

### A Personal Concept of Religion

The Spiritualist concept of religion is a very personal opinion, equal to the strongest conviction founded on facts. Charlotte P. Gilman put it most appropriately, "A concept is stronger than a fact." Where there are no absolutes, no creeds, no dogmas, a concept becomes a personal alignment, in action, in belief. For religion is a way of life. By the most liberal definition, it can never be considered an institution, nor is it fair to call a religion, a church. The two words should not be used as synonyms and interchanged.

If we sift out all the useless traditions and wild, unfounded superstitions throughout the ages of man, we extract a few priceless gems everlasting in truth - the richest uranium ores contain less than one-quarter gram of radium per ton, one part radium to 3,400,000 parts uranium. A fact is not always a truth. As our capable researchers have shown, a truth may be cause enough to dedicate one's life, and that truth may rise above all physical values. To love God with all your heart and your neighbor as yourself is the grandest truth given to mankind. It heartily suggests that you do to others as you would have done to you!

Records claimed from antiquity trace sixteen crucified saviors recognized by various sects and races. The treasured Golden Rule cannot credit its origin to the existence of Jesus, Confucius, any particular sage or personage of the past. The teachings of Jesus and Confucius were for the most part the teachings of another. Both men spoke of love and respect. From the gleanings of history can be found many answers. But from our own time it is important that man acknowledges the Golden Rule and acts accordingly. The law of evolution does not direct one channel of thought at the expense of another. Change in the mental as well as the physical should automatically become a hard, fast rule. Man should progress in his religion, too. The heart and the soul count as much as the other faculties. In view of this probable and gradual change, it was only natural that man should have entertained crude religious ideas. The sun was a force he could feel. It was overhead. He could see it. It rose and then left. It moved across his sky, his limited view. And knowledge of this was common to all people he chanced to meet. These simple realities had to be conceived before devotion to higher objectives could fill his life.

The dress can be updated. The material

changed. The form of transportation altered. Man has learned to better his life and his understanding of many things. But this great error of the past which today shows an equaled growth and grasp in his religious evolution confines the normal progressive tendency to crude religious theories. Religion. Reality. Practicality. Knowledge. No. partnership exists. Truths born in darker times should not be allowed to shackle progression now. In the past, men of superior abilities and minds were often held high, occasionally in awe, at other times worshiped. Although a few links to this period of yesterday remains on the earth, the time of superstitious belief has lost most of its following. Broken mirrors, black cats, walks under ladders, all these remain to tickle the imagination. Some Eastern philosophies speak of alchemy, a gift from the past to the present. Rumors upon rumors do not of themselves make a statement a reality. Spiritualists are not easily swayed by nonsense. For within the confines of Spiritualism can be found a serious attempt to bridge the distance between the reality of the material world and the truth of our spiritual destiny. The clear, definitive guidelines observed in the laboratory are not present in its study and practice, but it is particularly interesting to note that no scientific postulation, founded on established fact, denies that beyond this bodily existence another more complex society waits. The lack of dogmas, creeds and absolute church decrees seem to block reasonable and sound growth, yet their very absence frees its practitioners from walking a predetermined path in a predetermined manner.

The sea of knowledge beckons, and those who manage to rise above earth bound limitations chance to observe greater knowledge still. Every religion was first born of man's single encounter with a force presumed to be from heaven. But the application and interpretation of that encounter perhaps, just a single encounter in a complete physical lifetime - then decreed the future worship of thousands. A truth is not responsive to time or place, only to man's ability to grasp that given unto him. It is thus immediately easy to understand why so many different opinions and versions are often quoted for the very same biblical reference. Language is by its very nature and application transit. It changes. New words speaking new thoughts. Old words holding new meanings. When viewed in this respect Spiritualism contains not the shackles found in so many religions. This

reality suggests the recall of a very old argument: can one who has read a truth, but not experienced it, be fit to instruct one of less knowledge in the course that lies open to the greater life. The Tibetans once thought not. Today the reach of the orthodox church suggests that mere book knowledge is not adequate. More and more practitioners are exploring, attempting to understand the course they are on. Each act, each form of dress used officially in church functions has, for its origin, the past. All religious ceremonies, even the various forms of religions, represent a modification of systems and religious ideas fostered hundreds of years before.


been intensively strengthened in the last twenty years. It suggests that more people will attempt to experience religion through a mental link. Religion was moved from the position of pure listenership, where a lecture and reading of the Bible sufficed. At a time when a miracle is more a question of scientific talent, money and the expenditure of research than a half-told truth, mankind, as a whole is searching for a foothold which will brace it for the next higher rung. The mental link represents that foothold. Spiritualism provides both the foothold and the reinforcing mental and physical proof that substance can and does exist beyond the human idea of physical life.

