

MARS—ST

NTERING Station 64 you find your-L self in a very large, long room, walls and ceiling of slightly spherical shape; the floor is flat, of light copper color and looks like copper; all receiving and transmitting tables have large reflectors, shine like silver and are concave in form. There are numbers around the edges of the spheres. By pressing a lever at these numbers one may contact with its own degree of electrical action any place in the city or other cities, much like our radios of Earth, except more easily and accurately reached. There is an immense reflector in the middle of this room, with a large globe above it and only a few numbers around the reflector. This is used to transmit and receive messages from other planets. Mars has been in communication with Venus for a long time. A few scientists have received messages from Mars, also a few people suited by their own psychic natures to receive from the Martians what they are so anxious to impart. Their pictures are given through the reflectors and their messages through strong concentration, the power of telepathy electrically applied, using the finer forces of the brain.

Seated before the large reflector was a man who resembled an Earth man except in size and color. Slim legs and rather small feet, large from the waist up, powerful hands and arms, his skin a light copper tint. His body was encased in a sort of armor like glittering steel, but flexible. He pressed a controlling button and motioned me to a chair a short distance from the large reflecting sphere. As I watched it a mist of soft gray color filled it, turning into a clear violet shade, and I knew I could see any place on Earth I might desire.

I chose London, England, knowing that city to be in communication with Mars. Beautiful and varied scenery came first out of the reflector, then what seemed to be a place far out from the city, was a station fitted up on a much smaller scale than Station 64, but like it in detail. An Earth scientist was seated before the large reflector and was in communication with the Martian, Vardos by name. He placed a peculiar metal band about my head which gave me immediate contact with the messages. This was the purport of their conversation.

Mars-"Are you in preparation for the troubles ahead?"

Earth—"We are doing all we can to protect our people."

Mars—"Seeing and knowing all that goes on there, we have tried to post you regarding your enemies. It is difficult at times to reach you when your station is not in exact working order. You already have the secret of our

powerful Martian Death Ray. Have you had any success in its use?"

Earth—"We have in a small way. Disguised as a light ray on some of our ships—"Air Ships'—we have destroyed a number of old buildings. They were reduced to ashes in a few minutes. You tell us this ray can destroy whole cities, anything on which it is directed. Then indeed we have a mighty weapon which should end all war forever."

Mars—"We want to help you as we know what threatens your planet. We wish to give you the benefit of our knowledge. Foreign powers are allied against you. Many secret spies are working in a subtle way to destroy your power in England and America."

Earth—"We think that, and as soon as possible we will fit up our flying ships and other vehicles of transportation with the Martian Death Ray. It is no easy task to get the attention and help of the money powers to cooperate with us."

Mars-"You will ere long be able to show them what can be done with the Ray, then you can proceed on a large scale. But before that time we cannot prevent the destruction that will take place. A number of your largest and most beautiful cities will be wiped out completely. There will be great loss of life. Sorrow and desolation lie in the years ahead. Strong foreign powers hope to rule the world eventually. Through the use of the Martian Death Ray America will be saved from ruin. Foes will attack the United States of America. There will be war made against it through Mexico and Japanese destroyers. America will suffer, but the Ray will be in operation by that time and carry out such swift destruction that it may cause the abolishment of all wars."

Earth - "We have scientists and astronomers working constantly to perfect communication with you as we want all the knowledge we can possibly obtain from your great minds. One of our big super-minds has discovered a way to extract healthy blood from socalled dead bodies to cure the afflicted and help many who are suffering and diseased and he will later on discover the fluid that will be injected into the veins of a dead body keeping it for ages in a state of preservation with possibilities of revivifying and reconstruction of the body if desired. This man is formulating a plan through which the healthy organs of a dead body can be transferred to the living when their organs are worn out. A much better way to use a body when the electric spark dies out than placing it in the ground where it is of no account whatever."

Mars—"We have marvelous ways of using dead bodies to help the living, of which you Earth people do not dream and would no doubt consider horrible. Ours is a very old planet you know and we possess great secrets of life and death that we wish to give to save you from making some of our mistakes. We will enable you to have the knowledge that will show you how to store up large quantities of heat and water for the time in future centuries when you will need it. Our 'canals' are large reservoirs for carrying water surrounding our planet. We have central stations for distributing water, heat and air."

Earth-"Air?"

Mars—"Our atmosphere is getting scanty, but we are prepared for this. We have been taught by older planets how to manufacture air for our people and our dry ocean beds have been turned into places producing vegetables, fruits and flowers and many beautiful homes are near these places. I must end my talk with you now but will call you again and give further advice and help from us."

Instantly Vardos released me from the metal head band and made a sign over me which I understood to be one of blessing. Then I was back again to Earth, conscious of all our dangers and praying that I might be an instrument of help to our people of this planet.

