VOLUME I

VOLUME III

The third volume contains a complete Astrological Dictionary in addition to chapters on eclipses and their effect in various signs, also the sun and moon, together with chapter on Election and Horary Astrology, and the strength and influence of each planet, the sphere and orbit of each, as well as examples for taking sidereal time.

Horary Astrology is fully elucidated.

This volume shows the auspicious times for commencing any business or other undertaking. It also contains tables giving the rule of the planets each hour of the day, with numerous charts and examples, also how to reduce mean to sidereal time. Colors of the different planets and Zodiacal signs are given. It also contains a valuable treatise upon marriage.

VOLUME IV

"A very few years ago 'forest conservation' was little more than a phrase; to-day it is a vital issue in our national development," says Treadwell Cleveland, Jr., in a circular on the status of forestry in this country, which has just been issued by the United States Forest Service. "In connection with the general plan to conserve all natural resources, it is the most important and far-reaching economic policy ever adopted and pursued by any nation.

"The forest is one of the chief supports of the whole material fabric of our civilization. The forest means not only a permanent supply of wood and the life of all the industries which depend on it, but also the control of the waters for human use. There is only barrenness in the future of the nation which has lost the use of wood and the control of water.

"The sort of use that was made of natural resources during the pioneering stage, while right enough at the time, is far too wasteful to be carried on into the new industrial era. In order to know how to use a thing, however, it is necessary first to find out how much of it there is to use, and taking stock of our forest resources has led to startling results.

"It has shown that we are still destroying the forest as we use it; that we are taking from it every year three and a half times as much wood as is added by the new growth. It has shown that less than one-third of the growing tree felled by the lumberman is ever used at all, so that two-thirds of all the timber cut is simply destroyed. It has shown that one-eleventh of all the forests are swept by fires every year, and that on the average since 1870 forest fires have yearly cost \$50,000,000 in timber and fifty lives. It has shown that over ninety-nine per cent of the forests in

private hands—which comprise three-fourths of all the forest land and four-fifths of all the wood—is thus devastated by destructive use and the scourge of unchecked fires, while less than one per cent is properly handled for successive crops or effectively protected from fire. The forest as a resource is rapidly being obliterated.

"But the inventory of the forests has had yet other ugly facts to reveal. With the disappearance and deterioration of the mountain forests the Nation is losing control of the streams, which are useful in our civilization in ways and degrees unparalleled by any other resource. Pure water for domestic purposes is, of course, indispensable; usable water at the right seasons is the sole reliance of the great projects by which the arid lands are vivified by irrigation; cheap water transportation is a matter of dollars and cents to every citizen; trustworthy power streams are the key to the age of electricity, at the gates of which modern industry is standing. Yet the guardian of the waters is steadily compelled to retreat before the ax and fire.

"In waste alone we reject more than two-thirds of the lumber that might be taken from the standing trees. At least half of this waste is unnecessary. In the first place, we waste the forest by refusing to take advantage of its full capacity for growth. Protected and properly managed, our forests will produce far more wood than they do at present. But while it is wasteful to cripple the forest by a violent lumbering which destroys young growth—the promise of the future forest—it is doubly wasteful to lock up the forest and let the ripe timber die and decay, for in the former case the forest at least contributes a temporary supply of wood, whereas in the latter case it contributes no wood at all.

"It is not use which destroys the forests, but waste. Not use as such, but destructive use, combined with inexcusable neglect, is causing the forests to dwindle under our progressive demands upon them. The problem, therefore, is not to be solved by disuse, but by wise use and protection. These together will so stimulate forest growth that the needed wood may be harvested without depleting the stock on hand, and will keep intact the protective cover at the stream sources."

The Golden Rule.

In the cities, or in any thickly settled community where no man knows his neighbor, in the common acceptance of the term; where competition and self-seeking are so great that the main desire of the commercially powerful is to crush the smaller man; where the trampling down of a few less fortunate is a thing of no moment—it seems to the one who is sympathetic with the "under dog" that the golden rule is obsolete.