This tendency to venture more into the mental phase of worship has caused many students of the world's great religions to suggest that Spiritualism, whether by name or merely by its truths, will eventually surface as the one, major religion.

The definition most commonly attached to religion is that its a belief binding the spiritual nature of man to a supernatural being on whom man is conscious that he is dependent; also the practices that grow out of the recognition of such relations, including the personal life and experiences.

"Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world." James 1:27

Religion is not a superstition, mystery, formalism, a creed, but the springboard for the emotion of the soul to use in its climb toward the beautiful, the



true and the good. True religion leads us to observe a stricter degree of honesty in all our dealings with mankind. It causes us to search our hearts and make them clean and pure, free from selfish man, free from everything which can debase. In a sense, religion opens the doorway to the principles of Christ and directs our motives to higher levels that we may withstand evil temptations that beset our pathway through life. Progress in personal morality is possible for every human being. To aid in that progression is the simple aim of positive religion.

Work is an element in the development of our spirit, when done with fidelity and purity of purpose. Work is a joy, both for the doer and those for whom it is

done, when consecrated by brotherly love. Too often we find it a drudgery. Today, brotherly love is not a common denominator among workers.


You and I are architects, builders and decorators. Accordingly our work is beautiful or ugly. The result comes as we obey or disobey nature's physical and moral laws. Spiritualism seeks to make religion practical, and to show *all* the value of discovering and observing the moral and spiritual virtues of life. ### **Haunted Violin**

"Mysterious New England", published by Yankee, Inc., Dublin, N.H. Copyright 1971. "Haunted Violin" writted by Herb Arral.



Poltergeist performance has long been held as a matter of mystery, conjectural mystery. At this point the records amassed over centuries are not about to reveal the common secret which, somewhere, entwined, may exist in a weave common to every incident written. Instead, Arral's effort about the *Haunted Violin* merely adds another interesting entry into the record books. No clear answers are afforded. And only indirect suppositions are posed for the reader to glean conclusions in his or her own mind.

Read Mysterious New England as an adventure into the subject and avoid prefacing yourself on the correct definition of the word poltergeist. Preformed ideas will only betray the plot, if there is one, and plant your own thoughts as explanations to those of the author.

The story exemplifies an association with forces which Gordon Cudworth, the owner of the violin for over 20 years, could never reasonably explain nor accept.

The violin around which the story is based was made for a German king and required many painstaking hours of work.

It was constructed in 1769, and was composed of 365 separate inlaid pieces. The basic design, for the period, was traditional and represented excellent craftsmanship evidenced in the fine woods chosen.

Records remain vague as to whether the first owner experienced *the unusual*. For this, the story as written by Herb Arral unfolds while in the possession of Gordon Cudworth of Wareham, Mass., who prized the workmanship of the instrument above all in his private collection of fifty different instruments.

Activity supporting the possibility of the violin being *possessed* by a poltergeist began when its owner first played *The Broken Melody*, a musical selection written by the well known cellist, Van

Briene. As the instrument was being played Cudworth recalled hearing a strange rumbling noise. It continued until its point of origin, the kitchen sink, was clearly established.

The sound caught Cudworth's attention and caused him to lift his bow from the instrument. As if on cue, the rumble ceased. Again, he drew the bow across the violin and again the disturbance grew louder. Seeing no connection or reason for the coincidence he concluded his efforts for the evening and retired. Two weeks later he was invited to perform in a concert. His selection for his part was again, *The Broken Melody*. As he had yet to complete the piece on his favorite violin, he decided to practice and, of course, tune the instrument to its designed perfection.

At the first stroke the disturbance sprang anew. This time from the upper apartments of the house. His mother remarked about the noise this time. (This removed any chance of it being solely his imagination.) As she investigated the sound faded. Unbeknownst to her, her son had stopped fiddling. Since the family cat was not in evidence at that time the two assigned the strange sound to her. However, within minutes and while her son was still playing, the cat was found reposing quietly behind the kitchen stove - a good distance from the sink!

A few months later he once again took the violin in hand for a different selection. If something occurred he was oblivious to all but the musical notes which embraced the room and filled his ears. Suddenly he noted the latch on the door rattling. As he investigated, he found nothing to cause this rattle.

Cudworth then left the room and descended the stairway to another part of the house. His exit was followed by the closing of the door to the room he had just left. It slammed shut! No other sound or occurrence was noted.

The strange sounds usually coincided with the playing of *The Broken Melody*, just as the occurrence late one evening when he had finished the selection and was preparing for bed. The latch on his bedroom door jerked open and moved freely up and down as if someone were struggling at the door. He thought that perhaps someone was in need of help but unable to open the door. But when he opened the door no one was present.

Only a few of the many occurrences assigned to the melody or the violin were mentioned by Herb Arral.

Two other incidents are worthy of note. Each concerned activities which could be associated with the melody.

