This is the time of year when pneumonia will be prevalent in many parts of the country. We therefore publish the following remedies said to be effectual in the immediate relief of this dreaded disease. The directions should be explicitly followed.

In Worcester, Alaska, Seattle, Pasadena, and Los Angeles, it has been tried with unfailing effect. At the lastmentioned place pneumonia was taking off from two to five victims every day. Four of the Los Angeles papers inserted the cure under the heading, "No One Need Die of Pneumonia," with the result that only one death a day was reported and most of these were infants under a year old. Get an inhalation apparatus of glass, or, if you cannot procure one, saturate a ball of cotton (as large as a one-inch marble) with spirits of alcohol. Add 3-4 drops of chloroform to each ball of cotton. Place it between the patient's teeth and let him inhale the fumes in deep, long breaths for 15 minutes. Rest 15 minutes or longer if needed, then inhale again for 15 minutes and continue the same operation for 24 times and the result will be that the lungs will expand to their normal condition. In 24 hours the patient is out of danger, and in 48 he is cured, although weak. Change cotton and alcohol often.

The writer adds: "I have sent this prescription to the Stanford University; the Northwestern College of Medicine (Chicago), Cornell University (New York state), and to numerous other places, even across to England, to some of the most prominent men there. Doctors, try it for humanity's sake, and the public for your own welfare."—Harbinger of Light, Melbourne, Australia.

DOMESTIC REMEDY WITHIN RANGE OF ALL. SIMPLE BUT EFFECTIVE.

Boiled onions. Rye flour. Apple vinegar.

Mix. Use as a poultice on the throat and under armpits. Put on as hot as can be borne. Do not blister. Destroy the poultice as soon as removed; renew as often as cold. If taken in season it seldom fails to relieve the congestion; no, not even after all else has failed. Try it and you will be convinced.

Conservation of the Soil.

[Extracts from an address of President Taft before the National Conservation Congress, at Kansas City, Mo., September 25, 1911.]

If the population of the United States continues to increase at its present rate, we shall have in 50 years double the number of people we now have. It is necessary, then, that not only our acreage but also our product per acre must increase proportionately so that our people may be fed. We must realize that the best land and the land easiest to cultivate has been taken up and cultivated, and that the additions to improved lands and to total acreage in the future must be of land much more expensive to prepare for tillage. The increase per acre of the product, too, must be steady each year, yet each year an increase becomes more difficult.

Still, even in the face of these facts, there is no occasion for discouragement. We are going to remain a self-supporting country and raise food enough within our borders to feed our people. When we consider that in Germany and Great Britain crops are raised from land which has been in cultivation for 1,000 years, and that these lands are made to produce more than two and three times per acre what the comparatively fresh lands in this country produce in the best States, it becomes very apparent that we shall be able to meet the exigency by better systems of farming and more intense and careful and industrious cultivation.

The theory seems to have been in times past that soils become exhausted by constant cultivation; but the result in Europe, where acres under constant use for prc ducing crops for 10 centuries are made now to produce crops three times those of this country, shows that there is nothing in this theory, and that successful farming can be continued on land long in use, and that great crops can be raised and garnered from it if only it be treated scientifically and in accordance with its necessity. There is nothing peculiar about soils in Europe

that gives the great yield per acre there and prevents its possibility in the United States. On the contrary, there is every reason to believe that the application of the same methods would produce just as large crops here as abroad.

One of the great reasons for discouragement felt by many who have written on this subject is found in the movement of the population from farm to city. This has reached such a point that the urban population is now 46 per cent of the total, while the rural population is but 54 per cent, counting as urban all who live in cities exceeding 2,500 inhabitants. This movement has been persistent, and has made it very difficult for the farmers to secure adequate agricultural labor, with an increase in the price of labor which naturally follows such a condition. Still we ought to realize that enormous advance in the machinery used on the farm has reduced the necessity for a great number of farm hands on each farm. * * * * * *

Force of 3,000 Men.

It is now proposed to organize a force of 3,000 men, one to every county in the United States, who shall conduct experiments within the county for the edification and education of the present farmers and of the embryo farmers who are being educated. It is proposed that these men shall be paid partly by the county, partly by the State, and partly by the Federal Government, and it is hoped that the actual demonstration on farms in the county-not at agricultural stations or schools somewhere in the State, but in the county itself-will bring home to the farmers what it is possible to do with the very soil that they themselves are cultivating. I understand this to be the object of an association organized for the improvement of agriculture in the country, and I do not think we could have a more practical method than this.

