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

X7 QThe Master Keys of Destiny

V ITHIN our bodies we have four building factors. The first to appear is the urge, or desire to act. We observe this impulse. After observing it, we make comparison, bringing into action the power of perception. Through this combination of rhythmic steps we conquer fear and diffidence, instantly becoming creators. The thought is the motor power for desire. When the thought contacts desire, there is a tremendous force released. This force should be guided, when released, into channels of constructive activity.

Back of every deed lies first, the thought or urge. This thought may be consciously or unconsciously projected by the individual, or it may be consciously or unconsciously projected by an outside influence which registers in the etheric aura of a person. In either case, the result is action.

Every one should learn to check destructive thought projections in their inception, to avoid future disasters in their lives when the time of fruition comes. The time to do this is when the thought presents itself, before it becomes a desire. It is too late to avoid consequences after we have made comparisons. This error is the reason why so many are asking, "What have I done to merit this disaster?"

Watch your *releases*, and guard against destructive results.

To do this, learn the psychology of words. Words that have building powers are *root* words. Express your thoughts in phrases whose association words come from constructive root words.

For example, in "lost out," "lost" and "out" carry a destructive root that blots out the "I." The same thought can be expressed in this way, "I was not successful." "Was not" and "successful" belong to constructive roots, therefore they suggest to the "I" to "try again." "Try again" builds hope, while "lost out" destrovs hope.

The Magic Powers of the Super-Salesman as Analyzed by

EST the reader get the wrong impression concerning the convex profiled Nordic type, as discussed in previous articles of this series, it may be well to point out that the "criminal type" and the "suggestible somnambule" may differ in many physical characteristics from the Nordic norm, or the average individual of that ancestry.

Lief the Lucky, and Eric the Red, who crossed the Atlantic before the time of Columbus, were of that Nordic strain, which has made history. Their blonde complexions, and their convex profiles were indicative of the same qualities that are expressed today in Captain Roald Amundsen, the Arctic explorer.

While Dr. Frederick Cook, the criminal, represents the type below the norm, Captain Amundsen is of the type on the ascending curve of the graph. In other words, the difference between these two daring explorers and "high pressure" workers is indicated by the difference in stability as shown in their individual make-ups.

Dr. Cook was the impractical dreamer, the impulsive and unstable personality, which worked under high pressure, without the forethought or caution necessary for permanent success. Amundsen works with similar aggressive energy, but it is controlled and directed by his Calcium thoroughness and accuracy, and his deep-set eyes indicate balancing characteristics.

Our Nordic is nothing, if not energetic. His lack of pigment in the skin and eyes gives him a certain erethism which enables him to react quickly to light rays. His sense of feeling and hearing are equally sensitive to vibrations of sound and other sources of stimuli.

Under the direct rays of the Texas sunlight, Dr. Cook was stimulated to extreme activities, which took the form of fraudulent promotion schemes. His susceptibility to sunlight or limelight was always his undoing. The sensitiveness of his optic nerves and of his skin enabled him to be abnormally stimulated by bright lights, color, action and movement. He became a "high pressure" promoter of the worst type.

Captain Amundsen's Calcium conservatism keeps him away from the factors which have ruined many Nordic high types.

The anthropologist tells us that our Nordic probably had his origin in Northern Europe, north of the Himalavan mountains. In any case, he has survived best in the more northerly latitudes. In America, he may trace his ancestry back to Scandanavia, Denmark, the British Isles, Holland, or even northern Germany. Central Europe represents more of a mixture of the races.

The type is the most aggressive, the most ambitious, the most practical, the most energetic and the most highly civilized. Below the norm it may become the most superficial, the most impulsive, the most erratic, the least stable and most reckless. Above the norm, it gives us our greatest and most powerful men and women in many walks of life. Examples are such men as Thomas Edison, John D. Rockefeller, Henry Ford, and hosts of other celebrities.

Examples of the type which come below the norm were given in the previous article of this series-men who, like Dr. Cook, have gone to extremes in all that they have done.

The GREAT SIN

What is this "Great Mysterious Sin" of Biblical Fame on which Theologians Disagree —Philosphers Wrangle—and Scientists are Baffled Since Time Immemorial?

I N THE various Gospels we find much concerning the Holy Ghost and the great sin that all are warned not to commit. But these same writers have failed to enlighten us as to who this Holy Ghost is or what the sin could be. Many varieties of opinion are presented by different writers and many viewpoints are to be found in the quotations from the Bible which are here presented. For the benefit of the reader we have grouped them under different classifications.

Is the Holy Ghost the Blood That Courses Through Our Veins?

IN I John 5: 7, 8, we read: "For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost; and these three are one. And there are three that bear witness in earth, the spirit and the water, and the blood; and these three agree in one."

Analyzing the reference, we are led to believe that we have two bodies for one Life, and according to classification by this writer, the Holy Ghost is the blood. In this light we are quite agreed with the statement found in the following reference found in St. Mark 3:29: "But he that shall blaspheme against the Holy Ghost hath never forgiveness, but is in danger of eternal damnation."

This theory is supported by the following reference in Acts 7:51: "Ye stiffnecked and uncircumcised in heart and ears, ye do always resist the Holy Ghost; as your fathers did so do ye." We find added support for the theory in 1 Corinthians 6:19: "What? Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own?" According to this, our bodies being the temple of the Holy Ghost, the great sin would be a sin against the body.

If more argument is needed, the following quotation will give food for thought: "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost." (Titus 3:5.)

The Father in heaven is the spirit on earth; the word in heaven corresponds to the water; the Holy Ghost represents the blood. The washing, regenerating and renewing signifies the cleansing of the body, for the reasons given in Hebrew 6:4, 6: "For it is impossible for those who were once enlightened, and have tasted of the heavenly gift, and were made partakers of the Holy Ghost . . . if they shall fall away to renew them again unto repentance."

We all know the price that is paid for the sin against the blood and how this sin committed in the flesh passes from one to another, and that only by the cleansing and renewing of the blood can one be saved from this eternal damnation.

Various References to the Holy Ghost

IN THIS classification, the office of the Holy Ghost seems to be varied. In Acts 1:2 St. Paul gives the following dissertation to his disciples concerning Jesus: "Until the day in which he was taken up, after that he had through the Holy Ghost given commandments unto the Apostles whom he had chosen," etc. In the eighth verse of this same chapter, continuing, he said: "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you." In this reference the Holy Ghost is described as a channel through which Jesus talked; a medium perhaps—as this passage refers to his talking after his death.

Thus again, the fifth verse of the same chapter relates how the Holy Ghost was something with which one was baptized. A sort of mental power is suggested here, such as spirit or hypnotic power, as it is known today among the one thousand and one cults.

In St. John, Jesus said, "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you."

In this reference, the Holy Ghost is spoken of as a comforter, one who will take away the sting of death. This is a direct statement that Jesus expected to communicate with his disciples after the change called death, identifying himself by reminding them of the things he had said, knowing that this would be very impressive to his disciples who had no understanding of the natural law governing birth and death.

Today these words serve as a record that in those days, as in the present age, the life after death was the big question. Jesus simply made a pact with his disciples to return in his own name to comfort them; therefore we must deduce from this that the Holy Ghost as referred to by Jesus was the resurrected life.

This bears record in the following: "Being grieved that they taught the people, and preached through Jesus the resurrection of the dead." (Acts 4:2.)

It is plain that Jesus was an agitator breaking down the old traditions, an act which always brings hatred, envy and sometimes death to the one who, seeing the Law, dares proclaim it.

"And the Holy Ghost descended in a bodily shape, like a dove upon him, and a voice came from heaven, which said, Thou art my beloved son; In thee I am well pleased." (St. Luke 3:22.) In this reference, the Holy Ghost becoming a dove would indicate that it was without shape, but took form to suit the occasion. St. Luke 12:12 says, "For the Holy Ghost shall teach you in the same hour what ye ought to say." Here we must assume that the Holy Ghost is a teacher who is able to put words into our mind consciousness with power to force speech through our lips.

St. Mark 12:36 puts it in this wise: "For David himself said by the Holy Ghost, the Lord said to my Lord, Sit thou on my right hand, till I make thine enemies my footstool." Herein we find a personality interested in making David's enemies the Lord's footstool. This sounds like politics, or it might be construed to be black magic indulged in by those who were interested in David.

In Acts 5:3 we find a reference that looks like a combination substantiating both theories: "But Peter said, Ananias, why hath Satan filled thy heart to lie to the Holy Ghost and to keep part of the price of the land?" Verse 32: "And we are his witnesses of these things; and so is also the Holy Ghost, whom God hath given to them that obey him." It would also seem from these references that the Holy Ghost was a personality who was interested in real estate; otherwise how could he be lied to and be a witness to Ananias' keeping a part of the price of the land?

In the following passage, the Holy Ghost is presented as something that can be obtained by the laying on of the hands: "He said unto them, Have ye received the Holy Ghost since ye believed? And they said unto him, We have not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Ghost." (Acts 19:2.) These men were devout disciples of John the Baptist. Paul naturally expected them to be filled with the Holy Ghost. Imagine his surprise that John had so neglected this duty. Paul persuaded them to be baptized, after which he laid his hands upon them and the Holy Ghost came on them. (Acts 19:6.)

The Holy Ghost a Breath

A FTER the crucifixion of Jesus, when he materialized to his disciples in their seance rooms, we find this reference to the Holy Ghost: "Then said Jesus to them again, Peace be unto you; As my father has sent me, even so send I you. And when he had said this, he breathed on them and saith unto them, Receive ye the Holy Ghost." (St. John 20:21, 22.)

One must infer by this act that the Holy Ghost is a breath created by the magic words, "Peace be unto you; as my father has sent me even so send I you." St. John makes this clear that Jesus was sent by his Father to them with the commission of bestowing on those whom he chose, the Holy Ghost, with instructions as follows: "Whosesoever sins ye remit, they are remitted unto them; and whosesoever sins ye retain, they are retained."

