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

MEDIUMSHIP

Two Expressions on This Subject

HETHER or not there are more women mediums than men I do not know. Certain it is that there are more women mediums at work in the field of spiritualism than men. There are many causes which contribute to such a condition.

The first is money. Spiritualism is dependent upon the exercise of mediumship for the proofs of its philosophy. Yet the exercise of mediumship seldom pays the average worker enough so that he can support a family. Moreover, the development of mediumship often requires years of effort before it is of value for public service, and the wage earner, or the one who contemplates becoming a wage earner, many times rejects this field of effort, even though he may be gifted, because he feels that he cannot afford to sacrifice himself and perhaps others dependent upon him for support.

And just here, I wish to say that if we want more workers in the field, men of distinction and education, we must pay them a living wage. Such men and workers fill our ranks with adherents. The Master said, "The laborer is worthy of his hire."

Because of this condition there are too many untrained workers in the field, uneducated men and women, who cannot carry an appeal to the more intelligent class who are to-day, as never before, seeking answers to the questions, "Who and what am I?" and "Where do we go from here?"

Let us educate our mediums and, if they cannot afford an education, offer them one gratis. This training of public workers is the most important effort which spiritualism can put forth.

Every medium should be brought up to a certain standard before being permitted to use the platform for public appearance, otherwise such an appearance is derogatory to the cause which we represent, and attracts only an unthinking public eager for phenomena of any sort which may come through to them personally. We need more men on our lecture platforms.

Many women have come into public effort as mediums because their home environment was conducive to psychic development. Here they were quiet, often alone through the day, and with minds more or less unoccupied. No supervisor required them to be on the job every minute, neither was their livelihood dependent on their wits. Free and unoccupied minds are often used and developed by spirit powers.

Women, too, often turn to mediumship for cultural advancement, little realizing what mediumship really is. A medium is a channel merely, and the quality of the product coming from the medium depends largely upon their fitness for the work, their ability to express themselves, and the height of power they may attain. Mediumship and its exercise should never be looked upon as a pastime. It becomes dangerous when so used.

Women have sensitive natures, a first requirement for psychic development. They respond easily and readily to suggestion. Granting sensitiveness, the medium must set self aside and voice only the sentiments of another. If they cannot comply, they cannot do message work, nor any other mediumistic work, for all such efforts must, of necessity, come from the other side.

Psychic development in a medium is quite another thing. Development produces the seer, a state of being where the soul is conscious and in active use of its powers. A seer may himself reach a plane of spiritual knowledge and understanding, and be capable of imparting the knowledge thus acquired to others.

Such are spiritual teachers in their own right. Such an one was Andrew Jackson Davis, Hudson Tuttle, W. Colville, Emanuel Swedenborg, and a score of others, who penetrated the other side as free spirits and came back to tell us of their adventures.

Let those of us who are mediums see to it that we are such in character, in judgment, in self-discipline, that we may attract and hold those spirit advisers, who can use us for the benefit and enlightment of others. Such an attitude means our own growth, for we will then be considered as worthy to become pupils in that great school of higher understanding and spiritual enlightenment, which is ever open to the few who can qualify.

ERHAPS in answering the question so often asked, why more female mediums than males? it would give an illustration if I referred to one of my developing classes held not so many years ago. In this class of a dozen there were but two males, one

of which developed any phase of mediumship. Of the ten women, five gave signs of some form of mediumship, provided they would keep on with their development. Sad to relate, in the very beginning of good results, the two most promising ones stopped coming. They decided they were finished mediums.

The young man kept on until he developed to be a fair message bearer, receiving about fifty per cent of his messages correctly. However, he was naturally lazy, and, finding mediumship a way to earn a living, went in business for himself, as the saying goes. Now he is giving any kind of a reading asked for and receives a fee of twenty-five cents. It is such persons that hold back progress of TRUE SPIRITUALISM.

The females in the class all had husbands, and time to spare, none being business women. In the beginning they used the class as a sort of pastime. Seldom does a person who is actively engaged in business feel like giving up an evening or two a week for development and sit for seven years before doing public work (as my wife and I have done).

