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

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Suggestion the Basic Principle of Christian Science Healing.

PART III.

BEFORE I leave the subject of Christian Science and hygiene let me tell you about a few cases of the hundreds I have cured after Christian Science treatment failed.

Mrs. S., an old lady about 65, had taken six months' Christian Science treatment for deafness from one of Chicago's best-known Christian Science healers. She had all the faith in the world in Christian Science, for a cousin who lived with her had been relieved of a chronic nervous trouble after .treatment by the same healer; but the Christian Science treatment had no effect on Mrs. S.'s hearing. Having learned that I had cured several patients on whom Christian Science had failed, she came to see me. After questioning her carefully I examined her ears and found them filled with cerumen (wax) from the drum to the outer opening. I used an ear spud to remove as much of the wax as possible, and then, by means of a syringe, washed out her ears with a warm medicated solution. She heard distinctly after the first treatment and was overjoyed: I washed out her ears daily for a week, and, after instructing her to keep her ears henceforth in a hygienic condition with soap and water, I dismissed her perfectly cured.

Does the reader think that all the Christian Science healers in

the world could have removed that wax by their absent or present treatment? Does not this example show that the laws of hygiene must be observed?

DOES MRS. EDDY IGNORE NATURAL LAW?

Query: Are Mrs. Eddy's teachings in accord with the laws of hygiene and health? Does Mrs. Eddy ignore natural law? What do you think of a system of philosophy or science (?) which teaches that the natural laws of our being can be set aside? Where is the "science" in such doctrines?

Mrs. R. had suffered from dyspepsia for nearly four years, although previous to that time she had enjoyed fairly good health. Before coming to me for treatment she had taken nearly ten months' Christian Science treatment and had carefully studied "Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures," daily. Under Christian Science treatment she had become reduced in flesh to a shadow and was so weak she could scarcely come to my office. She would have continued Christian Science treatment till she died—"hypnotized" by it, in fact—if a sister of hers, a reader of SUGGESTION, had not visited her in Chicago, and, taking matters into her own hands, forced her to come to my office for treatment.

On examining the patient's teeth I found she had not a single molar tooth left, and in consequence was unable to masticate her food.

I sent her to a dentist at once to have a suitable set of false teeth made, and until she was able to use her new teeth successfully I prescribed foods which did not require thorough mastication. The patient began to improve at once. Her stomach digested what she ate, and in three weeks, by which time her false teeth were ready for use, she had gained eight pounds. In the following six weeks she gained eighteen pounds more—twenty-six pounds in two months —when I dismissed her cured, with better health than she had enjoyed in ten years. The teeth enabled her to eat like a healthy woman. Christian Science can't grow new teeth nor make a set of false teeth.

WILL CHRISTIAN SCIENCE TAKE THE PLACE OF TEETH?

Will any rational person claim that Christian Science can cure dyspepsia in a person who has no grinding teeth and who can not properly masticate food? Will Christian Science take the place of teeth? Yet we are taught that the laws of health and nutrition can be ignored if the directions in Mrs. Eddy's key to the Bible are followed. Query: Is Christian Science rational and scientific? Or does it ignore the simplest laws of our being?

Mrs. T., a young woman whose home was several hundred miles from Chicago, had suffered from nervous prostration, dyspepsia and constipation for several years and was urged by her husband to come to me for treatment. She was accompanied to Chicago by a friend who had been healed by Christian Science, and this friend, instead of bringing her directly to me, took matters into her own hands, and, after securing a boarding house, called in a Christian Science healer. I knew nothing of what had been done till I received a letter from the patient's husband, telling me what had occurred and requesting me to call at the boarding house to look after his wife.

I found her confined to bed, suffering from several severe bed sores. Urged on by the Christian Science healer, she had kept on her feet till nature could stand it no longer and she was simply forced to lie in bed. Her bowels had not moved in over two weeks. Her pulse was 130, temperature 103¹/₂, breath very offensive, persistent vomiting, intense headache. Her mind was in a very confused state and she talked incoherently about Truth, Spirit, Error. Immortal Mind, Chemicalization, etc.

I discovered she had not drunk over three glassfuls of liquids per day since coming to Chicago, seven weeks before I saw her. I immediately summoned a trained nurse, gave the patient a drink of laxative medicine and emptied the empacted bowels by using large enemas of warm water with glycerine. I left instructions with the nurse for dressing the bed sores and insisted that the patient should drink large quantities of water to flush out the whole system.

Next day I found the temperature reduced and the pulse down to 100 beats per minute; the nausea had ceased and the patient looked better and seemed brighter. She had slept very well and the headache had departed. I gave her a suggestive treatment every day for three weeks, and the change in her mental and physical condition was marvelous. I had taught her the necessity of looking after the life essentials, and she must have gained greatly in weight during the three weeks I kept her in the house, for when the three weeks had passed she was able to visit my office and I found she weighed 106 pounds. After daily treatment at my office for five weeks, she left for her home, a perfectly sound "cured" woman, and on the morning she left she weighed 123 pounds.

I could give example after example of cases of this kind, in which Christian Science has failed, because it ignores some of Truth's, Nature's, God's inexorable, common sense laws.

TYPICAL CASES.

A few days ago one of Chicago's most noted Christian Science healers—a pillar in the church—died from dropsy, the result of fatty degeneration of the heart. He was an abnormally stout man, and probably ate three times as much as he required. But the Christian Science healers were powerless to aid him, and he died.

Restricted diet, rational hygiene, judicious exercise and sensible suggestions would have saved this man's life and accomplished more than the "Immortal Minds" of Mrs. Eddy and a thousand Christian Science healers combined.

A few years ago I called at a residence in this city, and before I left was asked to step into a room to see a sick man who had been under Christian Science treatment for three weeks. He and his wife were Christian Scientists, and some of Chicago's best known Christian Science healers were supposed to be treating him. It appears that a pet parrot had bitten him on the hand three weeks before I saw him, and nothing had been done for him excepting to request the Christian Science healers to heal him.

I found his hand and arm swollen to three times their normal size, his pulse 160, and I should judge his temperature must have been 105. The case was undoubtedly a hopeless case of blood poisoning. I called his wife aside and told her to call in her old family physician without a moment's delay, but instead of doing this she summoned her Christian Science healer and they telegraphed to three other Christian Science healers-one in San Francisco, another in New York, and another in Boston-requesting them to give the man absent treatment. But the patient grew steadily worse, and after losing three days more in meddling with The Error-Christian Science-his wife called in her old physician, who immediately called in four or five of the best surgeons in Chicago for consultation, but they decided the patient had been neglected too long for them to be of any service, and in a few hours the patient was deaddead because he and his wife had been so hypnotized by Christian Science that common sense and hygiene had been thrown to the winds.

"I HAD KILLED THE PATIENT."

A Christian Scientist who heard me tell about this victim of The Error promptly declared that I had killed the patient by allowing my Mortal Mind to think he would die. I know this is a common excuse for Christian Scientists to offer when a patient dies after a physician has been called in. But can any good, consistent Christian Scientist imagine my poor little Mortal Mind overcoming and vanquishing the All Mind, God, Spirit, Truth, operating through the four "powerful" Christian Science healers and the victim's wife? What—Mortal Mind, Error, Devil, vanquishing God, Spirit, Soul, Life, Truth? Nonsense.

The victim of The Error—the imponderable Christian Science Therapy—was a well known inventor of railroad improvements and was too valuable a man to lose through such criminal negligence. Just before his death he had taken out a patent which is now in common use in every well equipped passenger train.

The Chicago papers published an account of his life and his inventions, and said he died from blood poisoning following a parrot's bite. The papers did not say that if a little hygiene had been used at the time the bite was received, or if hot fomentations had been applied as soon as there was the slightest sign of septic infection, his life could have been saved. But such is the Truth, and I believe the man would be alive today if it had not been for the baneful, pernicious, hypnotic influence of so-called Christian Science—The Error, as opposed to Wisdom—Wisdom, which God, Spirit, Truth, has revealed to man.

ME. FARLOW AND HIS STATEMENTS.

And now let us see what Mr. Farlow has to say about Christian Science and suggestion.

In the first place he virtually admits what every student of suggestion knows, i. e., that Christian Science cures are made by suggestion; but he goes a step farther and intimates that the quality of the suggestions used by the Christian Scientist is superior to the quality of the suggestions used by the average suggestionist.

I fail to see wherein suggestions like the Christian Science suggestions, founded on Error, can be of as good quality as suggestions founded on Common Sense, Science and Truth, such as the suggestions employed by the intelligent practitioner of Suggestive Therapeutics. Mr. Farlow should have studied the law of suggestion and watched its effect in the treatment of disease before making such a statement. There may be a certain emotional class attracted to Christian Science on account of its religious garb (and this class is very fickle), but, thank goodness, the great bulk of the people who

require to be healed do not belong to this class and will follow something built on sound, common sense when it is called to their attention, in preference to following a superstition, even if they are at first attracted to the superstition because they have not been given a simple, rational explanation for the apparent miracles wrought by the superstition.