The foregoing appeared in The Occult Digest, July, 1934. Since that time, at different intervals, through astral trips and electrical trance condition the following information has been given. All illuminated Mystics will understand the methods of receiving and I have tried to make the reading matter interesting to those who do not belong to the occult clan. Vardos takes the lead. Have met other inhabitants of Mars, but relate here only the things given that would be of real benefit to our planet.

OREJA (Ada Bertoni)

The people, their manners, customs, streets and occupations existing on Mars at the present time.

The streets are very wide and all wires are underground. There are high steel poles, narrow in circumference, with numerous buttons to press used to call cities and planes on each side of the street, also to connect with the large stores where one may have a conveyance sent out at once if they wish. The middle of the street is used by people who travel entirely by air. The sides of the streets have double tracks, which are used by small cars easily managed. They will take you right into a large store, and at the different aisles there are places to turn in for anyone following you to enable them to go to their own particular counters. This mode of locomotion is for people who do not walk much. Most of the inhabitants of Mars go about in airplanes or the handy little cars that are operated by electricity.

There is a lightly constructed harness made of thin metal that one may step into, an oval box fastened to the front of this harness affords the electrical currents necessary for the different degrees of motion in air travel. One presses a button and ascends lightly upwards, turn a button either to the right or left or in any direction they wish to go, or one may float horizontally for a long period of time. One cannot rise to great heights but for one person it works perfectly and is a delight and pleasure for short trips down town, to visit friends or out in the country. Earth people will travel as we do in time. There is a man at present on Earth trying to figure out the kind of harness used for single flying trips and its method of operation. When this is accomplished the harness will be as common as your bicycles.

You will understand that all kinds of air travel lessens the use of the lower limbs and the feet and legs become weak if not used to any extent. We are far more developed in the upper part of the body. Our feet and legs are thin and small. This applies to those who travel mostly by air and who dislike walking. We have our pedestrians, however, men and women who ride but little. They glory in walking and all kinds of athletic sports, are large and finely set up, are fine physical specimens of outdoor life and culture.

Our airships are of different shapes, some round, some oval and some fishshaped. Some are immense in size, constructed of thin but strong metal, operated by electricity and will carry one as far as they wish to go.

Our streets are paved with a hard substance which resists breakage, is smooth and of a dark green color that blends in nicely with the greens and reds and browns of the shrubbery.

We do not have many small towns. They are like the cities on a smaller scale. In the cities much space is required on account of the wide streets, and covers many miles of land. What would be like your suburbs of Earth is used to produce foods, vegetables, fruits and flowers. Where there was at one time great bodies of water, came dry land, and this waste land has been cultivated properly and made to yield the different products for the people and the few animals that live on Mars. There are no farms like those of Earth. The large spaces of land are taken over by the government and utilized mostly for food. The materials for food, vegetables and fruit are sold to the large stores who in turn sell to smaller ones. The water supply is low and that is one reason why the government takes out certain portions of the land to cultivate, using only the necessary amounts of water to produce the required results. There is very little rain on Mars, and the climate is cool and growing colder as the years go by. From 10 A. M. in the morning to 7 P. M. is the best time to travel in comfort. At other times one must dress for the weather as the changes on Mars are sudden, from a likable warmth to biting cold.

There are no trees, but quite a lot of shrubbery on Mars. Very few lawns in front of the homes as the water must be conserved. What takes the place of lawns is a mixture of colored stones giving the surface a fine appearance.

Our buildings are all of metal or glass. Ages ago we ruled out wood in the construction of even the smallest kind of out-buildings, partly from necessity and partly from choice. The materials we use give lovely effects to our homes and buildings and our large blocks of stone have lighting purposes that are almost unbelievable. With the different colors in the stone and glass the city is wondrously enchanting. We have few high buildings. Our halls for public gatherings are very large and of slightly oval shape and here one may see pictures much like your own movies showing all scenes of interest that have transpired on our planet for centuries back.

We have blocks of stone of a dark color which give brilliant illumination at night; this is lasting and so grand in coloring one cannot describe it.

We do not build close together as you do. Our homes are of unusual pattern, round, hectagon, oval and some in a pattern after the name of the home.

There are no really tall or large people here except the pedestrians. They are of fine build and held in great respect by the non-walkers. The pedestrians furnish much entertainment for the great crowds which gather on festive days. The amusements are generally feats of strength not unlike the gladiatorial contests of ancient days. Our men and women are of light red color, growing darker if living much in the open. The men are smooth of face and differ greatly in expression, men and women both, not unlike the people of Earth. The clothing is simple and comfortable and of a texture resembling fine gold cloth.

Women are on an equality with men: in some countries they manage the affairs of home and state, while the men attend to the ships and planes and interest themselves in everything that will have a tendency to make the planet better, and will bring more happiness to the people.

