WHO ARE THE GREATEST ENEMIES TO TRUTH, AND THE GREATEST OPPOSERS OF JUSTICE, AND THE DESPISERS OF PROPHECY, AND WHO ARE THE MOST INTERESTED IN OPPOSING TRUTH AND DESPISING PROPHECY.

Let any man of a deep-thinking and candid mind, with pure motives and just intentions, inquire amongst the teachers and followers individually, of every sect and denomination of professors of religion, and he will find that they, one and all, either through interest or ignorance, will ridicule, repudiate, and deny or contradict the truths of modern divine revelation, and treat with contempt its believers and propagators, but to attempt to expose or overthrow any great evil from which universal injury results to man, we must first apply the axe to the root of the evil, and our next con-aderation must be to find out where such root can be found; and we after years of study and experience, unhesitatingly say that we have come to this conclusion, which is, that the corrupt state of the scriptures, preached and set forth as they are by the clergy of the established church, with the said clergy, constitute the root of this great evil, which has long since formed a gigantic tree, while all other denominations form its branches, First then, we revert to the church clergy, and prove by their own conduct and their affluent positions that they are the most interested in opposing truth, propagating delusion and falsehood, and despising prophecy. In the first place, although they are perfectly aware from their own ecclesiastical history that the scriptures are corrupt, yet they tell the people that the said scriptures are all the pure words of God without corruption; and the people, from early tuition and erroneous imbibed notions, have readily believed them, and cannot and will not see that the same bible, in its present form, supports and confirms the clergy in all their ava rice and false teachings, by which they keep the people in ignorance, while they themselves live in luxury and idleness on the hard earnings of the industrious classes; and not content with luxuriant living, they must also have mansions to live in, carriages to ride in, and servants to wait on them, all of which the bible, in its present form, teaches, and likewise teaches the people that they should be contented in whatever situation or condition they may be placed, and the clergy avail themselves of these words, and tell the people it is God's will it should be so. And as modern divine revelation, in its truth and justice, denounces and exposes these evil practices of the clergy, no wonder that they have the greatest interest in oppo-sing truth and despising divine revelation; while those of their followers who are likewise interested by worldly gain, will equally oppose and despise the truth and justice as set forth in modern prophecy. While others who, from early tuition, are ignorant of the corruption of the scriptures, or the designs of the clergy, having been taught to listen to nothing or to read nothing but what their clergy tells them, and not to pry into the future, or into the mys-

teries of godliness, for what they do not know here, they will know hereafter, as mystery belongs only Thus in the blind superstitious ignorance inculcated to them through the corruptions rance incurcates to them through the corruptions of scripture and false teaching, they too, in their darkness, will oppose truth and justice, and despise prophecy. This and much more we have experienced in many parts of the kingdom, for the members of our Circle have visited the following towns, which lie in a circular form round the kingdom, and which are the principal stations for the hand of the fall with the content of cipal stations for the heads of the twelve tribes of the Great Organization, and which are as follows:

These and all the intervening towns between have been visited, und in each of the places where the warnings were profusely distributed, the clergy of the established church have been loudest in their condemnations of our cause, and the principles it advocates; while the professors and teachers of all other denominations have endeavoured to follow the examples of the church professors and teachers, and as our members paraded the different streets with their glorious banner, the standard of truth, waving above their heads as they proclaimed the truths of divine revelation, and warned the peo ple, the clergy teachers and professors of the different sects, after vainly wishing our members to leave the town and the parishes, and discontinue their labours, shrunk from them with awe and dismay, daring not to converse or hold controversy with our members, fearing that their craft would become greatly endangered thereby; while the ignorant and unlearned masses took pattern by their teachers, and what they called respectable fellow townsmen, and endeavoured by brow-beating abuse to drive our members from the several towns they visited. But our worthy advocates stood firm, and braved the scoffs and jeers of their opposers whom they compelled to hear and see what divine revelation teaches, after which they shrunk from the presence of our members, cool and calmly, as if convicted of their own guilt, and thus all the warnings, as slips, with thousands of pamphlets, have been successfully distributed in all the places named, and the members have joyfully returned in triumph to the dismay of the scoffers and unbelievers. While every place where the prophecies have reached, especially those which alludes to the budding and blossoming of the trees in the winter months, especially since the severe frost and snow has set in. the people of such places, on meeting with a member of the Organization or a believer in prophecy, derisively address the believer thus: - Well, how is the blossoming and blooming going on this weather. There will be no blooming now." Forgetting that God can fulfil his word in defiance of frost, snow, or cold. And this fact is even manifest now by the trees and shrubs, which are even now in bud and blossom while wintry weather was visible; and angels do

