

Spiritual Therapy

After President Merrill oproached me to speak in spiritual therapy I bund myself re-learning he meaning of the term.

By definition therapy means a condition of a urative nature. In ssence, such an action enotes illness or isturbance which would equire such application.



Spiritual means that of the spirit; the spirit being hat part of man which according to our teachings immortal and indestructible. So, placing these pords in proper perspective we have a condition of he spirit which is ill, or disturbed, or which is out f synchronization with natural law.

Where do we begin? Socrates said, "Man know hyself." Few of us have the faculty to objectively pand aside and critically analyze and evaluate all hat embraces the human spirit.

Living in a material world, inhabiting a physical bdy, our main thoughts are of physical well being. health. Man reacts violently to pain and illness. But it is true, as medical science informs us, that ilmost 80% of all illness is psychosomatic in lature, then is it not equally true that that which is Il or disturbed cannot necessarily respond avorably to pharmaceutics ... unless it goes deeper, affecting mind or spirit. I believe that we habit a cosmic mirror, and what we see reflected s what we as individuals are. The world can never the changed until man changes himself. Man must ecognize and come to terms, possibly through **w**-existence with himself, his environment, and the nature of his being.

Therapy, in the medical sense, does not always mean a passive tranquilized state. Sometimes shock reatments are used to jolt the nervous system to a tate of consciousness and awareness of the world around.

Earlier in my career I listened to a brilliant Peaker in our movement. He said, "No one ever weaks a natural law. It breaks you!" And so it is with the health of the body. Break a natural law by wrong living, eating, with other physical indulgences and the body reacts and becomes ill. It then that we resort to therapeutic healing.

But again back to the theory of psychosomatic

illness. Doctors will tell you that they can operate, excise, treat, but only nature heals. Only through natural law does each individual part of the human body produce its own kind. A remarkable statement appeared recently in "The British Lancet." There is not one particle of human tissue wholly removed from the influence of spirit. -truly a profound statement. Why do we need spiritual therapy? What are the symptoms of illness of the spirit and how do we handle it?

There are many avenues that lead to this morbid state - hate, greed, intolerance, destruction, wars, all of which at some time in our lives we practice.

We are going through enormous economic, social and environmental changes in this restless age that is shattering too many lives. Little wonder that 50% of our hospital beds are filled with cases of mental illness. We have computerized mankind until it has lost all identity; his identity as a spiritual being, operating through and in accordance with the natural order. We have pushed ourselves beyond the limits of the horizon of our own understanding until we have lost our reason for existence. We have a stock pile of scientific achievement but little or no philosophy to use it constructively. It was William Shakespeare who said, "The world is too much with us, late and soon, getting and spending . . . we lay waste our powers."

How can we apply spiritual therapy in our lives? I believe recognition is the first prerequisite; recognition that man is spirit, immortal, indestructible - that all the vicissitudes in life he faces are of his own making. Our seventh principle. We affirm the moral responsibility of the individual and that he makes his own happiness or unhappiness as he obeys or disobeys nature's physical and spiritual laws is of vital importance. We need personal responsibility -- facing courageously that which is our portion in life - not expecting a personal savior to save us, or shoulder our burdens, or make excuses for indulgencies.

We all recognize this condition in our organization, in our churches. How many are willing to accept responsibility? Invariably it is the few dependable, responsible people who keep the church alive.

How many are willing to deny self and extend out a hand to those who must follow, who are qualified to serve the churches but are sometimes neglected by a lack of understanding?

How many from the highest echelons of our

organization are training future new leaders in executive ability to fill the vacant places of those dedicated, illustrious men and women in our movement? How many through apathy or indifference have sacrificed our platforms by presenting ill-prepared speakers or message bearers who judge their success by numbers instead of the quality of their work?

This is a sickness of the spirit that must be remedied if we hope to regain the vitality, the vigor, and the dedication to rekindle drive equal to

those who founded this organization.

Meditation and prayers are efficacious components of spiritual therapy. Sometimes such tranquility can lull us to sleep in complacency and inaction. We need a shock treatment as we experienced last summer in Lily Dale. We almost lost that which was dear and precious to us, a spiritualist camp — given to us in trust by dedicated pioneers who cleared the darkness of a forest into the light of truth. We were not vigilant. We took for granted that which was the heritage of the spirit. There was a sickness in the camp, one which was born of greed, hate and destruction by a few dissidents. It was only when we fell to our knees and through soul searching — through recognition of that power we call Infinite Intelligence.

And so we began to reorganize our spiritual and psychic forces, began to share our strength instead of our weakness, to rekindle the wavering flame of eternal truth. It was then the healing balm of spiritual therapy enveloped us and we recognized that our sickness was in the mind and spirit and

not of the body.

If you must hate you destroy.

Hate poverty and slums
And wars and misery
Caused by Greed,
Hate sickness of the spirit

Go into the silence and look into that great cosmic mirror. Do you see a kindred spirit reflecting the face of a brother or sister in need, in illness, in pain? Can we touch them in their hour of need? Are you willing to let petty jealousies, envy, and foolish fears destroy your board, your church, your organization? We constantly refer to the Law of Cause and Effect -- to the Law of Compensation. Do you believe in them? Better still, do you practice them? Jesus said, "Physician heal thyself." All of us are physicians. Within us is the power of mind-spirit to create health and peace. If 80% of illness is of mental origin, then surely we can better that, health being from the same origin of spirit.

In the quiet moments at Lily Dale President Merrill and I will sit down together as we oftimes do and discuss, debate, and analyze our religion and its organization. And we realize that when we as individuals truly know ourselves, our rightful spiritual heritage as we practice this philosophy and religion, we can hopefully extend that spiritual therapy beyond our immediate needs to encompass

our country, and our world.