In the next place Mr. Farlow says the "cures" made by Christian Science are "genuine and permanent" because they have a spiritual basis, while the cures made by suggestive therapeutics are "unscientific, unreal and counterfeit."

I have already shown the absurdity of qualifying a cure; but even granting that there are different classes or degrees of cure, is Mr. Farlow qualified to speak authoritatively on the subject of cures by suggestive therapeutics? Has he ever compared them with the cures of Christian Science except in his imagination? And what basis of cure can be more spiritual than a basis founded on Truth— Fact—Wisdom (such as the cures that follow treatment by Suggestive Therapeutics through the Self, Spirit, Mind, within the man), which is called on to heal the body after man has supplied the materials through which the Self, Spirit, Mind manifests itself in the flesh of the body, and which is used to heal any diseased part of the body. Unscientific suggestions, such as are used in Christian Science, do not become more effectual or more spiritual because they are associated with a few scriptural quotations, whose meanings have been perverted to bolster up The Error.

Again Mr. Farlow says "It may be admitted that apparent results are effected through all sorts of mental suggestion, but we assert that the stability and character of the results are always in exact accord with the character of arguments employed in producing the results." In this I heartily agree with Mr. Farlow, and it is for the reasons he has advanced that the results produced by Suggestive Therapeutics, intelligently employed, are so far ahead of any other system of masked suggestion, including Christian Science.

Again, to quote Mr. Farlow, "A discordant bodily condition is the result of an erroneous mental state, and if the mental process by which the cure is attempted consists in merely exchanging one belief for another, we can not hope for the same permanent results which may be effected by imparting the truth which destroys the procuring Error."

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE HEALING

THE CAUSE OF DISEASE.

I must disagree with Mr. Farlow in the first part of this statement, for disease is not always the result of an erroneous mental state. The diseases cured by Christian Science are undoubtedly the results of erroneous mental states, but this is why they are susceptible to cure by Christian Science or any other system of purely mental treatment. However, there are diseases, arising from other conditions, in which the erroneous mental state follows the disease, instead of preceding it, but Christian Science, alone, can not cure these cases. For example, a man is in a desert and is unable to obtain water. The lack of this life essential produces certain physical conditions and if he is compelled to go without water for several days, his physical condition becomes so disturbed and his blood becomes so abnormal, that "erroneous mental conditions" (delusions) develop.

Now, of what avail will Christian Science be to a case of this kind? The laws of health and hygiene demand that this man be given water, and if he be given water in small quantities at a time, he will recover physically, and a little later the erroneous mental state will leave him.

Christian Science teaches that mind alone would cure this man, or, if he wants water to let him take what is put before him. Here again, rational hygiene demonstrates its superiority over Christian Science, for if a man who has been deprived of water till he is delirious be allowed to drink till his thirst is satisfied, he will probably die.

There are millions of patients whose erroneous mental conditions have followed a decline in health caused by failure to partake properly of the life essentials—air, food and water. But I agree with Mr. Farlow that we can not expect that an attempt to cure a disease by merely exchanging one erronéous belief for another will produce the permanent results that are effected by imparting the Truth which destroys the procuring Error.

For example, if a man be healed by making him believe that his disease, which he has always attributed to Divine Providence, is produced by Mortal Mind, the Devil (the Christian Science theory), is his cure likely to be as permanent as when he is restored to health by being taught the Truth, through suggestive therapeutics, that disease is the result of ignorance in transgressing God's inexorable laws, and that health follows and is maintained by right thinking, right living, and the proper direction of the Divine power within himself?

Mr. Farlow has emphasized this point nicely for me in the following manner, and it is in connection with this that he qualifies cures:

"One who believes that four plus four equals nine, might be cured of that belief by being persuaded that four plus four equals ten, but he would have another and greater error in the place of the first; whereas, if it be demonstrated to him that four plus four equals eight, he is permanently cured of this error. The former cure is unreal, unscientific and temporal; the later is real and permanent. The cure which is founded on divine, spiritual basis is genuine and lasting, while a cure based upon materiality or human will is unscientific, and therefore, counterfeit."

Just one more quotation from Mr. Farlow:

"It ought not to be difficult, however, to decide that the method which gives most power to God and least to human sense and reason, is most Christian and most desirable."

HOW MUCH "SCIENCE" ABOUT THIS?

It is a well known fact that Christian Scientists claim remarkable results in treating dogs, horses, plants and trees, as well as human beings. If this is the case and Mr. Farlow's contention be true, then all a Christian Science farmer would have to do to secure good crops, would be to treat his land to bring forth good crops. It would not be necessary for him to plant any seed, and his Divine Mind would kill out the weeds by denying their existence. Or, if the Christian Science farmer planted his seed he would not find it necessary to weed or cultivate. He would merely have to deny the existence of the weeds, and harvest a bumper crop. Would not this be leaving things to God with a vengeance?

But it seems to me that God gave man "human sense and reason" for a purpose, and expected him to use them. If he expected him to use them to keep his crops and orchards healthy, surely he expected him to use them to keep himself, his children and his neighbor as healthy as possible.

I think we can tell pretty well what would happen to a farmer's crop if he set aside human sense and reason, and expected God to look after it for him. And we have many awful examples set before us daily of the sad results of the Christian Science method of setting aside human sense and reason and relying wholly on God to heal their sick and suffering.

Mr. Farlow's argument reminds me of the story of the old Scotch lady whose husband occasionally had some distress in his

stomach from overeating. At these times it was his custom to groan with pain and pray to God in a loud voice to relieve him. During one of these attacks his wife said to him: "I dinna see why ye bother the dear, busy Lord wi' yer groans and prayers, when a pinch o' soda will relieve yer distress."

In conclusion, let me say that the only truth in Christian Science lies in the fact that it does make some cures among certain classes of diseases, but this Truth is the law of Suggestion, and the cures are made by the operations of this law.

After thirteen years' experience with suggestive therapeutics, in which I have received over ten thousand patients for treatment; after ten years' observation of Christian Science as a religion and system of healing; after witnessing the results of Christian Science treatment in hundreds of cases, and after making a careful study of Christian Science, I have no hesitation in publishing the results of my research and the conclusions to be drawn from them. Here they are:

IN CONCLUSION.

The percentage of cures among people who seek treatment by suggestive therapeutics is far greater than the percentage of cures made among people who seek Christian Science treatment.

The percentage of deaths under Christian Science treatment is greater than under suggestive therapeutic treatment. Let me say with respect to this point that although I have been practicing suggestive therapeutics for thirteen years, I have yet to sign the first death certificate, although, as a licensed physician in Illinois and several other States, I am fully qualified to issue a death certificate if called upon.

Under suggestive treatment results can be duplicated and repeated with certainty in similar cases—something that can not be accomplished by Christian Science.

Patients healed by suggestive therapeutics are not prone to relapses like patients treated by Christian Science.

The cures that are made by Christian Science are really made by Suggestive Therapeutics, unintelligently, unwittingly and unscientifically employed.

Suggestion is one of the natural forces of the universe, given to man by a superior intelligence to be employed for the education, uplifting and healing of man of every race and color the world over; that through it man might "have dominion over the fish of the sea

and over the fowl of the air and over every living thing that moveth on the earth." In fact, "suggestion moves the world."

I don't believe that Mrs. Eddy, even in her wildest flights of imagination, ever thought or expected that Christian Science would ever be anything more than a system of healing; but her followers who have been healed by it, not realizing that a simple attribute of their own minds is the source of all the healing powers manifested in or credited to Christian Science, have gradually made a religion out of it, because it appeared to them to be "a way that seemeth right."

The Power of Thought.

STRANGE EFFECTS OF THE IMAGINATION IN CAUSING DEATH

AND DISEASE.

From the London Express.

A REMARKABLE case of death caused by imagination was recorded recently. A young girl at Cincinnati, depressed through ill-health, drank what she supposed was a bottle of carbolic acid, and begged to be taken to a doctor. Despite all medical efforts, however, she rapidly sank and died. A post-mortem examination showed no traces of poison, and the bottle of carbolic acid was found untouched, while the bottle from which she had drunk the contents was proved to have contained only a perfectly harmless mixture.

"Fancy can kill and fancy can cure" is a proverb which, whether in that form or in the saying of the North Country, "Conceit can kill and conceit can cure," is quoted far and wide wherever the English language is spoken, and it has a fundamental foundation in truth which brings it in into contrast with many other proverbs.

"Fancy can kill!" More than that, fancy, "conceit," imagination—call it what you will—has killed strong, healthy men, and where it has not killed them it has given them disease of an unmistakable kind or has produced effects through the action of drugs exactly opposite to those which the drugs ordinarily induce.

