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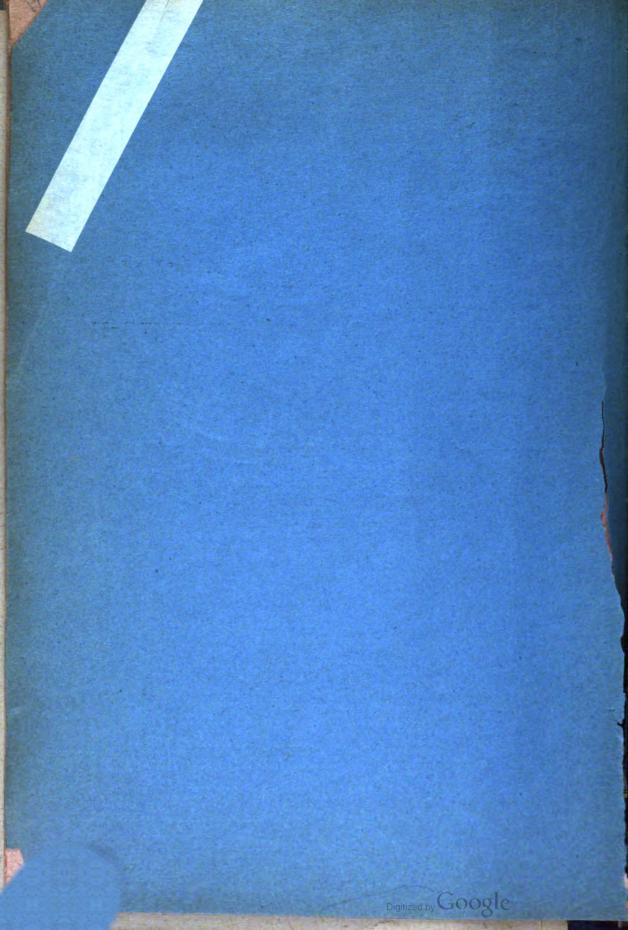

# Dreams That Come True

#### Part II.

#### The Dream at Patac-Amaya.

The year 1898 was spent almost entirely in the field, as my husband was determined to investigate ancient ruins all around the base of Illimani, the southernmost pillar of the beautiful chain of the Bolivian Andes. Our trip had been very eventful from the start and it seemed as though every Thursday was doomed to bring us some mishap. Fortunately nothing very serious happened, although on the very first Thursday, the day we left La Paz, our headquarters, a friend of ours, who accompanied us and who wanted to be with us for about three days, fell from his horse, broke his arm and dislocated one foot. On his account we were forced to remain at the countryplace of a friend from La Paz and lost some very valuable time, awaiting his recovery. And in the meantime, my poor husband, trying to jump a wide watering-channel on the grounds, sprained his right foot and had to be carried to the house on a stretcher. Thus I had, for a time, two invalids to take care of. After a couple of weeks, our friend, seeing that he did not readily recover, left with the doctor for the city and we continued our trip, only to meet with a whole chain of . other accidents, happening, curiously. always on a Thursday.

I shall not enumerate them all, but one of the last ones was so serious and could furthermore have had such tragic consequences, that I shall mention it briefly.

