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INTRODUCTION.

THE decided advance that Mesmerism has made as a curative power, the variety of diseases to which it has been successfully applied, all show that it has been received and acknowledged as a healing remedy.

For upwards of eighty years, the constant and unwearied researches of men the most distinguished, both for their intellectual powers and respectable position in society, have procured for Mesmerism many valuable works, and which have contributed to raising it to a very high place in public opinion. It was Mesmer who first laid the foundation of this noble science, by the happy inspiration with which he so powerfully influenced his earliest disciples.

Thanks to the constant and well supported efforts of several great men, the power of Mesmerism, as a curative agent, can no longer be called in question by any one who has a mind capable of conceiving and admitting what is so evidently true. Every day, new cures, collected by able practitioners, add to these proofs, already numerous, of the success obtained through the application of this science.

The object I have in view is to prove that man is possessed of a supreme faculty, which constitutes his essence, and that he can transmit that faculty to his equals.

Can there exist anything more interesting for man, who is subject to all physical evils, than to find in his friend, his wife, or his child, the power of relieving him, of bringing him back to life by curing him of the illness with which he may be afflicted.

MESMERISM.

AND

ITS HEALING POWER.

PART I.

"All things are marked and stamped with triple character; the power of God, the difference of Nature, and the use of Man."—Bacon's "Advancement of Learning." Book II.

Since the remotest times, the wonders of Mesmerism appear to have been well known to all nations of the earth. But in consequence of the total ignorance which has prevailed respecting the agency through which they were produced, these wonders have, for the most part, been ascribed to supernatural causes.

In the beginning of the eighteenth century, Mesmerism was considered as a particular agent. The study of it, may be well said to be study of life in Man.

The Mesmeric agent, or vital fluid, which has been also styled Animal Electricity, is that mysterious something by which the human body is put in motion according to the will, and is enabled to think, reflect, and judge.

Mesmerism may be easily characterized. It is an imponderous fluid, which can be felt and measured, and the power is revealed by effects the most constant, although, when considered with respect to their origin, the most incomprehensible. It is undoubtedly of all agents the most subtle, and is infinitely quicker than lightning.

The more the Mesmeric agent, or fluid, abounds with us, the more we possess life, strength, health, and intelligence. Whilst if we be deprived of it, we become weak and

feeble, and the mind itself lessens with our energy.

In effect our ideas are the more clear, our thoughts the more abundant, and our perception the more keen, as we invite to the brain a larger portion of the Mesmeric fluid.

I say, in order that Man may be in a sound condition of existence, both as to mind and body, an exact harmony, a perfect equilibrium must prevail between the material and spiritual life. Hence it is, if we exercise only the mind without taking any care of the body, the latter will weaken and decline. This is why we see so many children richly endowed with intelligence, sink in their very infancy, for want of that physical education which their state requires.

Man can, through his will, and the power of that faculty by which he moves and breathes, often exercise upon his fellow creature an influence. This influence is the principle which has received the name of Mesmerism. We have this faculty as much as we desire it.

In order that one person may, as a Mesmerist, act upon another, there must necessarily exist a feeling of sympathy both moral and physical. The physical sympathy is established by concentration; the moral sympathy by the desire that one has to relieve the other.

Thus the first condition necessary for Mesmerising is a strong will. The second, is that confidence which he who mesmerises has in his own power. The third is benevolence, or the anxious desire of doing good.

The action of Mesmerism is, in its principle, spiritual, because such is really its origin. But it is physical in its effects, because when it produces modifications on the system of the patient, these modifications cause themselves to be felt by the body animated by that principle.

It seems astonishing that one man can, by the mere action of his will, produce a wonderful change in the physical and moral appearance of another. But is not the reciprocal influence of the mind and the body in man also astonishing? A nervous disease can elevate all his faculties; a single idea in an instant destroy his whole system. How many examples there are of sudden deaths having been caused by excessive joy, or by violent grief? A single spark is sufficient to cause an explosion in a powder magazine. The contact of several different kinds of metals will often produce galvanic effects the most inconceivable. A ray of light, on penetrating certain dark places, may give a new existence to all the living objects they contain. The exact relation of cause and effect is a general law, of the reality of which we may convince ourselves by reasoning upon it.

The phenomena of Mesmerism have been

witnessed in all times, just as that of gravitation have been witnessed in all bodies.

Like all the intellectual and physical sciences which have, for the last fifty years, travelled with gigantic strides on the great highway of progress, the knowledge of the principles and laws of life have been studied with so much perseverance and success, that at present every one has an idea of Mesmerism.