not recognise the present worldly alterations of

times or seasons. This alteration was made to gratify the ambition and interest of man Common sense with experience, teaches us that November, December, and January, are the three winter months; and yet, although we experience that the 21st of December is generally mid-winter, yet those who have altered the time call it the first day of winter. Again, we all know by experience that in the month of February, the sap begins to rise; in March, bad and leaf are visible; and in April, full leaf is generally manifest, thus proving that February, March, and April, are the three spring months. While the almanack makers, by what they call correction of time, affix either the 20th or 2 ist day of March as the first day of spring; and thus the height of summer, or midsummer day, by their own calculation, is past bed fore spring is ended. And thus, also, experience teaches us that in May, June, and July, all yegetation is in bloom, or in its prime; proving that these are the summer months. While the almanack makers, by what they call correction of time, although they call the 21st day of June the first day of summer, yet in the same calendar they pronounce it to be midsummer's day, which appears somewhat mysterious. The months of August, September, and October are the original autumn months, as common sense and experience prove; for in August, all vegetation has arrived at perfection, or is completed in September; while in October, the leaves fall, and all the exposed portion of vegetation decays, thus shewing that the first winter month is November. But if our opposers doubt this, they forget that they are leaving plenty of time for another manifestation of budding and blossoming, even this season, before the winter, according to their calculation, has expired, which is on the 21st of March. Therefore, whether the present budding and blossoming of the trees, be the sign or not, or whether it will transpire again during the ensuing three months, up to the 21st of March, it is immaterial, for in either or both cases it will fulfil the prophecy. Let the sceptics or unbelievers say what they will to the contrary, but if the prophecies are not fulfilled as they desire they are not contented, neither will they believe. And this feeling prevails more amongst the clergy and professors of religion of the different denoininations, than it does amongst the non-professors and free-thinkers. We find opposition to our cause and its truths to exist more amongst the religionists than any we have to contend with; and yet, strange to say, with all their opposition, abuse, slander, and ridicule, they all are professors of charity, christianity, and professed followers of Christ; and yet they ignore divine revelation. treat its propagators with contempt; and not withstanding their professions of charity, they do not hesitate to say that we, the propagators of divine revelation, ought to be imprisoned or put to death, for no other reasons than that we denounce oppression, expose hypocrisy, priestcraft, and delu-sion. But we heed them not, knowing that justice and truth must be opposed and persecuted, and its propagators scorned by the wil-minded, self-willed and bigoted people; and thus we rejoice, and are exceeding glad that we are accounted worther to suffer scorn, contempt, and ridicule for the sake of

truth: nay, more, every faithful member, if neces sary, is ready to sacrifice his life in defence and for the advocacy of our glorious cause, and thus follow out the pure examples set by Christ and his apostles, whom our whole endeavours have been, and shall henceforth be, to imitate and follow to the utmost of our capabilities, according to the divine grace and permission of an all-wise God.

THE BIBLE AND ITS CORRUPTIONS TESTED BY MODERN DIVINE REVELATION.

(Continued from No. 23.)

To the Editor of the Spiritualistic Free Press.

