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PREFACE.

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It is not necessary for us to preface the contents of this work by any explanatory statement, so far as our regular subscribers are concerned, but the stranger to this system of thought and study may wish to know at the start what we mean by what we say. So we will explain to the stranger, to the one who picks this up for the first time, that we are simply teaching, through this publication, and other methods, a science that rests upon the foundation principles which evolve worlds, brings them to maturity, produces life and animation upon their surfaces and determines the movements, impulses, expressions and culminations of all phenomenal existences.

Astronomy pure and simple is the system employed; its occult or hidden influence in the affairs of life, being traced through the law of Magnetic Vibration, the Alchemy of Nature.

The simplicity of our method appeals at once to every mind capable of grasping any ordinary proposition.

Trusting a little attention will be given to the contents before judgment is passed upon its merits, we place it before the reading public as new food for thought.

INTRODUCTION.

In calling attention to Planets and People for the year 1900, we will give a brief synopsis of its career since its first inception, as we now have many readers who are not familiar with its earlier issues.

In 1894 a single sheet, 9 by 11 inches, was sent out weekly, containing a brief delineation of the planets, relative to things in general, and so great was the interest manifested by the few who received it that preparations were made for a regular monthly publication beginning with January, 1895. The first issue was received with great rejoicings and hundreds of letters of praise and good cheer greeted the editor from month to month as succeeding issues followed.

We found by the Planets that the year 1896 was a hard one all round, and especially so for the editor of Planets and People, so we merged the work for that year into one volume, and the young messenger was carried safely through, much to the delight of subscribers, for a large number preferred to have the information for the entire year in advance.

We, however, felt that a monthly was the more influential in extending the work we have in hand, so the monthly issue was resumed again January 1, 1897. It was continued as a monthly for two years, 1897-8, and, owing to other and more pressing work in the same line, we tried the experiment of issuing the work quarterly, which we did for the year 1899.

Now after all these varied experiments and experiences we again merge the matter into one complete volume for the year, in which form it will hereafter appear. This form is by far the most desirable to students of the law, and as most of our readers are students who make more or less pretension at the study of planetary influence we trust the present method will be in accordance with their wishes.

Planets and People has made a record in attracting scientific and philosophical minds that few publications have attained. Occultists in every country on the globe take it. It goes to Central America, South America, Australia, Philippine Islands, Central Africa and to many different nationalities of people. It interests both the old and the young, and many a business man and theatergoer has been held at home every evening for months at a time reading and studying the various truths presented in this little volume.

It is still in its infancy. The near future will open up a field for its influence which will surpass all expectation. It is this prognostication, made for the first time when the first issue was presented, that has given the courage to persevere in its publication.

Let all readers of Planets and People watch closely the progress of the work launched in its name, for it has come to open up a new way, a new time and the only universal science.



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THE EARTH IN SPACE.

It is almost inconceivable to man that this immense body of rock, earth and water in various stages of temperature has been going at the rate of eleven hundred miles a minute continuously for five hundred millions of years or more with scarcely a variation from a definite fixed path or orbit, and yet the fact is demonstrable.

The rolling of this great body, eight thousand miles in diameter, upon its axis; that is, turning once around every twenty-four hours, gives to the inhabitants upon her surface a movement that surpasses the first proposition so far as speed is concerned as it is so diametrically different in its relation to man. The speed of the journey around the earth is seventeen miles per minute, which is thirty-five times the speed of the fastest trotting horse. Yet the movements thus recorded are practically nothing in comparison with the revolutions of the little worlds we call cells in the brain of a human organism. They move as much faster as their size is proportionally less than that of the earth. This is a problem which goes beyond the power of mathematic computation, hence the marvelous statements made relative to bacteria and the multiplication of germ life, which the medical scientist is ever springing upon the public. Life is a marvelous thing, but the life of any one thing is in perfect harmony and accord with all other life according to the law, hence the life and action of a planet in space is the secret to all other living, moving phenomena of whatever name or nature. Think this over. It is food for thought.

ASTRONOMY AND ASTROLOGY.

GENERAL FORECAST FOR THE YEAR 1900.

In glancing forward and peering for a time into the future, relative to our country, our people and the general welfare of mankind throughout the world, we take as a basis for our reasoning and calculation the simplest known phenomena in the entire realm of science:

VIBRATION.

Electricity, its action and movement under the control and direction of man is the most readily accepted and best understood evidence of the law of vibration, for it shows that marvelous co-ordination in the nature of things which produces the harmonies and discords that arise from the contact of one body with another throughout the realm of nature.

The more recent achievements resulting in the transmission of messages through space give added interest and impetus to the study of all phenomena from the standpoint of vibratory activities.

It is the law of vibration in connection with the study of the stellar forces, and upon this relationship our statements as to the future are based.

Our solar system, well and clearly defined by astronomy, in all of its grand and beautiful exemplifications of mathematical accuracy as relates to the movements of the heavenly bodies, is a great vibrating machine with all manner of forces in constant interchange, one with the other, chief among which are those more potent and effective lines of force or activities which reach our own earth at such acute and vital angles as to produce sensations out of the ordinary.

These specific lines of action, or vibration, are the special currents for calculating the influences and resultant effects in the affairs of the world.

When the vibrations are of the Jupiter nature the chief things effected relate to the commercial or business sphere, hence, a good position and aspect of this planet in the universal scale means a general all-round good to the business world, and when the powers of other bodies are in the lead the result will be according to the nature of said planets and their combined strength. The Zodiac is merely a mathematical figure having for its separate functions a portion of space surrounding the sun in which the planets circulate. Its potential signiflcance is the result of the mass, density, distance and orbital relationship to the great central body, upon which the entire phenomena hinges.

Each planet as well as the sun and moon are centers of energy. A sort of storage battery for the inbreathing and outpouring of the universal currents.

The far off suns of space known as the fixed stars, produce a constant and unchanging effect; that is, the changes are so very minute that the senses of man are unable to record and make use of them, so they are not considered in the study of the near-by rays ever changing in angularities in a way to produce marked and striking sensations to the physical senses of man on things in general. As the moon lifts and sways the waters of the mighty ocean, producing the tides, and as this same moon is known to act upon the mental faculties of people, in a way to produce lunacy, so do the other bodies act and produce conditions in the world on the very same principle, which is nothing more nor less than the vibratory law of nature in varying degrees of intensity. With these few simple statements, designed for those

who may never before have given a thought as to the why of these things, we will proceed to give what we find must naturally occur among mankind during the twelve months of the year 1900.

THE GENERAL OUTLOOK.

We find the ruling planet of the year is that far off body Neptune, the ancient God of the seas, and we open the year with the planet Mars, the God of war, as the ruling planet of the day. These two elements therefore have a direct and important bearing upon the General Outlook, and the natures of these two magnets are very bad for War, Disaster, Conflagrations, Internal Discords, and general recklessness. They forebode severe Strikes, Duels, Murders and Tragedies out of the ordinary before the year is over. People in high places will be under the severest of this stress of forces as the sign of position and prestige, of government and religion are all stronger than for some years and the afflictions are severe.

The great swell given all branches of business during the past two years will continue to expand the business of this year and keep the wheels of progress moving forward in this important interest of the people. So we may all take hold and press on in the struggle for wealth the whole season through and make no mistake as to good times.

That terrible warfare will be carried on under the dominating forces of the solar circle could not be avoided except there be a general knowledge of the law that underlies the whole situation. This not being the case, the natural impulses of the physical man rule the situation and it means that blood alone will determine the results in hard fought battles.

