

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



A "Trumpet Seance."

The medium, his wife, my mother and I constituted the sitters. Among other wonders came one which has ever puzzled us. What was it and how produced? These words were loudly and wildly gurgled forth and we could all but see a man, with mouth and throat filled with water, struggling for life in a boot of man, when more more are inade-quate for a perfect description, and only a genuine experience with a drowning man can convey any idea of what this was like. As neither of us could think of a relative who had lost his life by drowning, my mother woncould think of a relative who had lost his life by drowning, my mother won-dered who it could be, when the voice gurgled out plainly enough: "1 am John S." It was a brother to my father's father, of course. We had heard of the circumstances from my grandfather and had forgotten. "Heinrich" was grandfather's name and as he was on board the same boat, it is likely he was called upon for assistance, as he stood gazing at his unfortunate brother drowning in the Mississippi. Admitting the correctness of the facts set forth above-and this admission is not unreasonable, as the London Society for Psychical Research, in the book, "Phantasms of the Living," has reported 600 similar or analogous cases, in which the proof of genuineness is overwhelming-the question arises, What is the explanation?

As a preface I will say that we see the grass grow, and yet we cannot explain the forces which cause the growth; we cannot explain the basic reason why steam drives an engine, nor can we understand gravitation or magnetism. There are thousands of facts that will probably remain a mystery to man for all time.

In regard to the occurrence narrated above and the 600 cases reported by the London Psychical Research Society, I would suggest that they are due to natural laws-laws as prosaic as the law of gravitation-which we do not understand. The laws and the powers of the subjective mind are only dimly perceived, and doubtless many of them are not even imagined.

Before an adequate solution of the various psychic experiences can be attempted one must be acquainted with all the facts and theories on the subject. Students of psychic matters should read these books :---

3-Phantasms of the Living and Transactions of the London Society of Psychical Research.

The theories that attempt to account, in a scientific manner, for the phenomena under discussion deal with the laws of thought transference and telepathy; with the persistence of thought forms; with the vibratory theory of mental forces; with the theory that thought is a form of motion or force which exists independently of the organized matter; with the advanced theories of metaphysics which hold that time and space are relative, and not actual; and also with the question of the fourth dimension of space and the vast field which that question presents.

In a few paragraphs the questions presented by the correspondent cannot be discussed; I can only point out a few of the elements which must be taken into account in making an intelligent and unbiased study of the matter. The question is one that deals with the borderland of human knowledge. Personally, I think the solution of these questions depends upon laws and principles which cannot be wholly grasped by the human understanding, because our brain development has not progressed far enough to allow us to give expression to them. A blind fish knows nothing of light and color, and a human brain that lacks many elements of completeness is not able to sense certain forms of expression or vibration which are partly in our plane of existence and partly without it.

Broadly speaking, there are two theories to account for such manifestations as are mentioned above: (1) the theory that departed spirits return and cause such phenomena, and (2) the theory that such occurrences are the result of physical laws like the laws which govern wireless telegraphy, the phonograph, or the manifestations of radium. Not the wisest man on earth has yet even suggested a theory to account for the paradoxical action of radium, and yet no one, so far as I know, has suggested that the puzzling behavior of radium compounds is due to disincarnate spirits. It has been the custom since the dawn of history to attribute every unusual occurrence to the action of supernatural forces; as the world becomes more and more enlightened, the number of occurrences attributed to spirits becomes smaller and smaller; in fifty or a hundred years hence it may be that the cause of all such experiences as given above may be as well understood as the art of photography; and it may be that other facts may arise which may not be understood, and which in turn will be credited to spiritualistic influences. It should be understood that because a fact is beyond our comprehension it does not follow that it is the result of supernatural action.

I do not wish to be quoted as having a theory to account for so-called occult phenomena, for I have none; the rolling years will solve all questions, dispel all illusions, correct all errors. In conclusion I will say that Dr. Isaack Funk, editor of the Standard Dictionary and author of the "Widow's Mite and Other Psychic Phenomena," has spent a lifetime in investigating the psychic and occult realms of the borderland of human knowledge, and he says that the evidence is not all in; he suspends his judgment. Earnest investigators should read his book. E. E. C.

The Power of Thought to Cause Death.

THERE IS a belief throughout the Polynesian race (Hawaiian, Fijian, Maorias, etc.) that a person can be bewitched so that he will die, and there are many cases on record where natives have promptly died when informed that some witch doctor was seeking their life. In ancient Hawaii we read of the "death prayer." A native priest, for a consideration, would chant the "death prayer," directing it against some poor wretch, and death was often the result. If the priest could have a small portion of the hair or clothing of the victim the result was thought more certain. In "The Origin of Civilization," by Sir John Lubbock (Appleton's edition, p. 246), in discussing these matters of producing death by sorcery, is the following:—

"One mode of operating (in Fiji) is to bury a cocoanut, with the eye upwards, beneath the temple hearth, on which a fire is kept constantly burning, and as the life of the nut is destroyed, so the health of the person it represents will fail, till death ensues. At Matuku there is a grove sacred to the god Tokalau, the wind. The priest promises the destruction of any hated person in four days if those who wish his death bring a portion of his hair, dress or food which he has left. This priest keeps a fire burning and approaches the place on his hands and knees. If the victim bathe before the fourth day the spell is broken. The most common method, however, is the . . . compounding of certain leaves supposed to possess a magical power, and which are wrapped in other leaves, or put into a small bamboo case, and buried in the garden of the person to be bewitched, or hidden in the thatch of his house. The native imagination is so absolutely underthe control of the fear of these charms that persons, hearing that they were the objects of such spells, have lain down on their mats and died through fear. Those who have reason to suspect others of plotting against them avoid eating in their presence, or are careful to leave no fragment of food behind; they also dispose of their garments, so that no part car' be removed. Most natives, on cutting their hair, hide what is cut off in the thatch of their own houses. Some build themselves a small house and surround it with a moat, believing that a little water will neutralize the charms which are directed against them."