How "fancy" can kill, how it actually destroyed life, was demonstrated by the physicians of Montpelier at the time when they were in the habit of having delivered to them every year two criminals whom they vivisected in accordance with the custom which had been handed down to them from Rome. One day they determined to see what effect the mere expectation of death would have on a man who was perfectly healthy.

They, therefore, took such a subject and told him that they would kill him in the easiest way by opening his veins in warm water. They got a bath of warm water, into which they put his feet. Next they blindfolded him and pricked his feet with the point of a lancet, but without drawing blood. Then they began talking to each other as if the man was bleeding to death. In a little while they removed the bandage from his eyes. The man was dead, killed by fancying that he was bleeding to death.

. THE FATAL BATH.

Only a year ago there was a young artillery recruit at Douai who was a perfectly healthy man, but who labored under the belief that if he had a bath he would die. His comrades laughed at him, and to demonstrate how absurd was his belief, they stripped his clothes off and put him into the bath. When they took him out of the water he was dead. It might be urged that he was suffering from some organic disease and the shock of the water killed him. A post mortem examination was, however, held, and no disease was discovered.

How "fancy," which is, after all, only another name for the influence of the mind, can produce a disease which will ultimately cause death was most strikingly shown in a case which has often been quoted.

In a certain prison there was a case of smallpox. The fact was known, as, in some inscrutable way which the authorities would probably find it difficult to explain, such facts always do get known to the prisoners. One of them, a perfectly strong, sound, healthy man, showing no symptoms of weakness, was moved into a cell in which he was told a prisoner suffering from smallpox had died. The statement was inaccurate, for there had never been a smallpox case in that cell at all. In a day or two the man complained of being ill. In a few days more he exhibited every symptom of smallpox. As a matter of fact, he had smallpox. He said he was convinced he was going to die. He did die—killed by "fancy" and smallpox which he acquired merely by "fancy."

SAVED BY "FANCY."

In striking contrast with his case was that of another prisoner. He was put into the cell in which the original smallpox patient had died. He was assured that no one had died there or had ever had the disease in it. Although the room must have been swarming with the germs thrown off by the man who had died there only a short time before, the second prisoner did not get smallpox or anything else, and remained perfectly healthy during all the time he was kept there and afterward.

It is no doubt because they never "fancy" they have a disease that doctors on the whole preserve such an immunity from sickness, as, no doubt also, because their patients never trouble their heads as to what was the last case the doctor has come from, that they, too, fail to catch disease. It is a fact well known to everyone who has had any experience of hospitals that, whatever may be the custom today, the students often used to leave the wards and go down to see fever cases in the room set apart for all diseases of "a suspicious nature, and go back to work in the ward without carrying infection with them, having taken no other precaution than that of washing their hands.

On the other hand, it is equally well known that in the earlier days of his medical career every student suffers acutely from the disease about which the professor of medicine happens to be lecturing at the time or the student himself happens to be reading. Indeed, there are many women who, of a friend says she is suffering in such-and-such a way, at once get every one of the symptoms mentioned.

PILLS AND IMAGINATION.

It has been said that "fancy" can pervert the ordinary action of drugs, and so produce unlooked-for results. One day a poor woman went to a doctor. Her youth belonged to the time before the Board school, and she was therefore ignorant of many of the facts with which the young people of today are thoroughly well acquainted. She was suffering from insomnia, and in order to produce sleep the doctor ordered her some opium pills, but did not tell her the reason for which he gave them.

The woman knew nothing of opium, and, indeed, she did not read the prescription, which was made up for her in the ordinary way at the dispensary. It was impressed upon her that she was to take two pills at bedtime. The only pills with which she was acquainted were the ordinary antibilious ones which are to be had at two for a penny at every chemist's. She took the two opium pills, and although by every law of therapeutics the action of opium is exactly opposite to that of antibilious pills, the woman was so convinced in her mind that the action of all pills was the same that the opium pills produced as powerful an effect as if they had been of the antibilious variety, but without making her sleep.

On another occasion the house surgeon at a hospital gave some colored water—only that and nothing more—to a hundred different patients. "Good heavens," he said when the last one had swallowed the draught, "I have made a mistake. I have given you all a strong emetic." Within a few minutes eighty of the hundred became violently sick, merely as the result of "fancy."

Jaundice is a disease which is supposed to be produced by certain internal disturbances, yet Sir Samuel Wilks has recorded one case which was clearly due to the effects of mental emotion, a potent influence over "fancy." This is also a potent cause for dyspepsia from which so many barristers suffer at the beginning of the assizes at which they have to appear, as it is of a similar complaint in many other professions and callings. Much has been written and more has been talked of late about cancer, the primary cause and origin of which is being sought by, it would be difficult to say, how many scientific men scattered throughout the length and breadth of the world. Few people would believe that "fancy," the influence of the mind, could produce it, yet Sir George Paget once wrote. "In many cases I have reason for believing that cancer had its origin in prolonged mental anxiety."

Dr. Murchison also wrote: "I have been surprised how often patients with primary cancer of the liver have traced the cause of this ill health to protracted grief or anxiety. The cases have been far too numerous to be accounted for as mere coincidences." While Dr. Snow, writing in the *Lancet* in 1880, says: "The vast majority of cases of cancer, especially of the breast and uterine cancer, are due to mental anxiety," and mental anxiety is often closely akin to "fancy."

(NOTE .- Since the mind has power to produce such important and far-reaching effects as shown in the above article, would it not be wise for mankind to study the mental and psychic forces and understand the basic laws of our existence? THE CHARACTER and quality of one's thoughts experience a change by every person they associate with. In thought elements you are a different man each day, caused by the suggestions, information. experiences, material and other environments that come to you each day. Each thing grafts on a quality or shade of thought. Thoughts all springs from and rest in consciousness. A dead man has no thoughts because consciousness has departed. Thoughts have spiritual chemicals that have attractions or repulsions; positive and negative affinities and combinations. If your associations are with evil minded persons, then you attract that kind of elemental mind stuff, and through thought chemicalization with their's, you too will become weighed down with their vicious thoughts.

The old trite aphorism, "evil communications corrupt good manners" is founded on truth. If our associates are pure, refined and intellectual, then we grow in the same mental qualities. Let a refined, pure woman come into the company of the degraded and all pass to a respectful recognition, with vice put in the background. Whatever weakens the mind weakens the body and enervates the power of thought. Many noble souls, through constant contact with spirits saturated with gross, lower natures are physically and menally sick thereby. Innumerable people lose vigor of body and decay because they continually think over daily the same round of thoughts. Your thoughts should be varied as your food, otherwise you will have much unrest, uneasiness and other forms of bodily disease.

Thought is as much food for your spirit, as bread is food for your body. One of the great causes of senility is looking back and dwelling on the events of the past. To keep fresh, hopeful, buoyant, and optimistic is to live resolutely in the ETERNAL NOW, and not keep looking back. Some dried up mentally and physically old men, and women, are ever looking back into the past, and talking of what occurred years long ago—and measuring up things by the decayed and warped mental yardstick of the past.

"I die daily," says Paul, by which we may infer that the thought of yesterday is dead today, and thrown aside like a worn out coat. We cast off old thoughts from our minds, and millions

of old cells each day from our bodies. Happiness is all a matter of thought. Some can be happy in a dungeon, while others will be miserable in a palace. All impure thoughts are harmful to one physically, mentally and spiritually; they are rubbish, garbage, rags and carrion around the mental premises. Some men at times have given expression to lofty sentiments like Robespierre and Mirabeau -yet most of the time were the entities of inordinate passions, defects and vices. They often soared to sublime heights, yet their known lives were low, groveling and coarse. All intellect abounding in richness of thought and visions of grandeur and beauty of life's possibilities, give expression to thoughts that harmonize with their plane of life. Take a man like Emerson, Beecher, Gladstone, Talmage and others whose spirits were opulent with great thoughts; they had to give to the world those thoughts in rich profusion. They lived in a thought atmosphere far above the ordinary level. They were ever and anon inspired by their thoughts. They all possessed what we call "magnetic influence"-that secret, intangible, invisible attraction that one person often has for others. Poets, artists, sculptors and orators work under such thought inspiration. We find the same secret attraction working in the world of business. and of all grades from the highest to the lowest.

