PROPOSED AMENDMENTS To The Constitution and By-Laws of the National Spiritualist Association.

Article IX, by substituting "Biennial" in place of "Annual Conventions," thus making the Convention meet every two years instead of annually.

Amend Constitution by adding:

"Any good Spiritualist paying one hundred dollars into the treasury of the National Spiritualists' Association shall be entitled to a life membership in the Association, with a right to vote in all of its business transactions."

Amend Constitution:

"To allow honorary or lay members the privileges of delegates; also that provisions be made for five-year members, with Convention privileges, for the sum of twenty-five dollars."

Article XI, Section 2, of the By-Laws, by inserting after "local associations" the words "holding State charters."

COL. SIMON P. KASE.

The Veteran Spiritualist Passes Away At His Home in Phila Jelphia.

Col. Simon P. Kase, one of the best known Spiritualists in the United States, if not in the world, passed quietly away from his home in Philadelphia and was buried August 30.

Col. Kase was one of the early converts to Spiritualism. Many of the most prominent mediums of the early days of modern movement were entertained at his home and varied were the experiences which he told in his narrative style, of the marvelous phenomena that took place under the finest of test conditions.

Col. Kase was one who gave to mediums the proper conditions for the production of the phenomena. His home was opened to them, and while there, everything that conducted to quietude and harmonious conditions was thrown around them. It is not to be wondered at that under such conditions phenomena were produced that seem almost incredible to the ordinary listener. Bulky objects were brought from different parts of the house and even from different sections of the county. Flowers, from tropical lands where no such plant could be found within hundreds of miles, even living animals and birds being brought into the room and on one occasion a large ham that had been hanging in the cellar being by some mysterious power brought into the seance room.

The following from the Philadelphia Item will give a slight idea of the last

"The funeral of Colonel Simon P. Kase, the Spiritualist, took place this morning from the family home, Fifteenth and Oxford Streets, interment being made in Mount Peace Cemetery. The funeral was largely attended, principally by believers in the faith.

"Farewell' services were held at the house last night, and the place was crowded. There was no sign of crepe anywhere, nor was there any other indication of mourning. In a small reception room rested the coffin containing Col, Kase's body, covered with flowers.

"The lights were turned low because of the heat, and in the dimly-illuminated rooms there was absolutely nothing to suggest that all those in the house had. gathered to attend funeral services.

"Everything possible was done to convince them to the contrary, or, as Samuel Wheeler, Vice President of the Philadelphia Spiritualist Society, said, they met "not to commemorate Colonel Kase's death in this world but his birth into the next one." Mrs Kase, dressed just as she might have been to receive friends at a reception, moved about among her guests, trying to find chairs for late arrivals.

The guests passed up stairs to a large room, where there was an open piano, upon which rested a guitar. Upon the walls were oil paintings of Washington and Lincoln, and written messages from relatives of the dead man, believed by him to have been written by hands that had long been laid in the grave. At the piano sat an aged man who played 'Nearer my God, to Thee,' and a young woman soon started to sing it as a solo, but she was joined by nearly every one in the room.'

In a late address by the venerable Dr. J. M. Peebles at the Ohio State Convention, as reported in the Banner of Light, of July 14th, I note the above suggestion, in connection with several others, who were called upon on the memorable occasion, to address the convention.

When discussing the obligations and the duties that devolve upon the workers in the Spiritual field, Doctor Peebles said in

"Now, fellow workers, while the editors of the great papers are pledging their faith to harmony, let us enlist, and make this a great army under their

The Light of Truth, in its effort to create a world of usefulness, must, at the same time, evolve a firmament. Remember, dear reader, that we seek to make as a central orb in that firmament, CHARACTER BUILDING.

"In the six days of our labor, every act must be accompanied by Aspiration and prayer; therefore, we link, as a cardinal feature of our policy,

CHARACTER BUILDING AND PRAYER."

While many are familiar with these two peculiar phrases, they are seldom used in conjunction, as they imply two very different exercises, in moral ethics and practice.

As the Doctor enjoins Character Building as one of the principal obligations devolving upon Spiritualists, let us see what that implies.

As a sect, Spiritualists have done very little in that direction, as I understand it, and it may be proper, and indeed necessary, if, as the Doctor says, Character Building is to be one of the principal factors in Spiritual teaching, that we look a little in detail, into what we have to do.

Agreeable to my recollection, it was Doctor Holmes of Boston, that very popular and well known physician, who, when asked at what age a child's education and training should be commenced, replied, "Two hundred years before its birth."