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Having a Choice is the Best Part About Growing Up

It's true you know. Regardless of what conditions we were born into or inherited, growing up gives us an opportunity to make our own road.

Let's pretend that we're about to be faced with that opportunity -- to make our own decisions. We're young, fresh out of school and ready to enter the world in search of our first job. For some of us picking an occupation will be difficult. Others, primarily because of the last four years at college are set. We could drop all this foolishness and pick up with dad's business. Not that it's the most rewarding career, mind you, but after all, he did slave to build it just for us these past thirty

"Money isn't everything," he used to say. That was about the time he gave up selling Fuller Brush products door to door and started working 18 hours a day at building his own construction company. Now he's got it made and so will we if we're a mind to. Dad's touchy about the business. It's his whole life. He spends a lot of time at the Club keeping his clients happy. Then there's those

long weekend trips to settle disputes.

Dad's been looking for a top public relations man, but that's not me. Fred is the real candidate for that job. He can handle his liquor and knows how to miss an occasional putt on the green. I guess I better face up to it and start looking.

By this time we've sent out resumes to those companies best suited to our needs. And we're looking forward to favorable response from at least

several firms.

At first the decision was hard because we didn't really like the idea of being tied down to a career which had only been lived through books and studies. Making it a life long career still seems threatening but there's personal security and comfort to consider. We're not too young to overlook those points.

At this point we probably haven't thought about liking future employment or becoming the firm's new president in twenty years or so. Of course,

these things are a foregone conclusion.

The search for that right job is comparable to finding a religion you can feel at home with. Too often you skirt over the obvious because everybody in the family was Baptist or Catholic. So why change?

Until we look around and see the difference how can we possibly know whether we belong with

another group.

Our search for a religion should involve as much forethought and planning as our final choice of a career. Perhaps we should write an opening letter, submit our family letters of recommendation and ask for an interview. That way we could have an opportunity to listen as well as be interviewed.

The idea isn't original. Some churches require prospective members to submit a lengthy application in their own hand writing. Usually it's limited to why they want to join. It protests the mettle of the individual and requires a little

forethought.

Most of the time we don't bother to search for a religion, we just plod along with the family's chosen one. Too often this imposed status is accepted without question. By no means should we presume the worst. It's just that some of us expect a little more than required attendance out of our religion. Above all it should satisfy, fulfill. The occasion should open our minds as well as delight our ears through beautiful orchestration and music.

The coming day of worship should be regarded warmly, with anticipation, not obligation. And certainly not long-faced and solemn. Attendance should never be determined by "but what will the neighbors think." Tithing, likewise, gifts to God are not status symbols ranked on the amount

given.

Since the church is not a personality, religious ceremony and personal attitudes evidenced toward the minister's tendency to lean one way or the other should be taken as trivialities not worthy of consideration. Every accomplished speaker has a developed style which serves him best. More often than not his preference to stand on toes or call down the Almighty Himself is just a technique to catch the audience's attention. Trifles such as these should never enter into serious consideration of one church over another. Attendance should fill our hearts, not deflate the ego. And that alone is what judgement should be based upon.

Some of us look for security, but don't find it in religion or church. We listen to talk about a hereafter; one Sunday it will sound so good that we just might consider going there sometime - all those beautiful angels playing their harps while floating around on fluffly white clouds, beautiful music, sparkling palaces and golden streets. Then another Sunday, hereafter sounds pretty grim - the fire and intense heat, red devils prodding us with pitchforks, and don't forget eternal damnation.

The question over which religion to choose can be confusing. So, how do we know we are really saved? We are told to accept a savior who died for us. Maybe we don't say the right words or utter the proper prayers. It makes us uneasy because perhaps we aren't good enough. God is love, we hear, but is that love only for a chosen few? What if we step in front of a truck and die before we accept this savior? Is this security? The second definition of security in the dictionary says: freedom from care, apprehension or doubt. Apprehension and doubt go hand in hand with this type of security.

We decide to try harder. We offer our time, give of our money. We want to help others. We want to learn. Just as in our job, we know that learning is the key, but there seems to be a closed door at the end of every path of learning we travel. It is difficult to show others the way when we aren't sure where we are going ourselves. It is impossible to learn and grow when our questions are ignored, evaded, or fail to be answered.

Does this type of religion offer a retirement plan? Yes, after a fashion, but it's rather shakey. We are asked to pay premiums, but are not assured of peace and plenty. We aren't really assured of a retirement, at all. Vacations and holidays? These are times to forget concerns and have fun! We don't want to worry about going to church or keeping in touch with God because we are on vacation. The neighbors and the community can't see us, so we can do as we please without worrying

about our image.

How about a return for our time and effort?

Many of us, just as in our work, want our religion
to give us more than we offer in return. And, sad it
is that we often find the door closed in both

is, that we often find the door closed in both directions - no giving - no receiving. We aren't motivated to offer anything when we aren't receiving.

As for buying stock in the company - forget itonly saints would even think of such a thing. It's sad when we don't have the comfort of being part of the company.