The tendency is toward a general war of nations, and yet it would seem that the already blended interests of the leading countries are such that a conflict could not well be brought about. The greatest danger lies in the fact that Internal revolutions are more strikingly shown by the lights of the blue than that great national conflicts will be brought on. Among the special features in connection with this conflicting tendency, is the fact that the universal sign relating to the Religious world is the one in which the powers will be the most potent during the year.

This brings us to a consideration of the important event of the closing year of the nineteenth century, the subject of

RELIGION.

This year's outlook shows that the most stupendous undertakings in the name of religion are due to be launched during the twelve months before us. And we see in the figure that such undertakings have the planets in their favor. There is everything to show that the prime movers in this direction will meet with success. It is a time when great things can be accomplished in a religious sense.

Now, inasmuch as there are many dissensions among the various sects claiming the name of Christianity the time is near at hand for the coming together of the leaders of the various bodies of so-called Christians, and holding a council with a view of amalgamating their interests and forming a trust, as the saying goes. Everything points toward combination and united effort, the only bad feature being the possible revolution which may terminate the effort.

In America it is supposed that there is sufficient enlightenment among "Christians" to prevent a serious conflict in the coming together of different organizations, but this is not so certain when one stops to consider the terrible and bitter denunciations that have emanated from leaders in many divergent sects, relative to the creeds and methods of others. The most

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serious phase of religious movement is in the direction of the Government. Church and state, which, according to our Constitution, are to be forever separate is bound to have an inning during this siege, and the attempt to make religion a part of our public school instruction will arouse the most violent opposition and bring on such a crisis as will tax the Genius of "American Citizens"—Real American Citizens—to cope with.

Our Public School System, the Grandest institution ever fostered by any government since the advent of man, is fast becoming a branch of the political machinery of the nation, and it is through this branch that the real battle of freedom will be precipitated.

In short, the people of this country are fast legislating themselves into a condition of Anarchy and Rebellion which can only result in an internal revolution disastrous in the extreme to the welfare of peace and freedom. We say disastrous, but only for a time, for the people have tasted the sweets of freedom and the struggle for emancipation, when it comes, will be a hard one and the lover of freedom will finally triumph even though the present systems of education and religion fall. The man that fights for freedom knows no failure. He fights to the bitter end and is a hard fellow to down.

Class legislation, unconstitutional enactments and coercion under such scheming practices will be borne until the aggravation becomes unbearable, then look out for the commune.

The significance of the planetary currents are quite clear on these points, and, as said before, the promoters of these schemes in connection with the government and schools will have things in their favor during the year 1900, but the planet of reconstruction holds the balance of power for some years after, when the liberties of the people must be looked after regardless of results. We will state here that any system of public education that joins hands with a religious movement will take upon itself a burden that means a struggle of great moment to the people, and for this reason we need something besides putty men in charge of the national government. They must be American citizens in every sense that the term implies or the nation is severely threatened by class legislation terrible in its complications and entangling possibilities.

The time being near for the weighing up of religious systems it is evident to a student of universal law that something more tangible and in closer touch with scientific knowledge is demanded by the great majority who give the subject a little thought beyond the mere tinsel of the outer magical show.

The religion of the future therefore, must be divested of ceremonial magic such as has for its prime and basic object the coercion and subjugation of the mind rather than the development and emancipation of the individual from a condition of bondage and superstition that has characterized religious work for thousands of years.

The religion of the future must and will count it a crime to take children of ten years and less, and put them through a course of ceremonial magic, incantations and unnatural procedure for the sole purpose of enslaving them under a particular creed or system, that they may be made subservient to it and pay tribute throughout their lives for the support of such designing schemes worked in the name of Christianity. Yes, it will be treated as a crime, for no greater misfortune can befall a child than to be born and reared under the dominance of one of these mind-blighting commercial corporations of the religious (?) type.

Religions, therefore, are hanging in the balances, the scales that weigh in wisdom's ways and tells the tale of

woe unto the student of science.

The phenomena of Fire plays a card in the game of the stars which relate the various movements of men to the heavenly hosts, and we must not be surprised if we see the fire-brand carried extensively in many places ere the century is completely closed, December 31st, 1900.

We draw this entirely from the law, and as the sign of religion is the sign of fire as well, and as the powers of revolution, of religion and of freedom are gathered together in the name of law and order, it is ordained that these times are to witness something out of the ordinary in the way of demonstrations touching religion, education and legislation.

Leading and progressive minds in all denominational institutions are in the ascending scale and if they but knew the possibilities which the year presents for a new and better method of procedure, they would scatter to the four winds the disgusting mummeries and cumbersome rubbish of churchanity and step into the broad, open fields of nature and construct a new church with such natural true educational and progressive features as would carry everything with it and mark a new era in the worship of the eternal life. The time is at hand for such a movement and we predict that the year 1900 and 1901 will see a transformation in religious life such as has not been witnessed in a thousand years or since the Reformation.

IN LABOR CIRCLES.

The laboring community is not to be overlooked by the powers on high while the other matters are being adjusted. The laboring man is gaining favor with the planets rapidly, but his time is not yet at hand. He must pass the trying ordeal of money monopoly for a time, when a new phase presents itself to both the capitalist and the wage earner.

Trouble begins early in the year be-

tween these two powers, and money being the element of strength during all the year it will be impossible for the laboring people to proceed in a way to accomplish much for their side until after June is passed. The latter half of the year the money power becomes involved and the man of muscle begins a development that is more powerful than at any previous period since labor agitations became popular. This means that the last six months of 1900 will be exciting and that the presidential campaign will be a marked and interesting one under the agitation of the planet Saturn polarized to the mental man.

But it must be remembered that we stated the fact that the money power will be in force all through the year, yet the tendency of said power is to wane at the last, giving the lead to the majority or the great mass of the people. This means a very sharp, close run for both parties seeking national honors. The fall of 1900 looks dark for the powers in high places. The test of Governments in many lands will be severe. The bubble of the trust is due to explode and the beginning of the end will be upon us. The Presidential Campaign will be a hard fight from start to finish, much harder than ever before. The division of the people over the questions of war and territorial expansion will cut all party lines and create a new problem in the maneuvers of political wire pullers. Money was in the ascendant in the last struggle, and the coming conflict has not only money power but the planet Uranus is in the heights as well and the humanitarian thread, the sentiment of fair dealing and Justice which relates to a class of minds and characters influential and powerful when fully awakened, will penetrate deep into the great masses which casts the vote of decision in national affairs.

It is this element which will continue in power for some years, and its influence will be felt and realized more forcibly in the religious world than anywhere else.

The man under this planet will see

many victories ere the season closes. His inning is to be a long and influential one, to the great benefit of humanity at large. It is a reformatory vibration that thus stimulates and sensitizes the higher faculties of mind and perception.

And under the planetary currents, as explained, we shall glide through the year, finding ourselves at the end of the cycle face to face with the great problems of Government, Religion and Labor, which, on the eve of a new century, mean a reconstruction of the thought of the world.

The specific points of the law of the planets may be watched more closely by reference to the monthly delineations farther on in this work.

ASTRONOMY AND ASTROLOGY.

Astronomy is at the foundation of all prediction of whatsoever name or nature. The seers of old made their predictions not necessarily from a personal knowledge of the law, but through contact with it and such minds as had been trained in its mathematical precision. They may have received the visions from these other minds on the principle of mental telepathy or from their own interior natures in which the knowledge was previously stored; that is, in some former incarnation. But, by whatever method, the law of Astronomy was the basis of the truth presented.