We have here a postive statement of the power of mental suggestion to produce death, and yet there are some today who doubt the efficacy of the power of thought to produce health.

Antiquity of Astral Science.

N investigation by the student into ancient history will demonstrate that this Astral Science is the most ancient of all sciences, and its history can be traced so far into the past that it may seem a hopeless task to actually discover by mortal means when and where this science had its origin. In truth, it is as old as man, as old as the universe itself, for it began with it.

From Babylonia and the Chaldeans we find a belief in stellar science spreading throughout the whole world. Once the religion of a great and mighty race, it taught its people wisely, lifting their aspirations by faith and knowledge, as well as by reverence, through the media of planetary spirits to the Supreme One and universal spirit, the Logos of the Solar System. Since the days of the happy Chaldeans, whose wisdom by the expansion of their consciousness could reach the shining Ones, the Star of Astrology seems to have waned, and for the multitude to have entirely disappeared, and its rediscovery, so to speak, is due to the spiritual activity that is again reviving the wisdom taught by wise teachers of a past age, and that mystic planet Urania is beginning to manifest its effect upon the children of the earth.

Berosus, the Chaldean priest, to whom a statue with a gilt tongue was erected at Athens, translated the illumination of Bel, an early Babylonian work, and introduced stellar knowledge into Greece. The Greeks held the old traditions for a time, but it gradually became more an art than a science with the majority, and so far waned that little true Astral Science can be found there, and it was left for the Romans to finally destroy the little life that was left in it as an esoteric study, though in spite of the governmental opposition it flourished in the early days of the Roman Empire, but in a very corrupted form.

We find that in the days of the Roman Empire through the pandering of the exponents of the science to political exigencies it

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became corrupted and nothing more than a form of judicial astrology remained, finally becoming nothing more than a form of divination.

The discoveries of Egyptologists prove that the Egyptians had no claim to the invention of the science, for they were taught by the Chaldean priests, who believed that an affinity existed between the stars and the souls of men; that the ethereal essence is divine; that the souls of men are taken from this reservoir to finally become infinity with the All Infinite. With them the soul was a spark taken from the stellar essence.

An Exponent of Modern Occultism.

(The following article appeared in the editorial page of the Chicago Record-Herald (daily circulation, 140,000; Sunday, 196,000), one of the leading journals of America, on September 21, 1906. The article is significant, as it gives so much prominent space to subjects which are ordinarily supposed to belong to the realms of humbuggery; subjects which are generally supposed to be the special property of charlatans, mountebank astrologers, frauds and fakers generally. Whatever may be your personal opinion concerning the various phases of occultism, it is undoubtedly true that these questions are receiving today the attention of thousands of intelligent persons; it is also true that what is denounced as humbuggery in one generation is often accepted by succeeding generations as worthy of all belief.—*Editor* SUG0ESTION.)

PAPUS, the man whose influence is at present dominating Nicholas, the Czar of all the Russias, as told recently by William E. Curtis in a letter from St. Petersburg, is one of the most phenomenal characters in Europe today. While neither a professional astrologer nor a magician, he has foretold to a certainty each of the several events which have convulsed the land of the Slav. The accuracy with which these events occurred as predicted first attracted the somewhat mystic soul of the emperor, and closer acquaintance has resulted in a bond of fellowship which has alarmed many near the emperor who do not know the real character of this mysterious Papus.

By some he is classed as a charlatan, by others as a dangerous revolutionist, who is enacting in the twentieth century what Cagliostro did in the eighteenth. Those who know him intimately are sure that he is neither the one nor the other. As to his charlatanry, Papus is one of the most profound mystics of the age, as his published works and the respect paid to them by savants of all nations will testify. As to the charge of being a revolutionist, he is no more that than any one who looks forward to the time when the world shall be as one republic, of which the nations shall be families. He has long been a student of divine architecture, and has gone deeply into the hidden sciences of the mind and soul.

Papus is his pseudonym, and to the people apart from his immediate family who have dealings with him—and they are many—this is the name by which he is generally known. In private life he is Dr. Gerald Encausse, a Parisian physician of immense practice, living in charming family relations with his wife and two children at 5 Rue Savoyard.

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Dr. Encausse is very attractive in his personality. He is rather under the middle height, alert and active, with a perfect control over

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his muscles. He is broad-shouldered and athletic, and is possessed of a constitution of wonderful vitality. He is of dark complexion, and the lower part of his face is covered with a black, curly beard, which, while not cut close to his chin, at the same time follows the general contour of his jaw. His nose is large, and the nostrils are wide and easily dilated. His forehead is broad and high. His is plainly the head of a thinker, and intellectuality is depicted in every feature.

It is not so much how he looks, however, as what he has accomplished that makes this hard-working Paris doctor the wonderful man he is. How he ever gets time to do all that he does is a marvel to those who know him best. In spite of the exigencies and demands of his practice, he has written treatises which must have taken years to prepare, has reduced to common language the works of Eliphas Levi, has become an authority of the cabalistic writings of the Talmud, is one of the leading Hebraists in Europe, and spends hours every week in the various lodge rooms of the mystic orders to which he belongs, and of most of which he is an official.

There is an old saying that a man is known by the character of his friends. Papus is the friend and teacher of the famous initiate St. Yves of Paris and Egypt; is an intimate with Dr. Franz Hartmann, of Germany, who is the only member of the ancient Rosicrucian order who is allowed to reveal such an association; is a familiar correspondent of A. E. Waite, of London, who is considered the best authority on psychic subjects written in English.