On the whole, therefore, I think our agricultural future is hopeful. I do not share the pessimistic views of many gentlemen whose statistics differ somewhat from mine, and who look forward to a strong probability of failure of self-support- in food within the lives of persons now living. It is true that we shall have to continue the improvement in agriculture so as to make our addition to the product per acre 1 per cent of the crop each year, or 10 per cent each decade; but considering what is done in Europe, this is not either impossible or improbable. The addition to the acreage in drainage and in irrigable lands will go on—must go on. The profit of the State or to the enterprise which irrigates or drains these lands will become sufficient to make it not only profitable but necessary to carry through the project, and we may look forward to the middle of this century, when 200,000,000 of people shall swear fealty to the starry flag, as a time when America will still continue to feed her millions and feed them well out of her_own soil.

If you were born between Jan. 20th and Feb. 19th, the sun was in the Zodiacal sign Aquarius. This nature is superior in sensitiveness, taste, impression and whatever pertains to the congeniality of home and its comforts.

These natives are popular, sociable, make friends readily, are broad minded, though cautious, are interested in public affairs or popular movements for the benefit of many.

They are patient, skillful, humane, intelligent, original and self-reliant, and they benefit largely through their many friends.

Those born in this sign are independent, dislike control, and require their own way in their work.

The Sun in this position is slightly unfavorable for the father; it favors the birth of sons but brings trouble with one of them. It is not favorable for vitality or longevity unless contradicted by aspects or mundane position.

The sign Aquarius is in reality a thought center and the native's restless mind is ever at work. "Though the son of Aquarius may be sojourning in a far country, satiated with the *husks* of eternal knowledge, wearied with the deceitful light of illusion, he uplifts his eyes and catches a gleam from the star of wisdom. It is then his soul awakens, his fetters fall, the prison door opens; the captive is free and where there was weakness now there is strength."

One may know an Aquarius native for years and never surmise the depth of feeling that is within his breast or the altitudes to which his aspirations ascend.

These natives should choose for their occupation either literary pursuits, mechanical or governmental positions.

The different polarizations of the moon modify the sun's influence somewhat and the sign rising at the moment of birth possesses a certain influence to produce a particular form of body and peculiar mental affections and as there is a sign rising every four minutes of time it is necessary to know the time and place of birth in order to determine the influences dominant at the birth of the native.

For example, if the sign Aries was rising it would tend to middle stature, thin face, dark hair and complexion and a combative disposition, angry as the Ram.

If Taurus was rising the disposition would be slow to anger, patient and enduring, but when angry, violent as the bull. The figure well set and the face full.

Leo would give a bold heart, cautious disposition, a firm step and strong countenance, well set body, square shoulders, bushy hair, inclined to curl, large eyes, quick sighted, ruddy complexion.

While, if Cancer were rising, there would be timidity and a weak constitution, rather pale complexion and small features.

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The sign Aquarius rising at birth gives a gentle, benevolent disposition, very fond of the water; gives a stout comely person strong appearance, clear delicate complexion, sandy or darkish hair; gives more beauty than any of the signs except Libra.

However, these descriptions rarely apply exactly as the disposition is ruled chiefly by the Moon and Mercury, besides the mind is influenced by every planet which casts an aspect to the Ascendant and by any planet rising therein, so that if the last three degrees of a sign be on the cusp or beginning of the first house, part of the next sign must necessarily be in the Ascendant and the native will partake of both influences.

Aquarius.

January 20th to February 19th. By Dr. George W. Carey, Teacher of Biochemistry.

Those born between the dates January 20th and February 19th are doubly blest, and babies to be born during that period for many years to come will be favored of the gods.

The Solar System has entered the "Sign of the Son of Man," Aquarius, where it will remain for over 2,000 years. According to planetary revolutions the Sun passes through Aquarius once every solar year; thus we have the double influence of Aquarius vibration from January 20th to February 19th.

Air contains 78 per cent of nitrogen gas, believed by scientists to be mineral in ultimate potency. Minerals are formed by the precipitation of nitrogen gas. Differentiation is attained by the proportion of oxygen and aqueous vapor (hydrogen) that unites with nitrogen.

A combination of sodium and chlorine forms the mineral known as common salt. This mineral absorbs water. The circulation or distribution of water in the human organism is due to the chemical action of the molecules of sodium chloride.

Crude soda cannot be taken up by mucous membrane absorbents and carried int) the circulation. The sodium molecules found in blood have been received from vegetable tissue which drew these salts from the soil in high potency. The mineral, or cell-salts, can also be prepared (and are prepared) in biochemic or homeopathic potency as fine as the trituration of Nature's laboratory in the physiology of plant growth, and then thoroughly mixed with sugar of milk and pressed into tablets ready to be taken internally to supply deficiencies in the human organism. A lack of the proper amount of these basic mineral salts (twelve in number) are the cause of all socalled disease.