Now let's make another comparison. Instead of comparing our job to our present religion let's compare it to Spiritualism. Spiritualism is the tallest, widest, most open doorway you can find. Notice I said door. There is no door to open or close. It is one big opening just waiting for seekers to enter. No door to hold you in, either! Spiritualists come because they can't get enough! They might miss something. Generally this group is particular about its time, energy and loyalty. They expect to enjoy the music, meditation, healing, lectures, classes, messages — each segment giving its own upliftment. If something funny happens on

the platform they are not afraid to laugh. In a Spiritualist church, we might have several different lecturers speak on the same subject and we would learn something different from each one. We may not always agree, but it gives us something to chew on. Maybe we will swallow and digest it; maybe we will spit it out; maybe we will just stick it behind our ear for now and try it again later. I have been a Spiritualist for about 3 years now, and I know that in 30 years I will still feel like an oversized blotter that has so much more to soak up. We are a full-time religion. Nothing in Spiritualism feels like a duty, and all Spiritualists vibrate on the same loving, living wave length.

As to security, remember what the dictionary says: freedom from care, apprehension and doubt. Spiritualism is Security with a capital "S". We know what the future holds for us. We don't listen to vague and confusing comments about the hereafter or wonder whether we are going to end up in a hot or cold place. We know that the good old doorway to reformation is never closed against any human soul here or hereafter. What could be more secure than that? Don't you agree that this is freedom from care, apprehension and doubt?

We can't advance in our company when learning stops. It's time to look for another job. Religion is no different. When learning stops, advancement stops. Isn't it wonderful to know that learning in Spiritualism never ends, never. How does that strike you? It excites me! I cannot imagine not wanting to know more. In Spiritualism, each question answered leads to another question another search. You've heard of professional students? Well, Spiritualists are perpetual students! No matter how much we read, study, listen and search, we never find the words "the end." There is no closing a book with a big sigh saying: Well, that's it! There is always another book or a new thought and another question to be answered.

The retirement plan is beyond all dreams. We earn it by giving of ourselves, working, teaching,

learning, and preparing while here on this plane of existence. Of course I know we will continue with this after our retirement, but without the various physical shackles to impede our progress; a freedom we can only imagine now. We may retire at the earthly age of 65 from our job and then wonder how many more years we have left to enjoy. In our spiritual retirement, we not only have a great reunion with our family and friends who have already retired, but we reap wonderful benefits. We become healthier and younger; and, if we take advantage of the opportunities to learn, we become wiser. And we don't have to wonder how long it will last, it's eternity. No amount of money, no matter how costly the premiums, can buy a retirement plan like that.

Once again we come around to the business of a return for our time and effort. As far as wanting our religion to give us more than we offer in return, we never ask for more, but we receive it. I believe most Spiritualists struggle endlessly trying just to get even, but don't make it. We receive much more than we give and it's impossible, in this lifetime, to even begin to repay the benefits we receive. I'm sure, that after we discard this physical shell - without being hampered by work schedules and clocks, we can really begin repaying in earnest; helping others in all phases of existence to find the light and truth of Spiritualism.

What about the opportunity of buying stock in the company? We don't need to buy stock. In fact, money can't buy it. We have only to see the truth; the light of this great company to know that we are already a part of it, as it is a part of us. H. Gordon Burroughs summed it up beautifully when he said: "Be happy in the truth that you and God, Infinite Mind, are one - and that you are living now, eternally."

The Ascent of Man

What are you?

The appropriate answer to this question is not always resting on the tip of the tongue. Still, a full reply is warranted: I am a being alive and conscious upon this earth; a descendant of ancestors who rose by gradual processes from lower forms of animal life, and with struggle became man.

This reply does not pretend to exhaust the nature of man. It is usual to impart the latter mode of statement first; but premature dwelling on the more mystical aspect of human nature, with Ignorance or neglect of the biological facts actually ascertained, only gives rise to troubled thought in the future when the material facts become known - often in crude or garbled form - and leads to skepticism.

The clause as it stands is a large and comprehensive statement, that will need much time for its elucidation and adequate comprehension. Its separate terms may be considered thus:

Earth - Children can gradually be assisted to realize the earth as an enormous globe of matter,

with vast continents and oceans on its surface and with a clinging atmosphere, with whole moving very rapidly (nineteen miles per second) through space, and constituting one of a number of other planets all circulating round the sun. They may also be led to realize that from the distance of a million miles it would appear as an object in the sky rather like the moon; that from a greater distance it would look like any of the other planets; while from a vastly greater distance neither it nor any other planet is large or luminous enough to be visible - nothing but the sun would then be seen, looking like a star. It is occasionally helpful to realize that the earth, with all its imperfections, is one of the heavenly bodies.

Being - The mystery of existence may be lightly touched upon. The fact that anything whatever, even a stone - exists, raises unanswerable questions of whence and why. It is instructive to think of some rocks as agglomerations of sand, and of sand as water worn fragments of previous rock; being, even here, there arises a sense of infinitude.

Alive - The nature of life, and, consequently, of death is unknown, but life is associated with rapid chemical changes in complex molecules, and is characterized by the powers or faculties of assimilation, growth, and reproduction. It is a property we share with all animals and also with

plants. Children should not be told this in bald fashion, but by judicious questions should be led to perceive the essence of it for themselves. Soon after they realize what is meant by life, some of them will perceive that it has an enormous range of application, and will think of flowers as possessing it also: being subject like all living things to disease and death.

What plants do not possess is the specifically animal power of purposed locomotion, of hunting for food and comfort, with its associated protective penalty of pain.

Conscious -- Here we come to something specially distinctive of higher animal life. Probably it makes its incipient appearance low down in the scale, in vague feelings of pain or discomfort, and of pleasure; although it is not likely that worms are as conscious as they appear to us to be. In its higher grades consciousness means awareness of the world and of ourselves, a discrimination between the self and the external world -- self consciousness in its proper signification: an immense subject that can only be hinted at to children. They can, however, be taught to have some appreciation of the senses, or channels, whereby our experience of external nature is gained; and to perceive that the way in which we apprehend the universe is closely conditioned by the particular sense organs which in the struggle for existence have been evolved by all the higher kinds of animal life, organs which we men are now beginning to put to the unfamiliar and novel use of scientific investigation and cosmic interpretation. What wonder if we make mistakes, and are narrow and limited in our outlook!