There exists in Nature an universal fluid, which governs and modifies all existences, and which has, in its special relation to man, received the name of Animal Magnetism, or Mesmerism.

Mesmerism is an existing fact. It is the principle of life, which is diffused by the Almighty throughout all Nature; which enters into light, heat, and electricity; which is acting within us, beyond us, and unknown to us; which is developing itself under the influence of moral causes or patho-

logical accidents, is denied by no one who has taken the trouble of making the phenomena of the external world a study. Every one also knows—we might say, every one feels—that there exists within us a hidden, even a divine power, by which we are animated, and which is within the province of our will to manifest or propagate.

By the study of Mesmerism, both the infinite goodness and the vastness of the work of the Supreme Being are displayed.

Habit and observation will soon remove the feeling of prejudice. The strangeness will pass away. People will perceive what a simple, easy, and natural power Mesmerism is; and when, day after day, they shall be privileged to witness some dear and beloved relative relieved or comforted by its means—or when they themselves, after the agonies of pain, shall have found a respite or a cure, their prejudice will soon be turned into gratitude to the Author of all good, and with myself they will say that Mesmerism is a gift of God.

Mesmerism has no danger. Should it fail of doing good, it would do no harm. be a good mesmerist, experience and knowledge are indispensable. Temper, patience, and presence of mind are also requisites; and as we have stated, character and right principle must not be forgotten. As there is every certainty that Mesmerism will shortly take its rank among the established branches of the medical art, a supply of qualified practitioners will be soon forthcoming. Nurses will be taught to mesmerise. Prejudice in our days is becoming silent, because its application has been patronised by the greatest men of this land.

By Mesmerism, the diseases subdued have been very remarkable; tic-douloureux, epileptic fits, brain fever, deafness, weakness in the eyes, neuralgic pains of all kinds, loss of voice, paralysis, fevers, inflammations, and a variety of other disorders; cures have been effected where all other means have failed.

If anything can lead to a happy reform in the habits of a people, it is surely Mesmerism. Its practice reveals physical and moral virtues almost unknown, and the beneficial effects emanating from it, and the simplicity of the means through which, by the Divine will, they can be obtained.

The usual means employed by Hippocrates, whether for the preservation of health or the cure of diseases, were frictions and manipulations.

The imposition of hands, so commonly used in Asia, the miraculous cures effected by rubbers, are the operation of Mesmerism. Frictions have become quite an art of healing, and it is only a branch of Mesmerism.

Professor Laisné has published a book on

Massages, Frictions, and Manipulations. His cures are very numerous and marvellous. As I said before, frictions are only what I should call "direct Mesmerism."

Mesmer, aware how considerably electricity enters into human Magnetism, conceived the Mesmeric tube. This was a wooden vessel not in contact with the ground, having an iron rod standing in the centre of it, and being nearly filled with different metals symmetrically fastened to some wires and small chains, which were held at the same time by two of the patients, while the others took one another by the hands.

Every living being is a real electro-body, and is constantly impregnated with this active principle; but all are not so in the same proportion, some having more of it, and others less; and hence, in great measure, the difference that prevails in temperament and constitution. The mobility of this

agent becomes still and simple in consequence of this variation; and we can therefore conceive that it must be repelled by some, and eagerly attracted by others, and the proximity of him in whom it abounds must be advantageous to him who is in want of it. The cohabitation of a child with an aged person must be good to the latter, and hurtful to the former. Vegetables close to a nursery garden are vigorous and fresh, but when they are allowed to grow near a large tree, they dry up and wither.

Mesmer was led by a series of minute experiments to proclaim the truth of an agent, of an universal fluid which he named Animal Magnetism, and of which he had studied the wonderful properties. This fluid which could, he perceived, disengage itself from one body and be transmitted to another, acted as a most efficacious agent towards curing numerous illnesses for the removal of which medicine was found wholly ineffectual.

Becoming possessed, through the kindness of his disciples, of a considerable fortune, he undertook to establish in all the principal towns of France, Mesmerism as a curative agent. The propagation of the system progressed as favourably as could be expected. Thoroughly convinced of the existence of a transcendant physiology, he had sought the nature of the force which vivifies man, and persuaded of the reality of the universal fluid, of that fluid which is the principal of life, he felt that man is possessed of a power peculiar to himself.

De Puységur, by revealing the psychological virtues of which some persons are possessed while under the influence of Mesmerism, gave to this science an entire new aspect. From that time the phenomena of clairvoyance constituted Mesmerism.

