I have long felt that Spiritualists are first-class folks, but are not always given first-class treatment; hence, our little "farewell" dinner party at O'Learys Restaurant.



I hope you enjoyed it, but I am very sorry all of you did not get prompt service. It seems quite a few delegates had plane connections to meet, and they were served first.

I thought one of the most memorable experiences of the 87th Convention was the visit to the Printing Offices of *The National Spiritualist*, provided by Stow Foundation.

It is an institution and headquarters we can all be proud of. The staff; Bill, Chuck, Marge, Marolyn, Linda, Dede and Cheryl, all work together in such harmony and efficiency, we can see why this publication is getting better and more professional, and a credit to our great organization.

Bill Melick has amazing mechanical ability, and he lead everyone on the bus tour through the various stages of producing TNS, i.e. typesetting, photographing, layout, circulation, etc. Stow Foundation has generously provided important and sophisticated equipment and the word should be publicized that many of your local church programs and other printing needs could be done at this office. Not only can Bill do it as efficiently, but it will keep the revenue within our own organization, and in some measure impliment a cycle of activity for future use.

From personal experience, I can now tell you (as a lame duck board member) that the N.S.A.C. Board worked long, hard, and late for 10-days in Indianapolis on the many administrative problems, and nearly a dozen ordination exams and N.S.T. exams. Long before the convention opened, we worked from 9:00 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. The night

before the convention began, President Merrill and Secretary Hull conferred with the Parliamentarian until 3:00 a.m. to get us off to a good start. It's hard work, and no wonder I decided 24 years on the Board entitled me to a vacation!

Pardon my California prejudice, but we were so proud of the presentations of Rita Faubel and Barbara Thurman, as teachers and ministers. Pat Smith did yeoman work as Chairperson of the Credential Committee, and Rolla Haddick gave substantial help to the Constitution and By-laws Committee to render an articulate and clearly worded by-law governing seating of delegates and proxy. This has long been needed.

Also brought to intelligent focus was Article VI, Page 10, Section 1 of the Constitution governing membership. In another year this will probably be reworded and presented as a proposed change which will provide fair and equal representation for churches in State Associations and those directly affiliated with the National Association: and, at the same time increase the numbers who can be seated at future conventions and also provide more revenue for our organization in per capita.

I thought one of the highlights of our convention program was the talk given by Charles Jessup of Houston, on the Bureau of Phenomenal Evidence, and the long-awaited report of the Church of England. Since phenomena is unique to our organization, I hope in the future, time can be provided for audio visual workshops and seminars on this vital subject.

What a delightful vocal presentation by the Descants from North Central High School in Indianapolis! Beautiful solo and ensemble voices and they looked charming in their light blue dresses. They expressed Hoosier harmony at it's best and thrilled all who attended the opening banquet. It brings back memories of many years ago when the Melick family provided similar music - the old fashioned and modern music so well blended.

Our ideas may differ in regards to promoting Spiritualism, but we agree 100% that it is the greatest science, philosophy, and religion in the world -- so *let it grow!* Cooperate with June Killmer, the National Lyceum Superintendent; her Assistant, Evelyn Muse; and Curriculum Directors, Peggy Spencer and Audra Cutlip. Only 22 of 59 Lyceums sent in reports. There is now a vital course for Lyceum teachers, using modern teaching methods. Let us all give them real support to encourage and develop Lyceums for all ages.

Lillian Sooter, the new Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, and her committee, improved on the financial results of last years' figures, and we are grateful to all of you thoughtful, generous delegates.

As usual, the Rev. Evelyn Muse distinguished herself with her inspiration regarding the great

work of the Healing Center, directed by Catherine Schneider of Wheeling, West Virginia. Where does Evelyn find that drive and energy? I saw her savoring a caloric slice of chiffon confection. Perhaps she put "honey" on it!

My respect, friendship, and love to all of you fellow Spiritualists! Remember what I said in Indianapolis! The philosophy of Spiritualism Is Growing, and you need only look around to see significant, yet subtle, changes taking place in other large religious groups. The laymen want to have more to say about their own spiritual activities, growth, and welfare. Isn't that our philosophy?

A True Story

Because this story is mine, I know that it is true and by sharing it, I hope it will unlock some doors for you.

