


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

I ask this great unseen healing force to help both present and absent ones who are in need of help and to restore them to perfect health. I put my trust in the love and power of God.

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

This is a tribute to a man who has held the reins of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches since 1973, Joseph H. Merrill.

Joseph Merrill, first saw the light of day in Norway, Maine, 1903. He inherited artistic ability from his father and mother who were both professional photographers. In 1915 the family moved to Brockton, Massachusetts, where he attended the public schools. Around 1917 he was baptized in the Porter Congregational Church and as is the custom of this denomination, was immediately listed as a member.

During 1918 he was astonished one Sunday when his mother asked him if he wanted to go to a Spiritualist meeting. This surprised him because there was never a sign of a member of his family being interested in Spiritualism. He became so fascinated that he attended regularly Sunday after Sunday.

Personality Profile

One day his interest reached the point of questioning the Congregational minister in order to satisfy himself beyond the lines of rationality and reasoning. The conversation with the minister was informative in itself. Young Merrill said to the cleric, "Every Sunday morning I stand with the congregation and repeat the 'Apostle's Creed', right?"

Receiving an affirmative answer, Joe asked, "What concrete evidence can you give of this life everlasting which I say I believe in?" But the answer was very vague and left the young man wondering about this faith that one is supposed to have.

Then came the question, "Who are these saints that we Congregationalists say we believe in, 'in the communion of Saints?' Are they individuals who lived on earth at one time and did some miraculous good, and for their deeds the Roman Catholic Church canonized them?" The affirmative answer still didn't satisfy young Merrill so he said to the minister, "What kind of a God is it that would segregate one group of individuals and call them saints? What happens to all our people who do good but don't get canonized?" The answer was as vague as the previous answers.

Not satisfied with this kind of God and continuing to attend the Spiritualist church, Merrill drifted away from the Orthodox Christianity that had been preached to him and remained active in the Spiritualist Church playing the piano and furnishing a portion of the church services.

In 1920 Merrill graduated from Brockton High School,

worked in the photography business with his parents and in 1922, enrolled in the Ithaca Conservatory of Music at Ithaca, New York, intending to complete a year's study in music, specializing in voice culture. But during the second semester he was appointed by the manager of a concert company to serve as a baritone soloist and accompanist for the violinist. Merrill then toured the eastern and southern part of the country as a member of the Jane Case Concert Company.

Touring ended in 1926 and young Merrill joined his mother in business following her separation from his father and joined the First Spiritualist Church of Lynn and shortly thereafter he became secretary of the church.

During the years of 1929 to 1933, Merrill affiliated himself with the cause of social justice joining the Townsend Club and becoming one of the active speakers for social security for the elderly (a forerunner of the present Social Security legislation.) He travelled throughout New England espousing the cause. Mr. Merrill was the co-founder of the First Youth Group organized in New England for the Townsend movement.

Several years later he was elected to the board of the Massachusetts State Association of Spiritualists and one year later became the secretary of the state organization, holding the office for nine years when he was elected to the office of secretary of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches at the

convention in Houston, Texas in 1961.

Prior to this election, he had also served as president of the Temple Height Spiritual Corporation from 1952 to 1961, and held the office of secretary of the Lily Dale Assembly from 1964 to 1973.

Leaving Massachusetts Merrill moved to Milwaukee to take up his duties, and transferred his membership to the Spiritual Science Church of West Allis. He was it's president for several years.

In 1971, Merrill decided to step out of office of secretary and on the passing of Reverend Hugh Gordon Burroughs in August of 1971, Merrill ran for office of vice-president of the N.S.A.C. and was unanimously elected at the convention in Phoenix, Arizona.

This was a brief term because in March 1973, Rev. Robert J. Macdonald passed away very suddenly and Merrill was appointed by the National Board to act as president until the annual convention which was held in Los Angeles. At that convention Merrill was elected to fill the unexpired term of president; the office he now holds until the convention in October, 1980 when the term expires.

In 1975 Merrill was the N.S.A.C. delegate to the International Spiritualist Federation held in London and was elected vice-president of the International group; the office which he presently maintains.

Rev. Merrill brings to Spiritualists a required energy, perseverance and leadership. by the late Rev. Robert J. Macdonald Fifth President, N.S.A.C.



