

Part two contains chapters on Hindu Astrology and others relating to the periods, sub-periods and inter-periods of the planets and concerning the judgments

of planetary periods.

The subject matter of part three deals with the planetary influences that dominate the physical form, have only to do with human evolution; the soul's pilgrimage through matter is graphically depicted in language that is free from the dryness of technical terms and awakens a realization of the Supreme Wisdom from which all existence flows. The Individual Keynote.

EDITORIAL

It is the consecrated purpose of this journal to assist those of its readers who desire to live broader, happier and more influential lives, by the use of advanced scientific methods, which are practical and effective when sincerely and fairly tested. The following seeks to call attention to old truths variously presented, trusting that some may catch the vibrant notes of joyous living.

The higher sense, inherent in every human soul, responds to such varied tones in nature's grand theme, that the failure of religious teachings to have more effectually brought peace, good will, prosperity and universal happiness to reign on earth has been due to striking the keynotes of human consciousness, always in the minor chords, such as those of retribution, atonement, self-sacrifice and the portents of eternal doom. The great purpose of the visible universe is joyful perfection, from the glistening dewdrop to the great shining sea; from the grain of sand to towering mountain peaks; from the tiny seedling to mighty forests, beauteous flowers and luscious fruits; from the feeble infant to masterful man who rules earth, sea and air, and it is vital that the attention should be turned to the joyousness of existence; to the grand hosannahs of achievement, and to a recognition of the truth that but for the dewdrop no shining seas would surge between continents, that the seedling conforms to the

laws of being and majestic forests are reared.

The babe obeys the divine urge within its soul, and Emersons, Gladstones, Clays. Websters, Humboldts and Edisons stand forth as master minds, statesmen, orators and scientists. The greatest possible benefit to every human being would be to realize that there exists within him the embryo of a master; that this marvelous power is inherent in him, to use and then to learn how to use it.

The wisdom of the ages has been fathered by experience, but as the twentieth century horticulturist rears flowers and fruits of supernal beauty and flavor, the result of experience, so may human growth today vield excellence of fiber and fruitage, avoiding much error and sorrow, for now we see, before we were blind.

The musician has learned from the technique of his art to draw his bow to produce desired tones and effects; he need not labor with discordant notes to do this.

In life's grand anthem some natures respond only to the strain of so-called practicality and, alas, they do strain every nerve to resist the cello tones of soul aspiration, calling them from their monotonous drum beats. Others are moved by intonations of peaceful repose or the vibrant clang of martial conquest.

Nevertheless, every instrument is needed to complete the Great Composer's plan; to those who are beating the drum of practicality, do so with a correct time and movement that is both glad and buoyant, not calling "taps" for all aspiring intonations! The celloist to blend his soulful tones in unison with the harp of peace and the bugle call to action.

Each individual life has its note of power and sweetness, which sometime, somewhere adds beauty and force to the whole composition. Shall not thoughtful minds pause and strike in harmonious accord the keynote of universal life, which is Love?

Organized Christianity Has Lost Its Hold On the Masses.

We note below some pertinent remarks by Rev. Frank Oliver Hall, D. D., of the Church of the Divine Paternity, New York City, in his convention sermon to the Universalists at the Church of Our Father, city of Detroit, on a recent date:

"Every clergyman and thoughtful layman must be impressed with the fact that a large majority of the people have somehow drifted away from the church and have little or no interest in its welfare or perpetuity. There is no violent antagonism to the church. We nowhere hear of mass meet-

ings to denounce the church.

"Men are intensely interested in a great many things: in politics, in science, in social problems, in sports, most of all in that most exciting of all sports to a man, the game of making money. Women are as intensely interested in various things, in art, literature, in bridge whist, and most of all in that most exciting of all sports to a woman, the game of achieving social success. But on the whole men and women are not interested in religion. I speak, of course, of majorities. A saving remnant is still vitally interested in the church and serves her interest in every possible way. Otherwise we must close the doors and suspend business. But what I say holds for the larger part of our people.

"Our time is characterized by a 'passion for reality.' Men have the idea that religion belongs to the realm of the unreal and the unverifiable, that the church is dealing with uncertainties and unrealities.

