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Nostradamus Prophecies Suddenly Hold Vital Interest in Soulcraft Broadcasts

HOW MUCH do you know about Nostradamus, the 16th Century seer, and his almost infallible prophecies about future events coming on the world up to the year 3,000 A. D.?

Listeners to the Magic Casements series of Soulcraft electronic broadcasts had their first reels dispatched to them this week concerning the background picture of Nostradamus—who he was and what he did—for playing to over sixty audiences on Sunday night, February 18th.

Who was Nostradamus?

The complaint was filed in response to a motion by Hamilton County Prosecutor Frances Neal, asking a new trial of the case in which Judge Tom R. White refused to surrender Pelley to North Carolina on charges of violating the Blue Sky stock law of that state.

Miss Neal said she petitioned for a new trial at the suggestion of Deputy Attorney General George W. Hand Jr. as the proper way to assist North Carolina in obtaining Pelley.

Hand said he would not formally enter the case until the petition for a new trial has been disposed of by Judge White.

Pelley's move to escape extradition alleged that the North Carolina effort is part of a conspiracy to punish Pelley for his fight on Communism.

It is also to seal Pelley's lips, the complaint says, on vital information he obtained as an agent of the United States Military Intelligence in Russia during 1917 and 1918, while Pelley posed as a YMCA secretary.

On that assignment, the complaint alleges, Pelley traveled 7,000 miles through Russia and Siberia, obtaining photographs and information desired by the Army.

He left Siberia with his material and carried confidential dispatches destined for President Woodrow Wilson.

"Due to petitioner's (Pelley's) services and acquaintance with military and secret service personnel, this petitioner came into possession of much secret information as to the operations of the Communist and internationalist element throughout the United States," the complaint stated.

They were then plotting and are still plotting the overthrow of the United States, Pelley charged.

The complaint continues:

"This plaintiff (Pelley) began using his talents and abilities as a writer in exposing the Communist and internationalist element seeking to take possession of the United States.

"He became engaged in the publishing business, printing and distribution of anti-Communist propaganda with a view of arousing the citizens of the United States against the dangers of Commu-

Pelley Fights Back with Claim of Radical Conspiracy...



HE Indianapolis Star for February 17th contained the following front-page article, which brings all Soulcrafters throughout the nation up to date on

the Pelley North Carolina extradition case. North Carolina has demurred at Indiana Judge White's decision, ruling that Pelley was illegally arrested on February 14, 1950, and requested that Indiana authorities appeal the decision for them, asking a new trial on the matter. In answer to their appeal, Pelley's lawyers filed an elaborate brief, charging an unconstitutional conspiracy on the part of subversive forces throughout the nation to deprive Pelley of his liberty and constitutional rights. The Star's story is as follows—

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 17—Charges that the late Federal Judge Robert C. Baltzell was duped into imposing a heavy sentence on William Dudley Pelley in 1942 are contained in papers filed yesterday in Hamilton County Circuit Court resisting Pelley's extradition to North Carolina.

George A. Henry, Pelley's attorney, stated that Baltzell was inflamed against



Pelley by anonymous telephone threats on his life, purportedly made by friends of Pelley but actually by enemies.

Their efforts were so successful that the judge slept with a loaded shotgun beside his bed the night before he sent-enced Pelley to 15 years in prison for sedition Aug. 12, 1942, according to the complaint.

What You Should Know about the Religion of Islam..



ONTINUING Valor's expoundings of other religions that have seized upon the devotional urges of mankind outside of Christianity, we consider this

week the theology of Islam, or as it is popularly described, Mohammedanism. Back in medieval ages the Arabs of the Near East arose in a vast paroxysm of religious frenzy and proselyted the teachings of Mohammed all over the Levant, pushing their conquests as far to the West as Spain, where they became known as the Moors. Who was Mohammed, and what did he teach, that caused a great desert people to embark on a program of such spiritual expansion?

Islam, take note, was an Arabic word meaning "pious submission to the will of God" and served as the label for the religion of the orthodox Mohammedans and hence used, generically, for the whole body of Mohammedan peoples. "Salama" from which the word is derived, appears in salaam, "peace be with you", the Semitic greeting of the East. In Moslem it essentially means to be "free" or "secure".

THE RELIGION of Islam, which swept the whole Mediterranean Basin in the Seventh Century, was the product of the thought and teachings of a poor camel-driver, one Mohammed, who had been born at Mecca, in Arabia, on or about 576 A. D. His father had apparently died before his birth, and his mother only survived him by a handful of years. He grew up on the largess of an uncle, whose armor-bearer he became in the incessant wars of the roving Arab tribes. There is a tradition that in his early years he was sent away into the desert to acquire the habits and language of the Bedouin tribes, and this seems to have been attested by the prophet himself. There seems to be little doubt that he often accompanied Meccan caravans to



the countries with which the Meccans had trade. Such especially were Syria and south Arabia, and perhaps Mesopotamia and Egypt. It is conceivable that he may have visited Abyssinia by sea.