How, in our days, can any one deny the existence of a curative fluid by which our fellow-creatures are so often relieved?

Being provided with this great truth,

Mesmer thought no longer but of making experiments, which might bring home conviction to every mind, and instruct at the same time. How often, while placed by the bedside of a patient, his active and benevolent will moderated a burning fever, or restored to the sinking frame its wonted strength!

There exists an uncreated principle, which is God; there exists two created principles Matter and Motion.

Man, by reason of his preservation, is to be considered in a state of sleep, in a state of wakefulness, in a state of health, and in a state of illness.

The assemblage of matter, by which he is constituted man, may be increased or diminished.

The diminution must be repaired; the matter lost is therefore made up by means of food.

The quality of motion is renewed by sleep.

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As man is subject to two kinds of losses, so are there two kinds of reparation, namely, by food and sleep.

The sleeping state of man exists when the exercise and functions of a considerable part of his being are suspended for a time, during which the quantity of motion lost while he was awake, is repaired by the properties of the universal currents in which he is placed.

There are, with respect to man, two kinds of universal current: namely, gravity, and the magnetic current from one pole to another.

Man is in a state of health when all the parts of which he is composed have the power of performing the functions for which they have been destined.

If a perfect order reigns throughout all these functions, this state is called the state of harmony.

Illness is the opposite state; that is to

say it is the state of disorder or disturbance. As harmony is single so is health.

Health is represented by the straight line.

Illness is the deviation from this line; this deviation may be more or less considerable.

The remedy is the means by which the order, or the harmony which has been disturbed, is restored.

The principle which constitutes, re-establishes and preserves harmony, is the principle of preservation; the principle of curing is therefore necessarily the same.

The vital principle being a part of the universal motion, and obedient to the common laws of fluid spread throughout nature, is therefore submitted to all the impressions of the celestial bodies of the earth, and the particular bodies which surround it.

This faculty or property in man, of being susceptible of all these relations, is what is called Mesmerism.

The Mesmeric currents can be propagated at a considerable distance.

The faculty of feeling in the universal harmony, that connection which beings have with the preservation of each individual, is what we should call instinct.

All animals are endowed with this faculty; it is submitted to the common laws of sensations, and which are stronger in proportion to the interest events have in our preservation.

Sight is an instance of a sense by which we can perceive the connection which coexisting beings bear to one another, as well as their relations and actions concerning us previously to their contact with us.

A man insensible to instinct, is as a blind man with regard to visible objects.

Instinct is in nature; reason is factitious; every man has a reason of his own; instinct is a determined and unvariable effect of the order of nature over each individual.

The life of man is the portion of the universal motion, which, in its origin, becomes tonical and applicable to one part of matter.

Death is the complete abolition of the tonical motion; the life of man commences by motion, and finishes by repose.

Every development and formation of the organical body, consists of the various and successive relations between motion and repose; their quantity being determined, the number of their possible relations ought also to be determined. The distance between two terms, or points, may be considered as representing the length of life.

If one of these terms be motion, and the other repose, the successive progression of the proportionate length of each of them constitutes both movement and revolution.

If man goes through this progression without its proportions being disturbed, he

reaches his final term without illness; if these proportions are disturbed, illness must be the consequence.

An illness is, therefore, nothing else than a disturbance in the progress of the movement of life.

An illness being a deviation from harmony, this deviation may be more or less considerable, and its effects be more or less felt.

All the causes of illnesses do more or less pervert or derange the proportions between matter and motion; between the solids or the fluids; they produce by their different applications a remission or disturbance more or less distinct in the properties of matter, and of the organs of the human system.

To remedy the effects of the disturbance to which we refer, and to destroy them, it is therefore necessary to provoke the intention; that is to say, it is necessary to increase irritation, elasticity, fluidity, and motion.

A body in a state of harmony is insensible to the effect of Mesmerism; because the proportion of harmony established is not varied by the application of a uniform and general action; on the contrary, when a body is not in harmony, Mesmerism can restore it to such a state.

No illness is cured without a crisis. In a crisis, three principal epochs may be observed; the disturbance, the digestion, and the evacuation.

The crises the less evident, are those in which Nature acts secretly, without violence, by breaking slowly the obstacles which stopped the circulation, and throwing them off by imperceptible perspiration.

When Nature is not sufficient towards bringing on a crisis, she may be assisted by Mesmerism.