Papus is most generally and widely known through his writings. Besides the books and treatises of which he is either the author or editor, he publishes a monthly magazine, "L'Illumine," devoted to the study of the Cabala and mystic subjects. He is a frequent contributor to many of the psychological magazines published throughout the world, and his ideas in pathology, that the physician should treat a large percentage of the ills of the body through suggestion to the mind, are receiving increasing respect from practitioners generally. He is to a great extent the interpreter of Paracelsus to the faculties in medicine throughout the world, as is Dr. Hartmann to the German medical faculty.

The work which brought Papus most intimately before the world of esoteric science is beyond doubt the transcription of the Tarot of the Egyptians from the cards to a systematized treatise in book form. He has taken the fortune-telling cards of the Gypsies, a style of cards which have antedated the modern playing-cards by several centuries,

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and from them he has evolved a system of revelation of the ancient mystery religion, which was the cradle in which Masonry was rocked in the youth of the world. He has proved to his own satisfaction and
that of many students of the old mysteries, that this pack of cards was the unknown vehicle in which was locked the esoteric doctrine and that this method of bringing the gem unsmirched to modern thought was chosen that the hidden treasure might be carried along the ages until the time was ripe for its unfoldment.

The Tarot is a pack of fifty-eight cards from which the present playing-card system was simplified. This Papus divides into two sections, and from this he evolves the Yod, He, Vau, He, of the ineffable name. From this start he makes the story of the Adam-Kadmon and the fall of man, which is briefly described in the Bible, together with the evolution from Tau to Aleph, a living, breathing, vital story. It is from the study of the Tarot by which he has been enabled to foretell the events which have given him so great an influence over the mind of Czar Nicholas.

In this work he has also evolved a system of mathematics which is just the reverse of that generally obtaining in the world. Instead of beginning with the hypothesis that four is merely a multiple of two individual units, and that the primal two is the reduplication of a single unit, he maintains that all the so-called higher numbers are merely divisions of unity. For instance, taking unity or completeness as one, he declares that unity cannot comprehend itself unless it be imposed upon something which is not itself. This principle thus opposed to unity or duality makes the idea two. Or, by making completeness ten, or the dot and the circle, he opposes duality as five, or the other half of the prime.

It is his theory that this was the real meaning of the two pillars set by Hiram before the temple of Solomon and by Hermes Trismegistus in the pillars in the Egyptian desert. His application of the principle in living is that they represent the power of choice, and that each soul is placed at the foot of one or the other pillar and is bound by the influence of that to which he is contiguous. He claims that midway between the two is the "quiet node," or equilibrium, which he designates by the idea three. From these prime numerical ideas he builds up a complete system, which he declares possible of application to the daily life.

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Apart from his writings, which are voluminous, Papus is the head of the "Ecole des Hautes Arts," which is recognized by the ministry of instruction in France as a legitimate branch of learning. His pupils are recruited from all over the world, and this takes not a little of his time and attention.

Besides being high in modern speculative Masonry, Papus is the revivor of the Rite of Elu Cohenim, which was simplified from the Masonry of Martinez de Pasqually, 100 years ago, by Louis Claude de St. Martin, better known to occultists generally as the "Unknown Philosopher." The thirty-six degrees from the apprentice to Knight Kadosh in the Pasqually Rite were reduced in-number to ten, divided into the First and Second Temple.

Persecution in France under the reign of materialism drove the order into seclusion, but in 1869 its ritual was again openly worked under the direction of Papus, who is for life the president of the supreme council. Since he has been the head the order has spread over the world and has members in India, Egypt, Europe, England and America.

As an interpreter of the decidedly difficult works of St. Martin, Papus has become known to students of psychic research in many parts of the world. He has also brought the writings of Eliphas Levi into common knowledge by reducing them to language which is readily understood by the lay mind.

To know him at his best, one should see him in the playroom in his Parisian home. No matter how busy he is, or how many weighty affairs are on his mind, he never misses his afternoon visit to his children in their own particular domain, a visit which is always accompanied by his wife. Then he indulges in a familiar chat, now that the children are getting mature; but when they were young he used to romp with them, and the grave master was as much a boy as the son of a dozen years. Madame Encause is wholly in sympathy with him in his search for the-hidden operations of nature.

"The childron's hour is one of the agencies which keeps me young," he said once in his peculiar staccato Eng ...n, for the language of the Anglo-Saxon does not come readily to his tongue. "There is really no excuse for growing old. Think young, and you are indeed so. The idea has been recognized since the wisdom of the ancients enlightened the world."


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

What Anti-Vaccination Means.

T^O many persons the anti-vaccinationists are purely a set of ignorant, superficial persons, swayed by sentiment, incapable of reasoning from facts, and who are moreover blind to scientific truth. That this opinion prevails is not surprising, for the seeds have been carefully sown and are assiduously cultivated by those interested. Any one familiar with pro-vaccination literature knows its origin and why it so long prevails. Yet there are thousands who oppose all sorts of inoculation, who do not perceive just what anti-vaccination means and why there should be such strenuous opposition to its logic. They cannot believe that it is purely and simply the money that is in it that keeps it in favor so long, although they admit it is a factor.

The doctor who advocates serum-therapy knows full well that we strike at the heart of the theory; that its burial means not only that "germs," "microbes" and serums have to go, but that the whole poisonous drug delusion must soon follow in turn. In fact, he knows we are striking at the very foundation of scientific medicine; that once it is admitted that vaccination is wrong, professional credit goes, and there is no telling where the thing will stop, for has not every sprig of modern medical dogma been predicated upon this foundation?

It means to them that their whole lives have been wasted, that all these years they have been injuring instead of aiding the sick and that every plank is taken from under them. It means that hereafter all their boasted learning and much vaunted medical knowledge is so much mere rubbish in the lumber room of forgotten errors. Yes, it means that they themselves will be packed off bodily and pushed to the rear with their drugs, serums, microbes, fads, et id genus omne, to give the goddess Hygeia sway once more.