We were traveling downwards through the valley of the Rio de la Paz, turning westward at the entrance of the Luribay River into the former, in order to regain the high plateau South of the city of La Paz, when at the countryplace of some friends, where we remained for a couple of days, two great big watchdogs attacked our good four-footed companion Pluto, a brindle bull. It was early in the morning, and I was not yet fully dressed. My husband, fearing that these enormous beasts might prove too strong for our Pluto, although he very well knew how to defend himself, jumped right in between the fighting brutes and was severely bitten in hands and arms. The consequence was that he could not travel for another two days and when we finally were forced to leave. so as not to lose too much time, he had yet his hands bandaged and the bridle of his horse had to be wound around those poor hands and we had to guide the horse as best we could. For a couple of hours all went well, because we made the Indian, who served us as guide, lead the horse and we ascended slowly the long slope towards the plateau. I even managed to take some photographs while on the ascent. But. after a little rest on level ground and while I attended the horses too, the Indian managed to "get lost," that is we lost sight of him absolutely and henceforth I had to look after both our horses and search for the path besides. As we could not travel at our accustomed lively trot, night surprised us before reaching Sica-Sica, the little capital of the province of the same name. I decided to go in search of some shelter for the night; we had no blankets to protect us from the cold, therefore could not possibly spend the night "á la belle étoile." I helped my husband down from his mount, secured the two horses near him and then started in search for a lodging. I followed the path as closely as I could, walking almost double, as the night was rather dark. Fortunately, I soon found some Indian huts, and after a lengthy parley and a liberal compensation, I secured a dirty Indian kitchen to pass the night. It was highly aggravating when we found out next morning that a ride of only about 15 minutes more would have brought us into the village of Sica-Sica and to the house of our friend there, who, in the meantime, had sent out searching parties for us, because the Indians of that whole region do not enjoy the best of reputations.

From Sica-Sica we journeyed to Patac-Amaya, our destination, and where we remained for several weeks, rather over two months. Patac-Amaya, the name, translated into English, means "Hundred

Dead" (or Corpses) and this sombre name dates from the Indian Uprising of 1781, when the Indians killed on that same spot about two hundred Mestizoes. It is a mining place and was one of the largest copper mines of that region. There are many such mines in the neighborhood, copper as well as silver. Our headquarters here were not uncomfortable. I had even a cook, a luxury not often found. She was the old caretaker of the very sadly dilapidated house, a good old woman and a faithful servant. The only thing that made us really suffer considerably was the water, which, flowing through miles and miles of copper fields, was so permeated with that ore, that it not only had a very disagreeable copperish taste, but it was poisonous. No matter how much I boiled it, or what I put in it, it always caused awful stomach ache. and we had to drink as little as possible. The grounds all around the house were beautifully green, but not from vegetation which was very scant, due to the elevation, about 12,850 feet, but due entirely to the copper-oxide.

The ancient remains are found in larger and smaller clusters all over an area of about five miles. We investigated and surveyed them all and have secured a large collection of archaeological objects from that region. The last place we investigated was called San Martin at some five miles from Patac-Amava and its ruins almost hidden among low hillocks. We were through with all work there, had paid off the Indians from the place who had worked for us, leaving only a few heavier objects there to be taken home the following day. This was a Wednesday. We were going there the following day to gather what was left and expected to make a general surveying trip of it, although we did not expect to find any new places. My husband's dream of that night prevented us from going and saved our lives.

It was about four a. m., when he woke me to tell me about his dream, which made us decide then and there not to attempt our contemplated trip the next day. Here follows the dream as he told it to me:

"We seemed to be living in a little cottage, somewhere in the States. It was like a little summer colony, and his father lived across the way in another cottage, with a cousin of his. We had arranged a picnic party for the following day and my husband was going over to see his father about it early in the morning, leaving me in the house, fixing everything for our Pluto, our dog, went with him. outing. As he approached the neighboring cottage. he saw that the door was locked, a thing he thought at the time as being rather strange. Pluto must have thought the same thing, for it seems he jumped with his whole body against the door, which flew open at the impact of the heavy dog's body. They entered and the two dogs kept there came to meet them. As my husband went up the lane toward the house he suddenly heard the voice of his father, full of anxiety, yet very clear and distinct, which called out to him: 'Adolph, Adolph, don't go, for God's sake, don't go!" And this father's voice was still ringing in his ears, as he woke and called me.

Hence we told our Indians from Patao-Amaya, who were engaged by us and who went everywhere with us, that we had decided not to go, because we had to get our mail ready; that they only should go, get the few things left there and about which they knew and come right back. Those Indians, our steady workmen, consisted of an old Indian shaman, who made the necessary encantations and gave the Tinka (libation) before every new excavation, two younger men and two boys. They were perfectly satisfied, seeing before them a whole day's pay with but very little work; they received their customary ration of coca-leaves and their cigarettes and off they trotted chatting merrily.