If that be the case, perhaps it will be better for us in our investigation of the subject of Character Building, to omit the earlier preliminaries, and take the child as soon as it arrives at years of discretion.

The precocity and observation of children at this age of the world is such, that by due diligence and careful training, a good foundation for Character Building may be secured by the time the child is old enough to know right from wrong.

As Spiritualists take no stock in the old orthodox theory of natural depravity, we can at once commence, by precept and example, to build the future character to which the Doctor so earn-

If it is true, as claimed, that Character building is an individual work, and can not be accomplished by another, only so far as advice and instruction can be imparted, it seems to me the Doctor should have gone a little further and defined characters and given us an idea of what he would have us pray for.

There are a great variety of characters as well as of prayers, and until we define them and agree upon what we want to accomplish, are we not liable to be at work at cross purposes, and our effort every "six days of the week," liable to do more harm than good?

BUILDING AND PRAYER." HOME CIRCLES.

How to Organize and Conduct Them.

When the cold winds begin to blow, people of all classes wonder what they can do to spend the long winter evenings. Nothing could be of more interest than a home circle.

Every family possesses among its members, one or more who can get the phenomena if proper conditions are made for it. Hundreds of families have held their circles and demonstrated to their complete satisfaction that there is a life after death and that under proper conditions there is communion between the spheres of carnate and decarnate existence. That much demonstrated, a long list of advantages can accure to the sitters.

The first essential to a successful home or any other kind of circle, is harmony. Therefore it is necssary in making the first start to interest those who are to form the members. If one member of the family does not want to sit, leave that member out and go right on without him or her as their presence in the circle will result detrimentally if the circle is joined under compulsion.

The next thing to do is to settle upon some time that will be devoted to it. Again the wishes of the entire circle should be consulted as it will be necessary in order that good results are obtained that it should meet regularly and at a time that will be acceptable to all.

Having decided upon time, location and frequency of meetings, do not let anything else interfere with it. You are making an appointment with your spirit friends. In order to do the necessary work, they will have to arrange a circle in their sphere of existence and more work will be done that is not seen than will be done by the seen workers. Therefore it becomes necessary to secure the best of results that these appointments be kept as sacredly as you keep your business appointments in this life.

Having attended to all of these details you are ready to arrange your circle. Here again much discretion is necessary. It should be arranged so as to form a natural human battery. To do this it is necessary to secure a human counterpart of the chemicals and materials used in galvanic batteries.

As copper and zinc or carbon and zinc in a proper solution project a force from one to the other, so people of unlike temperaments will act on each other to form a natural battery. As a rule males are positive and females negative. If more of one sex predominate, place the dark complexioned where positives are required and light complexioned where the negatives are required. Try to put people who are harmonious next to each other and then try your circle.

This arrangement will usually produce a good condition. You can tell if arrangements have been properly made by the feeling of the circle. If properly arranged it will appear quiet, harmonious and in many cases there will be a tendency on the part of those who are sensitive to go to sleep. On the other hand, if the circle is not properly arranged there will be an uneasiness prevailing that will show very clearly that something is wrong. When the last condition prevails, change the position of some of the members of the circle until a proper is equalibrium is

As this will require some authority, it is advisable to select some person as director in the beginning of the circle. Then after manifestations are produced, you can seek the advice of your spirit friends to know what is best to do to make the most success possible with the material at hand.

The kind of manifestations and the class of manifesting spirits will depend to a great extent upon the actions of the circle. If the circle is quiet, with a desire for the best, a similar class of spirits will be attracted. If the circle is devoted to fun, laughing and jest, that class of spirits will be attracted and the results will be accordingly. Remember that upon yourselves depends the class of phenomena, the reliability or unreliability of the messages received and that much will be gained towards securing reliable phenomena.

I hear someone ask after reading the last sentence, "Is there unreliable phenomena?" Yes, both reliable and unreliable. Like attracts like and as people carry their characteristics with them, you will attract the kind of spirits your circle makes conditions for. The law that permits a truthful spirit to return, permits an untruthful one; that permits a good one, permits a bad one. It is governed by the conditions you make.

principles was so unsuccessful, and so unsatisfactory when agreed upon, it should admonish us of the necessity of explaining every important theory we attempt to promulgate.

While Doctor Peebles urges "Character Building and Prayer" as among the important daily duties, I question whether one half the Spiritualists in America would agree as to what Character Building implies, or that believe in prayer at all. That class will be difficult to convince of the value of prayer, while many others will be equally skeptical as to what the Doctor would enjoin in Character Building.