Religion as it is presented and preached by the orthodox Christian churches and by the theological teachers is in dire need of rebuilding in the consciousness of millions of people. The heart and core of Christian theology has suffered severe body blows during the last few years. The Roman Catholic Church has noted the danger ahead and has issued a declaration for a new Christian Bible suitable for all Christians and approved by both the Roman Catholics and Protestants. This urgent demand is in direct contradiction to the encyclical of the then Pope of some one hundred years ago. Bishop Pike of the Episcopal Church created a stir in his Church as has not been known since the days of the Protestant Reformation. These are but two instances of a strong need for unity noted by some and protested by others in the various Churches of Christendom.

Many years ago the great Daniel Webster said; "Religion, therefore, is a necessary, and indispensable element in any great human character. There is no living without it. Religion is the tie that connects man with his Creator. If that tie is sundered or broken, he floats away a worthless atom in the universe, its proper attractions all gone. A man with no sense of religious duty is he whom the Scriptures describes as living without hope and without God in the world. Such a man is out of his proper being and away, far away, from the purposes of his creation."

Mr. Webster couches his words in such a way that we have no doubt as to his meaning. He does not speak of any church, but of *religion* which is a basic need. The church per se, is at times far removed from religion, concerned, as it is with creed, dogma and practice. The importance of religion as a factor in our daily lives was never more needed than it is today. Open defiance of law, civil or secular was never more prevalent. Spiritualists know that we cannot break natural law. We do know about transgression and advise that the transgressor is in danger of breaking himself in the process. But we are a very small voice crying in a vast wilderness. Our nation is first in the modern necessity for education - more knowledge in all departments of human effort. This necessity for

education assumes increasing importance when we realize that the great majority of our population grows younger by the year; and, youth has small interest in the piddling schisms that has beset the world of Christianity for such a long time. The church can no longer preach the *do nots* in religious thinking and thus gain the attention of the progressive youth of the world. The need for things to do is a much greater requirement.

A popular national weekly magazine published a long and very enlightening article on the growth of man through millions of years of time on this planet with much wordage devoted to the study of recovered remains and artifacts of near man, his habits and growth into true man. This magazine enjoys wide popularity and the emphasis of the publication is on youth. And rightly so, for youth is both the hope and the inheritor of the world we now enjoy. The Christian Fundamentalist is still preaching the Bible as the infallible word of God and the total age of man on the planet

Parapsychology Receives Blessing of Accreditation

Do it yourself, home study programs are a far cry from resident school, though, they have their place. The days of the mail order doctorate certifications are now numbered. Once it was common to find several firms and institutions offering studies in ESP and parapsychology for a modest price. The advertising section of many popular magazines still carry these ads and probably will for years to come. However, the crowning status has finally been achieved for parapsychology. In June of this year, Jeffrey Mishlove, became the first person to receive a doctorate degree in parapsychology from a university in the United States. He was awarded the honors by the University of California at Berkeley, after hurdling academic obstacles for seven years.

The 33-year old Mishlove, author, teacher and holder of a Master's degree in criminology, voiced his hope that recognition by the university would begin to remove psychic research from the *backroads* of our society.

The achievement required more than going to school. Mishlove was responsible for initiating the interest at the university. His first attempt to receive doctoral approval was rejected. However, a following proposal was accepted by the Graduate Degrees Office and lead to this crowning victory.

The actual program was intense, including courses in ethics, experimental methodology, computer science, statistics, experimental model design and perception. Mishlove's individual studies required him to gather data on hundreds of people claiming paranormal experiences. This program, which Mishlove helped establish is now being pursued by several students holding academic majors.

Now, with an accredited degree in his hand, Mishlove has established a program which separates legitimate claims from fraud and self-delusion. Others now benefit from his years of study and personal conviction. He conducts counseling sessions and teaches, as well as engages in psychic research at the John F. Kennedy University, a small, private school near San Francisco. Mishlove is also recognized at the Washington Research Center in San Francisco.

Mishlove's next design for parapsychology is even more ambitious. He fully believes that the next 50 years will see the natural, human talents of man move science to the center of understanding the interaction of mind and matter. When asked about this, he offers the current application as proof that still greater uses and challenges await. Uses for psychic abilities cover crime detection, healing, business and weather forecasting. Even archeology. Man is constantly probing into the past, and the power of the mind is proving a valuable means to bridge both time and knowledge.