A vast number of persons have been

cured by Mesmerism. Every day progress is made in the science. We now possess a great many works on the subject, many of which have been written by the most celebrated men of the day. The chirurgical operations performed during the mesmeric sleep were alone sufficient to prove the immense advantage that may be derived from the the use of mesmeric sleep.

As the limits of this book do not allow me to cite cases of operation, I shall refer the reader to my work on Animal Magnetism and Somnambulism.

"They are scarcely worthy of the name of physicians or physiologists, who say that Mesmerism determines no changes in the organization, or that it does not possess powers in the cure of diseases."—Rostan.

DIFFERENT COMPLAINTS TREATED BY MESMERISM.

Abscess.—In the year 1870, I received a letter from the Countess de P——, dated from her château in France. In this letter, she said that her husband, whom I had already attended ten years previously in London, was suffering with an abscess, very deeply seated in the left groin. Some months before he had had a bad fall from

his horse. An abscess formed itself. A celebrated surgeon had been called to make an operation; it was a most difficult one. The abscess began to discharge; so much so that the patient became very weak. The leg became thinner and thinner. At times he was very feverish, and had no appetite, was unable to move on either side. Sometimes, by the help of ropes, he would move a little the upper part of the body. just to make room for changing pillows, but always with much pain. Seeing his health declining rapidly, the Countess wrote to ask whether I could not come and attend him—their last hope being placed in Mesmerism. I left London for their place. As soon as I arrived I began to mesmerise It was indeed a very serious case. I found the patient as already stated. The abscess discharging profusely; the leg very much reduced and emaciated.

From experience, I saw at once what I had

to do. I mesmerised him strongly three times per day. I gave tone to the digestive organs; to all the vital functions. beginning of the treatment could not have been more satisfactory. His appetite improved daily. He became cheerful. After the first mesmerisations he gladly acknowledged the good I had already done him. Mesmerism assisted Nature in every way possible. Whenever a new abscess formed itself, I always succeeded in curing it. After a few days the matter changed colour, and became less. When new abscesses were forming, he would have high fever, which I always took away in one mesmerisation. We all noticed a daily improvement. He always felt better after each setting. He acknowledged to Dr. Clinchamps, (the family doctor), that Mesmerism had saved his life. I mesmerised him during ten weeks; after which I gave a few lessons to his wife, but she was too

weak herself to undertake to mesmerise him.

Since my attendance I have heard good reports. He is able to use his leg which was almost despaired of.

My patient had been a Mesmerist himself, therefore he had faith in the science. He continued to be mesmerised for five weeks more.

During the year 1874, Mrs. H—— consulted me respecting a pain in one of her legs. For a few days she had a red spot on the leg near the ankle, very painful. The ankle was very swollen. A few days after, an abscess formed itself. I mesmerised her during five or six weeks, daily. She is perfectly cured.

In the year 1872, Mr. R—— was mesmerised during a week after an abscess, which had left the leg in a very weak state. Mesmerism gave him general strength.

Mr. H—— was attended in the year 1872

for abscesses; they were small and painful. He was mesmerised during four months with good result. He gained strength, the nervous debility disappeared, the circulation much improved.

The surgeons of the present day are convinced that the discharge and healing of abscesses are done simply by force of Nature. To avoid stagnation of matter, they recommend cleanliness in dressing and fresh air. My opinion is that Mesmerism would always prove successful in such cases. Some cases of abscesses have given much trouble and fatigue. But I always found patients suffering from such disease, always resigned and able to appreciate the good of Mesmerism.

Alienation.—This dreadful complaint may be cured by Mesmerism; but it is very necessary to know how to conduct such treatment. It is generally very long, tiresome, and sometimes discouraging.

In the year 1845, I was consulted for a disordered state of the mind. The parents of the patient were anxious to try Mesmerism. When I arrived, I found it at first no easy matter to approach the patient. I was obliged to have recourse to auxiliary mesmerisations, by mesmerising him at a short distance, also mesmerising water to drink. After a short time, we perceived that he was becoming calmer. At length he allowed me to approach him; and in a few days more I succeeded in inducing him to sit down before me. The more the treatment continued, the more docile he became. At the end of a few months, it was in every one's power to appreciate the happy change he had undergone. He, who so shortly before could not recognise any one, would now come and bid me good morning, and at every mesmerisation he would shake hands with me. In short, it was easy to perceive that his reason was daily returning, and

when I left he was in excellent health. I have been consulted in London for a little girl who was recommended to me by Dr. Ashburner. She was a very interesting child, and I felt an ardent desire to cure her; and on examining the character and extent of the mental affection with which she was afflicted. She could not, so deplorable was her state, recognise her mother. At the first attendance, Mesmerism had the effect to soothe her very much. The more I proceeded with the case, the more sanguine were my hopes. She progressed daily under Mesmerism.