We turn therefore with admiration toward the great achievements in astronomical research, and from the calculations so patiently and carefully made for the use of scientific minds in delving more deeply into the hidden and remote regions of space, we turn the subject into Astrology and relate all phenomena to the universal or planetary vibrations so clearly presented to the astronomer by the spectroscope. It has often been stated that Astrology was the mother of Astronomy, but this is an error. The stars of heaven first appealed to the vision of man, and for ages he knew nothing of their wonderful significance but the changes of position as he gazed night after night into the depths of space. Astronomy is millions of years older than Astrology. but the processes of knowledge and science are evolutionary, hence, Astrology is an evolution from Astronomyflowering out, as it were, of the finer, grander and more beautiful phenomena relating thereto. This places Astrology at the highest culminating

point of the study of stellar wonders and makes useful and applicable that which, alone in its astronomical sense, is more or less wearisome because intangible for general study and benefit.

Astronomy is a science which enables one to foretell future movements, conjunctions, eclipses and various other results, for years in advance, with a precision that almost staggers the senses. Astrology takes the same figures, analyzes the nature of the same identical vibrations which enable the astronomer to see the planets and find points of relatedness from which to figure his predictions, and when the real nature of the currents are determined the astrologer states the sensations that will arise at any future time in the organism of man, animal, plant or mineral as a result of such aspects. Very few people seem to understand why our Astronomers are so averse to Astrology if the same figures are used in each science; and right here is where the new science, and the new religion, and the new government will take root. Therein lies the fertile field for planting a new system of thought. This midway sphere is the real and definite location for a universal religion. It is just between the material and the occult or hidden forces of nature, and with a knowledge of the two applications of stellar science the coming emancipator will be born anew and take the lead in a new religious movement.

Who is to be the coming Light? Who is to be the one with the necessary knowledge, possessing the nerve and the required gifts, having the proper poise and power to stand before a world and announce the new time, and back it up by demonstrations which will command the attention and admiration of mankind?

It is he who will lead in the future movement for the religious enlightenment and spiritual awakening of man: and the time is close at hand for his appearance, for thus saith the planets —the stars of the eternal depths.

Astronomy and Astrology will then join hands and such achievements as will be heralded from ocean to ocean and continent to continent will astound those whose narrow and bigoted minds have held them in superstition and ignorance for these many, many years.


The Aspects. $-\delta$ Conjunction. β Opposition. \square Square. ***** Sextile. \triangle Trine.

Initials.—(P) Parallel. (S) South Latitude. (N) North Latitude. (R) Retrograde. (D) Direct.

Aries is the first sign of the Zodiac, and Pisces the last. Aries begins at the extreme bottom of the figures of the Zodiac used in our system, extending to the right 30 degrees, where the sign Taurus begins, and so on around to the end of Pisces. Each sign is 30 degrees, the twelve completing the circle of 360 degrees.

Mercury is the planet nearest to the Sun, Venus comes next, then the earth on which we live, then Mars and so on out to Neptune, according to the order in which they are above placed.

The Moon has four phases, and in order to tell in what phase or quarter the moon is in at any time, as shown in horoscopical illustrations, remember this: New moon occurs when the moon is in conjunction with the sun, or to make it a little plainer, when the moon is between the earth and the sun. The full moon occurs when the earth is between the moon and the sun. The first quarter occurs when the moon reaches a position just behind the earth as she moves along in her orbit; and the last quarter when the moon gets just ahead of the earth. The various phases of the moon are shown in the accompanying illustration.



PHASES OF THE MOON.

In order to become familiar with the influence of the stars and be able to judge correctly of the horoscope of any given date, one must be quick to remember the above signs, the position and relation of the zodiac and the varying angles of the aspects.

When studying this work, bear in mind you are learning Great and Grand truths never before given to the world in a manner so simple, clear and accurate, and never before explained on a strictly scientific basis.

The difficulty of engraving the real signs in the monthly figure renders it necessary to use a round figure with small dots, representing the moons of the various planets which have such attendant bodies.

THE ASPECTS.

The aspects as given above apply to both the Geo-centric and Heliocentric systems, but an opposition Geo-centrically is not an opposition Helio-centrically, therefore the following explanation is given:

GEO-CENTRICALLY.

Conjunction means that two planets appear to be in the same position in the heavens.

Opposition means that one planet is on one side, or in one direction, and another is on the opposite side of the earth.

Square means when two bodies are apparently 90 degrees apart.

Sextile means 60 degrees apart.

Trine means 120 degrees apart.

HELIO-CENTRICALLY.

Conjunction means two planets in the same sign. (See illustrations in this work.)

Opposition means when planets are on opposite sides of the Sun.

Square means three signs apart.

Sextile means two signs apart.

Trine means four signs apart.

ABBREVIATIONS.

The letters indicate Geo-centric relations. (P) Parallel, meaning the same distance north or south of the equator. (R) Retrograde, means that a planet viewed from the Earth, appears to be moving backward because of the more rapid flight of the earth in relation to the outer planets. Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, and the slower movement relative to the inner planets, Mercury and Venus. (D) Direct, means the opposite, or moving in a direct course in their orbits. Helio-centrically there are no retrograde movements; all being direct.

The letters placed in column of the Moon in the tables, signify the crossing of the nodes of the Moon and making the change in latitude north and south.

Letters found in planets, columns show the same changes as regards latitude, P, R and D having reference as stated.

The planets in the horoscopical figures may be designated by their relative positions to the Sun, and by the fact that Mercury and Venus have no Moons, the Earth one Moon, Mars two Moons, Jupiter five Moons, Saturn with Moons and Ring, Uranus four Moons, and Neptune one.

HOW TO GET INFORMATION FROM THE FOLLOWING. GEO-HELIO TABLES.

The delineations which follow in connection with the Geo-Helio Ephemeris and Almanac are simply astronomical records of the planets' places for the year, real and apparent, the main and influential aspects being given for the convenience of students.

By noting carefully the statements made as relates to the various applications of the law, Business, Speculation, Health, Children and Marriage, and referring to the tables for signs and aspects a deeper insight into the reason for such conclusions will very readily be gained.

When the average of power is such as will produce a harmonious wave or current upon the earth a general all-round good feeling will prevail, and when the average is one of antagonisms the people as a whole will be in such a state, and trouble will begin to manifest itself in their lives as well as in the life of all things. A little attention to these combinations as they come on and pass away will give added strength (mental force) to combat or rather to withstand the various changes.

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
BUSINESS AND WEATHER GUIDE.

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SEEDING.

From the 1st to the 5th will be an excellent time to sow root seeds, plant the sweet potato, as well as other potatoes; start the peanut on its way and make ready for top onions, cabbage, wheat, rye, barley, rice, flax and other top stuff, beginning the 5th and lasting three days, when peas, oats, buckwheat, cotton, tomatoes, grapes, berries, etc., may be started under the best conditions. Then, after these last are in, which is the work for three or four days from the 8th, corn and especially sugar cane should be planted or sown. Fourteenth, 15th and 16th are regular cane days. The juice will be enormous from this time's seeding. Try it and report. Corn may be planted all the week from 15th to 22d. Flowers will thrive if seed is sown after the 22d. Cucumbers, squash, melons and running vines of all kinds from the 24th to 30th.

Surgery, 6th to 15th. It is not a good month for such operations.



ASTRONOMICAL PHENOMENA FOR JANUARY.

MORNING STARS.—Mercury, Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus will be morning stars all this month. Saturn, however, will not be visible until about the 20th, while Mercury will be hidden in the sun's rays after the 10th. Jupiter will appear very large and bright at an angle of about 35 degrees from the horizon at 5 A. M. Uranus, just below it, scarcely perceptible, and Saturn still low when the time comes for his appearance. Mercury will be due east close to the approaching rays of the sun. EVENING STARS.—Venus and Neptune rule the night during January, Venus appearing in the west after sunset, while Neptune will be rising in the east, reaching the zenith at about 11 P. PREDICTIONS.