Within a few hours, however, they came back looking quite startled and disconcerted about something. And this is what they told us: As they approached San Martin, they were received by a volley of stones, hurled at them by slings from some hiding place. As soon as they came within speaking-distance from the Indians of San Martin, those received them with insulting remarks asking why they had not brought the two foreigners along. The old sha-

man, being the spokesman, wanted to know why they should have brought us along and they told him that they had been expecting us in order to kill us. Asked why they wanted to kill us, they told them that they were convinced that we had found some gold the previous day and therefore we must die. They had a little parley, a tussle, then, as they saw 'hat our Indians were sent only to gather what had been left there, they withdrew and our men came home. The old shaman, whose name, if I remember correctly, was Martin, asked most earnestly, was it true what the Indians said that we had found gold? We told him that all we found the day before had been a pin, which looked like base gold, but that we were not at all sure that it was. And even in the affirmative case, it would only be worth a few nickels. As a matter of fact, that poor miserable pin, looking like very pale gold was the only object of that precious metal ever found on the high plateau. The Indian who found it, together with a body, had handed it to me, remarking at the time that he believed it was "Kori" (gold) but I told him it was just bronze. I took it to my husband telling him to put it away in his pocketbook, and nothing more was said about the matter. But the Indians are so greedy, so anxious, furthermore, to find gold, that the idea that that pin might have been of gold reigned uppermost in their minds and made them suspicious of us, thinking that we had found more of that precious metal and withheld the fact from them. Therefore we had to die, so that they could loot our property at will and get all that gold. And nobody would really ever have known what had become of us, for San Martin is a place "par excellence" for a crime of that sort. But for his father's warning, my husband and I would lie buried among the remains of the Indian race, to the study of which we had given so many years of our lives, our health and our energy.

# What Do The Message Teach?

"He that hath an ear let him hear what the Spirit saith to the churches; To him that overcometh evil I give to eat of the 'ree of life, which is in the midst of the Paradise of God." Rev. II. 7.

The message of the Spirit as reported in Revelations was largely a message to the Ancient Church,—the church of the day in which it was spoken. The age in which we live requires a different message in many respects. While the oldime message may contain much that is still of value to the world,—yet, in the language of Lowell,

"New occasions teach new duties; Time makes ancient good uncouth; They must upward still, and onward, Who would keep abreast of truth. Lo, before us gleam her camp-fires; We ourselves must Pilgrims be; Launch our Mayflowers, and steer boldly Through the desperate winter sea; Nor attempt the Future's portal With the Past's blood-rusted key."

It is not for us to disparage the message of the past,-but, instead, to leave it with the past where it rightfully belongs. The leaves fall from the trees in the autumn, after having served their purpose, and lie as a protecting covering of all the lowers things that cover the ground. In the Spring-time, when new leaves are coming on every herb and bush and tree, we do not curse the fallen leaves as we turn away to appreciate the beauty of the new leaves. Then why should we sneer, as many heedlessly do, at the past and its messages of the Spirit? Have they not served their purpose, inspiring hope in the heart of man, comforting in hours of sorrow and affliction, thus uplifting the soul of man to the higher things of the Spirit? We may not need them now, they may no longer inspire us, they may not longer offer relief for our sorrow. and from them our souls may no longer gather strength.

Ours is a new era of thought and life, and one of unmeasured progress. The



world is taking hold of human problems as never before. Ours the courage of a new century that ushers in the era of science. An era in which knowledge is to supersede in great measure faith and belief. Learning to know so much of the mysterious forces of nature we demand the same certainty with regard to spiritual things. Speculative philosophy and theology no longer fully satisfy the inquiring mind of man. Instead the same tests must be applied here as are applied in the study of the physical side of the universe. Much that has been held for centuries as sacred must go. Our conceptions of God are enlarging to meet the demands of the more exacting conditions of human life. Tennyson most truly explains:

#### "Speak to Him, thou, for He hears, and spirit with spirit can meet. Closer is he than breathing, and nearer than hands or feet."

