I N T R O D U C T I O N.

IN the preface to my last year's Almanack, I gave you some account of the Sun, as being the fountain of light, heat, warmth, &c. to all the inhabitants of this terraqueous globe, and therefore I shall in this endeavour to explain some of the principal phenomena of the Moon, and likewise shew what influence that planet has over the various diseases peculiarly incident to the human body, deduced from the well attested observations of ancient and modern Philosophers, Physicians, and the writings of other learned and eminent men.

The periods of epileptic diseases are, according to Galen, governed by the Moon, insomuch that the fits in that disorder, do constantly return with the new and full Moons; for this reason, those who were affected, the Latins termed Lunatici. Bartholin relates a story of a young woman, who had apparent spots in her face, which, according to the time of the Moon, varied both their colour and magnitude. Baglivi tells us, he was acquainted with a learned young man at Rome, who laboured under a fistula in the abdomen, penetrating to the colon, which discharged so plentifully in the increase, and so sparingly in the decrease of the Moon, that the patient could make a true judgment of the periods and quadratures of that planet, from the different quantities of the matter at those times discharged. Niphritic paroxysms are also observed to obey the lunar attraction: Tulpius relates the case of an English minister at Amsterdam, one Mr. Ainsworth, who had a fit of the gravel, attended with a violent suppression of urine, every full Moon, of which

which he found no relief till the Moon decreased, unless by bleeding at the arm.

In our Philosophical Transactions, No. 272 and 171, are related two notable instances of the effect of the lunar attraction upon violent hæmorrhages; the first, of a person who, from his infancy to the twenty-fourth year of his age, had, every full Moon, an eruption of blood, on the right side of the nail of his left thumb, at first to three or four ounces, and, after his sixteenth year, it increased to half a pound each time, which, when by searing the part afflicted with a hot iron, was stopped, the youth fell into a sputum sanguinis, this brought on a consumption, from which however he was in some measure relieved by frequent bleeding; but being young, and of a robust constitution, he was at last, with great difficulty, intirely cured. The other instance was in the person of an inn-keeper in Ireland, who, from the forty-third year of his age to the fifty fifth, in which he died, suffered under a periodical evacuation of blood, at the extremity of the fore finger of his right hand; and, although the fits here kept not their returns so certain as in the case above-mentioned, the discharge seldom fell short of four pounds at a time. This strange hæmorrhage first began at Easter full Moon, at which time it is a received opinion, that the attraction of the atmosphere is greater than at any other time whatsoever.

A Table of the Moon's Age for every Day throughout the present Year 1782. Whereby, with the Help of the next general Tide-Table, the Time of High Water at all the Places above-mentioned in it, are shewn by Inspection.

An Explanation of this and the following Table.

First find the Month in the Head of the Table, and the Day in the first Column on the left Hand, and in the Angle of Meeting you have the Day of the Moon's Age, with which enter the following Table, and find your said Number in the left Hand Column, and overagainst it in the other Columns is the Time of High Water at all the Places abovementioned, by Inspection. *Example.* January the 24th, I find the Moon to be 11 Days old, and over-against 11 in the 1st Col. I find 11 Hours 48 Min. in the 2d Col. 10 h. 18' in the 3d, which are the Time of High Water at all those Places mentioned above in the 2d and 3d Columns. *Etsic de ceteris*


The miserable situation or death of a Prince threatened; Mars in Gemini in the ninth house, one of the airy triplicity, the day house of Mercury, will be plotting all manner

OF THE SUMMER QUARTER.

THIS quarter commenceth at the very moment when the Sun apparently toucheth the first scruple of the tropical

tropical sign Cancer, making the days longest, and nights shortest to all the northern inhabitants.

The time of this ingress falls this year on Friday the 21st day of June, at 20 minutes past 9 o'clock in the morning, at which time, in the latitude of London, 24 degrees of Taurus culminates, and 3 degrees of Virgo is on the cusp of the ascendant; Saturn is lurking in the fourth house, and Jupiter retrograde in the same, the Sun, Mars, and Mercury in the eleventh, and Venus in her own sign, in the tenth house. Thus are the planets situated at this ingress. The angles are part moveable and part fixed. Four of the planets are angular, and Capricorn, the significator of America, is on the cusp of the fifth house, and the Moon, representative of the common people, debilitated in the fourth house, shews much murmuring, poverty, and multitudes of distress among them. Jupiter, significator of their clergy, retrograde in the same house, plainly demonstrates, that they announce such doctrines as are repugnant to sound religion and good policy; and stimulate their counsellors and law makers to war and oppressions of every kind. But to counter-act this, we must here observe, that Mercury is lord of the ascendant, in company with Mars, and the Sun in the eleventh, in Cancer, whereby I judge many questions will be agitated, relative both to peace and war, and so divided are their councils, that what they resolve one day they are ready to rescind the next. What the event will be we must leave to the Almighty's dispensation. Upon the whole, the planets portend a fruitful and healthy Summer, and that matters of the highest concern are now carrying on in different parts of the globe.