Thus it would seem that he refutes his declaration made before his crucifixion: "Wherefore I say unto you, All manner of sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven unto men; but the blasphemy against the Holy Ghost shall not be forgiven unto men. And whosoever speaketh a word against the Son of man, it shall be forgiven him; but whosoever speaketh against the Holy Ghost it shall not be forgiven him neither in this world neither the world to come." (St. Matthew 12:31, 32.)

In the following reference we get a glimpse of what might be called an evil influence or an imposter working under the guise of the Holy Ghost; for surely a good influence would not want to deprive any group of people of knowledge which would save them from committing the greatest of all crimes, the sin against the Holy Ghost, as we find was done in Acts 16:6: "Now when they had gone throughout Phrygia and the region of Galatia, and were forbidden of the Holy Ghost to preach the Word in Asia, after they were come to Mysia, they assayed to go into Bithynia; but the Spirit suffered them not."

Those Who Were Filled With the Holy Ghost

IN searching the Scriptures for knowledge concerning the Holy Ghost that we might better avoid the great sin, we find many points of view. In the following classification they were filled with the Holy Ghost, after which they did divers things.

Speaking of John the Baptist, it is said, "For he shall be great in the sight of the Lord, and shall drink neither wine nor strong drink, and he shall be filled with the Holy Ghost even from his mother's womb." (St. Luke 1:15.)

"Then Peter, filled with the Holy Ghost, said unto them, Ye rulers of the people and elders of Israel," etc. (Acts 4:8.) "And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost and began to speak with other tongues, as the spirit gave them utterance." (Acts 2:4.) In this passage the Holy Ghost is referred to as a spirit who knew various languages. This manifestation of spirit power, we find today demonstrated in many of the groups of people under various names; viz., the Spiritualists, the Full Gospel Mission, the Holy Rollers, and many others who claim to have the gift of tongues.

In St. Luke 1:67, we find that John the Baptist's father, Zacharias, was filled with the Holy Ghost and prophesied. And in St. Luke 1:41, 42: "And it came to pass that, when Elisabeth heard the salutation of Mary, the babe leaped in her womb and Elisabeth was filled with the Holy Ghost; and she spake out with a loud voice, and said, Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb."

The Holy Ghost a Gift Sent Down From Heaven

IN the following classification, the Holy Ghost is a gift. "But this spake he of the Spirit which they that believe on him should receive; for the Holy Ghost was not yet given; because that Jesus was not yet glorified." (St. John 7:39.)

"Unto whom it was revealed, that not unto themselves, but unto us they did minister the things which are now reported unto you by them that have preached the gospel unto you with the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven; which the angels desire to look into." (I Peter 1:12.)

According to these records of St. John and Peter, the Holy Ghost is under the dominion of a will not his own.

"God also bearing them witness, both with signs and wonders and with divers miracles and gifts of the Holy Ghost, according to his own will." (Hebrews 2:4.)

The variety of features presented concerning this subject is confusing to the very elect of the various churches.

The only reference to be found where the personality is unreservedly admitted, reveals to the thinking mind a personality thoroughly versed in the laws governing Life as recorded in St. Matthew 1:18: "Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as his mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together she was found with child of the Holy Ghost."

THE writer has no quarrel with those who find comfort in believing the Bible verbatim, no criticism for those who desire to evolve it to harmonize with the present day findings of our more progressive day, and we can appreciate the position of the scientist who is not quite ready to pierce the veil of mystery, yet in all the mass of evidence we fail to find any facts wherein the layman could know what the great sin is, or against what it could be committed.

and civilization make it no longer necessary to exercise great physical strength and speed combined with mental wiliness, quick wit and a secretive, treacherous relentlessness, this type gradually disappears. Some of them who are born in an easy environment use their powers in a criminal direction; while many turn to high-powered executive work, leadership and dictatorship.

Our most dangerous criminals, strongest pugilists and relentless, aggressive business executives belong to this type, also some of our greatest reformers and inventors. Jack Dempsey and Jimmy Britt, pugilists, belong to this type. Billy Sunday, revivalistic whip; Marconi, inventor of the wireless; Irene Castle, noted dancer; John Decker, famous cartoonist; Galli-Curci, the great opera star; and Marshal Ferdinand Foch, are typical Sodium Types.

VIII.

Etheric Body Healing

HE etheric body is that part of the physical which is made up of such fine matter that the keener etheric sight is needed to perceive it. The etheric body is the natural bridge between the astral or desire body and the physical; it is also the link of transmission for the healing vibratory forces, no matter what form they have-drugs, manipulator's aura, thought forms, mantras, chords of music, physical color vibrations, or the chromotherapeutic treatment of an Occultist. The proper vibration gives the proper result.

The etheric body has the form of the physical, which it penetrates and covers; it is transparent and looks like those thin, grayish shadows that we see at twilight. Neither the physical nor the etheric body shows clear color radiations; the further down and out those radiations are sent, the more complicated they become, the darker and duller appears the color.

One of the first observations made by the psychic, when after proper focusing, he becomes aware of having etheric sight, is the peculiar makeup of the etheric body. All kinds of geometrical forms and figures, packed closely together, are seen in it, just as they are seen in snow-crystals under the microscope. By changing the focus, an act of will and of thought, those figures become large or small, approach or recede, exactly as when they are seen in snow-crystals under the microscope, by changing the focus there. The make-up of the etheric body, as well as of the snow-crystals, teaches us this lesson: On the Form side of nature, for our vision, matter is made up of color vibrations, the radiations following strictly geometrical lines in the building of forms. It is only in the gross physical that colors and forms appear blurred, because intermixed; it is there that clear colors and strictly correct geometrical forms are rarely seen. In the physical, everything appears more intricately composite, both as to color and form. Shades of gray and brown are prevalent, such as come

out when pigments of different kind are mixed. Of geometrical figures in the physical body, the oval forms are most numerous as in the vegetable and animal kingdoms, whereas in the etheric body, as in the mineral kingdom, the angular forms —triangles, pentagons, hexagons, squares, parallelograms—constitute the large majority.

On the physical plane, the fundamental figure in the make-up of the vegetable, animal and human vehicles is the oval. All seeds and all eggs, in which the embryonic life is active, are ovals, and composed of oval molecules; the molecules are made up of round atoms, and the atoms are miniature solar systems, in which dot-like electrons dance circularly, spirally, to the rhythm of the One Life. Within the oval forms are the crystalline geomertical figure radiations that make up matter. "God geometrizes, said Plato. This saying is verified on all the planes where there is any kind of matter to visualize.

It is across the etheric plane, through the etheric body, our thoughts and feelings pass to the physical, to express themselves there in speech, in writing, and in various acts. It is across the same plane, and through the same body, sense impressions from the outside reach the inner man, producing feelings and thoughts on the two planes above the etheric. And it is finally across that plane and through that body all healing radiations, whether of drugs, of manipulator's aura, of mantras, of music, of physical or astral-etheric color radiations, pass to the diseased part, wherever that may be, on the lower mental, on the astral, or on the physical plane. The etheric body, the finer part of the physical, is the connecting link between the physical and the astral, as the astral is between the ethericphysical and the mental. Hence it can be said truly that all healing in which the physical plays any part whatever starts on the etheric plane, no matter what the healing method is, no matter whether the healing vibrations reach up to the astral and through that to the mental, or go down into the physical.

IX.

Physical Body Healing

Our physical vision tells us that whatever we see on the physical plane is characterized by color and by form. The forms are many, all of them built up on the seven fundamental ones: the point, the straight line, the angle, the triangle, the square, the curved line and the circle. Here we observe similarities and differences, and we classify all things accordingly. The color combinations on the surface of objects are many; but for ages man has distinguished between seven prismatic colors, seeing among them three primary and four secondary colors. Spectral analysis has verified this classification and helped us to discover the color of all the different substances not only on our own planet, but on all the other celestial bodies in our solar system, including the sun, as well as on all the other suns from which light rays reach us.

People with keener vision, who can also see on the etheric, the astral and the mental planes, perceive the same colors there, but more brilliant and beautiful, the finer the matter of the plane is on which they are seen. They have also observed something else, and quite as important. They have found that color on the mental plane indicates a mental qualification, on the astral a certain feeling, on the physical some ability, some trait of character, made manifest in activity.

When a clairvoyant looks at the finer make-up of a person, at his photosphere or aura, he finds that a sane and healthy individual is in possession of an aura in which there is a harmonious blending of all the colors. If one color is predominant, it will be found that its complementary color is weak and needs to be strengthened, particularly on the plane on which it appears the weakest. The clairvoyant, if he is a healer and has the necessary logical acumen, will also quickly find out that there is a distinct correspondence as well as a keen cooperation between all the planes that his vision can reach, and that while disease may only appear actually on one plane at a time,

pevertheless, it is present in some degree on them all, which is demonstrated when each different plane is roused from dormancy into activity.

Let us first see what a color means on the different planes, and start with *red*. This color vibration indicates on the mental plane strong creative, constructive thought; on the astral plane it signifies strong loving feelings; on the physical plane it shows virility, an activity that spurns laziness, and plenty of haemoglobin. When the red vibrations on the different planes are weak, the *greenish blue* vibration is predominant in the aura and signifies need of more red in the system.

Next in the chromatic scale comes *orange*, which on the mental plane signifies exuberant, joyful thoughts, on the astral plane a similar kind of feelings, and on the physical, robust health. Weak orange vibrations on the different planes give predominance to *sky olue* vibration.

The next color in the chromatic scale. *yellow*, indicates on the mental plane logical thoughts, with occasional glimpses of golden intuition; on the astral plane, love of knowledge and of wisdom; on the physical plane, studious habits and an easy flow of language. When the yellow vibration in an aura is weak on the different planes, *indigo* vibration predominates.