In the year 1869, Mrs. E—— was suffering much with great depression of spirits. Her great trouble was that she must have offended the Holy Ghost, and she could not be saved. Her father came to me, explained the case, and wished me to attend her. I understood that she had been so for many years. She was married. After her con-

finement she became worse, taking no notice of any one. I mesmerised her twelve times. Mesmerism was effectual from the first attendance. After the first sitting she became brighter, and promised to endeavour to struggle against these low feelings. At the second visit she felt so very happy, that I concluded Mesmerism had done wonders. At the sixth mesmerisation she was so well that I considered her cured. But her father and husband wished me to attend her again, which I did. She has never had any return of the malady.

Asthma.—In the year 1852, I was at Berne, attending several patients, among them was a gentleman who had been suffering from asthma for upwards of twenty years. Every medical treatment to which he had been submitted, proved wholly ineffectual. He followed my treatment. During six weeks I mesmerised him three times a day. A great improvement in his health was

soon perceptible. He could eat, walk, and sleep in his bed, which he had not done for many years. Being obliged to return home, one of his daughters, to whom I taught how to mesmerise, continued the treatment with success. I received the following letter a little time after.

"Dear Mr. Didier,

"Thanks to you, my health continues to keep up, and I am beginning to gather a little flesh, and every one finds me looking much better. I can now always sleep. Ever since your mesmeric treatment, there has been no appearance of that fever, nor of those fits of coughing with which I had been annoyed for twenty-five years.

"Deign, Sir, to accept my profound gratitude.

"F. DE G. M."

In the year 1851, I was residing at Tor-

point, near Plymouth, at the house of Lady H——. During my visit, I was requested to attend Lady S. W—— for asthma, and general debility. The attacks were very severe. I mesmerised her for one month. The cough and expectoration disappeared totally.

I shall always remember the kindness of this lady. In order to show her gratitude to the science which was the cause of the recovery of her health, she spoke of it to everyone. Through her kind patronage, I was enabled to convince many persons; to that effect I gave several lectures at the residence of General Murray.

It was the same some years after, when Lord Ingestre became, under my instructions, a Mesmerist. By his kind recommendation I gave a lecture at Lord Combermere's.

Captain H—— of the 1st Life Guards consulted me in 1851. He was a great

sufferer from asthma. I mesmerised him twice per day, during six weeks. I may say Mesmerism had a salutary effect from the first attendance. The crises of coughing were not so frequent. He soon gained strength, and was able to go through his duty without those paroxysms of coughing, for which he was in fear that he would have to give up his profession. Some time after I received the following.

"Dear Didier,

"I have delayed some time without writing to you, in order to convince myself of my having been radically cured.

"It is now with the greatest pleasure I can inform you that I am perfectly well, and that thanks to you, this illness from which I scarcely expected to recover, has left me, and I can now affirm that Mesmerism was the powerful agent.

"H——
"1st Life Guards, 1852."

In the year 1860, Mr. M——, who had been suffering for many years from asthma, consulted me, and placed himself under the mesmeric treatment. He was in fear to have to give up his studies at Cambridge, owing to that painful disease. He was mesmerised for two weeks. Left cured.

In the year 1864, Mrs. H—— was suffering from asthma. Her husband, the Rev. Mr. H——, sent me a telegram to go down and attend her at Malvern. I mesmerised her during one week, twice daily. This lady had been mesmerised many times before, therefore, she was very sensitive to the treatment. Only a few mesmerisations were sufficient to cure her.

In the same year, Mr. B——, recommended by the Rev. Mr. G——, (who has had recourse to mesmerism more or less for twenty-five years) was attended for asthma. Ten mesmerisations were sufficient. When

he left he could breathe with ease, and had no cough.