Sir,—In my comments on the history of the temptation as it appears in the book of Genesis, there is one part of the subject that has been but slightly touched upon, and the subject that has been but slightly touched upon, and that is concerning the serpent.—who, or what was he? The general opinions of christians would easily answer the question this way, "satan," or "the devil," but this answer would not suffice; all christians do not believe in this doctrine,—there is much division of opinion on the matter, and it is daily increasing. The Members of the Great Organization deny the existence of an individual deal. ual devil, or monster, called satan, serpent, dragon, and a host of other names. Many learned divines hold various and conflicting opinions on the subject, and the whole text of scripture contained in the Old Testament fails to text of scripture contained in the Old Testament fails to bear out the popular belief on this head. I shall reserve my own observations on this part until I have proceeded farther in my task; but it may here be remarked that in all the history of the creation of the earth, and also the heavens and the host of them, no mention is made of a hell, nor the slightest allusion to it when the curse for disobedience was pronounced on Adam and Eve, and what better proof can we have of the truth of the doctrine held by the Great Organization (who believe that the eternal salvation of all mankind without exception is accomplished already by the sacrifice of redeemers,) than the fact of their being no mention made by Moses of a place of eternal torment, and which he no doubt would have done if he had believed in such an institution as hell is described to be, by the great body of christian

In rejecting as we do the account of the creation and temptation as matter of fact, it may not be out of place here to offer a few remarks in support of our previously advanced opinion, to the effect of the whole history being constructed on an allegorical four dation. Thus Adam and Eve may represent the early generations of mankind, who, we can easily suppose were in a state of purity; who, we can easily suppose were in a state of purity; and the garden of Eden may signify a high degree of developement in the regetable kingdom much superior to the productions of after ages. The early generations were most probably aware that disobedience would be visited by punishment of some kind or other, and they were no doubt duly warned of the evil consequences that would result from an infringement of the laws instituted or their guidance and happingers, but they are a people or their guidance and happiness; but they as a people

were not proof against the temptations which fell in their way, and they suffered themselves to be allured from the paths of virtue and obedience, and thus they became possessed of the knowledge of the consequence became possessed of the knowledge of the consequence of evil courses, and thus acquired the experience of good and evil represented in allegory by the tree of knowledge. This appears to be the main foundation of the history, and Moses when he wrote it, most probaby intended to represent it under the form of an allegory; but which allegory has in subsequent ages been altered and twisted into its present shape so as to form a history, which is put forth as fact, and so true and accurate is this history assumed to be that the very year in which it occurred is reckoned and affords data for numerous calculations of the time of past cepts, and also a complete genealogy. reckned and attores data for numerous calculations of the time of past events, and also a complete genealogy, which like the other portions of this wonderful history has no better foundation than the imagination of Moses, and this it will not be difficult to shew from the facts as recorded in this account. Modern divine revelation de-clares that no account of the first inhabitants of the earth has been transmitted to us, therefore the genealogy and record of ages as found in Gen. v. must be imaginary, rection ages as found in Gen." Index or inaginary, as declared in the following revelation extracted from the "People's Guide," page 8, it was given in answer to a question relative to the great ages of Enock, Mathuselah, Noah, and others,

Celestial Revelation — Behold at that period man had

no knowledge, or means for dividing time, only by dark, and light, or night, and day, until they observed the changes of the moon in performing its revolutions. The moon was therefore made the period of calculation, hence it will be seen that the ages of the oldest men who existed seldom exceeded one shousand and eighty moons, or little more than ninety of the present solar calculated years, and that the human race in all ages were subjected to the same period of existence. It is therefore impossible that the period of man's existence could continue in accordance with the present account, which is said to be Moses's." These are the declarations we have been

commanded to make.

This revelation throws a light on the mystery of the recorded fact of the persons named in the genealogical account living so many years before they had children born to them; amongst the whole of them that are mentioned in this account Noah appears to have been the eldest before he became a father of children, it being stated that he was 500 years old when Shem. Ham, and Japheth were born. If when man was first placed on the earth he was commanded to be fruitful and multiply and replenish the earth; it seems that either the laws of and replenish the earth; it seems that either the laws of nature were operating against this commandment in the slow advancement of man to maturity, or else there was something very defective in his social arrangements, if he required to be from sixty-five to above a hundred years before he became a father. It is but reasonable to suppose that facilities for the propagation of their off-spring existed amongst the early inhabitants of the earth quite equal to those of the present day; and then why should it require a man to be nearly or quite a hundred years old before he became a father of children. This certainly does not appear to be the best and proper mode of complying with the commands said to be given, and there is nothing in all scripture history besides this account that bears out the view that man lived to such an count that bears out the view that man lived to such an extent of time as hundreds of our present solar years would amount to, and why should they on living so many years bezet comparatively so few children? Therefore it is evident from the facts of the case that the ages of the above named persons and their progenitors were reckoned by moons and not by years. CHARLES GREGORY,

