

own duty, even though it is devoid of excellence, than to perform another's duty well.





The Faces of the Signs



OUR attention at this time is directed to an important point in relation to the faces of the signs or the sixth part of a sign containing five degrees. Each face when rising impresses its influence upon the personality of those born under

that part of the Sign Ascending, and then a planet posited in the different faces of the signs will partake of that nature combined with its own. The planet rising in the Ascendant will, of course, modify the influences.

In giving the nature of these facts it will enable the student to render more accurate and exact judgment,

Aries

The first face of Aries is martial, giving a fearless, courageous ambition, one able to lead and command others, quick and ingenious and generally a very impressive speaker. The second face of Aries is a mixture of Mars and Mercury, with an undercurrent of Venus. This face gives pride and conceit, a resentful person, a tendency to indignation. Education of Children

REV. THEODORE PARKER'S AN-ALYSIS OF THE RELIGION OF SPIRITUALISM.

"This party has an idea wider and deeper then that of the Catholic or Protestant; namely, that God still inspires men as much as ever; that he is imminent in spirit as in space. For the present purpose, and to avoid circumlocution, this doctrine may be called Spiritualism.

This relies on no church tradition, or scripture, as the last ground and infallible rule. It counts these things teachers, if they teach—not masters; helps, if they help us—not authorities. It relies on the divine presence in the soul of men—the eternal word of God, which is Truth, as it speaks through the faculties he has given.

It believes God is near the soul as matter to the sense; thinks the canon of revelation not yet closed, nor God exhausted. It sees him in Nature's perfect work; hears him in all true Scripture, Jewish or Phoenician; feel Him in the inspiration of the heart; stoops at the same fountain with Moses and Jesus, and is filled with living water. AN INTERESTING EXPERIENCE

Due to the personal nature of the following letter the writer did not intend it for publication (see closing paragraph), but knowing that all Stellar Ray readers will be interested in it, we have compromised by simply signing his initials—Editor.

Henry Clay Hodges,

Editor "The Stellar Ray."

Dear Sir:—I was interested in the two cases of Thought transference, under the heading of "Dreams and Visions" in your February number. I could relate a parallel case almost identical with that of Dr. L. of Richmond, Va., in connection with my mother and her brother on the death of the latter, in which he impressed her with that fact though many miles distant at the time of his death. I have often exchanged thoughts and sentiments with my mother though physically seperated by many miles.

I might relate an instance among many others as additional proof of thought transference or soul communion, (if any were needed) which might be interesting from a psychological point of view.

My father, from whom I had been estranged some years previous to his death, lay on his death bed in a hospital. My mother was at his side. I was in -, some thousand miles distant. It was my mother's earnest desire that we should be reconciled before his death, and as the time approached her desire grew more intense. A few days before his death while lying awake in bed, I became conscious of my mother's presence. I could see that her face was convulsed with grief and knew that she was crying. The features were distinct though appeared to be in a state of vibration similar to heat waves. I heard her utter the words very distinctly in my mental consciousness. "O God soften his heart." My will remained opposed to hers for some time but was finally dissolved in the intensity of her desire. (for the higher vibration always controls the lower).

The instant my will succumbed to hers, I felt the wave of relief and gratitude which swept over her soul, and I knew that she knew that her desire had been fulfilled. I arose and wrote the following letter: "Dear Mother—"Inclosed you will find the letter in reply to your earnest and heartfelt desire, which came not by mail but in a much more direct and effective manner."

The above was the only written or verbal communication that ever passed between us in regard to the subject. Words were superfluous.

I could give another instance of an exchange of soul currents between two hearts (I say heart for the heart is a better carrier than the brain) which extended over a period of days, months, and years and was the closest relation that could possibly exist between two beings in this life. Though no verbal communication ever passed between them it culminated in the writing of a book by one of them and dedicated to the other, which has since become a classic, and is published by A. C. Mc. Clurg of Chicago.

Telepathy or soul communion is the closest contact that can ever take place between two souls in this life. Its the actual thought, feeling, and emotion, stripped of all subterfuges and deceptions, flashes from one heart upon the sensitized soul of another. As Swedenborg puts it, "He presents himself in his state;" the clarity of the vision in the mind of the percipient is in exact ratio to the intensity, power, and concentration of the thought, feeling, and emotion in the sender, and the harmony or atunement of the two instruments.