Common table sale does not enter the blood, being too coarse to enter the delicate tubes of mucous membrane absorbents, but this salt does distribute water along the intestinal tract.

Aquarius is known in astrological symbol as "The Water Bearer." Sodium chloride, known also as *natrum muriaticum*, is also a bearer of water, and chemically corresponds with the zodiacal angle of Aquarius.

The term angle, or *angel*, of the Sun may also be used, for the position of the Sun at birth largely controls the vibration of blood.

So, then, we have sodium chloride as the "birth salt" of Aquarius people.

The governing planets are Saturn and Uranus; the gems are sapphire, opal and turquoise; the astral colors are blue, pink and nile green. Aquarius is an air sign.

In Bible alchemy, Aquarius represents Dan, the fifth son of Jacob, and means "judgment," or "he that judges." In the symbolism of the New Testament, Aquarius corresponds with the disciple James.

The Spirit of Mercury.

Mercury is the first planet nearest the Sun, and revolves around that central orb in 88 days. By its rapid motion Mercury seems to "play hide and seek" with us. It is first an evening star following after the Sun in the west about two hours, and then in a few days we find him plunging into the solar rays to reappear as a morning star. The ancients first believed in the existence of two distinct stars, Set and Horus, Thoth or Thought, among the Egyptians; Buddha Lord of Wisdom and Rhauhineya, among the Hindoos; Apollo and Mercury among the Greeks; and in Iranian or Chaldean, Nebo all meaning Knowledge. Nebo signifies, "He who teaches and instructs." It also implies one who holds the sceptre of power, and many of the Babylonian kings were named after him, such as Nabo-Nassar, Nabo-Polassar, Nabu-Chadnezzar.

The agility of his motion has given to Mercury corresponding functions. He was represented with wings on his feet. He was also the god of thieves, of traders and physicians. In celestial correspondence he stands for the constructive, the inventive, active, excitable, changeful, nervous, cold and moist. His lines on the body, or in form are short and incisive and slender curves. His colors are blue, almost like a slate blue with spotted mixtures lighter than the blue.

His note in music is E, nearly. The color blue has much to do with the nerve energy, which comes directly from the astral matter surrounding the body. When the mind is free from fear, the Mercurial person is quick and ambitious, high minded and intuitional. The impressions are generally true, particularly if in good angle, 60 degrees or 120 degrees, or in conjunction, providing the conjoining planet be not badly aspected to some other planet.

The following I would consider to be the best interpretation of this planet in various points of the zodiac:

When Mercury is upon the mid heaven, and not afflicted, it generally shows the person to be high-minded, ambitious, and one ready and capable of throwing off surrounding troubles. When Mercury is in conjunction with the Sun, it assists the intellect, for the Sun governs the mind, therefore when the brain and mind work well together, we generally have good intellect.

Mercury, in the ascendant, will make the native quick and active; very fond of learning; sensitive, impressional and easily worried. The native is changeable in mind and sensitive to surrounding influences. He must not allow others an over influence in his life, or the mind easily becomes disturbed, which later tells on the nervous system. This should lead the Mercurial person not to listen to advice from many people about his affairs, for it brings much wavering and indecision of mind, and ends by his not knowing how to act upon the affair in question.

When the planet Mercury is applying to a good aspect of another planet, the native should always think twice about a matter, as the second impression is generally the better, Mercury being the planet ruling impressions; but when Mercury is separating from the good aspect of another planet it is best to follow the first impression of an affair. When Mercury is applying to an evil aspect of a planet, the first impression is best, and when separating in an evil aspect, the second impression is best.

It is well known that when Mercury is afflicted by Saturn, the native becomes timid, easily worried and imposed upon; hesitating, nervous, often allowing good opportunities to pass and not taking heed of them; often discovering it when too late. This same aspect shows colds in the head, catarrh, dull pains in the head brought about by fear and worry, and sometimes melancholy, and hysteria. All that can be said about this latter aspect is to free the mind from fear and have more faith, and be more readily inclined to let go things, instead of holding fast.

When Mercury is in good aspect to Saturn, it gives great shrewdness and common sense, caution, reserve, deep thought and a love of study.

Mercury in good aspect to Jupiter gives kindness and affection, good judgment and honesty in all dealings; one who would generally despise a mean act. Such an aspect gives good heartedness and genuine friendship.

When Mercury is in evil aspect with Jupiter, we find the native envious, worried continually over money matters and self interest; the judgment is poor, and therefore there are errors in many things. This affliction of Mercury by Jupiter gives a rush of blood to the head sometimes, dizziness, congestion of the brain, and violent throbbing of the head.

