

New Christianity, Scientific, Practical.

Members of the University of Chicago divinity school faculty have defined and formulated the characteristics of a "new Christianity."

The professors note the arrival of a new type of religioin in an official editorial in the current number of the Biblical world, issued by the university press.

In the anonymous editorial, responsibility for which is accepted by the 13 editors, the university authorities point to the coming of the "new Christianity" as a type of faith which shall result in "the releasing of men's minds from the bonds of tradition and creed," accept the results of the scientific study of the world and deal in every day works more than in theological subtleties. The religion is described as "scientific, ethical, practical and altruistic."

After stating the necessity of scientific study the author of the editorial proceeds:

"If there be a controversy between genesis and geology the new Christianity will stand with geology. The record left in the strata of the earth cannot be impugned by a poet of the pre-scientific age, even though that poet be also a prophet of a higher conception of God than had before his day prevailed.

"In conformity to the same principle the new Christianity will accept the assured results of historical investigation into the records of ancient times. Religion has its rights, but also has history, and one of these is that it be studied by historical methods."

Not until men love achievement for the common good rather than for selfish use, will we be one whit the better for change of rulers or law makers. * * * * * * The day is in the dawn, wherein farms, and factories and mills and railroads will be managed and manned by men working with and for each other. * * * * *

Dining rooms much better appointed than in most homes, reading rooms, and libraries, recreation rooms and gymnasiums, first-class lavatories, and many other related aids and incentives to intelligence, cleanliness and the higher life, are coming to be quite the thing.

And further, the blending of interests by employers and employed is gaining ground. In many institutions large bodies of employes of both sexes are taught systematically and in a fraternal spirit, the lessons of thrift, economy, good taste in many of the details of life. Regular systems of saving are instituted, and in many such plants it is principally the duty of one or more persons to look after such matters for employes. It is too wickedly true that in our eagerness to hasten evolution, we keep right on seeing only the worst side of capital's treatment of labor. It is bad enough heaven knows, and disregard for human life and comfort on the part of large employers is probably the rule yet; but the exceptions are increasing so fast that our criticism and complaint are in all fairness bound to take note hereafter of the growth of humanitarianism in factories and shops, as well as in the magazine editorial rooms .- From Editorial in "Homer Vidette," published in Homer, Mich.

Influence of the Fixed Stars.

The question has often been asked do the fixed stars have influence upon human life, and we give the following illustrations which prove to our mind that in many cases they have a powerful effect in shaping the life.

For instance, more or less of these fixed stars were dominant at the birth of Napoleon I, Marie Antoinette, George Washington, also at the birth of Hazen S. Pingree, the late radical progressive governor of Michigan.

Gov. Pingree was born August 30, 1840. The Sun was in the critical sign Virgo and the 7th degree of Leo was rising at the time he took his first breath.

The sign rising indicates the personality and Gov. Pingree was a Leo character out and out.

The fixed star North Asellus was along in the 7th degree of Leo and Mars was in the 5th degree of Leo.

Urania was casting a favorable influence to this sensitive point.

It would be impossible to give a more accurate description of the life and characteristics of Gov. Pingree than will be found in the following extract from Science and Key of Life, Volume IV, Page 267. Corporations were arrayed against him, newspapers refused to publish his manifestos and the pew which he had occupied for years in one of the leading churches is said to have been rented away from him. Still he blazed away at the strongholds of his opposers and brought about many reforms for which the people of Michigan now applaud him.

He died suddenly in the city of London while on his return from a trip to Africa.

Like other great reformers he was cannonaded in his day and canonized after his death. (See Science & Key of Life for following.)

August 22d to September 23d. Virgo—the Virgin Mary.

Virgin means pure. Mary, Marie, or Mare (Mar) means water. The letter M is simply the sign of Aquarius, "The Water Bearer."

Virgin Mary means pure sea, or water.

Jesus is derived from a Greek word, meaning fish, out of the pure sea, or water comes fish. Out of woman's body comes the "word made flesh.". All substance comes forth from air, which is a higher potency of water.

All substance is fish, or the substance of Jesus.

The New Moon for September occurs on the 3d at 12:05 P. M. The Full of the Moon on September 18th, 10:52 P. M., Chicago Standard time.

At the time of the New Moon, the Sun is applying to a trine of Uranus and sextile of Neptune, and a conjunction of Mars, altho the other aspects are the first ones formed, therefore will have the most effect, altho Mars being in the 10th house will be powerful and have a strong effect upon business and upon the political affairs of the country. I judge from these aspects, that business will be average good during the month, altho subject to occasional dull periods of a day or two at a time, but the masses or common people generally satisfied, altho slightly restless and active minded, a little more so than usual.

11th. Moon square to Sun at 2 p. m., be careful, even if Sunday.

12th. Moon past aspects, is somewhat quiet, not good for starting affairs.

13th. Moon applying to strong aspects. Is active but uncertain, be careful.

14th. Moon trine with Mars at noon, generally good, buy, ask favors.

15th. Moon square to Saturn 10 a. m., is deceiving and evil, be careful.

16th. Moon trine with Jupiter at 7 a. m., is good, push affairs.

17th. Moon sextile to Saturn 4 p. m., quiet, but generally good.

18th. Moon sextile to Neptune at 5 p. m., very good for all Sunday affairs.

19th. Moon not closely aspected, indicates a quiet day.

20th. Moon opposite Jupiter at 3 p. m., is active, changeable, but fairly good.