We are all parts of a great whole in the mental world, but we live on different levels. We live in an ocean of thought forms, thought elementals and thought stuff-from very crude material to strong and beautiful thought forms. Thought forms of strength have been photographed repeatedly on delicate plates as easily as the X rays and N rays are used. Scientific journals have in the last few years given well authenticated accounts of many such phenomena. This has been done in Paris, Washington and San Francisco. These pictures have been taken in this wise. A person, say of strong concentrating powers, takes a seat to be photographedhe makes in his mind an image, say of three friends, one on his right, one on the left and one behind him-when this group is well fixed in his mind, the signal is given, then the photograph takes the impression-the person and his three thought imaged friends, are distinctly taken in a group. This demonstrates that thoughts are things, though invisible and intangible to mortal eye or touch. What that substance is that makes up thought, no one knows, any more than one knows what composes electricity, force, gravitation, attraction, magnetism and many other things in nature. We see their phenomena and manifestations in innumerable ways. We sim-

ply go up against the impenetrable wall of the unknown-we will not say, unknowable, as some agnostics say; for, some time, man may penetrate the mystery and know the essence of some of these things. It is not wise to put a limitation on man's tireless investigations and researches. Thousands of minds every hour are sounding and dragging the deeps of the unknown-and from time to time treasures of knowledge are brought up and made manifest to humanity. With some, ideas are organic. They are creators as well as absorbers of thought. Such persons try to live up to their highest ideals, and in the greatest variety of life and occupation. When one has such inspiration and mission in life he feels an urgent necessity of bringing to himself all that is best in the universe that he is able to appropriate. He absorbs the spirit of all about him. He weaves into his spiritual fiber, and gives it out again, colored with his individuality. The flames in a series of lamps may be of the same character and color-but we have lights of as different colors as there are globes stained of different colors. So in a series of individualized persons, though each is fed of the same spirit, yet each reflects a peculiar light of his own.

"We can be creative and original as we absorb of any thought and make its expression original." We can assimilate thoughts of others with our own. This is as it were an actual chemical operation of unseen element. There is a combination of other thoughts with your own resulting in the formation of a new element. The more unselfish and purer your own thought and motive, the greater the rapidity of such combination, and the more original and striking your thoughts. By such means are many thoughts born in you.

The qualities of justice, unselfishness and other high ideals, are themselves elements and scientific factors in such birth. The man who is steeped in selfishness and greed does not hesitate to steal the ideas of others bodily. He knowingly appropriates the thoughts of others, without crediting them to their rightful owner, or with any credit. He is a mental poacher from the thought estate of his superiors. But the time will come when he will find himself in a desert place, with no chance to appropriate; dependent entirely upon his own resources; then he will find himself poor and crippled in mentality; because the bad habit he formed has dwarfed his faculties and made him helpless by habitually appropriating the property of others and branding it as his own—though he only has mental mavericks. A Case of Double Consciousness.

Dr. Albert Wilson: The patient was a girl, 22 years of age. She suffered from some affection that may have been meningitis, but this is not known positively. She then developed acute mani-During this illness the patient presented some acal excitation. remarkable changes of personality-such as are seen in hysteria. The author does not term the curious manifestations by this name. but describes some nine or more different varieties of personality manifested by the patient that are quite interesting. Thus the patient had spells of blindness, deafness, paralysis, etc. The most interesting of these manifestations, because the least easy to explain, was the patient's ability to draw the full figure of a nurse, etc., during her spell of blindness. To convince himself that this was the actual case, the author held a book between the patient's eyes and the sheet of paper on which she was drawing, or put his hands before her eyes while she was drawing, without in any way interfering with her drawing. Her sense of touch was highly sensitive during that period; she could detect a line drawn across her draw-

ing paper, dates written at the top of her drawing paper, merely by touching the paper where the intruding lines had been drawn. Plates of the drawings are given. During her normal state the patient could never draw, either before or after the illness.—From the Journal of Mental Science, October, 1904.

P URE WATER is composed of two gases, Hydrogen and Oxygen, in the volumes of two of Hydrogen to one of Oxygen, nothing more. If anything else has crept into the water it is accidental and should be expelled. These proportions are fixed by an all-wise Father and can not be changed or improved. The more nearly we obtain these elements in this proportion or volume the purer and nearer to nature is the water. Water is pure as it is formed in the clouds, but in its fall to the earth as rain it may absorb from the air dust, smoke, soot, floating germs, etc.

Rain water is soft and being free from all impregnations, at once dissolves everything soluble with which it comes in contact. When it enters the earth it may be filtered of much that it receives from the air, but, being a powerful solvent, it readily dissolves and absorbs minerals, vegetable and animal poisons and disease germs in the course of its percolation through the soil, and when it emerges again in spring, well or stream, it may be clear and sparkling, but loaded with poisons and death. Typhoid and other bacteria, themselves transparent, may swarm in it, and, if it could be magnified, every drop would be seen to sustain ugly looking monsters, able to consume the body and multiply into millions every hour, so that one would be reminded of the song of Rum's Maniae:—

> "In this foam Destruction rides And in this tide doth Ruin swim, Perdition at the bottom hides And Death is dancing 'round the rim."

Minerals are also held in solution in the water just as sugar is in tea. Neither boiling nor filtration will remove both of the most dangerous elements—disease germs and lime. Lime makes water hard, and when drank for many years produces paralysis, wrinkles, white hair and old age. The body becomes encrusted with lime, just like teakettles, when hard water is used. No person past middle life should drink hard water.

Filtration strains only—clarifies but does not purify. Fire is the great purifier. To distill is to boil water and condense the steam. In this process the Hydrogen and Oxygen are driven off and form pure water and the refuse is left in the teakettle.

As water only is desired, this process is strictly in accordance with nature's plan. The condensed stceam is pure H2O, exactly like the water in the clouds.

Wine is a Mocker; Strong Drink is Raging.

POR thousands of years people have been defending the moderate drinker and for thousands of years a warning cry from the four corners of earth has echoed and re-echoed, has gathered force and volume and emphasis, the cry that echoes the admonition that "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise."

* * *

It is the custom to excuse drinking and to claim that alcohol is a food, and that a little stimulant is beneficial, etc., etc.

Well meaning persons are apologizing for the moderate drinker, and well meaning (?) ministers are saying nice things about saloons if they happen to have a soda water attachment.

But at last there has spoken in no uncertain tones the spirit of hundreds of thousands who have been deceived and who were not wise; at last we have an argument that will stop forever more the apologists for alcohol; at last the truth has been declared and none can gainsay it.

* * *

The moderate use of alcohol beverages shortens life.

* * *

This is not said by any temperance crank or by any friend of teetotalism. It is the voice of the dead that speaks. The insurance actuaries have reluctantly been forced to make the statement that a moderate drinker is a doomed man; that moderate drinking means an untimely death; this has been shown by the record of thousands of cases taken from the mortuary statistics of the insurance companies.

* * *

These figures show without bias or prejudice or sentiment or any desire to favor one side or the other that alcohol, even in moderate amounts, means death.

Here is the proof, taken from the *Chicago Tribune* of December 4, 1904:

STRONG DRINK IS RAGING

DRINKERS ARE A BAD RISK.

Life Insurance Experts Agitate for a New Policy.

TEETOTALERS LIVE LONGER.

Figures to Show That Abstainers Would Get Greater Profits. NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—(Special.)—Actuaries of leading life insurance com-panies declare that investigations carried on here and abroad show that drinking men are such hazardous risks that a new form policy should be adopted governing their case.

In thirty-six years the deaths number 57,891 drinkers, as against 46,956 abstainers of men between the ages of twenty and seventy. The conclusion of the actuaries is that teetotalars, as a class, live from 20 to 50 per cent longer than moderate drinkers as a class,

GIVE VALUE OF ALCOHOL.

There has been during the last year an unusual amount of discussion by leading physicians in England and France on the value of alcohol as a drug and its dangers as a beverage, and there is now on record a voluminous mass of testimony on the question which is not only of the highest scientific character but also free from the prejudice which sullifies most of the pro-hibition liferature. These conclusions may be summed up thus:

In certain bodily conditions and when carefully administered alcohol is a valuable drug, but at present it is used much too freely, and consequently with harmful results. Its use as a daily beverage in any form is pronounced to be dangerous, physically and morally.

VIEWS BASED ON STATISTICS.

It was found that the death rate even among moderate drinkers of the first class is much larger than among total abstainers. This finding was reached from statistics covering 125,000 lives in a period of sixty-one years. In insurance phrase, however, it was found "non-abstainers are good average lives, generally equal to the best accepted standards," but "total abstainers showed marked superiority throughout the entire working years of the life of both sexes.

Thus from the age of forty to that of fifty, which is regarded by insur-ance men as the "prime of life," there were 6,246 deaths among total ab-stainers and 10,861 among moderate drinkers, an excess of 74 per cent in one decade. Between the ages of twenty and thirty the excess was 11 per cent, from thirty to forty it was 68 per cent, from fifty to sixty 42 per cent, and from sixty to seventy 19 per cent.

ABSTAINERS' PROFITS GREATER.