After giving lessons to one of his budding violinists the strange happenings again resumed. Both he and Cudworth commented about the incident.

"As I played, both of us heard the front door open and close several times. Each succeeding time was louder and more forceful."

The parent, who had requested Cudworth to play The Broken Melody, became very annoyed at the constant interruption. He climbed to the top of the stairs and called to his violinist daughter to stop slamming the door. But his words proved to be of no avail as the slamming continued throughout the song. It was later verified that the child had left the house immediately after the lesson.

This was the last time Cudworth remembered anything strange coinciding with the use of the

violin - until five years later. In Rochester, Massachusetts, Cudworth executed this same selection at the request of a local resident. The performance was excellent as always, except he was not asked for an encore. His guest said she felt "funny" while the melody was played.

While visiting friends in Mattapoisett, Massachusetts, he once again took his violin in hand for this particular musical selection. The result was near panic as pictures mounted in the same room swayed to and fro. The motion continued. The guest begged Cudworth to stop playing. He did and at the same precise moment the pictures ceased moving.

Whether or not Cudworth ever conceded that the violin was possessed may never be known. But according to the book, Gordon Cudworth had allowed the violin to rest unused, though it remained in near perfect condition.

Was it a poltergeist? Read this interesting and inquiring book and decide for yourself.

### Reins Change at Camp Wonewoc

An old and true friend will be missing when the Wisconsin camp opens this summer. Doc is no longer president. A long partnership concluded. Dr. L. E. Kress, 84, a guiding shepherd long familiar to the many who yearly trekked to this spiritual acreage, will be sidelined as an onlooker while new hands assume the reins.

When the rains and high water necessitated more gravel, he was there. Shovel in hand laboring beside the youngest worker. When more wood was needed to fuel the wood burning stoves, he was there swinging an ax. Tall and lanky. His hair as white as snow. An able worker. A willing friend. To many over the years he was just Doc. Always friendly. Steadfast and loyal. A Mason. A retired dentist. Doc can recall some of the pioneers who have passed through these grounds - the 35 acres of land first started under the banner of Spiritualism in 1874 by a local school teacher, Jerome Potter.

A few people became good friends, others just acquaintances to he and wife, Rose Kress, who may have been forgotten by some. It's this partnership which ends with this opening season. During her long and colorful career, Rose Kress ran the camp with an iron hand. Memory reminds me how softly she spoke. But every word was said with confidence. In 1925, she turned in her Roman

Catholic cross to serve Spiritualism. For many years she was the strong, driving arm which kept the camp growing, prospering.

But 1980 ushers in new ideas and a new command. It's sad in a very vital way, for an era has ended, a partnership concluded; yet, new opportunities await.

The man to assume the reins will be Lawrence Joseph Dentici. Beside being president of Camp Wonewoc, he is board president and pastor of the First Psychic Science Church at 6228 West Washington Street, West Allis, Wisconsin. His wife, Patricia, continues as the treasurer. The second vice president of the camp is also from his church, Norbert Lee Miller. The first vice president of the camp, Brian McCotter, was within his term of office, but resigned at the August business session. He subsequently nominated Rev. Joseph Sax, National Spiritualist Association of Churches trustee and secretary of Morris Pratt Institute to the post. Rev. Sax was thus elected.

The new team will have a difficult task ahead if they are to match the financial growth which Camp Wonewoc saw under the hands of Doc and Rose Kress. Inflation, and high gasoline prices tightens the grip a little more. In reflecting, we wonder if Doc Kress isn't a little glad he will not be held accountable for another prosperous season.

Dear friend:

I have often tried to come to you, but you were too strong and positive in the material for me to overcome your influence. #### Massachusetts State Association Extends Healing Reach

An idea was born in 1977. The Federation which stands today was the brainchild of State Trustee Joseph Chorney, who, three years ago, proposed the creation of a special federation, chartered as a state affiliate, to serve as the central core of a healing organization that, eventually, would reach throughout Massachusetts. Rev. Gladys Worsencroft, President of the State Association, acted with dispatch following this proposal. She immediately appointed a chairman and the Federation became fact.

The first official action to reach beyond the organization was to notify the Board of Registration and Discipline of Medicine of the State of Massachusetts. Every discipline of the act of spirit healing approved by the Federation was detailed to the state agency. Its response established communication between the two. The agency advised that the practice of medicine is the diagnosis, treatment, correction, prescribing,

injuries, ailments or infirmities, be they physical or mental, by any means, methods, devices or instrumentalities or the attempt, or holding oneself out as being able to do so. A further explanation was forwarded: "By spirit healing we mean a healing that is brought about by a none human agency. We define a healer as a person who is used as a human operative and who may also have an inherent ability to heal. Healing is the incoming of spirit powers through the body of the healer, transmitting curative and stimulating fluids and energies to the patient. To accomplish this the healer simply uses the lying on of hands and prayer through attunement."