His career as a caravan-driver appears to have terminated with his marriage to Khadija, daughter of Khuwailid, represented by tradition as a wealthy widow, fifteen years his senior, and forty years of age at the time of the union. This would bring Mohammed to the marriage at twenty-five. After his marriage, Mohammad appears to have been partner in a shop at Mecca where he apparently sold agricultural products. His literary style later was strongly marked by terms, phrases and metaphors drawn from that trade, although as a statesman he never displayed any strong financial ability.

On the whole then, Mohammed's early life seems to have been such as was normal in the case of a young man belonging to one of the more important families in a community which had not been long started on a career of prosperity.

OF the organization of that community—Mecca, that is—unfortunately we know very little, although we do hear of a council-chamber, and an age qualification for admission to it. The form of government seems to have been a rudimentary oligarchy—or rulership of affluential families—directed by some masterful individual. For the settlement of ordinary disputes recourse was had, in the main, to soothsayers, near or distant. The religion of the Arabs, before the advent of Mohammed, was a crude form of Animism, or Nature-Worship, or veneration of places, trees, and stones of divine

character. Mohammed himself, in his travels seems to have come into contact with Buddhism, Roman paganism, and Christianity-which he seems to have regarded as an adolescent departure from Judaism. Certainly Mohammed knew all about the Iews and their Mosaic religion. He appears to have been struck by the personalities of the founders of these religions then dominant in the civilized world, and to have aspired from the first to the place of legislator or mouthpiece for the Deity. The "Prophet" or "Apostle" was the divinely appointed dictator of his community. If he were not obeyed, the divine vengeance would overtake the disobedient.

THIS is the theory of the prophetic office that pervades the Koran, in which the doctrine is formulated that the nations each have their divine guide, and that Mecca before Mohammed's time had none. This place then, he felt a divine call to fill. But we are never likely to ascertain what first put the idea in his mind.

So far as Mohammed may be said from the first to have formed a definite notion of his work, we shall probably be right in thinking it to be a restoration of the religion of Abraham—or Ibrahim as the Koran calls him. But here is something we cannot ignore—

Mohammed was, in his own person, psychic.

He had a habit of wrapping himself in blankets, retiring within his tent, and "receiving messages" which he accredited to Divine Sources. That they might have been received from mere mortal persons in higher dimensions of Space and Time, communicating with him from their higher psychologies and angles of observation, doesn't appear in the text. Nonetheless, the man did get his instructions to galvanize himself and form a great religion under which the Arab tribes might all unite, and naturally, being an illiterate camel-driver, he interpreted such instruction as originating with God Almighty. Trusted followers were instructed to take down his utterances when he lay in these clairaudient trances. Apparently the purposes to be compassed was convincing his audiences of their miraculous origin.

The doctrines to which the Prophet

himself assigned most value would seem to be the unity of God and the future life, or resurrection of the body, which was a plain steal from Christianity.

MOHAMMED couldn't either read or write, but he could and did dictate—and he dictated what he heard from higher dimensions of Space and Time. Those intimately about him naturally concluded—being unlettered persons themselves—that God in Person was talking to this to-be Prophet, and hence proclaimed him as having unquestionable contact with divine sources.

His dictations, of course, became the Koran—which isn't a book of theological doctrine at all, but a book of the clairaudient transcripts of the Prophet lying in his tent wrapped in rugs.

And what was Mohammed's 'message"?

"Hark ye, all men! God is great. There is no God but God and Mohammed is the only prophet of God!"

That was the essence of all Mahomet's clairaudient recordings.

With that as the simple fundamental, he first converted his wife Khadija, his cousin Ali—who can only have been a mere lad at the commencement of the Prophet's "mission"—and one Abu Bekr, son of Abu Quhafah, afterward's Mohammed's successor. This last person became Mohammed's alter ego, and is generally known as the Siddiq—a Hebrew word signifying "saint"—but to the Arabs meaning, "faithful friend". His loyalty from first to last was absolutely unswerving, and he was selected to accompany the Prophet on the most fateful experience of his life, the Flight from Mecca.