During the three decades from thirty to sixty years of age is the time when most persons carry life insurance and when the profits are being earned and accumulated. It is evident, therefore, say insurance experts, that those in the total abstinence department, where losses are so much smaller, stand a better chance of profitable returns. In other words, with what the total abstainer saves in money by not drinking and gains in insurance it is clear that he is far better off financially than his brother of the moderate dividing above. drinking class.

Anna Eva Fay and Her Tricks.

In answer to a query in SUGGESTION for October, 1904, I told in detail how Anna Eva Fay gives her performance in apparent mind reading and clairvoyance. Since the exposure I have received a score of letter from readers, who have witnessed the performance, giving me "Hail Columbia" for attempting to explain such spirituelle phenomena on such materialistic grounds. Some said I was jealous of Miss Fay's psychic powers, others said that my explanation might account for some of the apparent mind reading, but gave their own experiences which they declared could not be accounted for on the grounds of trickery as I claimed.

I have not published these letters, nor have I answered them by giving further explanations to cover the individual experiences. A man does not like to be told that he has been fooled and that no matter how careful and cunning he thinks he has been, he has revealed his secret question to an accomplice of the performer in an unguarded moment.

In the past I have occasionally endeavored to explain to a correspondent how his secret might have been stolen from him, but I invariably received a "warm" reply to the effect that my correspondent was not born yesterday; that no matter how smart I thought myself in detecting fraud, I had overstepped myself in endeavoring to explain his experience; that the explanation I gave was not only-ridiculous, but an insult to the intelligence of a person who claimed to possess even a particle of common horse sense.

It has always been my policy in SUGGESTION never to expose an apparent psychic phenomenon unless I knew what I was writing about, and although my attitude toward some apparent psychic phenomena and some public entertainers has lost us many friends and not a few subscribers, still I will continue along the same path, and whenever I find a public performer claiming to give an exhibition of genuine psychic phenomena, when I know he is using trickery to obtain his results, I will not hesitate to tell my readers how the trick is worked if I have accurate information at hand. SUGGESTION is published to help humanity, not to deceive it. It is published in the interests of truth and science. It encourages the investigation of all psychic phenomena, but endeavors to deal a death blow to anything bogus that is handed out to the public in the guise of genuine psychic phenomena.

Not later than a week ago Miss Fay's performance was closed by the district attorney of Pittsburg, where she was arrested for conspiring with her manager and "assistants" to deceive the public. She was held in \$500 bail to appear at the March term of court to answer the charges against her.

In this issue will be found an account of Miss Fay's last exposé from one of the Pittsburg papers, which will probably interest all my readers, excepting the few who criticised my exposure so scathingly after being duped by Miss Fay.

From this it will be seen that my description of the methods used in the Fay performances tallies exactly with the confession of Miss Fay's manager.

But the number of letters of criticism I received after the exposure of the Fay performance is small when compared with those received since my exposure of the Zantzigs. Besides many rebukes from the readers of SUGGESTION, I have received a long letter of condemnation from the Zantzigs themselves, who have returned to the United States after a long tour around the world in their fake telepathy entertainment. I have these letters on file and will keep them there for ready reference, for it is not unlikely they will make entertaining reading before long, especially if the Zantzigs appear in Pittsburg or in some other cities where there is another wide-awake district attorney or an official like Mayor Stewart, or if they can be induced to give their performance where the investigating committee is made up of persons who know how to impose perfect test conditions.

It is utterly impossible for any person or any two persons to give a public performance of genuine mind reading or telepathy with the precision and success that attend the performances of such entertainers as the Zanteigs and Anna Eva Fay. If these performers simply advertised their performances as a mystifying entertainment for the public, well and good; but when they charge admission for a performance in which they claim to give a genuine exhibition of mind reading or telepathy, or other occult powers, they not only deceive the public, but actually obtain money under false pretenses, and when our district attorneys, as a body, awaken to this fact, many so-called occultists will be forced either to seek other means of earning a livelihood or to come out frankly and advertise themselves and their performances for what they really are—clever, professional tricksters, giving a mystifying entertainment of bogus mind reading or telepathy. Dr. Funk's Position Regarding Spiritualistic Phenomena.

In a recent communication to this office Dr. Schellhaus referred to Dr. Isaac Funk as a spiritualist.

A copy of the letter was sent to Dr. Funk with a request for him to explain his position. In reply the following letter was received: DR. FUNK'S LETTER.

My Dear Mr. Carey—You must pardon me for my long delay in answer-ing your kind note of the 9th inst, but I have been literally so overwhelmed with correspondence that has grown out of "The Widow's Mite"—this in ad-dition to our large holiday business—that I have not been able to even look at much of the psychic correspondence that has crowded my desks. In reference to your question concerning Dr. Schellhaus' reply, permit me to say that I have seen no reason to change my agnostic position toward spiritualism that I expressed in my recent book, "The Widow's Mite and Other Psychic Phenomena." There is much very careful investigation to be made before we will be able to discriminate between what goes under the names of telenathy. clairvoyance, secondary personality, etc., and communicamade before we will be able to discriminate between what goes under the names of telepathy, clairvoyance, secondary personality, etc., and communica-tions from what may be called foreign intelligences; and after we have succeeded in establishing points by which we will be able thus to discrim-inate, we then have a probably much larger task before us—that of discrim-inating between these foreign intelligences in the way of establishing the identity of the spirits communicating. These are very large questions. I' can not go into them now, but must refer those who care to know my views or lack of views on these subjects to my book

This Looks Like Telepathy.

A friend sent to the office of SUGGESTION the following clipping:

TELEPATHIC TIDINGS FLASHED 825 MILES.

MOTHER AND BROTHER AT ST. LOUIS AWAKENED AT HOUR OF DEATH IN JERSEY HOME.

"Plainfield, N. J., Oct. 1.—While neither had previously given a thought to things occult, Thomas Muir and his mother, of this city, are now converts to the theory of telepathy.

"When they went to St. Louis a few days ago all members of the family at home were in the best of health.

"Shortly after midnight of their second day in St. Louis, Muir awoke with a start, found himself in a nervous and apprehensive state of mind, and was not able to return to sleep.

"Referring to the matter at the breakfast table, he was informed that his mother had passed through an experience similar to his. They had awakened at precisely the same moment.

"Before they had left the table a telegram was handed to Muir informing him that his brother had fallen from a ladder the day before and that he had died at the very moment when the pair at St. Louis, 825 miles away as the crow flies, had been aroused from sleep by some subtle warning of ill tidings." Upon receipt of the clipping mentioned above, it was sent to Mr. Thomas Muir of Plainfield, N. J., with a request for a short statement regarding the truth of the article. Mr. Muir replied as follows:

"The facts of my experience as contained in the clipping you sent me are true. My mother and myself left Plainfield on September 7th for an extended trip through the West. On September 10th, my sixteen-year-old brother, a healthy boy in every sense of the word, fell from a trapeze in an amateur circus, breaking his neck. He lingered until 4 o'clock Monday morning, September 12th, when he died.

"Although his body was completely paralyzed from the shoulders down, his brain retained its normal activity and he called continuously to those about him, to summon his mother and brother, then in Des Moines, Iowa. This was particularly the case just before the end came, almost his last words being, "O, I wish Mamma and Tom were here so that I could say good-bye."

"At 2:53 on the morning of September 12th, I suddenly awoke in the Des Moines hotel, with a sense of oppression and with the thought that I had been awakened by the nearness of some person. I arose and turned on the light and though there was nothing strange about the room, I was too uneasy to return to my slumbers and remained seated in a chair until 3:30. When my mother and I met at breakfast that morning (she having occupied an adjoining room to mine) I spoke of the incident and was surprised to have her say that she had also been awakened at 2:30 or thereabouts and that she had been so restless that she did not return to bed again. At noon that day the telegram came announcing the death of my brother.

"I attribute the circumstance to some form of telepathy but as I am not nor never have been a student of the subject, I can not discuss it with you. This information, however, I furnish you cheerfully, and trust it may be of some use to you."

It will be noticed that when it is 4 o'clock in New Jersey it is about 3 o'clock in Iowa; so Mr. Muir was awakened at just about the time of his brother's death. If this case was the only one that has been reported, the element of consciousness would prevent any serious consideration being given to it; but as thousands of similar cases have been noted, and as his mother was also awakened at about the same time, there is a strong probability that some kind of message traversed the space between Plainfield, New Jersey, and Des Moines, Iowa.

Electrical impulses are now being sent by wireless telegraphy; why may not mental impulses, under certain conditions, be also transmitted through space and recorded in the secondary consciousness?