"Whether this opinion is just or not, it is certainly widely prevalent. And if the church is to regain the respect and loyalty of men it must be shown to deal with real things in a real way and to play an important function in human life.

Should Organize Forces.

"When you undertake to enlist the inter-

est of the average man in religion and the church he will probably tell you that, in his opinion, it makes no difference what a man believes about religion. We know better, of course. A man's religious belief will determine the man's character. But the average man has identified religion with opinions concerning such questions as I have indicated. So far he is right in his statement that it makes not the slightest difference what man believes.

"It is because the church has dealt with such questions until it has become identified in the public mind with their discussions and promulgation that men have come to feel that religion is detached from

life

"The churches have long tried to agree on some common theological creed and have failed most disastrously. They are no nearer agreement today than they ever were. But the attempt has never been made to organize the forces of religion and the churches for the accomplishment of the purpose which Jesus declared to be his mission. The gospel for an age of indifference calls for reorganizing and reuniting the forces of Christendom and pushing on toward immediate achievement.

"I believe that such reorganization is at hand. The denominational fences are falling in all directions. The denominational names have lost their significance. The old-time creeds have lost their power. We are going to wipe them all out soon. We are going to abolish all the old denominational designations soon. And we are going to get those men and women who believe in the noble dream of Jesus of the kingdom of God on earth into line to work together for the building of the kingdom."

A Decade of Progress.

Five years ago, the person who proclaimed that foods could be made remedial or curative, or that they were a potent factor in the cause of disease, was branded as a "crank" and faddist. In defense of this theory at that time, I wrote the following lines:

"If I mistake not, this decade will stand out in history as one of the most important since the world began. Its greatest achievement will be that it has put into motion a current of thought on the subject of human food, that will do more for the human race in one generation than all the learning of the musty centuries that have gone into the past."

Half of the decade has passed. Let us weigh this prophecy on the scale of what has since occurred.

Within the last five years the people of the nation have demanded that adulterating and poisoning foods shall cease, and Congress has passed the Pure Food Law and created a commission for its enforcement. True it is, that the law merely insists that things be what they are labeled-pure whisky and pure bologna are still bologna and whisky, and still unfit for human food, but the Pure Food Law has shown that the people can be awakened to a recognition of the fact that food as the constructive material of human life needs some considera-The Pure Food Law is the first step in the right direction. It is the crystallization of the thought that the nation's greatest asset is in the healh of the people, and that pure food is the greatest factor in health.

The last five years have witnessed a great popular uprising against patent medicines. People who now indulge in their use are pitied and looked upon as we look upon those who still believe in witchcraft, rabbits' feet or the horticultural influence of the phases of the moon.

Five years ago vegetarianism was considered only from its religious, moral or sentimental aspects, and the average college professor would have flinched from being called a vegetarian as he would from being called an anarchist. Today vegetarianism, or more properly, the question of the effects of flesh food, is being scientifically studied in many of the best colleges and universities in the land, with the result that flesh foods are now admitted by most upto-date scientists to be not only unnecessary, but actually detrimental.

A few years ago prohibition was looked upon as a proper thing for the employment of a few idle women and once-a-week preachers, but was considered unworthy of the support of the business interests of the country or the public press. The prohibition territory of the United States was then

confined to two or three "crank" states and a few scattered rural counties. Today the map is reversed, and "wet" territory is in the minority—a great prohibition movement has swept over the country—not because a few women and preachers have approved it, but because the American people are learning that intoxicating liquors are detrimental to health and prosperity. The same general wave of reform that passed the Pure Food Law is passing prohibition laws.

Until a few years ago consumption was treated with drugs, and the patient zealously guarded from exposure; today he is sent into the open air and instructed to sleep in tents in winter and under the canopy of blue in summer. All drugs are eliminated, and exposure to outdoor air, moderate exercise and pure food is the universal remedy-the remedy that cures. Nearly every state in the Union now has a society for the study and prevention of tuberculosis; and these societies are not controlled by the medical profession, but are philanthropic organizations working to place this information within the grasp of everyone who will learn.