Prayer, as usually understood, implies a petition to a higher power, higher authority and wisdom, generally to the Supreme Power or to God.

Since the idea of a personal Deity has been so largely abandoned, I think prayer in public has been correspondingly discontinued when addressed to the great over-soul-to God.

Beyond the effect upon the mind of the speaker and the audience, I cannot suppose any beneficial result can accrue from a public prayer, although many in deep affliction are undoubtedly comforted. But education has far more to do with that than faith and reason have. I would not presume to criticize anything that Doctor Peebles may say or write, if I was satisfied he had fully considered the effect it would have upon the mind of the people. Those that think, that reason.

His long experience as a teacher, a writer, a traveler, has given him a position that entitles his words, his writings, his judgment to the respect of those who know him, or are familiar with his teachings. Hence I criticize with timidity any thing that comes from him, as I realize that what he says is considered authority by many sincere Spiritualists. I realize too, that so many unexplained theories and new isms, are being introduced, and many of them accepted by Spiritualists, that great caution should be observed both by teachers and laymen, where any new theory or principle is sought to be introduced, even by as competent author-

I observe a very critical difference to some of Dr. Peebles' declarations of a more recent date in a Banner of Light of August 25, over the signature of Brother William Foster, Jr., one of which is so original, so extraordinary I can not resist the inclination to quote it. It is as

"The rank and file of returning Spirits are idlers, spirit tramps and pleasure seekers."

As I am not familiar with the origin of this quotation, I shall not attempt to criticize it to any extent. I will simply say, not being familiar with the Doctors associates, I will not attempt to judge of their character or of their occupation. As the Doctor only includes the "rank and file" in this classification, I feel there may be more outside that class than Bro. Foster apprehends, and that I have many dear friends among them, some of whom often meet me, but never in company with "idlers, spirit tramps, or pleasure seekers." While I have no doubt the Doctor will be able to satisfactorily explain his theory of Character Building and Prayer from his standpoint, I trust he will consent to do so. But Spiritualists have so many different standpoints from which they draw conclusions, and insist they are right, while I believe in the fullest liberty consistent with good morals, the lack of harmony and the differences of opinion, in the minds of our teachers and our leaders in the last fifty years, has been the cause of too much ill feeling, and from this time forward I feel it a duty we owe the cause and its friends to clear up every obscure point, and make clear every point of doctrine that is liable to be misunderstood or to create controversy or inharmony. I regret to see at the present time a sharp diversity of opinion springing up in our ranks upon the proper time to introduce upon our public platforms, phenomena. All concede its value-its usefulness. The only question as I understand it, is the time and place.

Anything like a compromising spirit, an earnest effort, to secure harmony, peace and good will, would undoubtedly be successful. The argument is, we must draw the line somewhere. "How shall we distinguish between fraudulent and genuine mediums, if we permit both classes to occupy the same platform?"

When we begin with the search light with an earnest, honest purpose, and a determination to make all proper allowances for circumstances and appearances we shall find but few fraudulent mediums in comparison to those that have been reported as such.

I have seen but few fraudulent mediums, but many that have been accused of fraud. Honest and sincere mediums can and sometimes do explain the embarrassments that timid mediums with little experience sometimes feel when they are unable to produce phenomena that they have at other times produced. An audience that has paid ten cents for admission to such a seance, goes away dissatisfied, and declares the medium to be a fraud, and they will never attend that seance again. I am by no means an advocate of fraudulent mediumship; neither am I disposed to see injustice done to worthy, partially developed me-

While I very much prefer confining the Sunday platform seances to the philosophy of our teachings, I think it due to those who prefer the phenomena to have the privilege of one-half the day, and the expenses of both be borne by the society.

The time has not yet come for a division, neither are we able to support a divided organization. With the exception of very few cities, if a persistent effort to divide is made, it will break up the whole organization and no good will be accomplished. Our local societies are nearly, if not all, tottering on the brink of dissolution.

All the remedy I see possible is more thorough organization, a nunited effort to save the cause by a determined and persistent resolution to sacrifice every thing for the general good.

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
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AT LILY DALE.

Second International Congress of Hypnotism.