I have found that when a man does want mediumship and is willing to hold firm until he attracts the higher guides, his work is superior to the woman's work. It is very unfortunate that we have to depend on the elementals for our first demonstrations, the higher guides never coming until afterwards. So many stop at this point, content, saying why go further, I only want what I can get out of it in the way of money, and the public is satisfied. If they only realized that at this stage without good strong guides they are open to any earth bound spirit, and are often made to do and say things that are disagreeable to Spiritualism.

Looking back at some of these half-developed mediums (and it is the fault of the public, for they seem to be satisfied with anything instead of demanding the best), I see that every one of them has been the tool of some earth bound spirit at one time or another.

They knew the risk that they were running, but in their arrogance they thought themselves exceptions to the rule, and, without high guides and lacking will power to say "NO" to what their conscience told them was wrong, they soon became tools of earth bound spirits.

I have about come to the conclusion that it is a grave mistake to hold developing classes and turn out low-grade mediums, for there is no way of making them continue until efficient. Until the public actively demands and supports only the best, I suppose that we will continue to have less experienced mediums on our platforms and also doing private work.

The other funeral service was of a brother, also a good friend of mine. The preacher (naturally, a medium) did not consign the spirit to Heaven. In a few days the departed spirit gave its destination, one which many others should aspire to reach.

I cannot help offering my testimony, for the difference between these funerals was pronounced. It was evident that the spirit of the sister and her family did not have the light possessed by the brother and his family, and this is sad, for light is for all of God's children.

COSMIC VOICES

F ALL the gifts God gave to man, there is none that satisfies so many needs as the gift of speech. Hearing is necessary also, but there must be speech for hearing to serve its purpose so far as the transmission of thought by vibration is concerned; for hearing

THE FLOWERS

The glory of the Lord shall lendure forever: The Lord shall rejoice in His works. Psalm 104:31.

Plants are classified according to their duration and character into herbs, shrubs and trees. The annual herbs grow from the seed, blossom and die all in the same season. In this climate they generally spring from the seed in spring and die in the autumn or sooner if they have done blossoming and have ripened their seeds. The mustard and the common morning glory are familiar annuals. Plants of this kind have fibrous roots intended only for absorbing.

There are many individuals traveling this earth-plane who become desirous of reaching out. They put forth their best efforts for a while to tread the upward and onward path that would lead to a high destination in the realms beyond. They flourish for a season with good works, but after a while, becoming weary of the struggle, the steadfast purpose wavers and dies, and the guiding light of the goal ahead becomes dimmed by the glittering allurements of the material attractions that soon batter down the weak defenses of the flesh. The spirit is neglected and in sadness cries out against the conditions that arrested its growth and advancement. Then the individual in his ignorance ofttimes blames the Creator for the evil consequences of the conditions he has attracted and courted and caused to fall upon himself.

Biennial herbs do not blossom at all the first season, but live over the winter, flower the second year, and then die when they have ripened their seeds. The celandine, turnip, carrot, parsnip, beet and radish are familiar examples. It is interesting to note the mode of life in biennials. The first season they prepare and store up nourishment which they expend the next season in flowering and fruiting. So for the first year biennials are nearly all roots and leaves. Being a storehouse of nourishing matter, the root becomes large and heavy and serves to feed the plant so that it is enabled to bear flowers and seeds. Having accomplished its purpose, the root becomes light, empty and dead, as does the whole plant by the time the seeds are ripe.

During the brief season of our journey here it behooves us to exercise as much wisdom and foresight concerning spiritual things as we are wont to display in adjusting material conditions. As we zealously labor to promote our material advancement by hoarding up possessions, which, however attractive, must remain here when the spirit departs, so let us as diligently make preparation for our spiritual welfare in the realms. To this end we must expend our energy toward growing in righteousness, truthfulness and brotherly love so that we will store up for ourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through and steal. Then the fruitage of our life's labor will await our passing over, and our spirits will reach out in happiness to continue our onward journey in Spirit Land.