Athletics and outdoor life are becoming more popular each year, and in our more progressive cities the physical welfare of children is receiving much attention from municipal governments.

Human Magnetism. M. Hopgson.

"What is more or less than a touch."

When my friend first offered to magnetize me I felt a little irreverent and very skeptical. To have my hands held in silence, with no emotional need on either side, made me smile with amusement. She held my hands, and then, with her left hand supporting my head, placed her right in turn over the nerve centers in the regions of the brain and heart. For a few days I felt that such means of nervous cure were probably highly imaginative, both in conception and issue, and then I began to realize that the "proper dispositions"-to use a theological term-were wanting. had lain with my eyes wide open and my brain busy; I must shut my eyes, empty myself of interests, and become, if possible, "as clay in the hands of the potter."

I made the necessary effort, and it was astonishing how soon my nerves relaxed their tension with my hands firmly held by my friend. By the time "magnetism" was over, I was always quiescent, and often pleasantly sleepy, though naturally externely excitable, and at present a victim of neurasthenia. But all this is merely introductory.

My experiences set me thinking of the deep symbolic and actual meaning attached to contact with the hand, and coming down to us through the ages.

As I lay one day with my friend's left hand under my head and her right over my heart, the beautiful words from the "Canticle of Canticles" came to my mind—

"His left hand is under my head and his right hand doth embrace me."

Satisfying and vitalizing this contact of the lover and beloved, and reproduced with a strange exactness in the work of magnetizing.

When I have been mentally disturbed or suffering from overmuch fatigue, with my nerves pulsating like a regiment of clocks, I have tried to attain the same calm and relaxed condition alone, lying as loosely as possible, shutting my eyes, and recalling within myself all my senses and powers. I have not succeeded; possibly by long, careful, and patient, practice much might be accomplished, but the easy and gracious way is that of companionship, strong and sympathetic, together with actual contact through that exquisitely sensitive guardian and director of power—the hand.

The use of the hand in blessing is very ancient, and priests are consecrated by the imposition of hands. If, as science seems about to declare indefinitely, all matter is simply a marvelous adjustment of electrical forces, who shall judge the power in all directions of the human hand, directed by the human soul immediately and beneficently?

But to pass within the lovely human experiences accessible to all; between friends the sense of communion is great if they sit or stand near ach other, but if their hands are joined there is an increase of nearness wholly incalculable, and in grief we are comforted thereby as we could never be by mere bodily presence. These are thoughts that float for me around the theory of magnetism, and they bring me back again to those wonderful words of Whitman with which I began, words pregnant with meaning and rich with truth:

"A Man From the Fourth Dimen-

BY DR. GEO. W. CAREY. Professor of Biochemistry.

If the statements herein recorded cannot be reconciled with advanced chemical and electrical research the reader is justified in rejecting them, as a record of actual phenomena, and consider the narrative the vagaries of hallucination. But if, on the contrary, it is shown that the results of electricity, molecular motion, chemistry and biology are quite within the scope of the basis necessary to establish the truth of this narrative, then it is clearly the duty of the reader to seriously consider the words of the "Man from the fourth dimension."

During the years 1891, 1892, 1893 and 1894, the writer resided at Spokane, Wash., engaged in the teaching and practice of biochemistry. I was at that time a member of the editorial staff of the Homocopathic News, a medical journal published at St. Louis, and had been, for several months, writing articles on the biochemic pathology

of disease.

During the month of September, 1893, I received a letter from the publishers of the News, asking if I could furnish a table of the proportion of each of the inorganic salts (minerals) contained in a healthy human body.

I thought at the time that it was strange that the publishers did not seek the information from the professors of physiology and anatomy in some medical college, but ascertained later that they had applied to several colleges and failed to obtain the data required.

I immediately instituted search in the library of medical text books, dictionaries and books on physiology, etc., but failed to find a satisfactory answer to the question

at issue.

I was in a quandry and much troubled. I felt that it would humiliate me if I could not obtain data from some authority that would enable me to answer the question propounded in a satisfactory manner. very much desired to keep myself secure, in the faith of the staff, in regard to my knowledge of the chemistry of life and my pride received a severe shock in view of the possibility that I could not "make good." I called on several physicians but none were able to answer the question.