Green vibration in an aura signifies lively, hopeful, helpful thoughts on the mental plane, feelings of happiness and joy on the astral plane, and quick, neatly executed acts, with a body brimful of joyous life on the physical plane. When the green vibration in an aura is weak, *purple* vibration predominates in it.

Blue vibration in an aura indicates on the mental plane faithful, earnest thoughts, on the astral plane, feelings of trust and confidence, on the physical plane, faithful, confident actions and healthy, quiet, steady nerves. When blue vibration is weak in an aura, orange vibration appears to be the predominant color.

Indigo vibration in an aura signifies on the mental plane concentrated, self-centered thoughts, on the astral plane, strong, self-centered feelings, on the physical plane, the absence of internal and external irritations and wounds. When indigo vibration is weak, a certain kind of yellow radiation becomes more prominent in the aura. Violet radiation in an aura signifies on the mental plane devotional thoughts, on the astral plane, devotional feelings, on the physical plane, acts of devotion and of worship, willingness to serve, and fine, healthy digestion in the service of the whole body. When the violet radiation in an aura is weak, greenish yellow vibration predominates.

Causes of Disease

Every effect which takes place in the physical body has a predisposing cause, either through the mental or the emotional body, or both, which cause must have appeared for a greater or lesser length of time before the effect comes forth in the physical body. All those conditions that cause pain and suffering have their starting point in destructive thoughts on the mental, and in destructive feelings, such as anger, hatred, distrust, envy, pride, doubt, dissatisfaction, on the astral plane. Finally they come down into the physical body as disease. Illogical thoughts and faulty calculations, which are wrong acts on the mental plane, cause mistakes, accidents and disastrous happenings on the physical, the results of which are disappointment, suffering, and often dissolution of form.

Destructive thoughts, ill feelings and foolish, hurtful acts are at the root of all diseases of the mind, of the desire body and of the physical body; constructive thoughts, loving, happy and cheerful feelings and sensible, helpful acts are the sources of mental, astral and physical health—the equilibrium, when all the functions act regularly. Health is another name for happy thoughts, feelings and acts in vehicles free from confusion, irritation and pain.

The opposites exist for the sake of equilibrium in the World of Forms, the realm of separation and duality, i. e., in the plane of thought, in the plane of feeling and in the plane of outer form. Without the opposites limiting and defining each other there would be no separate existence of any kind on the different planes. Without sickness, its opposite, health, would not exist as a separate conception or be appreciated as a desirable condition; without health, as a condition to strive for, there would be no elimination of the successively useless elements of thought, feeling and objective matter. And elimination is quite as necessary for existence in the World of Forms as growth.

Destructive thoughts, ill feelings and hurtful acts set up tendencies on the different planes of existence, tendencies which ultimately lead to disease by continued self-propagation until definitely checked, replaced and finally eliminated by constructive thoughts, loving, happy and cheerful feelings, and helpful acts.

The causes of disease are, like karma in general, of two kinds: (1) recently generated, the effects of moral, mental and emotional disharmonies in the present life, and (2) tendencies, brought over from earlier incarnations, susceptibilities to certain forms of disease, which are still unpaid karmic debts.

In Manusmriti, the Laws of Manu, there are mentioned certain causes of disease, which will here be quoted, but with this caution that the book, in the form that it has come to us and been translated from Sanskrit, is an exoteric, not an esoteric work.

Manusmriti distinguishes between mortal sins (Mahapataka) and lesser sins. As mortal sins are enu-merated: "stealing the gold of a Brahmana" (XI. 49) and "stealing a deposit, or men, a horse, or silver, land, diamonds, or other gems' (XI. 58), which is said to produce diseased nails; "drinking of Sura, an intoxicating liquor (XI. 49), "forgetting or reviling the Vedas, giving false evidence, slaying a friend, eating forbidden food, swaliowing substances unfit for food" (XI. 56), said to produce black teeth ; "slaving a Brahmana, falsely attributing to oneself high birth, giving information to the king regarding a crime, and falsely accusing one's teacher" (XI. 56), said to cause consumption; "the violation of a Guru's bed" (XI. 49), "carnal intercourse with sisters of the same mother, with unmarried maidens, with females of the lowest castes, with the wives of a friend, or a son" (XI. 59), said to cause diseased skin.

The lesser sins are said to produce the following effects: "An informer" gets a foul-smelling nose; "a calumniator" will have a stinking breath; "a stealer of grain" will get deficiency in limbs (XI, 50); "he who adulterates grain" will have redundant limbs; "a stealer of cooked food" will be troubled with dyspepsia; "a stealer of the words of the Veda" will be dumb; "a stealer of clothes" will get white leprosy; "a horse stealer" will be lame (XI, 51); "the stealer of a lamp" will be blind; "one who extinguishes a lamp" will be onecyed; "injury to sentient beings" [Continued on page 32]

PROBLEM An actual situation from Child Life

RUELTY is often observed in infants. They seem to take delight in scratching, pulling, tearing and destroying everything within reach. The child seems imbued with a destructive impulse that frightens the mother and causes her much concern.

Indeed, cruelty is so commonly observed in babies that psychologists are wont to believe that cruelty is the outcropping of inherent savage traits that must be conquered by the softening influence of civilization, as if cruelty were an instinctive trait to be throttled by higher forces for good.

I do not believe that the cruelty in a child is instinctive. Whatever is instinctive about it lies in the natural tendency to defend itself against injury. What we call cruelty in a baby is an acquired trait learned entirely from the dear ones who insist upon bothering the child with a thousand and one actions that the child interprets as plain ordinary interference with his comfort.

The baby does to others nothing more nor less than that which has been done to him. He scratches because he has felt fingers all over his body, often hurting him unintentionally. Even the accident of an open safety pin may occur. Itchy clothes, tight clothes and other inconveniences may be thrust upon him to cause pain.

Playing with the baby causes much discomfort in many cases, the child's body being pinched playfully, his hair pulled and his body thrown about more violently than one is willing to admit. All in all, the baby is constantly placed in a position to defend himself against the violent effects reaching him from his environment.

If you stop to think of the type of impressions reaching the child's mind in so many ways that we do not ordinarily observe, you can readily believe that the impulse to injure is in imitation of the family members associating with the child. Remember that the baby may misinterpret playful actions in terms of injury if these same actions cause any intense sensation.

The tendency to tear things apart and destroy them comes about through just such a misinterpretation. A baby may try to tear his clothes off of him because of bodily discomfort. It is then just a step to the idea that other things about him are capable of doing him injury. Besides, the act of tearing things may also imitate similar movements executed by his elders. Another factor is the pleasure gained through the sounds produced by tearing.

Problem

A baby about a year old developed the habit of scratching the face of anyone who came near him. His chief delight came about through scratching the eyes or mouth of the unsuspecting person who happened to be holding him.

Solution

In the solution of this provlem the mother must carefully consider the theory of cruelty described above. Her first thought should be directed toward the underlying causes of this habit. Without a knowledge of the causes, any corrective measures might injure the child's character, even if the habit of scratching were thereby eliminated.

In the above case the mother remembered that one of the favorite tricks practiced on the baby was that of thrusting the fingers at the child's face in a teasing manner. Also, there had been the habit of putting the fingers in the child's mouth, in an attempt to make the baby kiss the fingers. So, the child had learned to do likewise to others.

Naturally, the first step taken was to stop this sort of teasing. All other forms of tantalizing were eliminated. Playing with the child was encouraged in a gentle manner, being careful to avoid any semblance of violence. The new idea consisted of giving the baby pleasure through gentleness instead of playful threats of injury.

The next step was to evolve some form of correction when the child hurt someone. Scolding or spanking would only serve to intensify the idea in the child's mind, adding to it a feeling of hatred for the pain imposed. Slapping a baby for scratching is to assume in turn an infantile attitude. One who is grown up cannot presume to defend himself against an infant with blows.



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

What You Have Always Wanted To Know

A Short ASTROLOGY Story of ASTROLOGY

By DR. C.W. ROBACK

PRODIGIES and miracles, says Rousseau, have always been the most powerful means of civilizing the world; the wisest men have doubted whether, without these auxiliaries, it would be possible that laws or durable institutions should exist.

An impartial survey of the history of mankind from earliest traditionary records to the present, in relation to the influences of Astrology, must impress this truth deeply on the mind of every observer.

Proof of celestial influences has always existed in the natural world, though generally unobserved except by votaries of science.

"Change or removal," says Locke, "of any orb, although incomprehensively distant, would cause things to put on a very different appearance."

If celestial influences govern the planet on which we live, and are capable of producing health or disease, as they are directed among the human family, the truth of astrology is established without any further evidence.

We have said that astrology was an inductive science, and now proceed to give a simple illustration; if, during the existence of this science from the time of the Hebrew patriarchs to the present, individuals born when Mars was in the equinoctional sign Aries, have been subjeced to correspondent fortunes and occurrences in life, and individuals born when Saturn was in the zodiacal signs Capricorn and Aquarius, have been subjected to circumstances in life totally different from those under the influence of Mars, yet corresponding to each other, the evidence tends to establish astrology as an inductive science. We say, therefore, that every condition of man (his disposition, habits and fortunes), is indicated by planetary influences existing at the moment of his birth.

The science of astronomy, universally admitted to be one of the certain sciences, owes its existence to astrology; the division of the heavens into their respective constellations, and the nature and laws of the planets of the first magnitude, preceded a knowledge of astronomy by many centuries.

Until the termination of the 16th century, astrology and astronomy were undivided. They are, in fact and in purpose, inseparable—and as such we shall consider them.

The undeviating principles upon which the science is based, are demonstrated in the certain calculation of eclipses; not only in the predictions that the sun and moon will be partially or wholly darkened, but in the positive and never-failing announcement of the exact point of time at which the eclipses will occur, and the degree of shadow which will be thrown over the orb of day or night. It has determined the size and figure of the earth, the measure of the year, the longitude of distant lands, and safe courses for the mariner through the trackless paths of the ocean, amid the storms and tempests which frequently convulse it.