In our article in No. 23 of our journal we stated that if the present budding and blossoming of the trees is not the sign specified in the prophecies in the 'Warning Message' and in the 'Book of Life,' it is sufficient to fulfil these revelations. 

THE GREAT ORGANIZATION; THE CHIEF OBSTACLES ITS MEMBERS HAD TO CON-TEND WITH ON VISITING SOME OF THE LOCALITIES WERE TO CONVINCE THE PEOPLE THAT THEY WERE NOT MORMONS.

As the Mormon church, or the church of the Latter Day Saints, as they are called, was established on revelations, Purported to come through Joseph Smith the great Mormon prophet, and as the

Great Organization is established on revelation, and its Members, or followers are believers in prophecy, they have great difficulty to convince strangers to our cause, that we are not Mormons, for no sooner is revelation mentioned, than do the people at once affirm that those who are holding forth revelation are Mormons, and that"they ought to be put down. In the towns of Hereford and Shrewsbury, the Mormons were more railed against than in any other towns on the whole route, and upon enquiry we found that their depredations under religious pretensions in these districts. were most atrocious, chiefly resulting through the pluralty of wives, breaking up of families, and otherwise destroying domestic peace through men professing religion, cohabiting with other mens wives and daughters, so that much contention amongst families, and much disgust against the Mormons were prevalent, and hence through the base conduct of men who practised these vices under a cloak of religion, the Mormons in these parts are generally detested, and any one speaking in praise of revelation, or of the millenium era, or of the second coming of Christ, are at once looked upon and treated as Mormons; one of our Members declares that both in Hereford and Shrewsbury, when he was there six months ago, that if he could not have convinced them that he was not advocating Mormonism, they would in their hatred have done him some serious injury: two other Members have visited these same places within these last three weeks, and they had the same obstacles to contend with, and so it is more or less in every part of England, Mormonism is so disliked, that its very name has become a pest to the people, and from whence has this hatred to Mormon principles risen? especially in the minds of professors of religion, who unhesitatingly affirm that the Bible is all the pure word of God, and yet they despise the Mormons because they adhere to its teachings, this very circumstance is enough in itself to prove to the religionists if they would investigate that the Bible is both corrupt and immoral, for the Mormons however immoral their conduct may be in reference to the plurality of wives, and licentious lusts, we can find more passages of scripture to sanction their practice, than any other sect or denomination as founded on the scriptures, for in it you will find that Abraham, Jacob, David, Solomon, and in fact all the chosen men of God, with kings and great men, all supported their several wives and concubines, and David was called a man after God's own heart, and Solomon walked in His ways and feared God to the end of his days; then if the Bible containing such teachings, be all the pure word of God without corruption, as the professors of religion declare it is, why do they repudiate and condemn the Mormons for believing it, and following out the practice it teaches? they cannot believe that it is the pure word of God, or they dare not condemn its teachings, or those who practice them, but Mormonism is contrary to what they have been accustomed to, and is not considered respectable or decent by the clergy or wealthy of the present day; therefore people repudiate Mormonism, more for the sake of carrying favour with their superiors, than for the sake of morality,