The agency's reply, "as long as the healers do not diagnose, prescribe or promise any betterment or cures, the Federation is welcome to heal anywhere in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts," has remained our unwritten rule.

Since the inception of the Federation, requests have grown in number. Over 800 have been added to the list. These results are obviously both

encouraging and rewarding. In March alone, 150 names were placed on the list.

The Federation is presently at work on a brochure which will contain valuable information benefiting those workers seeking National Spiritualist Association of Churches (N.S.A.C.) certification. The brochures will be free and offered to better the results on final examinations and interest more people in pursuing the healing art. These only serve to supplement the N.S.A.C. Healing Mini-Course, not replace it. Those interested in receiving a copy of the brochure should direct their letters to Robert Miller, 27 Berkeley Street, Reading, MA, 01867. Be sure and enclose your name and address, along with 50 cents to cover mailing cost.

The purpose of the Federation of Spiritual Healers is to bring healers together, to promote the art of healing for the benefit of all, to encourage all who wish to serve their fellowman and to join with us in this noble purpose. The Federation welcomes aspiring healers and will assist them towards certification whenever possible. Most of all, the Federation exists to further dignify the healing art in every way, through action, word and deed.

The progress of patients is reported at least five times a year. Each church within the State Association has an appointed representative who works directly with members of the Federation. This direct line of communication was a decision made early in the development of the organization to provide immediate access to the Board which reaches throughout the state through its many

practicing healers. In all, there are nine churches with over 70 Federation members. When a healing request arrives, the chairman or secretary of the Federation contacts the area representative. In this duty, Federation healers have attended patients in many homes and hospitals around the state. As the Federation grows its reach will serve many of our fellowmen, and encourage others to develop the healing touch with which they have been graced.

Each month the healing list is revised. Together, the Federation and its members, open the doors for each other, sharing what we learn. And in this way we provide our healers with information which helps make them more aware, in turn, making all better instruments for spirit.

We invite you to join with us in our project which is simply to bring love and harmony to our brothers, whatever their need; to dedicate ourselves to the wonderful task of doing the work of spirit.



### What Do You Think?

Our new series of articles will take a different approach. Rather than asking you a question and giving you a specific researched fact, we will be asking "What Do You Think?" Again, we will present researched information



on the religion, science, and philosophy of Spiritualism and then ask you to do your part - Think! Feel free to research the subject and compile your findings. Send your response to "What Do You Think?" in care of "The National Spiritualist" office.

Is this a truth? Today, in 1980, the how and why of the beginning of the universe is still a mystery. No one knows the exact how and why. In Herbert Spencer's writings, he says there are three possible explanations of our beginning. First, the universe was self-existent or it has always been and it is independent of any cause; second, it was self-created (perhaps the big bang theory of the 1970's) and third, it was created by an external agency.

As time has gone on, the scientist, the orthodox Christian and the Spiritualist have each had their own understanding. The scientist still states the universe was to a degree self-existent although some are now looking to a power or source to reconcile that existence with a continuity of being. Basically, science does not see the need for a cause for it assumes it has always been. It is explained that there is matter and that is the essence of what every physical object is composed. Matter has always existed and always will. It is indestructible. Secondly, science recognizes a force, a power that strongly affects the physical conditions of matter or we can say matter is subject to motion. Motion is also indestructible. And further, the earth being cast off from the sun through the ages has given the capability of giving birth to forms of life down throughout the evolution of man. This is a materialistic approach to the beginning.

Meantime, the orthodox Christian states, "God

Genesis it tells you so." But ask then who is God? It is a difficult question to answer for to all men God is different in perception. To the orthodox, God is the supreme ruler of the universe. Jesus taught, "God is Spirit and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and truth." Further, they teach as John wrote, "In the beginning was the word, and the word was with God and the word was God." All things were made by him and without him nothing was made."

These teachings are based on assumptions. And, they must be accepted by faith for they cannot be proven. And though the Bible states all the powers of the earth and of God are given to his creation, it states explicitly man was given the dominion over all intelligence lower than himself. However, he was not given dominion over the Universe, for the natural law was established to so govern.

The Spiritualist's understanding of God teaches we continue to investigate, analyze, and classify facts. We agree with the scientist that the elements of the Universe always existed in some state - call it matter if you choose. But we do not believe that something can come from nothing. We do accept the scientific theory of matter and force. However, we go one step further. To this, we add the third basic element of Spirit. Since we recognize the existence of the spiritual element, the ego, it follows logically that the same must be in all of nature for we are a child of nature and that which is in the parent is in the child.

Spiritualists accept the three basic elements of the universe - matter, force and spirit - all three being indestructible. They are the trinity of elements and are interrelated. Spirit is that something which contains the attributes of consciousness or feeling, awareness, as well as thought, reason and will. Spirit is God, the universal power, without form, shape, impersonal and omnipotent and omnipresent.