THE THING that happened seems to have been that Mohammed first converted certain members of his own family to the divine sources of his clairaudient gifts, persuaded them that he could establish a civic-religious dictatorship over the pagan Mecca, and branch out from there to convert all Arabia to the monotheistic or one-God idea. He got so much influence inside Mecca that he raised up a storm of protest among the idol-worshipers and his battles of a long and hectic were on. Things became so hot eventually that he and his followers had to leave the place to avoid arrest and

death, and he fled to Medina—a city to the south. This Flight became known as the *Hijera*, or *Hijra*, and dates the true beginning of the Moslem "religion"...

In Medina, however, with his influence growing steadily, he had to procure money to carry on his proselyting. Hence he conceived the idea of robbing the passing caravans of the "Unbelievers"—as he labeled all Arabs who didn't accept his self-aggrandizing pronouncements as divine. He went at this in an amateurish way at first and for a whole year scored little success. But these inured him to events of blood and violence, and the ethics of what he was about didn't appear to worry him. Those not of the new faith deserved to be despoiled, is the way he seemed to have reasoned it.

It was from this systematic caravanrobbing that the Moslems gained their reputation as being good people to "join." All one had to do was declare publicly "Allah is God and Mohammed is His prophet" and one became a Believer. As for the new faith itself, it was devoid of any dogmatic doctrine or ethical formula. When the first opposition quieted down, and Mohammed had established himself at Medina-as the seat of his official "government"-with Mecca retained as merely a shrine-city where pilgrims could gather once a year, he started a new hornet's nest of trouble for himself by sending letters to the sovereigns of surrounding countries that unless they submitted themselves to his divine dictatorship he would consider them Unbelievers to be exterminated. The impertinence of it created fresh friends and fresh enemies, but the new religion was bringing the Arabs into prominenceand importance—throughout the whole Levant, and the series of desert wars that resulted extended the gains of the Moslems as far west as Spain . .

THE WHOLE program of the Moslems was more political than spiritual, and the mere word of the Prophet on this or that, was the law to be obeyed. Mohammed lived as he pleased, and did as he pleased, and if his public rose up and demurred, he cynically had a new "revelation" that made everything kosher. Whenever he withdrew into his tent and consulted his "mentors", the transcript

was added to the "holy" writings and propounded as the Word of God Himself. This became the Koran as we have it today. Whenever Mohammed heard of a new ruse for strengthening his power, it at once became a "holy" expedient, and among illiterate desert people, enjoying their first taste of world recognition, the Prophet could do no wrong. On this simple structure was Islam built. It was built on the old tenet that "the end justified the means" if it added to the glory of God, no matter who was despoiled or who suffered physically.

Of course in time it passed off the stage of history, because outside of Arabia it held nothing especially ethical or spiritual to sustain the souls of men.

But while it was in its heyday, it did furnish an irrefutable example of how psychical counsellorship could raise a man when the truth about psychical intercourse was not understood by the rank and file of devotees. It was the Piscean form of water-worship for a wild desert people. Coming five hundred to six hundred years after Christ, it drew on both Judaism and Christianity for its traditions. One of the things the Moslem stenographers, taking down the Prophet's utterances, couldn't understand was how he could lie quiet in rugs and narrate histories of past civilizations and peoples of whom he had known nothing prior to his trance. The sudden stipulations he laid down that all good Moslems should wash themselves before adjourning to evening prayer, had hitherto been unheard of. The "fire" of the Arien age had no part in the desert rites attendant on Mohammedanism.

What we have today for Moslemism is nothing but the remains and remnants of this civil-religious movement that rested squarely on Mohammed desiring to be the Hitler of his day and making good on it. Moslemism lacked even the ethical or philosophical premises that carried the religion of Buddhism across the Orient. To be a good Arab you had to be a good Mohammedan, and if you contributed to the power and prestige of the Prophet, you enjoyed your share of the lootings of Non-Believers that made Islam great in material wealth. You could also have as many wives or concurons.

bines as you could afford, and when you died, you went to Paradise.

The thing backfired on the Prophet.

He was said to have been poisoned by one of his harem wives who resented his attentions to Ayesha, a handsome and clever young girl who shared honors with Allah in dictating the Prophet's policies and fiats.

More about Telephones into the Beyond . .



PROPOS of the episode narrated in a recent the Philadelphia lady who got a discarnate voice over her magnetized telephone,

the Minneapolis Morning Tribune of March 27, 1947, ran an article that it headed: Calling the Spirit World, that doesn't make the Philadelphia story quite so screw-ball as might seem on first reading. The Tribune's article said-

THE day may be near, a leading psychic researcher said today, when you can pick up a 'phone and call the dead in the spirit world. The spirits of Alexander Graham Bell and Guglielmo Marconi have been telling him how, said John J. Williamson, founder and past president of the Society of Metaphysicians, Ltd. Williamson, who gets his information through living mediums, said Bell and Marconi seem tremendously excited about the idea and have poured across some 100,000 words of technical data.