Oh, yes, they know what it means, and well they know that we know what it means, and that it is with malice a prepense that we attack the fossilized system they uphold, determined never to ease up until full liberty in all medical lines is obtained.

One of the singular things of history is how college men are always against real progress. This has been Harvard's position from the very first. It was through the Mathers, father and son, one at the time president of Harvard College, that that other curse of scientific medicine—inoculation—was introduced into New England.

Today, even so learned a man as Charles Francis Adams says of Cotton Mather's father, that his pamphlet showing that inoculation was "blessed of God" is probably the most creditable of all his numerous writings. If his fame is to rest upon such grounds it is well his "lifelong literary activity" is completely forgotten. While it is true the people usually oppose real progress, once in a while their instinct is right, as it was in the case of inoculation.

The public is a mole, blind, stupid thing, but right, after all, in its instincts. Now, what is instinct? Instinct is simply the inborn gift of all animal life, unerringly telling the body to shrink from anything detrimental to either individual or race existence. It is perhaps the most useful natural faculty, but one that both education and training are focused upon to uproot and annihilate. This is true of all the teaching of the day.

Today the courts are enthroning a lot of medical pretenders and extending to them the powers the European priesthood possessed during the Dark Ages. But this cannot go on much longer. Swift and sure will be the reckoning. The time cannot be much longer delayed. In those days the caprice of any petty priestly upstart had the force of an imperial decree. The courts (where courts existed) believed that the common people had no rights these priestly pretenders were bound to respect.

If there must be a vaccination law, why not insist upon a clause that all doctors who vaccinate must use pure virus? If they do not, then hold them personally responsible for damages. All other classes are held liable for carelessness and inefficiency, why not doctors? This is not an unreasonable demand, for all the vaccination doctors claim that if pure virus be used no bad results can ever follow vaccination. Let them make their claim good.

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Psychology of Childhood

Every mother should learn the laws of hypnotism (suggestion) and apply them to her children. If this were done the world would soon be free of miscreants, and happiness would be more general.

Criminal tendencies can be modified and at times even eradicated by suggestion, especially while the person affected is young.

And I have even cured one case of hopeless love by hypnotic suggestion.—Dr. Eugene R. Eliscu.

Dr. Eugenie R. Eliscu, of New York city, a practicing woman physician, who employs hypnotism as one of her regular therapeutic agents, makes the foregoing statement in commenting upon the published announcement of Judge Lindsey, of the Denver juvenile court, that he would employ hypnotism as a means of reforming boys and girls.

"Judge Lindsey's innovation in court procedure is one of the longest strides in the direction of improvement that could have been taken," said Dr. Eliscu, who, by the way, has the reputation of being one of the most learned members of the medical profession in New York. She is still a very young woman, unmarried, and handsome.

Criminality a Disease.

"A criminal tendency," she said, "is merely a diseased condition, and if diseases such as even wry-neck, which is at times extremely obstinate, yield to hypnotic suggestion, why not also the crime disease?

"I instance wry-neck because it was only the other day that I was called in to an extreme case of that kind. The patient's neck was twisted almost completely around, and he had convulsions at alarmingly frequent intervals.

"As a sop to any prejudice that his relatives might have, I applied some chloroform liniment and then placed the patient in the hypnotic state. This was a more than ordinarily difficult task, requiring threequarters of an hour. But almost immediately after that the neck returned to its natural position, the convulsions ceased, and the patient has not been troubled since.

"Man consists of a body, mind and soul, and on each of these planes he is amenable to hypnotic suggestion. That his bodily ills can be made to yield to suggestion you have seen in the case of the wryneck. In regard to his mental part, the trouble usually consists of despondency growing out of failure to attain some end or object aimed at.

Soul Must Be Reached.

"It is to the soul itself, however, in the vital, immortal.part of us, that we must mainly look for the eradication of the evil tendencies and the awakening and expansion of the virtues.

"The soul is the performer, as it were, that uses our bodies somewhat like musical instruments. If the instrument is defective, no matter how good the performer, there will be discord. And there will be even worse discord if the performer (the soul) be bad, no matter how good the instrument.

"To reach the soul the hypnotist has to appeal to it through the mind. For this reason it has so far been found utterly impossible to hypnotize idiots, because they are altogether deficient in mind.

"In the soul of every one, even the most depraved and criminal, there is some latent good, and it requires only the right sort of suggestion to call it into play, just as it needs the steel to strike a spark from the flint.

"Many have been cured of cigarette smoking and drunkenness by hypnotism, and so why should not also crime yield to the same antagonist? That is exactly what hypnotism is in regard to the traits that are sought to be removed—an antagonist.

Moral Force Needed.

"The process is a wrestling; it needs the moral force of one human mind to impress upon another the perception of the necessity of doing or refraining from doing something.

"The case of hopeless love that I referred to was that of a sixteen-year-old boy. The object of his infatuation was a woman of twenty-four, who was not even aware of his sentiment toward her.

"The lad was pining away. He was very sick before he was placed under my care. Fortunately he realized the gravity of his situation, and his own will coöperated with mine in bringing about a forgetfulness of the young woman. Within a short time he was well again."—Chicago American.



Brighter Thoughts for Children.

John D. O'Brien, in a lecture before the school teachers at St. Paul, Minn., made some very happy suggestions in regard to ideal treatment of children. Among other things he said:

"A child's mind should be trained to look on the brighter side of life. Why is it that a child must be continually haunted with the nightmare of death? Grown people have only ten commandments, but the boy has ten thousand. It's 'don't this' and 'don't that,' until they are driven to despair. The way to treat a child is to give him more sympathy. All we can do is to train the instincts of a child, and we must do that when they are as yet undeveloped. Let us be careful to give them as enjoyable a time as possible."