The month of August, 1900, will certainly contribute much to hypnotic literature. The Second International Congress of Hypnotism meets the 12th to 16 of August at Paris. The congress has two aims; to fix upon a definite terminology for Hypnotism and to determine and preserve the real acquisitions in the domain of Hypnotism up to the present time. The work of the congress will be divided into four parts:

I. Clinics and Therapeutics of Hypnotism and Suggestion.

II. Pedagogical and Sociological Applications of Hypnotism.

III. Psycho-Physiological.

IV. Medico-Legal.

It can be seen from this that there will be a wide range of subjects discussed, and students of Hypnotism will look forward with interest to the publication of the proceedings of the congress. Among the pleasant features of the Congress are excursions to different points of interest, and last but not leas banquet which closes the proceedings. We expect to give the readers of The Suggesters and Thinker an account of the more important proceedings of this Congress.—Suggester and Thinker.

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GHOSTLY HORSES TROT.

Chesleigh, a Ghost, Drives Them. Geneva Mystery.

Geneva, N. Y., has a trio of ghosts-a man and a team of horses-and they appear every Tuesday night at 10 o'clock walking across the waters of Chesleigh

Residents in the neighborhood of the pond and people from Geneva watch from the shore for the phantoms. The team is driven by the man seated in a low vehicle, and the apparition first appears coming down the road on the east shore of the pond. The horses trot on the water for twenty rods and then man, horses and vehicle vanish. The route never varies.

Chesleigh Pond is four miles northeast of Geneva. It covers thirty miles, and has neither inlet nor outlet, but is believed to have a subterranean connection with Seneca Lake, two miles away.

It has been observed that when a storm rages on Seneca Lake the pond is also rough and when a calm lies upon Seneca, Chesleigh Pond is unruffled. Its depth has never been ascertained, although many attempts have been made to sound it.

Sixty years ago the pond and adjoining land were owned by Timothy Chesleigh. One day in the winter of 1857 Mr. Chesleigh started to drive across the pond on the ice with a team of horses. Out in the lake the ice gave way and nothing was ever seen again of man

That the apparitions now appearing are the restless spirits of Chesleigh and his team is the firm belief of the older residents who remember the circumstances of Chesleigh's death.

The ghosts were first seen by Daniel Wilson, an intelligent and reputable farmer, on the evening of July 3d last. He watched the team down the East road and supposed they were of flesh and blood. When the horses stepped upon the shining surface of the water and trotted easily forward, Mr. Wilson became excited, and after they had abruptly disappeared he consulted several of his neighboring farmers, who watched' with him nightly to verify his story.

Nothing appeared until a week after the first visit, when the entire party saw the apparitions as described by Mr. Wilson. A watch has been kept every night since the first observance of the phenomena, but only on Tuesdays are the watchers rewarded with a sight of the

FORETOLD HER DEATH.

Said She'd Die When Pastor Came Home-Prophecy Came True.

Mrs. Elizabeth M. Zeitz, one of the founders of the German Lutheran church, in Elizabeth, N. J., had her presentiment of death fulfilled when she died early yesterday morning from a sudden stroke of paralysis, after attending a reception given in honor of the home-coming of the Rev. Christian Fisher, pastor of the church, who has just returned from a European trip.

Mrs. Zeitz, although 75 years old, was one of the livelist old persons at the reception, from which she returned to her home at 10 o'clock Tuesday night, and while undressing the fatal attack came on. She dropped to the floor, and, in falling, upset a lighted lamp which was on the table in the room.

Her grandson heard the lamp fall and rushed into the room in time to save the house from destruction, as the blazing oil had ignited the carpet. Mrs. Zeitz was unconscious when picked up, and remained in this condition until she passed away. She was a widow and leaves one son and four daughters.

Mrs. Zeitz, a month ago told some of her friends and the members of her family that she had a presentiment that when her pastor, to whom she was much attached, returned from his trip abroad her time on earth would be about ended, but that she did not want to die before she saw him again. Weight of Whales.

Gage of Council Bluffs, Iowa, is the writer, and she plays strong on what the parents should do to have a loving son freed. She asks that \$1,500 be sent her in \$50 bills, wrapped in a newspaper and plenty of two-cent stamps to insure delivery, as she does not take drafts, money orders, etc.

"She says she was employed on the Durrant case and was helping him until his parents wrote telling her not to assist him any longer as they did not need it, and from that day she says, matters went against Durrant. She wants the money in advance and at once, so she can begin the work of concentrating her mind on those who will have charge of Ferrell's trial.

"She proposes by a process of hypnotism to influence judge and jury, and put them in the shape of dopey men, so they can do nothing but liberate Ferrell. She says if her instructions are followed she will have Ross walking on the streets shortly."