or the scriptures. So likewise, all classes condemn and ignore the Great Organization, and its principles, because they are founded on revelation and because they are opposed to the general interests of the people, and because we denounce all hypocrisy. priest-craft, and sectarian delusions, Mormonism included, they also, without investigation denounce the members of the Great Organization as Mormons, and imply all kinds of scandal and disreputable things to their charge, but cannot prove one accusation which they make against us, but on the contrary we are prepared to prove that the scriptures are corrupt, and that every sect and denomination founded upon them. is oppressive, hypocritical, and delusive, and that the Mormons propagate some of the greatest delusions, and practice some of the grossest hypocrisy and deception which can be found to emanate from any other sect or denomination, and yet we believe that the origination of the Mormon Church was sacred and holy, but that through ambition and lust for worldly aggrandizement, it became corrupted, and has gradually sunk into be that degradation which we now find it, and which is detested by all persons morally inclined. But to further prove connection with them, but have denounced their professions as hypocritical delusions, we, the Nottingham Spiritual Circle, through the Medium, Mr. J. Grow H. Brown, have published a pamphlet containing revelations from the spirit of to Joseph Smith, in which his own spirit is commanded to denounce the Mormon principles as they are now practised, such as the plurality of wives, the collection of tithes, and holding forth with unknown tongues, as hypocritical delusions and abominations, and the revelations given through his spirit are confirmed by revelation, given from the great angel a Gabriel, and the whole of which, and al revelations from the spirit of Swedenborg the Swedish prophet are contained in a pamphlet, 64 pages, demy octavo, published at 1s., but can now be had post free for 7 penny stamps, from the published address; and I here give a revelation from the spirit of Smith, extracted from the pamphlet in question, which proves that our members being believers in revelation, that they do not believe in encouraging and sanctioning Mormonism, but look upon it as an abomination to God, as divine revelation

as followed and believed by your followers the result of your predictions from reve-lations, or is this good in the sight of Heaven, in accordance with your experi-

ence in the spiritual world?

REVELATION.—August, 1856.—" No revelation was given to me from on high, ordering or sanctioning this lustful desire, but ambition and lust being in the hearts of those whose duty it was to uproot and erase such aphorences, through which, on reading the ancient scriptures upon this subject, it was suggested to me the necessity of conforming thereto, and seeing that plurality was permitted in the ancient days, I sanctioned its reestablishment, and set it forth as a divine revelation; thereby gratifying the worldly desires of myself and those whose support I needed, but which I have since proved to be offensive to man and displeasing to God as a gross abomination, and which all of both sexes who follow the dictates of this desire will ultimately prove, when reaching the spheres of immortality; although many will live to see their guilt before the great change shall come upon earth. Therefore I am commanded to declare, that this is an abomination, the founders and supporters of which will justly suffer in the sphere which I inhabit.

From the nature of the above revelation and the work from which it is extracted, it may be seen that we are not Mormons, nor believers in Mormon principles or doctrines, though we have no doubt but that the Mormon professions are as good as the professions of other sects, and quite as much and even more safictioned by scripture, but we do not believe in Mormonism, nor no other sectarian creed, nor yet in the corrupt portion of the scripture, still we believe that the said scripture contains the pure word of God, but that it is mystified by being mingled with the base assertions

of man.

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THE VISITING OF THE LOCAL STATIONS OF THE TWELVE TRIBES OF THE GREAT ORGANIZATION, THE WARNING OF THE PEOPLE, AND THE GENERAL THANKS. GIVING ON THE RETURN OF THE MEM BERSIS Ja

In accordance with the revelation, which ordered the visiting and the warning of the people in the twelve localities, on the return of the visiting members a general thanksgiving was ordered to be held in each locality, accordingly Tuesday, the 8th day of January 1861 was the day appointed on which the thanksgiving should be held, and in Nothingham, which is the first locality; the revelation directed that the members of the Circle and of the Community, should assemble at 10 o'clock in the morning of the above day, at the house of the Medium, Mr. J. G. H. Brown, Great Alfred Street, Nottingham, through whom startling prophetic warnings were to be revealed for publica-tion, in a series of pamphlets, explaining all things connected with the present dispensation up to the end, and all things connected with the great mil