Good soap is the thing to use on the brush and suds is a good gargle as well as nasal cleanser. Deep breathing through the nose and a thorough exercise of the head, neck and shoulders will greatly enhance matters and bring about a cure.

ATMOSPHERIC DISTURBANCES.

February 1st is a storm period, but a mild temperature in winter latitudes generally. We will no doubt experience thunder storms and a sleety time about the 4th, followed by the fall of snow in great quantities, the storm lasting in its complete run until the 12th, when a cold snap is due. 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
latitudes in other countries, hence it will be well to observe the following dates if the most prolific growth is expected:

From the 1st to the 5th: Roots, such as produce their fruitage below the surface of the ground. This is important to follow closely, as the volume of the harvest will be, in many fields, fifty per cent greater if planting is done during these dates. It is a specially good year for roots where seeding can be accomplished at this time. From the 6th to the 10th: Wheat, Flax, Barley, Rye, Rice, followed on the 10th by Oats, Buckwheat, Peas, etc.

The corn and cane period begins 12th and continues for eight days, up to the 20th. The first three days are the best, however.

From the 20th to 25th vines, squash, pumpkins, cucumbers, etc.

The 25th to 29th brings a second period for roots, as already shown. This latter period is not as good as the first.

STARS OF THE MORNING.—About 1 A. M. the planet Jupiter rises in the east the first of the stars of the morning. He is followed very closely by Uranus and Saturn, these three ruling the first half of the twenty-four hour cycle. Mercury and Mars are hidden in the rays of the sun, leaving Venus and Neptune as rulers of the evening hours. About the 24th Mercury may be seen for a few moments just after sunset in the west, if the night is clear. It will appear between Venus and the sun very close to the horizon.

PREDICTIONS.

BUSINESS .- The Business outlook for the month of February is not quite so promising as during January, yet not seriously bad by any means. This is an Iron month, and in this particular field a large output, increasing demand and much activity will result. It is a little stiff for most other lines, but a general good trade is sure. The medicine business may be pushed with profit at this time, therefore the month of January is an advertising month for this branch of trade. We sometimes have to suggest a previous time already written up for such procedure as advertising and making preparation,

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
SEEDING IN MARCH.

THE PLANETS IN MARCH.

The stars we shall see in the mornings of this month will be Jupiter at the Zenith at 5 A. M., Uranus a little to the east and Saturn still farther toward the east, all three within a space of thirty degrees or thereabouts.

Mercury, Venus and Neptune are evening stars, while Mars is mingling his vibrations directly with the suns, or so near that he is hidden from view. A very important movement of Jupiter occurs this month in his passing over the line between Scorpio and Sagittarius. This change, together with a similar movement of Mercury. places four planets in the sign Sagittarius and creates a new condition upon which to base our calculations for the latter half of the month.

TO CLEAN MARBLE STOOPS.

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

THE HEAVENS IN MAY.

The month of May presents the same morning and evening stars as did the month of April, their apparent positions in the heavens having changed but slightly. 

THE PLANETS IN JUNE.



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
tically on as if nothing had happened.

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





ECLIPSES IN 1900.


There will be three eclipses during the year, as follows:

First: A total eclipse of the sun by the passage of the moon directly between the earth and the sun. (See A in illustration.) This occurs on May 28, in the afternoon. Partially visible at New York, Washington and vicinity, but a total eclipse through the southern states and Mexico and along the southern boundaries of the Mediterranean Sea, ending up at the Pyramids.

The second eclipse is that of the moon (see B in illustration), caused by the earth passing between the moon and the sun while the moon is at her full. As the earth does not pass directly between the sun and moon, the eclipse will only be a partial one, but visible in the eastern portion of the United States.

The third eclipse occurs November 21st, which is an annular occurrence and will be visible in Australia and the southern portions of Africa only. There will be special tides out of the ordinary on the days of these eclipses.

The high tides come when the moon is in the new and full phases, or on the following day and during a total eclipse of the sun the action of the moon is more forcefully accelerated, hence produces a stronger influence upon the ever moving waters.





NOVEMBER METEORS.

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Every twelve years or thereabouts there is a more striking meteoric display than during the intervening years at this season of the year or any other.

This year is the twelfth since 1888-9, when a great display in the heavens created much comment.

One of the specific reasons for this periodic display of shooting bodies is the position and influence of the planet Jupiter which, with its wonderful power, in conjunction with the sun, acting upon the earth, and the aspects of the moon therewith. The cycle is about past ere the month begins, yet there should be quite a display. They result from the over stimulation of the earth, which draws upon the floating matter of meteoric dust and runs it to ground. The passage of the accumulations through our atmosphere giving rise to the shooting star appearances by reason of the friction which ensues. Their exact location is very difficult to calculate, but may be seen in many directions.

The accompanying illustration shows the dilemma of the astronomer over this simple phenomena.

The specially high and strange tides at various points July 22d last was another peculiar phenomena of planetary eccentricity.



A clipping from the "Scientific American" has been referred to the editor of Planets and People for remarks, owing, we suppose, to the resemblance of the circle and radial lines to the Zodiac. It is interesting to find that from observation the law of certain angles produce such definite polarities in the lives of animals. While this is founded upon a theory, it nevertheless illustrates a definite fixed condition in the science of Astronomy and Alchemy. A very technical treatise on the subject by J. Carter Beard in the "Scientific American" gives many interesting features on comparative zoology, but space will not admit of so extended an article here. We can say, however, with all candor, that the illustrations present many points in planetary science which students will readily grasp.

They will observe that man is in line with the perpendicular ray and that he, like all the other species is merely a radiation from a central point. That is, he is stimulated, backed up and sustained by the particular ray that has its greatest potency in a line perpendicular, and that such a thread or ray of life is laden with the larger and more universal radial influence. In other words, all rays are curved and move in spiral form, hence a curved ray having a formation of physical life attached will "ground" sooner or later, according to its length of orbit. The direct ray of man, however, can not

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run amuck the earth and return unto itself. Therefore man is a distinctly different creature, yet one of the many and varied forms of life under the same law.

We have stated in some of our works the fact that the "ray" should be sought if one wishes to find the secret spring of life. It reads thus (1894 Law and Prophets, Page 41, second paragraph): "The soul of man therefore, bears a certain relation to, and must co-ordinate with a certain principle, power, force or energy expressed in that wondrous orb. Seek ye the ray that binds your soul to him, and you will find the way that leads to power and wisdom."

It .s the specific ray of man that we refer to. That separate and superior ray to which man as a radial formauon and expression is directly in polar harmony.

VACCINATION

Falsely Credited With Abating Small-Pox.

"There are three kinds of falsehoods," said a clergyman at a church club in Brooklyn, N. Y., "lies, darn lies and statistics." For many years past the advocates of vaccination boasted that in the German army, where every man was vaccinated, there were but very few cases of smallpox, while in the French army there were very many cases, because of the lack of vaccination. The fact that every French soldier had to be vaccinated repeatedly, has spoiled the The vaccinated table of statistics. French army happened to have more cases of smallpox in a given period than those of the German army-provided the statistics didn't lie.

We are told that the deaths from smallpox in Germany have been reduced from 140,000 in 1871, to 200 in 1898, as the result of rigid compulsory vaccination. No credit is given to concomitant sanitary regulations which have been the sole agent in abating the ravages of the disease.

