




Greetings:

It is with pleasure that we bring to you the report of the Bureau of Lyceums.

This past year has seen the appointment of several new State Lyceum Superintendents by their state organizations as per the recommendation of your National Superintendent last year. It is recognized that someone within one's own state can work more closely in guiding and directing the formation and growth of Lyceums.

We are pleased to announce the organization of a new Lyceum at the Harrison D. Barrett Church of Camp Etna, Maine by Vera MacGregor with Mrs. Jonathan Gilman, teacher and the reactivation of the Lyceum at the Church of Psychic Research, Bellingham, Washington with Billie Jo Klaniecki, Conductor.

Beginners Kits to assist in the formation of a Lyceum have been sent to the following:

Plymouth Spiritualist Church, Rochester, N.Y. National Spiritualist Church, Norwich, CT. Second Spiritualist Church, Philadelphia, PA. Harrison D. Barrett Church, Etna, ME. Temple of Metaphysical Science, W. Babylon, N.Y.

It is difficult to give an accurate accounting of active Lyceums as many do not complete their Annual Lyceum Report. Forms were sent to 59 churches who list a Lyceum, but only 23 have been received at this writing. Follow-up letters have been sent and it is hoped that soon some accurate statistics can be compiled.

The response to the letter regarding donations in honor of Founder's Day by churches and individuals was gratifying. These kind donations, the sale of materials and some activities at Lyceum Conference have been our only source of revenue.

Appreciation is due the Curriculum Committee consisting of Mrs. Audra Cutlip, Rev. Evelyn Muse, and Mrs. Peggy Spencer. Together with your Superintendent they have spent many hours evaluating and revising The Spiritualist Progressive Lyceum Lessons - Kindergarten through Adult by Rev. Melvina Hostak for consideration in reprinting. They are also checking the availability of The British Officers Manual because it includes patterns for marches and callisthenics used in our earlier Lyceums. There appears to be a renewed interest in the use of these in some of our Lyceums. Quoting from this manual:

"The inclusion of marching and callisthenics in our sessions has a wider purpose than mere physical development, or relaxation from the mental side of our work. It is a fact that marching, and moving in unison, greatly add to the harmony of thought and aspiration amongst those present. More than this, the physical movements, performed to the accompaniment of music, provide for a flow of psychic power, which can be of great mutual benefit. This blending of psychic forces is revitalizing, as well as assisting our spirit friends in their ministry of inspiration and help."

The Curriculum Committee has recommended to the National Board the printing of the *Lessons* on *Mediumship* by Rev. Margaret L. King to be used as educational material in our Lyceums.

The Spotlight, our Lyceum periodical has carried many teachable and informative articles to be used by Lyceum classes and individuals. It continues in each issue to carry one or two songs reprinted from Heart Echoes, a song book used by many of our older Lyceums. Lyceums can accumulate these and will eventually have completed copies of the long out of print Heart Echoes for their use at no additional cost. Mrs.

Fran Broadstone, Editor of *The Spotlight*, strives to make each issue better than the preceding.

The National Spiritualist has cooperated fully with the Bureau of Lyceums in promoting Lyceum activities and working toward the growth of our Lyceum movement and our gratitude is due Rev. William Melick, Editor.

Our Twenty-fifth Annual Lyceum Conference was held in Lily Dale, New York on July 6-8 with a registration of 48 adults and 51 children from 12 states. The cooperative spirit which prevailed throughout the Conference was easily recognized. Many activities were enjoyed by children and adults and many beneficial exchanges of ideas and suggestions came forth.

This year a writing contest was initiated with a theme of "The Open Gateway". Prizes were awarded during the Lyceum Conference. It is our objective to stimulate more creative writing and hope that more entries will be received for next year's contest.

The gratitude of your Superintendent is extended to Rev. Evelyn Muse, Assistant National Superintendent and the National Board for their cooperation in all our endeavors.

