PARACELSUS WAS A PROPHET.

"The ordinary physician knows little about the phy-sical body, and nothing about the inner man, the cause of the emotions. Man's divine spirit is able to change his nature and to restore the health of the physical form. A physician who has no faith in spiritnal power, can be nothing but an ignoramus and quack, even if he had graduated in all the medical colleges in the world. Nature - not man is the phy-sician. Man has lost the true light of reason, and the animal intellect, with its speculations and theories has usurped the place. The ways of nature are simple, and she does not require any complicated prescrip-

Paracelsus was a prophet of the true healing art, and era, which Spiritualism is destined to establish and perfect, which materialistic scientists have failed to discover and must ever fail to establish.

"The wisdom of man is foolishness with the gods spirit. But wisdom which cometh from above - from the spirit spheres - is pure." The wisdom of the high-er spiritual realms is being poured out upon the world today in constantly increasing streams through mediums chosen by the spirits, on account of their gift of clairvoyance and other psychic endowments.

In my article in the Progressive Thinker, of November 6th, I refer to a medium of this class, who is an excellent illustration of my subject. I therefore use him again. This medium, Dr. J. S. Loucks, of Stoneman, Mass., is a man of sterling character, natural ability of a high order and rare gifts as a medium.
