ALUMNI AND ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION OF ORIENTAL UNIVERSITY.

Constitution.

Name—The Alumni and Alumnae Association of Oriental University. Purpose—To unite all graduates of Oriental University, and to support the work and spread the fame of said University.

By-Laws.

Officers—There shall be a President, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Librarian, who shall be elected annually, and who shall live at the seat of the University.

Members—Admitted are all male and female graduates who have studied at least six months in connection with Oriental University, whether in residence or by correspondence, and who have earned at least a Bachelor degree at this or any other school of good standing.

Fees—The annual fee shall be \$1, half of which shall be paid into the University Treasury; the balance to be used for the Association.

Local Charters—Members shall organize local centers anywhere as soon as ten members are so located that they can attend meetings con-

veniently. Addresses of graduates who are not yet members, for purposes of extending this Association, may be obtained from the Recording Secretary of this Association.

Annual Meeting-The annual meeting shall be held on the second

Monday in June, at the headquarters of the University.

Privileges—Individual members, local centers, and the whole Association have been granted the privilege by the Board of Trustees of the University to petition for changes of or addition to the by-laws of the University Corporation, to suggest improvements of whatever nature, and to vote on questions which may be submitted to them by the Board of Trustees or the Faculty. The management of the Association shall be entirely free from interference by the University authorities, so long as no conflict with the charter, the by-laws, and the principles of the University can be proven.

WHAT WE SHOULD DO.

Considering the fact that at present about 400 students graduate each year from Oriental University, it is obvious that all too few of them are joining our Alumni and Alumnae Association. There are also some of the members who have not yet paid their annual fee. Some have paid for the first year, but have not sent any money after that. We have received in all only \$20 in fees, which, of course, is not sufficient to pay even for printing this Bulletin, and no part can be paid to the University Treasury.

We have also not heard of any organization of any local centers.

When we read how much the alumni of other Universities are doing for their Alma Mater, we are ashamed that not more is done by the graduates of our world-renowned University. Some of our graduates are not only of great influence but possess also wealth.

As is well known, the Board of Trustees of our University has issued a call for helpers to collect an endowment fund of \$1,000,000.00. The Board is especially relying upon the co-operation of the graduates, and is now urging our Association to take up this matter most actively.

What shall we do?

The Officers of this Association have duly considered the matter, and are making the following suggestions:

(1) Let every graduate of the University pay one week's income to the Fund.

(2) Let every graduate hand at least 10 endowment fund circulars, to be obtained from the University office, to well-to-do honest and progressive people with a request to assist Oriental University.

(3) Let every graduate, as far as possible, put a little slip in with his or her letter, drawing attention to the good work of Oriental University and the endowment fund to be raised, asking for help. Slips furnished by the University.

(4) Let every graduate who has access to periodicals, publish articles or notices about the University and the endowment fund.

(5) Let every graduate become a member of the Alumni and Alumnae Association, pay five year's membership in advance, ask for names and addresses of graduates in his vicinity, and start or help a Local Center of our Association, and let such Center do all that it possibly can do, to help raise the endowment fund.

Large funds are also needed for new buildings for the University.