I often wish that there were some way of exchanging psychic experiences with one another whom we encounter among our growth path.

When I was a child, I was sensitive to spirit. I did not see spirits, nor did I hear voices, but I was able to see the past, present and future conditions around those I would meet for the first time. At times I was as frightened as my attentive audience. This was not an ability for a child to display, especially in a generation during which children were to be seen and not heard! My parents didn't understand it and neither did I. I did not know what power was using me as its instrument.

With the passing of time, the ability became more acute. It brought me invitations to parties. I sat for select scientific circles, and I occasionally worked with healing groups. All the time I was curious about this thing which was becoming sharper and more refined with usage. As my world expanded and society took on larger-than-life portions, I saw that Spiritualism wasn't widely accepted.

While this ability occupied much of my spare time, I had a living to make and had decided to become a writer. My career skyrocketed as if by a lucky star. In a short time, I gained immediate success and quickly racked up several best sellers to my credit. Success in the theater followed, and a few of my original stories were printed into films.

California and New York were common weekly stops.

I had money, position and fame. Although I worked night and day, I was happy. My success enabled me to search for answers and to satisfy the drive which had built up over the years since early childhood. The questions dealt with Spiritualism and the unresolved answers which years of wrestling had only enforced concern and wonder about. Such simple questions they were, for example, why did the world scorn it? Why were Spiritualists, at first, without first hand knowledge by their accusers, labeled as frauds?

I, too, had witnessed fraud, poor showmanship and church services which lacked genuine inspiration. However, neither of these conditions caused me to indict the individuals as a perfect example of all Spiritualists or Spiritualism.

Did a world too full of religions already have need of another one? What use was Spiritualism? How could it help people? Where was it taking me? How far would I go?

As if in reply to these questions, I began moving with a tide. I joined a Spiritualist society. I discovered a library with thousands of books on this subject which I had been looking for. Under the auspices of a teacher, I began doing automatic writing. I expected clear direction and a response. However, the results were never made clear to me.

I pushed hard to find the answers however, the extra effort began to show. Through overwork I cracked up. My career went to pieces -- a golden career with money, fame and position. Under compulsion, I gave up public life. For months, it seemed, my nights were one long battle with the pillow and sheets. Sleep proved as much of a struggle at night as life proved a struggle in the day. The combined effects applied heavy pressure on my already shattered nerves. My health fell abruptly, and I nearly died for nervousness and physical exhaustion. My recovery took forever. And then came the hardest battle of all -- the battle to regain a foothold again in the world of creative journalism.

I emerged slowly, as if from a dream. I felt sick inside. To think the thing I loved so much could hurt me so deeply. Yet, deep in my soul, I knew that what had happened was a result of physical overwork -- no play, no relaxation. Still, I attached pain to the thing I loved so much. Some day, though, I knew that I would find something to tie all the pieces together. Perhaps then I would be able to tell others before they faced similar crises.

For the present, I had to face reality, and reality told me that in the *now* I was a failure. My work, good though it was, no longer made the best seller list. Hollywood no longer wanted my work. I saw the summer waning for the bright young butterfly that had started out so gaily and set its goal so high.

The extrovert in me ran for cover. My personality switched, and I carried around the typical mannerisms of an introvert. My personal life suffered and I became very lonely. But I did not know what loneliness was until I lost my little dog by the name of Hobo. That little rascal had been a true godsend. Without my little friend, I began to understand what real loneliness was. So small and yet so important he had been to me.

His death struck the hardest blow. Yet! I did not care to live after the accident. I had no heart for work. I had nothing more to pen, especially to a public which I felt had deserted me in the time of my greatest need. Frankly, I no longer was able to be decisive about what to write. In the trade language of my profession, I was all burned out.

The walls of my apartment closed ever closer each night until -- the silence was interrupted one night by a visitor. Yes, you've guessed it. Hobo had come to comfort me. Through this manifestation, I was given the will and faith to go on. I was inspired to write again. I knew that I was going to be happy at last.

Soon a young man by the name of Johnny came into my life.

Our relationship moved quickly. We were both happy. Soon the date was set. My life was filled again. I just knew that I was going to be happy at last. The questions which had started my downfall no longer mattered. But! It happened again. And Johnny went away. Hobo went away too! The door closed and there was no one -- no little rascal to open it again. At least this was what I thought.