Since his early childhood, he

has sought to understand the what and why of telepathic communications. Although his father was quick to dismiss the prophetic dreams as nonsense, Mishlove's mother openly discussed the subject with him. Part of that childhood has remained firmly embedded in his memory. In 1971, the real thrust of those early years registered again, when he awoke during a dream about his uncle. A letter to his mother resulted in a telephone call and news that Uncle Harry had died one day prior to the dream. As the events became more frequent. Mishlove decided that there had to be a way to bring greater recognition to psychic phenomena which would not be easily dismissed.

Stacks of data have resulted from his pursuit of "this understanding." Now Mishlove lays claim to having met successful people from all walks of life who put their psychic abilities to fruitful daily application. He credits an oil company executive with 85 percent accuracy in business efforts following thoughts received through psychic meditation. In the category of unusual, he believes that he has found a man who "probably" can cause droughts, high winds, storms and large scale weather phenomena. Mishlove credits this unique individual, whose identity he chose to keep secret, with a proven weather development success rate of 33 percent.

LeRoy Minister Chosen To Head

Cystic Fibrosis Fund Drive Three Years In A Row

The biggest obstacle facing any new minister is to gain community acceptance. This problem strikes a sensitive chord each time a new arrival of any faith assumes a new post in a city previously unfamiliar to his helping hands. The Rev. Bryan McCotter, pastor of the J.T. and E.J. Crumbaugh Spiritualist Church in LeRoy, Illinois, has weathered this traditional aloofness and emerged a member, accepted in good faith, of the community. This year he was again asked to serve as chairman of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation fund raising drive in LeRoy. He was first asked in 1978, when little Todd Fannin peddled his bicycle 30 miles to raise \$138.00 for the drive. A



fifth-grade schoolteacher shares the spotlight with Bryan and little Todd. Ralph Duvick, of LeRoy Elementary wanted to help and discussed the needs with his school class. Little Todd was one of eleven hard working bike riders who took up the challenge and knocked on doors to gain financial backers for the marathon ride. The first year \$330.00 was contributed. Last year Larry Olson led the way, single-handedly earning \$375.00, for traveling 60 miles around Dawson Lake. The total funds rose to \$875.00 the second year.

This year 35 riders pushed their bikes long and hard to bring in \$1,110.00. Behind these boys are leaders of the community, one school teacher and one Spiritualist minister. The teamwork is evident. The prize for the boys is small in comparison, a T-shirt or a jacket. They are the real benefactors because they have had to solicit sponsors to pay for every mile they rode their bicycles. It takes a lot of doors and a lot of willing sponsors to earn \$375 for a sixty mile ride, like the one Larry Olson took last year.

Pastor McCotter's pleasant tasks, included turning the money over to the Central Illinois Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and handing out the T-shirts and jackets. But his role of chairman wasn't as simple as making a few telephone calls. He also had to interest enough people to make the fund drive work. In 1978, he approached the Kiwanis Club of LeRoy. Ralph Duvick was one of those helping hands who said yes. This year four members served as monitors at check points to verify the mileage the boys rode their bikes. Included were John O'Hara, Glenn D. Thompson, Donn Farris, and Paul Matlock.

Earning the trust and respect of new friends in LeRoy is just one way Bryan McCotter has been accepted openly in the community.

The Secret of Silence



here is a place to which you can turn for rest and release from fear and care. It is a holy place. Stillness fills it. The

peace of God is in it. There your mind becomes like a little child's, lovely and true and pure. There your thought is stayed on the things that are good and just and merciful. When you enter there, the world outside and all your troubles drop away and you rise at last, body stilled, mind stilled, refreshed and restored.

If you are tense in any part of your body, say "Relax and let go," until from the top of your head to the soles of your feet you are perfectly relaxed.

In the practice of the silence you will find it wise to use affirmations, for they will help you direct and control your thoughts. But there is a surer speech than that of syllables, a higher communion than that of words. His ministers in Spirit hear your innermost thoughts.

You do not have to cajole or coerce God; His love has already encompassed the fulfilment of your needs. It is only you that your prayers have to change.

Emerson said, "The only real prosperity that I can have is a rush of ideas." Divine mind is a reservoir of ideas, good ideas, yours to draw upon, yours to use. No sluggishness, physical or mental, no doubt or fear can remain in you, for you have opened your mind to the inspiration from Spirit.

Spiritual Healing

Everybody has a hobby. For many years I have experimented with this phase of the human equation in almost every form. When I was but a youngster, I learned that by placing my hands on people I could remove their aches and pains. I knew not why. Later in life, I began to investigate, to learn why.