lennium era, as necessary for mankind to know. Accordingly several members arrived from distant parts on the day appointed, some from Leicester, Bedworth, Belper, Manchester, and Sutton in-Ashfield, and at the time appointed, in the presence of a large number of persons, was commenced the receiving of a number of vast and important revelations, visions, and explanations upon them, in which were shewn in the most striking and remarkable language, the total destruction of cities, towns, villages, and bamlets, which laid in heaps of ruins, after which, the locality wherein the Community of the Great Organization of the principal portion of this kingdom will dwell during the great milleunium era, shewing also the form of the immense building which will be erected as the habitation of such Community, with its adjoining grounds, and the separate domiciles in the different wings, and compartments of the building, shewing also how the old feeble men, and helpless women were employed or occupied, and describing the culture, and traffic of the produce of different localities, from one Community to another, scribing also that the same order of things will exist in every nation, and amongst every people, who will all worship God with one accord, and serve Christ their Saviour King; the visions also will give a description of how the people of every nation will be employed, and how the earth will be cultivated, and its production disposed of without tax, or tribute; describing also the warmth and comfort of the clothing which the several people will wear, with a vast amount of other information as given in revelation, explaining each vision separately and distinctly, and all these revelations, explanations, and warnings, are to be published in a series of pamphlets, which will shortly be published, and of which due notice will be given. The revelations continued to be revealed from half past ten in the morning, till half past one at noon, at which time, pursuant to revealed instructions, a offering and a general thanksgiving was made to Almighty God; a substantial, but not an extravagant, though a right good meal had been provided according to revealed instructions, and when the table was spread all the persons present rose upon their feet, and with their heads bare their hands, and with their united voices offered up the solemn prayer revealed for such occasions, and which with its objects may be seen in the "Warning Message," after prayer the whole company seated themselves around the table and partook of a comfortable and substantial meal, enjoying conversation on the topics of our glorious cause, in the greatest harmony and love; after the dinner was over and the cloth was removed, and a little private business was ended the revelations were again resumed, and were of a highly important nature, and continued till half past six at night, all of which will in a short time hence appean in print. After the party had partaken tea, all the revelations obtained during the day were read aloud to the company, some of whom had not been present when they were revealed, but from their striking important, interesting, and instruct ing nature, all present appeared highly delighted and satisfied, rejoicing in the prospects which the revelations held forth in the future for the faithful servants of God, and about eight o'clock the greater portion of the company separated in high spirits, and apparently deeply impressed with true ligious, and charitable feelings towards all mankind. A thanksgiving of a similar nature was also held on the same day by the enrolled members of the Great Organization in the following localities, namely :- Bedworth Flecknoe Isle of Wight. Leicester, Loughborough, Marchester, and Sutton in-Ashfield, but as we have not heard their results before going to press we cannot give any account of them here, but shall let it pass on to the next issue.

The visiting members, which are at present at Nothingham, gave some interesting accounts of their experience on their several routes, an outline of which we have given in our leading article of this journal, but not having seen them, but only heard from them by letters when away, I could not give all particulars but them verbal description of what they had to contend with from the various religious sects and parties is unly amusing and interesting. Some of the great advocates of sectarian principles tell our members and the people

According to their teaching repentance and forgiveness of sin and eternal hap piness can be obtained at the eleventh hour, and when asked if that is not a greater inducement to sin and vice, because a last certain hope of salvation held out to them they are silent, but when told that our creed which teaches that all shall suffer according to their deeds or offences com mitted in life, they at once see that if they lead a wicked life even by repentance they cannot escape the punishment due for such sin committed and hence there is not much inducement for sin in the latter belief as in the former, for with such a belief as the former it would be immaterial as to what amount of sin we committed through life, as we could in the last moments repent and wash away such sin by our repentance, and go direct to heaven, while the creed which teaches punishment for the sins committed, shows to escape such punishment is impossible although it is not eternal pun ishment, and hence it is proved that to suffer for the sins committed in the flesh is a just reward, consisting of progressive purification, that all may be fitted for the company of holy angels and the presence of their Maker, and eternal rest; while the creed which teaches that an eleventh hour repentance for sin is acceptable to God, and insura immediate and eternal happiness is unjust, absurd, ungodlike, and without a spark of christian feeling or the justice and lovingkindness of God. Such arguments as these are often put forth by the professors of religion, but they cannot substantiate them, but are always confuted and discomforted and so turn from such discussion with fear and alarm depicted on their countenances. many of our members have frequently proved -