They first told him and his research associates to use atom smashing machinery for mechanical communication with the other world, he said, but the cost seemed prohibitive. A cyclotron, even second hand, costs thousands and thousands of dollars. So Williamson began research at the society's research center, a big, hotel-like building in Hastings, Sussex, England, and developed what he called "far simpler" methods.

"If we can succeed in perfecting these methods", he said, "there is no reason why anyone cannot have a spirit telephone costing no more than five pounds."

That, said Williamson, would revolutionize the present psychical seance.

His views caused wide comment among Britain's spiritualists who, according to psychic societies, number about 30 per cent of the whole population.

A good many agreed with Williamson's thesis that human mediums can't really be depended upon. Most of them unintentionally garble messages from the other world, the spiritualists say.

Williamson's research is backed by the society, and his principal associate is Ernest Smith. Both sold their homes to finance the purchase of the Hastings Center.


When this Chapel gathers momentum I plan on turning it over completely to them, and get a new machine and start another group.

Have you had an unusual psychical or supernatural experience at any time in your life? What was it? Under what conditions did it happen? Why not make it of record in the Soulcraft archives? T IS, of course, a sullen grudge on the part of North Carolina's radical elements or ex-New Dealers that makes them continue to press for the

Editor's extradition. "Break him financially by causing him as much expense as possible" now seems to be the motivation behind that State's tenacity in seeking to go above Indiana Judge White's decision on December 22nd.

This forces Mr. Pelley to adopt the drastic measures of probing back into the case from its inception and showing the conspirational genesis of the whole prosecution—and persecution.

T. Emmett McKenzie, by his own election but with the assent of Mr. Pelley, has retired from the litigation. His drastic demands for incredible sums of money to induce him to continue as Mr. Pelley's counsel, were rejected this month and he is no longer the head counsel in Mr. Pelley's defense. The times have come, however, when still more capable counsel is both willing and eager to take up arms for the Editor. In filing answer to North Carolina's most recent demands for appeal from Judge White's decision, the whole question of the interests behind such prosecution—and persecution—necessitated Mr. Pelley's Indianapolis attorney, Judge George A. Henry, citing the Communistic personages behind the North Carolina action from the first. The Red radicals never seem capable of recognizing when the time is proper to quit and retire gracefully. The whole basis of their psychology is keeping things interminably stirred up, no matter what damage to themselves is precipitated.

Only recently it came to light in Indianapolis that a group of Communists in Fort Wayne, Indiana, during the course of the Editor's 1942 trial, not only called Judge Baltzell on the 'phone but wrote him letters—signing themselves Silver Shirts—that in event the Editor were convicted, the Judge would be killed on

sight. The Judge spent the last few nights of the trial sleeping with a loaded shot-gun beside his bed, and when time came for sentencing the Editor, he "went the limit" in the matter of vindictive penalties. This, of course, was precisely the way the Reds have planned it . .

Now these facts must come out.

Pelley had been advised during his trial in 1935 that a representative of New York radicals had visited a roster of Asheville law firms, offering attractive financial enticements to the attorneys who would find "something against" Pelley to shut up his publishings. His own lawyers placed one of the attorneys solicited, on the stand, but he was silenced by the Court and dismissed.

Pelley has petitioned Judge White to air the whole conspirational nature of the action against him in the Hamilton County court.

We'll see who wins out in the end!

nism which then and there, and now is, prevalent in the United States and now threatens to destroy our present form of government."

Pelley alleged that as a part of the conspiracy to silence him, "one Alfred Kahn was sent to Asheville, N. C., where he placed the sum of \$15,000 in escrow with one Heywood Parker, said funds to be used as so-called attorney's fees for the purpose of filing some criminal charge, whether well founded or not well founded, against this petitioner."

Kahn then was and still is associated with "known Communists and pro-Soviet agencies and is still carrying out this conspiracy," the petition says.

Charges of violating the North Carolina stock laws were filed against Pelley.

The sedition charges in Indiana were part of the conspiracy, the complaint states, and after Pelley was indicted his \$10,000 bail in North Carolina was forfeited.

When Pelley was released from prison a year ago after serving seven and one-half years of his original sentence, North Carolina launched its fight to gain custody of him on the old charges.

URING my illness this spring, a prominent business man from Greenville, Ohio, called upon me with a singular story. He said he had just been

informed by a minister in his city of a most unusual happening, and he had been so impressed by it that he had made a long distance call to the parties involved to verify the remarkable occurrence. This is what he learned:


