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
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
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
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
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
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The Death of Prof. Neils R. Finsen.

Prof. Neils R. Finsen, discoverer of the method of curing lupus or tuberculosis of the skin and other skin diseases with light rays, and director of the Finsen Ray Institute in Copenhagen, is dead. For many years he suffered from a complication of diseases. So intense was his devotion to his work that he neglected himself day and night, to the despair of his friends, hardly sparing time enough from his duties for sleeping and eating. His death is attributed to overwork, aggravating the diseases from which he had suffered all his adult life. Professor Finsen was forty-three years old, and a native of one of the Faroe Islands. The institute of which he had been the head since 1896 is supported through private benefac-

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tions and a Danish government endowment. For all this help, Professor Finsen died poor.

Professor Finsen's great discovery, that sunlight and electric light rays contain properties that can be used to cure skin diseases, was the outgrowth of his experiments begun as a student in Copenhagen University. In a small attic of the old surgical academy building the investigation started. A fellow student, Sophus Bang, shared Finsen's enthusiasm for a complete reform in therapeutics. When ill health came to both, Bang sought refuge in Switzerland, and since has become one of the foremost anatomists of Europe. Finsen remained at home to carry on his investigations in the foggy and cold climate of Copenhagen.

In 1890 Professor Finsen was graduated from the Copenhagen University, receiving his doctor's degree. Three years later he published in a medical journal an article on "The Influence of Light on the Skin," which aroused general attention because of his assertion that cases of smallpox could be cured by putting red curtains at the windows of the sickroom. This was the beginning of the final triumph. Smallpox became epidemic in 1894 in Copenhagen, and the new method was put to the test. The red-room treatment became popular with both the medical profession and the public, for by it not only was the disease cured, but the red rays prevented suppuration and left the patient unmarked by the dreadful scars.

The red-light treatment was but one application of Professor Finsen's theory that light rays were healing, and at the best was but a negative result; it cured only when the disease had run its course. To develop the positive element of the light-ray cure, Professor Finsen began experimenting with artificial light rays. Soon he found it possible to concentrate rays of the ordinary electric light in such a way as to cure a lupus patient, who for eight years had tried every known method. The cure attracted great attention, and both moral and financial support came to the young investigator and discoverer.

In 1896 the municipal hospital of Copenhagen gave room on its grounds for several small buildings, in which Professor Finsen's experiments continued on an increasing scale. Then the Danish government came to the support of the institution, and it was enlarged and removed to Rosenvaenget, a pleasant suburb of Copenhagen.

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



New Thought Federation.

[The following report was received too late for the November issue.]

HE convention of the New Thought Federation held in Nevada, Mo., September 25-29, was in many respects the most successful of any meeting ever held by the advocates of this faith.

The Nevada meeting was one of vital importance, for at this meeting were inaugurated new lines of effort, and radical changes were made in the constitution and by-laws for the more expeditious transaction of business.

Perhaps the most important and far-reaching of the acts of the Federation was changing the name from the New Thought Federation to the World New Thought Federation, thus broadening the scope and extending the influence of its thought and work.

Another radical change was the abolishment of fees and dues, substituting therefor free-will offerings. With the increase in membership and the impetus given the work by the large attendance and the practical, helpful and inspiring addresses, it is believed this change. in financial management will be most beneficial. The method of election was also changed by the adoption of the referendum system, and the election of officers under the workings of this system at the Nevada meeting proved the wisdom of this change. The following are the officers chosen: President, T. G. Northup, Chicago; vice presidents, Judge H. H. Benson, Kansas City, and Mrs. Grace Brown, Denver; secretary, Ernest Weltmer, Nevada; assistant secretary, A. R. Heath, Chicago; treasurer, Mrs. Chas. H. Besly, Chicago; auditor, Chas. Edgar Prather, Kansas City; board of directors, Henry Harrison Brown, San Francisco; A. P. Barton, Kansas City; C. O. Boring Chicago; Mrs. Jennie H. Croft, Kansas City; Mrs. Isie Danly Davis, Durango, Col.; Rev. Paul Tyner, Atlanta, Ga., and Prof. S. A. Weltmer, Nevada, Mo.

Hereafter, under the provisions of the revised constitution, the place of helding the annual convention will be decided in open session, instead of being left to the decision of a board of directors. Chicago was decided upon as the place for holding the convention of 1906 and

the date fixed for October 23-26, both inclusive. The Federation officers residing in Chicago were empowered to make all arrangements for this meeting.

Here it may be stated so great was the interest manifested in the Federation and its work by the citizens of Nevada that Col. H. C. Moore, representing the Nevada Commercial Club, and Prof. S. A. Weltmer proffered the Weltmer Institute as permanent meeting place of the Federation. This plan was discussed freely, but the consensus of opinion was opposed to holding the annual meeting in any one place consecutively. Prof. Weltmer thereupon withdrew his offer and Chicago was unanimously chosen for the meeting of 1906.

Secretary Ernest Weltmer is busily engaged in the work of preparing the proceedings of the convention for publication, and it is hoped to have these ready for distribution in the near future. Mr. Weltmer is also preparing a little brochure of information for New Thought people, which will be furnished all the members of the Federation.

This new year in the life of the Federation begins under most favorable and favoring auspices. The infusion of new life into the membership body has given an impetus to more aggressively active work on the part of each. The officers chosen are broadminded men and women, keenly conscious of the far-reaching importance of the work in which they are engaged and, what is of equal, if not greater, import, officers and members work together harmoniously.




Fig. 4. The Attempt of One, Two, Three or More Men to Force a Chair to the Floor while My Hands are Upon It, (An illustration from Lulu Ilurst's Book. She uses these illustrations to give her explanations. Copyrighted. All rights reserved.)



of disease. If relief from aches and pains is desired, an antikamnia tablet is as good as anything; and I see no harm in using them in a reasonable manner. True, it is far better to so live that pain will not be in evidence. Drugs are unnatural and not to be generally recommended.



Thought Takes Form in Action.

I kept on looking where I wanted the ball to go, but my mind was on the 4 pin, and I was so afraid of hitting it that I got rattled, and away went the ball and struck the 4 pin and square, and instead of making a ten strike, I only got a 'split.' That South Sider hoodooed me, sure."

"Well, I don't know," said the Medical Student, "I was riding on the Cottage Grove cable line the other day, and had a seat on the front bench of the grip car. THOUGHT AND AUTO-SUGGESTION.

"Well," said the Psychologist, "we have touched upon a very interesting subject. Each and every example which has been shown us affords an excellent illustration of the tendency of thought to take form, or manifest itself, in action, as the result of suggestion or auto-suggestion. It is also an illustration of Unconscious Cerebration. It is a well-known fact that, if we think intently of a certain object, we are almost certain to incline in the direction of that object, or, if we are on our feet, to even move toward the object. The moment our attention is fully given, and our ordinary watchfulness temporarily relaxed, we find our involuntary mentality urging us, and taking us, toward the object of our interest. I might cite you many instances of this, if time permitted. An interesting experiment along these lines may be tried by the use of a lady's watch and chain, or similar object (a piece of metal attached to a string will answer equally well). Grasp the end of the chain between the thumb and the forefinger, and allow the watch to swing as a pendulum, on the level of your eyes, the hand being, of course, raised much higher. (Or suspend a ring by a thread in a tumbler by the fingers, resting the elbow on the table.) Fix your eves and attention fully on the watch, and forget that you have such a thing as an arm or hand. Then will the watch swing forward and backward, to and fro. In a few moments you will notice a tremulous motion of the watch, followed by a slight swing in the indicated direction. The motion will then increase, until the watch is swinging at a lively rate. You can then will that the watch change the direction and swing from right to left; then, later on, swing in a circle. If you have concentrated your attennot you will not be conscious of beging

imparted the motion by means of your arm or hand; in fact, we have seen persons who have insisted that it was the result of Will Power, pure and simple, without the use of their muscles. This phenomenon is caused by what is known as Unconscious Cerebration, which causes the manifestation of Thought, by Involuntary Muscular Motion. It is very simple and easily understood, and fully explains the phenomena mentioned by our several friends this afternoon. There is no mystery, whatsoever, about it."

A FEW QUESTIONS.

"Well, all this is highly interesting," said the Crank, "and we have greatly enjoyed and appreciated the explanation and illustration of our friend, the Psychologist, but I do not agree with him, entirely, when he tells us that it is all so very 'simple and easily understood,' and that there is 'no mystery, whatsoever, about it.' To my mind it is anything else but simple and easily understood, and there still remains considerable mystery, for me at least. Our friend has told us the How, but not the Why of it all—he has ticketed it with a name, but the naming of a thing is far different from explaining it; very far from throwing a light upon the Whyness of it. This is a very common fault among our scientific men. They dismiss a subject by giving it a name, and think that they have thus fully explained it. To say that a thing is 'merely' Unconscious Cerebration, and then get rid of it, is a very cheap way of disposing of it. Many of us dispose of extremely interesting phenomena and facts, by shrugging our shoulders and saying it is merely Suggestion; and pitying the ignorance of mortals who feel that the matter is still unexplained and unsettled. What is Suggestion, anyway? What is Unconscious Cerebration? What is Involuntary Muscular Action? What is 'a manifestation of Thought,' or 'Thought taking form in Action'? These phrases and terms are all very well, and they help us to express an idea in a few words, but do they really explain the matter? I think not! Our learned friend, the Psychologist, has shown us that, when we forget our arm and hand and concentrate on the watch, we cause the watch to oscillate by the movement of the muscles of our arm and hand, although we are not conscious of the muscular movement, nor do we consciously send forth the mental current which causes the muscles to move. All that we are conscious of is the strong Desire that the watch shall move, and the sub-conscious part of us 'does the rest.' So far as our conscious self is concerned, it is as

if the watch was moving in obedience to our will-force projected through space without traveling along the channel of nerve and muscle. The nerves and muscles do not exist for our conscious self—to all intents and purposes they are illusions, and yet they are the media through which the Sub-conscious manifests the Desire of the Conscious. Is this so very 'simple'? I think not.

"But enough of this for the present," continued the Crank, "it looks to me as if the Boy has turned this phenomenon to better and more practical use than any of us grown-ups. While we are theorizing about it, and relating incidents illustrating the casual use of this force, the child has shown us that he understands its workings and its practical application to the affairs of his little everyday life. It is not the first time that I have gone to the babe for wisdom. The workings of the mind of the child are worthy of the careful and constant study of the sage—that is, so long as the child is kept free from the fears, follies, illusions and delusions of the grown-ups. Although the child has an imagination beyond our comprehension, he is, at the same time, painfully, and even brutally, matter-of-fact. He wants to know the Why of everything, as well as how things are done. He has an abiding faith in the Goodness of things, until we pollute his mind with Fearthoughts and ideas of Evil. He has an abiding belief in Justice and Truth, until he profits by our example and beats us at our own game. He has Confidence and Trust, until we scare it out of him.

WILL AND DESIRE.

"Now, look at the Boy," shouted the Crank. "He knows by intuition or instinct what we find it hard to get by reason. He knows that in order to get things that we want we must first earnestly Desire them; then we must Will that our Desire will be attained; then we must confidently expect the desired result. As he has told us, we must 'want it the worst way,' and not 'care whether school keeps or not,' just so we get the marble; and we must say confidently, as he did, 'You're my marble;' then we must 'look at him strong and steady-like;' and then act, and lo! the 'beauty' glass marble is ours. If we would only put into our daily tasks the interest and attention that the boy puts into his game, we would see quite a difference in things. Of course it's true that the boy finds his 'beauty' marble to be far less attractive in his hand than it appeared when in the ring, but what of that—so do we. The thing is this: While you are in the Great Game, take a boy's in-

terest in it; play with a zest; play your level best and get the marble. Of course, if you are wise, you will know (and so does the boy) that it's all a childish game, and that the joy is in the playing rather than in the possession of the spoils, but that needn't spoil the game. The boy knows enough to enjoy the playing for a few marbles that he could buy for a penny a fistful at the corner store. But what of that—he finds a joy in Living, Acting, Doing; in Expressing his Life; in living it out; in Growing and Outgrowing; in the acquiring of experiences. And is it not true that these things (together with Love) yield about all that we may expect to gain from living? And he has sense enough to know the truth of this, instinctively, while we poor grown-ups vainly imagine that our pleasure will come only in the possession of the trophies of the game -the glass marbles of life-and look upon the playing of the game as drudgery and work imposed upon us as a punishment of the sins of our forefathers. The boy lives in the Now and enjoys every moment of his existence-his winnings, his losings, his victories, his defeats, while we, his elders and superiors in wisdom, groan at the heat of the day and the rigor of the game, and are only reconciled to our task by the thought of how we will enjoy the possession of the marbles—when we get them at the end of the game. The boy sucks his orange and extracts every particle of its sweet contents, while we throw away the juicy meat and aim only to secure the pips. Oh, yes! the boy not only knows how to 'get there,' but he has also a sane philosophy of Life. Many of us grown-ups are now re-learning that which we lost with our youth.

"And then," concluded the Crank, "you will notice that the bowler, the bicyclists and the others, got what they didn't want, because they were afraid of it, and allowed it to distract their thoughts from the object of their Desire. To Fear a thing is akin to Desiring it—in either case you are attracted toward it, or it to you. It's a rule that works both ways. You must think about the Thing you Want—not about the Thing you Don't Want, for the thoughts you are thinking are the ones that are going to 'take form in action,' as our good Psychologist would say. As the Boy said: 'You've got to think about a thing if you want to hit it, and if you think about the wrong thing, why, you're going to hit the wrong thing.' Watch your Ideal, not your Bugbear. Concentrate on your Ideal—fix your thought and gaze upon it, like the boy upon his marble—and don't allow Fearthoughts to sidetrack you. Select the thing you, want to be, and then grow steadily into it.

Pick out the thing you want, and then go straight and steadily to it. Replace your old song of 'I Fear' with the New Thought anthem, 'I Can, and Will.' Then you will experience an illustration of our good Psychologist's theory of 'Thought taking form in Action.'"

"Humph," grunted the Psychologist, "that is the way with these transcendentalists. They are always making mysteries, and building up fancy theories about simple things that are readily explained by those of us who understand the first principles of the Science of the Mind."

"What is Mind?" queried the Boy, innocently. "Children should be seen and not heard," retorted the Psychologist, rather testily. "Run away and play marbles, while your elders discuss matters of importance."

And the Boy departed, and with him the Crank. For they were Brothers.

Business Talks BY THE MANAGER

The Editor in Mexico.



The Origin of Christian Science

F one were to look about for an illustration of the power of a dominant idea over the human mind it would be difficult to find an array of facts equal in significance to those which gather about the term "Christian Science" and the name of Mrs. Eddy. Hitherto most writers who have referred to this peculiar cult have either assailed it or have undertaken to assimilate its teachings in their own terms. But quite apart from either the absurdity or the truth of the general doctrine there is this other interest, namely, the power of the central idea, with its set of suggestions and the implied system of organized thought. The purpose of the present article is to call attention to this significant interest. I have no desire to interfere with the good which many are deriving from Christian Science. Nor would I say anything that might seem to imply personal animosity. It ought to be possible by this time to distinguish between the help-that may spring from a doctrine, or a personality, and the negative characteristics in question when it is viewed in another connection. The time will doubtless come when the mere power of the Christian Science idea will be looked upon as the strangest phenomenon in the whole movement.

The peculiar situation is this. It is given out that Christian Science came by "revelation," in 1866, and its authorized text-book is practically infallible, like a work on mathematics. Accordingly, Mrs. Eddy is revered with all the esteem that seems to belong to the giver of a divine revelation. Little by little a powerful organization has been built up, and with equal pace the power of Mrs. Eddy has increased, until now she is compared with the Pope, and outsiders look on in amazement when her apparently arbitrary edicts are received, as if each word were divinely inspired. It seems never to occur to her followers to question the truth of the statements whereby this vast power has been slowly acquired, but one and all aid in the pro-

mulgation of the revelation idea. The power of this idea seems all the more remarkable in view of the fact that year by year more people in the outside world are discovering that the revelation theory is unfounded. To understand how all this can be it is necessary to go back to the time when Mrs. Eddy was the loyal disciple of the remarkable therapeutist who restored her to health.

In 1862 Mrs. Eddy was an invalid, confined to her bed after years of illness. Learning of the wonderful cures which were being wrought by a certain Mr. Quimby, her husband wrote to the new healer requesting help for his wife. Later Mrs. Eddy was moved to Portland, Me., and my mother happened to be present when the future "founder" was assisted up the steps to Mr. Quimby's office for treatment. Mr. Quimby had then been in the practice of purely mental treatment, according to the methods now in vogue, for many years, and it was out of his practice and teaching that the mental healing movement has grown. My father, who was Quimby's patient in 1860, and who had become an enthusiastic follower of the new therapeutist, was then devoting his time to the new patients. Thus it happened that he first explained to Mrs. Eddy how the cures were wrought. He also loaned her a volume of the Quimby manuscripts on the mental theory of disease and its cure. Mrs. Eddy herself became an ardent follower of the new theory, and not only made converts to it, but publicly lectured about it, and when Mr. Quimby's death occurred, in 1866, she wrote a poem about him for a Portland paper.

There is plenty of documentary evidence, if anyone wishes to prove my statements. There is also evidence to show that Mrs. Eddy gradually changed her attitude towards Mr. Quimby, whom she has repeatedly maligned during the past twenty years as "an ignorant mesmerist." It is not for me to assign the motives for this change, but to point out that from the time when, in 1883, articles began to appear in the Boston papers, showing where and how Mrs. Eddy derived her "revelation," the hypothesis of this "revelation" was brought forward more and more. Mrs. Eddy gained greatly in repute by closing her "metaphysical college," in 1889, and retiring to Concord, N. H.—on account of shaking palsy, it was said. The revelation idea was also furthered by the growth of the Christian Science church in Boston, with its inscription in large letters, and its general repute among the faithful. The more widely it became known that Mrs. Eddy had borrowed the more valuable portions of her methods and

theories, the more strict the regulations of the church became. For every historical fact there was an off-setting statement, tending to throw the real history into a false light. The sect has thrived under the alleged persecution by the truth-tellers. Moreover, an element was introduced into the Christian Science theory which seemed to account for all this "persecution," namely, that all this was due to "malicious animal magnetism." Thus it has come about by a system of the most persistent suggestions, sent abroad in advance, that every avenue has been cut off. Hence, no one is now able to win the attention of a Christian Scientist when it is a question of the Mrs. Eddy's great benefactor.

It would surely amaze people if they could know all the facts in this strange history. I am often asked to give an explanation of this astonishing power, and in addition to the facts mentioned above I point out that the secret of it all is the power of a skilful magnetic personality. My mother tells me that Mrs. Eddy had a way of calling people by pet names and gradually persuading them to serve her. In this way mother was patronizingly addressed as "Nettie, dear." This was in 1862, when both were patients under Mr. Quimby's care. Doubtless that magnetic power grew with the years, and when the revelation hypothesis was introduced it was only a question of time when the Christian Science idea should gain a great impetus. Mrs. Eddy's temptation to claim the whole discovery as her own was the same that comes to many when they find themselves succeeding. The carrying out of her edicts is the natural result of acceptance of the personality from which they emanated. Very likely Mrs. Eddy has regretted that she ever maligned Quimby. But what could she doso some would contend-but stand by her position when once she had assumed it? What can her most tried and trusty followers do but sustain her in it all? For there is a long story here, too. I have known several people during the past twenty years who were once Mrs. Eddy's right-hand followers, but who could not long endure the system to which they were subjected. Little by little, however, the fittest have survived, until now-well, the movement is successful, and profitable, and what more need be said?

Now, I do not for a moment question the honesty of those who have helped to spread the revelation idea and maligned Mr. Quimby. I seriously question if many of the leaders of the Christian Science movement know the truth about the "revelation" and about Mr. Quimby. The paid agents who answer all criticisms of Christian

Science probably know the truth, for they create "facts" at will. But for the most part the situation is this: the power of the mere idea is so strong that almost no one questions it within the ranks of the Christian Scientists. At any rate, if doubts arise the leaders know how to quell them. Thus they are unwittingly the agents of a machine.