But we proceed to describe the solar system as first taught by Pythagoras, confirmed by Galileo, Kepler and Descartes, and finally established by Newton.

The sun, in the commencement and early periods of the solar system, was supposed to be fixed and immovable in its orbit, but modern discoveries have proved that it revolves on its own axis from west to east.

Planets of the first magnitude, which move around the great luminary by their centrifugal force, and are held at certain and undeviating distances by his centripetal force of attraction, are Mercury, Venus, the Earth, Mars, Ceres, Pallas, Juno, Vesta, Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus, or Herschel; they revolve at unequal distances, in the order named, from West to East.

To this first order of planets, is attached a secondary system, termed satellites, which moves around the primary or larger planets, in a corresponding manner to that in which the latter pass around the Sun.

The Moon, the satellite of our earth, moves around it in twenty-eight days, forming the lunar month. Jupiter has four satellites; Saturn seven, and Herschel six.

The motion of the primary planets is regulated by a universal law, which dictates that the squares of the periodical times of the planets are to each other as the cubes of their mean distances from the Sun; a corresponding relation exists between the primary planets and their satellites.

The Moon being a dark and round body, is luminous only in appearance, her light is borrowed from the Sun and reflected on the Earth.

When in her revolution, she is placed between the Earth and the Sun, or in conjunction, she is said to be new; her enlightened side is towards the Sun, and our planet does not experience the influence of her beams. In a short period, she appears like a hollow half circle, which gradually fills up until the whole of it becomes illuminated towards the end of her first quarter. In her second quarter, she is exactly opposite to the Sun, or at her meridian, it is then full Moon.

From this period, as she revolves, she becomes more shaded from the Earth, until returning again to her original condition between the Earth and the Sun, or in conjunction, her light is again hidden from us.

The shepherds among the mountains of Asia-particularly in India, and subsequently in Ethiopia-having from the nature of their employment, scarcely any objects to contemplate other than the heavens, which was their only canopy by night, divided the starry firmament into various clusters or constellations, typical (as their imaginations directed) of some object, animate or inanimate.

Its History and Its Influences

The heavens were thus figuratively divided into three parts; first, the Zodiac (from *zo-on*, an animal), a large circle embracing the orbits of the planets and our satellite, the Moon; in its center the ecliptic, dividing it into North and South, in the northern side of which are placed twenty-one principal constellations; on the southern, fifteen.

The observations of astrologers are limited to twelve of these constellations, six being on either side of the ecliptic.

The twelve signs, denoted above, were originally believed to correspond to the twelve months of the year. Ancient astrology has invested them with the power of directing some of the natural laws of the animal kingdom in each succeeding season; thus, when the sun enters the sign Aries, the lambs follow their dams; then he is seen in Taurus, when, under natural expectancy the cows bring forth their young; when in Gemini (in former periods of time represented by two kids) the goats produce their offspring; the fourth sign, Cancer, designates a shell-fish that crawls or goes sideways and backwards; it is placed in the northern solstice, or north of the ecliptic where the sun retrogrades from the north to the south to show the period of our longest days, as day gradually decreases after he has left his greatest northern declination.

Leo, the lion, a furious and ferocious animal, signifies the extreme heat of a tropical sun when he enters this sign of the zodiac.

Virgo, the maid or virgin, designates the approach of harvest, or ripening of the grain, which takes place when the sun enters this sign; it was in former times represented by a maid dressed as a female reaper grasping an ear of grain.

Libra, the balance, and Scorpio, the scorpion, are supposed to designate autumn, prolific in fruits and diseases; the former furnishing, in her profusion of ripe and unripe fruits, the causes of disease; the latter represented by one of the most venomous among animals stretching out his destructive claws-the sign of impending mischief, and waving his tail as if in gladness at its completion, denoting the later portion of autumn, and the succeeding unhealthy period of the YCAT.

Sagittarius, the archer, represents the fall of the leaf as the period when the hunter (the archer in former times) issues out in pursuit of his game; this constellation was formerly designated by a huntsman with his arrows and club.

Capricornus or the horned goat, the token of the southern solstice, when the sun has attained his extreme southern point, is beautifully adapted to show the ascension of the sun to the north of the ascension of the sun to the north of the ecliptic, the well-known character of the animal being that of climbing—or of browsing as it ascends the mountain's acclivities. Winter, with its rains and general humidity, is represented by the southern constellation, Aquarius. The former representation of this sign was the figure of a man pouring out water from an urn. Pisces was originally shown by a figure of two captured fishes connected by a string; the moral of the connected by a string; the moral of the sign is, "the severe season has passed; though your flocks, as yet, do not yield their store, the ocean and rivers are open to you, their inhabitants are placed within your power." The northern and southern signs are opposite to each other in their signs are opposite to each other in their respective successions (as Arries to Libra; Taurus to Scorpio; Gemini to Sagit-tarius, etc.), a circumstance of infinite importance, and which should be per-fectly known to the astrologer in casting a celestial theme of heaven, as the horo-neares of a kirch are other unmerichly songe of a hirth or other remarkable

Descriptions of the astrological signi-ficance of each of the twelve signs of the nodiac have been and are being given by Haasan Osiris, and readers are respectfully referred to them for reference.

But we may describe briefly a few of the planetary influences. If, for example, Saturn is malignant in aspect toward the fortunes of men, Herschel or Uranus is peculiarly unfortunate, and when brought into opposition or action with other planets in casting a nativity, is equally evil as Saturn is unfortunate: the com-bined malignant influences of Saturn and Mercury are scarcely equal to those of this distant planet.

Byron's description of Manfred, in the poem hearing the same name, seems to furnish a fine illustration of the peculiar influences of Herschel at the hour of

The virtues and vices which pertain to this constellation, are equally furcible and prominent; strange, unaccountable, eccentric, original, romantic and unset-tied, the passessors of the physical and mental elements indicated by Herschel,

can neither be personified nor imitated by those not possessing them; like the sun in his orbit, they are alone and unapproachable.

Jupiter is equally powerful in the pro-duction of good, as Herschel and Saturn are in the creations of evil; the uncon-trolled elements of his nature, arefreedom, confidence, generosity, benevolence, charity, universal good-will, dignity of character, and nobleness of disposi-tion; he is the reverse in everything of the more malign planets; to be born under his direct influence is like the land of Goshen amid the plagues of Egypt, being preserved from the general contaminations of mankind, their crimes and sufferings.

His natives form the most useful and happy members of the human family, at once loving, and almost universally beloved.

The fiery anger indicated by the ap-pearance of Mars is significative of his human influences; those indebted to him for ruling at the hour of their nativities have an unrestrainable desire to be in quarrels and mischief of every descrip-tion; they are unyielding, vicious, rude and savage. "The bitterness of their wrath is cruel." They demand universal homage and submission; thieves, high-waymen and murderers, belong to this planet.

The moral and physical influences of the sun over nativities, when not coun-teracted by the evil aspects of surrounding planets, denote a disposition of the highest order, noble and magnanimous, proud and exalted, but humane; a true friend and a most generous enemy, scorning to use accidental advantages over a foe, usually having few words, but pompous and gorgeous, fond of dress, ornaments, and decorations of all kinds, and especially of costly jewels and splendid attire.

If the sun be ill aspected, it betokens that the native born within its influence will be arrogant and submissive, a despot vet a sycophant, with all the evil qualifications which belong to this condition of character.

This planet is most materially altered in natural indications by the zodiacal position which he occupies at the periods of nativity; thus, in the watery signs, Cancer, Scorpio and Pisces, he is immeasurably less fortunate than when in the signs of Aries, Leo, and Sagittarius, or even in Libra or Gemini.

even in Latra or Gemini. The sun is said by the ancients to rule the heart, back, arteries, the right eye of a man, and the left eye of a woman. His diseases are faintings, palpitations, deranged brain, disorders of the mouth and there exists and throat, etc.

Venus, the next in order to the sun, is the only planet to which the ancient poets have done honor, in personifying her as the friend and patron of the softer passions; among them, particularly, that of love.

Antiquity places her among the most auspicious stars, and modern astrology has confirmed the justice of this pre-eminent position; those who are for-turnately horn with this planet in the superior angles, are, as they ever have been, noted for emimence in the polite annals or scientific arts of the times.

If this planet, at the period of nativity, he well dignified or well aspected (the terms are indeed synonymous) the temterms are indeed synthymous) the tem-per will be quiet and placid, engaging, sweet, merry and cheeriul; the manners and motions will be unusually graceful; the natives will be amateurs in music, drawing and the accomplishments gen-erally-but if the aspect of Venus be

evil, those born under her direct government will be the reverse of all that is virtuous-lewd, profligate and lascivious; she is said to rule the reins, spine, generative system, neck, throat and breasts.

Mercury, the smallest of all the primary planets, revolves the quickest in his celestial orbs; he can be discerned only before sun-rise in the morning, and for a short period after sunset in the evening-being so near the sun as to be generally eclipsed by his superior splendor; the ancients term him the "swift mes-senger of the gods" from the rapidity of his ascension towards the sun.

This planet, the most minute among its fellows, has been singularly placed by the ancients, as if to prove the truth of astrology, so as to hold a conspicuous station in the judicial portion of the science; he is said by them to rule the intellectual and reasoning faculties; if imagination or whim had formed the basis of astrology, this planet, almost invisible, would never have been stationed as the chief ruler over the mental powers; some more majestic and visible planet would doubt-less have been assigned the honorable position.

Mercury is said to preside over the brain, tongue, hands and feet; his distempers are madness, apoplexy, vertigo or dizziness, stammering, coughs and gout, or rheumatism; the enemies of this planet are Mars, and the sun and moon; his friends Jupiter, Venus and Saturn. The moon attached to our earth as a

satellite or inferior planet, the principal source of her evening light, by reflection of the rays transmitted to her by the sun, is a cold, watery, moist and phlegmatic planet; exceedingly variable in astrolog-ical science in her influences on men and mundane affairs as she is in aspect with good or evil stars.

