The Astral World.

The astral world is a definite region of the universe surrounding and interpenetrating the physical; it is composed of an extremely subtle form of matter invisible to the physical sight. There are seven states or conditions of physical matter, solid, liquid, gaseous and four others, etheric in nature, under which are classified the innumerable combinations which similarly go to make up the astral world. All physical atoms possess their astral envelopes of astral matter, forming what may be termed the matrix of the physical, for it is imbedded in the astral. Astral matter serves as a vehicle for the one life animating all. It sustains and nourishes every particle of physical matter-giving rise not only to what are termed vital forces but to all electrical, chemical and other energies.

ASTRAL BODIES.

The next important vehicle of the soul is what is termed the astral body which belongs to the astral world. If one will imagine the physical world to be annihilated, he will still have a perfect copy of it in astral matter, so that those who pass out of the physical into the astral or spirit world would be unconscious of any difference in their surroundings as they would behold this counterpart of the physical life and naturally, believe themselves to be still living in the physical form and so continue to be actively engaged in maintaining their old ideas and customs.

Take such countries as Africa, China, Russia, etc., and the atmosphere is filled with intelligences who have lived under their crude customs, and their influence affects to a great measure the material condition of those countries, making progress difficult, for the reason that both spirit and mortal are absorbed in the material plane of life. Thus the astral duplicates of material objects which surround those who

have passed from the mortal often cause them to believe that they have just awakened from a sleep or some condition of unconsciousness and it takes time to realize that they have passed into another world and are under entirely new conditions.

All are constantly working through the astral form, and without the general action through the astral there could be no connection between the outside world and the mind. There could be no connection between impacts made, as all outward or external experiences or contacts become sensations to the astral form and are only then really perceived by the mind, for all centers of sensation really exist in the astral form.

However, in both instances the astral and physical bodies are really only the vehicles or sheaths through which the one great infinite divine principle is functioning, the great flame or atma, the highest expression of man, which is shining out imperfectly on the lower planes of life because of the imperfection of these vehicles or sheaths. In order to realize an astral body think of the individual as dropping off the physical body as a cloak and standing up in a subtle and more luminous copy of it.

A PERFECT ASTRAL BODY

A perfectly formed astral body means that the individual has attained to a high level of intellectual culture and spiritual growth which is indicated by the clearness of its outlines, the luminosity of its material and the perfection of its organization.

At a low stage of evolution the astral form is undefined in outline, its material coarse and its colors dull, obviously unfit as yet to act as an independent vehicle when withdrawn from the physical. The astral form is made up of the substance of which thoughts are formed and naturally responds readily to thought vibration.

We should realize that the astral plane is filled with thoughts, the effects of which are very little understood, for every individual

is impressed to a greater or less degree by thoughts which he receives from the fields of space. If in a darkened condition and manifesting on the animal plane he may respond to thought currents which cause him to become a criminal and even take the life of some friend, and awaken to the results of his act when too late.

How necessary it is, therefore, to think pure thoughts and act in accordance with the higher precepts of consciousness. The prediction of the time of death of any person is one of the most difficult feats of prognostic astrology regardless of whether the birth minute is closely known or not and this was recognized even in the time of Ptolemy. In astrological literature we frequently read of some prediction of great exactness made in the past in this regard such as the prophecy of the poet, Dryden, giving the exact year of the death of his son, Charles, but nowadays this exactness, if it ever really existed, seems to

be a lost art. In the cases of Queen Victoria and King Edward their charts had been studied for years by astrologers, great and small, yet not one of them made a straight-out correct prediction of the year of death of either of them. I am excepting all vague allusions which were claimed as predictions after the event and in reality were purposely worded that way so as to allow the astrologer to wiggle out which ever way it went. Many astrologers rushed into print to give post mortem reasons for the death, but none of these astrologers seemingly saw these reasons in advance of the event.

