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Personal Magnetism.

The sun is potent, above all other material agents, to impart magnetic force. It is well to allow the sun's rays to fall directly upon the head, face and all sections of the body whenever it is convenient so to do. Then if proper attention is given to correct breathing and diet we surround the body with a wall of defence which disease can never break through. In winter we should be especially careful regarding these apparently simple rules of health. Few people have grasped the importance of this one question of breath. Few people take the trouble to actually fill the lungs once in a month. They breathe merely to live and never consider that it is possible to greatly increase their life forces through so simple a means. Usually the upper sections of the lungs are employed, utterly to the neglect of the extreme lower parts. The "breath drill" is a branch of West Gate teaching which really requires little time or attention. A good plan is to practice it when walking. Breathe regularly and deeply and make the breath co-incide with a certain number of steps. ample: If you are walking at a moderate pace take one inhalation while going five steps; then hold the breath for two steps, then make the exhalation while taking five steps, then hold the breath two steps before commencing the "drill" again. The number of steps should be regulated to suit each individual's lung capacity. By practice great increase in lung power will develop. In my own case I can easily take a dozen steps while inhaling once,

but those who have not made a practice of this drill will do well to take five steps, or even less at first, for each breath. If these simple rules are followed carefully the function of breath will soon regain its normal condition and we shall need give no further voluntary attention to the matter. In these exercises let all the breath pass through the nostrils. Magnetic force is also generated through self-massage of those parts of the body which ordinary exercise does not reach. For example, take the section between the shoulder blades. By patient practice the tips of the fingers may be made to reach this entire section and a new quality of life-force thrown into the tissues and nerves heretofore unknown. Also pass the hands rapidly back and forth over the spinal column, especially at the small of the back, where the exercise always tends to give tone to the vital organs, as the kidneys, liver, etc, All these physical exercises which bring the muscles of the waist and back into action tend to impart grace, strength and symmetry. And the few moments night and morning necessary to devote to them will soon become the brightest and most interesting spots in the daily life.

The January Stars.

Now let us enjoy the beautiful winter constellations. January 10th, at 8 o'clock, p. m., we shall see a most remarkably brilliant display. Sirius, the "dog star" (most dazzling of them all) is just coming to view in the southeast; Procyon, the principle member of Canis Minor, is seen well up from the eastern horizon; Regulus and the other stars of that famous group in Leo known as the "Sickle" are slowly climbing up from behind the northeastern horizon; then, in order, following the path of the ecliptic we have Cancer, Gemini, Taurus, Aries, Pisces and Aquarius, the latter nearly hidden beneath the north western horizon. The bright Milky way now passes almost straight across the heavens from south east to north west.

Almost overhead, in the path of the Milky Way, we note the well known groups of Auriga, Perseus and Cassiopeia, while low down in the north we perceive the cross of Cygnus Orion, with its rich display of stars, clusters and nebulæ occupies a broad section of the southern heavens. As is well known to most people the three bright stars in the centre of this constellation mark the "belt" of this mighty hero, and this belt shows us the imaginary line known as the celestial equator. There will be a new moon upon the 3rd of January, and it will be in conjunction with Venus, the brilliant evening star, upon the 6th, at 2 o'clock p.m. The moon will be in conjunction with Mars Jan. 14th; with Jupiter the 21st and with Saturn the 27th.