In her unfettered condition in a nativity, she is the herald of constant success and continued good fortune through life; she produces full statute, pale and fair complexion, round face, gray eyes, short arms, thick hands and feet, with corpu-

lent and phlegmatic physical system. When afflicted by evil solar influence, the result will be weakness of sight, blemishes in the eye; conjoined with Jupiter, she is exceedingly fortunate, and is said to govern the brain, stomach, howels, etc.

Her diseases are rheumatism, consumption, palsy, cholic, apoplexy, vertigo, lunacy, scrofula, small-pox and dropsy. Her exemits are said to be Saturn and

Venus; her friends, the sun, Jupiter and Mercury.

The natural and astrological connection existing between the planets, the houses of heaven or the signs of the zodiac, and the astrological effects of the varied celestial houses, is so intimate, that we shall extend our remarks further than we originally purposed, to display at one view the whole of the elements which form this combination, and the limited effect arising therefrom.

The first house, or that of Life, the points of the eastern angle and horizon, touches a line, or imaginary line, level with the horizon when the sun first rises at dawn of day.

at down of day. The stars and planets placed within this house, exert a most powerful effect on the future life and destiny of the indi-vidual whose horoscope it constitutes. Saturn or Mars, within this house, never fails to denote sickness and acci-dents. Jupiter and Venus in a similar position, insure freedom, good forume and lasting success it is of the masu-line evelor, and rules the head and fare Time gender, and rules the head and face us the sign Aries. PERSONAL MAGNETISM.



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BeaRealLeader MENTAL FAMILIARITY

THERE is no truer saying than "Familiarity breeds contempt." Much of the trouble between married couples and the lack of respect of children for their parents is due to familiarity, not necessarily physical familiarity, but mental familiarity. Few people really think, they permit their minds to stagnate and grow dormant and eventually they become set and inflexible, and they use only one of their many mental phases. Their families and associates become accustomed to that one phase, and in time become so familiar with it that they expect nothing else and lose respect to a certain extent. Many cases of domestic differences have been settled by a change of location or a change of position that compelled a mental change.

The child soon tires of one thing and the adult mind is not so different from that of the child that it may remain satisfied with the same thing over and over. It requires some change, however slight. The universe is forever changing and life itself is the result of incessant change.

A business begins to go backward as soon as the minds in charge begin to lie dormant and fail to keep abreast with the times. Customers are merely human beings with purely human characteristics; they demand some change to hold their interest. The success of civilization always has been dependent upon the evolution of the human mind. The changes must be moderate and be kept within bounds for the erratic individual who is forever changing with no idea of stability cannot hope for success. Too radical changes bring about a chaotic condition. This is true of nations as well as of individuals. For instance, Russia laid practically dormant for many years and suddenly underwent so complete a change that she lost her equilibrium.

In the individual it is not meant that he should attempt any radical or revolutionary changes but should keep mentally awake and use every phase of his mind, so he is able to see all sides of a question and is able to realize his potential abilities.

Undue mental familiarity is inevitable unless one compels himself to do some original thinking. One whose mind is habitually quiescent becomes like the monkey, an imitator, merely imitating himself. It is an established fact that a man soon tires of a woman who is slovenly and careless of her appearance, but not nearly as quickly as of one who is slovenly in her thinking. No degree of physical fastidiousness can make up for mental inactivity, or degeneracy of thought. That is as true of man as of woman, and it would be a wonderful step toward advancement if men and women would realize that each day has a bearing on the future, and that each day spent without some mental activity is lessening their chances for permanent happiness.

The great beneficial characteristic of work is that it compels more or less thought. Of course, too much activity causes fatigue, but even fatigue is better than inactivity, for when the mind recovers from the fatigue, it is stronger for the activity. Mental activity overcomes that "ever present" trouble. By the term, "ever present," I mean, too close association of families or people otherwise thrown together where the tendency is for one to follow the other in thought, and to discourage original thinking. It is well for people to be apart at times. How true is the old saying, "Absence makes the heart grow fonder." If it is not possible to be apart physically it is possible to be apart, at least, mentally. This point is well illustrated by the story of the old farmer who spent a few days in the city, away from his wife for the first time in thirty years. On his return she asked him what he saw. "Gosh A' Mighty Mandy," he replied, "I seen so much thet if I started in to tell you all of it we wouldn't hev no time to fight fer a year."

Too close association blunts the sense of appreciation. The Palisades along the Hudson, to the man who sees them every day, are merely rocks. The Grand Canyon is merely a rocky gorge, to the natives who have seen nothing with which to compare it, and who are accustomed to seeing it. The tourist who was enthusiastic over the wonders of Niagara Falls turned to an old native who stood close by quietly smoking his pipe. "Isn't it wonderful?" exclaimed the tourist. "Huh!" ejaculated the old native, "don't see nothin' so wonderful about it. There ain't nothin' to stop it from fallin'."

There are so many instances that bring to mind the passage from Gray's Elegy, "Many a gem of purest ray serene

In the dark unfathomed caves of ocean bear.

Many a flower is born to blush unseen And waste its sweetness on the desert air."

Many wonderful intellects are allowed to smother under the cloak of laziness and inactivity, needing only a little prodding, a little prick of adversity to make them set about to free themselves. Many more are allowed to die for the want of a little appreciation, a little encouragement to help carry them over the hard places.

Habits of mental slothfulness are easily formed for every imaginable form of amusement, entertainment and light fiction is provided to entertain, and to relieve the mentally lazy of the necessity of exerting their minds, even for their own amusement. It is said that five per cent of the people do ninety-five per cent of the thinking. If this is the case, a large per cent of the people must expect to be dissatisfied and to suffer from mental familiarity.

The mind of the child is unusually active and finds something to do, and to think about continually, provided it is allowed to develop normally, and its little mind is not molded along the lines of some adult mind, grown stagnant. Unfortunately it is often the case that the parents imagine they are infallible, and they attempt to force the mind of the child along certain indefinite lines without taking the trouble to learn exactly what they want, and consequently they fail. The child not only becomes unruly, but is robbed of the natural freedom and sweetness of a child. They would do better to stir up their own minds and make them keep apace with the mind of the child rather than to attempt to stifle the natural activity of that mind.



of Nordics, is found the man with many typical characteristics, among which are the aggressiveness and energy that give us our "high pressure" salesmen and promoters.

Such an example may be found in the such an example may be found in the personnel of any great enterprise, where stock selling is done according to "high pressure" methods. The sales manager is a driver, rather than a leader. He sends his salesmen out into the field, filled with such enthusiasm that they try to carry everything before them.

Shortly before the war, there was evolved, by a "high pressure" man, a system of selling named "the one-call system."

The idea, in brief, was to give a pros-pect "the rush act," to overpower him by sheer force of words and enthusiasm, and, if he failed to buy, to threaten him that the "opportunity" would never again be offered to him.

Without realizing it, the inventor was working on the theory that if a sufficient among them would be a proportion of highly suggestible individuals who would be swept off their feet. He called it the operation of "the law of average."

The system worked. The men who used it most successfully were of the "high pressure" type. The only trouble was that the business itself was con-ducted under "high pressure," and when the pressure grew too great, the enter-prise blew up.

Meanwhile, the hundreds of men who were introduced to the system by the selling organization, started similar sell-ing-campaigns of their own, or went with other firms. In two years, dozens of stock-selling organizations were oper-ating along the same lines and the sys-tem became an American institution.

Today, if you are approached by a "one-call" salesman, study the type.

You will find that he is of Nordic an-cestry, as a rule. He has the convex profile, the large or turned-up nose, the prohie, the large or turned-up nose, the width between the ears, and he usually is blonde in complexion. His eyes are restless, and he breathes a large amount of oxygen. Quick in thought and speech, he will have a command of lan-guage and an enthusiasm, which, if you are not careful, may induce you to be-lieve that black is white.

Now, restless energy, enthusiasm, quickness of thought and speech and similar characteristics may be very desir-able qualities, when balanced by other fantors

Even the extreme profiled type, if he has other balancing qualities, such as the osseous body structure, a reddish color to the hair, or a dark complexion, with the eyes deep set, may be a very high type of individual. Whether one agrees with his ideas or not, there is much to

Billy Sunday is an excellent example of the "high pressure" salesman. His energy and aggressiveness are among the qualities most marked, and whether or not you agree that religion should be sold under high pressure, the fact remains that Sunday does it.

Whether or not you agree that habit-ual criminals should be denied their

freedom, by putting them under high bonds, Judge Lyle, of Chicago, believes it, and with Nordic aggressiveness, em-phatically says so. The Judge may be an extremist, in the minds of many peo-ple, and he has some of the characteristics of the man who works under high pressure, but the pigment in his hair indicates that there is a modification there that should save him from the faults of the type below the norm. He has earned the title of "the Red-Headed Terror," but if he were an extreme blonde with protruding eyes, he might be called worse names than that.

It is the same kind of energy and aggressiveness that makes the successful salesman who consistently breaks records. to is Nordic in its nature, and is not found, except at intervals, in the dark-complexioned type with the deep-set, brown eyes, and the concave profile.

Sometimes the profile of the successful "high pressure" salesman may be plain. But you will usually find that he is speeded up, if he has the blue or pro-truding eyes, the light complexion, or the large nostrils and plenty of chest development.

The that there will be plenty of oxygen. human furnace is no exception, and, physical energy comes from the heat that is generated in the body, the subject of breathing is one of particular importance.