Thus, if matter, force and spirit are indestructible, life goes on!

### Views Of Our Heavenly Home

Foreword

In "Views Of Our Heavenly Home" Andrew Jackson Davis attempts to give us at least some conception of the Great Universelum as he names the greater overall Universe. If it would



seem to tax our imagination, he as much as says, "so be it!" To quote him: "Such contemplations are wholesome, invigorating, ennobling, exalting; and you are therefore urged, because you are a spirit, and because you are destined to live an eternal life, to think upon and familiarize your reason with questions of eternity."

#### Part II

There is a general correspondence between man and the earth. This carries over into the Spirit World. However the Second Sphere is not a mere repetition of this earth. The Spirit World is superior in every respect. Evolution and progression are according to natural law.

Davis tries to make us see something of the vast universe. Our sun together with our earth is a member of the sixth circle of suns which composes what we know as the Milky Way. Thus strange as it seems, we are a part of that distant Milky Way, most of which we cannot see. Numberless constellations compose the sixth circle of suns.

Vast as is the Milky Way with its belt of suns and planets, Davis says the Second Sphere is centered in it as an endless tremendously broad band. (Remember we are already a part of this Milky Way.)

The earth like other planets is a great chemical laboratory. Particles of energy are constantly thrown off perpendicularly to the earth's surface to join a stream of magnetic current several miles above the earth's surface and flowing to a great electrical vortex at the North Pole. At this point it is repolarized and flows at a higher altitude in a reverse direction as a tremendous belt of celestial magnetism completely enveloping the earth. At the South Pole this celestial magnetism intertwines and swings off as great celestial rivers of magnetism

flowing to the Second Sphere and acting as a celestial highway. Between these rivers a central magnetic stream returns to earth carrying vital spiritual energy.

Strangely these rivers possess enough elasticity to flow out of the way of any approaching planetary body according to magnetic repulsion and return by attraction to their natural courses without loss of continuity. Though these rivers are natural paths of communication, spirit is not restricted to them when the power of will is applied.

The spiritual is in all that is natural as the soul is within the corporeal body. When the body dies the individual naturally enters, sooner or later, his appropriate place in the Summerland. In realizing the magnitude of the great cosmos it can appropriately give us a feeling of humility even to the extent of futility, but we should never lose sight of the fact that the individual commands his place in the sun to rise ever higher.

Davis accords the early Greek philosophers Pythagoras and Plato high honors for their advanced teachings. He quotes Pythagoras: "The music of the spheres can be heard by abstaining from the food of animals; by bodily purity; by meditations; and by presenting to the elements the internal faculties of mind."

Knowledge of the universe came slowly to man. Copernicus introduced the idea that the sun and not the earth was the center around which all bodies in the heavens were harmoniously revolving. Bruno was burned at the stake by the Christian Church for suggesting that other planets might be inhabitable. Galileo was put in a dungeon by the Christian Church for saying that the earth moves. Kepler discovered the eliptical orbits of planets. These and other scientists made their contributions in spite of stern opposition by the Christian Church which cannot suffer progress.

Nature is consistent. There are seven spheres within seven circles of suns and only seven true notes of music determined by the spheres. The eighth note being a repetition of the first an octave apart and all other notes are merely in a different octave. There is a parallel of harmony with the beauty of music and the performance of the universe.

With individual solar systems like our sun and it's planets the nearest planets to the parent sun are the newest and the least developed. The more distant are more developed and refined. For

instance Mercury is more crude than earth while

Jupiter is more refined than earth.

With the rings of suns it is different. Those nearest the great central sun are oldest and most refined. The outermost, as is the sixth ring of which our sun is a member, are newest and the least developed, because beyond the sixth ring is the great sea of comets and uncongealed energized substances from which suns are made.

Davis says a luminiferous ether floods infinite space. It is within and without all things. He names it "the Spirit of God." He illustrates magnitude

with a parable.

Our sun and mother of our earth has decided to take her whole family of planetary progeny on an eliptical journey to see the royal magnificence of their grandmother star Alcyon. They are in no hurry traveling comfortably together at twenty thousand miles per hour, so it will take them over eighteen million years to get there. (Our planet earth has it's orbit about the sun and at the same time is traveling along with the sun and other planets on another vast orbit of a greater sun.)

Someone once expressed to me the wonder that there was enough room in the Spirit World for all the millions of spirits who have departed the earth. Would they not need to get rid of some by sending them back to earth? (Not really a bad question.)

Davis has answered this question indirectly by revealing the infinite vastness of the universe with unlimited space for expansion of the Spirit World which is not affected by the size of our earth or the number of it's inhabitants.

He prophesied that the moon upon becoming more mature will triple it's rate of rotation and eventually become a small planet with life on it. Meantime there are the makings of another moon in the outer atmosphere.

We now realize that the star-filled heavens are not a conglomeration of planetary ornaments but a perfected system stupendous in magnitude. We begin to think that this whole thing is bigger than we had any idea of. Even with that our imagination is too meager to encompass it all. We must not forget that there is an omnipresent spiritual aspect along with the natural.

Davis says that man travels more than a million and one-half miles every twenty-four hours as the earth moves through space and yet he is unaware of it. (There are many other facts that man is unaware of.)

### Role Of The Torchbearer

Strange is it not that throughout the passage of time it has been mystics who have drawn their civilized societies to wake. The remembrance of what they have been and their accomplishments remained enshrined in the memory of humanity. The price they have paid for this service, however, has always been misunderstanding, misinterpretation, and persecution.

Progress seems to have been by way of self-sacrifice -- even of reputation as conceived by the worldly wise. Only the brave, the unselfish, the far-sighted can bear the torch. Comfort and security are the graveyards of the soul. Life and progress are synonymous for struggle, building and suffering -- but this way lies immortality and the salvation of the human race.

The foolish person is satirized by H. Spencer Lewis in the following quote, "tries logically to ignore the phenomenal facts of life, simply because he personally cannot learn a theory that explains them." To the same degree one may claim that electricity does not exist because its source and its nature may not be known in the phenomenal world. The frog at the bottom of the well thinks that there is only four feet of sky, as that is all that it can see. A person who is not informed about a subject really has no right to speak authoritatively about it. Yet, all down through the ages those who have never seen a disembodied person, received a premonition or dream that has come true, or experienced any spiritualistic phenomena whatever, are the most inclined to consider themselves authorities on the subject -- to decry, misinterpret and ridicule those whose experience has demonstrated these facts.

Hostility to truth or to the torch-bearers of truth in all generations has not limited itself to the things of the spirit. There has been practically no advancement in science in any form, that has not been achieved in spite of the persecution, imprisonment, and often the death of its torch-bearers, even before the time of Galileo to the time of Edison and Henry Ford.

Those persecuted for spiritual truths have the honor of being in the most illustrious company of the universe, the real servants of humanity that keep mankind from reverting, not only to sub-human but sub-animal existence.

What if the torch-bearers should suddenly leave

the world, while man continues to forge the instruments of his own undoing: Man, frivolous, greedy, and wrapped up in his own personal interest -- apart from spiritual truth, spiritual experience and conduct -- would soon annihilate himself!

The things of the spirit are so convincing and demanding in their effect upon man that if he finds them interfering with the type of life he wishes to lead, he conceives of no other way of dispending with those who bring new truths than by persecution, removal or death.

Galileo, the inventor of the thermometer, the telescope, among many other things of benefit to humanity, was forced to bow to triumphant stupidity, and scarcely escaped with his life only to spend his last days sightless in a prison cell. Other benefactors of humanity, Gutenberg, the inventor of printing; Palissy, the founder of paleontology and ceramics; Jenner, the discoverer of vaccine; Harvey, the first to realize the value of experimental physiology -- all had their lives poisoned by persecutions, law suits, ridicule and poverty. Michael Servet, who without influence or teaching, gained the knowledge displayed by the circulation system and the heart, was burnt at the stake. Savonarola also died at the stake and so did the admirable John Huss -- both having the courage to preach pure morality to a corrupt generation. Lavoisier, the sole founder of perhaps two of the most beneficial sciences known to humanity, chemistry and physiology, was guillotined in the market place of Paris.

Denis Papin saw his steamboat torn to pieces. Descartes, who like Socrates, dared to talk of the rights of human reason, had to flee from his country and died abroad. Spinoza, a great and bold thinker regarding spiritual things, fell victim to cruel persecution. The most gifted of the French writers, Victor Hugo, lived twenty years in exile. The sublime Spanish author Cervantes, spent half of his life in the galleys and in prison, and Moliere was buried in a paupers grave. Voltaire, Pellico and Michizwicz suffered exile and imprisonment. Demosthenes and Cicero, perhaps the greatest orators of the time, were assassinated. Socrates, who said that man must know himself and should follow no rule of conduct but conscience; who openly listened to the wisdom of his spirit guide, was condemned to death, as was Aristophanes.

Even Christopher Columbus alone against the world bore the torch of a great idea, equipped with a few wretched boats, dared forth into unknown seas, clinging desperately, obstinately to his great idea. At last he reached land; a New World was won for the Old, but on his return to Europe his sole reward was to be chained and thrown into prison and threatened with death. He escaped torture only to die in poverty and exile, abused, slandered and betrayed.

Within the early part of this century we have recorded numerous instances of the persecutions of torch-bearers -- from scientific and spiritual corners

alike.

