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### ANNUAL MEETING OF UNIVERSITY CORPORATION AND COUNCIL.

The Annual Meeting of the Oriental University Corporation and Council, at which all University Officers, Professors, and Graduates have a vote, will be held at the University Hall, 1919 Penna. Ave., N. W., Washington, D. C., in accordance with the By-laws, on the third Monday in March, the 17th, 1913, at 7:30 p. m. We hope that all who can attend, also from out-of-town, will do so, as important business is to be transacted. Propositions to be acted upon at this meeting should reach the President or any other Trustee at least two days before the meeting. (By-laws Art. 9.)

### WHAT ARE YOU DOING FOR THE TENTH ANNIVERSARY JUBILEE FUND?

Very little has been heard at the University Onice about raising funds by our friends. We are sure that so many of them are acquainted with practical plans of raising funds for similar purposes that we trust such plans will be speedily executed for the benefit of the University, which as they believe, is truly worthy of such support. Now is the time for all good people to come to the assistance of the great cause of the Oriental. There are more than 500 friends of this work. 100 could, perhaps, raise each \$100; 100 could, perhaps, raise \$50 each; 100 could, perhaps, raise \$25 each; 100 could, perhaps, raise \$12.50 each; and 100 could, perhaps, raise \$6.25 each. This would make a total of \$19,375 to be raised during this year. Perhaps, there is someone who is wealthy and donates \$625. so that a Jubilee Fund of \$20,000 may be raised. This sum of \$20,000 would be a great help to the University and would start our work in Los Angeles, Cal., properly, although it is not nearly enough for buildings to be needed soon. Now, get busy, friends! A part of the year is already gone. Where there is a will, there is also a way. Do you have the will to help? Then find the way! You will surely find it, if you are in real earnest. The money is greatly needed, and only you, dear friends of the Oriental University, can be expected to raise the funds. Please let us hear from you soon. Under great privation and opposition we have reached the tenth year of this school. The expenses are growing, and we need financial assistance even for the current expenses. We are continually handicapped, and the remuneration of those who work continually at the University is a mere pittance.

### GREAT LOSS TO THE UNIVERSITY OF A SINCERE FRIEND.

The Oriental University mourns the great loss of its Honorary Vice-President, President Dr. Manuel E. Araujo of the Republic of El Salvador, who died on February 10th of the wound inflicted by an assassin, February 4th. President Araujo was a great scientist and one of the best rulers any country has ever had. He had done much for his nation, and his people adored him. His memory will be sacred, like that of President Lincoln of this country. The last words written to President Holler, of this University, received only several weeks before the sad occurrence were: "1 shall always be ready to serve you gratefully in my particular sphere, for the benefit of the elevated purposes of the noble Institution which you direct and represent with such dignity. My esteemed friend and colleague, please accept my personal appreciation and affection." We weep for our honored friend. May his released spirit speedily advance into the higher realms of divine life!

### THE THEOMONISTIC ASSOCIATION.

WHAT IS THEOMONISM? Theomonism is monistic theism, the scriptural monotheism wrongly changed by priests and dogmaticians, against true revelation and reason, into the unsupportable trinitarianism which has no foundation in the original Bible-text. Theomonism is a living religion emphasizing the fact that God reveals Himself today just as much, if not more, than in the past, through media (formerly called prophets). Theomonism is a religion that is truly scientific. It grows by inductive comparison of material phenomena, by deductive reasoning on the basis of well-known facts. and by intuitive perception in accord with philosophy and science. Theomonism teaches that there is one only personal universal Supreme God of the Universe, Eloah (the worshipful God), or the macrocosmic absolute God, the Creator and Lord of the Universe, represented to the Earth as Jehovah (or Jahve), one of the Elohim, or gods, whose name means "he who is," i. e., he who makes the existence of the supreme Deity real to the The Elohim are supposed to have emanated from Eloah. From Jehovah was Earth. derived the only-begotten divine son, the true Adam (first or perfect man), who reincarnated for the salvation of the race of which he is the progenitor. Jesus is the only Christ or chosen anointed priest, prophet, and king, the great mesocosmic mediator between the macrocosmic God and the microcosmic human beings. Theomonism teaches that personal and universal life is strengthened and sanctified, as well as continually elevated by the divine universal sacred spirit-power of God, which spirit is no person in itself, but a power of the personal God for the personal human beings, which is strongest in the highest heaven spheres. Theomonism teaches that words alone are of little value in religion. Deeds are absolutely necessary to prove our faith in God and our love for mankind. Traditional creeds and ceremonies become easily fossilized and life-less. Religion is a personal affair of the soul with God, and men have no right to judge or hinder the free growth and expression of this union of the souls with God. Those who wish to communicate with saintly spirits in heaven, and who can do so under proper protection and guidance, should never be discouraged in such intercourse which at all times has given great purity and intensity to the lives of the children of God on Earth. Theomonism, while

acknowledging that it is most difficult to separate the tares from the wheat, until the great harvest, and that ascetism, celebacy, and monachism, are very seldom conduc ive to higher morality and the salvation of the world, holds that the children of God, nevertheless, have a right and duty to combine by themselves into co-operative societies, not only for religious communion, but also for social, economic, educational, and political protection and progress. Theomonism is the true psychic religion of modern times, giving wisdom and consolation to a restless and materialistic race, on the basis of true revelation in the Bible, which is at last to be turned into more general practice, believing that right thinking must cause right living. Theomonism abolishes the prerogatives of human priests, rulers and laws, as far as opposed to the principles of truth and love. All degrading influences, poverty, slander, and bloodshed it seriously aims to counteract by preventive methods.

II. HISTORY OF THEOMONISM. The main principles of Theomonism are as old as the world, because Theomonism is what God has aimed to impart into mankind from the beginning. Its fuller glory appeared in the teaching and life of Jesus Christ, our elder brother and spiritual guide, whose nature is most compassionate and pure. Theomonistic tendencies appear more or less pronounced and powerful in the Monistic Emanistic Gnosis, of Clemens of Rome (100 A. D.), Valentine (140), and Karpokrates (150); the Origenism of Origen (185-250) and his followers: the Oriental and Gothic Arianism of Arius (who died 336), and Apollinaris (370), the Semi-Arians (320-450), and the Gothic Bishop and Bible-translator Ulfilas (312-331); the Kabbala; the Socinianism (1550-1800) of Socinus, Servet (who died as a martyr of Theomonism through the intrigue of Calvin), Schlichting, and many others. But the first attempt to systematize, purify, and modernize Theomonism was made by Helmuth P. Holler, in 1907, in his little pamphlet "Theomonistic Theology" (30c). It has gone on a quiet mission, and has been well received. But now is the time to start Theomonism as a world-wide movement, for it is greatly needed everywhere. Let now every child of God become a member. Registration fee, 50c.

III. MODE OF ORGANIZATION OF THEOMONISTIC MOVEMENT. There is to be only one great universal, non-sectarian, and international religion, with present headquarters in America. Circles and Assemblies are to be organized everywhere, which will be known as "Theomonistic Societies." There will be no paid priesthood, though spiritual leaders and missionaries. As little as possible is to be spent on buildings and outward property, but as much as can be collected by free-will offerings for the amelioration of suffering everywhere.
