Connie Ransom 1906 - 2003

Whilst not born into Spiritualism, once Connie adopted it she quickly became involved. There will be older members at the Spiritualist churches in Finchley and Reading who will remember her well and be aware of the work she did there.

She devoted herself to The International Spiritualist Federation from the early 1960's and through that involvement she met many of Britain's leading post war mediums. These would have included Gladys Osbome-Leonard, Bertha Harris, Joe Benjamin, Nan McKenzie, Helen Hughes, Gordon Higginson, Harry Edwards, Maurice Barbanel, Robin Stevens and Ursula Roberts. Also because of all the work she did for the ISF she will be fondly remembered by Spiritualists all over the world, including Argentina, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Canada, France, the Netherlands, Scandinavia and the United States.

Those who only knew Connie from her attendance at ISF Fraternal Weeks in 1997 and 1999 didn't really know her at all. They will remember a slightly eccentric but loveable old lady who in 1999 went around all week with an increasing number of feathers in her hair.

The real Connie was a determined, innovative lady whose first great contribution to the ISF was to help President Margaret Wilson to hold it together during the early 1980's. These were the most difficult years it has ever experienced; years when financially it was living from hand to mouth and apathy surrounded the organisation like a thick fog. Had it not been for the efforts of these two ladies at that time, we would have had no ISF today.

Connie joined the Federation in the late fifties or early sixties and she soon became involved. Firstly helping May Brown check credentials at the 1966 Congress in Copenhagen, Denmark then in 1969 succeeding Harry Dawson as ISF Treasurer, which duties she carried out for almost 20 years. During her time as Treasurer she recommended the Executive Committee to buy stock in Great Universal Stores, an investment which is now worth many times what was paid for it and underpins our present financial strength. For several years she combined the duties of treasurer with those of Membership Secretary, until the indefatigable Kay Rumens took over that role.

In 1984 she became President and this was when I first got to know her. I was traveling regularly to the USA even then and she went out of her way to send me details of Spiritualist churches in America. I still remember the kind and encouraging letters she wrote. Robin Stevens succeeded her as Treasurer but after a while his health began to fail and he felt he could not continue in that role. Connie, typically putting the ISF's best interests first, agreed to exchange jobs with Robin and became Treasurer once more.

During her first term as Treasurer, the Federation was left a significant sum of money in the will of Mrs. Ivy Shelton. The Executive Committee decided to set up The Shelton Trust to administer this fund. Connie became one of its first Trustees and continued to be so until June last year.

Important though the foregoing work was, I believe it was as an innovator she made her greatest contribution to the organisation. As a result of her suggestion, Congress 1975 at Froebel College, London became the first Congress where accommodation for delegates and members, together with all meetings, took place in the same building. This format has been extremely successful and is still used today.

Being a maiden lady, Connie rarely had many people gather to celebrate her birthday each August. It is probably most unkind to suggest that this prompted her to launch our two-yearly week at Stansted Hall while she was President. Whatever the reason, Connie invented Fraternal Week and we were all more than happy to celebrate her birthday there each year!

Let us thank the Great Spirit for the life of Connie Ransom and for everything which she did for Spiritualism and to make the ISF the wonderful organisation we all love so much today. I am sure she will still be saying to everyone in spirit as she often did to me, "Don't worry. Life's too short, keep smiling!"

SELF AWARENESS AND HEALING FELLOWSHIP

I moved to Spain in 1992 and almost immediately started a Circle in my apartment. Every week more and more people were asking to join the Circle so I decided to find a public room to hold meetings. A member of the Circle contacted a snooker club, which had a spare room away from the bar (very rare in Spain where there are very few public rooms without bars!).

As the numbers attending our meetings increased, I was able to invite one UK Medium per month to spend a week with us, taking the meeting and giving private sittings. Eventually I was able to persuade people to attend workshops and my apartment became too small to hold all those wishing to attend and I moved to a house.