In the Bible we find the earliest recorded history of the efficacy of healing by the laying on of hands. It was not recognized at that time by the multitude that it was what we of today know as *suggestion*. We find in the Bible the reference to a woman who was healed of a disease, with which she had been afflicted for many years, by merely touching the hem of His garment. To the student this shows conclusively a form of mental healing brought about by the patient's state of mind. We find further, many references wherein Christ tells us that: All the things He had done, we could do also if we had the faith to believe.

By systematic study and experiments it was found that within a limited field the senses could be rendered unusually acute or insensible. The motor nerves could be equally effected.

A part of sensation, movement and mental action proceeds in isolation from the rest; what is retained and what is lost, what powers are exaulted and what reduced, depend upon the nature of the contracted and dissociated field, as it arises from within the subject or is imposed from without by suggestion.

Actions beyond ordinary strength were performed; similarly, by suggestion, paralysis could be induced, partial or complete. Actual sensations were suggested away, such as pain, discomfort, worry, etc. Many major surgical operations have been performed by its use for anesthesia.

In our own United States, we find that about 1840, P. P. Quimby was attracted by the reports of the success of Mesmer and others, and began investigating and for many years practiced mental healing in different towns in Maine. He had, early in life, been what was known as a magnetic healer. Later he established metaphysical healing known as Mental Science. His writings, called the Quimby Papers, were guite exhaustive of what was known of the science at that time. Mary Baker Eddy, being in poor health following the death of her first husband, was listed as having been attended by Quimby. She reportedly regained her health and studied with him for many months. On returning home she formulated her results and called it Christian Science. Mrs. Eddy founded the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston in 1879. It is unnecessary to comment on the success of the movement started by her as it is only too well known and continues to gain new adherents.

Many of you will recall the "Press Agent"

reports of many different healers. Of late years the name of Emile Coue Seater is most easily recalled. His visit to the United States in 1923 being an epoch that is still fresh in memory. His theory was that by training the subconscious mind by constant repeated affirmation, it would direct the diseased organs to manifest health.

About the year 1898, Dr. Sidney A. Weltmer created quite a sensation with his announcements to the world regarding his investigations, in the applications of suggestion, the success of his healings, and results obtained by suggestive treatments. He published many books and established a college to teach suggesto-therapy at Nevada, Missouri. It incorporated a four year course of study. His son carried on the work after the passing of his father.

According to the opening statements of their literature, suggesto-therapy is the fundamental principle underlying all methods of healing, which is true. It matters not whether it is medicine of some form, osteopathy, chiropractic, massage, hydro-therapy, electro-therapy or what not. The suggestion arouses the latent power within the individual by which all healing is accomplished. In the event this latent power is not functioning, no method of healing will keep the individual functioning on this earth plane. It is possible that this latent power may be in abeyance and by freeing the circulating mediums of the body it may be aroused. It matters not how this is accomplished, although some methods may be more efficacious than others.

Suggesto-therapy defines disease as any condition that interferes with the functions, happiness or prosperity of the individual.

Suggesto-therapy, intelligently directed, either by the individual himself, which is known as auto-suggestion, or by someone for him, enables the patient to live a life according to the strength of his highest desires, rather than according to the weakness of his doubts and fears, and the diseases of various kinds that may afflict him.

Suggestion brings an individual to a statement of conscious self-mastery that enables him to overcome his fears and belief in limitation, sickness, disease and poverty, which leaves his spirit free and joyous to work out the things which are important in accomplishing his share of the world's work, and discharging his full duty to himself, his family and community.

These suggestions may be given by spoken words, the laying on of hands and by telepathy.

We will first consider the applicability to the chiropractor of the spoken word by giving to the patient words of cheer that will convey to him

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strongly the idea that he can and will become well under your ministrations. Deftly direct your patient's mind away from thoughts of disease, suffering and anguish to thoughts of optimism and jubilant expectancy. Teach him to speak not of his infirmities but to speak of his well being, and to look for and expect all the different organs of his body to function harmoniously. Lead your patient to realize that you have freed the circulating mediums within his body that carry to all the glands the life giving force that will cause every minute cell of the body to function in perfect harmony with the great cellular cosmos.