For the above reason these communications usually take place during sudden centration of the thought, feeling, and in sudden danger, or parting at death when the soul goes out to its loved ones, as in the above mentioned cases. It seems that the feelings and emotions (for a dead thought will not carry) are the dynamics which set in operation those subtile forces which send them speeding with lightening rapidity to

their opposite pole of attraction or affin-

The above statements are facts not theories for experienced knowledge is our own not borrowed. I have no more doubt of the faculty of thought transference or soul communion than I have of any of the rest of my perceptions, or that I can see with my eyes or hear with my ears. I know that under certain conditions it is both possible to see and hear without the use of the physical organs. Which are but the outward prototype of the inner vision. As Emerson says, "Spirit is not needful of mediate organs, it has plentiful and direct effects. I am explained without explaining, I am felt without acting, and where am I not."

The above was not intended for publication, but would not object to the right persons seeing it who might be interested in it from a psychological point of view.

SOME RELIGIOUS AND SOCIAL OPINIONS—A "RECKONING" NOT EXACTLY "DEAD" OF A FELLOW-VOYAGER ON LIFE'S DEEP SEA.

I believe that each of the writers of the four Gospels, whoever they were, had the sincere intent of setting forth a plain and truthful record of what they knew of the life of The Christ in Palestine, in the physical manifestation, who was called Jesus; and of those events immediately surrounding and participated in by him. I believe that none of the original copies, or exact duplications of the originals, have been preserved on earth and have come down to this time; nor were copies of the originals ever seen by the English translators of what is known as the King James Version. The copies to which they had access, we may assume were the lineal descendants of the Originals, but greatly changed, as all decendants are changed from their originals.

Our present un-American alien law is the source of the diplomatic embarrassment at Washington, at this writing, in our relations with Japan; it is a shame to the fair name of my chosen state, and the United States of America,-the patron and foster-mother of all Europe-is a stench in the nostrils of three-fourths of the population of the globe! If we can make American citizens out of Africans and Europeans, which we certainly have done, there is nothing but prejudice and capitalistic greed standing in the way of our extending the same privileges to Asiatics. But surely in the path of the years lies the wiser plan of the co-operation of all nations and "the Federation of the world;" and we are approaching it more rapidly than we realize. They who rise early see that the east is rosy with promise. Humanity's condition will be graded up to a state wherein there shall be no more sickness, suffering, want, fear or grinding care. For a broader, saner sense of justice is being born in the hearts of men;-they begin to feel like a thief when they hold more than they can use wisely; and it is through love and cooperation that the salvation of the race

DIFFERENT KIND OF DEVILS, OR TROUBLES OF THE NEW THOUGHT PEOPLE.

A literal interpretation of the mythological characters, astronomical allegories and alchemical symbols of the Bible and New Testament has caused the earth to run red with wars; and the belief that the literal blood of a man, however good, or his ignominious death could by any possibility save souls, has made idolators of a large portion of the race. It seems incredible that men should go to war about God or religion, yet such is the case. Sam Walter Foss, in a poem entitled, "Why?", says:

They met and they talked where the crossroads meet,

Four men from the four winds come, And they talked of the horse, for they loved the theme,

And never a man was dumb.

And the man from the North loved the strength of the horse.

And the man from the East his pace, And the man from the South loved the speed of the horse,

And the man from the West his grace.

So these four men from the four winds come,

Each paused a space in his course And smiled in the face of his fellowman

And lovingly talked of the horse.

Then each man parted and went his way As their different courses ran; And each man journeyed with peace in

his heart

And loving his fellow-man.

They met the next year where the crossroads meet,

Four men from the four winds come; And it chanced to be that they talked of God.

And never a man was dumb. One imagined God in the shape of a man,

A spirit did one insist; One said that Nature itself was God, And one said that He didn't exist.

But they lashed each other with tongues that stung,

That smote as with a rod; Each glared in the face of his fellowman.

And wrathfully talked of God.

Then each man parted and went his way,

As their different courses ran; And each man journed with war in his heart,

And hating his fellow-man.

Sin is from a Greek word meaning to fall short, or a failure to fully comprehend.

Unborn millions cannot be saved from their failure to understand by the crucifixion of a saint.

But the old question, "What shall we do with Jesus?" must be answered, for in the answer we will be able to "work out our own salvation."

Jesus, the Nazarite, is derived from the Hebrew Isis Nazir, meaning the eternal essence, cooked or transmuted, changed or prepared. It is a chemical or alchemical symbol, typified by the crucifixion. A union of elements is described as crossing, crossification or crucifixion. The eternal essence passing through the various changes from the vibration of pure spirit potency to materialized forms is continually being

crucified. Acids and alkalis, apparently opposite in quality, unite and form new compounds.

Air is the universal eternal essence. When breathed into the arteries, it is changed to blood, and then it is deposited in flesh and bone, thus materializing the human organism.

All scripture is an allegory. It is a figurative literality. It described literal facts under the figure of living beings. It is a personification of existing active principles, but no person or sentient thing is actually alluded to from Genesis to Revelations.

To establish this proposition, you say, will subvert all existing religious belief. Not so. It will simply give to religion what it lacks—a scientific and reasonable basis. It will bring the present church out of the crumbling shadows of doubt into the strong light of faith, establishing it upon the rock of eternal truth or science.

Epictetus, known as the prince of Grecian stoics, was for a long time a slave, but those who read his words of wisdom now name him the prince of philosophers, and clearly see that the so-called new thought of today was promulgated during the palmy days of Greece and Rome. Epictetus was a philosopher of Nature, and not a product of scholastic lore.

One of the gems of the Epictetus mine of wisdom is: "It is not things, but the opinion about things that trouble mankind. Thus, death is not terrible. If it were so it would have appeared so to Socrates. But the opinion we have about death, that is terrible, that is where the terror lies."

The word Satan is from the Sanscrit, Satya, meaning truth, and the Egyptian Soterim, i. e., a judge. It is also identified with the Greek Cronus, meaning one crowned. In Grecian mythology, Cronus swallowed all his children until the birth of Jupiter. Cronus, you must remember, and Saturn are the same, and in other symbols or mythologies they are represented as the Dragon. There is a constellation called the Dragon, and

the Chinese use a symbol of the Dragon on their national ensign, as we use the eagle on ours.

There is a symbol of Egyptian origin showing a wheel, the expression of eternity—without beginning or end—on the right side the genius of good, Anubis, ascending; on the left the genius of evil, Typhon, descending. Up over the center sits the Sphinx, a sign of ruling power, holding the universal force in balance as it passes through the changes we call good and evil. In chemistry this operation is carried on by acids and alkalis, which, while seemingly opposite in quality, unite and form new compounds.

Saturn ascending is Christ, while descending it is Satan or devil. Saturn rules the interior of the earth - lead, iron, coal and tillers of the soil. Therefore, we speak of these people as Saturnians. Satan is only a name for the aggressive creative spirit on its descend-Paul plainly says: "He ing course. that descendeth is the same as he that ascendeth." In second verse, second chapter of Job, we read: "And the Lord said unto Satan, from whence cometh thou? And Satan answered the Lord and said, From going to and fro in the earth and walking up and down in it."

In this quotation from the book of Job, which is one of the grandest epic poems on the science of astrology and astronomy and chemistry ever conceived, we find the influence of the planets clearly shown. Saturn rules materiality. The sign of Saturn itself is a symbol of matter ruling over mind, a cross over Luna, the moon, or mind. The idea that Saturn is really evil gave rise to the idea of a literal hell down in the earth.

Thus we see that the materialistic concept of man on the earth plane of thought creates many devils.

Evil, or a devil of some kind seems to be a necessity to those still in thought or separateness or individualism. The efforts of these people to keep before their mind's eye something other than law, or the chemistry of life on natural lines, calls to mind the little boy who

asked his mother if she thought God would let him have one little devil to play with when he went to heaven if he would be real good.

But let us return to the ancient symbols of alchemy and astrology again. The church has taken these myths, allegories or symbols, clothed them with personalities, and then called upon the people to fall down and worship themyes, even called upon the people to worship the devil, for the concept held by the church of the Jewish Jehovah makes Him a first-class devil most of the time. The distorted idea held by the church of this tutelary deity made him destroy innocent men, women and babes in order that his chosen children might posses a better dwelling place.

Fine business for the creator of heaven and earth and all peoples, as He is claimed to be. What would we think of an earthly parent who would select, say, two of his children as his chosen ones, kill the rest and give their lands to his favorites? We would call him a devil and proceed to stretch his neck.

But of course the Old Testament narrative of the God of Israel has its root deep down in the alchemy of the wondrous human laboratory—the circulation of blood, the nerve centers, the cellular operations and the composition of the blood itself; in fact, the Bible is a collection of alchemical and astrological writings, all pertaining to the chemistry of life operating in the human organism, well understood by the Jewish Rabbis during the Pisces age, or the dark ages.

We have now entered the Aquarius age—the air age, or the age of spiritual man. We no longer see men as "trees walking"; no longer see the divine operation as evil, black magic, or the work of a malignant being; but see all as wisdom's operations.

We are passing out of the Pisces, or water age, in which our vision was distorted for 2000 years by a materialistic concept of forms, and even life itself.

The early Spiritualists laughed the big devil "out of court" or, rather, out of existence, and then declared every operation in the temple of the living God—
the human body—that they could not understand to be obsession, or the work of
evil, earthbound spirits. In union there
is strength. While these little devils
were united in the orthodox devil, he
was strong; but after he was cut up into
many small pieces his ultimate extinction
was certain to follow. But if we must
have the belief in evil personified, I prefer one big devil to several million small
ones. I am pleased to note that the majority of modern Spiritualists do not believe in evil spirits.

Next came Theosophy, the wisdom religion, whose founders failed to recognize, as others had failed before them, that there is nothing but wisdom.

Wisdom operates on various planes, but the same wisdom is always the operator. The same wisdom—infinite life—operates through the cellular structure of the universe, from molecue to animal structure, from saurian to savage, from the crystal to the civilzee. A deferentiation in cellular arrangement causes the different types or materializations.

Theosophy did not believe in evil spirits, but brought the devil to the front to make his bow to the world again, labeled Karma. The so-called evil in the world, according to this cult, is the result of evil in some past world, i. e., incarnation. So Karma is another kind of devil. Then came Mrs. Eddy and Christian Science, with all is God, or spirit—with its mortal mind devil, occupying no place, being a highly triturated potency of nothing—but a devil just the same.

The race having failed to transmute the devil, even with Mrs. Eddy's science and health, mental science came to the front. The advocates of the science of mind did not believe in mortal mind. They believed that all was immortal mind, and it did at first really look as though the devil was dead at last. But on further investigation it was discovered that the devil was still in evidence, disguised as error, mistakes, and evolu-

tion from a low to a high state. When the teachers of mental science are asked the question, "How can mind, eternal, immortal mind, which is all and never commenced, be low or need to progress, get better or go up higher?" they fail, utterly fail to answer. The devil in any disguise he may be clothed with will give even the new thought people serious trouble.

Even the sweet-souled Hindus, must be troubled by their highly esthetic, attenuated devil, that they softly name Maya, or illusion. Illusion is a fleeting, momentary expression of divine wisdom, a great necessity in the eternal plan.

But the day of awakening, the day of resurrection, is at hand. Throw off the grave clothes of materialism, oh, brother, oh sister! Come forth in the shining robe of spiritual philosophy and sing the song of the new birth.

Stand up in the full realization of your godhood and say: "Oh, thou Eternal, Omnipresent Spirit, thou doest all things called good or bad, and I have no gods or devils before thee."

The devil is only God in disguise. Spell devil backward and you have "lived"—that is, life, and life is God. Therefore God spelled backward —that is, "lived"—is a combination of letters that spells devil.

Be free, oh soul! Arise, take up thy bed and walk. Thy sins be forgiven thee.

The resurrection morn has dawned. This is the day of judgment; that is, correct judgment.

Charity begins at home. Forgive your own sins, which are simply failures to understand, and you will know how to forgive your neighbor and love him as yourself. Again I say, "Thy sins be forgiven thee."

Let man stand upright and splendid, Let woman look up from the sod, For the days of our bondage are ended, And we are as one with God.