The growth of our Lyceums, as well as the growth of our churches, will manifest itself as church leaders and members recognize and meet the individual's spiritual and social needs and realize the church's need for every age group from babies through senior adults. Then will we attain our great ambitions and hopes of having the complete Lyceums described by our Founder, Andrew Jackson Davis, in every church serving the needs of man on earth and spirits gone before.

Centuries of pain, trial and error has shaped and on occasion, hammered his thought power and devotion into an offering now shared and dreaded by most of humanity. In one respect man has tried to form a heaven on earth, as with his church and religion, reflecting the source of all and his obligation to the Supreme, Infinite Intelligence.

That mankind may more fully enjoy and more completely realize the full beauty and strength of his step-child, he must perforce, seek to more fully understand the enduring qualities of religious precepts which have brought our civilization, as we understand it, into being.

Faith, often regarded as the evidence of things unseen, is a most beautiful emotional quality and may indeed become a most solid precept for true living when it is rooted in even the slightest knowledge of God, the supreme source of all life. Did You Know . . .

There is a difference in conventional and unconventional healing? Hippocrates based his theory of healing on the power of nature, on diet, herbs, bath and rest. He believed there were two classes of problems that affected mankind and these were the external --



which relates to nature and the environment; and the second -- the internal which are man's personal habits including thought and mind activity. He based all disease on an imbalance of the body fluids.

By his understanding, he removed healing from the confines of the priests and religionists.

In the Second Century AD, secular medicine became a well established practice. But we should note that at least two centuries before the Christian era, medical practices were accepted in the Roman Culture. The Greek physicians performed well and thus brought acceptance of the practices.

In this light, it was the Greeks who understood man and his thinking. They also recognized that people only appreciated that for which they had to pay. Thus, fees were established for medical attention. This profit making system of medicine continues to this day and is manifested by numerous materialistic doctors.

Galen, the physician was very interested in the practice of magic and recognized amulets and charms. However, this was carried on by the Christian Church, as they were the first to enter the lucrative business of commercializing the ancient practice of charms. Today we still have copper bracelets worn for alleviating or assisting with problems of the blood, arthritis, etc.

We find throughout history, that unconventional healing was the way and as a result magic, the occult, faith and Spiritualism have a long track record of healings.


However, it took three centuries of protestanism and one of materialistic science to revive the methods of unconventional healing. The Movement of Spiritualism has been credited with the revival of healing practices in the nineteenth century.

To the unconventional method of healing, the Spiritualists added the power and influence of excarnate spiritual beings for cures and healing with both the mental and physical diseases. The results were produced by spiritual influence working through the body of the medium, stimulating and revitalizing the fluids of the body and sending energy to the affected parts. It was further understood that the spiritual influences could illuminate the brain of the healer and thereby intensify the perception of the healer so that he could see or feel the causes of the disease.

These healings were furthered by application and treatment of disease at a distance. The spiritual beings combined the healing forces with the magnetism and vitality of the healer and conveyed these forces to the patient at a distance. This became known as absent healing.

Today, more and more unconventional methods of healing are becoming the ordinary rather than the extraordinary. Conventional healing means those practices which are readily accepted by the general public while unconventional practices are those which have been found to be of value and produce results but have not been totally accepted by the general public.

All things need a beginning - thus let us remember, it is recorded that it was the Spiritualist Movement that revived the means of healing both physically and mentally by what today is termed unconventional healing!



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A Sea of Sights and Sounds

Substance is created through natural law. Cosmic dust is matter, or fine energy, as we now like to call it, adding to the phenomenal mass of expression. The Gulf Parting Spiritualism and Orthodoxy Gets Narrower Every Day

Often it is asserted that there is a vast gulf between Spiritualism and other religious faiths of the world. Closer examination of the facts, however, seems to dissolve many of the more dubious references to one another made respectively by both sides at different times.