If death is a happy release of the indwelling spirit and a removal to a higher and broader plane of consciousness it would not cause such a terrible affliction in the chart of the native as we have accustomed ourselves to expect, especially where one passes out at a ripe age in a so-called natural way and not by sudden accident. "O death, where is thy sting? O grave,

where is thy victory?"

I know of several cases where the native was taken down with his final sickness at the period of his greatest elevation to earthly honors and in such cases the directions indicated that elevation strongly while the death afflictions were light. Invariably I have found that the surviving relatives show the death strongly in their charts while in the horoscope of the deceased we are frequently driven to seemingly inadequate astrological reasons. Of course when a man in the prime of life departs by sudden accident or violence the directions are generally adequate to account for the demise.

2T am satisfied that Neptune has a very powerful influence in the final breakdown of the body in advanced age. In the case of King Edward, his natal Sun was at 16° 54' Scorpio and at the time of his death Neptune had progressed to 16° 1' Aquarius, being but 53' from an exact square. In cases of solar directions I am in agreement with H. S. Green in his "Directions and Directing," that they extend over a period of time as long as three years if there are no intervening directions to interfere. This amounts to saying that such directions must have orbs of influence of about one and a half degrees on each side of the point where the direction is mathematically exact and while in the case of Neptune in King Edward's chart it would have taken many years for Neptune to progress forward this 53' to exact square yet if we consider the orb theory it was close enough as it was to come into action when excited and powerfully affect the natal Sun by its affliction. That this theory is entitled to consideration is fortified by the fact that during the two or three days prior to demise of King Edward Neptune was transiting the exact trine of his natal Sun exciting this basis direction of Neptune-square-Sun into ac-

I do not claim that this was the sole astrological indication of the event but as it is a solar direction and as the Sun is the center of our system and the giver of strength and life it is surely entitled to a foremost place in the train of death directions.

Psychic Research

[The following narrative was sent to Everybody's Magazine in the contest for the most remarkable psychic experience and was then sent to me after its return to the author.—James H. Hyslop.]

"The Shadow World Editor,

"DEAR SIR:-Your request for report of psychic experiences attracted my attention a few days ago and as I think that I have something unusually interesting, the truth of which I do most solemnly swear to, I thought I would write down my experiences and send them to you. Before beginning my narration I will say that I no longer experience any such strange phenomena and have not for about fifteen years. I will also reiterate that what I am about to relate is strictly true, and nothing but plain unadorned, truthful facts. I will also say that though they happened many years ago they made such an impression on my mind that they are just as vivid and real to me today as the day they occurred. Indeed were I to live a thousand years, and preserve my mental faculties. I feel sure that I could at the end of that time, relate these facts in minutest details.

"The first phenomena occurred about twenty-five years ago. I was then attending the Stanstead Wesleyan College, Stanstead, Province of Quebec, Canada. Mr. Lee, a tall, large man, with a kind face and voice, long full beard, was then the principal. It was a boarding school, and most of the pupils lived there. I occupied a neat little room on the second floor, and I had a roommate by the name of Charles Lawrence. My family, consisting then of mother, oldest sister, Emma, my brother Adolphe, and my sister Elizabeth, or Liza, as we called her, were living in Montreal. I don't now remember the distance between the two places. At the time that what I am about to relate took place, I was in good health,

and normal in every way, and was about twenty years old.