After the lecture it was proposed that some musical items be substituted for the usual discussion, as no one present wished to discuss the revolutionary ideas advanced by the speaker. It is said that the teachers were astounded at the ideas set forth by Mr. O'Brien.

It is undoubtedly true that the mind of a child should be filled with optimistic ideals. Especially true is it that the child should not be clouded by what Mr. O'Brien referred to as the "nightmare of death."

In regard to the subject of training the child, the writer says, in "How to Live Forever":

"Every child instinctively believes in life. The average child has to be persuaded into accepting the idea that he must die. It is wrong to suggest to the child the necessity of growing old and passing away. To suggest to him before going to sleep each night that he may never awaken is both foolish and harmful. 'If I should die before I wake' should never be taught to a child. Teach rather that during the sleep the soul watches over and renews the body, causing it to awake rested and happy in the morning. The realization that the mind of a child is like an art gallery, and every thought it receives is a new picture, emphasizes the necessity of giving children wholesome mental pictures to concentrate upon. How absurd and wrong it is to fill the child's mental gallery with pictures of terrible torture, fiendish devils, and a revengeful God! The mind of the child should be filled with ideals of beauty, thoughts of tender love, and suggestions of kindly action.

"In training the child for perpetual youth it is essential to preserve the natural spirit of play. Many people imagine that it is unbecoming for a child to romp and play after it reaches a certain stage of growth. Fond mothers clamp restrictive corsets on their young daughters and tell them to act with more dignity. The vivacious forces of childhood are repressed and a long step taken toward 'growing old.' The merry thought, hearty exercise, and natural breathing of a child guarantee beauty and continuous life."

OSTEOPATHY

Adjustment of Structure.

The fundamental and distinctive idea of Osteopathy is that disease is caused by misplacements of the structures of the body, and that these misplacements can be adjusted by hand manipulation. Man is looked upon as a machine, and health is regarded as attainable by securing a proper position of all the parts of the machine. The largest part of the Osteopath's adjustment is done upon the vertebræ and ribs, yet he has won many signal victories in treating other parts of the body. Many supposedly incurable cases of hip trouble were dislocations that have yielded to the Osteopath's skill in diagnosis and technique. He will relax the surrounding tissues and gradually bring the limb into position, in a manner heretofore unknown to the medical profession or the most skillful masseurs and Swedish movement-men. Many cases of paralysis of the arm, resulting from injury or stiffness of the shoulder joint, have been entirely cured by Osteopathic adjustment. There are thousands among the readers of SUGGESTION and their friends whose deformity or crippled condition could be done away with by Osteopathic treatment.

It is particularly in the treatment of the vertebræ and ribs by which a cure or great benefit is secured in diseases of the internal organs, such as the lungs, heart, stomach, liver, kidneys and bowels. The twenty-four separate vertebræ which form what is known as the "backbone," fit one on top of the other, and through the center of each of them, passing up and down, is an opening, and these combined openings passing from the head to the lowest part of the back form the spinal canal, through which passes the spinal cord. On each side of the vertebræ, at points between them where they fit together, are openings through which pass nerves, called *rami-communicantes*, from

the spinal cord to the sympathetic system which controls the activities of the vital organs. These rami-communicants have the power of determining the blood supply to the vital organs. Any misplacement of the vertebre is likely to bring pressure on the nerves, passing between them, with consequent impairment of function.

For example, there are nerves that pass between the second and third dorsal vertebræ and accelerate the heart action. A-misplacement of the third dorsal vertebræ will produce impairment of the heart action, and a correction of this misplacement will restore the normal heart action. This state of facts has led to great emphasis on the part of Osteopaths to the idea of "centers." That is to sav. the stomach, the lungs, the intestines and all other vital organs have certain centers in the spine, and by treating these centers by manipulations, correcting subluxations of the vertebræ, increasing the mobility of the joint, and relaxing the muscles, ligaments and other structures around the joint, diseases of the organs controlled by these centers are cured or benefited. In addition to replacement of structure, the Osteopath understands the art of stimulating or inhibiting the nerves that control these organs. For example, in cases of constipation, full, free and natural movements of the bowels are frequently secured by stimulating the bowel centers, and diarrhea or bloody flux is usually well controlled by inhibiting procedures.

Most Osteopathic literature asserts that Osteopaths work on the theory that disease is caused by pressure on the nerves that pass between the vertebræ, caused by misplacement of the vertebræ, or lack of mobility of the joint. Clinical experience in many thousands of cases ought to convince most any one that this theory is a fact. But, in addition to this, we have the results of experiments on animals, made by Dr. Connell, of Chicago, and Dr. Louisa Burns, of Los Angeles. Dr. McConnell would anaesthetize a healthy dog and then by force produce a misplacement at the stomach center in one of the upper dorsal vertebræ. The dog was then permitted to live in his usual way with his usual feed. In a few weeks he became sick, whereupon he was killed, and a post mortem revealed a markedly diseased stomach. This is to say, an injury in the upper part of a dog's back caused disease of the stomach. Dr. Burns has anaesthetized animals and then opened up to view the abdominal organs. She has then manipulated the spine where were located nerve centers for these abdominal organs, whereupon marked differences in the quantity of blood distributed to these organs became very apparent. For example, in some instances the organs became very pale, indicating the withdrawal of blood.

Opponents of Osteopathy heap ridicule upon us by saying that we always find a bone out of place. A part of this is due to our carelessness in describing lesions found in the spine and other joints as dislocations. As a general rule we do not find in most diseased conditions gross dislocations as commonly result from some great violence, but by training our touch we do find spinal centers that are tender, and where the vertebræ at rest do not assume the positions proper for normal persons, and where the muscles are contractured. The condition of the ligaments and muscles preclude the joint from assuming its normal position. At any rate, again and again and again, the Osteopath brings relief from pain and suffering and cures disease by treatment directed to these joints, and this is the part our patients are more interested in; then the theory of our science.