During this time we had to change the location of our public meetings several times and I decided we needed our own premises. With this in mind, I started looking for property with room to build and in December 1998 I moved to my present address and set about finding an architect and builder and obtaining planning permission to build a Centre. The meetings meanwhile continued in my sun lounge which held about 40 people.

The building was dedicated by Judith Seaman, a Minister of the Spiritualists' National Union, on 9 November 2000. At this time, because of problems with the builder, the interior of the building was incomplete, there being no tiles on the concrete floor and the kitchen was just an empty space. Because the Dedication Service had been advertised, we decided to go ahead with it anyway.

By January 2001 the work was completed and we were able to start a full programme of activities. Judith Seaman and her husband Barry had moved to Spain and Judith took over the organising of classes.

Our next step was to set up a committee and seek affiliation to the Spiritualists' National Union. In addition to the mediumship classes, we now hold a numerology class and a Chi Ball class and have fundraising events, such as Christmas Fairs and Open Days to attract other people to our Centre.

We have also held several Naming Ceremonies and a Wedding Blessing. We are now able to invite 2 mediums per month from the UK to take our 2 weekly services, give private sittings and run 2 one-day workshops.

We are also attracting people from the UK and other countries to attend week-long seminars, the first of which was held in June 2002 when a group of people joined us for a seminar with Judith Seaman and Margaret Falconer as tutors.

In November, we were joined by friends from the UK, Germany, Portugal and America for a Trance Seminar with Steven Upton and Judith, whilst Steven's wife Stella took a group on mediumship. We are planning several more seminars in 2003 and are looking forward to welcoming friends from other countries. Our congregation is mainly British, but we also have Swedish members and people from other countries who are holidaying here join us from time to time.

Although the Spanish attitude towards Spiritualism has eased somewhat, as yet we have no regular Spanish attendees, but hopefully this will change.

As you will realise we are a very lively and active Fellowship and are well blessed in having Judith Seaman as our resident Minister. I now feel I can relax and enjoy all the activities of the Fellowship.

He wondered who on earth is swimming at this time. He got out of bed and looked out the window. Seeing no one there he was alarmed enough to bolt downstairs and outside in his bvd's. There in the middle of the pool he saw a tiny baby squirrel lethargically struggling for its life in the cold water. He immediately rescued it with a skimmer net. The poor little thing was frozen to the point of almost immobility. It was a baby red squirrel; the body was about 4 inches and the tail a few more. He brought 'him in and in a few hours he was fine and trying to chew his way out of the plastic laundry basket and towels we had put him in. He now regularly visits our feeders and we call him "Chee Chee". ALONE on a GUIDED TOUR - part III

How did I ever end up in the tiny village of St. Ulrich in the very south of Germany in the middle of the Black Forest? I still do not know. Maybe I fell in love with its remoteness, its small old monastery, its scattered old farmhouses, the lovely green meadows, the forests and the spectecular view over the Rhine Valley to the French Vosges mountains in the distance.

The environment is completely different to where I grew up. I was born and raised in the north of Germany on the Baltic Sea amongst a family of sailors. For generations the men of my family have been seafarers. Those who joined the Navy later sailed amongst others on a sailing ship called 'Gorch Fock', a fourmasted sailing ship, used to train naval officers. This ship closely resembles the famous 'Pamir' which sank when I was about 7 or 8 years old. I still remember the day when the tragic news reached us and our whole family was devastated. Luckily there is still her sister ship 'Passat' which is based in the nearby harbour of Travemünde. I spent much of my childhood there, where my mother had been evacuated during the war and my beloved brother, now in the spirit world, was born.

My brothers and I started sailing when we were kids and I guess sailing and travelling is in our blood. It is therefore not surprising that I began travelling at a fairly young age.

Many years later I felt this urge to go down under to explore the magnificent islands of New Zealand. The following encounter happened shortly after I left a place called Kaikoura on the eastern shores of the South Island where I had been doing some whale watching out at sea. It was fascinating to watch these enormous mammals rising out of the water and diving back under with their tails high in the air.