When Mercury is in good aspect with Mars, we have a quick, independent and ambitious nature; a good mathematician; persevering and determined; one who would do well as a chemist, a physician, an engraver, an engineer, or one who would manage over the affairs of others well. When Mercury is afflicted by Mars, the native is very quick and sensitive, easily offended; touchy; not always honest. The thief and liar come under this aspect as well as the gossip. This aspect of Mercury afflicted by Mars will bring sharp shooting pains in the head, fever, irritability and restlessness, together with malarial troubles. Mercury in good aspect with Uranus gives the native a peculiar sensitivity, much intuition, and presence of mind; scientific, ingenuous, fond of occult study; one who reflects a spiritual nature in the intellectual.

Mercury afflicted by Uranus gives great fretfulness, liability to sudden change, with wrong impressions, moving by fits and starts, showing a great need of mental control. This affliction will be followed by dazed feelings in the head, distress of mind; pains which come and leave quickly; excessive nervousness, followed by a disordered imagination. Under the evil aspects of Uranus, the native may be helped by a magnetic healer, electricity, and the cocoa plant.

When Mercury is in good aspect to Neptune, we have the native quick, active, ambitious, ingenuous, possessing rare judgment, and a good reader of human character; inventive and practical. When Neptune afflicts Mercury, then we have the clever deceiver, with glib tongue; a ready talker; takes advantage of his own native shrewdness over others, and the diseases from this mental condition bring imaginary complaints in the head; great fear, hysteria and nervousness, with pretended ailments also. Such cases can well be treated by thought cure, a magnetic healer, and physicians often use sedatives and morphine.

Mercury in good aspect with Venus gives merriness, music, poetry, a healthy mind, and a persuasive voice, and in bad aspect with Venus, slovenliness, carelessness in dress and speech and mental impurity generally.

Mercury in good aspect with the Moon quickens the intellect, gives repartee and true imagination and impressive speech. But when badly aspected by the Moon, gives back-biting and a lack of good faith generally. When Mercury is in the twelfth house, it gives oratory when unafflicted. This position of Mercury in the twelfth house, in earthy and watery signs, opposed by Saturn, Uranus or Mars, gives deafness, and weak hearing generally. The twelfth house is said to be the karmic house, and diseases springing from this house are due to mental impressions and inclinations of a malefic order which have been generated in a former incarnation.

Mercury afflicted by Mars often gives a lisp and stammer. His weakest signs are Cancer, Sagitarius and Pisces. It is well to say that a child born with Mercury afflicted will have a troubled mind, which will tell largely in the nervous system. Such a one should always be careful in signing writings, and read any papers. compacts or agreements before they attach the names to such. Mercurial diseases caused by Saturn's affliction, as catarrh. etc., can be well treated by Nux Vomica. Jupiter's ailments under Mercury can be treated by belladonna, that is, those relating to the blood and congestion in the head.

A person with Mercury afflicted should try and reverse impulsive tendencies, and instead of being a detrimental aspect at birth, will be beneficial to the soul's good for all time. The cunning must not be used in material things, and the worry will cease; the principle to live to in this case is to be silent, less ambitious about worldly affairs and in this silence will grow a newer/knowledge direct from the soul like flashes of inspiration and, firmly fixed in love, will give that nobler patience and intuitive discrimination which can never be obtained by mere exercise of the intellect. The Mercurial man then becomes a communicant with the gods, readily measuring all outward things with the rod of true knowledge; his are the wings of courage, and he can well wear the cap of concealment, for, as the Greek myth has it, "He so excels that he can conduct the very gods on their journeys." Let the Mercurial man keep alive his celestial sense, known to the mystic enthusiast, and joining his will to the paternal will he can well become the nearest satellite to the Central Sun.

The Outlook for February, 1912.

The Month of February comes in under the Full of the Moon which occurs on the 2d at 6 p. m. Chicago Standard time. The New Moon occurs on the 17th of Feb. at 11:44 p. m. Chicago time, or one hour earlier for Washington time. At the time of the Full Moon, the Sun is within half a degree of a square aspect of Saturn, an unfavorable aspect, indicating uncertain business affairs and uneven temperature, very cold in parts of the country where it generally is warm, and warm where it is generally quite cold. An unfavorable period from the first of the month, for starting new business of importance for the average person, best to wait till the early part of March as the month of February is not as favorable for such as the average month. The True Nature and Value of the Trained Psychic Unfoldment.

(A Study in the Expansion of Consciousness.)

By Frederick Helm Sloan.

An enlarged comprehension of the nature of the brain faculties and functions is necessary before the true nature of Psychic unfoldment can be realized. Whether we are dealing with the senses on super-physical planes, or whether with those on the purely material plane, their perceptions cannot be transmitted to the ordinary physical consciousness without a physical basis for this transmission, and the physical basis for the transmission of super-physical faculties is the brain. It is purely and wholly a question of psychological faculty of brain development.