We do not have wars. We have had them and very severe ones. The people called continually for strife, war, bloodshed, but that was a time many hun-

dred years gone, when we did not have the intelligence to live peacefully. At this time we work for and with each other, and always for the best environment suitable for every person. One chooses their task, and for the best production in each line, reward is given by the government.

The government allows so much to each person according to their needs and their position in life and there is no waste or extravagance among the people. The medium of exchange is cut in coins similar to yours of Earth in copper and a metal resembling aluminum, and in copper sheets for larger amounts.

We have no paupers, criminals or outcasts on Mars, for we have learned to live right from every standpoint and as human beings should live according to the highest principles involved and in harmony with the highest Supreme Intelligence.

The main cause of war was greed and we do not know what that word means. Our progression has come about over a long period of time. Our great scientists found a way finally to treat the brains of criminals and abnormal people making them over into good citizens thus avoiding the bad mistake of sending them out into the unknown with a heavy burden to carry. One murder executed to cover up a loss of something that can never be made right, or to even up a bad score does not help anything or anybody. Those who take a delight in seeing a criminal or degenerate person electrocuted or hung are not much better than the criminal-morally-for they have hate in their hearts and one should work for reform always through the spirit of love. Your murders will cease in time, and instead of sending the undesirables out into some hereafter loaded with all their vicious tendencies and no chance to do any better, he will be given the attention of your super-men scientists and get the right start on Our scientists do wonderful things. 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The Cyclic Formula of Change

The Aryan-Hindu Formula

NDIA represents typically (but, of course, not exclusively) the attitude of devotion; that is the dependence upon the One-that-is-in-the-beginning. It stresses-in many ways-the First Principle, the alpha of evolution and the yearning toward absolute Unity. The fact that there existed in India a universal synthesis of knowledge is not always recognized; but it can be discovered in the great days of the old "Aryavarta," of Aryan civilization, underneath the many accretions and perversions which have marred the pure beauty and simplicity of the ancient system, long antedating Buddhismjust as the Yi-King long antedated Confucianism. This system seems to have been recovered, in part at least, in a somewhat mysterious way by Bhagavan Das, and we refer the student to his great work, the Pranava Veda.

India's integration, being based on the original One, is essentially hierarchical-much more so than China's which is equilibrative. All activity and knowledge are seen in their root-relationship to the triune One, which is the AUM, the world-process derived from the absolute Unknowable and incomprehensible Unity. In AUM, A stands for the universal monad, U for the world of illusion, M for the relation between both. This relation is a relation of negation. For the old Hindu wisdom, based on the One, denies the Many except as a shadowy objectivation of this One.

Thus the formula of the worldprocess is given as "The Self-is notthe Not-Self." The formula of knowledge is that the object (Not-Self) must be known so that the subject (Self) realize by seeing the illusory character thereof that there is nothing but the subject. The integration is reached by denial and renunciation. The worldprocess is seen as an illusion (Maya). The personality and change are illusions; and at the end of the cycle, the original One finds himself again what he originally was-uncorrupted by change. What has he gained through the process of change? This, that he now knows consciously that "I am that I am." Thus consciousness is the end of the process, but a consciousness which identifies itself completely with the subject and withdraws from the object all reality. However, all fire leaves ashes; and so a new cycle is necessary to reincorporate these ashes into a new living and growing tree. Thus the world-process goes on endlessly through incarnations after incarnations of the same Self. Time becomes thus the fatality of being-the warp and woof of "karma" and of misery.

This basic attitude to life follows necessarily a strong emphasis upon the One that is in the beginning. For this One the "process" of the middle cycle means dismemberment, tragedy-or, sacrifice. The end means return to the integrity of the beginning. Thus the AUM: which is to be repeated in succession; for the M is cessation, deliverance. But it brings again re-birth. And the true AUM is the inaudible one; truth residing in withdrawal and abstraction. A and U are also sounded as O to show that the distinction between self and not-self is a mere concept, an illusion. Thus OM is the integrated tone - the simplest vocal sound: inhaling of air and closing of lips. A true symbol of the One without a second.

The synthesis of universal knowledge and activity followed upon such concepts. Out of the OM emanated the Gayatri, the sacred invocation to the Sun and the unity of all life. From the Gayatri, and some other basic mantrams, issued forth the four Vedas; from the Vedas came the Vedangas; from those, representing the basic sciences of the self, originated the six schools of Hindu philosophy, synthetized at last in the secret seventh. Atma-Vidya—the consciousness of the "end", leading to the re-utterance of the AUM in a universal way. All of which is but a most sketchy outline of one of the basic systems of consciousness of mankind, a system which is still the foundation of most religions and most types of occult philosophies.