Digression on the Senses

Our fundamental interpretative sense is that of touch -- the muscular sense generally. Through it we become aware of space, of time, and of matter. The experience of space arises from free motion, especially locomotion. Speed is a direct sensation. Time is the other factor of speed. It is measured by an uniformly moving body -- that is, by space and speed together. Muscular action impeded, the sense of force or resistance, is another primary sensation. And by inference from this arises our notion of matter, which is sometimes spoken of as a permanent possibility of sensation. Hardness and softness, roughness and smoothness, are all inferences from varieties of touch. Another sense allied to touch is that of temperature, whereby we obtain primitive ideas concerning heat. Then there are the chemical senses of taste and smell. And lastly, the two senses which enable us to draw inferences respecting things at a distance. These two attract special attention. The information they convey, though less fundamental than that given by the muscular sense, is of the highest interest and enjoyment.

The ear is an instrument for the appreciation of aerial vibrations, or ripples in the air. They may give us a sense of harmony; and in any case they enable us to infer something concerning the vibrating source which generated them, so that we can utilize them, by a prearranged code, for purposes of intelligent communication with each other -- a process of the utmost importance, to which we have grown so accustomed that its wonder is masked.

The eye is an instrument for appreciating ripples in the ether. These are generated by violently revolving electric charges associated with each atom of matter, and are delayed, stopped, and reflected in various ways, by other matter which they encounter in their swift passage through the ethereal medium.

From long practice and inherited instinct we are able, from the small fraction of these ripples which enter our eyes, to make inferences regarding the obstructive objects from which they have been shimmered and scattered. It is like inferring the ships and boats and obstacles in a harbor from the pattern of the reflected ripples which cross each other on the surface of the water.

The precision and clearness with which we can thus gain knowledge concerning things beyond our reach, and the extraordinary amount of information that can be thus conveyed, are nothing short of miraculous: though, again, we are liable to treat sight as an every day and commonplace faculty. We are not, however, directly conscious of the ripples, though they are the whole exciting cause of this sensation. Our real consciousness and perception are the objects which have invested the ripples with their peculiarities, have imprinted upon them certain characteristics, and made them what they are. The eye is able to analyze all this, as the ear analyzes the tones of an orchestra.

Convention Highlights

Proposal for Expanded Research into Psychic Phenomenon


Presented by Nicholas M. Sourant to the delegation in attendance at the Rochester, New York convention, 1978.

The general public has issued its stamp of approval for the mental phenomenon presented under the label of Spiritualism and parapsychology. It's the proof of puddin' so to speak! This is not a typical unsubstantiated statement. No! These statements are backed by the prestigious and highly reliable Gallup Poll, which this year revealed an accounting that 51% of the American public believes in extrasensory perception. 51%! When conducted among those with college level education the Gallup Poll findings hit a whopping 64%.

Whether technical points such as the meaning of words like clairvoyance or ESP were defined is doubtful. And this is why these findings are so impressive. Though much of Spiritualism suffers from a general misunderstanding of the true definitions of terms in use, the few, more popular ones remain adequately underscored by the news media to assure acceptable interpretation by the masses.

The July issue of the U.S. News and World Report provided heavy support on this subject with its lead paragraph: "Slowly but steadily, parapsychology is edging toward scientific respectability after years of lurking on the fringes."

But the news media can only pump so long! The cloak of respectability must be tapped while the opportunity is alive in the minds of the general public. At this very moment some newspaper reporter is talking to still another group of independent researchers probing into psychic phenomena. Now is our moment in time. It is our door to which these questions should be addressed. But no one calls. Either we seek these knocks now or forever padiock our doors. It is for this reason that I again come before you and plead for your support. Last year my words fell on deaf ears, perhaps, I would like to believe, because I could only

propose, not suggest a source of funding. Today I can. Such funding is available through the United States government. It funds many projects, and quests such as a probe of psychic research is well within this field. Obviously there are drawbacks to every Santa Claus and the U.S. government is not going to give without strings. However, if we as Spiritualists can gain the respectability of government support through research finding, the barrier of working along defined limitations should be worth the result.

I ask for your backing and sanction in my effort to obtain this funding. As an assistant curator of psychic phenomenon, I intend to get the paperwork moving through channels as soon as I return to Florida.

In order to prepare an acceptable proposal I intend to work with my associate Charles D. Jessup, III, also an assistant curator of psychic phenomena. The biggest obstruction confronting us is the acquisition of qualified personnel who will lend their professional talents and

identities to this endeavor. Qualified is a term which, in this case, refers to individuals recognized by their scientific peers as capable and outstanding. Unfortunately, few Spiritualists are accredited with doctrines in physics or medical research. The day has passed when the Sir William Crookes of the world were at our side. More such men must be found to aid our efforts.

Those recalled from the land of the dead, after being certified as medically dead have thrust proof of a summerland into the public's eye. We now need the support of recognized researchers -- researchers such as Dr. Kubler-Ross and her peers.

Although Spiritualists were the first to acknowledge the value of positive thought, who holds the title of The Father of Positive Thinking? An Orthodox!

A way must be found to give our prayer groups their due. Entire institutions of learning have been built on the beneficial efforts of prayers. So, why not Spiritualism? The value of a prayer-petition may not fall within qualities considered measurable by computers; nevertheless, the value is well known. And we are but one of the lesser known groups using prayer groups to help the afflicted.

