambition to "furnish that proof of a future life of which so many live and die in anxious doubts—so many in positive disbelief.'