I received the letter from the publishers Monday and had spent all the time I could spare during the week. Sunday came and I was quite miserable and discouraged. I went to my office in the Tull Block, Riverside avenue, about 10 a. m., locked the door and sat down at my desk with the intention of writing to the publishers that I was unable to give them the information they desired. While thinking how to word my letter a feeling of buoyancy and hope suddenly swept through my brain and all desire to write instantly departed.

I turned about in my chair and looked out toward the pine-covered hills, and then occurred the strangest phenomena ever witnessed by mortal man. Midway between my desk and the window there appeared, first the eye of a man, then one side of his face, then the entire face and head, which seemed to move toward me; then the entire body came into full view, exactly as if it had emerged slowly from behind a screen or curtain.

I cannot even attempt to describe my astonishment when this man appeared before me. He was dressed in dark gray clothes and held a soft brown hat in his hand. He appeared to be about 45 years of age. His beard was a grayish brown and close trimmed. His eyes were dark brown and very beautiful. After looking intently at me for a minute my visitor advanced a few steps and sat down in a chair about five feet distant from my desk and thus addressed me: "I have come at your request and am at your service."

I answered, "I am not aware of ever having met you before, and I am quite sure I have not requested your presence."

He replied, "You have been in search of

certain information during the past week; I am able to answer your question. No person can conceive of a question that cannot be answered. No one ever desires knowledge that they cannot obtain some time, somewhere, somehow. I came to offer my services to you."

"Come from where," I asked.

"From the fourth dimension," he replied.
"Where and what is the fourth dimension," I asked.

He smiled and spoke as follows: "The fourth dimension is simply a rate of motion, as are all other dimensions. I am now polarized at a rate of molecular activity that enables me to increase or decrease my rate at will. As you see me now, I am functioning in the three dimensional rate. the same as your body is polarized, and when I increase my molecular motion one dimension I will disappear from your vision. You are a three dimensional being, therefore you cannot fully understand what the fourth means. Man is not complete man while in three dimensional concept. Three sides of a square leaves a gap or lack of dimension that forms a square. A triangle is an abortion, or incomplete expression. All three-dimensions beings are mortal, that is, they must pass into the square before they realize immortality.

"You marvel how I got into the space that you think is a room walled in with sides, roof and floor, but a two-dimensional being would marvel as greatly at the suggestion that there was any dimension other than length and breadth. If an object be placed directly on a level, directly in front of or at right angles with a two-dimensional being, it can recognize it; but if the object be placed above or below the plane the being cannot possibly comprehend, or in any manner sense the object.

"In addition to length and breadth, you cognize depth, or up and down; therefore you can see ahead, at right angles or up and down, and you say that is all there is of space, just as the two-dimensional sees only two.

This room is not inclosed as you think it is. I will give you the correct proportion of the different minerals that form the base of blood, and remember that flesh and bone is simply precipitated blood."

My strange visitor then asked for paper and pencil and hastily wrote down the formulæ of 'inorganic salts upon which the organic structure of man's body is built. Laying the paper and pencil on the desk the fourth dimensional man continued as follows:

"Your body, and the bodies of all threedimensional beings, are composed of chemical formulas that cause a rate of motion of brain and nerve cells that causes the concept of three dimensions, or as Herbert Spencer wrote, 'The correspondences of environments.' You have probably heard of the co-efficiency of refraction, which is a rate of activity caused by a certain combination of mineral dynamos in the blood that renders tissue absolutely transparent. alchemists talked and wrote of this mineral combination and nothing else. The cellsalts in the human body are the 'Piolhsopher's Stone.' Your text-books differ in regard to the combination or proportion of these salts in the blood, for the blood of a living person varies in combination at different hours of the day because of work, rest or excitement, after or before meals, condition of digestion, etc. The formulæ I wrote on the slip of paper gives the proportion contained in the ashes of a perfectly healthy body after cremation.