However, my Johnny did come back. And it was Hobo who brought him up the flight of stairs leading to my apartment. First, it was just the two of them. Then there were others. Always it was the same. They would tell me that they were not dead. That they were all alive on the other side of life. Perhaps more alive than we.

From that first time when Johnny and Hobo came, my outlook changed. I didn't have to depend on automatic writing. I was not frightened. The events didn't shatter my life. I didn't cry. Instead, I was happy, uplifted, and inspired at each new visit. I became more of the old person -- challenged and challenging.

In the months that followed, I met Johnny's new friends -- Americans, Russians and Germans. They were all working together. When I asked, each told me of his transition and new existence. They were delighted to speak about their new world. But it was Johnny who made me promise that I would write a story that was happy, not sad. Uplifting, not depressing. Packed with people, not ghosts!

As I worked, somehow I found myself back in the beginning -- asking the question I had asked so long ago. "Why does the world think ill of Spiritualists? What is wrong with Spiritualism?" Each night when I said my prayers, I would ask God to give me a clue.

"Yes, what is wrong with Spiritualism?", I demanded. And one night the answer came.

"If an error exists, it exists in the platform of

the creed. Why limit a religion to death or to communing with the dead? Spiritualism should be a way of life. Why not preach life instead?"

When I write and need inspiration, I reach out to Spiritualism for an idea. An inventor, a dress designer, a doctor, a defense worker, all seek the source of spirit, whether knowingly or not. Spirit is in everything. It's not the dead that speak to us. Oh, in our terms of physical life and physical death, it is. But in fact, it's the life that's in them. It's the life in everything. Spirit is all there is.

When Spiritualism is viewed in this broader sense, it will take on a new concept. It will no longer be scorned and criticized. It will be welcomed by many -- for with *life* as its reward -- Spiritualism opens the way to prayer with real power.

And therein lies our answer. This is Spiritualism -- not the limited concept that has been often given it -- the pulpit shrouded in shadows for the faithful few -- with millions hungry for it and ready for it.

Spiritualism is life abundant. Life for me and life for you. That is our answer to the world. That is the story in my book, *Universal Station*, which



came to life with the help of spirit. It brought to life those who were seemingly dead.

Of course, we wish to speak to our loved ones. But there are horizons beyond. Brighter, broader and greener.

And when we take the world by the hand and lead those who have eyes, but do not see; ears, but do not hear; and voices, but do not speak, and walk them through the numbered steps to spirit -- Spiritualism comes out with new friends.

Actual Spiritualism

The public tends to lump all Spiritualists together. As we know there are many *kinds* of Spiritualists! Consequently, we must work to clear up inconsistencies.



Sometimes one may be led to wonder about Spiritualism. How much of it is pure Spiritualism and how much is spiritism? When it is accompanied by a notable amount of spiritual upliftment or contributes to the knowledge of the individual, it can be considered Spiritualism. Simply stated, Spiritualism relates to that which is spiritual or more finely evolved above material attributes. How many messages from the platform meet that criterion? Does the message often fall into an intermediate category with the subject being highly mundane?

Spiritism alone, or involved in a message, need not be detrimental in any respect; but it falls short of the high purpose of Spiritualism which is intended to encourage the spiritual progression of the individual. Merely being reminded that life after death does exist, is not the sum total of progression.

Progression pertains to being a better person by living a better life. This requires a better relationship with our fellow human beings. This is not easily accomplished. It not only requires great constant effort, but continuous reminding and guidance from spirit, as an incentive toward more actual Spiritualism.

There are so called *Spiritualists* who in addition to adhering to creedal religion, indulge in the claptrap of orthodox Christianity for its staging effect in an effort to attract those unable to reason beyond their inherited religion. They, however, find some sustenance in the thought that life does go on, and a fascination in the thought that *communication* is a possibility. They neglect to inquire into the relationship between spirit and the universe, or attempt to understand the application of natural law in their daily life.

This is not Spiritualism! It is more likely an application of spiritism to orthodox Christianity. It follows the prophecy of A. J. Davis that the orthodox establishment will seize upon the

demonstration of *life after death* as a matter of self-preservation without comprehending the nature and significance of spiritual progression.

