MIND YOUR OWN BUSINESS.

It is a strange thing that the majority of people cannot mind their own business. About this season of the year, those who have to work ten to sixteen hours a day six days out of the week feel as though they wanted to get out and enjoy some of the pleasures that are enjoyed by those whose time is not so occuppied and they attempt to play ball, golf, go bicycle riding, have picnics, etc. Right here comes in a class of fanatics and under the obnoxious "Sunday Laws," arrest them for taking that outdoor exercise that is necessary for their health and as a relaxation.

Every Monday the papers are full of arrests made by fanatical people, mostly women and preachers.

It is too bad that these preachers can not be made to go out and do six hard days labor each week for a few months, then they would learn what it means to be bound down. They can choose their time to go out for recreation and although they do not labor but fifty-two days in the year, they always secure from four to six weeks vacation, thus cutting down their Sunday work to about forty-six to forty-eight days out of the year. During the rest of the time, they can devote themselves to reading, going fishing, hunting, playing ball if they want to, without in any way interfering with their labors while the labor they do is so slight that they would not suffer if they had no vacation.



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
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