The Chinese Formula

This system is of course fundamentally different from the Chinese system, which emphasizes the reality of the "process" and the dualism involved therein. Yang and Yin, the two cosmic polarities, are seen in their cyclic interplay. Time is no longer the fatality that forces the spirit into reincarnation; but as the basic reality of the process of change. All life is a ritual of change, a drama picturing the related activities of Yang and Yin, and featuring their successive permutations. These permutations are symbolized geometrically, first in a threefold scheme of archetypal manifestation (for every relation between two elements involves action, reaction and interaction); then in a sixfold realm of activity, which is the realm of actual drama or outer performance. Thus 64 hexagrams are formed representing all the possible phases of interaction between the two principles in the sixfold realm of activity. These hexagrams are then distributed in a circle, very much as the signs of the zodiac in modern astrology.

What this cyclic series of hexagrams represents is the universal drama of life, the cosmic pattern of all activity and of all reaction to activity (which is what we call, knowledge). More specifically, it stands as the graph of the changing relationship of sun to earth during the cycle of the year. But this relationship, which curves along the path of the earth's orbit, is in fact the very origin of the vital principle in everything. Life does not come from the sun. Life is the result of the enacted relationship between sun and earth, between energy and substance, Light and Darkness.

At the summer solstice, Yang dominates; at the winter solstice, Yin; at the equinox, they are in a state of dynamic equilibrium. But in the fall Yin increases; while in the spring Yang increases and Yin decreases in intensity. Thus four crucial points, the Cross of activity, the Four Acts of the drama-which a Fifth Act may, or may not, synthetize. This Fifth Act is the "Quintessence" of alchemical lore. It is the Fifth Limb-the house of the Creative, whether above or below. It is the sacred place where dwells Tao, the Great Meaning, the apex of the pyramid based on the four crucial points of the year, the Symbol of all symbols. Tao is the solution of all conflicts; -and therefore it is not a thing or even an essence, but a process. It is the Process in the Head; the going of the Initiate up the steps that lead to the top of the pyramid—a flat top, originally for the apex itself could only be the mystic Fire rising from the exalted altar; the altar where the Four Errors (which are really limited viewpoints) are burnt and are solved, resolved, integrated into the One Mean-

This One Meaning resolving all conflicts by equilibrating and transcending them is embodied in the Chinese Emperor. He is the neutral point where all cosmic energies are balanced, the Great Empty, the hub of the wheel. This, within the State. But, for the mystic, there was potentially in every man an "imperial palace." There within the head, Tao reached completion as a process, the process of "circulation of the Light" and the "Diamond Body" was born—the Emperor: the God-of-the-end, the Light-Seed.

The word Tao can be symbolically analyzed so that each of its three letters refer to one term of the Cycle. A refers to the One-that-is-in-the-beginning, the monad; O to the ultimate consummation which in man means integrated Personality centered around the Self (and not only the merely conscious ego)—and, at a later stage of abstraction, the quintessence of Self-

JUST after reveille formation that morning the name of my friend, Tony G—, was called with six others to be sent to the front. I would rather go also than to be separated from him and so I stepped forward, saluted the Captain, and asked for such a privilege, but in a rather sharp reply, was given to understand once more that in the army one cannot do as he wishes.

He had placed some boards above a manger that was large enough for two mattresses and which we had shared together. Most soldiers slept on straw mattresses laid on the rough stone floor. F we turn back the pages of the Bible to the time when man first appeared on earth we find him inhabiting a garden. One whole 30 degree section of the zodiae, where the Sun may be found from August 23 to September 23, was set aside by those who anciently studied the stars as signifying just such a garden, and as having an influence over the fruit of the trees and the grain of the field. MORE than 95% of the young men lion of cigarettes in 1936 (few cigar-of the United States have used ettes smoked 50 years ago), and pay ettes smoked 50 years ago), and pay for tobacco and the smokers' supplies, more than the combined cost of our public schools and churches. Our jails, prisons and reformatories, and insane asylums, are badly overcrowded (chiefly with increasing young degenerates) and we have not the money to build more. Tobacco is a true Narcotic "Dope" like Opium, Cocain, etc., and when a case against tobacco is carried up to the Supreme Court (U.S.) it will be so declared. Tobacco habit is more difficult to cure than liquor or other "dope" addiction. With the increasing

use of tobacco we may expect much worse conditions in the future. I see no hope for spiritual, moral or physical up-lift of our people and future generations with increasing use of Tobacco-

Although "hard times," U. S. people spent 31/2 billion dollars for tobacco in 1935. We must get rid of tobacco first, to get rid of liquor and other dope, and reduce juvenile crime and vice .- A. L. The Fingers Interpreted

ACCEPTING as our premise that the hand is the instrument of the intelligence, whereby man has been enabled to fashion his surroundings, to devise ways and means of aggression and defense against the forces of nature and to create tools and devices whereby his bodily powers have been multiplied almost incalculably, brings us to a consideration of the fingers of the hand.