Dr. Jones of Florida Technical University has succeeded in duplicating measurable data in his research of psychometry. And he is just one of many now knocking at the door of greater knowledge.

Scientists confronted with the remarkable Uri Geller have walked away stunned. Only magicians have offered to produce the equivalent result in each test that Geller passed. The BBC made Geller famous, but not because he appeared on television but through the comments of hundreds of individuals who reported that the very same feats he demonstrated on stage was at the same time repeated in their household -- formerly silent clocks restarted and silverware turned upwards, yet all remained untouched by human hands.

On a one to one magicians probably can repeat the effects resulting from Geller's psychic feats, but what about those where the influence extends outside of the stage door and across the countryside? Geller may be a fake. If so, he's brilliant.

In actual tests a few of Geller's feats have been successfully duplicated – the equivalent effects produced. However, other cases have failed to stand the testing and succumb to failure – falling short of the psychic's alleged ability. The jury is still out on rendering a final verdict on this question.

Think tanks are now used extensively within government and industry to approach difficult questions. So, any desire to help here should be openly welcomed.

Psychic circles probing crime are becoming more and more acceptable and in some cases are actually requested by police agencies. These last two areas fit us to a tee and by all means should be actively pursued.

Our request for federal assistance is hardly unexpected since the Soviet Union is reportedly investing annually \$50 million in psychic research. For the present, private industry remains the main financial arm behind independent psychic listening.

It is we who should be at the leadership of this effort --Spiritualists. Efforts of our pioneers in Europe and the United States represented the first who seriously examined this power.

Either we stand, or fall behind, while others who followed our early lead reap the harvest and recognition that Spiritualists alone deserve.

Therefore 1 propose the following:

1. We expand our acceptance in spirituality to encompass the fuller spectrum of thought process and associated spirit manifestation, and become actively involved in its research to that end.

- That we invite the scientific community to join with us in the research of the power of spirit manifestation and related phenomenon and seek direct, practical application.
- We research the relationship of thought processes and those areas we attribute to spirit manifestation.
- That we invite industry and government, through our representatives, to assist us in learning of the practical benefits of a psychic think tank.
- That we make application to private and government agencies for grants or trusts to provide the funding for serious research into these areas.
- That we charge our churches to seek out their friends and discuss in our interests the need to provide qualified personnel and funding for research programs.
- 7. Finally, I propose that we institute a formal call for scientific papers in the research of psychic phenomenon and spirit communication, its related fields and parapsychology in general. To this end I charge that the first national conference be held one month prior to the next National convention, so that the two may benefit from each other.

In order that such an undertaking be performed within the prerequisites industry and the government may elect to lay down it may be necessary for this organization to approve an independent body — a foundation working within the chapter but freed from its politics.

The Penetralia of A.J. Davis

By Herbert F. Schneider



Foreword

Andrew Jackson Davis was besieged with questions about the Spirit world by seekers of knowledge. He decided it would be helpful to publish questions and answers thereto from the wisdom he received from the higher sources of life. This book he entitled *Penetralia* because it penetrated the underlying principles of questions of greatest import to humanity.

Without reiterating the questions and extensive answers, I attempt to extract important knowledge from the entire book and present it for ready digest. -- H. F. S.

Part 1

The Philosophy of Questions and Answers

Davis begins by asserting that there is a philosophy to mere questions and answers. It involves thought and reflection whereby knowledge is unfolded and revealed. Such knowledge from thoughts has been handed down through the ages and can keep company with the angels or founder on a much lower plane. He says, "In great and good minds all thoughts are harmonious and meek, but the thoughts of small minds fret and strut like puppets."

All things and ideas, first exist before the human mind can seemingly conceive or even suppose them. He says, "I do not believe that man can fancy impossibilities. Every human thought begins in the essence of truth." However, man is ever inclined to diminish or exaggerate and the portrayal of truth suffers in consequence. Skeptics diminish with their demand for facts and idealists tend to exaggerate principles.

Everything man has produced, clearly existed first in the mind. Every invented proposal is resisted with scepticism until it has proven itself beyond question.

We deal with three departments of human thought, with man in the world of the Indefinite situated between the Finite and the Infinite. With self knowledge we humble the mind by realizing that we are ignorant. Knowledge of finite sciences is accompanied by vanity and ambition. Self knowledge opens up two worlds of being, the Indefinite self and the Infinite to which man feels instinctively related.

"Man sees himself as an unsolved problem and here begins an infinite series of questions and answers. Each one discovers in himself a desire to know," hence interminable questions. The mind itself is a world of interrogation. In an attempt to answer some of these questions, monuments of useless theology has been built and precepts and bibles written, but the answers have come from lesser worlds that the Infinite.

"If man can ask a profound question, there is power latent in his nature not less able to reply; that is to say the ability rightly to put a question presupposes the ability rightly to answer it."

Davis said he remained in childish ignorance until the day Spirit said, "Jackson! What do you see?" From that day onward he labored to tell the outer world what the inner world told him. Davis implies that there is a law of questions. If we properly organize questions of a consequential nature, revelations can follow.

The mind of the twelve year old Joshua, (the Hebrew name of Jesus) was organized beyond the average boy of that age. However, when appearing before the board of interrogation to be enrolled as a male of the nation, his intelligent response prompted more advanced questions. Davis assures us that the stimulus of these questions awakened a new channel in the mind of the child so that answers flowed forth in a manner to astound his questioners. Davis explains that without the stimulus of these questions this wisdom would not have been released.