The writer heard a successful business man say that all business men lied, cheated, crushed their competitors to the wall purposely, and gloated over it; that business was a case of "every man for himself, and the devil take the hindmost." To my question as to whether that was complying with the biblical injunction "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them," he replied: "We can't these days, and live." He was mistaken.

The golden rule is not exemplified by running down the whole Chinese race, because one of their number has committed a murder. (Disposing of the body in true American fashion, possibly learned through yellow journalism). For a time it seemed as though the "Brotherhood of Man" did not include the Chinese. Their vices were paraded before the public; their customs were ridiculed. Why should they not bring their vices here? When we go abroad we take our mannerisms, customs, fashions and vices with us.

The withdrawing of christian aid was discussed, just when their most desperate needs were learned. There was a widespread tendency to try and find ulterior motives in the work of all missionaries to the Chinese in this country. Such writers would have been justly indignant if those missionaries had bared the motives of their

criticisers in their everyday life, and caused them to be printed for public perusal.

The world is full of examples of the stronger crushing the weaker; the worker scoring the idler, the idler ignoring the worker; the malicious tale is carried by those who forget or do not know that such tales come back, if not in kind, in some way that will cause misery to the sender. It is the law that we must reap what we sow. When the harvest is ripe, we rarely remember that we did to others the things we are now unhappily reaping. When we are thoughtless, we may possibly be excusable; but when we are heartless in the bitter pursuit of those whom we envy, or disregard from any cause, it is unpardonable. The needless jab, the unkind cut, the useless bucking against others, the spiteful tale, the relentless pursuit of a rival, are not "as ye would that men should do to you."

"The thorns which I have reaped are of the trees I planted—they have torn me, and I bleed; I should have known what fruit would spring from such a seed."

A good illustration of the golden rule is seen in small, country places, where probably it has never been preached, and in many instances the demonstrators do not know the injunction of scripture by that name. Many live it almost perfectly who have never heard of it. With them it is simply a "fellow feeling" that makes them "wondrous kind." The spirit of it is found in districts where people are pathetically alone, in a way. There is no fire service, no police protection. People are many weary miles from a doctor; outside of church influence—therefore they have no pastor.

But the neighbor: It is the neighbor who understands and helps. It is the neighbor who takes his team and gathers in the crops for the sick man; it is the neighbor who goes for the doctor in the

night; it is he who fights the fire. It is his wife who leaves her work and scrubs and washes and bakes, and cheers the woman across the meadows. She does not have to investigate the antecedents of the ones in distress, allowing her sister woman to suffer hunger or pain while she does it!

The suggestions: "We have troubles of our own," and, "Keep your troubles to yourself," are not posted in country homes.

Why the necessity for the oft-repeated threats of arrest if the property-owners of our cities do not have their walks cleaned after snow storms? Because those owners of "slippery places" do not live the golden rule; while in the country, men not only shovel "every man over against his own house" but on to the neighbor's. It is a very common sight to see country people shoveling each other out—without any thought of the action being returned.

We are fond of noting how *others* do not live the golden rule. It would be well to observe ourselves for a while.

We are told the object of geometry is to investigate the properties of space, and we must assume Euclid purposely neglected to define the fourth dimension.

Proclus says, "Euclid wrote his fourth book, for the purpose of exercising beginners in the direction of errors in reasoning."

Euclid describes a point as that which has no parts or which has no magnitude."

In other words a point is an imaginary place, against or in substance or in space.

The first dimension is that which has only length and breadth, but no thickness, or a mere space between two points.

The second dimension is a solid, or that which has length, breadth and thickness.

The third dimension is a solid, or that which has length, breadth, thickness, shape, size and position; of which its boundries are called surfaces.

There may be many of the 1st dimension in the second dimension, and still more of both 1st and 2nd in the 3rd dimension, and you may find room for many of the 3rd dimension so you may assume a solid has three dimensions, a surface two, a line one and a point none. Now in defining the 4th dimension you must define the 4th dimension as constituting all of these or mean-

ing all of these, the eternal whole without length, without breadth, without thickness, as all of these have been defined, the 4th dimension must constitute the eternal limitless space and should not be spoken of as a place or condition, or if so it causes confusion, so the talk about vibration and rado activity and a hundred and one high sounding phrases is bosh. Nor is there any great puzzle to the meaning of the 4th dimension for there is no room for anything else but the fourth dimension.