Some hands are so long that the long fingers are really short in comparison with the long palm. Then, there are some hands where the fingers are so short that the opposite is true. The question naturally arises, "What are the true proportions of the well-balanced hand?" Thousands of measurements have established the following standard:

The width of the palm is equal to the length of the middle finger.

The width of the base of the fourth finger is contained four times in the total width of the palm, the former measured from the outside of the hand to a line drawn midway between the fourth and third fingers.

The width of the little finger is contained nine times in the total length of the hand, from the tip of the middle finger to the wrist line at the base of the hand. Therefore, in the normal, well-balanced hand, the ratio of the width of the palm to the length of the hand is as 4 to 9. With these rules in mind, it is possible to establish the ratio of proportion in the hand under consideration.

Long Fingers

Long fingers indicate a love of detail, method and regularity. Such persons are very proper, strict in matters of propriety and decorum. They are the

fingers of punctilious, dignified and slow-moving habits of thought. Such an individual will have all the details of a business literally at the tips of his fingers. Their owners are often harassed and troubled over mere trifles as though they were matters of the greatest importance. There is a love for detail, whether in dress, in decoration, in work or in dogma. These are the fingers of slow, careful, patient people, painstakingly accurate, and often long winded. Where the fingers are too long, it often indicates a domineering, tyrannical disposition.

Short Fingers

Short fingers indicate the impulsive and intuitive nature. There is often the power to look at things as a whole, and often denote exceptional capacity for executive work. Very often the individual with short fingers will act as if by inspiration, not stopping to weigh and consider a matter before coming to a conclusion. Such a one is often rather brusque in manner, but active and full of life, energy and determination. In speaking, they are often short, sharp and decisive. They come to a point quickly, and leave the detailed explanation to others. Short fingers are often the possessions of extremely successful people.

Smooth Fingers

Smooth fingers are much more impulsive than those of any other type. Such fingers show quick apprehension, intuition and love of reading. The possessors of such fingers are often friendly people, enthusiastic, rather credulous and great lovers of beauty. It is the type of finger that sees more beauty in life, sees more of the artistic side. They think quickly and intuitively and often come to more accurate conclusions than could be expected of either cold reasoning or meticulous analysis. The possessor of smooth fingers loves those things which appeal to the eye or appeal to the sense of beauty. Smooth fingers are inspirational. They seem to receive instantaneous ideas which work out successfully for them.

Knotty Fingers

The knotty fingers belong to the reasoners, the analyzers of the world, those who take nothing on faith, but subject all things to an exhaustive analysis. The "knotty fingers" seem to arrest the impetuousness of the disposition and give reflection, love of detail, and is the type of fingers often found on the hand of great organizers and those who require thought and reflec-

tion in carrying out their plans. This type of finger will be found on the fastidious dresser, the analytical, and often "doubting Thomas" type of person.

The knotted fingers often indicate a greater capacity to analyze a situation and in this manner arrive at correct conclusions. Such individuals often fret and worry over little things, but they are certain to rise splendidly to emergencies. The possessors of knotty fingers are inclined to scientific research work and details will never be overlooked.

Set of the Fingers

The fingers should be set evenly on the palm to indicate a balanced personality.

Such an individual will act according to his own thoughts and ideas, rather than seeking the advice and counsel of others. If the hand is firm and well balanced, it is an excellent indication.

Where the fingers fall apart easily, it indicates one who is quick to grasp ideas and suggestions. Such individu-

THE ASTROLOGY OF PERSONAL-ITY—by Dane Rudhyar. Published by Lucis Publishing Company, New York City. Dane Rudhyar has been known for several years to the astrologically minded public for his regular contributions to "American Astrology" and to other periodicals. This book sums up and presents as a complete whole his broad and challenging attitude not only toward Astrology, but toward life and the building of an integrated and creative personality. It addresses itself therefore to the student of psychology and of spiritual thought as much as to the Astrologer. Steeped in the most modern philosophy, Rudhyar, who is also an essayist and composer of music internationally known, brings to Astrology an unusual background. hood: and T stands for the world-process of change-in man to that state of being which is a continual flux of thoughts, feelings, intuitions and sensations; the state of the evolving, everchanging personality. The letter T came first, in this sacred word of China, because Chinese civilization emphasized the element of "process"; and the letter T, in universal symbology, signifies the life-power that flows through the process of becoming, the power born of the "crucifixion" of the One into the realm of duality. However, this life-power, when controlled by man in equilibrium of action, becomes the energy that leads inward along the "conscious way" which is Tao.