Perennials, like shrubs and trees, live on year after year. Of the many herbs that are perennial only a portion generally survives. Parts of the stem containing buds are always kept alive to renew the growth for the next season, and a stock of nourishment is also provided for new growth. Sometimes this stock of nourishment is laid up in the roots, as in the peony and dahlia, other times in particular portions of branches of the stem itself, as in the potato. The accumulation may also be in whole stems or branches under ground, while in some plants the leaves, or the lower end of the leaves, as the lily, hold the food.

All these plants teach us a lesson that persistent effort and labor must be expended to secure results, small and great. Provident preparation and attention to the little things brings the development of the bigger and grander conditions. If we are concerned only in keeping man's law to the neglected observance of the Laws of God, our lack of effort in this direction will show in the impoverished development of the spirit, which on reaching the far-off shore would fain cover up its uncomeliness and hide itself from view. While on earth it may have been encloaked in a beautiful temple of clay that it was pleased and proud to look upon, until death resigned it to mother earth. A beautiful spirit instead of a starved out, uncomely one might have emerged from this temple. The spirit fully disrobed of its earthly garb and all the falsity enveloping it, cries out and laments, as it understands that it is reaping what it A. M. W.

PSYCHIC DEVELOPMENT

By Rev. Milicent Hubbard PREFACE TO LESSONS



O FULLY understand the purpose of the lessons in PSYCHIC DEVELOPMENT, a limited explanation is necessary. No one should attempt to develop unacknowledged consciousness until they are prepared to make whatever sacrifice is necessary

for a full and complete unfoldment of the latent possibilities within themselves. And never should a person attempt to investigate the psychic realms, trusting to chance, for the dangers are very real and may retard spiritual growth instead of advancing one who seeks TRUTH.

THOSE who would investigate psychic phenomenon as a pastime would do much better to leave it alone rather than invite the elemental force, which is glad to manifest their presence and power. But if the student seeks to contact the intelligent spiritual entities, then he can follow these instructions with safety.

LESSON 1.

Choose a room where you will be insured against interruption, and arrange to have a dark blue light in one corner of the room. Place the light so that three-fourths of the room is in darkness. Be seated in a chair, not too tall nor too short, with a straight back. Sit erect, feet squarely upon the floor and hands resting comfortably in lap, palms turned so they may be made a point of contact. Empty the mind of all material things. Repeat this short prayer:

"Father of LIGHT and TRUTH and LOVE, I surrender myself for instructions to your representatives; those teachers from the spirit planes whom you have appointed to teach humanity the lessons of life. May I be receptive to their instructions, intuitively, clairvoyantly, and clairaudiently; thus becoming what you would have me, a psychic."

If possible, sing a verse or two of some hymn, for the rythm of hymns is better than secular songs and provides a better mental attitude for the sitter. Arrange for about thirty to forty minutes for the sitting. Be sure to register each sensation, vision, or thought, as each registration encourages the spirit teachers. Close by repeating:

"I thank you, friends and teachers, for your patient, loving help, and I will do my best to be worthy of your attentions. Good night, and may God bless you and your mission."

Set aside a certain hour once or twice each week, and let nothing interfere with the regularity of the time, and be sure to be prompt to the minute for the beginning of each evening's lesson.

Face away from the light and toward the dark side of the room. Open and close as directed for the entire series of lessons.

tered the doorway of the mind and man overestimated the material values of earthly life, including his earthly body, the temporary home of the soul. Fear manifested itself in story, song and praise, as superstitious periods produced superstitious beliefs. It was considered profane to reason beyond the narrow limits of established dogma and faith, rather than knowledge, became the foundation stone of spiritual building. Embarrassing questions of life that could not be answered in the light of faith were dismissed without answer, or at best were answered by warped minds in fear and trembling. The few crumbs of spiritual knowledge that were reluctantly fed to the hungry sheep of the fold did not satisfy, and slowly, but surely, the hungry sheep sought new pastures for spiritual food. It is true that many became indifferent to spiritual things, and the age of doubt was born. We are living in the age of doubt, as any well-informed clergyman will attest.