Spiritualists can utilize the Bible to good purpose but Spiritualism is not based upon the Bible. It is independent of all material creation, in spite of the fact that many other distinct religions claimed to be based upon different writings inspired directly by a personal God.

Other so called Spiritualists insist on encompassing one or more borderline systems indulging in some limited form of spiritism without admitting to Spiritualism. These liasons do not contribute to the prestige of Spiritualism. They are confusing possible students who never get to learn the facts, because they eventually drift away from vagaries.

The early brilliant proponents of Spiritualism, most of whom lectured and wrote prolifically upon the subject, did not encumber it with any of these other sectisms. They were truly inspired and fully understood the significance of that which they proposed. It was Spiritualism pure and simple.

Spiritualists should not lose sight of this and attempt to appreciate what the pioneers have given us. Spiritualism can be added to by growth, but let us not dilute it with contradictory philosophies, some of which are merely opinions with a following!

Respect Among Men, Respect Among Nations

Every so often some nation has a severe attack of indigestion. The pains usually result from selfishness, intolerance and the desire for power. The nation's course remains locked at the helm as ministers struggle to turn chaos into stability.

It has happened so often that the World Bank and other major lending institutions find little difficulty in putting together basic guidelines designed to get the country on its feet again. But first, a comprehensive plan must be adopted by the ruling bodies. As is the case, various plans will be introduced, some tried and others discarded.

When the problems seem in God's hands, only then is the spiritual side taken into account. Here the relationship between all the great religions of the world find a counter-part in the destiny of nations. For when a man of spiritual discernment stands out from the crowd, a new religion cries out for attention among the people of the land.

In times of success and achievement the daily importance of religion falters, and the spiritual aspect of man's nature is neglected for the pursuit of happiness. You might say that religion experiences a series of cycles. Now, religion is engaged in a deadly encounter with the forces of materialism. Whether it will emerge victorious and shake off the shackles of prejudice, hypocrisy and racial intolerance remains uncertain. However, the world struggle is bringing the various religions into closer unity to fast remove doubts and fears that everlasting understanding among nations is possible.

In the early forties an association known as the National Conference of Jews and Christians, was formed for the purpose of doing away, so far as possible, with racial and religious prejudice, in order to present a solid front to the attacking forces of materialism. Astute leaders of these large religious bodies, so different in nature, now perceive that unity does not necessarily mean merging with or embracing the religion of another, but means rather an appreciation and understanding of the viewpoint of the other. The two have worked together in matters of civic reform, each denomination doing its part in order to eradicate conditions which it thought were detrimental to the welfare of the country.

Older than the National Conference of Jews and Christians and much broader in scope, since it takes in all religious systems, is the World

Fellowship of Faiths. The first Congress of this group was held over a period of six months, between June and November of 1933. It was unique in the history of religion, and was the reward of years of labor by Charles Frederick Weller, a social worker in America, and Kedarnath Das Gupta, a man of vision from India, who was firmly convinced that two of the greatest obstacles to world peace were religious intolerance and racial prejudice. Both men understood that if these two barriers could be removed, then, the people of the world would truly begin to link hands across the ocean, from nation to nation. It was a great achievement. There were representatives from every religious system in the world. Leading educators and men prominent in scientific fields also took part.

The official opening night of the convention, August 27, was one never to be forgotten. It was probably the first time in history that Hindu and Mohammedan, Shintoist and Buddhist, Jew and Christian as well as representatives from all other religious systems gathered under one roof. These men sat together. They shared the same platform, courteously listening while each representative explained the tenents of his religion and briefly told what, if thoroughly understood and practiced, it could do to bring about a solution of the world's ills and the establishment of peace. All in attendance agreed on one important point - all worshipped the same God and in a sense worked with the same purpose in view. It was in the tools and method in which they differed.

Like all great movements based on fundamental principles, the World Fellowship of Faiths had a small beginning.

In May of 1886, a group of Chicago high school students led by Charles Weller organized the Good Citizenship Fraternity, which expressed and practiced some of the ideals of interracial, inter-creedal and inter-class fellowship that grew to become the Congress of the World Fellowship of Faiths in 1933.