Since the wireless telegraphy and telephone have been demonstrated, it seems reasonable to suppose that thought vibrations may also travel from mind to mind. A French scientist has asserted and continues to assert that the human brain sends out vibrations which correspond in intensity to the volume of thought, and while the scientific world refuses to believe in these N-rays, yet they may exist, and eventually vibrations caused by mental action may be registered as wireless telegraphic messages are. In this age—the age of radium—it is not well to be too dogmatic; the line between the possible and the impossible is shifting and changing, from day to day, and the beacon of knowledge is penetrating today farther and farther into the mists of the unknown and it will be a bold prophet who can say what lies just beyond.

One was my father's mother, who passed away, as nearly as I can tell, twenty years ago, in England, and who has sent me many messages since and before, and the other was an Indian chief, Tecumseh. Anna EvalFay Exposed.

[Anna Eva Fay was arrested in Pittsburg, Pa., last December, and in self-defense her manager explained that she was simply a common trickster, with no psychic powers whatever. An explanation of her methods was printed in the issue of SUGGESTION of October, 1904.

As many thought this explanation unjust and faulty, an article from the Pittsburg *Leader* of December 29, 1904, is here given. Miss Fay was arrested for violating some law regulating the operation of fortune-tellers. Still, notwithstanding this article and numerous exposures, and the positive statements of Miss Fay's manager that only trickery is used in her exhibitions, many people will contend that Anna Eva Fay is a "psychic." The article referred to is given below.]

HOW MISS FAY DID HER WORK.

Her Clever Manager the Inventor of an Ingenious Secret System.

SPOTTERS WERE USED.

Their Duty Was to Identify Folks and to Discover Questions.

TONY AND THE TUBE'S PART.

George H. Pingree, manager of Anna Eva Fay, and W. D. Grimes, assistant district attorney, had a long talk today over the prosecution of Miss Fay for fortune telling. At the conclusion of it Mr. Grimes declared that the bill against Miss Fay would be sent to the grand jury and if she is indicted she will be tried. He declared that there will be no settlement of the case.

The trial, however, can not proceed unless Miss Fay is in the court room when it is called. She is now under \$500 bail to appear at court. She will leave Pittsburg this week for Baltimore and will continue her tour of the country. When her case is called next spring there is no expectation that she will cancel her theatrical dates for the purpose of returning to Pittsburg to be tried, particularly when at the most only \$500 is involved. That amount would hardly pay her expenses back to Pittsburg and her counsel fee, to say nothing of the risk she would run to be either fined or imprisoned if a jury should happen to declare here a fortune teller.

JUST PLAIN TRICKERY.

During the talk Mr. Pingree had with Mr. Grimes the act of Miss Fay was thoroughly discussed and Mr. Pingree admitted that there was no telepathy, no mind reading, no second sight, no clairvoyance nor nonsense of any kind about it. It was merely an act arranged to deceive and mystify the people.

The first requisite for the successful performance of the act is to obtain knowledge of the question any person desires to ask. Next it must be gotten to the stage and conveyed to Miss Fay. A successful performance required that these two things be accomplished without detection and that they were hundreds of persons will testify. And in doing so they give strong testimony as to the cleverness of Mr. Pingree, for he is the man who devised the ways and means.

All the persons in the audience see is Miss Fay on the stage covered with a sheet. This sheet serves a double purpose. It gives the minds of the credulous ones in front a turn toward the supernatural and it, it is said, conceals a speaking tube that is run up from underneath the stage to the ear of Miss Fay. It will be recalled that at the Avenue theater Miss Fay sat on a temporary platform erected beyond the line of the footlights. At Old City hall she sat on the stage. The platform at the Avenue had to be erected because there was not room under the stage for one "Tony" and his assistants to work. They had to utilize a recess that was made under the stage for the piano used in the theater. The piano was moved slightly to one side for the engagement. At Old City hall, "Tony" and his men worked under the stage and it was a hot, close place. He used to come out covered with perspiration.

WORK OF "SPOTTERS."

"Tony" was the person who got the questions when they came from the front of the house and read them off through the speaking tube to Miss Fay. These questions were gotten in various ways from persons who firmly believed that they were the only living ones who knew them. Sometimes they were conveyed to "Tony" through a slit in the stage platform and at other times they were hustled around under the stage by messenger.

At the door of each performance it is claimed there were spotters employed by the management whose duty it was to write down the name of every person they knew. In the theater were other spotters and cappers who were there to keep their eyes and ears open and learn who was asking questions and what they were asking. Spotters were at work outside preparing for performances to come, picking up all they could hear of persons who were talking of going to the theater to ask Miss Fay certain questions. The management, it is said, had unsuspected sources of information, and all that was gathered was made available by the ingenious system that was invented by Mr. Pingree. All of the information collected beforehand was in charge of "Tony" and on a tip from the front he could in a moment spring any part of it through the speaking tube that connected with Miss Fay's ear.

One instance was related to-day: A certain distinguished soldier of high rank is interested in some old Mexican mines. He was preparing to go to Mexico to see about the development of them. He had talked to many persons about his trip and about the mines. He told some of them that out of curiosity he was going to see Miss Fay and ask her about his trip to the South. He wrote his question on a letter head of the Duquesne hotel and showed it to several persons before he went to the theater. Among those who saw it or heard of it was one of the spotters in the employ of the manager of Miss Fay. As soon as the soldier entered the theater word was sent back to "Tony" under the stage that he was there and that he had written on a Duquesne hotel letter head a question which read: "Shall I take a trip to the south?"

When Miss Fay's act came on she soon "saw" in the audience this soldier, and she called out his name. She answered his question that he was going to the South, that he was going to see about his Mexican mines. She related the history of the mines, how they had been worked for centuries by the Mexicans and Indians and that under the management of the soldier it would pan out rich.

The consequence of that answer was that the soldier began feverish preparations for his trip to Mexico and is now more firmly convinced than ever that he has a rich thing in his mine.

CLEVER TRICK AND DECEPTION.

At his conference, with Mr. Grimes to-day Mr. Pingree was asked about this answer and how he obtained knowledge of the question. He merely smiled and said that the fact that the question was answered proved the cleverness of Miss Fay. He said that the soldier had gotten just the sort of an answer he wanted and that he undoubtedly had full faith in his mine before he went to see Miss Fay. Mr. Grimes held that such an answer might make a man go into unsafe and injudicious investments, but Mr. Pingree contended that that man had so much faith in his mine that he a would have gone ahead without any word from Miss Fay. Mr. Grimes then mentioned the case of an old man and his daughter who were awaiting the distribution of an estate in court. They were told that the estate would soon be distributed and that they would get a good sum of money out of it. He held that this old man might be led into the expenditure of money based on this information, which he and his daughter regarded as supernatural and hence reliable, and that he might be plunged into debt and the estate might not come up to his expectations. He said great harm was done in this way. Mr. Pingree answered that the old man probably knew how much money he was to get from the estate and that as for his belief that the act of Miss Fay was supernatural, he was sure that nine-tenths of the persons who went to the performance went only to be amused and knew there was nothing about the show but a clever trick and deception.

"UNDERGROUND" METHODS OF COMMUNICATION.

County Detective Robinson says the speaking tubes under the stage were supplemented by a building telephone system and Mr. Grimes ventured the opinion that a couple of men armed with powerful telescopes were hidden high up in the building and read the questions as they were written by persons down below. To these theories Pingree merely smiled. He answered that there was deception practiced, and that the persons who asked the questions unconsciously aided in it, but he would not go into an explanation of his methods for the very good reason that there would be numerous Anna Eva Fays on the very good reason that there would be induced two persons touring together as "The Fays." They are said to be the son and daughter-in-law of Miss Fay, who is married. Mr. Pingree says they are no relation to her and are merely giving a poor copy of her act. While Mr. Pingree would not give any light on his methods he tacitly

admitted to Mr. Grimes and to a Leader reporter that the first requisite for a successful performance was to get the names of persons asking questions and their questions. And, as stated, the next was to get them to "Tony" under the stage. How this is done is his secret, which he is entitled to keep since it is his stock in trade and since he distinctly disavows any supernatural work, mind reading or other mystic attributes for Miss Fay.

WHY DELAYS ARE NECESSARY.

There are times during the performances when delay is necessary to get possession of the answers. A common method is familiar to all who attended Miss Fay's show. She would say: "I see Robert Smith. He wants to ask a question. Mr. Smith, now keep

your mind concentrated on your question. Don't think of anything else. Think of it alone and I will come back to you." Then she would see Peter Jones and Michael Robinson and William Brown and a lot of others and would answer some questions previously sent to her through the tube by "Tony." All this time Robert Smith, if he were a credulous person, would have his mind concentrated on his question, perhaps one of great importance to him. He would be theining of action perhaps one of great importance to him. He would be thinking of nothing else and noticing little else except that Miss Fay was going ahead answering questions of others. He would be impatiently awaiting his turn. While in this state of mind Mr. Pingree or some other person connected with the show would by hook or crock get to know what the question of Robert Smith was. The information would be sent to the stage by the secret method of Mr. Pingree, and bye and bye Robert Smith's question would be an-swered, to his intense astonishment. He would at the same time be willing to swear that the question was never out of his hand all the time. Probably

it wasn't, but in some way he had revealed it to the slick Mr. Pingree. The Fay people made use of the old trick of the pad and the carbon The pad was used as a desk for persons to write their questions on. paper. Concealed in it so that it could not be discovered was a piece of carbon paper Another impression of the question was made without the knowledge of the person asking it. This one was sent to the faithful "Tony" under the stage and by him transmitted through the speaking tube to Miss Fay. But this is

a clumsy device at the best and one that did not find much favor with Mr. Pingree. He had other methods and a better system based on the work of spotters and cappers and a knowledge of human nature.