Edison, who gave us the electric light, phonograph and radio among six hundred other inventions was ridiculed and called "that insane fellow who is fiddling around with a lighted hairpin in a bottle." This genius was once quoted as the author of a statement which seems perfectly suited to the Spiritualist view of the impossible, "They are waiting to give us these things over there." Since most of his ideas were credited as coming to him as he slept, it is reasonable to presume that his comments may have concerned an industrious group of spirits who were anxiously striving to assist his ever active mind.

The Wright Brothers constant preoccupation with their contraption called the aeroplane

identified them as insane fools.

Inventor and religionist Henry Ford faced equally harassing obstacles. The assembly line technique was easily bounded in contract to the one he had to mount when his firm tried to introduce a new type of engine. Ford required heavy financing and thought that he could find support among the bears of Wall Street. History, apparently, doesn't record those he approached for funds as too friendly toward his new project.

When a torch-bearer sways from the traditional path, the persecution often is of the most drastic kind. The knowledge of such truth poisoned Socrates, slew the prophets, beheaded John the Baptist, and stoned and crucified Jesus - the tender

mystic soul who had pity on all sufferers.

But roughly handled also are the modern mystics, who have clairvoyant, clairaudient and prophetic powers. Even the little children who possessed psychic and spiritual abilities were maltreated even before the time of Joan of Arc whose voices caused her to be burned at the stake, and beyond the time of the persecutions of the little Shaker children, in 1837, who fell down in trances and prophesied coming events. There were the Fox sisters who demonstrated survival

unmistakably through knowledge obtained from the discarnate.

At the age of seven, Cora L. V. Scott (Richmond) delivered trance lectures to large audiences. Under trance her abilities were such that she could hold any sincerely interested group spellbound. The information relayed through her trance sessions was often of the highest intellect. The Davenport boys demonstrated materialization while in trance. Their phenomenal strength was put to the test when a college professor, who had securely bound the boys, found himself being bound with the very same ropes. The boys remained stationary all the time. At the end of the test the boys were freed and the professor tied up.

Older torch-bearers also suffered persecution. Those who elected to stand up for their cause and attest to their belief in survival of the soul after death had to accept the price for their faith. Spiritual gifts of communication with the discarnate, healing, clairvoyance, clairaudience, astral projection, materialization and prophecy were not always to be treasured. Few, in fact,

would envy an outcast.

Yet many giants of the time were attracted to Spiritualism and to the investigation of psychic phenomena. Sir William Crookes, foremost chemist of the world, for over two years experimented with Katie King, a disembodied spirit under test condition, in his own laboratory. Other noted personalities attracted to Spiritualism include, Professor William James of Harvard; Dr. James Hyslop, once head of the Logic and Ethics Committee at Columbia University; Sir Oliver Lodge, foremost authority on the ether; Alfred Russel Wallace, great naturalist; Andrew Lang, the great anthropologist; Camille Flammarion, the great astronomer; Dr. Pio Foa, professor at the University of Turin; and, Dr. Zolner, professor of Physical Astronomy. Dr. Alexis Carrel, Nobel Prize winner, attested to witnessing and investigating many instances of healing. In his book Man, the Unknown Dr. Carrel wrote favorably of clairvoyance, clairaudience and astral projection. All of these true seekers experienced the very personal pain of being shunned or black-balled by their peers. Those who ventured forth often faced the prospect of being "unemployed." There was a time when a devout Spiritualist could not find employment outside of the Church.

#### For The Betterment of Mankind!

The world of spirit is not always taken in the same accord as it is given.

The cure for pyorrhoea was given from the

other side of life. A dentist who had witnessed the healing of the gums by a spirit given prescription decided to apply the same treatment to several of his patients who where suffering the loss of their teeth. The treatment worked perfectly, in every case. His work continued without criticism until

other dental associates learned of how the information had been obtained. The choice was then presented to him bluntly. Either he abandon the treatment or face censure by his peers.


Torch-bearers have always had to stand firm and bear the slings and arrows of prejudice.


I suppose most religionists, of whatever name and denomination, have a kind of faith in survival, continuity and

### Gems by Clyde

### Garlic, Nature's Other Wonder Drug

Garlic perles possess a fantastic healing essence. Many cite it as their sole means to reduce tendency toward high blood pressure. This little bulb demonstrates remarkable antiseptic properties and has proven highly effective in treating intestinal and arterial diseases.

The curative powers of garlic were known to the Babylonians 3,000 years ago. During the height of the Egyptian empire, two million dollars were spent for garlic to feed the workers constructing the great Cheops pyramid. Those intrepid adventurers of the sea, the Vikings and Phoenicians, considered garlic an essential item in their sea packs before starting a long voyage. Greek physicians, who some credit as fathers of present day medicine, advocated the use of garlic regularly. Archaeological digs have resulted in several documented prescriptions involving heavy usages of garlic.