Ostensibly, the ultimate goal is the same in each and every case: Spiritual development and world brotherhood. In view of this I for one, fail to understand why there should be such hostility and antagonism towards one another, unless it be due to jealousy and self-interest. To some extent both are guilty of these traits. Neither of these disfigurements of the personality are *simple* to eradicate from the human make-up, especially when age and pride of an organization are weighed in the balance.

For my part, I can only speak from my position in the United Kingdom of Great Britain. More tolerance is definitely required before a beginning with substance is likely here. But which side can first be expected to make a friendly move toward the other. A pact, extending blessing one to another, should bear considerable fruit. In the case of Spiritualism, growth continues to come in small numbers, though ever consistent.

The recent public awareness has spawned a number of psychic research institutes. All insist upon improved educational standards for those whose ambition it is to do public work. In my humble opinion, this will go a long way toward popularizing further growth. As sensationalism fades into the background and the real intent and purposes of our *cause* are given full treatment in the public eye, traditional restrictions may cease. Too much display and fanfare detracts and perhaps causes the sincerely interested public to shy away.

Far too long Spiritualism has been regarded by many as some kind of entertainment. Or at best, just another of those cults which spring up from time to time, only, in the course of years to recede once again into the obscurity from which it sprang. The trail of individuals who today are all the sadder and wiser speak only too fluently of such cults which had no beginning and thus end abruptly.

Happily, in Great Britain, at least, that state of affairs is gradually giving way to a more sober appreciation of our real aims. The acknowledgment of the validity of our work and to some extent, our claims, in the early forties by the Chairs of Psychic Research at Oxford and Cambridge helped immensely in bringing this change in attitude about. This relationship between research and church makes the past more believable. A definite boon to Spiritualism.

If the Christian Churches are afraid of queering their pitch, so to speak, then it is up to them to sit up and take notice of the writing on the wall. There must be reasons -- logical reasons behind the congregation growth rate at Temples of Spiritualism. And unless the latest polls are wrong, Spiritualism is showing a higher percentage of increase than is its neighbors. Of course, the total numbers far favor the orthodox!

The criticism I have to make about the orthodox church is that it appears to be almost totally absorbed with preserving its ancient traditions and ritualistical practices, rather than adapting itself to human needs. Furthermore, the theological training establishments are sadly in

need of reform. One can only presume that their narrow creedal teachings severely limit many students who, having imagination and vision for their job, discover a hiatus between their desires and their fulfillment. The maxim therefore for the orthodox church appears to be, put your own house in order.

Since it is never really fair to be one-sided and as I criticized Orthodoxy earlier, it is only right that I reflect on one of our weaknesses. There is, of course, considerable room for improvement. But in terms of our neighbors we are young and have much to learn. In the past, probably owing to lack of first-class speakers, many people have been allowed on the rostrum who were totally unqualified for such work. Their good intentions cannot be weighed here, for the damage inexperience renders to intelligent seekers venturing into one of our churches for the first time, is often total. These people may never come again. In this respect, I will say that the organizational effort behind the orthodox church and the educational requirements it has set, virtually eliminates something like this ever occuring. It does not allow anyone to occupy their pulpits without having first demonstrated ability with dignity and efficiency.

It is hoped that the link in Spiritualism between the United States and Great Britain will grow ever stronger, leading to the ultimate fusion in one gigantic world group of Spiritualists that will, eventually, lead the World's people to the clear and correct understanding of Spiritual Truth, in all its majesty and beauty.

Unfinished Symphonies

Through the fingers of a London widow flow compositions in the style and genius of 15 deceased musical giants.

Strings, woods and brass notes tingle at the ends of her fingers. Her psychic creations clash, then resound in harmonious splendor to the music of the heavens. Over 400 compositions bear the indelible stamp of the *past* -- works penned by mortal hand! But in the unmistakable style and creative genius of great composers?

Chopin, Schubert, Beethoven, Bach, Brahms, Schuman, Debussy, Grieg, Rachmaninov and

Montverdi -- they have made a simple London widow world famous.