The "high pressure" salesman gets plenty of oxygen. His physical make-up is such that he takes in the air efficiently, is such that he takes in the air efficiently. He usually has a generous mouth, and the bridge of his nose is nearly always large and wide. His chest expansion is large, and the body of this type is better developed through the shoulders and chest than in most people. He breathes rapidly, sucking in the oxygen in large amounts. amounts,

Many times the "high pressure" type is a fat man, with the above physical make-up. He moves much more rapidly than other stout men, is more verbose and is combative, rather than suave or diplomatic.

This Oxygen Vital type tends to judge everyone by himself, particularly if he has the typical Nordic skull. This kind of salesman rarely goes back to a cus-tomer the second time. His enthusiasm leads him to frequently oversell a pros-pect. Or, if the customer fails to buy at once, this type does not want to bother with him. He would prefer to go out and approach a new prospect, "cold turbow" turkey

He does best working with boom propositions, such as real estate, oil stock, or speculative propositions that a cus-tomer buys only once from him. His tomer buys only once from him. His enthusiasm and fervor often lead him to overstate his proposition, so don't put him to work on customers with whom you

may want to deal regularly. The "high pressure" salesman does not believe in any other method of selling. He is quite sure of himself and his system, for it usually proves very profitable to him. However, it is not likely to be quite as satisfactory to the customer.

The average sales manager looks upon this type of salesman as a marvel. He considers that the "high pressure" man

has some mysterious gift of the gods. There is no mystery about him, when one understands his physical make-up and its influence upon his thinking and acting. If he must a brink thinking and acting. If he gets plenty of oxygen and the right chemical diet, he has the energy to keep going, and he will find a certain proportion of highly suggestible people who will be overwhelmed by his methods. Shut off his oxygen and he loses his power.

Jack Dempsey, the pugilist, recently had his nose operated upon, as it had an obstruction which hampered his intake of air. Dempsey says that his energy and endurance have increased tremendously since the operation, and undoubt-edly many people might be speeded up by the same method.

The "high pressure" salesman frequently suffers from high blood pressure, due to his habits, and experiments are being conducted with a diet of liver to relieve this condition. Iodine may also be of value in the diet. Thyroid disturbances are not unusual in the type.

Properly balanced in business with his complementary type, the "high pressure" man does a wonderful work in selling and promoting, but without balancing factors, he may do more harm than good. Proper environment, the right climate, and the proper application of psychological principles can do much to regulate our friend, who really has no secrets from the man who understands human analysis.

BROWSING AROUND By E. M. K.

Of new books there are many, but this month a few older friends engross our principal attention. Older, that is in the sense that their ink has had time to dry, and they have passed already through the fire of the first reviews of other reviewers.

Man is the topic of them all. Either man physical, as in the medical works of Dr. George Starr White, of which more hereafter, man spiritual as in Charles Gray Shaw's philosophical treatise, man in the more or less "altogether" of Albert Edward Wiggam's NEW DECALOGUE OF SCIENCE, man astral in a number of works on stellar lore, man mystical as in Frater Achad's "PARZIVAL," and, of course, man mental in the psychological treatises. Like Job, or whoever it was that originally made the exclamation, we propound that man is truly "wonderfully and fearfully made!"

was that originally made the exclamation, we propound that man is truly "wonderfully and fearfully made!" In THE VALUE AND DIGNITY OF HUMAN LIFE, as shown in The Striving and Suffering of the Individual, published by The Four Seas Co., Charles Gray Shaw has attempted one of those metaphysical speculations which propound a very nearly impossible question, and proceed to give it a very nearly impossible answer. The present state of man, practically speaking, is not so very high. The organism is imperfect, the phenomena so varied and the apparent aims so diverse that the search for a common denominator of human progress is, based purely upon the requirements of collecting data, a physical impossibility—and naturally, therefore, a mental impossibility. We are still in that period of development when the collection of highly specialized data with reference to very limited aspects of man employ all of the talent and energy of our best researchers.

The attempt at synthesis upon the basis of their findings, which is more or less what Mr. Shaw has undertaken, and in a mold already cast for him, as he acknowledges, by Prof. Rudolph Eucken, is—again of necessity—incomplete and dissatisfying. Dogmatism is convenient or irksome, depending upon the cast of one's mind. The only dogma of science is that there is no dogma. And the disconcerting instability left by this sweeping iconoclasm results in much of the laborious effort which modern psychologists and philosophers put forth to avoid any appearance of this sin. One feels the great strain under which Mr. Shaw's brain labors in reading his book, and, sharing it, one lays it aside with a wish that this excessive laboriousness might be overcome, the point arrived at, and the statement made either fearlessly or entertainingly. A monk or a professional philosopher would certainly be able to get at the book, but I find myself as laboriously trying to say something about it as Mr. Shaw, so I turn with pleasurable relief to an author who attempts no less pretentious a program than Mr. Shaw, but who succeeds immeasurably better in conveying both the magnitude of his subject and its relative place in the life of the reader to those fortunate enough to come in contact with his book.

I refer to THE NEW DECALOGUE OF SCIENCE by Albert Edward Wiggam, published in a very readable and good looking octavo by Bobbs-Merrill. He deals with the ethical challenge of the present, and proceeds in a reverent though almost breezy manner to give five timely warnings as to imminent racial dangers, and then, pointing to the ethical transition which has taken place through the establishment of the scientific laboratory, he issues the ten commandments of science. These, he conceives to be, the duty of eugenics, the duty of scientific research, of the socialization of science, of measuring men, humanizing industry, preferential reproduction, trusting intelligence, art, internationalism, and philosophical reconstruction.

Benergy and the second struction. Each of these "commandments" is elucidated, and made clear to even the tired comprehension of a book reviewer, and only the necessity of pointing to other works prevents this reviewer from devoting the whole of his space to a praise of the usefulness, the brilliance, the clearness and the entertaining style of Mr. Wiggam's book. Suffice it to say that all leaders and most followers should read it.

We are also in receipt of an interesting brochure from the Roycrofters, looking to the same general end, but pointing specifically the "UNITY OF THE SCIENCES, SPIRITUAL AND PO-LITICAL" being a treatise by Julia Goldsier on the relationship of religion and economics. It fits in well with the "third commandment" of Mr. Wiggam's decalogue.

Also, Super-Science, Inc. sends us a smaller brochure dealing with "MAN'S DEVELOPMENT ON THE PHYS-ICAL, MENTAL AND SPIRITUAL PLANE." It propounds a few rather startling conceptions, such as the alleged fact that "the SOLAR PLEXUS is the medium through which the SUB-CONSCIOUS or SUBJECTIVE MIND gets its knowledge."

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

1925 marks the eighteenth crusade of the Red-Cross Tuberculosis Christmas Stamp with an expected sale of 1,250,-000,000 seals in a united effort to raise \$5,000,000 to carry on a national fight against tuberculosis.

On Christmas eve, 1903, Einar Holboel, a Danish postal-clerk, originated the penny-sticker idea which has saved thousands and helped millions of human lives, but we must credit Jacob Riis, while Editor of *The Outlook* in 1907, for telling the story of its Danish success that prompted Emily P. Bissell, a Red Cross worker, to first adopt and Americanize the tuberculosis seal. In 1908, the American Red Cross "nationalized" it, arranging in 1910 with the National Tuberculosis Association to manage its sale. In 1919 the American Red Cross withdrew, transferring its exclusive rights of sale and use of its doublebarred "Red Cross" to the National Tuberculosis Association who today, with 1,400 local affiliated agencies, carry on its annual sale independently.

For the love of little children, pity that helps those who suffer, and good citizenship in the uplift of humanity and the health of our country (our nation's health record is a disgrace to civilization) the Christmas Seal is the one stamp of universal brotherhood that practices what it preaches—the conservation and perpetuation of human life!

ly. It is a fact that there is a larger demand for books on character analysis today than there has ever been, and therefore this spur to your inclination.

The writer, suspecting himself of being a phosphorous type is now proceeding to function according to Hoyle—or Rocine —and "stop a sustained effort" right in the middle of it in order to set forth a notice of the publication at Biloxi, Miss., by W. R. Carter, of a brochure (We seem loaded with brochures this month!) entitled REVELATIONS OF MAN'S DESTINY BY FORMER MORTALS WHO TRAVEL TOWARD THEIRS. One of them, incidentally is FIATISI, formerly a mortal woman but now "Assistant Ruler for Jehovah in Far Off Heaven" who tells us that the rib story was not, in every sense, correct. Then there is MENNENISTES, now "Ruler of a District in Heaven," who also testifies with reference to the general destiny of woman, "AN ANGEL OF HEAVEN WHO LOVES INFANTS" who describes the care of babies who die in their infancy and a number of interesting reports on OETA the ALMOST PER-FECT HEAVEN by HE WHO LEADS, I HAVE SPOKEN, I HAVE SAID, and A FORMER MORTAL WHO IS NOW ALMOST PERFECT IN HEAVEN. Altogether, the booklet is well worth sending for.

Slightly more pretentious is "UN-FOLDMENT" published by the Rochester Home Betterment Club, and following the general lines of the newer "psychological development" organizations, it presents its happy ideals in beautiful, well chosen and understandable English. Barring the fact that it credits a jest to Douglas Malloch which thirty years ago was told of Horace Greeley by some one else and retailed by Eugene Field in Sharps and Flats, it is accurate, too. It is a genuine tonic for tired minds and a beacon of hope for many whose needs are answered in its philosophy. These same things are true of "RADIO TALKS ON CHARACTER ANAL-YSIS" by Alma Thompson Leaverton, these being condensations of the Rocine material.

In these days, meaning of course, the particularly current passages of the calendar, when the output of occult literature of more than ephemeral value seems so slight, it is gratifying indeed, to those who have a fondness for that type of opus to come across Frater Achad's "THE CHALICE OF ECSTACY." The book purports to be a representation of the "inmost secret of PARZIVAL," and to have been written by "A Companion of the Holy Grail." Undoubtedly both claims are manifest.

Undoubtedly both claims are manifest. Even those whose familiarity with the things of the Temple is largely confined to gleanings gathered up as crumbs from those who have passed the portals, know the signs—and the signs are many and unmistakable in this work.