Thus the goal of the Sage was to equilibrate within himself the opposite polarities, to reach a point of balance from which all conflicts could be symbolically resolved through objectivizing and transcending them, and to draw within the creative center of his ultimate selfhood the quintessence of the entire process of change so as to build therewith the spiritual vehicle for a relative type of individual immortality as one of the true "Celestials"—i.e. as the spiritual manifestation of one of the archetypal Principles within the realm of Universals.

The "New World" Formula

Thus the Chinese and Hindu "weltanschauungen," or world-viewpoints. We claim that a third type of universal integration is possible, which would emphasize neither the One-in-the-beginning, nor the "process" which we call "life"-but the ultimate sum-total, the con-summation, the in-gathering of all elements within the "circle of wholeness." Such a system would obviously integrate some of the features of the Chinese and the Hindu typical philosophies. It would moreover incorporate the particular stress made by Christianity upon "personality" and the process of crucifixion-a stress seemingly absent from the Chinese system. Finally it would have to give hospitality to the new scientific mentality, in so far as it involves a critical and analytical approach to the world of natural phenomena, and an attempt at deepening thus the understanding of the process of change.

Such a system, such an attitude to life is slowly in the making under our very eyes. It lacks only some basic co-ordinating factors, a larger vision free from European bias, a truly esthetical and creative temperament—and a collective spiritual impulsion which even now may be gathering its momentum out of the collapse of the old European civilization. To the building of such a new world-viewpoint pioneers in practically all spheres of human activity are contributing. Perhaps the term "Holism" is as good as any to characterize this new attitude to life; if the

meaning of the term is broadened beyond General Smuts' definition. have used the phrase "philosophy of operative wholeness." We defined in our last chapter the truly "esthetical" approach to life and its relation to the new psychology, especially as formulated by Jung. We touched in an earlier chapter upon the new attitude of science, whose findings will do perhaps more than any factor toward establishing the new philosophy of living and being. We must mention not only those movements in the field of social organization, politics and jurisprudence which stammer the first sentences of the new human language, but above all the momentous pressure of economic factors, the influence of our machines and our technology which will be the practical determining factor of material changes.

Then, there is the new religious consciousness and the power of movements which deal with Occultism and Mysticism—even Spiritualism. In Alice Bailey's books the characteristics of the new type of consciousness emerging here and there everywhere, and the broadest implications of the idea of group-work on a world-wide basis are stated with unimpeachable clarity. Her study of the activities of what she calls the New Group of World-Servers. even though made on the basis of occult ideas which may disconcert not a few; is a masterly expression of a vision which encompasses the whole of mankind.

What is needed, however, is a simple symbolic presentation of life-principles such as we find in the old Yi-King; a general formula which relates, centers and crystallizes all the new ideas and ideals; which brings to formulation in a new and significant manner the basic forces which in every field seek for a new type of adjustment. Realizing the apparent magnitude of the task it would seem presumptuous even to attempt it. Yet what is more simple than the basic principles of the Yi-King? Our civilization is overburdened with complexities. What it needs is a few simple and synthetizing ideas, which at last can co-ordinate structurally the bewildering maze of our intellectual knowledge. It needs one, or a few, significant symbols to integrate the whole mass of materials, data and sciences which are crowding our encyclopedias. Can such be found, at this present moment? It is hard to say. But we may at any rate contribute a suggestion toward the eventual solution. On the other hand the following concepts will be of essential value to us in determining the bases of astrological symbolism. And let us not forget, astrological symbolism, as symbolism, may yet play a most important part in making concrete and intelligible some of the deepest ideas involved in the philosophy of the new civilization.

Man is unquestionably more perfect in every department. The material of man is of a finer, and more delicate texture. It is more perfect. Man stands erect.

More perfect vibrations enter the form of man, and this gives him the power of speech and a super intelligence. In other forms a full cycle of material and vibrations cannot enter. Man is a brain being.

The ether generates all these conditions that we see in man, and man only is the complete instrument to absorb fully, every department of the physical and spiritual existence.

All material existence must commence from a gaseous state. All spiritual existence must commence from the Creative Vibratory Principle.

The gaseous substance ends in bone for the human. Other solids are of degeneration. The Creative Vibrations end in intelligence for the human. The unit here is more complete.

The more complete unit of man can tap the ether more perfectly and attain immortality. The form of man becomes finer and superior through use. It stagnates and deteriorates through non-use. The immortality of the body and the soul is plainly revealed by the Laws of the Universe. Every physicist and every renowned authority on the subject of man must acknowledge the immortality of the body and the soul of man.

gifts without cost, but knowledge is not one of them. No one can be given knowledge; it must be acquired. And the only method of acquiring it is through a process similar to that which Adam and Eve and their offspring followed after eating of the so-called forbidden fruit. That is, through a wide variety of contrasting experiences.