"One Sunday afternoon, soon after dinner, I felt a sort of sadness steal over me. I paid no attention to it at first and went about talking to the boys and trying to engage in conversation with my room-mate and others in order to throw off this sadness. All my efforts were in vain and the sadness or rather heaviness, as I might say, increased and with it came an irresistible desire to be alone. About 3 o'clock I told my friend Charley Lawrence that I wanted to go to my room and wished to be alone and asked him not to come and disturb me. He readily consented and I went to my room, locked the door and sat down at my little study table. I put my elbow on the table and my head resting in my hand began to think and wonder what was the matter with me, as I had never before in all my life felt so queer. All of a sudden I could see nothing, although my eyes were open and I seemed to be flying through space at such tremendous velocity that I could see absolutely nothing, and therefore, it seemed night. Then I saw myself standing in a room, but my eyes seemed so blinded that I could not make anything out very clearly. Gradually my eyes became accustomed to the light of the room and I found that it was a bedroom. A large bed stood in one corner of it and a woman was lying on it. Another woman was kneeling by the bedside with her face buried in the bedclothes, and another woman was leaning over the foot board and looking at the woman in the bed. In the opposite corner was a table with some writing paper and envelopes and a bottle of ink on it, and a man sitting at the table holding a pen. My eyes being then all right, I looked at the people in the room and recognized them all. The woman in the bed was my mother, who appeared to be very sick; the kneeling and sobbing figure was my sister Emma, and the one at the foot of the bed was Liza.

The man at the table writing was my He held in his right brother Adolphe. hand a pen and his left was resting on a sheet of paper. He turned his head around and looking at mother said, "What shall I tell him?" Mother answered in a very feeble voice, but still audible to me, "Tell Ernest" (that is my name) "that if he wants to see me alive once more he must come at once, as the doctor says I have not long to live." Brother turned to the paper to begin to write, but at that instant everything turned black again and I had the feeling of flying through space and in a moment I was again in my room sitting there in the same posture, apparently I had not moved in the least and I got up and walked about the room a few times. The sadness disappeared, but in its place a great anxiety took possession of me. Was mother really in a dying condition? What was the meaning of that strange vision and hearing my brother's and my mother's voices, which I readily recognized, when I knew they were at least 100 miles from me? Nothing of the kind had ever happened to me. I had never heard anything about spiritualism. I was absolutely ignorant of such things as psychic phenomena, and I was a very pious orthodox church member. I said nothing to anybody about what had happened, I thought it best to keep my own counsel. From that time on I became very anxious to get a letter from home, but I knew that I would not get it till Tuesday morning. It was customary at the school to have family prayers in the dining room, then breakfast, followed by the distribution of the mail by the principal. That particular morning I had no oppetite for breakfast, so I went to the principal and asked him if he would kindly give me my letter and I would go to my room. He looked hastily through the bundle of letters and told me there was none for me. I told him I was sure there was a letter there and he asked me how I knew it. I told him I could not explain, but I felt sure there was one. He became impatient, and told me to go back to my place and wait, and if there was a letter for me I would get it when he got to it. Sure enough he called my name. I stepped up to him and got it and saw it was from Montreal and in my brother's handwriting.

Now a strange thing happened, the moment the letter touched my hand I felt happy as the impression came to me that mother was better. I opened and read the letter, which was very short and contained only the short conversation I had heard in Montreal the previous Sunday afternoon. I showed the letter to the principal and he asked me if I was going to start for home that very day and I said no, there was no need of it. He thought I had no money to go and he offered to lend me some and urged me to go at once, but I stoutly refused to go, as mother was better. asked me how I knew it. I replied that in the same way that I knew about her illness and the letter coming to me, the same way I had learned that she had improved since the letter was written. I told him that it was merely an impression, but that I could depend on it. At any rate I told him that I would wait till the next day and if another letter did not come telling me of mother's improved condition I would then start. Then he turned upon me and gave me a terrible scolding and lecture and told me never again to allow myself to harbor such foolish thoughts and never to let him hear me talk that way and told me to go to my room and spend some time in prayer, which I did.

"On Wednesday morning the expected letter came telling me that mother was much better, that all danger had passed and I need not go home unless I chose to.

Since my pilgrimage in the west, I have been surprised and shocked at the ignorance of the people concerning themselves. Since Plato's day, when to know oneself was supreme wisdom, the work and study of man became and was exterior or outside himself. Mastering practically the dynamic forces of nature man has ignored himself. Civilization in the main is but another name for and form of pleasure, while man, the problem and end of civilization, is still the enigma and mystery of the world.