In the same manner that the mind expresses itself through the instrumentality of the brain; so do the feelings, mental feelings, emotions, emotions arising from the intellect; sensations of both a physical and higher nature, arousing true spirituality of feeling; and, in fact all the numerous aspects of Soul-Consciousness, express themselves in our Physical Personality through the various portions and appropriate brain centers. Meta-Physics or Occult Psychology recognizes three main divisions of the brain: The lowest physical, or lower portion; the meta-physical, or middle portion; and the spiritual brain, or upper portion of the purely physical brainstructure and consciousness. In these portions the corresponding faculties of Consciousness have their seat of physical and material expression.

Thus do all the perceptions of consciousness (no matter from what higher plane they may have originally occurred upon), find their manifestation and expression through and by means of their appropriate brain center. In the case of sight (whether super-physical or physical), this sensation must be translated into a

Perception, for thus only do we realize having sensed or "seen an object," as the appropriate brain center, or the *center of perception* itself is enlarged.

Without this was in perfect functioning order, we might have any number of senses, both physical and super-physical, and these might additionally be in perfect working order, yet our consciousness would be entirely oblivious to the fact. It is this sensory faculty of the mind, or consciousness of the Physical Personality, that constitutes one important aspect of consciousness, the ability to perceive sensations. This of course may be either to a lesser or to a greater degree, according as this faculty lies dormant, or begins to awaken.

This Perceptory faculty of Consciousness has its Physical Brain seat near the brain-center in the small organ of the Pineal Gland, which may very aptly be called the sixth sense, namely that of perception.

When this Perceptory or Sensory Faculty of the Mind, this Sixth Sense located in the Pineal Gland Organ, becomes attuned, so to speak, with higher and more spiritual vibration of a subtler and refined nature, we (that is, the mind of our Personality and Physical Brain), begin to become aware of Perceptions obtained by other means than that of those coming through the channels of the five physical senses. As the vibrations of the Pineal Gland are raised higher and higher to more refined levels or Key Notes of Vibration, new and more refined Atoms are built into this Brain Structure and these give it a greater field of action and capacity to respond to the finer and more interior vibrations coming from the Psychic Vehicle of Consciousness or Sub-Conscious Mind within and transmitting these down into every-day Physical Perceptions, from the interior and sub-conscious mind and

from the sub-conscious sense perceptions. When this begins to occur the First Sub-consciousness is beginning to be un-The "sub-conscious" is developing folded into the super-conscious mind within us in a hitherto latent condition. The Physical Brain Consciousness is undergoing an expansion, for this is one of connecting links between the two the Planes of Consciousness; of the lower and the higher personality, which, before this has occurred, had distinctly separate fields of activity, as far as our memory was concerned, at least. These were then known and "sub-conscious" the conscious 28 minds. It is the vivifying of this link or Sixth Sense, that causes the so-called "sub-conscious" to itself be brought into true functioning order (in its first stage at least), and the growth of the super-conscious mind to take place.

But it is not a question of "planes" of matter at all, within which the sense-perceptions may occur upon. (Whether these become transmitted down from the subconscious on super-physical planes, or whether they may come from the Material Plane), they MUST come down through the Pineal Gland Organ, or else be realized by the Perceptory faculty of the brain, if the Physical Senses are the source of the information and vibrations. Even the First Sub-Consciousness and its sense perceptions are of such a refined nature of rapid and spiritual vibrations, that they are truly entitled to be called "Psychic" or Spiritual in their quality. This is the link, not only between sight, but for all forms of Sense Perceptions and for all Aspects of Consciousness, or rather Super-Consciousness, and the awakened Super-Conscious Mind of the first strata within the soul-Consciousness itself.

When the door is opened that allows this mighty stream of Conscious Vibrations to rush through, or down into the Brain (from the super-dimensional depths of the soul), we (in our Physical Personality), undergo what appears to be a decided expansion of comprehension along all lines. The way is opened through which the comprehensive faculties of the highly vibrating phychic brain (in comparison to which the Physical Brain is as sluggish as mud), may send down to us

something of its power of Subtle and Psychic Comprehension, existing as it does in a World of Super-Physical Dimensions; in the fourth dimension of space. In its wonderful Etheric Structure, built, as it is of Etheric Molecules or (of "radiant matter" of Modern Science) and in the world of four dimensions, it is little wonder that it presents for the mind a vehicle of a truly Spiritual and Psychic Power of capacity, in comparison to the Material Brain consciousness, of the low-personality. In such a "sub-conscious" and Etheric Brain as this must be, with its exceedingly rapid vibrations of a New Order of matter entirely and pulsating at a Higher Key-Note of Vibration, and in a World Unmeasurable to the Material Instruments of Science, but Perfectly measurable to the appropriate and Phychic Senses and fourth dimensional Instruments of the Developed Occulist, when he is able to detach his consciousness from the material brain and function it in a more Interior manner in the fourth dimensional-Psychic Brain and body and senses, and study this World by the Higher and appropriate Scientific Instruments and Methods belonging to the New Order of Vibrations and Space into which the "Material plane has been resolved.