Therefore the only puzzle there can be to it is in man's trying to define limitless space as a thing or space between points.

Mr. H. S. Le Valley has the best of the argument except he speaks of vibration and radio activity as these are merely imaginary things, or if they exist they become elements of a third dimension, though he partly defines it, when he says the 4th dimension is but extention, limited or universal.

As the other dimensions have been defined, there is no possible place for the 4th except to embody the whole, or it would go back to one of the other dimensions. Therefore it cannot be limited, or it would become a lesser dimension.

This I have defined in my works years ago.

I, at my wits' end, could but experiment.

Carefully I applied "colorless iodine" on small spots, and soon there was relief. After having suffered several days (before this was applied), a few applications gave desired results.

I was not at all affected, although at no time had I tried to avoid the poisonous vines, but had torn them away so, as we thought, they could do no harm.

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The Outlook for July, 1910.

The New Moon for July occurs on the 6th of July at 3:20 p. m., Chicago standard time, and the Full of the Moon on the 22d of July at 2:27 a. m. At the time of the New Moon the Sun is 14° in the sign Cancer, in parallel aspect to Mercury, and applying to a conjunction of Neptune. The outlook for the month is what would be called changeable; the parallel aspect of Mercury and the Sun is one of the aspects that causes an unsettled period in business, that is, days when general business is very active and promising. This will continue for several days, then get very quiet for a few days and be at a standstill. The aspect of Sun to Neptune indicates many changes going on in a small way, many individuals starting moves, travel and change of location, but as a rule general contentment among the masses, although the Sun coming to an opposition and parallel of Uranus the middle of the month shows a vein of discontent and possibly talk of strikes in

some localities. The weather condition will continue unusual as it has been during the first half of the year, more rain than is needed in some parts and much less than is best in other parts, the northern states coming in for their share of moisture and the southern states not having as much.

The cereal markets active and probably quite uncertain, I judge, subject to weather reports, and probably some crop damage. The effect of the Uranus aspect is to make the market subject to sudden changes during the middle of the month, occasional showing of strength, but also having considerable weakness off and on, and the stock markets as uncertain with several changes in the indications for them during the month. I consider the last ten days of the month the most favorable for starting new business or important changes for the average person.

12th. Moon 28° in Virgo, no close aspects. Is quiet; may be good generally.

13th. Moon 11° in Libra, sextile with Mars at 3 p. m. Is generally good.

14th. Moon 23° in Libra, square with Uranus at 7 a. m. Active, uncertain.

15th. Moon 4° in Scorpio, opposite Saturn 7 a. m. Is evil; be careful.

16th. Moon 16° in Scorpio, trine with Neptune at noon. Generally very good.

17th. Moon 28° in Scorpio, no close aspect, but good for Sunday affairs.

18th. Moon 10° in Sagittarius, applying to a good aspect of Mars. Is good.

19th. Moon 22° in Sagittarius; no close aspects. Is quiet but favorable.

20th. Moon 5° in Capricorn, square to Jupiter at noon. Is active, but good.

21st. Moon 17° in Capricorn, opposite Neptune at 11 a. m. Deceiving, uncertain.

22d. Moon 0° in Aquarius, square to Saturn 6 p. m. Is unfavorable generally.

23d. Moon 14° in Aquarius, parallel with Mercury. Active, changeable.

24th. Moon 27° in Aquarius, no aspects. Generally good for Sunday.

25th. Moon 11° in Pisces, trine to Neptune. Generally favorable.

26th. Moon 25° in Pisces, trine to Sun. Generally favorable.

27th. Moon 8° in Aries, opposite Jupiter at 8 a. m. Is active, changeable, but generally favorable.

28th. Moon 23° in Aries, trine to Mars at 10 a. m. Generally favorable.