"I want to say," said Mr. Pingree this morning, "that Miss Fay never in her career gave an answer that was designed to cause trouble in a family, to cause any person loss or to lead them into trouble of any sort. She invariably gave that kind of an answer that the person asking the question most desired, a good and favorable answer. She tried to heal up family disputes and often answered questions so as to undo the mischief already done by fortune tellers, mind readers, mediums, phrenologists and persons of that kind. Women have asked her about the faithfulness of their husbands and have said they were told by some of these charlatans that he was paying attention to another women. She always told them to pay no attention to such nonsense; that while their husband was absent from home he was at his club, was attending to some business or was with men who were his close personal friends, or something of that sort for the purpose of relieving the husband of the suspicion and setting at rest the mind of the wife.

"NOTHING SUPERNATURAL ABOUT IT."

"Our show was for the purpose of entertaining the public. Only a few who came took the answers seriously. The rest were puzzled as to how it was done. All were warned that there was nothing supernatural about it. If some believed there was in spite of this it was merely a tribute to the cleverness of Miss Fay.

If Mr. Pingree had said to the "cleverness of Mr. Pingree" he would have stated it more correctly. With Mr. Pingree's system any person who can talk intelligently and repeat what "Tony" sends up through the speaking tube could do just as well as Miss Fay in the act. The "system," the tube and "Tony" does the work, and Pingree is the "system."—Pittsburg Leader, Dec. 29, 1904.

A Letter From Mr. Farlow.

BOSTON, MASS., Nov. 3, 1904.

EDITOR SUGGESTION :

Dear Sir—In your editorial mention of my article, which appeared in your issue of November, you do injustice by declaring "He virtually admits the chief claim of our contributor that Christion Science cures are made by the operation of the Law of Suggestion."

It should be understood that the cures in Christian Science practice are not produced by an operation, but by a remedy. It now appears that you construe the word "suggestion" in a manner to make it strictly synonomous with the word impartation. I assume your admission that you would classify faith and the act of imbibing truth as a form of suggestion: in other words-you have made for yourself a definition of suggestion which is broad enough to include the prayers of Christian Scientists and all other Christians. In so doing you have virtually taken possession of prayer and faith in the name of suggestion, coining a meaning of that term suitable to your purpose, after which you insist that Christian Science is identical with suggestion. In doing this you depart from the real issue. It is not our purpose to quibble over the technical meaning of the word "suggestion," which you have adopted, but to contend for the distinct individuality of Christian Science. Thousands have been cured by the mere perusal of the Christian Science text-books, many of whom had no thought of deriving benefits therefrom. They were cured by simply imbibing the truth of Mrs. Eddy's Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures.

If you insist that the modus operandi by which they obtained their benefits is properly named "suggestion," then you virtually claim that all Christians who are healed of sin and sickness by laying hold upon God through faith or by becoming impressed with the Divine presence of power through reading His word, have been healed through suggestion. To make it appear that Christian Science and hypnotism are identical is both misleading and detrimental to the public welfare. It should be distinctly understood that Christian Science heals through its firm reliance upon God as the only power, while what is commonly termed "mental suggestion" relies solely upon the suggestion itself.

(REPLY TO MR. FARLOW'S LETTER.)

In this letter Mr. Farlow again virtually admits our contention, that the Christian Science cures are made by suggestion, but he shows clearly that he has given very little if any attention to the investigation of Psychic phenomena. He classifies hypnotism and Suggestive Therapeutics as if they were identical, whereas they have nothing in common except that, like Christian Science, their phenomena depend upon the operations of the Law of Suggestion.

But Mr. Farlow says the cures in Christian Science are not produced by an operation but by a remedy. This Universe and everything within it are run by the operations of God's laws, and any phenomena that occur or are witnessed by man are the result of the operation of these laws. Now, if Mr. Farlow wants to attribute the cures of Christian Science to some agent outside the pale of God's power—some remedy other than the remedy provided by God's inexorable laws, I suppose he is entitled to do so. But if the Christian Science cures are not made by the operation of God's laws "the remedy" must be provided by something apart from God, which, according to the Christian Science theories, themselves, must be Error—the Devil. Of course I do not pretend to believe that these are the conclusions Mr. Farlow intended us to draw, but his attempt at a play upon words instead of sound argument provokes the temptation to turn the Christian Science logic upon himself.

Mr. Farlow's letter shows, also, that he has not yet awakened to the full realization of the scope of the Law of Suggestion, nor to the many phenomena that follow the operations of that Law. I disclaim taking possession of prayer and faith in the name of Suggestion or of coining an unusual meaning of the term Suggestion. I do claim, however, that the Law of Suggestion antedates prayer, faith and Christian Science; all of which are only phenomena of the operations of this law.

I have never contended that Christian Science had less of a distinct individuality than a wooden idol or an electric belt. In fact the individuality of each is quite marked, but the cures made in

people who adopt, wear, pray to, or approach any one of the three, in an attitude of expectancy, are identical and are produced (or the remedy is produced) by the operation or operations of the Law of Suggestion. The cure or remedy does not lie in The Electric Belt, or Christian Science or the hideous wooden idol. It lies in the mental attitude of the sufferer who approaches them, viz., in his expectancy or auto-suggestion.

I have no doubt that a big idol would apparently have more potency in it than a small idol, but the potency would really be in the difference of strength of the auto-suggestion produced in the mind of the sufferer.

If the Christian Scientists recognize this fact and attempt to produce the highest degree of expectancy, then they recognize the force of suggestion and attempt to employ it. But the fact is, that very few Christian Scientists recognize or realize this cardinal attribute of the human mind, and it is for this reason that the practitioner of suggestive therapeutics, by intelligently securing the highest degree of expectancy in every patient, obtains so much better, greater and more permanent results than the Christian Scientists.

In my continued article on Christian Science, to be found elsewhere in this number of SUGGESTION, I have touched on the cures made by reading "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," and if Mr. Farlow's argument that the cures that follow the reading of the book are due to the imbibing of Truth, then Mr. Farlow will have to admit that the patients who are cured by wearing an electric belt or by praying to a wooden idol also imbibe The Truth from these objects. Now what is this Truth which brings about these cures by such apparently different objects of faith? Surely Mr. Farlow or anyone else can see, with half an eye, that it is Auto-Suggestion.

Mr. Farlow says that Christian Science heals through its firm reliance upon God as the only power, while mental suggestion relies upon the suggestion itself. If Mr. Farlow will investigate the matter a little, he will probably not be so dogmatic in his assertions. He may *believe* that the Christian Science cures follow a firm reliance upon God, but he will also discover that the same cures will follow a firm belief in anything else, whether it be a physician, a drug, an idol, a book, a talisman, an electric belt, a shrine, a mineral water bath or a magnetized handkerchief.

It is a demonstrable fact that cures have followed a belief in

any or all of these things. It is also a demonstrable fact that the cures made have been identical and are identical with the cures made by Christian Science. It is also a demonstrable fact that the cures made by belief in all the things I have named, including Christian Science and "Science and Health With Key to The Scriptures," are made by the same natural law or remedy—suggestion.

This leaves Mr. Farlow with a difficult proposition—the negative side of the question.

I wish Mr. Farlow would devote as much attention to a study of the Law of Suggestion in general and to Suggestive Therapeutics in particular as he appears to have devoted to Christian Science. I believe he intends to be fair. He is certainly loyal, and after he has studied the Law of Suggestion and taken a broad, rational view of the subject, I believe he will become a loyal adherent to Suggestive Therapeutics regardless of his actual religious views. Christian Science was conceived as a system of healing, not as a religion, but its followers have endeavored to make it a religion also.—EDITOR.]