Probably by this time the reader is asking the question, How do these joints become misplaced? The usual answer is that this is done by falls or jars that occurred some time during the patient's life, or by heat or cold or sudden changes affecting the tissues around the joints. Most Osteopaths admit that changes in function will affect structure. That is to say, for example, that wrong diet may injure the stomach, which in turn causes a lesion in the back in the stomach centers. But many do not place as much emphasis as they ought on the idea that we are personally responsible for our diseases, which are generally caused by wrong ways of living rather than by accident. The Osteopathic treatment may overcome some of the results of wrong living in the past, but a permanent cure can only come by learning the laws of the life of the human animal and living accordingly.

In conclusion I would urge upon every reader of these lines, who is seeking health, to consult the Osteopath, no matter what is the matter with you. No knives or poisons are used. The Osteopath cures many supposedly strictly surgical cases, and he advises surgery only when it is absolutely necessary. If he understands his business there is small likelihood of his doing any harm. He may not be posted on the best methods of directing thought forces or as to what is the best diet or other matters pertaining to hygiene, though he is more likely to have more advanced views on these subjects than the average doctor of medicine. You may have to wrestle with these questions yourself. In fact, there is an imperative need that the layman study hygiene, as the doctors alone are not likely ever to be able to disentangle the snarls that modern civilization has woven around our hygiene. LETTER FROM DR. CAREY TO THE EDITOR OF SUGGESTION.

Christian Science, as expounded by Mrs. Eddy, teaches that God, being only good, and filling all space, is, of course, all there is, and as matter, the human form and matter in its various manifestations is, if it exists at all, evil, therefore, it does not exist, but is an illusion or belief of mortal mind. Of course, there can be no such thing as mortal mind, according to the basis of the science; therefore, a belief in something that does not exist by a something that does not exist is a statement that cannot be comprehended or in any manner understood. But when the chemical, rather the alchemical, operation of all phenomena is understood the manifestations called nature or matter appear to the consciousness in a new light. There is nothing but reality. Ice is as real in its form as water. Water is as real as oxygen and hydrogen.

All so-called substances is a form or expression of the universal substance-Principle or Mind-therefore real, eternal, absolute.

MR. FARLOW'S REPLY.

Editor SUGGESTION:—Following your kind permission I herein submit a review of an article from Dr. Geo. W. Carey. The gentleman declares, "Christian Science, as expounded by Mrs. Eddy, teaches that God, being only good, and filling all space, is, of course, all there is, and as matter, the human form and matter in its various manifestations is, if it exists at all, evil; therefore, it does not exist, but is an illusion or belief of mortal mind. Of course there can be no such thing as mortal mind, according to the basis of the science; therefore, a belief in something that does not exist by a something that does not exist is a statement that cannot be comprehended or in any manner understood." Then he writes, "All so-called substance is a form or expression of the universal substance—Principle or Mind—therefore real, eternal, absolute." The gentleman has left little for me to say on the subject, since his last paragraph answers his first. Christian Science agrees that everything in creation, from the least to the greatest, is real and is the expression of "Principle or Mind," God. The phenomena of chemical action and chemical results will eventually be understood to be mental. Under the microscope of Spirit it will be noted that all creation is spiritual and not material, and the changing views will disappear. It is well said that mortal mind with its supposed manifestations cannot be comprehended, for there is but one thing to know concerning it, and that is that it is an illusion. Mortal mind is not really mind or intelligence. The term "Mortal Mind" as used in Christian Science means a false sense. In the dark we have a vague and inaccurate perception of things. It is proper to say that this vague and inaccurate sense is illusion in the ratio of its inaccuracy, and that the darkness which gives the false sense is also an illusion. In other words, darkness is not an entity—is not something, but the want of something—the want of light. Mortal mind is not in reality mind, but darkness, which gives an erroneous sense of creation; hence it is perfectly sensible to say that both mortal mind and its supposed creation—that is, its false presentation of the real creation are illusions.

The following letter from this office to Mr. Farlow was sent in response:

DEAR MR. FARLOW:-Yours of the 25th is at hand; I will be pleased to print it in connection with Dr. Carey's article; your answer is interesting, as it gives a very clear view of the Christian Science doctrine on the point in question.

If mortal mind and its perceptions are illusory to a greater or less extent, then the doctrines and theories of mortal mind are illusory; then the theories or doctrines of Christian Science are illusory, being products of the mortal mind. I do not see how we are to distinguish between illusions and realities unless we admit that some one has superior information and can determine which product of mind is illusive and which is conclusive.

As a matter of fact is not all human deduction but a delusion when compared with the ultimate? Advanced thinkers agree that all so-called knowledge is but comparative and that man has never yet fathomed the sea of truth; hence all our assumptions are but guesses and all our conclusions are but phantoms. Man knows about as much of his origin, object and destiny as a bunch of sparrows knows about the differential calculus. It appears to me that there can be no intellectual progress until man recognizes his insignificance and woeful ignorance. Prof. Edgar L. Larkin has shown that if the whole solar system were blotted out of existence that the universe would never be aware of the loss—never miss us. And man cannot comprehend the most elementary principles of time or space or eternity; yet every day I read of this one or that one who claims to know the secrets of Deity and who

Mr. Farlow's response was as follows:

That the theories and doctrines of Christian Science are not products of mortal mind, and, therefore, are not illusory, is proved by their results. One might assume that the proposition that two times two are four is a product of mortal mind, and upon more careful consideration we note that it is an idea of eternal Principle that never had an origin, for in the very spot in your brain where you now entertain the idea that two times two are four it was true ages ago that two times two were four—true before there was a manifestation of brain—true everywhere and at all times and under all circumstances that two times two were four. Thus we might illustrate the everpresence and eternity of every idea of Truth which goes to make up the ideal main, whatever we may say of the mortal, material, transitory man.


We determine between ideas that are true and those which are illusory by examining their origin. In the first place we must be planted in a definite idea that is actually correct and has been so demonstrated. For example, we say "God is Mind" or "Spirit"; this we take as our premise and every consistent deduction from this premise must be an idea of the divine Mind, and comes to us not by reason of mortal mind, but in spite of it. We disagree with the agnostic theory that all so-called knowledge is but comparative and that man has never yet fathomed the sea of truth. What I have proved of the truth of Christian Science enables me to be as positive of its exactness as I am of any mathematical proposition.


I agree with you that we know about as little about Truth as the sparrows know about the differential calculus, for we are surely not very far advanced, but, notwithstanding, we get a great deal of comfort and harmony out of the little truth we do know and demonstrate.

Your statement concerning what Prof. Edgar L. Larkin says reminds me of the statement of a German philosopher. He said he had proved by the use of a powerful microscope that the whole of matter, if compressed, could be put into an ordinary sized coffee pot, and he believed, if he had a microscope large enough, that the whole of matter would disappear, but the poor man forgot that in order to have a microscope large and powerful enough he would have to have the whole of matter in the microscope! Mrs. Eddy says that "Under the microscope of Spirit matter disappears." This does not mean, however, that the universe disappears, but that the belief that it is material disappears; that when the false sense of it disappears the true perception of it remains and is apparent.

If it is true that man is to attain to perfection by spiritual or mental development, then I cannot see that death would make any more change than crossing the line from one state to another, for such an experience could be nothing more or less than a simple transition from one plane of consciousness into another, like going to sleep, at night. One begins to dream and he is just as conscious of individual existence and of his body and of trudging about in his dream as when awake.

Premature Burials.

George W. Allen recently wrote to the Boston (Mass.) Transcript

There are two bills before the Massachusetts Legislature to require safeguards from premature burial. The bill introduced by Representative Chandler has two purposes, one to save life by requiring that tests shall be applied to discover any indications of life, and if there are such indications to attempt restoration and to prevent premature burial by requiring that in no case shall a certificate of death be issued until death is certain. This bill makes it a crime, with a penalty attached, to encoffin, embalm, bury or cremate a human body until a certificate has been obtained as above. The other bill introduced by Representative Walker only requires that a physician shall examine the supposed dead person and certify that life is extinct before embalming or burial. If this bill should become a law without further provision the situation would be practically but little better than at present. Unless the only sure test of death is required before the certificate is issued, any indication sure test of death is required before the certificate is issued, any indication of death may be regarded as sufficient and embalming may be performed as it is now before the body is even cold, and burial may take place, as now, while the person is alive. Under the present law an undertaker can embalm while the person is alive, or bury the person before death, and he commits no crime. If it is known he can say, 'What are you going to do about it?' Under the Walker bill neither is made a crime. No sure proof of death has been discovered outside the setting in of putrefactive decomposition. Although there has been a reward of 20,000 frances for the discovery of some other sure test, for years no claimant has appeared. It is surprising that with so many causes, internal and external, for a suspension of animation and simulation of death that anything less

for a suspension of animation and simulation of death that anything less than certainty of death should be required to save a person from the undertaker.

In England there is a society whose object is to awaken public opinion on the subject of premature burial and to work for the passage of laws which will make premature burial impossible. Statistics have been prepared to show that in Europe out of every 500 supposed deaths, one person is resuscitated. Although the medical profession refuse to take any interest in the matter, it is unquestionably the case that many persons are buried while in the state of suspended animation. Every day the newspapers chronicle a case in which a person is revived after being given over to the undertaker. Allowing for exaggeration, there are certainly grounds for agitation and enlightenment of this subject. Certainly there should be no unseemly haste in injecting the embalming fluid.

In this connection an item from an exchange may be interesting.

It is stated that in the cemetery just outside the town of Weimar, in the mausoleum in which the remains of the poets, Schiller and Goethe, lie buried, there is special provision made against the danger of premature burial from suspended animation. No bodies are placed in the ground until they have spent a considerable time in a receiving vault. In the fingers of the corpse are placed strings which communicate with an alarm. The least pulsation will ring a bell in an adjoining chamber, where a guardian is always on the watch. In several instances, by this timely alarm, persons prematurely buried have been rescued. It is said that the provision arose from the tradition that one of the princes of Saxe-Weimar, this being their family burial place, was buried alive here.

Bread and Milk as an Aid to Longevity.

The following dispatch from New York, dated July 10, 1906, appeared in the Chicago press:

"Whether a diet of bread and milk taken exclusively for forty years is responsible for the remarkable preservation from the effects of old age shown in the body of Mrs. Mary Fay, who died at the age of one hundred and five years a few days ago, is causing intense interest among physicians.

"Despite the extreme age of Mrs. Fay her body is in as perfect physical condition and as well nourished as that of a woman of thirty or thirty-five years of age, according to Coroner's Physician Dr. Philip O'Hanlon. Dr. O'Hanlon, since he became connected with the coroner's office, has made 4,500 autopsies, and he was so surprised at the physical perfection of Mrs. Fay's body today that he called in all the other physicians and surgeons of the coroner's office to observe the unusual conditions.

"The only explanation that the physicians can offer for the condition of Mrs. Fay's body is her mode of living. Dr. O'Hanlon and others who saw the body are wondering whether or not they have a corroboration of the theory of Professor Elie Metchnikoff of Paris, who asserted that man does not live out his allotted span of life because of the cellular activities in the digestive tract which produce old age. He believes that by a diet of sour or curdled milk the germs of putrefaction, which, according to his theory, produce old age, may be successfully combated.