29th. Moon 7° in Taurus, past aspects, but is quiet, uncertain.

30th. Moon 21° in Taurus, trine to Uranus at 9 a. m. Is generally good.

31st. Moon 5° in Gemini, trine to Jupiter at 2 p. m. Is very good, especially for all Sunday affairs.

The longitude of the Moon is given for 6 a. m. and all aspects as given are for Central Standard time.

Those who wish to take advantage of good and bad days, according to the Lunar and general aspects, will do well to choose those days when Moon is in good aspect to the Sun or Jupiter for dealing with officials, and those in prominent places. Avoid asking favors that you are anxious to be granted on days when the Moon is in an evil aspect to Saturn, and I have found that it is not well to start new affairs, make important changes, make investments or speculate on days when the indications are unfavorable in general.

If you wish to test this, look back at some of the dates in the past when you have started important business, changes, etc., and see what the aspects indicated.

Eighteen years of practice and observations show me that the aspects are powerful and reliable.

The Influence of the Moon on Human Respiration.

HENRY CLAY HODGES.

It is remarkable to note the ignorance which prevails among intelligent people regarding Planetary Law. As an example, not long since the undersigned listened to a sermon delivered by a friend which was in the main an able discourse, in which the speaker referred with eloquence to the Sun, Moon and Stars as evidence of the wisdom of the creative power of the Infinite.

Before closing, however, he remarked "how foolish it was to suppose that the Moon had any effect upon human life." He further declared that "there was no soil in his congregation for such ideas to take root," while the fact was that from the moment he took his first breath and for every hour since he had been dependent upon the alternating influence of the Sun and Moon for the breath which carried oxygen to his lungs, purified his blood and had prolonged his life for over 60 years.

Again we see how closely allied are the changes of the moon to those of malignant diseases. We find the critical periods, the fourth, seventh, fourteenth and twenty-first days, are from the time of the patient's first sickness. Why? Simply because the fourth day the Moon semi-squares its own place at the time of illness; the seventh day it squares; the fourteenth day it opposes; the twenty-first day it squares once more; but little does the world stop to consider the cause of these influences, which are due to immutable law.

"In perfect health it will be found that respiration follows closely the motions of the Moon, as for instance, dividing the lunar month into two equal parts, we have one portion light, the other dark. During the total lunar month, the Moon traverses the twelve signs of the Zodiac and remains approximately sixty hours in each sign.

The signs of the Zodiac are positive and negative, that is, masculine and feminine; the positive signs begin with Aries and are every alternate sign that follows. The same with Taurus, which is the first negative

sign. Now when the Moon enters the positive sign Aries and there are no cross aspects to interfere with the Moon's passive influence, also if the Sun's benefic rays are not crossed by malefic aspects being thus conducive to good health, the respiration takes place entirely by the right nostril, and when the Moon enters the first negative sign, Taurus (and the health is good), it will be observed that the breathing is conducted entirely by the left nostril.

This fact is quite significant in the consideration of the Moon's influence upon the health and its relation to the sign Gemini ruling the lungs. There is no doubt that many individuals do not take breath into the lungs in the proper manner, and this subject should be given careful attention by those who may be in attendance upon the sick, for the health depends in a large degree upon proper respiration, which should be effected by the nostrils entirely, although in outbreathing the mouth may be used. The first important thing to do upon arising in the morning is to fill the lungs with fresh oxygen, forcing through excessive outbreathing every particle of air from the lungs possible. If proper attention was given to breathing there would not be so many cases of lung, throat and blood disorders.

During the time in which the Moon is traversing through a sign, viz: about sixty hours, it will be observed that respiration changes from one nostril to the other thirty-one times, and sixty divided by thirty-one gives just one hour, fifty-six minutes, seven seconds and a fraction, of alternate work for each lung. It may also be observed that, if at the time of Sunrise, the respiration takes place through the right nostril, then for three successive mornings at Sunrise respiration will take place by the right nostril. If at Sunrise the respiration is through the left nostril, then for 3 successive mornings it will take place through the left nostril.