"The mineral salts of magnesium sodium, lime, potassium, etc., are set free from food by the process of digestion and are then taken up by mucus membrane absorbents and carried into the blood vessels. The air is spirit substance and when breathed into the 'alchemical vase' the body-it unites with the minerals and forms the elixir of life, known as blood. The organic portion of food, the fats, albumen, etc., are burned up to furnish motive power to run the human engine. The oil found in flesh is not the oil taken as food, for that oil, or fat, goes through a chemical change in the stomach and intestinal tract and the oil is transmuted into energy or force. The oil in flesh is the product of certain air elements uniting with the molecules of potassium sulphate in the arteries

"When the molecules of organic matter and the inorganic salts unite and form tissue molecules and are polarized with the flat side outward, dense or opaque tissue is formed, as seen in three-dimensional beings. When the molecules are balanced so that the edges or corners point outward they form facets that reflect the effect of motion called light, in a manner that causes tissue substance to be transparent.

"All third-dimensional beings will pass into the fourth dimension during the 2200 years of the Aquarius, or Air Age, that commenced in the year 1900.

"Spirits, or so-called disincarnated souls, always have bodies and do not have to materialize when they appear to those on your plane; they simply change the rate of motion of their molecules. This truth accounts for all spiritual manifestation. It also accounts for multiple personality, for personal consciousness is the result of activity of brain cells. There are many cells in the average brain that lie dormant and unused for years, and when called into action by planetary aspects they sometimes completely change the character of the individual.

"The few who can at all sense the fourth dimension motion are the sensitives whose brain centers are easily polarized by the thought vibrations of those in the fourth realm. No new phenomena is presented to the clairvoyant, but that which is real, always, is made visible for a moment. When the cells of brain in three-dimension beings begin to change to the fourth motion the real man's form commences to appear, and if the energy of the man of the fourth be sufficient the whole form will appear. When this thought energy or motion lessens the so-called spiritual form apparently begins to disappear. The law of parallax causes the eye to see the two rails of a car track run together at less than a mile from the eye, or clouds to touch earth at a distance of fifty miles.

"Thus three-dimensional beings are only two-thirds men. About the year 1945 the influence of Aquarius, the 'Sign of the Son Man in the heavens,' will be sufficient to complete man by bringing into action his latent brain cells. Then will the Real appear and you will know that 'The Kingdom of Heaven' was always at hand."

Here my visitor ceased to speak and seemed to slowly slide behind an invisible screen and disappeared from my vision. Four years later I attended the analysis of the ashes of a cremated body a teamster killed by an accident while in robust health—and found that the proportion of cell-salts tallied exactly with the table given me by the Fourth Dimensional Man.

Esoteric Astrology.

Esoteric astrology pertains to the hidden, the subjective side of this divine science, having to do more with the individual soul growth of the Ego. It has to do with Infinity, and when the individuality has outgrown the physical environments, and passed beyond the desire condition, he comes under the rays of Esoteric Astrology. though from the first these rays are striving to manifest their influence upon the individual; the force of them depending upon the soul growth of the individual, and his or her receptivity to their uplifting rays; each expression tending to bring about a more perfect blending of the soul with these esoteric rays.

The Sun and Moon represent the individuality and the personality. The Sun, the individuality and rules by day, the Moon the personality and rules by night; while Mercury is the medium between the two, the transmitter; therefore a careful study of the positions of these planets together with Urania and Neptune. is important when considering the esoteric.

All in all, we may consider the Zodiacal signs and planets as an expression of the man; for instance the twelve signs may be likened to the aura, the luminous light that surrounds the man; while the Sign Ascending, can be considered as representing the physical expression, and the Moon represents the etheric body, the body drawn from the ether upon which the physical body is built.

The planets, Saturn and Mercury, represent the mind body, while Venus and Mars represent the desire body; Jupiter may be best understood as the casual body, or the medium through which the individuality finds expression; while the various gradations of matter, or the various conditions by which the Ego finds expression, are indicated by the divisions of the signs into groups of water, earth, air and fire. The watery signs pertain more to the astral substance; the earthy to the physical; the airy, the mental, and the fiery, to the pure etheric.