The evident sympathy of the writer for the literary and musical symbolism embodied in Wagner's "great work" proves him a student, and his keen analysis of their spiritual and occult import stamp him as indeed "a companion of the Grail."

Filled with profound scholarship and the wide range of familiarity with kindred philosophical systems, as would be expected of the erudite Adept, the allusions are nevertheless not beyond easy comprehension to all genuine students of the occult, which enhances the pleasure to be found in reading the book. It is handsomely printed and bound, and is a credit to its publishers, the Yogi Publication Society. Frater Achad is to be complimented. So are those fortunate enough to secure and read his book.

Of an almost purely medical cast, but stated so that they may be readily comprehended by laymen, are the works of *Dr. George Starr White.* One of the three at hand is the second edition of "THINK," a breezy mixture of medical advice of a homespun and therefore valuable type, and epigrams and aphorisms which the good doctor has collected with an appreciative and discerning eye. A second, "YOUTH OBTAINED AND RETAINED" deals with color-therapy and is at once authoritative and interesting. The third, on PROSTATIC DIS-EASES is chiefly notable for its good common sense.

But, where the good doctor has slipped, gone astray, askew, fallen into sin, committed assault and battery not to say mayhem and nigh murder, is in his selection of a reformed spelling in which to promulgate his ideas. It takes not less than a Spartan soul and a courageous mind to plough through a prejudice against reformed spelling as deep as mine.

To hand also is an extremely well written and clearly stated booklet on "HOW TO HAVE HEALTH," by Lillian De Waters, which is a real stimulant to one's "cosmic urge," whether one agrees with the emphasis which is given life on the mental plane by the writer or not. Its hypothesis is the supremacy of mind over matter, and the securing of health through a right attitude of mind, and is at once a brief, thorough, clear and entertaining thesis on this subject. It is worth perusal not once but frequently.

From the same author comes a more spiritual document, stressing the kindred approach, that of the spiritual understanding, in a seven-topic book on the attainment of perfection, titled "THE FINISHED KINGDOM." It is not less well written than its smaller companion, and consistently urges the centering of the attention upon the idea of perfection in a spiritual sense as a means of achieving it in the physical.

The author of the foregoing two, also sends us the key to her philosophical system in "Our Sufficient Guide," a more positive expression than either of the foregoing, and which sets up the Bible seen from the author's viewpoint—as the sole necessity for the achievement of the desired end of perfection. Ralph Collier Wright really hands us

Ralph Collier Wright really hands us a surprise. In a handy little volume, "THE SOLUTION OF THE HEALTH PROBLEM IN A NUT-SHELL," he handles the subject literally with both hands full. *Abas*, medicine; avaunt, ye ologies and isms, for verily, saith this author, the two hands are all the materia medica needful, and their application the only therapy! This reviewer can remember when the application of only one hand, and that one occupied with holding a hairbrush was at once a physical and a moral agent. But even that well remembered touch was not sufficient to ward off later ills, also both moral and physical. Yet, we feel sure,

had our parent perused the pages of Mr. Wright, we would never have gone wrong! The proper application of the human hand to portions of the anatomy which are given as the seat of practically every affection classified as an illness, is held by Mr. Wright—and others—to be the surest, quickest and safest method of treating disease. And while this idea tickles the risibilities of this reviewer, it is well to bear in mind that a sense of humor is not always good sense even when it is a good sense of humor. There may be more in this idea than is palpable at first examination. We do not intend to belittle the theory—nor any other theory. But we cannot resist the temptation to stop awhile, in this sometimes hum drum task, and fill again our sinful pipe, and meditate upon the manual applications which have been ours in the past from well meaning parents, teachers, deacons, neighbors, and . . .

If Mr. Glenn Andrews Kratzer, who appears to have written on practically every phase of occult thought, never achieves honors for anything in the way of belles lettres, he nevertheless deserves a more than modest palm for the optimism, and open-mindedness of his compilation published under the title of "THE INTERPRETIVE SCIENCES." Nowadays nearly every proponent of occultism stresses indirectly, the infallibility and perfection of his or her own particular brand, with the sometimes more than patent implication that the rest is all a species of celestial blah.

This is not Mr. Kratzer's attitude, and his book, which sketchily makes clear the philosophy of more than a dozen systems of occult thought, practice and divination, has done a pocket work of genuine value to the researcher in these by-paths of thought. His book is published by the Universal Life Institute, which title is probably more fitting than that of many more pretentious and less helpful institutions. The booklet is informative, concise, and helpful.

So is SAM BARTOLET'S ALMA-NAC AND EPHEMERIS FOR 1926, now off the press and available. Besides the ephemeris, it contains an interesting scriptural chronology, weather tables, lists of feasts and a host of succinct bits of occult information of value, and often needed as references. Every occult student should have one.

O. B. L. or THE BRIDE'S RECEP-TION, a Short Cabalistic Treatise on the Nature and Use of the Tree of Life, with a brief introduction and a lengthy appendix. By Frater Achad. (Collegium ad Spiritum Sanctum), \$10.00.

The Children of Israel have given the world not only three religions, but also the philosophy of Qabala. This philosophy, symbolized by that Tree of Life, which we call the *Ten Sephiroth*, has been eagerly studied by some of the deepest minds ever since its first publication. Those Sephiroth included Macrososmos and Microcosmos, starting with *Kether*, the Crown, the direct radiation from *Ain Soph*, invisible and boundless, and ending with *Malkuth*, the Kingdom, visible and circumscribed. They are ten, because that is the Number of Perfection. Perfection means *Synthesis*, without which *Thesis* and *Antithesis* stand there fighting each other, getting nowhere.

This book is no mere copy of what other cabalists have written about the Tree of Life. Its author, Frater Achad, with his deep insight into cabalistic lore, is an independent thinker, and his intuition has helped him to visualize many new truths and facts. If his fine pictures of the *Sephiroth* in this book are compared, for instance, to that in *Liber* 777, it is easy to see the difference. This book is a gern of bookmakers' art and of cabalistic insight. Even a mere *Tyro* in *Cabalism*, like the reviewer, can see it.— *J. B.*

THE EGYPTIAN REVIVAL, or The Ever Coming Son in the Light of the Tarot, by Frater Achad. (Collegium ad Spiritum Sanctum), \$5.00.

When we first read Sepher Yetzirah, over forty years ago, and compared the thirty-two "Paths" there described with the "Paths" between the Ten Sephiroth on the Tree of Life, and saw how they were reproduced in cabalistic books, we found so many seeming discrepancies that we gave up that study. All the authat we gave up that study. An off au-thorities wanted us to go down from *Kether*, whereas we wanted to go up from *Malkuth*, and start there, to get to the Crown as soon as possible. We ex-pected, of course, that the light (*Ain Cohe Aue*) should meet us from above Soph Aur) should meet us from above, so that we could see the Path and climb the Jacob's Ladder. Some of our friends hinted that the Tarot cards perhaps would give us the clew. But there are unfortunately different kinds of Tarot cards, with figures that seemed arbitrary and symbols pointing in wrong directions. Not having the original symbols, we did not make any attempt at connecting the Tarot and the Ten Sephiroth. But this is what Frater Achad now has done. His book is very interesting and ought to be read by all lovers of the occult. If they know something about the subject beforehand, they will learn much more about it. And if they do not, but are willing to learn, they will gain in knowledge by reading this book .- J. B.

THE SOIL AND CIVILIZATION, by Milton Whitney, Chief of the Bureau of Soils, U. S. Department of Agriculture. (Van Nostrand), \$3.00.

The Library of Modern Sciences, to which this publication belongs, is so well known that to mention this fact is a splendid recommendation in itself. The author, an expert, here tells us the influ-ence of the development of agriculture on human progress. He discusses brief-ly the important soils of the United States, gives valuable facts about soil control, and permits us to read some very interesting chapters on the history of agriculture and its practice in various countries, both ancient and modern. Avoiding technical terms as much as possible, the author has given us a popularly written book that will be of importance to all who are interested in agriculture first and foremost, but besides this to everyone who wants to trace the progress of human evolution from the time of cave dwellers and shepherds to that civilization of ours, which would be annihilated in the destruction of its foundation, agriculture.

In Genesis we read that the first shepherd, Abel, was killed by the first agriculturist, Cain. Nowadays agriculture and cattle-raising, fraternal activities, do not kill each other, but cooperate, like true brothers.—J. B. [Cont. on page 40]

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
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History and Influences of Astrology

The second house in order from the ascendants, is the house of Riches. This signifies the pecuniary fortunes whether in houses, lands, or gold, the gain or loss in business; poverty, misfortune, and everything which bears any relation to silver or gold, or the "world's wide wealth" of him for whom the figure or horoscope is cast.

The third house is that of family connections and friends; of letters, messages and rumors.

The early astrologers from this house formed their judgment respecting family relatives of the person for whom the horoscope was desired, born under any particular sign, with the fate whether good or evil, appertaining to them.

When evil or unfortunate stars are in their revolutions located in this part of the zodiac, evil effects will necessarily follow; thus, when Saturn is there, hatred is found to exist among brethren. Herschel being in a similar celestial position, never allows the native to repose long in the same place, or to meet with an appropriate and mutual affection from his kindred-but Mars situated with an evil aspect in the third house, is the demoniacal genius of all that is evil in the relations to that house.

The lower angle of heaven whose line the sun touches at midnight, is more feeble in influence than any other angle throughout the celestial circle, and is termed the fourth house; this house exerts a special influence upon all ques-tions which affect the private enemies of children. It is represented by the sign Cancer.