Respiration effected by the right nostril is said to be under the Sun's influence, or solar in its effect, while that effected by the left nostril is lunar in its effect. If there appears an alteration in this order, it will be due to a like period having passed at the time of the observation, or to imperfect health.

To observe this law will assist one to realize that all the universe is related, and that every atom, object or thing breathes in unison, when it is in tune, or its normal condition of being. The inbreath and outbreath responding to the inbreath and outbreath of the universe, and in this is where the cross aspects cast their affliction, and affect the perfect equilibrium of things in the physical, or world of matter. It is one of the keys to health, to fully understand and follow this knowledge of proper respiration.

The First and Thirteenth Respiration Are Identical.

Finally it will be observed that according to the calculation based upon twenty-four hours, that the thirteenth change in breathing, is identical with the first breath, for then the Moon enters another sign and there naturally comes a change of respiration. We found by dividing sixty hours by thirty-one we have one hour, fifty-six minutes, seven seconds and a fraction. Then, for instance, in the period of the light of the Moon, it will be observed that the respiration on the first, second and third days are lunar, or by the left nostril. Then, using the one hour and fifty-six minutes, seven seconds and a fraction of time to base the changes, it becomes evident that for the balance of the day or twenty-four hours the respiration will alternate between the left and right nostril.

We may illustrate further taking the period as represented by the light of the Moon, and we have the first, second and third days when the respiration is lunar at Sunrise, and alternates during that time from left to right nostril. Then the fourth, fifth and sixth days, the respiration will be solar at Sunrise and alternate between right and left nostril. Then the seventh, eighth and ninth days the respiration will change to lunar again at sunrise, and alternate from left to right, and on the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth days the respiration is again lunar at Sunrise, while in the intermediate days upon the tenth, eleventh and twelfth days the respiration has been solar at Sunrise.

The same changes will be found to manifest during the period of the dark of the Moon except that they begin under the solar influence. The Moon's influence be-

ing weakest during the dark period or old of the Moon. Thus, the first, second and third days in the period of the *dark* of the Moon, the respiration at Sunrise is solar in its influence, the breathing being by the right nostril. By carefully considering these two illustrations if the student may follow this regularity of alteration to the exact day and hour as illustrated, he will know he is in a healthful condition, and that if he is not following this regularity of alteration, he may be sure he is in discord with the law.

Kings and Comets.

The King is dead; sic itur cum astra.
Requiescat in pace, rex vivat!

As the French would say, 'Boutez en avant!'—Push forward!

Since time immemorial it has been the astrological custom—or shall I say dogma, thesis, prophecy, superstition, coincidence, or truth?—to associate the inter-terrestrial perihelion passage of large comets with the fall of empires or the passing of kings.

The question arises as to how the astro student may know and *prove* through which of the above terms the blue pencil may be drawn free from the bias of egoistic prejudice and conviction.

It is impossible to eliminate by observation of perihelion passage the possibility of mere coincidence because of the infrequency of such celestial events, except in the case of telescopic comets. Impossible at least for many centuries, because we have no authentic records of either the accuracy or extent of the past observations upon which the dictum was handed down to the days of modern astronomical methods.

But if weight be given to the influence of these celestial "vagrants" at perihelion, then at least some weight should be given them all along their eccentric orbits, except in cases in which their orbit lies in a plane of very great inclination to the earth's orbit, or ecliptic, as it is called. The proper way, then, to conscientiously and scientifically determine the horoscopic significance—if they have any—of comets would be to compute ephemeris for their

entire revolution and observe them as constantly in nativities, and with the same vigor we apply to our more "steady going" planets.

No astro student of today has followed the aspects of Neptune through more than one-third of one revolution (few that), yet from the thousands of relative positions it has, in that time, formed with the swifter planets, we have learned beyond contradiction the general nature of it's biological and psychological functions, and many of it's individual peculiarities.

Waiting for the perihelion passage of comets is far too slow and uncertain a method for determining beyond the possibility of coincidence whether or not they should be given an important place, or any place, in our consideration.