Every person is an electric battery. One half of the body is negative. One half positive. One may over-balance the other if allowed to do so by improper conduct of the physical mentality. Every successful physician must necessarily make himself predominantly positive. No patient applying to the physician is positive to that physician. A patient may tell you that he has no confidence in your ability or in your profession but the evident fact that he has applied to you for help is *prima-facie evidence* that such is only spoken from the material mind, while in spirit he is negative and receptive to your suggestions.

Laying your hands upon the human body carries with it an unspoken suggestion and conveys to the mind of your patient a telepathic suggestion as to what you expect to accomplish. And should the suggestion register with sufficient force, you will accomplish your desires.

The positive thought of the physician directed upon the negative mind of the patient will produce the desired results. Those who are conversant with the schooling and manner of treatment of the Christian Science practitioner are fully conversant with the efficacy of telepathic *suggestion* and know that thoughts are things, just as Spiritualist healers do, and when directed to their patients accomplish definite results.

Why In The World Start A New Church?

Every so often a Spiritualist decides it's time to start her own church. Usually, the action follows years of apprentice work in another church, and the need to satisfy an old longing to assume a leading role in directing the growth of her religion to make a mark.

In September the fruits of one such worker will become evident in Corpus Christi, Texas. Mrs. Marcia Hagopian will officially open the doors to a Lyceum program taught in the Montessori method along academic lines. When TNS heard about her plans we decided it would be interesting to share the thought process that goes into wanting to become so heavily committed. The following article is her reply to our inquiry:

Upon viewing the overall picture of the magnetism of our country and its' various components, the first aspect that touches me is the seeming decline in the values and principles that ensure growth. I think that the statement, *United We Stand - Divided We Fall*, should be considered in depth by all Spiritualists if we are to make our *mark* upon the world.

The government has fragmented into countless bureaus, and unity no longer exists in any of its undertakings.

Orthodoxy has followed suit. There is a tendency toward developing a semblance of unity between the various "heads" of orthodox religion, but the fact remains that there is a continual increase in spin-off quasi-religious groups and an appreciable decline in the overall attendance of the major denominations.

Unfortunately, Spiritualism has suffered greatly from a lack of growth as a unified whole while many sub-groups and independent mixtures have been on the upswing. True, there has been an increase in the chartering of new churches, but membership remains limited and, for the most part, Spiritualism is questionable in the majority of people. They reply, "What is it?", "I've never heard of it", "Oh, that's where all of those weird things happen, would you hold a seance for me?", or "That's the same as witchcraft, God said to stay away from that sort of thing."

The greatest period of growth in the moral, religious and unified consciousness of the American people took place while the development of the individual person was God-centered. The churches were mainly responsible for the education of its members in both spiritual and academic fields. As the opinions of the governing factions began to differ, fragmentation took place and, over the decades, the entire American way of life -which was first founded upon freedom -- has become segregated, fragmented, departmentalized and regulated to the extent that unity and freedom no longer exists in many of life's expressions.

The churches, for the most part, have centered upon religious education; academic instruction has come under government control and through the separation of church and state God is "not allowed in school." Many universities are owned and run by the major denominations, but they begin with the psycho-sclerotic man, not the tender, malleable mind of the child.

The development of industry and economic factions forced the American people to adhere to a way of life that sets Sunday aside for God and, for the most part, sets God aside for consideration on Sunday. This one factor has a tendency to separate a conscious unity with God from the remainder of the week and the activities that take place therein.

A God-centered way of life is technically absent and has been replaced with a complex and structured intellectual study and/or acceptance of man made doctrines and creeds which, again, are expressed and realized, for the most part, on Sunday. The average child, and adult, goes to church and/or Sunday school on Sunday, says a blessing before dinner (the blessing is usually not considered important for breakfast or lunch) and then maybe a bedtime prayer and this is the extent of the religious life for today's average person until a tragedy occurs. Then a minister is called in, for the church member knows not what to do nor how to handle prayers in a crisis situation. During Sunday school the children are exposed to Bible stories which insult their intelligence because the symbology of the stories is often neither discussed nor understood. By the time the child reaches adolescence he rebels against the general stereotyping, dogma and stagnation that life has presented to him and he enters into a state of religious apathy, crime or any of a myriad of forms of social unrest.

The human race, the United States of America and Spiritualism have all reached a cusp in their development during which the action of a critical group of people shall determine their destiny. The decline and fragmentation must be reversed if freedom is to be realized by us all. This critical group is you and me, and our children, and those whom we can touch with the truth that Spiritualism represents.