In such a mental vehicle (as this Psychic Brain and first strata of the developed "sub-consciousness" into the Super-Conscious Mind, must afford to the Trained Occulist, who is really able to enter in full waking consciousness into this *subjective* World (without being merely in a "sub-conscious" condition), there opens up an entirely new world of comprehension, and of subjective mental capacity as well as a new world in external nature, and a new order of vibrations in matter, and a new field of "Nature's Finer Forces."

In this new world of consciousness everything in the personality has "gone up" another octave of vibration, so to speak, in all our different aspects of consciousness. Where all the higher aspects, at least, are far more subtle, Psychic and spiritual than anything before dreamed as possible. Where the thoughts and emotions may swing through a far wider orbit of consciousness, and ex-

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perience a far wider range of consciousness than is possible to the mind while working through the denser limitations of the material brain instrument.

Wherein all the Higher Aspects of consciousness, and also of the surrounding external world, on this new plane of Consciousness and of Etheric and Refined Matter are of a Spiritual quality and of a higher and more perfect form. Where forms of unearthly beauty may be seen, and where thoughts of unearthly grandeur of Comprehension may be thought by the mind in its untrammeled instrument of this higher expression of the mind and soul. Where *True* Spirituality of unearthly *power* may be *felt* by the Psychic Soul; where the very life-force itself pulsates through the veins with unearthly buoyancy and joy of life; where, in fact, everything in the Material and Physical Life of man has attained a higher octave of Expression, of Psychic Capacity, of Spirituality and of mentality, and is infinitely more refined, subtle, expansive, comprehensive, psychic and Spiritual than is possible to the unawakened lower personality of undeveloped humanity.



As your mind or consciousness has no ending and as you cannot cease to exist at any time it will be well for you to start now to live the eternal life. Whether your mind is functioning on this or on the other side of the grave is of little importance. All the efforts you make to live true to your highest ideals now, even in the face of apparent failure, creates those soul muscles which enable you to mount the heights of Wisdom.

There is a tendency among our friends the metaphysicians to ignore the facts of spirit existence which are so visible to those who have spiritual sight and even to scoff at the revelations of the seers because they are not cast in abstract or metaphysical forms of thought. He would narrate to his friends how "Bright Eyes" had saved his life by certain warnings and how "Bright Eyes," by giving him specific directions in business deals, had enabled him to avoid loss and also to make money.

The fancy became so real to him that he summoned a famous painter from Chicago and directed him to make a life-size picture of his spirit son, giving minute directions about his appearance.—Post Dispatch, St. Louis, Mo.

The Growth of Spiritualism.

Signs of the growth of Spiritualism continue to reach us from all quarters. The daily press and current literature are full of references to spiritualistic phenomena, the spirit circle is becoming a recognized institution the world over, and the subject is even attracting the attention of that ubiquitous individual "the man in the street" who, in his casual way, is beginning to inquire whether there is anything in it.

Are the so-called dead really alive and able to communicate with those still in the flesh? This is the burning question. Let those answer who are best qualified to judge—the men who have spent years in investigating psychical and spiritualistic phenomena, and in carefully weighing and sifting the mass of evidence placed before them.

That the human spirit persists after the death of the body, retaining all its essential qualities and memory of its earthly experience, that the future life is a continuation of this is the conclusion arrived at by every man of scientific attainments who has investigated the data available in a manner commensurate with its importance.

This is the decision of many scientists of the first rank, such as the great English trio Sir William Crookes, Sir Oliver Lodge and Dr. Alfred Russel Wallace, of Continental savants such as Zollner, Lombroso, and Flammarion and of such competent psychologists and investigators as Frederick Myers, Dr. Richard Hodgson, and Professors William James and James H. Hyslop. It is also the opinion of thousands of intelligent spiritualists throughout the world, and spiritualists, be it remembered, are not all mistaken. Many of them are level headed men and women who have spent their lives in scientific discovery and research.