I used to discuss this question in print until I realized the folly of the controversy, and became a pessimist Still, my iconoclastic proclivities propel me to repeat for The Progressive Thinker the following English statis-

tics which I gave to the New York Sun fourteen years ago:

Vaccination was made compulsory in England in 1853, again in 1867, and still more stringent in 1871. Now mark the result as given in the vital statistics authorized by Parliament. Since the first year named England has been visited with three epidemics of smallpox, each more severe than the preceding, as appears from the following figures:

And now you tell us that in New York City (August, 1885), where vaccination is not yet compulsory, the disease has almost disappeared, while in London, where most stringent compulsory laws prevail, the smallpox is raging.

All the foregoing facts appeared in the Sun of August 21, 1884, with the editor's own heading in these words: "Vaccination a Fraud—New York Healthier Without It." But now, to my great surprise, you repeat the audacious assertion that vaccination has driven the smallpox out of New York, and to my intense disgust you add:

"Yet there are some more or less educated persons of a cranky disposition who write to us urging us to denounce vaccination as an outrage."

It is sanitary regulations, and not vaccination, which abate the ravages of smallpox.

The anti-vaccinationists have always been able to demolish the pretensions of their adversaries. I don't wish to say any more on the subject. Let Brother Peebles come forth with his "pen-gatling."

CANNIBAL CONNOISSEURS.

How the Mpongwes Prepare Human Meat.

P. A McCann, after 19 years' residence in West Africa, tells a thrilling story of his stay among the cannibal Mpongwes. These savages believed that the white men ate white men, as they themselves eat their fellowblacks. A big chief offered Mr. Mc-

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Cann the smoked thigh of a native. This was considered a gracious act. To refuse it would be unfriendly. Mr. McCann was in a dilemma. But he feigned illness, and said he was not eating just them. The chief eventually put the matter off good-humoredly by saying he supposed the white man preferred white man to eat instead of black man.

The Mpongwe cannibals of the most pronounced type thickly inhabit the banks and forest regions of the Gahoon and Elobey rivers. Although they kill game for food they much prefer human meat to any other. Human flesh, they say, has a rich flavor about it which is entirely absent from any other kind of meat. They eat all enemies they kill or capture in war; the latter are tortured before being put to death. In fighting with an enemy who has pressed them hard and caused them much loss, the bodies are eaten very soon after the capture and when the heat of war is upon them.

The bodies of enemies killed by stealth they generally treat differently, for, not being excited by hard fighting or losses, they deliberate more over the pleasure the eating will afford them, and go more leisurely about the preparation of the meat. The flesh having been cut up is cooked in plantain leaves. The method of doing this is as follows: Several leaves of the plantain tree are cut at the base of their shafts from the trunk of the tree, and the midriff of the leaf, which is thick and full of sap, and so prevents the leaf from bending easily, is dexterously pared down with a single cut of a knife. The leaf is then held over a fire, and under the influence of the heat softens and becomes as flexible as cloth. All the leaves are treated like this, and are afterward put one on top of another, and then gathered up so as to form a basin-like receptacle.

A quantity of human meat, cut into small pieces, is then placed in this, some water and dika fat made from the fatty kernels of the seeds of the Mangifera Gabonensis are added, after which the leaves are gathered together at the top and tied round with the fibrous strips cut from the midriff when preparing the leaves. The bundle is then placed over a slow fire for seven or eight hours, and the flavor

of the meat thus cooked, according to Mpongwe connoisseurs, surpasses everything in the world's bill of fare.

Besides he told me what kind of a business to interest myself in in order to succeed. Perhaps this was the best part of it, for I like the new venture, and it seems to be just the proper thing. There must be something in it, yet I don't know a thing about it. I am just giving my experience, and I consider I got the worth of my money a hundred times over whether I was fooled or not. Results are what I'm after.'

EARLY RELIGIOUS FORMS.

In "Sex Worship" Mr. Clifford Howard exhibits a collection of curious data and draws many interesting conclusions from them respecting early forms of religion. In his showing these forms concerned the worship of figures and symbols that typed the power of generations. Creative force in human kind, in birds, in goats, became the image of that creative force that clothes the world anew in spring, that fills the earth, the air and the water with animal life, and that in the perpetuation of races leads to the hope of immortality.

There is little doubt that the phallus, representing the male principle, was one of the first religious symbols, and that modifications of it were for thousands of years worshiped, carried in processions, made a subject of sacrifice, decorated with flowers and anointed with wine and oil. The yoni, or opposite element, also had its factions, and the two were sometimes involved in deadly warfare. From these symbols we have the pillar, the church spire, the cave, the pyramid, the lanceolate window, the cross, the shell, and many other appliances of modern temples or modern worship, the origin of which has been forgotten and the purpose of which has been subverted.

The feasts and celebrations in honor of fertility, that at last became so gross that even Rome could not endure them, had their beginning in what we would consider as immoral and indecent, but what the ancients intended as solemn and reverential practices. Some of the barbarian and savage tribes of the present day continue acts in their worship that are directly derived from the sex worship of past centuries.

THE ORACLE.

In this department of Planets and People we have made it a point to treat all questions that may be sent in for elucidation. Personal matters must not enter into the queries, however, as they must be of general interest and possess educational features such as will make the department of lasting benefit to all our readers. The questions presented in this year's work have been accumulating for some time and we select the most important ones, believing they will be of interest to all.

There are many theories and curiously strange notions in the minds of many people relative to life, the occult realm and to phenomena in general, and this department is kept open for the express purpose of meeting the demand for rational answers to ail questions that may arise, of whatever name or nature. It makes valuable reading for those meeting with the science of planetary law for the first time, as many things are explained, and all questions answered from a strictly scientific standpoint. Parties sending questions hereafter will have to wait some time for answers, but they will be filed as received and published in due time.

Question.—Reference has been made in Planets and People to certain strange noises which a few people can hear that others cannot. What kind of noises are they; what causes them, and what do they signify?—A. F., Arizona.

Answer .- Persons of a sensitive and highly spiritual or receptive nature are attuned to finer vibrations than those of a more materialistic stamp, and such characters are gifted in detecting sounds that never touch the coarser tympanum. There is also a certain nature that has a combination in the personal magnetism that enables those in spirit life to create a sound in by coming into it and playing upon it with a magnetic current from the vocal cords. This may be a fine buzz, a short click, a slightly squeaky noise, or it may be a fairly audible voice or word. This is not, however, the clairaudient gift necessarily. One may be clairaudient and have the other conditions mentioned also. The questioner is no doubt clairaudient to a degree and hears sounds that are not produced directly in his

own aura, but in the aura of other people and things. This is true clairaudient power. A person with this gift highly developed will often catch clearly sounds produced some distance away. It is the faculty of catching the finer and hidden currents that convey various noises through space.

In all probability this person hears the sounds produced by those on the astral plane who come and go in his presence while alone, when everything is quiet. The noises may be these and also sounds of other curious natures, the detection of each being a clear and finer sense which should be cultivated until a better understanding of the whole is brought about.

Q.—We hear a great deal about occultism, and I would like to have you explain what occultism really is.—Mrs. A. C. S.

A .- Occultism is that branch of one's education which has to do with things not taken cognizance of by the five physical senses. In so far as occult phenomena is brought within the realm of the five senses it is objectivized, or materialized, hence ceases to the degree of its objectivity to be occult or hid-den. It is then made apparent. As man, or, more strictly putting the case, as an individual becomes enlightened relative to the principles, laws and conditions which underlie the hidden phenomena of life and things he merges into the finer sphere of realization, and his sixth and seventh senses then become a part of his everyday life. They are the more active and far reaching senses and border on the deeper phases of occult law to a degree that one may become perfectly neutralized between the outer and inner realms of existence. When in this state he dwells on the borderland between two spheres or octaves, and sees and realizes fully the operations of natural law in both realms.