Rosemary Brown is the earthly author. Her talents consist of one remarkable asset -- a highly receptive psychic. Lacking formal schooling, Rosemary has, nevertheless, demonstrated skillful talents at the piano and organ.

Her fame, perhaps, now, even her future remains in the hands of 15 deceased masters of music.

The biography, "Unfinished Symphonies..." is Rosemary Brown's, but the story is woven with threads of demonstrable spirit return and assistance.

These great minds live on creating new

compositions -- songs, instrumental pieces even complete operas! And Rosemary Brown is their host and friend.

This biography is a testimonial to creative living in the *hereafter*.

First to greet her regularly was Franz Listz. On occasion Schweitzer and Mozart occupy her time.

This book will not be her last. Sir Donald Tovey, who died in 1940, was, at last word, deeply involved in dictating his book *Immortality*. "Work" she recalled was and remains a passion for these men. Tovey's initial remark's on January 1, 1970, exemplify this: "Well, as you can't sleep, we may as well do some work."

The following message was one received from Sir Tovey during a seance of two hours, "Man will plumb the mysterious depths of his veiled consciousness and then will soar to correspondingly greater heights."

Previous to 1971, she came under constant investigation, undergoing psychological tests, psychic tests and musical examinations. Around then the endless whirl of tests ceased. She apparently had satisfied her inquisitors.

Rosemary credits her Scotch Celtic blood for this inherited psychic ability. During grammer school she recalled seeing Beethoven and Schubert. Early in adulthood she heard the voices of these masters speaking to her.

In 1952, she married the son of Sir Thomas William Brown, a trained horticulturist and free lance writer who earlier had lost his wife.

At her mother's death bed in 1961, Rosemary was told of a medium, Mrs. Osborne, who held circles in nearby Balham, seven days a week. This began her introduction to Spiritualism. Her husband passed away shortly after the death of her mother.

With the door opened Rosemary soon began to attend church regularly. She soon joined the working staff by taking the place of the retiring organist.

Another psychic, Miss Gladys Smith, introduced her to the church's Fellowship for Psychical and Spiritual Studies. Later a healer in the town of Acton advised her that the conductor Franz Listz was trying to contact her.

Through another medium named Harold Sharp she learned of her contact with Beethoven. Following this, George Rogers introduced her to Rachmaninov.

The procession of famous people continued to increase as she met Sir George Trevelyan, B.T., who showed her scores to Mary Firth who was in charge of musical courses at his college in Attingham Park. It was natural that Sir. Donald

Tovey would follow the procession, as Mary had been one of his favorite pupils.

After many early disappointing bouts with the British Broadcasting Corporation Company Rosemary was given air time which brought new works of the composers wide attention.

Listz agrees with his contemporaries that *pop* music is "fun and may be good for young people, providing it is not depraved". Unfortunately some of it does, at times, seem tainted.

Listz once compared modern music "to a series of vaguely interesting, but grotesque sounds".

He explains his method of traveling as "teleportation".

"He thinks of me," she says, "and by so doing he gets in on my mental wave length. If we think of what is good, we can contact that wave length," she explained.

The human soul, like the seed, seeks divine light. Ultimately it will find it, not necessarily, though, on earth, which is a nursing school.

"Hell", Liszt says, "is a self made thing."

Mannerisms apparently change little. In life Schubert was modest and humble; she reports him as quiet in a merry, very lovable way. His contribution was a piano sonata in C Major, a work of 40 pages.

Robert Schuman and his wife, Clara, also appear to her -- Robert the introvert, and Clara the extrovert. Rachmaninov remains "reserved and almost inaccessible" and seldom stays for any length of time.

Beethoven stands aloof like a Greek God, and inspires an atmosphere of sanctity with melodic symphonies. She reports being drawn to the warm, friendly Grieg who has given her half a dozen compositions. The most difficult to understand reports Rosemary is the explosive Berlioz who typified vitality and romantic dreaminess all at the same time.