21st. Moon conj. with Saturn at 4 p. m., is uncertain, risky, sell, use care. 22d. Moon applying to good aspects, is favorable generally.

23d. Moon trine with Sun 8 a. m., is good, push affairs, buy, make changes.

24th. Moon square to Venus at 8 a. m., active, generally good.

25th. Moon square to Sun at 2 p. m., is not good, be careful.

26th. Moon applying to a sextile of Venus, is quite fortunate. Buy.

27th. Moon not closely aspected, is a quiet day, generally good.

28th. Moon not closely aspected, is quiet and uncertain.

29th. Moon still unaspected, looks quiet, but even and favorable.

30th. Moon trine with Saturn 10 a. m., is generally good. Buy.

Note:—If you are starting new and important business, it is best to have the Sun well aspected to some one or more of the planets as well as the Moon, and best to have the aspects forming than to have them past. It is not well to start important business during periods of bad aspects, as they will surely bring annoyances eventually that you can escape by choosing a good time.

Schellschmidt of Louisville, Ky., states that "they generally manifest themselves about the time of puberty and are very severe for a few years, but with increasing age the attacks become less frequent, until at the age of forty they seem to almost disappear and are seldom or never seen after fifty. They are associated with vertigo, nausea and vomiting. The pain is in and around the eyes and while the attack lasts there frequently is partial or total blindness. Those who complain of this trouble suffer from prodromal symptoms for several days before the attack shows itself in an active form, which symptoms differe in different patients.

When treatment is demanded it is more for the pain than anything else. Opium will relieve but does more harm than good, as it leaves the system in a worse condition to resist a subsequent attack. Antikamnia tablets give great relief and act quickly. An emetic will sometimes abort an attack. The bowels should be kept open and those diuretics which hasten the elimination of the urea should be administered. If the attacks are due to a reflex nervous condition the cause must be sought and treated.

The adult dose of antikamnia tablets best suited for the relief of these headaches, is two overy three or four hours." A.K. Chem. Co.

Miscellaneous

Forests in China.

In considering the progress of the almost world-wide movement for protection of forests, an interesting review has just been made of the work in China—a country which is so often cited as an example of the evil effects of deforestation.

In a portion of the Celestial Kingdom earnest efforts are now being made to reestablish a forest cover by planting. Consul Wilbur T. Gracey, of Tsingtau, China, reports that the Germans in that region are making successful attempts at reforestation. The success of the work was practically assured at the start, for to Germany is given the credit of having the highest developed system of forestry, and it was natural to expect that the long experience in forest work in the Fatherland would lessen preliminary experimentation and hasten progress in China.

When Tsingtau was occupied by the Germans about eleven years ago the hills were found bare and barren, with only a sporadic growth of scrub pine and weeds. Plans for reforestation were at once made, and about 2,965 acres have already been planted. About half of this is planted in acacias, the balance in pine, larch, walnut, oak, ash, maples, and alders. So ccessful has this planting been that the point has already been reached where the sale of timber can be made. Small branches are sold for firewood and some of the timber is used for mining purposes. The sale and exportation of acacia is expected to become a considerable source of revenue during the next few years.

It is particularly remarkable that this work should have been so successful in view of the difficulties to which the plantation was subjected. The rainfall is light and lack of moisture considerably retarded the development of the trees. By far the worst enemies, however, were insects. Various species of caterpillars and other insects have been so destructive that thousands of Chinese boys and women are now engaged annually to destroy them. Various measures of prevention have been tried, such as placing girdles of glue on the trees, but these have not been effective and it was found necessary to resort to a systematic destruction of the insects by hand.

During 1908 over seven million caterpillars were gathered by hand, smashed, cov-

ered with lime, and afterwards used as fertilizer. This method has been successful in protecting the greater part of the plantations, but on the mountains on the border of the territory the trees are eaten bare. Acacias appear to withstand the attacks of the insects better than any other species, and the summits of the mountains are now being planted with these trees in an effort to check future destruction. In addition to these enemies, Chinese thieves are another source of difficulty, and on one occasion a band of thirty-six thieves was captured in the act of stealing wood.

In spite of these drawbacks, however, the work has been so successful that the Chiese government is now undertaking forestry schemes in a number of places under advice from German experts. This work centers about Mukden, Manchuria, where success has already been obtained with acacias and experiments are now being made with other trees. The first Chinese forest school was established at Mukden two years ago. Six hundred and twentyfive acres have already been set apart for cultivation, and 24,710 acres are to be purchased for afforestation.

Three large mines in China, in the provinces of Chihli and Shansi, which are under the management of Europeans, are making plans for afforestation, and the Shantung railway is planting acacias along 260 miles of its track. This, however, is simply a beginning of the work, and the Chinese government now has in contemplation the inauguration of extensive afforestation work in different parts of China.

Domestic Chats.

My "fireless" has not the roasting and baking attachments, but I intend to have them another summer. I cook meat and fowl nicely. I made beautiful jelly, cooked the fruit in it, all night, then strained the juice off and put on the oil stove a little while to melt the sugar. I shall make preserves in it and cook fruit for canning.

Most women are too warm and tired to enjoy a vegetable dinner after being over the fire for an hour or two, in a hot kitchen. I wish they all could try a fireless for a month and enjoy life. They cost from \$5 to \$30, and if your husband says he cannot afford one, tell him it pays for itself and is cheaper than doctors or undertakers.