Q.—Is it right for man and wife to be divorced, or is the teaching of the church relative to the indissolubility of the marriage bond correct?— Thomas.

A.—The questioner evidently has in mind the decree of the church of Rome on this question of marriage, and our answer is taken from nature, based upon the law universal, which makes no mistakes. If it was right to hold those together who are thus bound by church decree, after due baptism and devotion in the faith, nature would never disturb or separate them, but instead of this, we have the fulfillment of the higher and diviner decree which in certain cases overrides man's power and renders the twain, driving them apart forever. In every realm of nature this law is supreme and with human kind the highest type of intellect with the most perfect realization of right and wrong, of humanity and justice, it is no less effective and in reality it should be the more effective than in any other. And let those whose vibrant currents become crossed by storm and wave take to the first life preserver that presents itself, and paddle to a harbor of safety, independence and freedom.

Q.—It has been intimated from time to time that the year 1900 will be a severe one for religious denominations. What particular denomination will be affected most?—R. S. T.

A .- There is no denomination but what will feel the disintegrating forces that are rampant in the starry dome at this time, and grave dissensions will arise in each, causing people of the same church and congregation to take sides against one another, split up and start out anew, each on what they believe to be the proper line. The general awakening of all people to a more rational and liberal policy in connection with so-called religious procedure means the destruction of many empty forms and ceremonies which have been fostered upon the minds of trusting and confiding humanity for the sole purpose of controlling them in thought and action. Not that there is any conflict between what was meant in the ancient records and the truths of the present, but because of the designing systems that have grown upon certain ideas of the truths the early writers aimed to convey, and do convey to the man of science and wisdom. From now until that time the churches will be in the throes of hopelessness.

Q.—Who is to be the next President? —H. M. H.

A.—This is a question which can be dealt with at this time only from the data of the candidates.

The law will show, however, if traced deep enough, the exact locality upon the earth's surface where the child was born which is to be the next President of this republic. There is nothing strange in this to one versed in the law, for was it not foretold in past time that a child would be born at a certain time and in a certain place which would rule in the hearts of men? WILLIAM J. BRYAN.

The fact that William J. Bryan sprang suddenly from a clear sky into the arena of national politics, and, in the face of phenomenal odds against him, particularly in a money sense, made such an unprecedented record toward victory is evidence of his being tried again this season.

Assuming, therefore that he will be placed in nomination we give a few points relative to the planetary influences that will be for or against him' at the November cast.

If our data is correct, Mercury and Mars, affecting the points of power in Mr. Bryan's horoscope will again defeat his efforts to get to the front and win the race.

His figure of birth, however, is a strong one and a persistency is shown which will make him a hard man to down.

His next chance of making a score will come in 1904, when Jupiter will be in a position to give him power and start him on an upward career again, which will culminate in 1908 under favorable auspices for honors and recognition generally.

Q.—What has the oracle to offer relative to the agitation going on over the seating of Congressman B. H. Roberts of Utah? Should he be debarred from a seat after being duly elected because of his religious faith?—H. C. Z., Salt Lake.

A.—This department was intended for questions bearing upon the subject matter presented in the body of the work, but this question may not be out of line, as the law is universal and must explain all points relating to planets and people. So our answer is this:

A man that has the nerve to take unto himself more than one wife to love and provide for, holding both in equal position, respecting each alike so far as holding an honorable place in society and the world, is, for many, a man to be admired.

Solomon, the so-called wisest man that lived, had hundreds of wives, and in many countries it is a common practice and religiously observed and respected by the people.

Contrast this custom with that of a senator or congressman, who has one wife whom the nation respects as his complement, who loves one or more other women and to whom he pays a more marked respect and with whom he spends his pleasantest hours, to say nothing of the money and presents which he freely lavishes upon them.

The nation respects the latter and questions not the purity of his life so far as its influence in the nation's welfare. There are thousands of just sucn cases in every large city among men in all the various levels of society, from the lowest to the highest, and in many instances the real wife lives apart from her husband while the paramour fills the place she was given to occupy. Now comes the question of the law, the universal law, and we find that variety is the spice of life, that nature revels in multitudinous relations and situations; that there is no set rule that will apply to all people in this or any other relation, and, furthermore, na-ture gives the desire, the inspiration, the determination to people and things to seek that which seems the most desirable and reasonable for comfort and the attainment of freedom and happiness. Therefore we say that the congressman-elect from Utah, from all that has been done and said relative to his career, holds a high and honorable position in the affairs of the nation, as is shown by his majority count, based upon his fitness as a gentleman for the office he is elected to fill.

The so-called laws of the land, acts of the law-making bodies, may forbid such relations as polygamous marriages, but if the constitution guarantees the right to each citizen to worship God according to the dictates of conscience, and polygamous marriage is a part of one's religious convictions, either the constitution or that portion of it which alone gives it standing in a supposedly free country must be suppressed or that one class of religionists must suppress another class and by force, not religious persuasion, coerce them into accepting that which is contrary to belief and conscience.

This simply means that religion and the propaganda of religious sectarianism must be carried on by conquest, by military procedure and strife, by war and rebellion, by inquisitorial torture and murder, for the martyrs of every cause are a we and active to-day more numerously than ever before, and the price of freedom is never so high as to cause a halt in the acts of the respective apostles.

There is something in the very fact that two ladies have become so reconciled to one another that they can share the honor of the position of wife in relation to one man, that challenges our holiest admiration. Yet we can readily see that for those who have not attained to such a brotherly or sisterly state, sad indeed would be the lot of many who might venture a trial.

It seems just as necessary to pass a law that all priests and other bachelors as well as old maids, shall marry or leave the country, as to say that a man shall not marry but one woman, and then allow some bigoted, narrowminded and rebellious set to pester him into a state of anarchy for following the dictates of conscience as primarily guaranteed by the rock of ages at the foundation of the nation if he oversteps the edict.

Dealing as we do with all subjects from the standpoint of the highest and all powerful actuating force of nature, we can not take sides against the freedom of conscience in any question that may be presented. The question of marriage, as we have stated many times, is within the keeping and jurisdiction of a higher law than that of legislati e enactment, and any attempt to abridge the rights of the people in this respect can only stir up strife, propagate debauchery, crime and dis-ease, and take away liberty and the right to seek happiness and harmony, the chief desideratum of living. This is a question which is being brought out at this time by the election of Mr. Roberts, and among those in opposi-

tion to his being seated are some old maids who are so young that they are not supposed to know much about the right or wrong of connubial relations, therefore the matter depends upon the deliberations of more mature and experienced minds.

A sensation of national magnitude is very liable to evolve from this attempt to deprive Mr. Roberts of his seat in congress, for the "inside" of others in high places may be opened up to the people for consideration and the passing of judgment. Yet the Bible tells the devotee to "judge not, lest ye be judged."

Q.—What is the condition of the churches to-day1—H. O. M.

A .- We define the situation as follows: The Catholic Church is a great commercial scheme, worked under the guise of religion, for revenue first, last and all the time, no phase of its operations being without a definite and special system of financiering, which means a steady and unceasing flow of shekels into its coffers. One of the chief sources of revenue is the system of working each and every office in each and every town and city in the land, by bands of so-called sisters of various orders, begging from any and all classes in the name of charity. This practice is the chief promoter of laziness and beggary among the people, for many see how easy it is to get money without working, therefore make begging their occupation, evidently concluding that it is not a bad thing to do when the church sets such a striking example.