In the year 1871, Miss H--, twentyone years of age, had been suffering since her sixth year—fourteen years. I was told that she had been under the care of nineteen doctors. She coughed and expectorated almost constantly. She had been attended by some medical men for bronchitis. She was very weak, the slightest fatigue would bring on paroxysms of pain, yellow complexion, no appetite, very emaciated. Her long sufferings had rendered her very nervous. Even after some time, I was in fear for her lungs. She came here accompanied by her mother, who had not left her since the beginning of her illness. The first mesmerisations were so successful in soothing her, that it gave us hope to continue the treatment. She was attended during the whole winter. After a month, there was a decided change for the best. Her appetite was better, she was less nervous; the cough had diminished, she had gained flesh, and was stronger. All symptoms of fever had disappeared; the feeling of soreness on the chest also; there was no more prostration. She became cheerful. She continued to progress under Mesmerism, until she was radically cured. She was attended six months every other day. Now she is quite well. I may consider this case as one of the best in Mesmerism. After a lapse of three years I have again seen her. Having caught cold, they thought it would be wise to be attended without delay. Certainly a few attendances proved very beneficial.

Few cases suffice to show the power of healing which Mesmerism possesses. I may here state that patients are never sent to sleep. During the mesmeric manipulations, conversation goes on. When Mesmerism succeeds, the disease is healed without the patient feeling anything whatever.

Catalepsy.—In the year 1865, through the kind recommendation of Lady L---, I was requested by the Rev. Mr. R-- to come and attend his daughter, who had been suffering many years from cataleptic fits. She had invariably two fits per day; sometimes they would last four hours, and leave the patient in great prostration. Many physicians had been consulted, and for some long time she had been under medical care. I went down into Northamptonshire, to their country seat. When I arrived, the patient was in a fit. I mesmerised her twice per day. At the sixth sitting she had so much improved, that her father, delighted at the result, consented to let her accompany me to London, and be placed under my The Reverend gentleman was acquainted with Mesmerism, but he saw, with much pleasure, the happy result we obtained in such a short time. She was mesmerised twice daily. The treatment lasted six weeks. During the treatment she had no attack. Mesmerism gave her much strength. Instead of going out in a Bath chair, she could walk a few miles without fatigue or reaction. After the treatment I constantly heard from her; she continued to keep well. These unusual exertions, for her, did not prevent her, on her subsequent arrival at her residence in London, from engaging in her affairs without fatigue. For almost twenty years her fingers had been in a state of rigidity; they recovered their natural flexibility.

Her satisfaction was only equal to her gratitude to the science to which she was indebted. Her husband had been relieved by Mesmerism. I attended him two months, and whenever he had an attack, whether at night or in the day time, Mesmerism always succeeded in relieving him.

Miss S—— was attended in 1868 for neuralgia in the eyes, with great pains in the head and face. The first mesmerisations were very successful in relieving the pain. I was requested to come again the next day, when we obtained the same success, and after ten days she was cured. The mother decided to place her other daughters under my treatment, as she had been herself cured of rheumatism.

Fever (Typhoid.)—The Baroness de P——had been suffering from typhoid fever, and medical men were despairing of her state. The family had consulted me by letter. Seeing that she was getting worse, and medical men giving no hope, they sent me a tele-

Therefore I did my best to restore the equilibrium, and put a "mens sana in corpore sano." He was cured. This gentleman had been himself a great Mesmerist, when young and healthy.

Mr. N—— had been suffering for many years with torpidity of the liver, and weakness in the digestive organs. He was mesmerised every other day during two weeks, and was cured.

"The fault of most works upon Animal Magnetism or Mesmerism, is that they are too theoretical, and do not convey any information as to the practical application of this extraordinary agent, which is said to be so potent in the cure and relief of many of the ills that flesh is heir to. It was first authoritatively promulgated by Anton Mesmer, a native of Mersberg, in Suabia, who, in 1776, on taking his degree of M.D. at Vienna, maintained in his inaugural thesis, that the planets had an influence over the human body. At that time there was a Jesuit at Vienna, one Vatter Hehl, who believed in the efficacy of the load-stone in curing certain diseases. Mesmer became acquainted with him; embraced his theory; put it in practice; and if we are not entirely to disbelieve contemporary records, he did so with great success. From him the science was called Mesmerism, though he himself termed it "Animal Magnetism." It attracted considerable notice on the continent. In England it was comparatively disregarded till 1829. Then a discussion on the subject was opened by Mr. Richard Chevenix, in the London Medical and Physical Journal, in which subsequently, Dr. Elliotson, Mr. Colquhoun, Mr. Herbert Mayo, the Rev. Hare Townshend, and others, took part. Some had the faith of M. Didier, and were implicate believers in the entity of the mysterious occult influence. Friends and upholders have been working quietly; they have made some converts to their faith, and have established a Mesmeric Infirmary in Weymouth Street, Portland Place.