It was surprising to read that Albert Schweitzer, dear friend of Sir Donald Tovey, produced an organ composition.

The list of works is endless, remarkable, and accurate to a fault -- completely above reproach. Music accomplishes in a short time what words would take hours to bring about. "On Wings of Song", recalls what Shakespeare said so long ago: "There's not the smallest orb which thou behold'st but in his motion like an angel sings". So again Byron, "The earth is but an echo of the spheres".

When music is composed in prayer with listening audience, the bridge to the Spirit World is built easily. It is Rosemary's hope that her communication with the great masters has not been in vain.

If we are members of a society, we must willingly put the law of cooperation into motion. Cooperation is a two-way street.

The very presence of life is evidence of cooperation. How it flourishes, however, denotes the degree of harmony consistent among opposites living within a competitive society. For adults as for children, the function of this law depends on cohesive blending.

A child has to learn to cooperate first with his parents in order to learn. Then he learns through play experiences with his friends to cooperate and to share. When he goes to school he again learns more about cooperation. With each new academic experience he learns to grow as a member of his class.

Members of a family should learn the same rules of cooperation, so that the home runs smoothly. Each person in the family must do his part, for harmony to exist.

Love is at the core of family and all relationships. Individuals attract what they put out. When love is present, cooperation is in evidence.

On the material level of occupations, trade, professions, cooperation is definitely in effect. If people do not cooperate toward the goal, then the goal will not be attained whether it is making trucks in a factory, repairing highways, teaching children, working in a store or whatever.

If one feels in his life that he needs more material abundance, he must work in conjunction with the laws of desire, attraction, and cooperation to bring that abundance unto himself. To do this we must cooperate with spiritual laws on a mental level. For our spiritual growth on a mental level, we must first desire to grow. We must put intensity in that desire.

We must not forget the law of love either. We learn to love and put it out first in the mind, then the heart. We absolutely must cooperate with the law of love if our lives are to have beauty and purpose. If love is what we put out, then love is what we will attract back.

Common sense and good health rules cannot be ignored though, regardless of spiritual understanding. One absolutely must cooperate with the laws of good health to feel well.

On a broader scale, members of a society must cooperate or else the walls come crumbling down. Everyone must do his part whether he be a street

sweeper, fireman, lawyer or indian chief. It is when members of a society do not cooperate and everyone starts passing the buck that we begin to see a breakdown occur.

Members of nations must cooperate or else chaos sweeps the land, with much suffering.

When one realizes that the law of love works in conjunction with the law of cooperation then, of course, everything seems clear.

If one truly loves the members of his family he will want to cooperate. If one truly loves the spiritual side of life he will want to cooperate with the various spiritual laws so that he can grow spiritually. If one truly loves his church with a heartfelt love then he will want to cooperate and do what is necessary. If all people's of the world learn to love and care for each other, world peace will not seem the far-fetched dream!

Poltergeist

A phenomena of Imagination, Conscious Energy, or Both?

Poltergeist - German origin, usually explained as a "noisy spirit". But -- is it?

This is an interesting subject, especially in light of today, when the public seems drawn to strange and unexplained happenings recently splashed in national magazines and newspapers.

Legend has it that this ghost-like phenomena is a spirit of playful, teasing and fun-loving nature, known to throw things around a house, upset books from the shelf, make rapping noises and generally disrupt the household.

Dr. Nandor Fodor, states in his book, *The Haunted Mind*, "The poltergeist is not a ghost. It is a bundle of projected repressions". Assuming Mr. Fodor's theory is accurate, we could then assume that the physical expression is being generated by the release of an energy/consciousness activity which shares a common ground and results in an explosion observed as physical manifestation. controllable as the movements of the hand". *Powers*, he claims, bring about this noisy spirit - not the spirit world.