At the same time they should not be ignored because of their attenuity and insignificant mass and consequent absence of perturbation of the earth even when as close as the recent visitor; for, while Neptune's influence readily shows itself in the affairs of men, and has a mass one-fifth of the earth, still it does not at any time disturb the earth in it's orbit to a measurable degree, and thus the absence of measurable physical disturbances between two celestial bodies, considered as acting upon the center of mass, is no evidence whatever of a lack of an imperceptible (mechanically or physically speaking) influence of far-reaching psychologic, biologic, and pathologic significance to the life they support upon their surface.

That Halley's comet exerts an ulterior influence on the minds and conditions of some men has recently been evidenced in both a humorous and pathetic manner, but that it has either a psychological or physiological one of a subjective and unconscious nature is far from proven by the number of coincidences recorded.

Mouline se battre contre des is one of the watchwords of Science, but between the superstition of the comet's ulterior designs—such as head-on collisions!—and an investigation into it's possible subjective influence on the human organism, through the sensitive cells and nervous system, lies the abyss separating the illiterate masses from the scientific mind. * * * * *

In viewing the horoscope of the late

King Edward we find no weighty argument favoring this particular coincidence of the ancient dictum. The comet was 5° of Aries at his death, and thus close square to progressed Saturn and Jupiter in the radical ascendant, and Jupiter and Mars assisted by afflicting the same points by transit.

This might form an "excuse" to those students who may not have rectified and progressed the nativity correctly, but if these be done, and the nature of his illness be considered, we are convinced of other more potent influences from a different planetary source.

All his life Edward VIIth was in health harassed by one prime affliction; namely, the moon nearly in partile square to Saturn rising; and he succumbed to a lunar complaint (exposure, cold, pneumonia).

For sixty-eight years he fought this astro affliction with the marvelous vitality of the Sun sextile to Mars, but in due time Nature claimed her own, and said, not to the King but to the man, "Move on!"—a man of human faults but greater humane virtues. We note that at birth the zenith was smiling on Saturn in the ascendant, and thus indicative of his "life job" (to speak clearly and not flippantly). Then we should expect to find this combination afflicted at his death. It was.

At death the progressed 6th and 12th houses (ruling the body and it's sickness and dissolution) had just passed the aspect of Saturn's radix in the ascendant, and had reached the arc of the native zenith and nadir (the latter is by some called the end of life, the grave, etc.) The exciting transits to the native Moon and Saturn were evil one's of Venus and Mars, the latter translating to the comet and first mentioned combination. The progressed ascendant was $28^{\circ}59'$ of Aries and in faint square to the Sun in $26^{\circ}28'$ Capricorn. This arc was excited by Uranus "stationary" in $25^{\circ}13'$ Capricorn, and by Saturn in $28^{\circ}45'$ Aries.

It would require considerable courage (or prejudice in favor of the ancient dictum) on the part of a careful student to assume the passing of this monarch would not have occurred at that time just the same had the comet been at it's aphelion on the 6th of May instead of at perihelion.

Had the comet been of great weight in this nativity why did it not hasten death

between April 16th and 30th when it passed to and from a stationary angular affliction very close indeed to Saturn and the Moon's radical positions?

The danger of erroneous conclusions as to the prime causation of any event is necessarily very great if there is the least error in the birth moment.

The rectification used is the writer's slight correction of the rectification by the English astrologer, Bailey. The rectification was completed last November and every public event of importance, as well as many personal ones, were used and made to agree in arc length exactly to their respective times. No readjustment was found necessary to make the one "time" arc (the 6th and 12th to arc of Saturn and 4th) measure correctly to the exact time of death. This "time" arc is a significant one when we consider the birth affliction and the peaceful transition.

Another point in this chart at death is that the progressed Moon was forming a good direction to the Sun, and unafflicted. This as often occurs at death as not, and only goes to show how insignificant the planetary directions are as compared with those directions dependent entirely upon the birth minute; aye, even the 4th second when the great issues of life are at stake.