How little has physical science or even psychological science helped man to know himself. Chemistry discovers the X and violet ray, radium and helium, but how little is known of super-physical or even psycho-chemicalized man. Thanks to spiritualism, theosophy and the new psychology man's interior, rather than his exterior nature is receiving attention, and the most eminent scientists are proving that to know man or one's own self (the microcosm) is

to know the universe (the macrocosm). Is this not a recognition of the saying, "Be still and know that I am God," and is not God the spirit or Divine intelligence imminent in us all?

So that to find the gold if imperishable wisdom in oneself is more valuable as a human find or asset than all the material gold discovered in the earth. What does such spiritual discovery mean? It means a new and higher revelation and inspiration of life. It means the re-creation of the race, not by stirpiculture but psychiculture. It means the birth of the superman, not an animal enlarged or, magnified but man plus his divinity. It means no longer a humanity enslaved by material conditions or environments, but liberated from beastliness, poverty, disease, crime, insanity, degeneracy, idiocy by a control of the lower physical sense and corporeal man by the spirit of God in a man! It means in short the abolition of industrial conditions, in which

capital and labor wage incessant warfare, because of human ignorance and greed, by the awakening of the soul to the meaning of life, by which each man finds his true work and place in the earth, loves and does it excellently and so blesses the world by his endeavor.

Here in Portland, Oregon, as I look out of my hotel window into the park, the benches are crowded with idle, unemployed men. Many have no trade nor profession. Hence they are tramps. Could they be taught to go within themselves, to know their life's work and that to do it means freedom and happiness, these benches would be empty or filled with children and convalescent invalids. What a change! Thousands of men and women, with sad pinched faces, are tramping the dusty roads seeking a "lost trail" to be found at last and only in themselves. A big, great man and one supremely happy is one who knows himself and so finds his work, loves it and does it excellently well.

* * *

The need of Theosophy, Spiritualism and the New Thought movement is a new psychology, and a technique of terminology which could be universally accepted and understood. At present, while there is a new psychology, it is nebulous and in process of development, and about all that is affirmed or accepted by the new psychologist or those who call themselves such is the fact that spirit is the source of body, mind and all normal and supernormal life. rather than the opposite; some identify soul with spirit or mean spirit by their definitions of soul, or soul by their definition of The theosophical psychology is rather scholastic, oriental and sanscritty to appeal to many western scientific students, and while its definitions are exact and very helpful, they do not seem to become popular or wear well with our western students. On the other hand, metaphysicians, like Christian Scientists, who perhaps would not consider themselves flattered to be so classified, mix mind with spirit as to make neither one clear or intelligible in the soul's category of normal and super-normal powers, they have no new psychology to speak

of which scientists could accept as more than mere doctrine. Now the basis of any psychic or spiritual development must rest firmly upon facts, powers, and laws which each one can experience and demonstrate. And if this basis is (as we make bold to declare it is) secure against dogmatic bias on the one side, and metaphysical speculations on the other, it can be accepted as scientific as any other proposition of science. It would be valuable to discuss the meanings of certain words used in the new psychology, as objective and subjective mind, normal, abnormal and supernormal powers, conscience, intuition, ego, identity, entity, individuality, personality, telepathy, suggestion, but space will not permit; but the student will find all these terms considered at length in my new book or "Telepathy" sold by the Stellar Ray and it will unquestionably appeal to him as clear and sufficient.

Much confusion of thought could be avoided if the student were developed interiorally and spiritually to understand the true nature of the spirit in its relationship and correspondence with mind, faculty, function and body, for then it would have a clear perception of the inner meanings of terms, which outward definitions are not always so apt to express! I will instance Take the words one case in conclusion. objective mind, sub-conscious mind and subjective mind! How little is ever taught of the true relationship between them. We hear a great deal of the super or cosmic consciousness, of hyper and sub and subliminal states of consciousness, but what do they mean in plain, simple language of the new psychology? Now objective is the physical subjective, the spiritual (metaphysical) mind, with sub-conscious mind as a mediant between the two. All automatic processes of the organism reside in the sub-conscious mind, and into the sub-conscious the hypnotist places his subject by hypnotic suggestion. But the subjective is the spiritual mind and as such is the seat of the supernormal powers as the objective is the seat of the normal.