I was slightly sad leaving Kaikoura, because it was my last day on the South Island where I spent such memorable, beautiful weeks meeting all sorts of lovely people. I was heading for Picton where I had to hand my rented car in to take the ferry back to the North Island the next day. I had one more night left. When I arrived at Picton, a beautiful small harbour by the sea I left it again straight away. I needed to be alone.

So I quietly and slowly started to drive up a twisty road which led up the mountain overlooking the Marlborough Sounds, an absolutely wonderful area with many inlets and islands. On and off wide openings in the lush vegetation permitted absolutely stunning views over the almost mystical bays below. The windy road was getting narrower, steeper and it eventually led me to a gorgeous secluded bay.

The place was called 'Te Mahia' and consisted of just one motel by the sea, and a few houses visible up on the hills in amongst the trees. The name of this hamlet so much resembled my name and as it was getting dark I decided to stay there.

I spent my last evening on South Island on the balcony in front of my room overlooking the sparkling sea below, drowning my 'sorrows' in a few glasses of red wine. I was so reluctant to leave.

Remembering my roots and where I came from I craved for a boattrip that would take me out to sea again to have a better look around these Marlborough Sounds. But alas - it seemed to be too late, I had to leave for the North Island in the evening of the next day.

The following morning, I just finished packing my car, slammed my boot shut and heard the familiar "took,took,took" of a small motorboat approaching the shore. Spontaneously I turned, approached the captain and asked if he knew of anybody taking people out to sea.

"Come with me, no problem. Just walk over there" he replied and pointed to a small wooden landing a bit further down the bay.

"I will come and pick you up. In fact, there are two other ladies wanting to join me, so I will take the three of you with me when I go out farming my mussels."

Only a few minutes later we are taking off in his small boat and the three Kiwis, those two ladies and the captain, start chatting away. I am listening quietly and from what I gather the ladies are from Christchurch, being out here on holiday.

I myself am in a pensive mood staring out to sea, reminiscing. We hardly exchange a word and I am therefore astonished when at the end of the trip the two elderly ladies called Yvonne and Sonia invite me to their place for a cup of coffee. I accept with pleasure.

When they ask me where I am from it transpires that Yvonne had been to Freiburg near where I am presently living.

She raves about the town and its surroundings including the Black Forest. One thing leads to another and we find out that each of us is living in a small cottage, mine having been an old tobacco store. That triggers off an experience that she had in a place called Kaysersberg at the foot of the Vosges mountain range. It is just across the border in France about 40 minutes from Freiburg. It is one of my favourite places in the Vosges. I love it, but it is very small and therefore I am amazed Yvonne knows this place. Feeling my excitement she continues telling me about other small places in the Freiburg area that she loved and went to, trying to remember their names. We eventually find out that she has been to a small town called Staufen, where I happened to start my own business and lived for some time.

Suddenly she is trying to remember the name of a beautiful monastery in the area. I am reciting all the famous ones and Yvonne replies: "No, no, no", trying hard to remember, "no, that's not the one." Eventually I mention the one in the village of St. Ulrich where I used to live. "That's the one!" she exclaims. I can't believe it. This place is so small, it has not even got a shop. It is on a dead end road leading into the Black Forest. Most people from the nearby town of Freiburg have never seen or heard of it.

So, here we are, in a remote area of New Zealand, talking about places and people that we both happen to know in and around this small village in the Black Forest in Southern Germany. Yvonne had been in St. Ulrich at exactly the same time that I had been living there. Still amazed about this incredible coincidence, Yvonne continues: "My husband and I loved this place so much that we even came back a second time after a trip up north to the Baltic Sea. You know, my husband used to sail on the Pamir," - with that remark my whole body is covered in goose pimples.

"He wanted to go and see her sister ship 'Passat' which is based in a small port called Travemünde" she says. By now, tears are welling up in my eyes. "Oh, I am just emotional" I say trying to excuse myself as the tears just stream down my face. She also knows the 'Gorch Fock' the ship on which many of my loved ones sailed - around which my brothers and I used to sail in our small sailing boat when we were young, exchanging jokes with our mates high up in the yards or waving goodbye when our men sailed to foreign countries.