Infection, autoinfection and autointoxication—much abused and but half understood terms, are practically synonymous, and all three result, oftener than from any other cause, from constipation. It is fashionable and orthodox to ascribe all forms of infection to the invasion of one or another species of the germ family. Various germs—mostly harmless and helpless specks of microscopic life, primal, omnipresent—are found within the body during an "attack" of disease, whereupon we immediately charge them with having caused the disease. This charge is beginning to be questioned as both illogical and libelous. Every form of life originates in germs. No organism, speck of earth, globule of water or cubic centimeter of air escapes the constant presence of living and actively multiplying germs. Even the socalled pathogenic varieties are constantly present in every corner of the earth, in the heavens above and the waters beneath. True, they are not lined up for roll call nor taken into account until their tenant's condition has suffered a certain degree of deterioration and disarmament which invites their at least necessary, and doubtless, in a broad sense, friendly mediation. Facts are constantly accumulating that make the thinkers question whether they are not concomitants rather than causes of disease. And when all the facts have been revealed they may possibly no longer be called pathogenic, but prophylactic, evolutionary, a legitimate stage in the biologic cycle.

If the recent purvevor of health-science in one of the daily papers had modified his assertion "Life is a battle with germs from start to finish," so that it would read, "Life is a battle from start to finish with countless germs as constant allies," he would have been much nearer the truth. All life originates in germs, is nourished by germs and could not continue without their momentary and persistent aid.

In the face of current professional teaching and almost universal belief this is a species of heresy. Its acceptance would wrench the crown from Lister, and make germicides a laughing-stock of logical physiology. But if facts already patent warrant the statement time will ultimately prove its truth, no matter what a majority of us now believe. Tubercule bacilli, as we know, swarm everywhere, and it is evident that if capable of the diseaseproducing power ascribed to them the human race could not survive for a single generation—in fact, would have long since become extinct. The deadly diphtheria germ is present in thousands of healthy throats—perhaps in every throat, during an epidemic of that disease; yet only the disordered throats and run-down systems tolerate or suffer from them. Already these beginning to ponder them.—Dictetic and Hygiene Gazette.

A Remarkable Cure by Suggestion.

Many of the leading newspapers of the country last November published articles regarding the cure of a little son of Mrs. Marion Foster Washburn, of Elkhart, Ind., by suggestion. The healing suggestions were given by Mrs. Washburn, and the following is a specimen of the various accounts which appeared:

A NEWSPAPER ACCOUNT.

ELKHART, IND., Nov. 26.—(Special.)—A mother's devotion, supplemented by earnest prayer, has accomplished in this city what all the learning of some of the most noted specialists of the country had failed to do, and a child, given up as incurable and apparently doomed to sink into imbecility, is now well and strong, mentally and physically. The woman who has performed the remarkable cure is Mrs. Marion Foster Washburn, the wife of a prominent Elkhart physician, a member of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, and once the corresponding secretary and afterward president of that organization. The child whom she has restored to mental and physical strength is her six-year-old son.

strength is her six-year-old son. Mrs. Washburn is not a Christian Scientist, though she is a firm believer in the efficacy of prayer. But in the case of her son she prayed not for his cure so much as for a way by which he could be treated successfully. When Chicago specialists, who examined the child, said that he was past medical aid and would degenerate into imbecility, she did not lose heart. She said she believed that there was a way to reach his trouble and she prayed to be directed to this way. Her husband's library, one of the most complete in Elkhart, was resorted to every day, but all works on the subject ended with the same conclusion, and that was in accord with the verdict of the specialists who had been so freely consulted. The child had fallen down stairs several years ago and had received an injury to the skull at the base of the brain. An operation, she was told, would be certain death, and life promised nothing but suffering and gradual degeneracy of mind and body. As a result of the fall the child became paralyzed on the left side and could walk but a few steps without falling.

HOW THE CHILD WAS CURED.

It was at this point that Mrs. Washburn determined to try suggestion as means of cure. She spent one entire day explaining to the little fellow what she proposed to do and was much gratified to find that he at least comprehended enough to be of some assistance to her. That night she sat by his bed and tried to regulate his breathing by putting her mouth close to his ear and gently uttering her commands. After receiving a number of clippings from interested friends containing articles relating to the case, Mrs. Washburn was asked for a statement. The lady sent the following letter:

STATEMENT BY MRS. WASHBURN.

ELKHART, IND., Nov. 23, 1904.

MY DEAR BISHOP FALLOWS:

I hardly know how to tell you about John's cure, it is such a long story. The newspaper account was far from accurate. The whole thing took place over three years ago, but I suppose the fact that John has stayed well so long, and not only stayed well but got quite appallingly strong, is only added proof to the thoroughness of the cure.

Some called it tuberculosis of the brain; others a brain tumor, but all said he must die. And when I awakened in the morning the whole plan of treat-ment was clear as crystal in my mind. The elements of the idea had been there all the time, because I had read with my husband, and had seen him do wonderful things with suggestion. But the notion of applying it to a case of mechanical injury to the brain, like John's had never occurred to either of us. Now, however, I remember an article by Prof. Elmer Gates, who said that under suggestion he had known sound brain and nerve cells to move over and take the place of injured ones.

I began with John's breathing, because that distressed him the most, and threatened many times a night to end his life by suffocation. So I made him look at a silver dollar, so held that it reflected the light of a candle straight into his eyes. Then I kept repeating: "Now you are going to sleep; but no matter how sound asleep you are, you will hear mamma and do as she tells you." This was when he went to sleep at night. During the day I had explained to him that he had two brains, an upper and a lower, but the lower one was sick, but the upper one was all right, and that I was going to teach the upper one to take care of the lower one while he was asleep just as I took care of him while he slept. He agreed heartily and was eager for the new performance.

Well, he soon went to sleep, of course, and then I put my mouth to his ear and ordered him to breathe just as I breathed. When he got out of time with me, I roused him by tapping him sharply on the shoulder.

"You are forgetting," I said, sternly. "You are to mind Mamma, no matter how sound asleep you are. Breathe now."

He was not used to sharp speech, and sometimes he would murmur:

"Are you speaking cross to me, Mamma?"

"No, dear," I would answer. "Not to you, just to your brain."

Sometimes he would slip from my control and I have had to dash water in his face to rouse him, and then use my silver dollar and put him to sleep all over again. It seemed to be just natural sleep, sometimes very profound, but just sleep, with fixed attention. He was never cataleptic at these times, though once, in the day time, I induced this state. But I did not want it. My idea was to utilize natural sleep, to keep everything as near the normal as possible. As for his mind he is unusually bright and competent. But then he always had a superior brain. That is why I could manage him so well.

THE UNCONSCIOUS MIND, by Alfred T. Schofield, M. D., author of "Springs of Character." New York. Funk & Wagnalls Company: cloth; 800; 438 pages.

This is a book for advanced students of the New Psychology. The preface says:

"The object of this work is to establish the fact of an unconscious mind in man, and to trace in brief some of its powers and the various ways in which they are exhibited. We shall hope to show that this mind is the seat of character and of conscience and the spirit-life; the source of conduct, of instinct, of tact, and the thousand qualities that make us what we are; the home of memory, the ultimate governor and ruler of all actions and functions of the body, and in every way a most important factor in our psychical and physical life."

The book covers the entire ground of the mental realms and shows the operation of the subjective mind in all its various phases; its action on the body; its action in health and disease, and its agency in the so-called faith cures of all kinds.

Every doctor should read this book and if wise he will study the principles of psycho-therapy and prevent many of his patients from falling into the hands of quacks.

CONFESSIONS OF AN M. D. Being a series of semi-humorous letters from a doctor to his son; published by the author, Elmer D. Barber, D. O., 405 Hall Bldg., Kansas City, Mo.

This book consists of fifteen "letters" showing in an entertaining way the difference between the osteopathic treatment and the methods of the drug doctors. For example, in the fifth letter:

"The doctor has a word to say on the digestive tract and systemic circulation. He also traces a dose of colchicum through hidden paths and devious ways from the stomach to the feet of a gouty patient, and discovers that it was distributed indiscriminately throughout the entire system. Soliloquizing, he wonders what would happen if that part which was switched off in the vitals got tired of loafing around, hunting for a chance to dissolve urate of soda, and started in softening up the brain, working on the heart or rusting off the hinges from the liver."

In the first part of this book the author tells about Souls; gives her idea of what they are, where they come from, and how they can leave the body, etc. She teaches reincarnation, and tells things that would put her in an asylum if she was ever examined before a medical board. In the second part Sara Thacker gives some of her experiences. Those who want a basis of fact for their beliefs will not care for this book; those who are ready to believe that any one's soul can fly about the universe on a picnic at will may care to read it.

From the view point of the New Psychology these soul experiences are but subjective ideas, caused by previous suggestions and beliefs, and are brought about by the unusual activity of the subliminal mind. In this sentence the good doctor tumbles his own castles of "obsessions" to the earth. No healthy person was ever "obsessed"; no one who was properly fed, who drank sufficient water to keep the fluids of the body in proper condition, who breathed pure air night and day, who cultivated the mental habits, ever had a hallucination, for "obessions" are simply vivid hallucinations.

Lawson's Frenzied Finance.