It would surprise the readers of Suggestion, as well as they may understand the power of thought, if they could know with what persistence the revelation idea has been enforced during the last decade. Sooner or later all of the suggestions that are sent abroad are brought to my notice, for people constantly call upon me for information in regard to Mr. Quimby. Once I received a call from a Christian Scientist in full standing, and perhaps if I narrate the case the power of the revelation theory will begin to come clear. The devotee in question happened to see in the catalogue of a public library the title of a book of mine, and as the title suggested a doctrine allied to Christian Science she made bold to read the book. Then she read a similar book by Mr. Henry Wood, and one by Mr. Trine. course the leader of the Christian Science church to which this devotee belonged learned what was going on, and forthwith imperatively forbade her to read any book on that subject, except the "authorized" text-books of Christian Science. She stated that the books in question contained only "error," and that the books were written by unprincipled men. Probably it had never occurred to this leader to question the truth of her "facts." But it did occur to her follower, who came to Boston purposely to set her mind at rest on this point. First she visited Concord, N. H., on the annual pilgrimage to "Mother Eddy." This was disappointing, for she was not permitted "to get near enough to see what the mother was really like." Then she came to me with the usual alleged facts about Quimby and the rest. I explained the situation, and the woman, who was an earnest truthseeker, saw how she had been held by a spell, backed up by misrepresentation. But then came the question, should she at once leave her church? No. it seemed possible to continue a member, with the hope of setting her fellow members free. Accordingly she kept on as before. But only for a short time, for the ever vigilant leader soon questioned her in regard to her reading, and she was brought before the church committee and asked this one test question:

"Do you believe that Mrs. Eddy's books contain all the truth and that these other books contain only error?"

"No," replied the woman candidly, "and moreover I have found

out that the authors of these books are not as represented." Thereupon this truthseeker was immediately dismissed from the church. And with good reason. For the only way the Christian Science church can be kept alive is by rigidly drawing the lines against all investigation. Those who thus draw the lines probably do not know the real reason why they do it. But at headquarters the reason is known.

It is significant that not once in the history of the movement has a Christian Scientist of prominence ventured to challenge the real facts in regard to Mrs. Eddy's relationship to Mr. Quimby. Either the power of the Christian Science idea is so great that it remains unquestioned, or the leaders are so discreet that they never mention the significant facts about Mrs. Eddy's indebtedness to Mr. Quimby. For example, no attempt was made to reply to the exposure of Mrs. Eddy which was published in the Arena, in 1899. The Christian Scientists did indeed bring suit against the Arena company, on account . of the reproduction of Mrs. Eddy's photograph, but this had nothing to do with the exposé. The reports which were circulated at that time and which I have had to explain many times since, once more illustrate the way in which the revelation theory is maintained. It was reported that one of the editors of the Arena barely escaped the officers of the law by sailing for Europe when the suit was declared; that the Christian Scientists drove the Arena out of Boston, and nearly ruined the business of the magazine. The facts were that I, the editor in question, had no connection whatever with the business, hence none with the suit against the Arena company; that I had engaged passage for Europe long before the suit was dreamed of, and hence it was a mere coincidence that I chanced to sail the day the suit was declared; and that the sale of the Arena, containing the exposé, actually helped the business, which, in its turn, had already been secured by a New York house when the Arena exposure was planned.

At the time the Arena in question appeared postals were sent to hundreds of Christian Scientists, with the hope that they might be persuaded to read it. But, no, many of the postals were returned with such comments as, "It is all error," "You will find that you are wrong." Copies of the Arena were also sent back with the edges burned, and the Boston Public Library copy was smuggled away by some loyal devotee of the Christian Science idea. One felt that the same fire that once stirred the martyrs was alive. But what a pity it seemed that it did not stir people to seek the truth.


Here, then, is an opportunity for the readers of Suggestion to follow the growth of an idea. There will be war unto the end. The more widely it becomes known that there was no "revelation," but that a disloyal disciple promulgated a master's ideas in her own fashion, then claimed to be the real "founder," the more strenuously will the Christian Scientists come forward with their denials.