Intelligent questions and answers are not founded upon the opinions of superficial popular authorities. They must be based upon nature, reason, and intuition.

The beautiful teachings of Joshua (Jesus) was in response to the questions in the minds of his listeners. If they had been mindless sheep there would have been no "Sermon on the Mount."

Questions which remain unanswered to each individual will at some distant day be revealed to us from within ourselves and the Infinite source.

"The purity and truth of an answer depends upon the quality of the question."

We must apply detachment in our judgement to understand the justice in the purpose of all things. "Man is idle until the world interrogates his nature. By putting the right questions at the right time. and in the right manner, a human mind may be measurable revealed to itself. In this art lie all true methods of education." "Man must both desire and learn to answer every question he finds the power to ask! Herein lies the cause of all progressive development."

A Catechism

All humanity contributes in some degree to the story of life on the planet, particularly in this sphere which Davis refers to as the embryological sphere of human existence, thus emphasizing a contrast with the higher spheres.

Davis believes that since theological monopolies have fallen out of step with the progress of scientific discoveries, a new teaching is necessary.

Man's chief end is endless progression; to do good, be happy, get wisdom and aspire calmly toward perfection; to become harmonious even as his Father-God and Mother-Nature are harmonious.

To seek only pleasure is to be a sensualist or materialist. To seek God by means of creeds and formulas is to be a religionist. To seek after eternal life and endless improvement is to be a harmonialist. To them pleasure and truth are co-incidental.

The Godhead consists of all the people that ever lived, on earth or planets of the firmament and all the spirits of the spheres. We live and have our being in Divine Existence.

The decrees of God are the Eternal Laws of his vital system. They are the Laws of Association, The Laws of Progression and the Laws of Development. Man is a microcosmical part of the Universal System.

Man is governed by three sets of Laws; Physical Laws -- the relationship of the body to its environment; Organic Laws -- the vital requirements of the body; Spiritual Laws -- the relation of the soul and its attractions. Man can develop his instincts to make him aware of his degree of conformance, with consequent benefits or penalties.

The true aspect of Creation is Perpetual Formation. Man is a product of Nature. (Not specifically created by God).

Earliest Man could not fall, from innocence or in any other respect, because he was already at the very bottom of human existence. Through milleniums of time he stumbled from complete ignorance to a state of comparable enlightenment. Observation of nature proves the ascension of all life from a lower existence and unfoldment to a higher. Man could not escape this Law of Nature and was compelled to follow a similar path.

The nature of sin is when the ignorance of excess or blind passions cause a pitfall, with unhappy consequences to ourselves and others. It is fundamentally a self debasement which we inevitably regret.

Past failures of the face of man have not acted against man in perpetuity but with the beneficence of Divine Spirit have been applied as a serious lesson toward reformation and unfoldment. All evil is overcome by good. Man stumbled because of his ignorant state of development at the time. For that reason Divine Justice permitted early man to discover what was wrong and to reach a little higher.

Everlasting life belongs to all mankind, since they have their entire existence in one Omnipresent Spirit of Deity. There can be no segregation of any part of humanity for destruction.

Redemption of man is through wisdom only. There is no other. It is the blending of love and knowledge.

Wisdom opens the soul to a perception of things spiritual, leading to peace of mind and immediate joy in transition.

Our duty is to Do Good and Speak Truth, because we are attracted to it and it is what we want. To do so because of fear, duty or obligation is of a less exalted motive.

Report of Eleventh Triennial Congress

London, England

To the Board of Directors of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches and the Delegates Assembled in the 86th Annual Convention.



Greetings:

It is with great pride and humility that your representative to The International Spiritualist Federation -- 11th Triennial Congress brings you a bird's-eye view of the activities in this Congress from August 26th, through September 2, 1978.

The Theme of the Congress was: Towards a World Society Which will Reflect the Spiritual Ideals and Moral Values Taught from Spirit and Demonstrated by our Valiant Pioneers.

Spiritualism in the I. S. F. Congress is as difficult to define precisely as is air, or the flowering of a plant, flavor, love, or the song of a bird. It embodies character building, brotherhood, and friendly gatherings. It is all of these and much more. While Spiritualist eludes concise definition, there are things about it we can show or explain to our fellowman. Because of our zeal for service to others, our spiritual desires to further our own spiritual progress and to assist and inspire all mankind.

Spiritualism lives by what it gives. Our meetings bring people together who would otherwise never know each other, and close association makes lasting friendship. As long as the heart beats in our breast, we are going to have concern one for another. In the ISF Congress meetings, we have a wonderful opportunity to give expression to our innate desire for togetherness. Our Organization (NSAC) is failing in its duty as a good Society if it is not providing this opportunity. Every Society in the ISF exemplifies and teaches the principles of GOD and home and country. This should begin in our Organization and continue into all units, producing better Spiritualists and better homes, therefore a greater Spiritualism.

The Congress meetings were held at Grove House, Froebel Institute, Roehamton Lane, London. This is a Teachers Training College of London University. Froebel Institute is in a lovely setting of many beautiful trees. The beautiful Cedar of Lebanon resembles the Ming tree. There are beautiful pines quite different from the kind we have, Mulberry, Wild Olive, Oaks, Ferns, and flowering plants of all kinds and a beautiful lake with many ducks floating so gracefully awaiting "manna" from the hands of Christene Clairmont and other members of the Congress. (May we inform you that all ducks and deer are the property of the Queen and are well protected. Many deer are on a free range in a public park just a short five minutes drive from College.) On these beautiful grounds where nature reigns supreme are five halls of residence, each with its own private sitting room and little kitchen on each floor, so one could make tea or coffee have friendly little gatherings morning, noon, or night. Dormitory rooms (single) had ½ beds; desk, chair and closet and a wash basin in each room. Your Representative was a guest at the *Garden Courts*.