This fraternity functioned until World War I broke out, during which time Charles and others worked in the War Camp Community Service established by President Wilson. At the conclusion of conflict Charles again lifted the banner and began an effort that saw the League of Neighbors emerge. The purpose of the organization was to generate harmony and demonstrate appreciation among both American and foreign born citizens.

Other hands were also at work. In 1910, Das Gupta, an Indian from Bengal, organized the Union of the East and West in London. Its purpose was to develop cultural unity. In 1920, Das Gupta came to New York, where for the first time he met Charles Weller and joined forces with him. In 1924, the two men were able to unite the League of Neighbors and the Union the East and the West as one.

Since the Union of the East and West was working to promote cultural unity and the League of Neighbors was striving to bring about racial unity, it was inevitable that the question of religious or spiritual unity should arise. So many religions were represented that it became necessary to work out some plan whereby each would respect the opinions of the other, else the organization would fail and the work of years would have been in vain. Before respect would have to come exchanges of the religious doctrines and teachings. Step by step, the plans were laid by the two men.

The timing was perfect, as religious unity would strengthen both the cultural and racial unity. The first effort to be born from these two organizations was the Fellowship of Faiths. In 1928, the three movements were incorporated as the Three-Fold Movement - League of Neighbors, Union of East and West and the Fellowship of Faiths.

Many meetings were held between 1924 and 1929. The sites were London, New York City, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington and Chicago in Christian and Jewish temples.

At almost every preliminary meeting, representatives of Christianity, Judaism, Buddhism, Hinduism and Mohammedanism were present. These meetings were the testing ground for the eventual congress that lay in the future.

The object of the World Fellowship of Faiths, with headquarters in New York, Chicago, London and Bombay and councils in other world cities, continues to be to remove prejudice by bringing about mutual appreciation between the people of all creeds, climes and cultures. In fact, it is brotherhood, peace and progress which represent its goal!

Religion has always been interpreted man to man. Consequently, it has been colored by his spiritual insight at the time the message was received. There are no recorded instances where God proclaimed his message before a large audience when all could see and hear him. The message has always come through some inhabitant of the earth; not all at once, but little by little, as the chosen interpreter was able to give it.

It is significant that not all of the message has been received by the same race, but some portion has come through members of different races at different times. And the message has always breathed love.

Taking all these things into consideration it would seem that through the efforts of the National Conference of Jews and Christians and the World Fellowship of Faiths a better understanding of the message of spirit has been brought about. Certainly, when man can understand his neighbor and respect the other's point of view, even though the two may disagree, a better understanding of the meaning of unity has been attained. Unity is one of the important aspects of religious teaching.

Men make up races and when races recognize their relationship and need of each other, trust will begin to set solid roots.

William Butler Yeats, Poet and Medium

Born to the land of mystery and legend, where leprechauns and visions are as true to the mind as to the eye of the beholder, his eventual course was as set as the born mornin'.



It was a foggy morn
June 13, 1895, as this wee lad took his first breath
in Dublin, Ireland. In the years to follow he would
call Georgeville, 5 Sandyville Avenue his home.
Heredity gave him a touch of religion and his
homeland provided the setting which would later
be his destiny.

Father to son. That's the way it was in Ireland. William's paternal grandfather was the son of a rector of Drumcliffe, the curate in charge of the parish of Tullylush, County Down.

On September 10, 1863, his father to be, John Butler Yeats, took in marriage Susan Pollexfen of Sligo. The regal beauty of St. John's Church sparkled as family and friends witnessed the joy of two loved ones united in holy matrimony under the full protection of the church.

Grandfathers on both sides of the family took an active interest in little William and each added considerable wealth to his mind.

William Pollexfen settled in Sligo Harbor where he married a fine figure of a woman, Mrs. Middleton, who earlier had been widowed.

Long summers passed too quickly as the two, William and his maternal grandfather, raced the sun from dawn to dusk at Merville. It was a long and lasting relationship which continued when William Pollexfen retired to Rathedmond.

He also spent much time with his eccentric uncle, George Pollexfen. Shadowed by Knocknares, the mountain where Connaught's legendary warrior queen Maeve lies buried, the young lad tasted the first of many legends. According to Paddy Flynn, it was in a cabin at Ballisodare that his pen put to paper many of the old stories as they were told in the Celtic Twilight.