It is considered the correct thing by shallow and unthinking people to ridicule spiritualism and all connected with it. It is soeasy to laugh at that which we do not understand; no trouble is involved, and brains are absolutely at a discount. Many of those who ridicule spiritualism no moreunderstand it than the dog understands the Moon he howls at. It is said that a man once stated to Sir Charles Lyell that geology was false, and that he did not believe one word of it. "Do you," inquired Sir Charles, "know anything about Geology? Have you read anything on the subject, or studied it practically?" "Not at all," said the objector. "Why should I study it when I don't believe in it?" "Well then," replied the geologist, "you are incompetent to discuss the subject or to have an opinion on it. Go and study geology and then come to me and I will listen to your objections. It will, however, be needless then, for you will be of the same opinion as I am."

So we would say to the objectors to Spiritualism—put aside your preconceived ideas, rid the subject of sentimentalism and transcendentalism, and investigate and study it in the common-sense way you would study any other science. The writer knows that spiritualism gives the proof that life is continuous and that death does not end all; on the contrary that it is but the portal to a fuller and more complete existence, and we know that men have always hungered for knowledge concerning the Great Hereafter. One question more than others all From thoughtful minds implores reply; / It is as breathed from star and pall, What fate awaits us when we die.

Spiritualism alone can give a definite answer. It alone can give the proof for which so many crave. It alone can demonstrate the truth that the so-called dead are not dead, but living still; and herein consists its strength, for it tells of a mighty truth, and as a famous American orator said:

Truth crushed to earth shall rise again The eternal years of God are hers.

Psychical Effects of Temperament and Temperature By J. C. F. GRUMBINE Fellow of Society of Science, Letters and Arts of London, Eng.

Is there a relation between meteorology and psychology, temperature and temperament? Zero weather in the winter and torried weather in the summer may seasonably invoke such a question, and if, as our astrologers maintain, cold and heat are due not only to the perhelion or aphelion of the earth, but to planetary positions, the answer is evident that by a spiritual law of correspondence, which science has not yet discovered, the psychological influence (temperament) of the planets is translated into the physical or meterological' effects (temperature) of cold and heat.

In a far subtler way the soul's life operates upon and within the phenomenal world. As the will, intellect and heart control the operations of the spirit, little or no blood would lead to cold and death, while much blood to heat and life, and the action of the spirit would have everything to do with the quantity and quality of the blood as manifesting life or death. Thus fevers and chills, while abnormal pathological symptoms of arrested circulation, caused by nervo-psychic derangement, show how the thermometer is often made a measure of physiological conditions. How this is done in the cosmic sense or how it is transferred in the physical or psychological sense from material to immaterial worlds must yet be investigated by astute men of science.

There is no doubt but that chemistry and even physics will show an intimacy with alchemy and astrology as these occult sciences were taught in the eastern schools. The planetary system, in its exterior organic form, has always been regarded as a body through which the soul of the universe operated, and in a particular and general way, what each soul does and can do in his own organism that the soul of the universe does and can do. We do not identify these activities as uniform or as alike, but only

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suggest broadly the possible results from similar causes or sources of action.

What, it may further be asked, is the electrical connection between matter and spirit, organism and life? When elements are reduced to electrons how do they connect, form and assemble into action to produce bodies? This question is answered by one word-"Mind." And so as mind is the occult connective of spirit and matter, it is not strange that in a manner, not yet even hinted, the spirit produces these phenomena of cold and heat. Action and reaction suggest flow and ebb, life and death, heat and cold. As the mountain peak covered with snow could not be, were it not for its base often flowing with streams of water and covered with verdure, so nature produces her comparative revelations of the "one law, one element—one far off divine event toward which the whole creation moves."

We live in one universe, where one law obtains immutably, eternally, absolutely. Spirit governs it and we shall find that there is and can be in it no mistakes, chance or evil, so called, which cannot be cleared and understood by the reign of law. Why then disassociate the outer from the inner, the material from the spiritual world?

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The Two Great Questions.

THE EXISTENCE OF GOD AND THE IMMORTALITY OF THE SOUL.

By Lysander Hill.

Many scientists there are who have expressed themselves more or less forcibly at times as to the lack of proof of the existence of a God. A great number of scientific and educated men also doubt the proofs of immortality.

It has remained for Judge Lysander Hill, of Chicago, to formulate the scientific proofs of the existence of a God, and to draw the deduction that man has Godlike qualities that entitle him to an immortal existence. This he has done so comprehensively, so exactly, so logically, that the book is placed in a class by itself. In fact, Judge Hill's array of facts and logical deductions are combined into an argument which seems absolutely unanswerable.