After having experienced so many surprising 'coincidences' during my trip around the South Island of New Zealand, I can hardly believe that during those last hours of my stay I am to experience yet another one. My brother, father and grandfathers, now in the spirit world, were sailors and officers in the navy. Presumably one of them is behind this.

Still unable to control my tears and being slightly embarrassed in front of Yvonne and Sonia, I talk to my folks in the spirit world saying "that this is nearly getting too much". Emotionally I am almost unable to handle the quantity of these unbelievable encounters. But they did not abandon me just because I was leaving South Island, no, they continued to guide me invisibly for the remainder of my trip and afterwards.

Now, months later, I realise that I have developed so much faith that I continue to follow their signs and messages. At times it takes courage, for they seem to lead me into a totally new future in a different part of the world, amongst others having to give up my beautiful cottage near Freiburg.

These experiences - and there were many more during this very special trip and afterwards - taught me to trust in their and in the Divine Guidance. I am not alone on my guided tour.



SPIRITUALISM FOR LIFE

This is a complex subject as it involves my whole life. Spiritualism has always been part of me as I was born into a Spiritualist family, attended the Lyceum and the local Spiritualist Church. Because of my parents' interest in regional and national Spiritualism, I met many SNU national figures, including Gordon Higginson, who in his younger days regularly travelled to the North East to work for our local Churches. In later years, I had the honour of being on stage with him (along with many others!) representing New Zealand at the SNU Centenary celebrations at Wembley.

I didn't really know anything about the ISF then, except that there was such an organisation, and I remember that at least once or twice my father, Norman Ainley, attended the ISF Congress in London. I have the impression that they were always in London but that may not be correct, and were rather stiff and starchy affairs with rather academic theses or papers being presented, and without much of the fun and light-hearted fellowship we achieve today. I hope this doesn't offend anyone because, as I say, I had no first hand knowledge.

As is normal, I veered away from Church when I grew up, took up a career and left home, then later married and had children. My husband, Fred, and I emigrated to Auckland, New Zealand, in 1960 with two pre-schoolers and our third child was born there. We soon began to visit and then became members of Carlton Gore Spiritualist Church in Auckland. This is an ISF Church now but I don't know when their affiliations began.

However, it wasn't until we moved to Dunedin in 1966 that my interest in Spiritualism was seriously re-fired. Dunedin Church was one of the first in New Zealand and began in the 1920s, when a few pioneers visited and toured the country. These included Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Robert Stout and others.

Some of those early established Churches formed an association together, called The Spiritualist Church of New Zealand, and in 1924 this was ratified by an Act of Parliament, called The Spiritualist Church of New Zealand Act. So, from then on there has been a national Spiritualist organisation in NZ, but there have always been many more Churches outside the SCNZ than within it.

Some are Christian Spiritualist and affiliated to the Greater World, and many more are independent. All this makes for as interesting a mix of Spiritualism as may be found anywhere.

My personal involvement with the Dunedin Church grew rapidly as I joined the committee, accepted every office in turn, and became a Minister in the 1970s.

Learning about Spiritual Healing and then looking after the Healing in the Church is something I have always done in Dunedin. I was also involved nationally and became National President for 12 years in the 1980s and 1990s.

During that time, I did my best to interest independent Churches in becoming part of the SCNZ, but must admit that most of them preferred to retain their independence. When I retired from that position, I just knew it was time to hand on to someone else.

In the 1980s, I contributed a number of times to a weekly Sunday morning radio programme called 'Faith for Today'. This was 4 to 5 minutes long about ordinary life situations. No mention could be made of Spiritualism, but it did bring in my personal reactions and feelings, obviously coloured by my beliefs, and I received some wonderful letters from people all over the country. I have enjoyed, and am enjoying, my association with the ISF. There are