Dr. Martineau said: "His spirit speaks with our spirits and the passage is made from the measured steps of material usage to the free thought of spiritual affection." And this is the Revelation of the real Fatherhood of God. The Soul overshadowed by the Divine comes into touch with all the possibilities inherent in itself. Then knowledge of things hitherto unknown is flashed upon the mind-and no longer is man a grovelling being in the marsh lands of lust and passion, but instead an exalted being in true relationship with all possessions of the Infinite. Possibilities never dreamed of before stand revealed and in the new light thrown upon them, seem easy of attainment. In Oneness with the Divine are found all the riches of the Spirit after which the world has been vainly seeking. Immortality becomes more than a dream of seer and prophet of the past,---for in the divine experiences of the soul it has become a demonstrated fact.

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# The Key to the Universe -- The Spiritual Significance of Numbers

The very word Universe suggests immediately the idea of completely unbroken unity, therefore if we find a key to unlock the meaning of the Universe it must prove a single mathematical key.

It is frequently truly said that Mathematics is the only positively definitely exact science, for though we often hear much of exact sciences in the plural, we look in vain to discover any.

Experiment and research are the two principal watchwords of scientific investigators, and very good and honorable words they are, but they necessarily imply the changeful results which inevitably follow upon continuous investigation into Nature's mysteries.

We throw no discredit and cast no reproach upon scientific research when we call attention to the different theories put forward in the text books in use in colleges to-day from those promulgated a generation or two ago. We are on uncertain ground in chemistry when we state something to be seemingly a demonstrated fact to-day and then to-morrow make an opposite assertion, because in the interim our attention has been called to the behaviour of certain chemicals in an altogether unexpected manner. Our theories are upset, our hypothetical conjectures have to be altered. This is so freely and widely admitted in scientific circles that it excites no surprise among students to be calmly told that the theories of yesterday are today abandoned and a fresh hypothesis must straightway be considered. To many minds this confession is extremely bewildering and leads many unscientific intelfects to entirely abandon quest for knowledge along lines where everything seems so painfully dubious, but the genuinely scientific intellect enjoys the mental chase and is in no way distressed because we are living on a planet where we have to stumble along in semi-darkness, and while working often in very dim light, though never in total darkness, find means for the cultivation of our mental faculties by

actually undergoing the experience of making many mistakes and subsequently rectifying them.

But though the foregoing remarks are applicable to all the sciences save one, they do not and cannot apply to Mathematics which in ancient times, among the most enlighted adepts who have blessed the earth with far more than common knowledge, was termed Divine Science. We are all familiar with the masterly declaration of the immortal Plato. God geometrizes and probably nowhere in Hebrew literature can we find a choicer gem of poesy and philosophy than the familiar 19th psalm. Thomas Paine refers to it in his "Age of Reason" in terms of highest eulogy and he incorporated into that much controverted volume Addison's exquisite paraphrase of that beautiful psalm which is frequently employed as a hymn in places of worship of widely differing denominations.

No matter from what sources we may seek to derive enlightenment, we must all sooner or later be brought to confess that unity is the foundation of the Universe. Pythagoras, the Sage of Samos, whose dissertations on the value of numbers is still highly prized by students of Nature's revelations, declared unfalteringly that we could imagine the obliteration of all plural numbers, but not one could conceive of the blotting out of one.

There is no system of religion, science or philosophy which does not postulate unity in some manner, though many systems soon begin to lose themselves in a bewildering maze of labyrynthine pluralities. Spiritualism and materialism in their ancient classic forms, though diametrically opposed philosophically, each posited a single substance originally, and we know of no modern metaphysical or other speculative cult, nor any system of recent philosophy, which does not start with some declaration of unity. Herbert Spencer, aiming at the production of a perfect synthetic philosophy, declared it to be self-evident to his understanding that there is an infinite and eternal Energy whence all things proceed. Spencer was avowedly an agnostic from the theological standpoint, while that acknowledged giant among British scientists, Lord Kelvin, was definitely a Theist, but Kelvin agreed with his agnostic contemporary in admitting the Energy but proceeded to reason in spiritual directions far beyond his philosophic confrère.