The Protestant denominations come a little closer to the humanitarian idea of procedure in their so-called religious work, yet to-day we find them in the throes of contention and disruption, their ministers changing beliefs and leaving their flocks to start on broader and more independent lines, while the laymen are scattering in all directions seeking that which will give a little light unto the soul.

They, too, are in a sea of doubt and darkness that is pitiable, yet far in advance of the Catholic position because of the larger field of investigation and a lighter yoke binding them to an established line of thinking.

These Protestant denominations are built upon the social rather than the commercial basis, and as social societies they may be called a success, but when it comes to knowledge, they are as far in the dark, or nearly so, as any.

It is the blinding influence of greed that prevents the light of reason penetrating the chambers of superficially religious minds. Science alone must and will make its way into the world of church work until the entire face of its ancient markings will be cut away and a new wave of comprehensive information will sweep in and illuminate the whole edifice.

And thus we find the various cults, struggling in the agonies of despair, knowing not which way to turn for guidance midst the breakers of the times.

TONS OF DIAMONDS.

Turpentine mixed with carbolic acid and kept in open vessels about the room will, it is said, greatly lessen the risk of contagion in scarlet fever, diphtheria and kindred diseases.

A mixture of fine sand and plaster of paris, wet up to the thickness of mush, and applied with a blunt knife. will mend small troublesome holes in the wall.

GUILLOTINING IS PAINFUL.

The London Medical Journal publishes the report of Dr. Cinel of Paris, asserting that guillotining does not immediately affect the brain. The French doctor says the blood first comes from the larger vessels of the neck, and that there is hardly any drain upon the circulation in the cranium. The brain. he adds, finds nourishment for an hour after decapitation, during which time the person decapitated retains his or her senses of hearing, smelling, and Absolute death, Dr. Cinel seeing. claims, does not ensue for three hours. Thus, it is pointed out, guillotining, instead of being speedy, is one of the most prolonged and horrible forms of capital punishment.

THE FAKIR.

Verbosity has another drawback-it not only does not sell goods, but it also creates the impression that the man who uses it is a fakir, probably because fakirs are always loudmouthed and verbose, says the Re-porter. No matter in what language a fakir speaks he usually knows only a smattering of its grammar and rhetoric. The fakir likes to spell truth with a capital T, to show the great reverence he has for veracity; and there are numerous other things which the fakir does and which brand him as unmistakably as the changeless spots which

mark the leopard, notwithstanding which fact there are some retail dealers unable to detect the claw in the velvet and hence are constantly being "worked" to the queen's taste by fakirs. Beware of the fakir, for he is abroad in the land; and whenever you discover him give him a wide berth.

THE SALARIES OF GOVERNORS.

LAWS.

What are Laws? What is it that determines whether a certain proceeding in accordance with the rules for the enactment of so-called laws by legislative bodies is productive of real law or not?

Let us analyze the operation from start to finish.

A certain man conceives of a plan for the furtherance of the interests of the people at large, or, as is too often the case, for the special advantage of a private firm or class of people interested in some specific and personal matter. He frames a bill setting forth the importance of the measures in relation to the community, the people, the whole people, the nation and its welfare.

The proceeding thus far is correct and proper.

He then proceeds to bring it before the legislator representing his district and through him seeks its passage.

This is also proper and in perfect accord with right and justice.

We will not enter into details as to the things that may or may not be done in connection with its complete adoption by legislative enactment, for it may be honestly or dishonestly carried through. We will, however, take the matter from the time it is declared a law of the land. Now what have we to deal with? Merely a legislative enactment.

Is this law?

We make the bold claim here and now that it is not law in the real and true definition of the term. Why do we make this claim? Because it has been proven over and over again that it is not always law and if thus shown on one occasion even, it is sufficient to cause one to question as to the validity of all other enactments.

Many of these so-called laws are on the statute books and they furnish the opportunity to thousands of the most disreputable vampires and unscrupulous robbers that walk the earth to pester and coerce the innocent and unsuspecting citizen into giving up his little gains to protect him from a severer trial and crucifixion.

Therefore the question arises, What is Law?

The Constitution of the united States specifically states the foundation principles upon which our laws must be founded. This being the case any legislative enactment contrary to

these basic principles is unconstitutional, hence is not law at all, but a mere pretense, a counterfeit, a scheme of the most damnable type to secure power and prestige for the few at the expense of the many.

One of the most diabolical enactments in these times is that relating to medical practice. It is promoted by the profession and for the profession, no other person ever benefiting one iota by it.

Under this measure many innocent, good, kind, humanitarian and needy people are being tortured and driven to distraction every year, creating such a state in society that it is becoming necessary for one to fight for his life in order to escape the butcheries of the ignorant practitioner, the chief beneficiary of the scheme. It is time that something was done in the direction of making laws that would relieve the people from such onslaughts.

The medical law is but one of hundreds of enactments that are designed for special and private gain at the expense of the many.

The recent legislation relative to the Flag, while it aims to protect our National Banner, and justly, too, is, by the defective methods of law-making, made the means by which many persons are forced to pay tribute to these shyster lawyers and hell-hole justice courts which are becoming so rank in their methods that the term justice has no meaning in connection with them.

This should not and would not be possible if laws were enacted on a just and honorable plan.

Is it possible to have a just plan?

The trouble with the whole scheme of law-making, and the unscrupulous proceedings against innocent persons lies between the passage of a measure and the supreme court of the United States. It is in this open field of exploit that the schemes of those seeking class legislation find a rich and ever growing harvest. In this vast area the plundering and crucifying processes are worked to the limit, stultifying reason, conscience, liberty and all that makes for a larger, broader and grander civilization.

A JUST PLAN FOR MAKING LAWS. We suggest what we believe to be a just plan upon which to formulate and pass laws for the people without in any way disturbing or changing the present method. It is this:

Recognizing the superior ability of

the minds that sit in judgment in the highest courts of the land, before any act of any legislative body becomes law it should be passed upon by the highest tribunal of the state in which it is presented, and by the supreme court of the nation if relating to matters outside of state jurisdiction.

Its constitutionality should first be determined before it is taken and used as a bioodsucking machine for sapping the very life from those for whom the measure purported to protect and benefit. ...Il laws based upon right principles and in accordance therewith are good for each and every citizen.

Now, it may be argued that the supreme courts are too busy to take up every little enactment and give it the attention necessary to a final judgment. Then we say increase the number of supreme judges.

If we are going to make laws of the people, by the people and for the people, it must be done without leaving open this middle ground for combat and injustice, which lies between the beginning of a legislative act and its final removal from the statutes by some superior court because of its unconstitutionality.

It is this kind of practice, this, system of law-making, this corrupt scheme of making a tool out of the government by allowing great loopholes and incomplete methods to exist for the express purpose of enabling one class of people to feed upon and devour another class; it is this kind of work that is creating a condition among the people that forebodes an internal strife of terrible proportions sooner or later.

The word freedom is becoming obsolete. A man has no freedom to choose a natural death. The tendency is if a man says he is sick, under legislative enactment-not law-he is taken and cut in two, and if he lives, the score card of the professional carver tallies one. If he dies the law protects the murderer. That is what it was intended for, yet it is so worded that to the ignorant it appears as a measure of protection for the sick and the unfortunate. This medical law is unconstitutional upon the face of it, but it takes money to fight the organized band of butchers and carry a case up to the final judgment, and even then, it is claimed, there is the possibility of a decision favoring the barefaced and unquestioned imposture if the price offered is high enough.

It is this possible failure in the attempt to secure justice in matters of such importance to the people, that causes us at this time to merely suggest what we believe should be done toward a solution of the problem ere it is too late, and the people become so enraged that they take the law in their own hands and create an internal revolution destructive to peace and civilization.