Thus various individuals are placed in various environments, and through this variance in position and quality, assist each other by contact to evolve to higher and purer types of expression; for if all were

manifesting under one group, they would not readily contact the qualities indicated in the other groups; and this is controlled by a wise and Divine Infinity.

In December STELLAR RAY we gave the influence upon the individual of the sign rising at the moment of birth, following we give the sign the sun was in at birth, denoting the individuality in contradistinction to the personality.

The Zodiacal signs are divided into three equal parts of ten degrees each, which are called decanates.

Aries is the first sign, and the first ten degrees of this sign are assigned to the natural ruler of Aries, which is Mars.

The nature of individuality of one born in the first decanate of the sign Aries, or between the 21st and 31st of March, is symbolical of the Mars and Aries influence, denotes one who hews the pathway for his fellowman, a pioneer, a soldier, or warrior.

The second ten degrees of Aries, between March 31st and April 10th, belong to the Sun, indicating a nature too proud and ambitious for his own ends. The third decanate, between April 10th and 20th, is ruled by jupiter. This signifies a learned man, one possessing the wisdom to teach others but, also, he is more apt to use his knowledge for a selfish purpose.

Taurus.

The first decanate of Taurus (from April 21st to May 1st) is ruled by Venus, the ruler of Taurus. This denotes one fond of ease and anusement, not ambitious, desiring fine raiment and ornaments. The second decanate of Taurus (from 1st to 10th of May), is ruled by Mercury. This gives more force to the mind and turns the attention to Taurus pursuits in tilling the soil and bringing forth the fruits of the earth. The third decanate of Taurus (between May 10th and 20th) is ruled by Saturn. This denotes one associated with mines, things of a hidden, occult nature.

Gemini.

The first decanate of Gemini (20th and 30th of May) is ruled by Mercury. This denotes one fond of study and learning, quick in thought and action. The second decanate of Gemini (from June 1st to 10th) is ruled by Venus, and denotes one fond of the arts, music and science. The third de-

canate of Gemini (from June 10th to 20th) is ruled by Urania, denotes one associated with science and learning in the occult and mystical.

Cancer.

The first ten degrees of Cancer (from June 21st to July 1st) are ruled by the Moon, and denotes one of a domestic nature, fond of home and family, and finds pleasure in looking to the comforts of them. second decanate of Cancer (1st to 10th of July) is ruled by Mars. This denotes one who will have many varied experiences in life, and who will not find the enjoyment they crave in their home. This shows one very wise in understanding. The third decanate of Cancer (10th to 21st of July) is ruled by Jupiter. This denotes a traveler, a missionary seeking to plant the seed of truth, but finds his mission a difficult one, and beset with many obstacles, but truth will finally conquer.

Leo.

The first decanate of Leo (21st to 31st of July) is governed by its natural ruler, the Sun. This is symbolical of one in power and authority, one in high position, though ruling more by his will and courage than through any mental capacity. The second decanate of Leo (Aug. 1st to 10th) is ruled by Jupiter, and denotes a dignitary of the church, one in power and authority, dignified but possessing judgment and diplomacy. The third decanate of Leo (Aug. 10th to 20th) is ruled by Mars. This denotes one who will have an eventful career and will occupy various positions in life, though a natural commander; he will ever strive to be at the fore.

Virgo.

The first decanate of ten degrees of Virgo (Aug. 21st to 31st) is ruled by the natural ruler of Virgo, Mercury. The second decanate of Virgo (Sept. 1st to 10th) is ruled by Saturn. and no doubt the Avatar was there, willing to give his teachings to all having the spiritual ability to comprehend them. The comet of 1882 blazed forth the glory of his efforts, bringing a spiritual influx to the new Aquarian reign to lighten the burdens of the aspirants to Truth.

