Altho the statement is not may not be honored when the award is again made. It has not long been known that there are certain rays of the spectrum which act as germicides; these are the visible violet and invisible ultra-violet rays. Finsen devised an electric apparatus which would give an abundance of violet and ultra-violet rays. The disorder which has been most readily treated by Finsen is Tuberculosis of the skin, called by medical men lupus vulgaris. In a special hospital, which has been established in Copenhagen, known as the Finsen Institute, 456 cases were treated up to the close of 1900. The treatment was necessarily severe, since few patients required 20 sittings of an hour each—one daily-while many needed from 300