Charles Darwin, Thomas Huxley, and indeed all the leading intellectual lights of the last century, agreed upon a primal unitary basis but they more or less diverged as they proceeded to define their conceptions of this unity. It ought always to be borne in mind that every genuine agnostic is entirely non-dogmatic, as was Darwin, and therefore leaves the field completely open for all investigators who desire to make explorations in the domain of psychical research.

Turning to the faith of Israel we are immediately confronted with the matchless words accepted by Jews of all schools from the most conservative to the most radical: The ETERNAL is our GOD: the ETER-NAL is ONE. How infinitely much from one standpoint, and yet how wondrously little from another, does this mighty sentence convey. Another statement on which all Israelites the world over are agreed is that the name of GOD is ONE. The declaration is sounded forth alike in orthodox synagogues and reform temples "in that day (a predicted period of worldwide enlightenment and peace) the Eternal will be acknowledged ONE and HIS Name ONE."

Wallis Budge, who has given us fascinating illustrated works detailing the religious concepts of the ancient Egyptians, declares that scholars are now practically agreed that while multitudes of divinities were worshipped with varying degrees of adoration and veneration in the delta of the Nile, One Supreme Deity was always acknowledged as beyond all the gods and goddesses who were too multitudinous to enumerate . Students of the religion of ancient India declare that the same is true of Hindu concepts, for while millions of divinities have received homage on the banks of the Ganges the philosophic Hindu has never lost sight of the essential unity of the Universe.

We hear much in these days of a Pluriverse or a Multiverse, and we should never shrink from considering evidence of diversity, which is truly an interpretation of unity, but let us be on our guard lest we slip off the original foundation and lose ourselves in a maze of pluralities, forgetful of the fundamental truth that the unit ever stands supreme and that all numbers are included in the number one as all colors are contained in the single Ray of Light.

There is only one absolute color, white, as there is only one absolute number, ONE. Directly we pass from a contemplation of unity to diversity we find a regular scale of numbers universally adhered to. The 7 hues of the rainbow are the same whether we witness a magnificent display in the heavens or on a gigantic scale after a flood or tempest or whether we have a tiny prism in our private sleeping room. Always the same 7 hues, always in the same rotation counting upward or downward as we please.

The symbol of the great universal allincluding One is the Circle, but our little one, the smallest of our numerals is a perpendicular stroke. Our numerical and chromatic scale combined reads thus: 1, red; 2, orange; 3, yellow; 4, green; 5, blue; 6, indigo; 7, violet; counting upward, and of course exactly the reverse counting downward.

Now we know why the rainbow was exalted in Genesis after the Deluge and why in the Apocalypse we are told of a great White Throne and of a Rainbow encircling it.

Next to the circle which is unquestionably the highest and most universal of all symbols, the globe with 2 wings and the cross have held highest place in general esteem. These emblems of the number 2 have everywhere portrayed the idea of duality as the first expression of unity. Male and female are signified by the 2 wings of the globe displayed to-day in many places where symbolism is regarded as an aid to understanding.

The Cross originally means exactly the

same as the winged globe, therefore the typical Christian sign, which is immemorally older than the beginning of the Christian Era, may rightly be regarded as significant of sex-equality and also of the equal dignity of the positive and negative manifestation of life in continuous expressions. Duality is everywhere revealed in Nature, but Dualism is a pernicious philosophy. The vital difference between them is plainly this: Duality of right and left, male and female, centripetal and centrifugal, etc., in no way interferes with a full acknowledgment of the perfect goodness of the Universe, while Dualism teaches good and evil as rival and continually opposing forces, one forever militating against the other. The total absurdity of Dualism consists in the fact that the most pronounced dualists have always had to invent some origin for their second element while they found only One at the The odious idea of sempiternal start. evil is as ridiculous as it is immoral, for no one ever found a devil till he had first imagined a fallen angel, who by falling became a devil, therefore even if every theory of fallen angels "who kept not their first estate" be accepted without controversy we must of necessity anticipate a day when they will return to their primal glory.