There is but one basis for consciousness, and that is the perception of relations. Whenever the mind, or soul, is unaware of relations it is in a state of coma.

In order for the soul to be aware of those relations which make it conscious, it must contact relative conditions. Such relative conditions are present only in association with substance. And to the extent the experiences have wide diversity in kind and great range in intensity do they afford the materials out of which knowledge may be acquired.

We can know nothing whatever of coldness apart from our experiences with things which vary in the degree of heat which they possess. We can know nothing of sweetness apart from our experiences with things which are less sweet and more sweet. If we have had some experience with that which is bitter and that which is sour, it gives us a better knowledge of the significance of sweetness when we contact it.

Our knowledge can be widened by reading books, or by hearing of the experiences of others. But this is possible only to the extent we have had experiences of our own, in contact with substance, with which to compare the experiences and information related to us.

Unless in our own lives we have had sorrow, at least in some minor degree, we have no appreciation of what sorrow means to others. Nor do we have a proper knowledge of joy; because there can be no comprehension of joy apart from its relation to other emotional experiences of varying degree of intensity, and especially by contrasting it with its opposite, which is sorrow.

Pleasure is best understood through comparing it with pain, just as white can be recognized by comparing it with the things which are not white. And thus we might run the whole gamut of human knowledge and show that in every instance its acquisition by the individual or by the race is completely dependent upon a variety of experiences with substance.

To the extent the experiences have wide diversity in kind, and great range in intensity, do they afford the materials out of which knowledge may be acquired. Thus the physical conditions under which man commonly lives, and which have been his lot ever since Eve decided the tree of knowledge of good and evil was desirable food, offer the best opportunity which it is possible to imagine, for the acquisition of those experiences that when compared and analyzed become wisdom.

The soul before its incarnation on the physical plane is depicted as Adam, without knowledge of responsibility, and, therefore, in a state bordering on unconsciousness. If it were to acquire that wisdom expressed in the Bible, "And the Lord God said, Behold, the man is become as one of us, to know good and evil," it had to have a broad basis of experience upon which to build. The entrance into physical conditions gave it the opportunity for such acquisition.

We have here, consequently, the answer to the so frequently asked question why man must undergo incarnation in physical form, must work and struggle, must have pain and hardship, and go through other experiences. Without such experiences he could not acquire the knowledge and power which enable him to participate in divine attributes. Such participation is clearly set forth in the Bible when it states that man was made in the image of God.

Everyone, of course, is quite familiar with the story of the immaculate conception, and how the Virgin Mother, warned of the enmity of Herod, fled for a time into the land of Egypt. And a somewhat similar mother was honored in various ancient lands long before the Christian era, and was pictured in the sky. In Egypt, for instance, where she was called Isis, there were yearly pageants in her honor, with processions of virgins who carried sistrums in their hands. These sistrums were of such form that they symbolized the mother principle, which it was the purpose of the pageants and ceremonies especially to honor.

So while as depicting Eve, the mother of us all, the woman in the sky has not always been held in the highest esteem; in the higher aspect which she clearly pictures by possessing the wings of an angel, the Virgin Mother has always been called blessed.

Even the Hopi Indians, in their ceremonial dance to bring rain and assure an ample harvest, do homage to the Virgin Mother in a manner quite similar to that which was the usage of the Egyptians; both peoples undoubtedly deriving the essential idea from a common and much more ancient source.

Certain Indians on the sidelines, all during the dance, shake white gourds filled with seeds. These rattles are identical both in shape and significance with the sistrums used by the Egyptians in their Isis ceremonies.

Furthermore, the Hopi Indian girl of marriageable age wears her hair carefully dressed on either side of her head in a form to represent a squash blossom. Such a flower symbolizes both that she is a virgin and that she has potentialities for motherhood. She is not permitted to wear this distinctive headdress after she marries.



correspondences both to the ancient beliefs and customs on the American continent, and to the constellations pictured in the sky. But on the Queen of Spades, which is the card corresponding to the zodiacal sign Virgo, in addition to the blossom held in one hand, she also bears in the other hand a lighted torch, to indicate that she has conceived by the solar power, or, if you prefer, by the Holy Ghost.

Egypt was ever considered by Bible characters as the land of darkness. And as the seed of squash and bean and corn which the Indian placed in the ground had to remain in hiding for a period before the earth could bring forth, and as the Virgin persecuted by Herod sojourned for a time in the dark land of Egypt, so also the Sun, immediately after its station pictured in the sky by the Virgin, must pass across to the dark half of the year for a time, where the nights are longer than the days.

the history of every event and condition, big or small, happy or unhappy, useful or purposeless.

The cherished idea becomes the controlling purpose in the life of the individual. In their search for gold, the cherished idea of the alchemists was service to humanity. They failed to discover the gold for which they searched, but, dominated by a mighty controlling purpose which took them higher than the discovery of mere metal they discovered things of greater use to the human race: medicines, china, explosives, the laws of nature.