Meals were served in the College Canteen. Meals were promptly on time -- Breakfast: 8 to 9 A.M., Lunch: 12:45 to 1:45 P.M. Dinner from 6:30 to 7:30 P.M. Each day at 11:00 A.M. a coffee break with biscuits was served; and at 3:30 P.M. was tea time with cookies and sandwiches.

Saturday, August 26th, 1978 8:00 A. M.

Registration of Representatives and Members of ISF. We received a folder of written material which included reports of the Executives and Minutes of the 1975 Congress.

8:00 P. M.

The Executives extended a welcome to the Delegation followed by the introduction of the Representatives from the various countries with each representative responding with greetings from their respective Societies. There were five NSAC Members in the Congress, namely: Miss Florence Macdonald, Mr. and Mrs. George Parks, Mrs. Elsie Phillips and Evelyn Muse. There were four other Americans there, namely: Mrs. Christene Clairmont, Dolly Snaders, Victoria Michalka and Mrs. Ethel Meyers.

Sunday, August 27th 10:30 a.m. Montefiere Hall

The Worshipful Mayor and wife of Wandsworth gave a civic welcome and had pictures made with the Delegations from each Country. (The Mayor kissed your Representative on the cheek -- I haven't washed my face yet!) The Mayor and wife remained for a Lecture and Demonstration by Mr. Robin Stevens, D. S. N. U. Pres. of the West London District Council. Mr. Stevens gave a very fine Lecture and Demonstrations. No Hymns, no prayer -- only an introduction by the Chairman. Mr. Stevens has been a Medium since he was eight years of age. He stated that he couldn't comprehend the Catholic, Mohammed and Christian religions but through the understanding of a Spiritualist, knowing that man is a Triune Being, then I can understand to a degree that those of other beliefsand in other countries with their determination to go forward, and to express life and purpose that it is continuous. Mr. Stevens reached five or six with Spirit greetings. Much time was lost in the translation of lectures and messages into Portuguese and Spanish.

3:00 p.m.

A group discussion period with Mr. Jack Hancock - Re. Executive - Canada. Mr. David Lapato of South Africa read a paper: "Peace that is Understood in Every Day Life." Mr. Lapato has been in Spiritualism 40 years. He is a very successful Healer in So. Africa. He stated: "No where do we find a more acceptable explanation of our life here than through the Religion of Spiritualism. Orthodoxy is loosing its authority, it has not brought the comfort for physical loss. It is failing in that it has ignored spiritual doors which leads man into greater avenues. Evil overshadows the good in our lives unless we are strong enough to overcome evil with good. Man should be willing to explore every facet of the soul." Mr. Lapato was given

15 minutes for the Delegates to ask questions on spiritual subjects.

4:15 p.m.

Señora Maria Meliado - Barcelona, Spain, read a paper entitled: "How Spiritual Healing Came to Earth." Señora Meliado is a most sincere and lovely lady, Founder and President of Sociedad El Maestro."

7:45 p.m. Service in the music hall

A demonstration of Psychic Art by Ms. Coral Polge (Mrs. Joe Hanson), a very charming lady. An introduction of Ms. Polge and Mr. Gordon Higginson by Miss Margarite Wilson. Miss Wilson stated that they had worked together on numerous occasions. This was quite an experience, which your representative shall attempt to relay to you. This will be difficult. The stage was quite large--a screen was prepared back of Ms. Polge. A machine in perfect view of the audience with Ms. Polge sitting to the front and side of the machine. An explanation was given that as she was impressed of the spirit entity or saw them approach -- she would then start sketching their face or profile. Each stroke of the brush or pen was instantly relayed or flashed on the screen at the same time she received it. Her work was very good, as to the authenticity of the entities which appeared on the screen, we cannot say; but there were definite, various facial expressions and expecially the eyes were outstanding. At the time of the sketching Ms. Polge would relate her feelings or what she sensed the entity may be trying to convey to someone in the meeting. Then Mr. Higginson would clairvoyantly describe what he saw and to whom the message and spirit belonged. About 10 or 12 sketches appeared during the service. A donation for The Children's Hospital in Brazil was collected at the door. (\$59.10)

Monday August 28th 9:45 a.m.

A welcome by Mr. Lapato - Chairman Prayer - Mr. Jack Hancock Congress officially opened for business.

Minutes of 1975 Congress, President's, Secretary's, and Treasurer's Reports were accepted as written. All of the reports were in our folders. There was very little business reported; the meeting was quite unorganized.

2:45 p.m.

Lecture -- Mr. Gordon Higginson, President -- The Spiritualist National Union. Subject -- "World Spiritualism An All Embracing Reality." (a very beautiful lecture.)

Mr. Higginson spoke firmly and convincingly of his bellef in Spirit. (Quotes: "Spiritualism embraces all truths.) I am not a Christian but that does not mean that I cannot see the good in Christians. If Death is the end, there is no purpose to life. Where there is light, there will always be shadows, for shadows are only reflections of the light. Spiritual gifts are within each Individual. He defined the Trinity of Man: "Body (physical), Soul (which responds to God), Spirit (that which lives on.)"

4:45 p.m.

Service by: Mr. Quy Playfair - Brazil Subject - "Psychic Scene In Brazil Today."

Quote: "Brazil is the leading country today for the development of Spiritualism (Spiritists). There is a multi-racial population in Brazil. Brazil has a long history of Catholic domination. There are 20 million Spiritists. In 1972 a survey showed:

67% accepted the existance of life after death.