As dogma looks to the setting sun and watches the creeping shadows herald its dying age, it gathers its brood of varied sects beneath its trembling wing and doubts. Having sown fear it now reaps fear, and, having brought forth children of doubt, it finds doubt has taken hold with a strong grip. The slimy hand of doubt is feeling its way into sacred places and traditions, and who can stay its hand? The sanctity of the home is at stake as men doubt the value of life's richest blessings. The doubtful attitude of our youth, upon whom rests the progress of our civilization, shows a picture of the times. The thought may register in some minds that the picture is too gloomy, but the majority who will analyze will also agree.

If doubt is cast upon our present mythology as well as the mythology of the men of old, it behooves the children of men to reach out for evidence that will satisfy and thus remove doubt. A saving way was shown humanity some nineteen hundred and twenty-seven years ago, when the Master Teacher

trod our earth plane, showing no doubt or the fear of men's opinions, and who did not value the physical body as highly as countless so-called followers of His do today. No one questions that the Nazarene possessed wisdom, but many question that the wisdom he displayed is accessible to any other child of God; yet the Nazarene said it could be, and few today believe it. Here briefly is the balm for saddened hearts, disappointed lives and minds filled with doubt. The Elder Brother reached the heights of wisdom and in love pointed out the way of life, that straight and narrow path of spiritual rectitude. Follow it.

As the shades of doubt cover our earth plane and confusion of thought prevails, let us take courage in the knowledge that we are divine; as part God mould our characters in the light of truth. To the skeptic and luke-warm without poise and power (perhaps not altogether the fault of yourselves), do not feel that humanity has been lost, about to be engulfed. To the seeker of truth, looking up and beyond the opinions of men, you positively know that the Great Light is shining in all of its glory and will penetrate the gloom. The truth-seeker is like unto a wet blanket to the pessimistic doubter, and the doubter feels uncomfortable in his presence. The seeker taps the higher sources for his inspirations that bring knowledge, while the fundamentalist ripening into the doubter claims there is no further knowledge beyond what he at present believes.

As the purifying fires of life will have burned out the doubts of human hearts, men will progress, because they will seek. Our present age is but the door to knowledge. Humanity is demanding to know and raises doubt because it does not know. In the deep recesses of his better self, man is yearning for truth. He is no longer the infant in swaddling clothes, but has been growing for centuries. In his present adult age he does not want to be considered a child, and it would be foolish to expect him to try it. Let us look at the facts and not deceive ourselves, especially those who are trying to teach men how to live. As man has risen to material heights due to the spark of God within, why should that same spark remain fixed and immovable, fettered to tradition and unable to rise spiritually as the Supreme Force, God, had intended? Why should the more important side of life, the spiritual, take a back seat, so to speak, to further the interest of the material? There is no good reason for it, but due to the teachings of our ances tors, who, with all respect for them, were unable to provide the comforts such as we enjoy, did not hesitate to provide complicated dogmatic systems that did not permit of spiritual growth. However, the full grown man is reaching out as the God-part within asserts its growing strength. This condition is to be rejoiced over rather than regretted, for the spirit in man, that immortal part that never, never dies, is climbing the steep hills of spiritual progress to trace the lost image of the Father on high.

The developing spirit presses on, knowing the way to go. It has found that sweet communion with the Father brings peace that the world does not understand. It is trying to regain some of its lost estate, that Heavenly home of abundance for the pure in heart and the joys of the blessed it now longs for after feeding on the spiritual husks of men. The contrite spirit sees its mistakes, acknowledges them to the Father and is willing to make restitution for them. The Father hears the cry from afar off, and sends forth the illuminating light to guide the wayward home. If there is joy in Heaven over one sinner that repenteth, there is more joy in Heaven as that sinner remains firm in his repentance and offers to make good his shortcomings. Otherwise, where is the genuineness of the sinner's repentence?

Those who experience this spiritual upliftment soon find greater capacity for higher influences and vibrations. Under such conditions man comes to know those things that so few today have understanding of.