At Rosses Point, while attending to another lodge owned by this uncle, he first met Mary Battle. Through her he became initiated into the world of visions and omens.

Near the hotel which once stood at Rosses

Point was Elsinore, owned by his reclusive uncle, Henry Middleton. To this fellow went the fame of being included in one of William's poems. The familiar lines go:

My name is Henry Middleton
I have a small demene;
A small forgotten house that's set
On a storm bitten green.
I scrub its floors and make my bed
I cook and change my plate.
The post and garden boy alone
Have keys to my old gate
From mountain to mountain ride
The fierce horsemen.

His mother died in exile, but today there's a brass placque in St. John's to her memory.

A short time before his death, William went to Ethel Mannin to arrange his funeral. He asked to be buried in a small churchyard in County Sligo with the name and dates embellished by these words:

Cast a cold eye on life, on death.

He died at Cap Martin, in the south of France, January 1939. For sometime during the war years his body remained at Roquebrune but was later brought back to Sligo by the Irish government.

Yeats introduction to Spiritualism seems to have come from a woman friend, Maude Gonne. According to friends who kept daily records of such things, Maude told him of an apparition she witnessed in childhood of a woman dressed in a gray skirt with a gray veil over her face. These same records indicate that Maude could pass easily into a semi-trance.

Maude's answer to Yeat's question, "How many circles in heavenly habitation is eternity" was this: "He (her guide) is telling me that I am in hell, but that some day I will be able to enter three circles, though I cannot now".

He then showed her three circles: a garden, the circle of almost fulfilled desire; a place of eternal peace, which is very brief for every human soul; and a mountain with a winding road and a cross—the circle of divine love.

Yeats tried crystal gazing through the aid of a young doctor, who on one occasion visualized a priestess coming from a Greek temple to lead him into a room with only a throne. The door to this room trembled. At that point, Yeats reportedly

said, "Follow". The door opened into three rooms similar to this one. There, the doctor stood before an empty tomb, which born an inscription that was not legible.

When the doctor awoke, Yeats asked him what he had seen. "I remember nothing after a woman came from a temple to give me a cup of wine." The doctor interpreted the vision as death of the sovereign Queen Victoria, but Yeats believed it to be connected with an hysterical nurse he had recently met in a garden.

Yeats traveled to France where he met Mrs. Olivia Shakespeare, who is said to have given him further psychic information. Returning to Sligo, he spent six months with his uncle, George Pollexfen who had been improperly vaccinated for smallpox. As a result, Uncle George developed blood poisoning. On learning of the malady, Yeats hypnotized his uncle and asked him to observe the river flowing through the room sweeping the red disease away.

Yeats ordered Uncle George to banish the disease with the help of the Archangel Gabriel, who would control the waves of rushing, cleansing water. In the morning the family doctor returned to check his patient and found him in the best of health.

His cousin, Lucy Middleton, also demonstrated clairvoyance. She claimed to see an Anglo-Indian, a former George Pollexfen, a retired man of a century past.

After this visit, he returned to London, where he made the acquaintance of the poet, Ernest Henley. Henley, saddened by the grief of his daughter, Margaret's death, spoke of seeing her come in the room. "It was so real," he remarked, but yet he could not believe the vision.

Another kindred spirit was A. E. (George Russell) who after being introduced to Sir Horace Plunkett, became the leading agent in the Agriculture Organization Society. His spiralling success in this field, especially in the organization of banks, was phenomenal. He was essentially a poet and claimed to have visions.

On May 9, 1912, Yeats went to Cambridge House, Wimbledon, to attend a seance by Mrs. Etta Wriedt, a Detroit medium. Eight people attended, including Mrs. Adele Harper and Miss Edith Harper. The latter being the secretary to W. T. Stead. The group sat around the room with the usual trumpet in evidence. Yeats felt drops of moisture on his head and was told it was baptism. Then a loud voice came through the trumpet asking for Mr. Gates, alias Yeats. Yeats replied, "This is I". The voice went on to say, "I have been with you from childhood. We want to use your

hand and brain. You possess a key and are a keen mind. I, Leo, am a writer and explorer".