Let the comet "help" if the student wishes, but let him not blame the death of

a much beloved monarch upon this wanderer alone. In another article under the same caption I will deal with the horoscope of King George Vth, and perhaps sprinkle a little acid upon the "12th house" astrologers so fond of predicting "woe and wars" each week.

Unusual Physical Phenomena.

BY JANE R. GRIFFING.

The following record is by a lady who was well known to Dr. Richard Hodgson and whom he regarded as a competent witness. He reported from her several experiences which were published in the Jour-

nal and Proceedings of the English Society. Cf. Proceedings Vol. XI, p. 462, and Vol. XIV, p. 292; Journal Vol. VII, pp. 176-179, Vol. VIII, pp. 145-147. The present experiences were written in a diary, some of them so recorded contemporaneously, and then afterward copied from this diary for me. I have seen the original diary and

have omitted from the account certain personal references which affected only certain members of the family, but do not concern the nature or integrity of the record. I have changed the four names of her children to suit Mrs. G.'s request. All other names remain as in the record. With Dr. Hodgson I also regard Mrs. G. as a competent and intelligent witness. She has been especially critical in her observations and records.

The incidents vary in nature and evidential value. I do not mean to enter into any destructive examination of details: This may be left to intelligent readers. It will be apparent that some of the physical phenomena are conceivably explicable by some possible ordinary cause, though there is no evidence in the premises that it was present. Other facts, however troublesome they may be to accept, are interesting and will give service in a collective mass of similar incidents. They are all worth recording as experiences.—James H. Hyslop.

Phenomena in Minnesota, September, 1895,

In the autumn of 1865 we moved into a small house in the village of Plainview, having sold the house in which we had been living, as we were to leave Minnesota in the spring. The house stood by itself in a large lot, about five minutes walk from the street, and as far from the nearest neighbor. All the people in the neighborhood were quiet, respectable families. Early in the winter my husband left home to attend law school and my household consisted only of women and children, my sister Emily, twenty-three years of age, my sister-in-law, Kate, the same age, and Nettie, seventeen, and my two young children. The three girls did the housework, looked after the children and waited upon me. I was very ill, not able to sit up more than an hour a day. A physician came to see me three times a week. We seldom saw any one else; had no visitors to speak of. Soon after my husband left we began to hear mysterious footsteps and raps about the house and I often saw lights in my room at night. Nettie finally asked me if I was willing she should sleep upstairs with the other girls as she was so annoyed by footsteps about her bed. (She

slept in the room next to mine). I assented to the change and after that the three girls slept in one large room which was reached only by a stairway going up from my room. Not long after the change was made there was the heaviest snowfall of the winter. In that prairie region if there is a high wind when snow falls it is piled in great drifts in places, often impassable for days. On this occasion the snow drifted badly and there was a wall of snow several feet high all about our little home. No one could come there or go out of the house for at least a week. The usual dullness of our life was greatly increased one evening after a dreary day the girls went to bed for want of anything else to do. The lights were out and everything quiet before eight o'clock. Just at that hour there came a tremendous blow, as it seemed, on the side of the house. Greatly startled I called out, "Girls, what is that?" and they at the same time shouted together the same question. There came more blows apparently in different places, and I asked, "Is that spirits?" Then there were three loud knocks. Then raps and loud blows all over the house and Emily called out in great fright that a hoopskirt that hung on the wall was whirling all over the room and under her bed. I called to her to light her candle and come down. She said that her candle was gone. I lighted my lamp and finally Emily came down in a state of extreme nervous excitement. She became calm when she was with me in the light and away from the circus performance of the hoopskirt. I began to ask questions by repeating the alphabet, writing down the letters as they were indicated by raps. The questions were answered as readily if asked mentally. In answer to the question "Who is it?" the name Charles Legrand was given. He was an admirer of Nettie's, living in another part of the state. There was no real information given. Before Emily came down there were raps on the stove-pipe in music time. Finally a dance time was rapped out and Nettie, under some strong influence, as she told me next morning, got up and danced. She said she felt a hand on her shoulder and some one danced with her. At one, the voices suddenly ceased, after telling us that they would come at the

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same time next evening. Emily's candle was found between the two mattresses and the hoop-skirt under the bed.