For these reasons it is often considered one of nature's wonder gifts to mankind. Since the Babylonians first discovered its potential to heal, garlic has found its way into many cultures, been widely accepted by the more bizarre health freaks which populate the nation and it has been the subject of severe scientific study in the laboratory.

Over its long use, it has been cited by the Egyptians, the Chinese, the Greeks and the Babylonians as the one ingredient capable of curing intestinal disorders, flatulence, infections common to the respiratory system, tape worms, lice, skin diseases and ulcers. It is not surprising to find that among the less scientific members of our society a few have crowned it with the ability to slow down the aging process. This aspect is probably due to its power to help in reducing high blood pressure, which, of itself is a barometer indicative of the years of human life remaining.

Why it worked remained a mystery until the bulb was taken into the laboratory and studied thoroughly. One Russian investigator who devoted much time to the study of garlic marketed garlic oil which bore the nickname, Russian Penicillin.

The little evil smelling bulb has been widely accepted by the medical profession, even though its ability to perform wonders placed those who advocated its use in the same general category as unschooled practitioners who applied age-old folk medicine to every ache and pain.

Its main power rests in its effect upon certain germs. A series of experiments conducted in the early forties by Emil Weiss, M.D., of Chicago,

began to isolate the areas in which garlic was effective. Twenty-two subjects with known histories of intestinal disorders were carefully studied for several weeks. The group was then divided into two classes. One received no medication. It became the control group. The other group of eleven were given daily doses of garlic. Daily specimens were collected from both. The control group showed no signs of change during the period in which garlic was administered to the active group. They fared far better, Headaches, mild diarrhea and other symptoms which were attributed to intestinal disorders gradually disappeared during the garlic treatment. This in itself was significant, but the daily analysis of samples taken clearly showed changes in the intestinal flora of the treated group.

The human body is alive with active bacteria. In the intestinal tract these are termed flora and can be extremely healthful to proper digestion. Bacteria are also found in the mouth. (In recent years several dairy firms around the country have begun to offer acidophilus milk. These particular bacteria help eliminate foul smells which many people weaken through the use of mouth washes and other lotions.) Not all the bacteria are helpful. Some contribute to conditions of putrefaction and eventually ill health. The decrease in the harmful bacteria suggested a strong correlation between their uncontrolled growth and intestinal disorders and resulting problems. In like manner it has been found that extracts of garlic and onions are highly effective against a number of insects.

The power of garlic to control certain types of bacteria was carefully studied by T. D. Yanovitch of the USSR. His work was published in the Comptes Rendus de l'Academie des Sciences de l'USSR, 1945, Vol. XLVIII, No. 7. He introduced live strains of bacteria into garlic juice. Complete cessation of all movement occurred within three minutes, according to the report. When he applied garlic juice to cultures, the bacteria dispersed to the outer edge of the container. In two minutes ineffective bacteria became evident and within 10 minutes all activity ceased. He noted that the effectiveness and speed with which the extract caused complete cessation depended upon the freshness of the juice.

Considerable research has been accumulated on the use of garlic and garlic juice for the treatment of hypertension (high blood pressure). However, because society has spawned so many probable causes of this condition it has been extremely difficult to completely isolate each associated problem and say that organic disorders are solely responsible. This in turn questions the ability of

garlic to completely arrest hypertension.

In the July issue of Praxis, 1948, G. Piotrowski, a member of the faculty of medicine at the University of Geneva stated that garlic was generally effective in reducing high blood pressure in the 100 patients treated under his direction. Two schools of thought exist as to how this is achieved. Some researchers contend that the effective antiseptic action of garlic on the bacteria in the intestinal tract assists the body's natural defenses in removing poisonous substances and lowers the blood pressure as a side effect. Dr. Piotrowski supports direct action as the principal reason. According to the publication, his research could find no reason for a reduction in the blood pressure through a cleansing of the intestines. Dr. Piotrowski said that he felt that garlic dilated the

blood vessels, and that this result reduced the blood pressure.

Researchers have credited garlic with trace amounts of vitamins A, B and C, as well as manganese, copper, zinc, sulfur, iron and calcium.

The magic of garlic's curing power has in a sense made it more appealing than penicillin. And not only because of the price and ease in obtaining it.

Over the years it has been considered a definite aid to digestion, as it stimulates production of the gastric juices. It serves as a carminative, relieving flatulence, dyspepsia and colic. Garlic is a proven intestinal antiseptic and has been used with some success in infectious diseases such as diptheria, scarlet fever and tuberculosis. It is classed as an expectorant, useful in many respiratory infections, especially those characterized by a dry, hacking cough, bronchitis, colds and asthma. Some practitioners consider it an excellent nerve tonic, effective in cases of neurasthenia.