In accordance with your cherished idea which becomes finally your controlling purpose, your life will be one of happy and successful service or unhappy and miserable slothfulness. You are good or bad, worthy or unworthy, gentle or cruel in accordance with your controlling purpose. The frog masquerading as a bird is still at heart and purpose a frog. Peter the Hermit rendered apparent and honorable service to Christianity by his leadership in the first crusade, yet Peter murdered millions of Jews in the name of Christianity. He was a frog masquerading as a bird. His controlling purpose compelled him to wholesale murder for which he won the plaudits of an admiring world, but we individuals of a more advanced Christianity look upon him with aversion and horror, for we do not cherish the idea of murder in our hearts and fail to see how murder under any name can be dissembled as something holy.

Alexander cherished the idea of a world empire of which he was to be sole ruler. His controlling purpose drove him to ruthless murders; it made him a crazy man trying to divide the universe between himself and God. Aristotle, on the other hand, cherished the idea of service to mankind; his controlling purpose compelled him not to acts of violence and murder, but deeds of kindness, and thus he demonstrated his certain superiority over Alexander; for, while Alexander was changing the map of the world, Aristotle was changing the thought of the world.

Nero's cherished idea was for renown and power. In compassing this desire, his controlling purpose drove him to wholesale murders in the name of the

Christian church. Driven by an insatiable lust for power, he caused thousands of Christians to be covered with the skins of wild beasts and thrown to the mercies of ferocious dogs, and while the maddened animals fiercely tore the shrieking victims limb from limb, the bloody Nero, disguised as a charioteer, wandered among his guests and gloated on the terrifying sight. Cruelly and viciously, this inhuman tyrant kicked his second wife, Poppae, to death as she knelt helplessly before him. What, indeed, could have been the controlling purpose of this murderer?

Vitellius has the uncertain honor of being called the most beastly of Roman emperors. His cherished idea was power and wealth; his greatest delight was torturing a victim who had incurred his displeasure. Vitellius conceived the novel idea of giving a great banquet and serving poison instead of the usual fare, and when his guests fell over dying in great torment all around him, his cup of joy was full. On one occasion, he visited a friend who was ill with a burning fever, and with his own hand gave him a cup of poison instead of water with which to cool his parched and burning lips. Two sons who had dared to plead for the life of a condemned father were cruelly executed at the command of Vitellius. To the most terrifying acts of cruelty did the controlling purpose of Vitellius drive him. His death was as violent and bloody as his life. The controlling purpose dictated his dying just as it dictated his living. The soldiers of Antonius stripped Vitellius naked on the street, bound his hands behind him. fastened a halter about his neck and dragged him through a hysterically shouting throng into the forum. His body was spattered with mud and clubbed with huge sticks; rocks were hurled against his naked body and unprotected head. Bruised and bleeding and swollen, he was dragged through the streets and hurled into the Tiber.

No life can be made up of hatred and strife, bloodshed and cruelty and acts of violence unless it is first dominated by ideas and purposes of like nature. The body never moves to an act of any kind until caused to do so by the mind. Every action of life is preceded

by a corresponding mental act, cherished idea, controlling purpose. Every bloody act of Alexander, Nero and Vitellius was preceded first by a corresponding mental act. Every single act of violence perpetrated by these tyrants owes its beginning to the mind of the perpetrator. Unwisely, they expended the energies of their minds in bloody deeds seeking to work out their cherished ideas by murder, and with every crime their controlling purposes compelled them to still greater crimes. Their natural and violent ends were the logical outcome of their controlling purposes serving them faithfully to the last.

It is for you to decide what your controlling purpose is to be; and you had better exercise care in making this choice, for once made, it takes the power out of your hands and propels you to a life of fullness or to death. Choose murder as your controlling purpose, and murder begins at once to control you as it did Nero and Alexander. Your body is matter, and as such is purposeless and without force, but once the mind of you causes power to flow through your body it can at once begin gathering other matter into concrete form as indicated by the thought sent out. If you indicate by thought that your body is to proceed into action that is to destroy the life of another, you have allowed yourself to be dominated by the controlling purpose of murder and will in turn be destroyed by that thought. If you indicate by thought that your body is to proceed to action which will bring happiness into the lives of those touching yours, you have allowed yourself to be dominated by the controlling purpose of happiness. Health, happiness, success, all will come to you simply by choosing sensibly and courageously the purpose which is to control you.

It is the controlling purpose which compels the individual to discern the object and carry it out successfully. Start the power flowing from your mind through your body in ways appropriate to your purpose, and see to it that your purpose is honorable, just, happy, and keep at it everlastingly until this purpose dominates you.