Turning from the errors of dualism to the truth of duality we can at once proceed to establish social and industrial relations between the sexes on a footing of perfect equity, not so much of equality as of equivalence. We often hear it erroneously stated that one sex is stronger than the other, but that assertion cannot be supported if we make our researches cover a wide field, any more than we can endorse the oft quoted saying that the right hand is stronger than the left. All these ignorant assertions are based on limited observation of more or less distorted habits, never are they founded on a real knowledge of universal order. If a large number of people use one hand much more than the other, and thereby strengthen it by exercise, they can point to an inevitable outcome of their own conduct, but should it become customary to use the left hand more than the right, than the right hand would be the weaker member. If girls were

athletically trained and boys were systematically coddled we should soon discover evidences of superior strength of female over male, and so throughout the entire gamut of possible human experience we should become witnesses to results of human activities and non-activities producing fuller development in the former and comparative atrophy in the latter instances: Father and Mother are equivalent but are not identical. We are greatly in need of pronouns; our present 3 do not suffice. Language is constantly undergoing enlargement and renovation, and to meet the pressing needs of the coming age we must add to our speech a pronoun which expresses the idea of masculine and feminine in perfect combination. The symbol of the sphere and then the globe with the two wings perfectly expresses the great thought artistically, proving beyond dispute that stone tablets interpret ideas far more perfectly and universally than any written or spoken language yet invented. The Old Testament says that the 10 Commandments were originally engraven upon 2 Tables of Stone, and the New Testament declares that if men "hold their peace" stones will cry out, and they have been crying very loudly during recent years, particularly since the discovery of the Rossetta Stone, by means of which so many ancient hieroglyphics have been successfully interpreted.

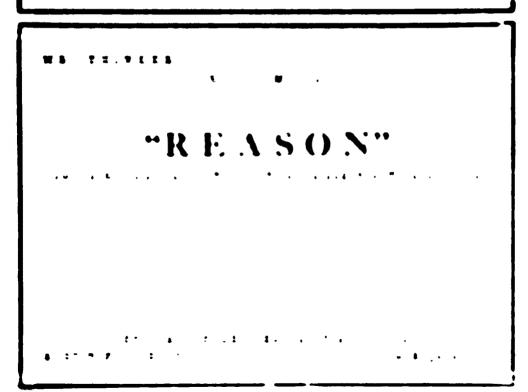

# The Coming Race

By Edward Lord Lytton.

#### (Continued)

My host then proceeded to question me to the habits and modes of life among the races on the upper earth, more especially among those considered to be the most advanced in that civilization which he was pleased to define "the art of diffusing throughout a community the tranquil happiness which belongs to a virtuous and well-ordered household." Naturally desiring to represent in the most favorable colors the world from which I came. I touched but slightly, though indulgently, on the antiquated and decaying institutions of Europe, in order to expatiate on the present grandeur and prospective preeminence of that glorious American Republic, in which Europe enviously seeks its model and tremblingly foresees its doom. Selecting for an example of the social life of the United States that city in which progress advances at the fastest rate, I endulged in an animated description of the moral habits of New York. Mortified to see, by the faces of my listeners, that I did not make the favorable impression I had anticipated. I elevated my theme; dwelling on the excellence of democratic institutions, their promotion of tranquil happiness by the government by party, and the mode in which they diffused such happiness throughout the community by preferring, for the exercise of power and the acquisition of honors, the lowliest citizens in point of property, education, and character. Fortunately recollecting the peroration of a speech, on the purifying influences of American democracy and their destined spread over the world, made by a certain eloquent senator (for whose vote in the Senate a Railway Company, to which my two brothers belonged, had just paid 20,000 dollars), I wound up by repeating its glowing predictions of the magnificent future that smiled upon mankind-when the flag of freedom should float over an entire continent, and two hundred millions of intelligent citizens, accustomed from infancy to the daily use of revolvers, should apply to a cowering universe the doctrine of the Patriot Monroe.