The book is as epoch-making as was Charles Darwin's "Origin of Species," and, while pointing out the mistakes and faulty surmises of Darwin, gives full credit to that pioneer in science. Were Mr. Darwin alive today he would be one of the first to congratulate Judge Hill on this crowning effort of intelligence, the gathering together of scientific facts logically and positively proving the existence of a Creator and a God. Briefly, Judge Hill shows that Dar-

Briefly, Judge Hill shows that Darwin's theory of evolution accounts only partially for the existence of the various forms of life, and while Darwinism disposed of many old ideas, yet it did not dispose of the question of a Creation. Judge Hill illustrates at great length the inventive process of the Creator, in producing such instruments as a snake's poison apparatus, a bee's sting, a spider's web factory and similar astonishing mechanisms, including the wonderful

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combination of chemical and mechanical contrivances that constitutes the human organism. He shows that the entire universe is but a combination of machinery, full of complex inventions, exhibiting a limitless knowledge of the laws of Nature and an omnipotent ability to combine and make use of the material needed for any desired purpose.

He draws the conclusion that while evolution plays its part in the economy of Nature, the hand of the Creator is everywhere in evidence-that this Creator we call God. In his own words: "We are, therefore, as intelligent and reasoning beings, compelled to the conclusion that he who said in his heart 'There is no God' was rightly characterized as a 'fool,' and that he who says 'There is no such thing as an immortal soul' belongs in the same category. For even the atheist cannot regard the works of nature without recognizing their obvious 'mechanism,' strangely forgetful of the fact that mechanism necessarily implies contrivance, and there can be no contrivance without the exercise of mind.

"There are millions of intelligent men and women who believe that they have had personal communion with God, and who find in their own experiences ample justification for their religious faith. So long as the world had no clear conception of the actuality of telepathic com-munication from mind to mind, it was natural that it should reject such revelations, and indeed all revelation, as fictions of an excited immagination or of pious fraud. Men thought that revelation, to be entitled to credence, ought to be delivered orally, in spoken words, or in an interview between God and man; or, at least that some Divine Power must take hold of the arm and compel it to write. Revelation, unsupported by evidence such as that, was deemed entitled to no consideration.

"But with the knowledge that telepathy is an established scientific fact, there is no longer any reason for rejecting the testimony of credible witnesses that they are conscious of having had communion directly with the Divine Spirit. There may, indeed, be many enthusiastic devotees, and many other persons who are prone to mistake fancy for fact, whose judgment on such matters may not be entirely reliable; but there is no reason to doubt the testimony of thousands of pious men and women who conscientiously believe that they have communed personally with God.

"This great mass of testimony to personal communion with God is, of itself, evidence that God exists and that the soul is immortal. Many persons feel the need of no other evidence upon which to base their religious faith, and are happy in the consolation which they derive from it."

Judge Hill does not appear as a defender of the Scriptures; in fact, he says in so many words that the story of Adam and Eve is an allegory. He is primarily a scientist, and evidently not bound by the creed of any church, but throughout his work there is apparent deep religious feeling toward God, the Creator, and his reasoning brings him ultimately to the conclusion thar man, like God, is immortal.

Incidentally, Judge Hill's great work is a compendium of the wonders of Nature. His beautifully worded descriptions of the mechanism and construction of the human eye, ear, brain, nutritive system, breathing apparatus, glands, skeleton, etc., are masterpieces of scientific literature that hold the reader chained and thrill him with admiration for God's handiwork.

In, the chapter on God. Judge Hill gives these conclusions: "We have come, then, to the end of our discussion, so far as it concerns the great question whether God exists and governs the universe. The proof of His existence and government is so clear and convincing that it must be pronounced absolutely conclusive. There is no room for any other verdict; for in all nature there is found not the slightest evidence to the contrary.

"This conclusion accepted, as it must be by all reasoning minds, evolution disappears as a religious question. It will always remain interesting, and scientifically valuable as a theory on which to explain the process of animal and plant development from the living germ. For it is undoubtedly based upon fundamental truth—the truth that God is not clothed in a material body, and therefore works His will by establishing general laws for the control and government of material things. To ascertain and formulate those laws is the high prerogative of science.

"Science has not only enabled us to prove the existence and government of God, but it has done much more than that—it has furnished us with information that practically amounts to a new revelation of God himself. That revelation tells us of His eternity; for He existed before time began; of His omnipotence; for He controls the universe; of His omnipresence; for He is acting at the same time everywhere throughout the universe; of His omnipresence; and of His incorporeal unity; for it is clear that the works of nature were all produced by one and the same Maker, who is not embodied in material form." In the concluding pages of the volume, Mr. Hill discusses telepathy and clairvoyance and cites instances in proof of the existence of both. He argues that these faculties, of little use here, indicate that we are destined to inhabit another world where they will be valuable and useful in a higher existence. Shakespear Press, New York.

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