Persons who wonder why it is that hypnotism is dreaded and maligned by many will find a partial explanation by reading the above extract. 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

THE MISSING LINK.

Those who have not heretofore subscribed to the Darwinian theory that man is a descendant of the monkey, or, rather, an ascendant from that animal, will learn with vital interest of a discovery made by Prof. Clement L. Webster, archaeologist, for a long time in the employ of the Government in New Mexico, and now devoting his life to scientific research, with headquarters in this city.

The startling results attained by Mr. Webster consist in the discovery of ten mound-builder mounds near old Chickasaw, Chickasaw Co, Iowa, from which he exhumed no less than fourteen well preserved skeletons of the race whose skulls are almost flat on the crown and whose forearms compare favorably in length with the legs, adding to the belief that these people in their life could scamper along on all-fours at a lively and natural gait. .

Scientifically, the find will startle the world of archaeology and attract the interest of the entire personnel of Darwinian believers.

MADE DISCOVERY ALONE.

The mounds are located on the west side of the Little Cedar River, about one and one-half miles below the town at the border of a terrace twenty to forty feet above the flood plain, at its base. This important discovery was made by Webster alone and proof of the find may be seen at his cottage in this city.

About 260 yards to the southeast of the mound is a spring which flows freely through the land formely populated by these strange monkey men. The mounds are from two to five feet apart, are circular, round-topped and measure from twenty-two to fifty-one feet in diameter and from one and three-fourths to five feet in height. The main line of mounds runs north, and a few degrees east. The others run parallel to the main line.

The first mound opened measured twenty-two feet in diameter and about one foot in height. A few inches above the original surface was a thick bed of charcoal and a large, thoroughly burned oaken log eight feet long and twelve inches thick. There were no skeletons in the first mound, but the second yielded a find which excited even the staid professor, who has been inured to strange and valuable finds all his life.

The mound had been graded almost level years ago by the husbandman, the site of the mounds being on the farm of R. H. Gordon, who, until the discovery, little dreamed he was working over the graves of a prehistoric race of the lowest type and living in sight of a burial ground which, giving up its dead, would set thousands to thinking and agitate the minds of scientists all over the country.

BONES WELL PRESERVED.

In the second mound, at the original surface, two sitting skeletons were found. The bones were well preserved, and Webster carefully exhumed them. When he examined the first skeleton and found the skull flat and the forearms so much longer than the specimens found heretofore, he was delighted, and, though greatly impressed with his important find, continued to dig feverishly into a third mound, in which he struck three more well preserved skeletons, also in sitting postures.

One skeleton faced the east; the second faced the first, and the third a few inches north, also faced the east. The skulls of all three of these skeletons were markedly Neandertholoid in type. In one specimen the lower forehead back of the eye orbits is very narrow, but rapidly expands backward; the frontal arch rises only 4.7 milimetres before sloping abruptly backward, leaving a concavity back of and over the eyes.

The larger cranium was 61/4 inches long by 5 inches wide. One skull appears to be that of a woman. Another probably belonged to a man of great age. What his intellectual power was is only conceived through scientific eyes on examination of his skull. His long arms may have assisted him in swinging from tree to tree when pursued by fierce animals, as it is held by men of knowledge that men in the earliest stages had no weapons of defence except what nature provided.

A RACE OF GIANTS.

The structure of the mound above referred to is: Under three and one-half feet of yellow clay soil unlike that in the immediate vicinity. Under this came one and one-half feet of earth and ashes, very hard, with shattered bits of charcoal, and then, at the original level, the skeletons. The fourth mound explored developed two sitting skeletons with crania crushed, but some of the long bones were preserved. These indicate great muscular development and lofty statue.

The earth and ashes beneath the bones were stained deeply, showing the bodies to have been buried with the flesh. Webster dug actively and soon had four skeletons out on the surface from the next mound. The teeth of these were well preserved, but worn down, with the exception of one which had a large molar cavity, no doubt causing its owner considerable tooth ache ages ago before dentists were on earth. The lower jaw was massive and heavy and protruded brute-like. One skull appears to have been subjected to the action of fire before burial. These last finds were evidently bodies of two aged, one middle-aged and one younger individuals. The last mound opened resulted in three skeletons sitting with feet drawn under. No trace of pottery was found as in the graves of later generations, proving the bodies to be those of people who lived in the crudest age.

Prof. Clement L. Webster is a thoroughly reliable man, well known to all scientific writers and students, and there can be no question as to the greatness and importance of this discovery of what might be considered by some the "missing link." The remaining mounds will be opened in a few days.