Second Evening.

The next evening we were all settled for the night at the time appointed and as soon as the lights were out the noises began. They were more varied than before. There were sounds as of persons dancing and I heard a low uncanny laugh more than once. Different articles in the girls' room were whirled about and Emily again became too frightened to remain. The candle was gone again. She came down stairs. In answer to the question "Who is it?" there was rapped out "I am the devil" and at that there was a fearful Bedlam of noises, not only in and near the girls' room, but apparently all over and outside of the house. I was thoroughly frightened. The evening before I had enjoyed it but it seemed as if now there was really some demoniac play going on. Kate and Nettie were frightened and lay close together, their heads covered by the bed clothes, so they told me afterwards. Exactly at ten it ceased, after telling us that they would come again the next night. On account of the apparently evil character of the influence I was afraid of it and as my doctor, the next day, succeeded in reaching the house, I asked him to be present at the next performance.

THIRD EVENING.

Dr. W. was there, the noises began promptly about the same as before. Emily, again too frightened to remain upstairs, Dr. W. held a lamp at the stairway so that she could see to come down. It was blown out by a strong gust of wind and a chair thrown at the doctor. Every time he lighted the lamp and held it there, the same thing was repeated. There was a low loft opening out of the girls' room in which articles not in use were stored and we heard sounds as of persons actively engaged in pulling them out apparently for the purpose of throwing them at Dr. W. though none of them struck him. These noises ceased at the usual time with the promise to come again the next night. The next day we sent for a cousin of mine and his wife. The girls did not wish Dr. W. to go up into

their room and we wanted some one there to go up.

FOURTH EVENING.

My cousin came, noises began promptly and were the same except there were more in my room. The doors and windows were violently shaken, even a closet door, and there were what seemed pistol shots in the room. Outside of the house and in the woodshed also, there was a great commotion. We wanted Colin and Lucy to go up to the girls' room but they were afraid, said nothing would induce them to go. At the usual time the noises ceased, after the message (in answer to my usual question, "are you coming again?") that they were not coming. I asked why and they said, because they had accomplished their object. When the noises ceased my cousins took a lamp and went upstairs. As they reached the landing various small articles fell to the floor from the ceiling. That was the last of these manifestations. After that we never heard a rap.

It has been suggested that possibly Nettie produced these disturbances for amusement. (As to the other girls it was a moral impossibility.) But, assuming that she would do it, it was impossible. Aside from the fact that except on one occasion for a few minutes, she was in bed with her sister Kate, she could not have produced one-tenth of the noises had she been alone and unobserved, without confederates, more than one, out of doors as well as in the house. On the last evening there were very burning. Then she could not have answered the questions which were often not audibly but mentally asked. If she had produced such extraordinary disturbances so successfully she would have been likely to repeat it on a larger stage, but that was the last as well as the first. She was a gay, lively girl, clever and intelligent, but with no unusual mental traits except a gift for flirting. Kate was a conscientious, sensible girl and had a horror of the superhuman. Emily was conscientious, devoted to me, excitable and nervous and has had all her life, more or less, of what are called "psychic" experiences. No doubt her influence and Nettie's combined, enabled the unseen intelligence, whatever it was, to

manifest itself by the disturbances so entirely outside of ordinary experience.

Science, the Key of Life, by Alvidas.

The student of Astro-science, which broadly speaking is but another name for the mathematical formulae of life, by which supreme order, intelligence, wisdom and justice are maintained in the universe, is never surprised by the ever new and fresh revelations of wisdom from the busy adepts, both incarnate and excarnate. God's laws are eminently just and wise. I cannot begin to explain all that the student will receive by a patient study of each volume, such wise counsel as to appreciate what Mr. Hodges has done in placing these books in the hands of the reader. They contain gold nuggets from the mines of truth, which will give one the imperishable wisdom, which serves one well in this life and the life to come.

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
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
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