It is a proven fact that if a child has not been quided in developing his natural creativity during his sensitive periods (which occur in the very early years) he will become confused, restless, disruptive and rebellious. As Spiritualists, we understand that God-spirit, Infinite Intelligence is the beginning and the driving force of every child and must be recognized and dealt with accordingly. This is accomplished most favorably by surrounding the developing child with the truths and principles of life, growth and consciousness. While so doing, his native creative instincts and psychical sensitivities will lead him into seeking academic development through which he may express, on an intellectual and communicative level the intelligence that is his. If the proper equipment is then provided and if the child is properly guided then a harmonious soul results and a free and happy individual embarks upon the world as a strong, intelligent, God-centered and therefore magnetically attractive person.

Andrew Jackson Davis foresaw a Lyceum where the children were reared in Spiritualism. Their entire education was to be built around the principles of growth and development on physical, spiritual, intellectual, moral and psychical levels. He understood the creative, absorbent and psychical mind of the child. He knew that it is through the unified and harmonious training of the child *today* wherein lies the strength of the world *tomorrow*. He foresaw Spiritualism as a world religion uniting the people of the earth through the common bond of love and truth. He foresaw this taking place through the spiritual training of the children and I believe he was right.

For eight years Spirit has been guiding me towards the development of a church and church related school. Every fiber of my being throbs with the desire to bring the freedom that Spiritualism represents to the troubled masses. God has called me into the ministry and Spirit has found it possible to use me as a channel through which the river of living religion, Spiritualism, may flow.

The most important, and perhaps most delaying, aspect is that Spirit has made it clear to me that in order for the church to do its job properly it must contain a Lyceum true to the form of Andrew Jackson Davis' teachings. One without the other would be defeating the principles of growth and development of the human mind and soul.

Since I have set my hand to the task of starting

a church I have met, head-on with a number of obstacles, some peculiar to Spiritualism, some common to all denominations. When discussing my plans for a church and a school, the first reaction is always "That's an awfully big job for one very little person." How very true, but that does not mean it cannot be accomplished. I began my church in my home four years ago and have continued such over that period. The greatest obstacle here is the limitation of space, which means growth in numbers is next to impossible. Obstacle number two is funding. With such a small group the cash flow is also small. We are slowly making headway but inflation is growing faster than our finances. The people I have talked to and the offers I have had, have been too numerous to mention. The one outstanding fact is that they all require a compromise on my part that would be detrimental to my belief in the way Spiritualism should be presented, or would require me to lower my standards which are the same as those set by our pioneers.

Another problem is the name "Spiritualist." It draws the thrill-seekers and scares away the fearful. I feel this is because the general public is still very ignorant about Spiritualism. They are ignorant because the word in connection with religion is not known nor heard often enough to stimulate an interest. Some who are interested in helping to finance the forming of a church want to have several seances first; others want readings and if they are happy with the results then they will consider helping. There is always a string attached somewhere that calls for a compromise toward a lower level of consciousness and expression. Of these things I simply will have no part!

Here, in Corpus Christi, many of the non-churchgoers are that way because this area is peculiar to not stimulating church attendance on Sunday. More often than not potential backers have asked if I would consider services on some other day than Sunday. I do not consider this a problem so I hold my services on Wednesday evening. Spirit has reminded me over and over again that the earth is God's true church, all of humanity it's congregation and that pure religious worship is a way of life practiced and expressed all day, every day, not something set aside for one hour, once a week on a designated day - Sunday. The magnetic purposes of a church can be served just as well on any day of the week but many orthodox prone people think God's way is Sunday and anything else is blasphemous.

Until larger quarters can be found my church has gone as far as it can in its development. We are now concentrating on the school. I have discovered

that the Montessori Method of education is very much in accord with Andrew Jackson Davis' idea of unfolding the child. It lends itself well to incorporating the teachings of Spiritualism as a part of the classroom development methods. We presently have a member of our group training in the Montesorri method of teaching for the elementary grades and she will be ready to begin teaching in September. We have our orders for the necessary didactic equipment ready and are confident that God and Spirit shall find a way to fill our financial needs. When the school opens in September, the building shall provide room for our church needs as well and I'm sure that the financial strain will be lifted somewhat. Basically, our plan provides for the opening of the elementary grades one through four in September, along with a Chreche for newborn through age two and a well rounded schedule of adult classes, all based on the philosophy of Spiritualism. Further teacher training will be accomplished for the higher grades next as well as for the pre-primary levels. It is a very big job and the needs are tremendous.