When Yeats said he did not know him, he added, "You will hear of me at Rome". He then disappeared. After his speech came another voice which Yeats could not understand. Then the voice was interrupted by a second speaker who told Yeats to sit up straight in his chair. He claims he was touched on the hand and saw a light in front of him in the shape of a sixpenny loaf.

This remarkable man represented the consciousness of an age just beginning to investigate mediumship. It is the man and the poet that we see -- the poet and the medium, bridging the gap between scholars and Spiritualism.







Quiz Corner

How soon after death can the departed spirit communicate with the earth plane?

The time varies greatly, according to the innumerable number of factors that make communication possible. It is a *trinity* of operation -- wherein each part must operate in unison with the other two:

- 1. Those on the earth plane must cooperate by providing the proper conditions, here, for reception.
- 2. The communicating entity must have a yearning to contact earth loved ones, and some knowledge regarding the process.
- 3. The band of spirit helpers must be competent to assist in this particular task.

There are times when persons who have gone on have no desire to contact those left behind, and the loved ones here have no desire to contact them. In such cases it would be a difficult transaction as the law of attraction would be weakened.

Persons going over as a result of sudden accidents, war, suicide, or lingering, painful physical or mental disorders have to rest for a period, until such time as the soul is adjusted to function through the etheric body, and memory, which they carried over with them, becomes clear and definite.

While on earth many hold obstinately, to the opinion that spirit communication is impossible. Until such views, through observation and spirit instruction on the *other side of life* are proven erroneous to them, no communication can be expected.

However, under normal conditions, where there is a reciprocal love tie, a desire to reach each other that suggests effort to thus experiment, and prejudice is absent -- communication can be established at any time after the pericord binding the physical and etheric bodies together, is severed.

Transitions

Beesley, Arthur S., age 64, Walled Lake, Michigan, passed to spirit as a result of injuries sustained in an auto accident July 24. Born in Canada, Mr. Beesley lived most of his life in Michigan. He was a member of the First Spiritual Temple, Royal Oak; President of the Michigan State Spiritualist Association of Churches for 17 years; and had also served as Trustee of the Association for several years prior to being elected President.

Then, truly, shall the doors between the two planes of life open more widely and every human being will realize the truth of life immortal and the naturalness of contact between this plane of life and the next.


The field is fertile and waiting! Let us not neglect the hour, for it too shall pass!

Flag theft angers writer


Editor,

N.S.A.C. By-Law Amendments

The following changes and additions were adopted at the convention held in Indianapolis, Ind., 1979.

ARTICLE IX, SECTIONS 9, 12, 13, 14, and 15, pages 30 through 32 were deleted. (Please note that Sections 14A and 14B remain as is.)

ARTICLE IX, SECTION 18, page 33: THIRD LINE, AFTER THE WORD, "CONSOLATION" INSERT COMA, and delete the words: "and spirit greetings - public or private".

ARTICLE VI, SECTION 1 through 5, pages 25 and 26, DELETE AND INSERT THE FOLLOWING:

SECTION 1. Auxiliaries, churches and societies chartered by the NSAC shall elect delegates and alternates to annual conventions of this association in a duly constituted meeting prior to the opening session of the annual convention. Properly executed credentials, furnished by the Secretary of the NSAC shall include the names of the elected delegate and alternate; the signatures of the President and Secretary, with the seal of said organization. Credentials shall be made out in duplicate, with one copy being retained by the delegate, the other copy to be mailed to the NSAC Secretary, at least twenty (20) days prior to opening session of the convention.

SECTION 2. No delegate shall represent more than one organization or have more than one vote.

SECTION 3. If and when a local society elects one of its members as delegate to the national convention, the state association having jurisdiction shall recognize and confirm the same.

PROXIES

SECTION 4. Auxiliaries unable to provide a delegate, and wishing to be represented, may appoint as proxy, any agreeable member in good standing from the organization of the NSAC up to twenty days prior to the opening day of the convention, when properly executed credential must be mailed to the National Secretary.

RESOLUTION: WHEREAS, Spiritualism is based upon mediumistic communication, and whereas, it is necessary and vital to the life and continued growth and success of our churches to have a sufficient number of mediums to serve the public:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that each auxiliary of the NSAC offer at least one class at all times for the development of mediumship.

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

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
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