The fifth house bears an extended rule over various events; the astrological judgment in relation to the children of the inquirer or native, is deduced from this constellation. It is also the house which more immediately affects the destinies of women, and the real and per-sonal property of fathers; all questions in which gaming, theatres, banquets, etc., are involved, are answered from this house

It points out the death of monarchs, the journeys of religious persons, etc. The fifth is a masculine house and rules the stomach, liver, heart, sides and back. The sixth house is of evil aspect; it portends sickness and secret enemies. It

is a feminine house, similar to Virgo. The seventh house being the point of the horizon where the sun sets, is indi-cative of important events in astrology, being paramount over wedlock and con-jugal happiness. If the evil planets Saturn or Mars should occupy this house, the legitimate dwelling of Jupiter, and is not counteracted by the mild beams of Venus, the native will assuredly be un-

fortunate in wedded life and in continual turmoil and trouble.

It is the oracle of love, duels, war, the describer of thieves, their persons and occupations. It is a masculine constellation, similar to Libra. The eighth house is important in its

astrological significations; the answer to inquiries in relation to wills, legacies, adversaries, friends, and success in life, are answered from this house; if Jupiter or Venus are in this constellation, the native cannot die a violent death.

It is a feminine house, similar to Scorpio.

Questions in religion, science, learning, books and travels are answered from the ninth house; it belongs especially to the church and pastors, to dreams and visions. It is a masculine house, like Sagittarius.

The tenth house being the point of the heavens where the sun reaches his meridian, denotes honor, credit, authority, preferment and trade. Jupiter, Venus or the sun, in this house, designates great eminence in life; while gloomy and malignant Saturn in a like situation, when not opposed by more benevolent stars, augurs disgrace and ruin. The Duke of Wellington was born

under the benign influence of Jupiter in the tenth house-while the conqueror at Jena and Austerlitz, the subsequent exile at St. Helena, Napoleon, was born under the evil influence of Saturn, in the same house; splendid illustrations of the accuracy of astrological predictions!

It is a feminine house, similar to Capricornus.

There is a remarkable unanimity of opinion between ancient and modern astrologers in relation to the important astrological influences of the eleventh house. From this house all questions are answered in relation to friends, wishes, hopes, flatterers, favorites and desires. If this constellation in horary astrology be infested with evil planets, the inquirer will experience severe disappointment in reference to the object of his inquiries.

It is a masculine house, like Aquarius. The last house within the range of our description is the twelfth. This constellation is especially the house of private enemies, anxiety, suffering, imprisonment, and all the miseries to which flesh is heir. In horary astrology, it denotes sorrow, unceasing persecution, self-mur-der, assassination and envy. It is like Pisces, a feminine house.

We have now described sufficiently for the general reader in the elementary principles of this science, the signs of the zodiac, the primary planets and the houses of heaven, with their separate and combined influences over the affairs and fortunes of men.

VIVISECTION AND THE PUB-LIC CONSCIENCE, by John Sturgis Codman, Boston; New England Anti-Vivisection Society.

The booklet is a published address of the author, in which he defends certain activities of the Society. He approaches the subject of animal vivisection as a moralist, rather than a scientist, condemning the autocratic attitude of the medical profession and protesting at the methods used. He also takes up specific cases of human vivisection in which experiments were conducted upon found-lings, orphans and destitute children.— C. W. C.

HUMAN VIVISECTION AND THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSO-CIATION, By John Sturgis Codman, Boston; New England Anti-Vivisection Society.

A second edition of a booklet, the first edition of which was sent to members of the A. M. A. in Massachuşetts, "with small encouragement," according to the preface. The first half of the pamphlet discusses the position of the A. M. A., while the second half is embodied for reference and vertification of the Society's findings. The discussion has to do with the "unjustifiableness" of such procedures as Tuberculin Tests, Molluscum Contagiosum Experiments, Lumbar Puncture Experiments, and certain experiments with the brain in a living body. The author seems particularly careful and accurate in presenting his data.— C. W. C.

FOOD, ITS SELECTION AND PREPARATION, by Dr. Leon Bourgonjon, Los Angeles, California. The Author. \$1.00.

With the field of dietetics submerged beneath a flood of "cook books" ad nauseum, fanatical diets, and high brow what-not, Dr. Bourgonjon's little book comes as a relief to a long suffering public. Written in lay language, with a scientific background, the book gives the impression of having been written by a physician whose knowledge of technical chemistry has not obscured his common sense realization of the need for something brief and practical. In less than a hundred pages, the writter has presented many of the important facts of diet, most of which should be taught in the public schools.

Valuable charts are included, but he ignores caloric charts as being without value. Superfluous discussion of vitamines is avoided and particular attention directed to the mineral salts in food. One only regrets that the author did not go a step farther and point out the relation of these organic salts to the various types of human beings as has been done in biological chemistry. As it is, the reader is obliged to accept the one general program for all types, when we know that "what is one man's food may be another man's poison."—C. W. C.

GOITRE, BEWARE OF THE KNIFE, by J. D. Levine, Chicago. The Author. 50c.

Dr. Levine offers five causes of goitre. They are inheritance, auto-intoxication, fecal infections, injuries to the cervical nerves, and sex disturbances. One is led to wonder if the learned doctor has not neglected to mention the mental causes of such gland disturbances, due to his enthusiastic pursuit of the objective causes of disease.—C. W. C.

WOMAN AND THE NEW RACE By Margaret Sanger. New York: Eugenics Pub. Co.

The 6th Edition of this splendid work by this pioneer in Woman's rights has an introduction by Havelock Ellis.

Fearless, inspiring and highly practical in her principles, as they appear in this book, Margaret Sanger should have a monument erected to her and her work. The book will serve many and the coming generation will owe her a debt of gratitude that can never be paid.

Her constructive ideas on the limitation of offspring will startle conventional puritans of limited vision, but her pitiless criticism of present laws, customs and prudery operates like a surgeon's scalpel, cutting through the putrid mass of ignorance and superstition, disposing of the bigotry of the Church, the stupidity of legislatures and sex complexes of neurotic reformers.

Mrs. Sanger metaphorically sews up the flesh, applies the necessary medicine, and directs the way to social health. Unfortunately, she is "unable" to publish the most important part of her knowledge, but the organization which she directs grows and increases in its service to suffering women.

This book is recommended to every man and woman who is not afraid to face the realities of life.—C. W. C.

CHEMISTRY IN MODERN LIFE, by Svante August Arrhenius, Director of the Nobel Institute, the Swedish Academy of Sciences. Translated from the Swedish and revised by Clifford Shattuck Leonard, Ph. D. (Van Nostrand), \$3.00.

The world-renowned name of the author of this book tells us beforehand that *here* is a true record of what modern chemistry *is* and what it has done for modern life. Professor Arrhenius, internationally known as one of the greatest authorities in the science of chemistry and the science of physics, and director of that Nobel Institute which yearly distributes the Nobel prize for chemistry of about \$45,000 and the Nobel prize for physics of the same sum, is indeed well worth listening to, for we know that he is an authority of the highest rank in his sciences. His translator has evidently done his work well also; being a scientist himself, he is the proper one to undertake such a task.

We have here the romance of chemistry's contribution to human progress. This romance is written so that even a layman can understand. Technical terms have been either avoided or explained, and facts are here presented which everybody in our enlightened age ought to know.—J. B.

THOU ISRAEL, by Charles Francis Stocking, E. M., Chicago: Maestro. \$2.50.

The author dedicates this novel to "one so 'clothed with the sun' as to fill his life with radiance—his wife." This is a gracious dedication, 'as Mr. Stocking thereby puts Mrs. Stocking in the same category as Dr. Anna Bonus Kingsford in England and Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy in America, who both claimed to be the "Woman clothed with the Sun" in St. John's revelation.

Throughout this novel he claims that womanhood is the best channel for the divine, and he is particularly anxious to indicate the *fempinity* of God, together with the *masculinity*. He avoids calling God *our Parent* and says Father-Mother instead, which from the spiritual point of view seems rather superflous, if God is a Spirit, and consequently sexless, as the author often reminds us in his book.

a Spirit, and consequently sexless, as the author often reminds us in his book. As a motto for his Prologue, Mr. Stocking quotes from Fichte: "Nothing is but God, and God is naught but Mind. Darkly the veil of things rises before me, 'tis mortal mind." In the Hindu Adwaita philosophy, of which this is a reflection, we learn also that nothing exists but God; but there He is not identified with mind, Manas, which is a much lower emanation, through which He acts. Paul, quoting a Greek poet, said in his speech on Mars Hill in Athens: "In God we live, move and have our being." This admits our own existence, too, in God. And if we live, move and have our being. Or else, why bother to mention us at all, if we are nothing?

The phrases "mortal mind" and "communal mortal mind," are often used by the author. In philosophy this phrase of the mind is usually called "concrete mind," as it has to do with the concrete, that which we call material. The author tells us repeatedly that "mortal mind" is the "mist" spoken of in the second chapter of Genesis, the "serpent" that deceived Eve, the "liar from the beginning" in the words of Jesus, and he compares it to the "suppositional opposite" of Herbert Spencer. Now that God is all and "communal mortal mind" is entirely outside of God, together with matter, which is nonexistent, Mr. Stocking tells us that belief in this "nothing" is exceedingly dangerous and leads to sickness, poverty and death, whereas we will have plenty of everything, excellent health and will never die, if we do not believe in the existence of matter, but have perfect faith in the doctrine that God is all.

That simple faith can cure is a wellknown fact, demonstrated not only by Jesus and his apostles, but in all countries and all ages of the world. Such faith cures are mentioned in this novel also; but the author does not admit any other method of cure but that which denies matter and disease. And this cannot really be a cure; for how can anyone cure a sickness which does not exist at all?

matter and disease. And this cannot really be a cure; for how can anyone cure a sickness which does not exist at all? The author proclaims a theory that the English and the American people are physical descendants of the lost tribes of Israel, Ephraim and Manasse, and that they are going to purify the old religion of Israel. He says that the world war broke out because the Germans believed in the reality of matter and in the "animal magnetism" of their countryman

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
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
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
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