I think that this will be the first Spiritualist educational center that encompasses academics in the elementary grades and I know that it will work. I believe that if this were done on a national level our country would be well on its way to freedom and people would flock into Spiritualism because of its philosophy and educational advantages, rather than shy away because of its phenomena and obscurity.

This is why I want a church and what I am doing to build one.

Is mediumship a gift? If so, why the development classes?

"Timely Reflections"

Fellow Spiritualists:

Spiritualism was a religion'' is a statement often heard. As members of the organized movement of Modern Spiritualism, we sometimes grow



impatient with those who unknowingly make this statement.

In one sense, it indicates our failure to have made an impact on humanity regarding the spiritual and philosophical values in addition to the scientific demonstration of the phenomena of mediumship. However, investigators from all walks of life and all religions can no longer ignore or deny the frequent spiritual experiences so many people are having. While they may not immediately relate such experiences to the so-called miracles recorded in ancient Biblical times, nevertheless, the more they find out about invisible influences in their daily lives, the more they will be disposed to the ultimate search and aspiration of every soul. The search for the truth of the continuity of life, and the immortality of the soul.

Whether or not science is ready to admit that man has a soul, Astronaut Edgar Mitchell, who had evidential sittings with Rev. Arthur Ford states the case articulately. He says the difficulty of such admissions by science is that psychic phenomena can be spontaneous or laboratory. The more reliable psychic phenomena is spontaneous.

Man (science) proposes: God (Spirit) disposes. There is room for improvement in this area by both science and religion. Physical science must eventually understand how spontaneous spiritual laws operate. Spiritualists must attempt to demonstrate clearer messages, befitting the prefix *clair* (clear) before sight, hearing and sensing.

I have long felt that Spiritualism does not stress enough the reality that man is *spirit right here and* now.

The medical profession is gradually admitting the effectiveness of psychic diagnosis by some of their own professional doctors. At distances of several thousands of miles, some have been able to tune in to specific cases and give accurate diagnosis and treatments in over 90% of the experiments. This is not new to us anymore than to the world famous natural spiritual healer, Dr. Olga Worrall, but it is a breakthrough of science into religion, and of religion into science. The recently coined words, holistic medicine, or holistic health, offers what pioneers like Andrew Jackson Davis long ago preached and demonstrated.

We have won a great victory in convincing the skeptic of the power of mind (spirit) over matter, which is a very necessary step toward convincing him of the survival of his own soul.

Teachers in spirit have long told us that the functions of our bodies do not exist in separate airtight compartments from our spiritual faculties. The latter remain dormant and closed in far too many people. They think mostly of the physical and little of the spiritual. The five physical senses have to be educated, disciplined and controlled, so that the spiritual faculties which operate spontaneously, can permit an unobstructed flow of spirit power through them.

1893-1980

Once again a child has been born. A new ideal has been realized. A new revelation given to the world. To faith has been added knowledge. To worship has been added service. To prayer is added personal responsibility.

Supernatural is superseded by natural law.

Superstition is replaced by reason.

Darkness replaced by light. Man has come into his own with realization,

Realization that he is a part of the Infinite whole,

"Whose Body Nature is, and God the Soul."

In the year 1893, forty-five years after the raps that "resounded around the world" had been heard in the little cottage at Hydesville, a National Convention was called and was held in the city of Chicago at 77 Thirty-first Street, on September 27,28,29, 1893.

At this organization convention there were present two hundred and one delegates, coming from twenty-six different states and representing one hundred and one different cities, including one in Germany.

At this convention, and

during succeeding conventions, the Association has come to be known as, the "National Spiritualist Association of Churches." Truly a noble name, for a noble cause.

Harrison D. Barrett was elected the first president of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches. He accepted the honor and responsibility in the following excerpts: "I deem the highest honor ever conferred upon mortal man. I pledge you my earnest endeavor to work for Spiritualism in fair weather and stormy times as much as my

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feeble ability will enable me to do; pledging you that the interests of this Association shall be my interests, and this religion, the purest and noblest ever vouchsafed to man, shall be advanced in every possible way for the highest good of all mankind."

Spirit, God is Spirit. Spiritual, the development of the highest and the best within man. Spiritualism, the study for beneficial use of the spiritual laws of life. *Spiritualist*, one who studies, understands and lives in accordance with spiritual law, for the welfare of the world in which he lives.