History and Nature repeat themselves. The Jews were looking for a temporal king clothed in robes of regal splendor, and they spurned the lowly carpenter's son who was sent to them with the teachings they then most needed-Faith, Hope and Charity. Amid the mental storms then raging the peaceful Nazarine was overlooked beyond the fact that his poor, harmless body was nailed to the cross. Yet his spirit lived, and through years of persecution a small and faithful band of loyal souls preserved his thoughts. It was at least one hundred and fifty years after the night in the garden of Gethsemane that the world began to realize that a Master had been slain, and not until the time of Constantine did his teachings receive serious attention. The Teacher had come and gone, and though his words were clothed with lies by an unscrupulous priesthood, the principles he taught, the Sermon on the Mount, still lives and prospers.

Like the Jews, both Christians and Mystics have been awaiting a sign from heaven and the coming of a new Messiah. They are expecting a Spiritual King who will anounce his approach with a loud voice, amid tinkling cymbals and detonating brass.

The sign came, and with it, we may be sure, came the Master; persecuted as such great souls always are by the inversive elements who dread the force of the great truths that are so fearlessly taught. The sign came at the beginning of the Luni-Solar cycle in 1881; the great comet of 1882, fiery messenger of God, bearing the tidings of a new era to an expectant world, flashed a moment, and was gone: and as of yore, it was only the simple seer that recognized the sign heralding the Avatar, only the astrologer who saw and followed the Star in the East.

The needs of the time are Life, Light and Love, and though the Master has come and gone, unrecognized by the world, unknown but to the few, or perhaps unknown to all,

we may rest assured that the spiritual seeds have been sown, are now taking root beneath the black soil of confusion; that later, warmed by the sunshine of spiritual aspiration, they will grow in profusion, and that at the time of greatest need the luxurious fruitage will be spread before a famished world.

Pisces The Fishes.

The phosphate of iron may be produced by mixing sodium phosphate with sulphate of iron in certain proportions. The precipitated salt is filtered, washed, dried and rubbed to a powder. In order to render the molecules of iron fine enough to be taken up by the absorbents of mucous membranes and carried into the blood, this preparation must be triturated with sugar of milk to 6th X.

Ordinary tinctures of iron are useless if supplying iron to deficient blood is the end sought.

Iron molecules in blood, by that miracle of chemical affinity (another term for God in action—or Wisdom operating) attract their "soul mate," Miss Oxygen, and together they course through the river of life distributing the blessings of vigor and health.

Health depends upon a proper balance of iron in the blood. Heat, in so-called fever, is caused by the increased action of blood, and the distress and quick breathing by deficiency in oxygen. A molecular disturbance in iron soon breaks the continuity of other salts, for an injury to one is the concern of all in the cell co-operation commonwealth in the kingdom of Heaven" within. May that kingdom soon come among men, in order that we may have a sane civilization.

Hemorrhages are caused by deficiency in iron, but Kali phos (Aries) and Nat. Mur. (Aquarius) are also frequently deficient in hemorrhages (see Carey's "Biochemic System of Medicine").

Important Facts Regarding Spirit Com-

A subject of most vital interest and which must not be slighted in supernormal unfoldment is that of the science of the subjective mind, or the part it plays in spirit communication. Few students, except the most profound, realize the correspondence between the spirit incarnate and our subjective minds. Most persons unacquainted with occult science and spirit manifestations imagine that all mediumistic and supernormal phenomena are extraneous, and touch our present forms of consciousness from outside us, rather than from within us. This is all the more easily thinkable and accepted, since phenomena themselves are appearances which lay outside the sense man, or they appear to originate outside of him. This is the greatest error into which the populace and the unenlightened student could possibly fall. Nothing grows or lives outside of itself. The soul's life, its expressions or unfoldments are from within, and not at all from outside itself. Even the material universe grows, and manifests from within and its forms which seem to manifest outside (the outside being only another form of the within), are not outside at all, in the strict use of the word.

Recent investigations of the ether by Sir Oliver Lodge show that matter is corporeal and gross product of the ether—a substance so fine, compact and dense, that matter could not stand up without it, and disappears whenever there is a shift in the vortices of the ether. Like the grub worm in the crysalis that yields at length to the law of the transformation or transmutation

is a serpent on the physical. The very dust within and governing itself into the butterfly, the growth or metermpsychosis is from within itself, and, as a natural symbol hints at the greater cosmic symbol in astroreligious or occult science, of the phoenix, which, as an eagle on the spiritual plane, is redolent with spirituality, as demonstrable in the lily or the rose, if we could but smell it from within, and not as wafted to us full of germs and corrupt material in the process of decay and death.