RUINS OF' EL-KARNAK FALL.

Nine Columns of the Great Hall of the Temple of Thebes Crumble

Into Dust.

Cairo, Oct. 9.—News has just reached here of the recent fall of nine columns of the great hypostyle hall of the Temple of El-Karnak, built by Zetee I, dynasty XIX, one of the most magnificent and celebrated relics of the architecture of ancient Egypt.

The great hall of El-Karnak, which is the most notable of the monuments of Thebes of its class, is 170 feet long and 329 feet wide. The stone roof, now partly in ruins, was originally supported by 134 columns, the loftiest of which were nearly seventy feet high and about twelve in diameter. It was built by Zetee I and sculptured partly in his reign. Work upon it was continued by his son and successor, Rameses II.



HOW TO LIVE A CENTURY.

Pure air is food for the lungs, as bread is food for the stomach; and an inexhaustible supply of it has been furnished, fresh and free, to every living creature. It is possible for a person to live a whole month without solid food; but when deprived of fluid to drink, life becomes extinct more quickly; but when deprived of air, the person can live only a few moments.

All through life's journey, from the first breath in infancy to the last act of respiration in old age, air is an absolute necessity.

This vitalizing element, with its invigorating influence, can be heard playing in the tree-tops, whizzing around the corners of the house, and we feel it fanning our own cheeks; it is everywhere, rushing along on errands of mercy, imparting life to man, plant and beast.

Air is a life-preserver; it is the particular friend of man, and he who barricades the doors and windows against this life-saving friend, gives a cordial invitation to disease and death to enter.

Open the doors and windows, and let the sun shine in, and let the wind blow through the rooms every morning, for they are disinfectants performing labor of a sanitary nature. Breathe long and deep; fill the lungs to their utmost capacity with pure air several times each day, and keep the home well ventilated night and day; and remember that when night comes on, all the air you have, in or out of the house, till the next morning, is "night air," and you cannot bottle day air enough within the sleepingroom to last through the night; so by all means let the air circulate through the room, and thus keep a fresh supply of this life-giving element constantly with you.

More fresh air is required during sleep than when awake, for increased quantities of poisonous products are given off from the lungs and skin at this time; so each respiration renders the air in an unventilated room more unfit to be breathed again.

Keep the windows sufficiently open so the fresh "night air" can come in from one side, and the impure air can go out through the other. The upper sash should be down one inch and the lower sash up one inch for each person sleeping in the room. A lamp burning in the room should be counted as equal to one person, and a gas jet equal to six or more persons, according to the size of burner. It is suicidal for any person to sleep or live in an unventilated room, for when deprived of pure air, the person will die sooner than from being robbed of any of the other life elements.

The writer has seen many instances where vines covered with heavy foliage were growing before the windows of the sleeping-room, for the express purpose of keeping out the sun. The sun, like the air, is a powerful agent, prolonging the life of the human family by burning and in other ways destroying the enemies that are lurking about in our pathway. So, in place of shutting the sun out, remove every obstruction, curtains, blinds and vines, and let your friend shine in.

Sunshine and fresh air make cheerful homes, and, combined with wholesome food, pure water, and cleanliness of the body, make cheerful people; and cheerfulness inspires activity, like the sparkling brook, as it glides so gracefully over its pebbly bed, proving a blessing to everything within its reach, and making living objects happier for having passed that way.

"A merry heart doeth good like a medicine; but a broken spirit drieth the bones." Prov. 17:22. Be cheerful always, in the home and away from it; "look on the bright side," and cultivate a desire to make others happy, and happiness will not be a stranger to you.

Carlyle said: "Wondrous is the strength of cheerfulness, altogether past calculation its powers of endurance. Efforts to be permanently useful must be uniformly joyous,—a spirit all sunshine, graceful from very gladness, beautiful because bright."

If we would live to a "ripe old age," we must entirely abandon the use of tobacco in all of its forms; also the use of alcoholic beverages, for they are enemies, dangerous in character, stealthily undermining the foundation on which life depends.

One of the most common causes of nervousness and dyspepsia is tea and coffee; there are 3,000,000,000 pounds of tea, and 1,000,000,000 pounds of coffee consumed annually. Tea and coffee waste vital force, impair digestion, and affect injuriously the nervous system; they break down the delicate house in which we live, and prevent the builders from repairing the same, and, if allowed to continue in their work of obstruction and destruction, the house will surely become uninhabitable and useless.

MASTICATION AND TEETH.

Dyspepsia Not the Only Evil Resulting from Improper Chewing of Food.

Mastication is rapidly becoming a lost art, and although we have become hardened to the fact that three-fourths of the dyspepsia is due to this cause, it might surprise some to know that the early decay of the teeth and diseases of the gums are occasioned by this same lack of maxillary exercise. A disease of the gums, called Rigg's disease, which is every day becoming more common, is caused almost entirely by the want of proper mastica-tion. Twenty-five years ago this trouble was not considered of any importance on account of its rarity. To-day it is given more care than the decay of the teeth.

When attacked by Rigg's disease teeth that are otherwise healthy and strong become loose in the jaw, and after a time nothing can be done to help them. By lack of exercise the blood that should nourish both the bones, the gums and the teeth is not carried to the parts, hence the enamel formed is defective and early decay results. Frequently, too, the mechanical development of the jaw is arrested by the same want of motion.

Among the earlier races defects of the jaw and teeth were almost un-known. In examining the skulls of thousands of Indians, early Britons and Chinese, not a single irregularity of the jaw is found, and the teeth present are sound and well formed. The food which these people lived upon, such as roots, herbs, corn and uncooked meats, required a great deal of chewing, and as a result the muscles of the jaw were dense and hard, the bones large, regular and firm. Most of the food among the better class of people to-day is cooked so as to require very little mastication, and the consequence is that the muscles have become flabby, the jaws slender and the processes for the attachment of the muscles almost obliterated.

DRUGS DO NOT STRENGTHEN.

Temporarily Stimulate Man by Drawing on His Reserve Forces.

There is no drug yet discovered, so far as we know, unless it be alcohol, which distinctly adds force to the body when it is taken. All of the so-"strengthening remedies," called which enable a man to accomplish. more work when he is under their influence, do so not by adding units to his body, but by utilizing those units of force which he has already obtained and stored away as reserve force by the digestion of his food. Kola, coca, excessive quantities of coffee and tea and similar substances, while they temporarily cause nervous work to seem light, do so only by adding to the units of force which a man ought to spend in his daily life, these units which he should most sacredly preserve as his reserve fund. The condition of the individual who, when tired and exhausted, uses these remedies, with the object of accomplishing more work than his fatigued system could otherwise endure, is similar to that of a banker who, under the pressure of financial difficulties, draws upon his capital and reserve fund to supplement the use of those moneys which he can properly employ in carrying on his business. The result in both instances is the same. In a greater or less time the banker or the patient, as the case may be, finds that his reserve fund has disappeared and that he is a pecuniary or nervous bankrupt .- Therapeutic Gazette.

IMAGE IN THE ROCK.

Brazen Relic of Bygone Days Found in a Well at Robinson, Ill.

At a depth of 27 feet, while blasting rock in a well, at Robinson, Ill., a brazen image was found.

The image represents an angel bearing in one hand the bowl of what is supposed to have been a candlestick. In the other hand is a lamb. The image was undoubtedly imbedded in the rock. In the same vicinity there have been a number of instances of finding pieces of petrified wood.

The supposition is that centuries ago the old valley of the Wabash river was inhabited by an artistic and intelligent race of people, long preceding the American Indian.