So in this way the technique of the new psychology will help us to explain and understand what hitherto has been either occult or unintelligible.

Luminous Bodies Here and Hereafter or "The Shining Ones" The Electrical Theory of Life.

By Charles Hallock, M. A., Member of the Washington Biological Society. Cloth and Gold, \$1.00.

This little book is up to date. It takes in various ologies and lines of modern scientific thought, weaving them into a homologue of fantastic colors and novel pattern as interesting as Gobelin tapestry and as quaint as an arabesque or Egyptian mosaic. Every line of it is suggestive. Its eminent author, who was the founder the "Forest and Stream" a third of a century ago, has been publicly pronounced by the late Prof. Eliott Cones, of the Smithsonian Institute, a "naturalist of no mean ability," which his half dozen copyrighted books abundantly prove. Enough of natural history, natural science, and philosophical discussion comes within the scope of this volume to give it a substantial character, and so command the interest of such readers as are devoted to the literature of sport, science, and good morals.

Like unto a joke, the success of a treatise lies in its application, and the ultimate of this one is the eternal betterment of men. At the same time, the subject of "Luminous Bodies," whether they be terrestrial or celestial, is sufficiently occult to stimulate curiosity, especially in the direction of its spiritual outlook; and it is the masterly and very original treatment of this department which gives to this novel treatise its peculiar value as a mental force. Electricity, the reader will at once discover, is the magnetic thread upon which all its postulates are strung, and this wondrous and in-

scrutable element is of itself sufficiently engaging to draw attention.

As stated in the author's prolegomena, his thesis rests upon Dr. Henry Raymond Rogers' "Theory of the Great Physical Forces" (first promulgated in 1876), and now made lucid by the Lodge electron theory, and Van der Nailler's exposition of evolution; and is set forth as "as attempt to explain the inter-relation of "Terrestrial, Celestial, and Intellectual Kingdoms," and "Man's Oneness with His Maker." As a working proposition, its tendency would be to arouse religious forces which now lie dormant, and to define a common ground upon which a Lay Church can build.

Among the Ancients, With an Account of Their Hystic Initiations.

By Louis Iacolliot.

Published by the Theosophical Pub. Co., 253 West 72d St., New York. Price, cloth, \$1.50.

The author, who was Chief Justice in French East India and Tahiti, gives in this book a resume of his experiences in his investigation into the subject of Occult Science and the practices of those who have been admitted into the sect of the Pitris, which is Sanskrit for spirits or ancestral shades.

This is neither a doctrinal book nor a work of criticism, and the author points out in the preface that he is not called upon to decide, either for or against, the belief in spirits and feels therefore better able to write its history.

These doctrines were known to the Egyptians, to the Jewish Cabalists, to the people of Finland, to the school of Alexandria, to Philo and his disciples, to the Gauls and to the early Christians, and the Hindus. As for the ancient Chaldeans, the practice of popular magic and sorcery seems to have been the utmost limit of their attainments.

They have also given birth to a peculiar system of moral philosophy whose place in the general scale of metaphysical speculations is pointed out.








July will average cooler than usual. The drouth will be broken and good rains may be expected in many parts of the country. July will be a much better crop-weather month than May and June were, as an average.

In above chart the treble line represents normal temperatures and rainfa'l. The heavy line with round white spots is temperature forecasts. Where it goes above treble line temperatures a e expected to be higher. Where it goes below treble line-temperatures will be lower. The broken rigzag line is rainfall forecast. As it goes higher indicates greater probability of rain and where it goes lower the reverse. Dates are for meridian 90. Count one or two days earlier for west of that line and as much later for east of it, because weather features more from west to east.