"Investigation at the instance of Dr. O'Hanlon revealed the fact that the old woman has lived for forty or fifty years on bread and milk.

"She refused to eat meat or vegetables and generally carried with her on her excursions about the city a few crusts of bread. For thirty years her home has been a small room at 490 Sixth avenue. She was known to all the children for blocks around as 'Granny' Fay.

"'Granny' Fay, according to her neighbors, was the 'sprightliest old woman in Greater New York.' Although her sight had been dimmed by her age, her step was as firm and elastic as that of a young woman, and she made excursions about the city which would have tired out many a person much younger."

Books.

HELP FOR CHRONIC SUFFERERS.—This is the title of a book by Dr. H. Valentine Knaggs, M. R. C. S., etc., and published by Jarrold & Sons, 10 Warwick Lane, E. C., London.

On the title page there appears this sentiment, taken from an American author:---

"In order to regain health we must acquire the habit of being properly fed, ventilated, watered, exercised and rested."

In the preface appears the following:

"In the treatment of all obstinate, chronic and apparently incurable diseases the trend of modern medicine is in the direction of proper feeding, correct breathing and increased working of the organs that eliminate impurities from the body.

"Persistent drug taking is gradually going out of fashion, and in its place more attention is being given to diet reform, to the necessity for brisk exercise in the fresh, vital air, to the free use of distilled water for promoting the action of the kidneys, etc. * * * "Yet, by a thorough reform of the dict, combined with exercises involv-

"Yet, by a thorough reform of the dict, combined with exercises involving the deep breathing of pure air, the two essentials of life—the intake of nourishment and the outgo of the waste—can be made to absolutely balance each other. It is only on such lines that diseases can be permanently cured."

The author states that the purification of the blood, without which no bodily repair can take place, is brought about by the following, which form his chapter headings:—

"Efficient digestion, correct breathing, removal of waste products by diet restrictions, the use of water and fruit or vegetable juices to flush the excretory organs, the utilization of the action of light and heat to promote free action of the skin, the stimulation or sedation of disordered nerves, control of the senses."

The author holds that civilization is the cause of disease, that health depends on the due, orderly and rhythmical functioning of all the cell groups, and that this functioning will go on properly provided that food, air and water are properly adjusted to the needs of the body, that wrong eating is a prolific cause of disease, that soft foods are unhealthful, that vaccination is a positive injury and causes many of the ills of childhood, that uncooked foods are beneficial for chronic sufferers, as they supply the natural tissue salts, that waterdrinking is essential to health and that hard water is injurious, as it produces a calcified condition of the circulatory organs, and that the emotions should be controlled.

Dr. Knaggs' book is a fair exponent of the principles of the New Hygiene or Nature Cure, especially as it is presented by American hygienists. The student of health will find the book valuable, as it points out certain broad principles. If any criticism might be offered it would relate to the lack of information regarding the power of mental force on bodily health; the author uses the term "Self-Suggestion" once in speaking of the desirability of acquiring the habit of perfect mastication; but he might easily devote one chapter to the subject of Auto-Suggestion without detracting from the interest of his very valuable book. The Tragedy of Chicago.

A STUDY IN HYPNOTISM

Richard G. Ivens, a peaceable, kindly, temperate, industrious young man, twenty-four years of age, and a son of respectable parents with whom he had always lived, was hanged in Chicago by process of law, on June 22, 1906.

He was accused of an atrocious murder, the perpetration of which he "confessed" after being arrested and vigorously charged with it by police officers.

His "confessions" were so incongruous as to preclude any right to credibility. He later denied any knowledge of having made the "confessions," sustaining this denial on the witness stand and maintaining his innocence to the last. He met death on the gallows with quiet resignation.



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

Dual Personality.

The following item is from the Cincinnati *Evening Star* of January 9, 1906, sent to this office by A. W. Buchtman, Cincinnati, Ohio:

The most remarkable story of dual personality ever investigated by the medical fraternity of New York is told in connection with the death by his own hand of Dr. Robert W. Steger, the Nashville physician, whose note of farewell to the world vaguely hinted that the "story of 'Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde''' was not overdrawn. Bit by bit, from his friends and acquaintances, a bare skeleton of his dual life has been pieced out. By his own wish, the New York College of Surgeons may try to find a clue to the puzzle by an autopsy. At one time Dr. Steger had a practice of 425,000 a year. He lived well, though not extravagantly. Then he became conscious, according to his own statement, of a second self that at times strove for the mastery over his physical being. It was the scientific curiosity of a physician that led him to yield himself at first to this second self. At the beginning it displayed no evil tendencies. Outwardly, the only manifestation of its control lay in an alteration of the features, hardly to be described, and yet sometimes sufficient to prevent his recognition by his closest friends. His voice also changed during these periods. It became gruff, uncertain. He had difficulty in articulation. In the beginning he told of his obsession to one or two of his close friends in his profession.

Close friends in his profession. At first, they did not believe him. To convince them he called on them during the period in which the second self had control. He bought every book upon dual personality he could find. He spent his fortune in scientific investigation of the mystery of self. Then, it would appear, the nature of the second self was first revealed. The real Robert Steger fought for days at a time against a madly murderous desire which dominated the other. He longed to commit hideous crimes. In his struggle he paced his office floor until physical exhaustion enabled him to get the upper hand of himself. It is believed by his friends here that he preserved the mastery to the end. It is not thought that he ever yielded to the obsession which bedeviled him day and night of late. But he felt his power of resistance growing weaker. The Mr. Hyde of his nature was gradually gaining complete mastery. He felt that his one refuge was in death. In dying he asked that his fellow physicians strive to find the clue that had eluded him.