Can these powers which bring about this "noisy spirit" emanate from the imagination alone? Can we think ourselves into a state of energetic thought which produce an object-throwing force, or one which can, within our limited range of hearing - make noises loud enough to raise one from sleep? What magnitude of power lies within the imagination? Do we really know?

Or - does this "noisy spirit" activity only manifest when there are children about the area of activity? I have heard many people say that "it is the child that brings it on". Can we conclusively state that "children" are the true catalyst to this phenomena?

The purpose of this article is to motivate those who care to comment on this theory relating to the poltergeist phenomena. We have all read magazine articles, newspaper accounts, and even television stories, about someone's house being "invaded by strange happenings". Well maybe, we can help questioning individuals somewhat by educating and informing them of the cause of these strange happenings. This would assist them in their dilemmas about the unknown and relieve them of yet another misconstrued concept in today's unbalanced world condition.

I certainly do not profess to know all the answers; therefore, it would be my hope some of the readers of *The National Spiritualist* would contribute their knowledge and research on this subject.

They're with other loved ones. But me! I'm here, alone, left to face all the memories alone. The loving touches are gone. Soon the sound of his voice will be hard to capture and his image will fade. Everything we had together is now part of the past, tomorrow doesn't exist, not for the two of us. Now, there is only one. Just me, alone!

Where there is love, also, there is emotion and unfortunately, pain and the sorrow which goes with passing from intimate contact with loved ones. The land of spirit is not barren of the joys and happinesses found during physical life. Love carries with it the burden of separation, especially where communication falls on deaf ears.

The stories of sudden separation and mounting grief strike familiar chords. Her mate is gone. Now she, too, is a widow. But in her grief she forgets that he too, has become separated and is now a widower!

Invisible, He Stands At Her Side, Matching Her Tear For Tear

Transition provides no immunity, only continuity of expression along more subtler lines. And while the living suffer, the departed must also master new circumstances and accept the distance which physical death has brought. Sometimes, though, acceptance comes harder for the spirit. The following is a case about which I read in the *Psychic News*.

Last week I was present when Lilian Bailey, gave a remarkable trance seance for Mrs. Leonard D. Woods, a friend of mine whose husband had died weeks before under tragic circumstances.

As I look back and recall the events which led up to that session and the settling of nerves it provided the medium, myself, the departed and Mrs. Woods, it's clear that some who pass into spirit life enter with anger. Perhaps the phrase, only time heals originated from those in spirit who, through observation, learned early the value of patience.

The wife bore the loss of her husband with great calmness and demeanor, reflecting considerable credit to her, as the sole living provider and parent of two children. At the time Mrs. Woods was not a confirmed Spiritualist, She knew of the faith, but spent her Sundays with her mother at the Roman Catholic Church.

The loss marked the second time that tragedy struck her life. Her first loss was a daughter, Shirley Ann, who made the transition three years earlier. It was then that Mrs. Woods and I first met as Catholic and Spiritualist. At the time, neither of us suspected that the friendship would grow in importance.

Our first discussion dealt with our religious differences. I told her, as I remember now, that I was surprised to find such an intelligent woman being dictated to on matters of what to read, by a priest, especially a man under the age of thirty. I choose only to relate my own part, although she gave a good accounting for her faith. In the end, however, she turned to a less controversial subject. This I took as an indication that she was finding my explanations of Spiritualism *more reasonable*. Perhaps, even worth looking into. Of course, she did and became a credit to her faith.

A few days after Mr. Woods met his tragic death he managed a slight communication to me about his wife's activities. "My passing has again attracted her to your faith. Just the other day she was reading *The Psychic Stream*, a book by Spiritualist Arthur Findlay." He said, "She was shocked to find such a thick book, 1200 pages, among my library. Although she had often cleaned the books, not once had she observed the titles, much less read the contents!"