The subjective mind is within the objective, and yet is independent of it. In fact, the objective mind depends upon it. So subtile is this interdependence, that no thought can arise in the objective mind without first expressing itself as an inspiration in the subjective. And yet the subjective is not wholly supernormal, and not at all unnatural, but an integral, natural hemisphere of the mind itself. In spirit communications, where a spirit excarnate is endeavoring to reach some loved one or earth, and by the law of attraction is dispatching a message, as best it can to that one, the message must be made up of the thought substance of the objective and subjective mind of the receiver, and while there is direction and quality in the inspiration of the spirit who impels the message or transmits it, that will or inspiration is under the material law of spirit communications, and is dependent upon the reflective power or capacity of the medium through whom the message is transmitted. If the mind of the medium is clear, that is, if the mind of the medium is free of cross lines, vibrations or thoughts, as commonly flow in and out of our normal minds, especially when active or working, or in a

state of flux, as most minds are, one can readily see how little of the original message or inspiration by correspondence, will come through, and in fact how much of error or extraneous matter will mix withthe pure message.

Again, it is a fruitful source of perplexity and doubt among the most advanced psychics, why certain facts or items of information can be given, while other items or facts of seemingly no greater value, apparently, cannot. This has been asked me again and again, and the only explanation which I have to offer and which seems to explain the difficulty is, that since one fact may be easy for the excarnate spirit to bring through, transmit or because spiritual or more amenable to the law of attraction which we do not as yet clearly understand, the other fact being more formal, distant and concrete, is not so easily transmitted by inspiration into the subjective mind, and through it into the objective mind of the medium. One instance will illustrate: A mother loses her child. She feels him come to her in spirit and, clairaudiently, she hears him reply to her question, "Where were you just now?" "I was with papa!" "Where is papa?" The little spirit replies he does not know, or rather

is unable to tell the mother. Now it knows as a matter of fact, but the mother has sent out a question with a doubt and wishes to make it a test of his actual presence or identity, and the child finds the doubt or test so darkly walling up the mind as to produce mists, veils or conditions which makes an answer impossible at the time. Now when it is understood, that no spirit can possibly use the brain of another as it could its own, when on earth, and not possessing a brain as an organ in the spirit world, that is, an organic material brain, and, as its own subjective mind does not and cannot always respond or correspond with that of the earth instrument, the difficulty in translating a thought from its own mind by inspiration to that of the mother or medium, is at once apparent.

A little more understanding on this most occult but intricately interwoven subject, in which all the functions of the soul play a vital part, will help us to carry on communion and communication with our departed loved ones in a normal and sane way, and not compel us or them to act ex-cathedra, or ex-machina, in a world, in which the spiritual and the natural are important hemispheres of one divine world,

and where the spirit is all in all.

Imported Japanese White Oak for Railroad Cross-Ties.

San Francisco, April ...- The growing scarcity of American timber suitable for railroad ties has induced one of the largest Japanese importing companies to introduce Japanese white oak as a desirable foreign species to take the place of the American oak, for railroad purposes. Several of the western roads have already purchased a large quantity of the Japanese white oak to be used in replacing worn out ties along their rights of way.

The increasing cost of all railroad ties has naturally led the railroad companies to desire to prolong the life of the species of wood used, by preservative methods, and only recently an application was made to the United States Forest Service to conduct experiments at their Berkeley timber testing station to determine the value and life of the Japanese oak timber when prop-

erly treated.

This application brought up the interesting point as to whether or not the Forest Service would be allowed to undertake experiments with foreign species of timber, inasmuch as the act under which these experiments are carried on specifically requires that only American grown timbers shall be treated. The Forest Service has found it necessary, owing to pressure of other work, to decline to undertake this experiment, and therefore this point was not considered. It is estimated that there is a large supply of this white oak in Japan and should its use for railroad purposes prove satisfactory, it is probable that a large market will be created for it in this country.