The investigation of its phenomena and a study of their implications have given full assurance that, *God is Spirit* universally present, manifesting and thus creating life through all forms of organisms in all departments of nature, thereby re-affirming, the fatherhood of God, the motherhood of nature, and the brotherhood of man.

The first three of the Declaration of Principles of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches, (study them) state clearly our position upon this matter and give assurance that not only is Jesus the son of God, but that also are all men equally the children of God, each one the repository of infinite possibilities.

An Argument About God?

Can we really argue about God? Spiritualists say no. Infinite Intelligence is too vast for mortal man to begin to comprehend. TNS offers the following tidbits of opinion which mortal man has produced. Since no authority is truly absolute here, TNS makes no pretense of being able to fully define God. However, many interesting arguments have been set forth. We plan to bring you some of them. All will be short, and, we hope, offer a ray of light about how some people view reference to the Infinite.

A One-sided Opinion . . .

Spiritualists hold a common opinion of God, though, in expressing their belief tend to present different facets of the same overriding thought. The same cannot be said for the atheist and the pantheist. They are opponents of heart and fact. And yet, they, too, share a thread, which, neither will perhaps totally admit: The idea God exists. ithout desire the spiritual aspirant can proceed absolutely nowhere. Realities begin with a single thought. Sometimes such thoughts begin with a desire.

The Advanced Course of Modern Spiritualism states, "the desire to know leads the student into avenues of approach that gives him a better understanding, and in his efforts to know, expands his mental horizon. Understanding comes through contact, application, and experience. No one can force it!"

One may wonder why Spiritualists emphasize the study of natural laws. Again, the course states, "because this great universal law governs all, alike, because all are parts of one perfect whole; so the materialist, the skeptic, the realist, the mystic, the pagan, the theologian and the non-creedalist are alike governed by natural law. It is one thing all humanity shares in common."

"Natural law is a fact."

It further states, "Natural law is a fact, therefore, man has no alternative but to comply harmoniously with it. He cannot deny it out of existence anymore than he can create or destroy his own soul. Ignorance in regarding it, refusal to accept it, inability to grasp its significance, in no way hinders or deters this immutable law from manifesting correctly everywhere. It is in the smallest atoms of matter, in limitless space, in enduring time in all conceivable forms of energy in every material, in every thought, in every act, in every personality, in the visible and invisible expressions, in all animate and inanimate creatures. In short it is Infinite Intelligence or God.

All spiritual growth begins with this very important first spiritual law of desire. If a person does not possess the desire to grow or learn, then he probably will not progress. If a person does possess the *desire* to learn, he then has to apply *power* into the desire.

In the Magic Word and Riches Within Your Reach by Robert Collier, there is a statement which says it best: "You must not only know exactly what you want but you must also want it (hard enough) and be willing to pay the price of its attainment."

If a person wants to study and learn to be a capable church worker, the basic desire is the first prerequisite. In addition, one must be willing to pay the price of its attainment. This involves setting priorities to include time for study, meditation, development classes, serving the church, etc.

Having the desire to grow spiritually is but the first step. The desire must be intense. No matter what type of goal we set we have to put the law of desirability into effect. This law has great effect in our daily lives and it merits serious consideration.

"Yes," my goal is success.

Most people would adamantly exclaim "yes" when asked if their goal was success. But if one were to ask the same person if they truly understood how desire helps them to bring about this most successful portion of their lives, few would know. A clearer grasp of how our lives parallel natural law must be part of any successful pursuit.

The study of natural laws forces one to analyze, to dig deeper, to probe, inspect, and disect his role in the great scheme of things.

One can see where the law of attraction blends nicely with the law of desire. For if the law of desire is great enough this will help to bring about the law of attraction, each buoying the other for still greater achievement.

It must be remembered that laws have positive and negative aspects. For example, people can desire the wrong things. Then the very nature of attraction becomes the magnet which draws us out of alignment and into difficulty. So the thing they thought they desired comes hurling toward them through the law of attraction. Then they are stuck. We must indeed be careful what we seek. Sometimes we get just what we want! If more people understood how the natural laws worked, maybe they would not make this mistake so frequently!

Something else to remember about desire was best expressed by Robert Coolier in his book The Secret Of The Ages, "Desire must be impressed

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
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

They are of that class I suppose of whom it is said Jesus went and preached to in prison.



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
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Declaration of Principles