The Catholic Church up to this point was still in charge of her religious activities. So, instead of asking permission of her priest, she decided to attend several seances and explore the feelings which drove her. Within a few weeks she had received enough evidence from her deceased daughter to choose Spiritualism. Several successful trance sessions followed. None, however, included her late husband.

Mrs. Woods was, at first, a typical closet Spiritualist. Then came a seance with Frank Leah, a psychic artist of considerable fame. He drew a life portrait of Shirley Ann. The evidence was irrefutable. The artist had no prior knowledge of Mrs. Woods and since her daughter had been gone for several years, newspaper clippings would have been extremely difficult to find within the short time between the date of her appointment and arrival.

The evidence piled up quickly for her. At a later sitting - with Estelle Roberts - her deceased daughter referred to the psychic drawing. Soon, Mrs. Woods was a working evangelist, spreading the news and word of Spiritualism among her friends. One of those friends had recently experienced a similar bereavement with the passing of a daughter. In her attempt to illustrate a point, Mrs. Woods sought assistance from her daughter, Shirley Ann, for this friend. The sequel couldn't have been better. One evening, to Mrs. Woods' surprise, Lilian Bailey's daughter telephoned. The young girl was following through with a request of her mother's guide, Poppet. The guide had told the girl to tell Mrs. Woods that her daughter, Shirley Ann, had received the verbal message and would intercede to give evidence to the friend in need. And she did!

Those who criticize child guides do not know the valuable function they perform in transmitting evidence of survival. Lacking the need for self consciousness, these guides become expert at the task of penetrating the defenses of those who are emotionally up-tight. Much of the success which normally occurs can be indirectly attributed to the efforts of child guides.

The sitters are not the only ones held in emotional turmoil. Spirits occasionally suffer from this problem. Mr. Woods was one whose emotions were totally out of control. Although he was delighted to meet his lost daughter, Shirley Ann, the reunion did not compensate for early death.

Even his nature was antagonistic to communication. In life he was critical by nature and a philosopher by habit. Despite adverse attitude toward his new state of life, he had to admit that some of the evidences coming to his attention could not be explained away.

Leonard's disagreement made a sitting impossible. Several days after his passing Mrs. Bailey called Mrs. Woods about a previous discussion. In the middle of the phone conversation Poppet took control of her medium and continued the verbal exchange. She wanted Mrs. Woods to know that Shirley Ann's father was trying to communicate. Poppet first said: "The man who handled all of Mrs. Woods' finances." Of course, other proof followed.

Poppet explained the great difficulty spirit was having with this gentleman. He was too emotional for full control.

Leonard Woods passed to the *Spirit Land* in his early forties. He was successfully carving out a career which had already shown great promise. This man did not want to die!

Again and again Poppet told Mrs. Woods she was trying to help him. Her efforts were of no use,


though. Due to his mental state, a seance would be a waste of effort. Even his reunion with his daughter had not adequately compensated him for being cut off, as he regarded it, "in the prime of his life". Poppet had called off the first sitting because of this attitude. Finally, during another conversation it was learned that the attempt would be made again within a week.

Poppet opened the sitting. She relayed messages from Leonard concerning certain finances his wife needed to know. The control was then turned over to Shirley Ann and a touching reunion took place between daughter and mother.

Control was relinquished and Poppet was in charge again. Control, however, was hard to maintain. As was later told, it took all the control that Poppet could muster to keep him in check. His emotions were running high. He was extremely anxious to reveal his nearness. But his new being wouldn't allow him to express his feelings. This only added to his displeasure.

The efforts put forth by Mrs. Woods in comforting her bereaved husband was just what the doctor ordered; before the seance ended Poppet announced that he was much improved and had begun the important process of adjusting. In this instance, it was Mrs. Woods who counseled Leonard, and not the reverse.

The communication had provided him with an outlet to continue useful work. He had decided, Poppet said, "to help guide and direct his wife in her finances." Poppet summed up the value of Spiritualism, at least, for Leonard: "He's not an orphan any more."

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
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
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
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