When I had concluded my host shook his head, and fell into a musing study, making a sign to me and his daughter to remain silent while he reflected. And after a time he said, in a very earnest and solemn tone, "If you think, as you say, that you, though a stranger, have received kindness at the hands of me and mine, I adjure you to reveal nothing to any other of our people respecting the world from which you came, unless, on consideration, I give you permission to do so. Do you consent to this request?

"Of course I pledge my word with it," said I, somewhat amazed; and I extended my right hand to grasp his. But he placed my hand gently on his forehead and his own right hand on my breast, which is the custom among this race in all matters of promise or verbal obligations. Then turning to his daughter, he said, "And you, Zee, will not repeat to any one what the stranger has said, or may say, to me or to you, of a world other than our own." Zee rose and kissed her father on the temples. saying, with a smile, "A Gy's tongue is wanton, but love can fetter it fast. And if, my father, you fear lest a chance word from me or yourself could expose our community to danger, by a desire to explore a world beyond us, will not a wave of the vril, properly impelled, wash even the memory of what we have heard the stranger say out of the tablets of the brain?"

#### "What is vril?" I asked.

Therewith Zee began to enter into an explanation of which I understood very little, for there is no word in my language I know which is an exact synonym for vril. I should call it electricity, except that it comprehends in its manifold branches other forces of nature, to which in our scientific nomenclature, differing names are assigned, such as magnetism, galvanism, etc. These people consider that in vril they have arrived at the unity in natural energetic agencies, which has been conjectured by many philosophers above ground, and which Faraday thus intimates under the more cautious terms of correlation:

"I have long held an opinion," says that illustrious experimentalist, "almost amounting to a conviction, in common, I believe, with many other lovers of natural knowledge, that the various forms under which the forces of matter are made manifest have one common origin; or, in other words, are so directly related and mutually dependent, that they are convertible, as it were, into one another, and possess equivalents of power in their action."

These subterranean philosophers assert that, by one operation of vril which Faraday would perhaps call 'atmospheric magnetism,' they can influence, the variations of temperature-in plain words, the weather; that by other operations, akin to those ascribed to mesmerism, electrobiolody, odic force, etc., but applied scientifically through vril conductors, they can exercise influence over minds and bodies, animal and vegetable, to an extent not surpassed in the romances of our mystics. To all such agencies they give the common name of vril. Zee asked me if, in my world, it was known that all the faculties of the mind could be quickened to a degree unknown in the waking state, by trance of vision in which the thoughts of one brain could be transmitted to another, and knowledge be thus rapidly interchanged. I replied, that there were among us stories told of such trance or vision, and that I had heard much and seen something of the mode in which they were artificially effected, as in mesmeric clairvoyance; but that these practices had fallen much into disuse or contempt, partly because of the gross impostures to which they had been made subservient, and partly because, even where the effects upon certain abnormal constitutions were genuinely produced, the effects when fairly examined and analysed, were very unsatisfactory-not to be relied upon for any systematic truthfulness or any practical purpose, and rendered very mischievous to credulous persons by the superstitions they tended to produce. Zee received my answers with much benignant attention, and said that similar instances of abuse and credulity had been familiar to their own scientific experience in the

infancy of their knowledge, and while the properties of vril were misapprehended, but that she reserved further discussion on this subject till I was more fitted to enter into it. She contented herself with adding, that it was through the agency of vril, while I had been placed in the state of trance, that I had been made acquainted with the rudiments of their language; and that she and her father.who, alone of the family, took the pains to watch the experiment, had acquired a greater proportionate knowledge of my language than I of their own; partly because my language was much simpler than theirs, comprising far less of complex ideas; and partly because their organisation was, by hereditary culture, much more ductile and more readily capable of acquiring knowledge than mine. At this I secretly demurred; and having had, in the course of a practical life, to sharpen my wits, whether at home or in travel, I could not allow that my cerebral organization could possibly be duller than that of peope who had lived all their lives by lamplight. However, while I was thus thinking, Zee quietly pointed her forefinger at my forehead and sent me to sleep.

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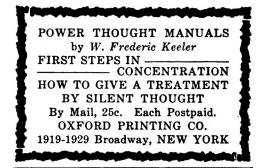
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