50% had experiences of another life

28% of the attendants in Spiritualist centers were of other religions.

Spiritism is three fold - Religion, Philosophy, and Science. One can remain a Christian or member of any religious group or church and still be a Spiritist. In Rio de Janeiro they have a welfare organization for Spiritists where they treat over 1,000 children. Doctors, nurses and laymen work for free to pay a Karmac debt.

In El Salvador, S. E. Brazil, they have a social system and many Spiritists live there. In the city of Sao Paulo they have one of the most scientific Research Institutes in the world. There is a collection of Reincarnation, Poltergeist, Obsession, Possession, Misc. Phenomena, Mediums and Healers, etc. Mr. Playfair said: "I have very little confidence in the Spiritualists of London (because of some experience there), they are not putting into practice their philosophy. Brazil is really putting Christ into practice with all our courage and assistance to humanity." (Mr. Playfair is a rather young man, late 20's or early 30's in age, a college professor, and most sincere as were all the younger people attending the congress. At the close of the afternoon service, one of the oldest healers in Great Britain was introduced - Mrs. Natalie McKenzie, 94 years of age and still very active in a Healing Center.

8:00 p.m.

Divaldo Franco - Bahia, Brazil; Truly an Orator in his own right; a keen mind for names, dates, etc. Subject: Reincarnation With Scientific Proof

Mr. Franco gave many experiences to prove his subject—which seemed to be only a personal conviction of reincarnation. It did not give scientific proof (of the Theory) of Reincarnation. Mr. Franco was indeed worshipped by the South American Delegation. He is a delightful person to know.

Tuesday August 29th 9:45 a.m.

Business Session.

Prayer -- Mr. David Lapato -- Chairman.

Voting of Names placed in Nomination prior to the Congress. Your Representative gave a written request to the Executive Board on Sunday prior to the Election to seat Miss Florence Macdonald, and Mrs. Elsie Phillips as the other two representatives of the NSAC to the Congress. We were allowed three full votes. Our Candidates were elected. Tellers were: Mae Brown and Ethel Watts. There were 17 countries represented: Beigium, Canada, Egypt, Finland, France, Great Britain, Holland, Iceland, India, Norway, Portugal, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, USA, West Germany and South Wales. There were 145 Delegates - 44 day members who did not stay at the College at night.

I S F Treasurer, Mrs. Connie Hanson gave the Report of Finances which were in Bonds or a Savings Account, to wit: as of December 1977 a balance of \$6,047.87.

The 1981 Congress will be held in London -- after this date invitations will be accepted. Mr. Hughes of Great Britain, a very fine Parliamentarian asked for the floor and plainly stated that in order for the delegates to understand the business and be able to appraise the value of its context that a standing committee should be appointed for the next Congress to put the house in order -- not just chit-chat but know what we're doing. The Executive Committee must be able to accept new ideas, etc. Suggestions for a permanent office for the I S F set up in Great Britain (London) with the President and Secretary were given.

Mr. Brian Fearon of Canada said: "a decision shall be made to the Executive Board as to what will be best for the Organization."

Mr. Sven Arne Silve of Sweden suggested that the Executives set up Workshops for the Delegates to go and

listen and make suggestions.

Mrs. Muse of the USA suggested that a Committee be appointed in each Society of the ISF to contact members of their Society as a point of contact so that members may be aware of what is going on in the work and needs of the I

The Glorious Fight

(For Life)

In my recent readings at the Marion Skidmore Library in Lily Dale, New York, I was researching through the subject of reincarnation. At a seminar session held at Morris Pratt Institute this summer, President Joseph Merrill was discussing this subject and made a referral to some books by various writers. One such book was Letters From A Living Dead Man, by Elsa Barker which included the following statements:

"There is nothing in this universe stronger than the will of man when it is directed by a powerful unit of force. Whatever your strength, make the most of it in the battle of life."

In this highly competitive world we live in those words seem to bring forth an application of
philosophy worth trying. We all face daily trials
and tribulations, ranging from our personal life
within the framework of our homes, to the
everyday stresses of work and survival in our own
particular professions. There is no doubt as to the
"struggles, battles and fights" we daily encounter!

Dictionaries tell us the word fight or battle can mean a range of things — it can indicate combat, contrast, or to contend in any manner, striving vigorously — I would prefer to accept the latter definition — to strive vigorously.

Let us strive vigorously everyday by applying that powerful unit of force (the will of man) as indicated in the above passage and let our positive nature handle our problems. It makes sense that this procedure would bring a harmonizing effect to the daily fights in our lives. A negative thought or action brings similar results -negativity, confusion and inactivity. A positive will can work itself through the winding maze of difficulties with steady and progressive results.

A further inspiring comment from this same book states:

Remember that your opponents are not other men, but conditions. If you fight men, they will fight you back; but if you fight conditions, they, being unintelligent, will yield to you with just enough resistance to keep your muscles in good order.

Conditions - they can upset us, make us angry and produce a negative atmosphere. If something we experience does not blend in with our ways of life, try changing the conditions --not the men behind it! How? By that powerful unit of force - your will! It can permeate any condition and positively used, can and will alter the set of circumstances and eliminate the negativity of that condition.

A concluding statement written in the book mentions . . .

The joy of the struggle! That is the keynote of immortality, the keynote of power... Tell them to enjoy their struggles, to thrill at the endless possibilities of combination and creation, to live in the moment while preparing for long hence, and not to exaggerate the importance of momentary failures and disappointments.

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
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
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
